

President's Report

Amidst the changes and upheavals of the eventful year just passed, the Minnesota Auxiliary has pursued the even tenor of its way, and so far its accomplishment has not been perceptibly diminished by the bewildering demands which press in from every side. The thing which stands out most prominently in the year's work is our week of "The Pilgrimage of Prayer." Under the able management of the Devotional Committee, it was a source of deep strength and inspiration to the Woman's Auxiliary in particular, and to the church in the Diocese, in general. Another source of strength and helpfulness is our Deanery Meetings, which bring together women who cannot always attend the larger conferences. There have been enthusiastic meetings in four of the Deaneries this year. One of the St. Paul Deanery, at Ascension Church, Stillwater; one of the Winona Deanery, at St. Paul's Church, Winona; one of the Faribault Deanery, at All Saint's Church, Northfield, and six monthly meetings of the Minneapolis Deanery at the various city churches. The educational work has proceeded with regularity and with increasing popularity and success. On the material side of our work, we have given generously, not only through the Blue and the Red Mite Box Offerings and the usual Missionary boxes, but we have contributed also to St. Agnes School, Kyoto, to missions in Alaska, Wyoming, Akita, Japan, and to our own Sheltering Arms. These special pledges were all assembled at the last annual meeting (except the Sheltering Arms) and have been paid with gratifying promptness. The year has been fraught with change, in the Diocesan Auxiliary as elsewhere. We have been called upon to mourn the loss of our Beloved Bishop, and of our energetic, faithful and devoted President of the Little Helpers, Mrs.

Perry L. Norris—both are enshrined in our love and in our memories. Other changes face us in the resignation of Mrs. Morrison, Recording Secretary, and Mrs. Ballard, Treasurer. It is with deep regret and grateful appreciation of their services that we accept these resignations from the Executive Board. Today we welcome with pleasure our newly installed Bishop to his Auxiliary Parish and pledge him its loyal support.

The problems which confront us on the threshold of the new year are rather appalling; it is a time of tremendous testing for the church and for the Auxiliary. If the only cure for the present world-sickness is Democracy, those of us who know our Lord and His plans must know that Democracy is only "safe" as a Brotherhood which is built upon the "Fatherhood of God." The world will not be "safe for Democracy," or anything else but brute force, if we are slackers in the extension of the ideals and principles of Christianity. In this connection, I wish to recommend to the women of the Auxiliary in particular, the Church Branch of the Civilian Relief Committee of the Red Cross. Let us take as an added duty the care and oversight of the families of our church men and boys who are at the front, as well as of the boys themselves—it is mission work and as such belongs to us. Those men must feel that the home church is behind them, and it devolves upon us to show the practical value of our professions. If the duties of citizenship make insistent calls upon us, then the time is here for us to give "until it hurts," but we must not be "slackers" in our work for the church.

Minutes of Annual Meeting

The 36th annual meeting of the Minnesota Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in the Church of St. John the Evangelist, St. Paul, Thursday, October 11th, 1917.

The services of the day opened at 10 a. m. with celebration of Holy Communion. The address was given by the Rev. H. M. Ramsey, of Faribault, on the topic, "The Woman's Auxiliary and Citizenship." Following the communion service, Bishop F. A. McElwain extended greetings to the women of the Diocese. He said in the past five years he had had an increased sense of the importance of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and he hoped the Minnesota Branch would not neglect the needs of the church while doing patriotic work. He suggested the motto, "These ought ye to have done, and not to have left the other undone;" and not to forget the words of St. John, "Ye are of God, and the world lieth in wickedness."

Rev. Edward Cross, Rector of St. John's, welcomed the Auxiliary most cordially.

The morning offering was taken, Bishop McElwain read noonday prayers.

At the close of this service the President, Mrs. H. C. Theopold, took the chair.

Bishop McElwain announced the presentation of the Red Mite Box offering, taken during the singing of hymn 478.

