REPORT OF PRESIDENT

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Minnesota, as a whole, has made splendid progress during the past year although funds for carrying on the work have been greatly curtailed. Reports from heads of our diocesan departments show a steady improvement along every line of endeavor.

The establishment of two new departments, the Christian Social Service and the Junior Auxiliary, has been the means of bringing in many earnest workers, who, previous to this time, have not been greatly interested in Auxiliary activities.

Two of our larger deaneries have been divided making eight in all and it is Bishop Keeler's desire that we have at least two meetings a year in each deanery. Nearly every deanery has carried out the plan and it has been a very great success—the joint meetings in the fall bring all Church workers together—the Auxiliary holding an afternoon session followed by a supper and then a conference of each division held separately to talk over plans. Following this conference all groups come together for an evening meeting with speakers. The joint meetings are presided over by the Dean of that deanery in which the meeting is held. Some Auxiliary groups prefer all day meetings in the spring beginning with Holy Communion and having the regular Auxiliary program and election of officers. It is the general opinion that whatever is best for the growth of the Church and spiritual needs of its members will finally be adopted and become a regular program for the year.

Three diocesan meetings of the W. A. have been held during the past year and ten Executive Board meetings at which it was the privilege of your President to preside. It was a pleasure to attend the deanery meetings held in the fall and to hear the fine reports given by the Auxiliary groups. It has been a hard struggle for some of the small groups to keep going but they are not giving up.

It is generally conceded that the membership of the W. A. in Minnesota is growing rapidly—the meetings are so well attended that it is difficult for the rural deaneries to take care of those who come. Annual meetings have been held in rural deaneries for some time past in order to reach every part of the diocese and it is hoped this custom may continue and plans made for the accommodation of all. The number attending the last annual meeting exceeded all previous records.

The splendid co-operation of our Church women makes it ever a privilege to work with them. The unhappy conditions everywhere have not discouraged them but made them more thoughtful, kindly and generous. May we give God the praise for all that has been accomplished and ask Him to grant us strength to meet the many tasks that will confront us in this new Auxiliary year.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY

There have been ten meetings of the Board with an average attendance of 16, and three Diocesan meetings during the year from May 1, 1932, to May 1, 1933. The fiftieth annual meeting was held at Austin on Thursday, May 19, 1932, with Bishop Moulton of Utah and Mrs. George Bancroft of Stillwater as the speakers. The semi-annual meeting was held at St. John's the Evangelist, St. Paul, Wednesday, October 19, 1932, with the Rev. George L. Brown, Hospital Chaplain at Rochester, the speaker. Mrs. S. B. Solhaug of Minneapolis reported on the summer conference. The midwinter meeting was held at St. Paul's on the Hill, St. Paul, Thursday, January 26, 1933, with the Rev. C. Rankin Barnes of New York the speaker at both morning and afternoon sessions. The attendance at these meetings was between three and four hundred. The Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor attended each of these meetings.

At the annual meeting at Austin the Constitution was amended as follows:

Art. IV, Sec. 1. The general officers shall be a president, first and second vice-president, treasurer, U. T. O. treasurer, corresponding and recording secretaries, librarian, supply secretary, educational secretary, rural work secretary and Christian social service secretary.

In the resolutions adopted it was voted to re-establish the Junior Auxiliary as a Diocesan organization.

More work was done this year than in the banner years of 1929-1930, but owing to the decline in prices, the value of the boxes has been considerably reduced.

Many parishes have sent two or three boxes and the Junior Auxiliaries in several parishes have shown a great interest in this department of the Auxiliary work.

There are just two parishes in the Diocese who have consistently refused to do Supply Work during the last four years.

The Supply Fund, the fund which the Supply Secretary uses to buy materials for those parishes which are unable to purchase their own materials for the garments to be made, has been of great help.

Strange as it may seem, fewer parishes used this fund this year than last. Thirteen parishes and missions were helped in this way this year.

A detailed report of the work of each parish will be listed in the Year Book.

Rev. and Mrs. Ten Broeck are very grateful for the large amount of clothing which has been sent to the Indians at Birch Coulee during the past year.

The Supply Secretary is finding it increasingly difficult to estimate the amount of Diocesan work the parishes in Minnesota do each year. Practically every parish is helping in some way, our three Diocesan institutions: Sheltering Arms, The Church Home, and Birch Coulee.

REPORT OF JUNIOR AUXILIARY SECRETARY

When this work began a year ago, our survey showed there were fourteen church organizations for girls in the Diocese. Several of these were choir clubs and organized church-school classes which did no church work besides the special purpose for which they were organized.

There now are twenty-three groups, all carrying out, in part or wholly, our recommended program, which stresses devotions at meetings, parish and community service, missionary education, and the linking up of the girls' work with the Auxiliary through W. A. speakers, United Thank Offering boxes, and Church Periodical Club work.

We are encouraging reading of religious and missionary books by sponsoring a reading contest.

I was helped enormously in starting this work, new in many ways, by the advisory committee, Mrs. J. E. Hanzlik, Mrs. J. D. Bronson, Miss Mary McKinlay, and Mrs. Charles Beard.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB FOR THE YEAR 1932

The distribution of magazines without cost of parcel post being so desirable these times, the giving of them locally has been encouraged. The Parish Secretary is asked to get in touch with the heads of various institutions in the Diocese. They have done this and the list of institutions to which material has been sent follows: Poor farms, 6; sanatoriums, 3; city hospitals, 5; orphanages, 2; Indian missions, 2; old people's homes, 4; county jails, 4; hospitals for crippled children, 2; private hospitals, 4; visiting nurse, 2; settlement houses, 3; miscellaneous institutions, 13.

Packages are sent to mission stations in the U. S. A. and also to foreign countries such as Brazil and the Philippines. The total amount distributed by all branches is as follows:

Current periodicals sent regularly, 95; donors of same, 37; Bibles, 45; Prayer Books, 18; books, 697; Church School material, 1,917; odd magazines, 12,323; Christmas and seasonal cards, 28,786; picture cards and calendars, 1,247; music, 54; miscellaneous, 13,487; institutions in Diocese aided, 43; expended by director, \$15.30; expended by secretaries, \$215.04; total, \$230.34.