The roll was called, showing an attendance of 216 representatives.

Rev. Edward Cross announced luncheon, inviting all to remain.

Meeting adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Meeting was convened at 1:45 with prayers read by Bishop McElwain.

Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The President's address was given, being most encouraging as a mirror of the work of the past year.

Reports of Secretaries followed. Mrs. Robert Williams told of an interesting meeting held at St. John's Church, Rochester.

Mrs. O. A. Spies, Corresponding Secretary, thanked the parishes for co-operation. All the missionary letters had been promptly taken and splendid boxes sent out during the year.

Mrs. F. B. Bass, U. O. Treasurer, reported over \$1,069.00, a slight advance over the corresponding year of the last Triennium.

Mrs. R. B. Ballard, Treasurer, said over \$400.00 had been paid in pledges, and gave a most satisfactory report.

Miss Elizabeth Yardley, President of Juniors, reported boxes sent at a valuation of \$699.70, making total of all money raised, \$1,376.77. Miss Yardley announced plans already formulated to reorganize the Junior Department on lines similar to those of the Woman's Auxiliary; having a full quota of officers and active work done by these various officers.

Miss Margaret Densmore, Church Periodical Secretary, said vigorous work had been done—far reaching and successful—including sending literature to soldiers, which she hoped to continue as a special feature of this department.

Rev. Mr. Tyner, editor, brought to the attention of the convention the uses and abuses of the "Church Record," urging renewal of subscriptions and earnest patronage of that paper.

Miss Mary Smith announced the coming of Miss Mills to the Diocese, and urged attendance upon the study classes—suggesting mission study be continued during the glad seasons of the year, as well as during Lent. Miss Smith gave a report of the "Pilgrimage of Prayer"—the closing meeting would be held Sunday next before Advent, November 25th, with celebration of corporate communion and an offering taken for St. Agnes School, Kyoto.

The Committee on Credentials reported 42 dues received and 39 credentials taken.

Mrs. E. S. Gaylord, Chairman of Finance Committee, stated the Red Mite Box offering to be \$1,547.00; recommending two-thirds of said amount be given Bishop McElwain for Diocesan needs, one-sixth be divided equally between the three scholarships—namely, Bishop Whipple, Bishop Gilbert and Cora Bronson, and that \$25.00 be given to the Sybil Carter memorial fund, the remainder be sent to Missions House undesignated.

The Committee on Resolutions was instructed to act also.

The Committee on Nominations was instructed to pass ballots.

Rev. Dr. Rollit spoke of the status of parish apportionments.

The report of the Little Helpers was read by Mrs. Wm. Remington. At its close Bishop McElwain asked the convention to rise and unite in silent prayer for the work of the dearly beloved leader, Mrs.

Carrie H. Norris, whose tireless hands had so recently been laid away to rest, the Bishop voicing the prayer, "May the soul of our faithful sister rest in peace, and may light perpetual shine upon her."

Mrs. Theopold called attention to the church literature to be had at the door. She commended the parishes for liberal response for special work of the past year. She mentioned several appeals, but earnestly recommended aid for Mrs. Evans at Akita, Japan, and immediately received nearly \$100.00 in pledges from various Branches.

A conference of parishes followed, lead by Mrs. Williams, each telling of the most important incident of their work during the year.

Report of the Nominating Committee was read, the election resulting in two changes: Mrs. George Prince elected to the office of Treasurer, Mrs. E. S. Gaylord to that of Recording Secretary.

Miss Kathrene Sleppy presented the following resolutions:

RESOLVED: That the Secretary be instructed to express the sympathy of the Auxiliary—

To Mrs. William C. Pope and family, for their loss in the death of the Rev. William C. Pope, who was always the friend and helper of the Woman's Auxiliary in all its phases of work;

To Mr. Perry L. Norris, for the death of his dear wife, Mrs. Carrie Norris, for thirteen years the beloved and faithful Diocesan President of the Little Helpers;

To the family of Mrs. W. B. Folds, for the death of their mother, who was a charter member of the Minnesota Woman's Auxiliary and its first Secretary and Treasurer, serving in that capacity from 1882 to 1890;

To Mrs. S. L. Fraser, President of St. Mark's Auxiliary, Minneapolis, for the very recent and sudden death of her husband, Mr. S. L. Fraser.

RESOLVED: That the Auxiliary assembled extend to their beloved Bishop, Bishop McElwain, their pledge of affectionate loyalty on this his first day among them as their Bishop now enthroned.

RESOLVED: That a vote of thanks be extended to the Rector, choir, women and all members of St. John's parish who have joined in such kind and friendly hospitality to the Auxiliary.

Corresponding Secretary's Report

Madam President and Members of the Auxiliary:

Another busy year has passed, during which 470 communications have been sent out. These included letters, postal cards, reports and report blanks, notices of meetings to Diocesan branches and to the clergy, programs and press notices.

Sixty Missionary boxes were sent from the Diocese, valued at \$2,519.63. These boxes often contained many things besides the requested articles and were the expression of loving thought and care.

When no acknowledgment is received by a Branch within a reasonable length of time, it is requested that the Secretary be notified.

In the Spring, parcels-post packages were sent to the Mission at Allakaket, Alaska. Nine Branches contributed and the total value was \$380.43.

Shortly after Easter Mr. Kobashi, of the "Widely Loving Society," Osaka, Japan, called upon the Secretary, with letters from Bishop Lloyd and Miss Emery, commending him and his work. Before his departure from the city he returned to tell of the kindly manner in which he had been received by the Auxiliaries and to express his deep gratitude to them for the financial assistance given for his work.

Notwithstanding the increased demands upon us all in these days, the Corresponding Secretary has found the same loyal support from our faithful parish leaders and members. This is most gratefully acknowledged.

Report of the Educational Secretary

In January, 1917, I conducted a Normal Study Class on "The New World," in Detroit, Mich. Immediately upon my return to Minnesota, similar classes were held in St. Paul, at Christ Church, and in Minneapolis, at St. Mark's Church, also a class for leaders in Merriam Park, at St. Mary's, using the "Acts" as a basis for our study. A course of ten lessons on "Missions in the Sunday School" was presented, during the second term of the Minneapolis School of Religious Instruction. In June I was the leader of the Normal Class at the Minnesota Summer School of Missions, where we discussed study class methods and demonstrated the same by assignments from and discussions of "The New Home Missions." There have been many miscellaneous calls for me this year, to fill in on programs, to give book reviews for Auxiliaries, and to speak before study clubs on "Latin America from the Viewpoint of a Mission Study Class."

Our advance has been in the enlistment of young women and older girls for mission study. I rejoiced in the splendid attendance and earnest attention of the young women in classes at Gethsemane, Holy Trinity and St. Paul's, Minneapolis, and at the University.

I wish to record here my hearty appreciation and gratitude to Mrs. Hector Baxter, Mrs. Robert Williams, Mrs. F. E. Olney and Mrs. W. R. Terry, who have assisted so much by conducting classes outside of their own parishes. By their help, and that of the Educational Council, with its Deanery committees, our educational work is being strengthened and spread. Mrs. F. E. Olney has been appointed Custodian of Literature. She will have material for programs and suggestions for study, also the recent communications and leaflets from the Church Missions House.

Our study for 1917-1918 is most opportune. In Minnesota we suggest that the courses on "Missions in the Bible" be used and that an effort be made for a diocesan campaign in Bible study and reading. In the past years our rectors have been our helpers and advisers; may we continue to look to them for guidance and encouragement in this year of our need, that all Christian men and women may know the comfort in God's word and the strength of His power.

Those who love them can still keep boxes and each Sunday put in a gift, and ask God's blessing on His little ones who believe in Him, binding together the church militant and expectant.
