PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Another year of worthwhile activities of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Minnesota, was finished with the holding of the fifty-second annual meeting in Mankato, May 16th, 1934. This meeting was one of the largest and most inspirational we have ever had. The communion service was held in St. John's Church but it was necessary to retire to a neighboring church of much larger size in order to seat all who came. It was the first time the Auxiliary has been fortunate enough to have the use of a microphone and all in attendance were able to hear the entire program. Bishop McElwain, Bishop Keeler and our guest speaker, Bishop Roberts of South Dakota, gave most helpful addresses. Mrs. Roberts, who is the member at large on the National Board from the Sixth Province, gave a brief but interesting talk.

The Deanery meetings held during the past year have been well attended and members of the Woman's Auxiliary have taken an active part in the programs.

The steady growth of the Junior Auxiliary branches and the excellent work being done by these Juniors promises a brighter future for the upbuilding of the Woman's Auxiliary in this diocese.

Considerable interest has been taken by Woman's Auxiliary members in the United Thank Offering this year and many ways and means have been devised to make the amount worthwhile when presented at General Convention in Atlantic City.

Our "Day of Prayer" held November 11th of last year was widely observed. The Lenten study groups were well attended. Members of the W. A. took an active interest in the Summer School Conference held at Carleton College in June. A full quota of delegates from the Minnesota Auxiliary attended the Sixth Province Synod held in Hastings, Nebraska, last fall and a like number has been elected to attend the General Convention in Atlantic City in October of this year.

Y president attended eight Deanery meetings, three Dioc. meetings and ten Executive Board meetings during the past Auxiliary year.

May the new Auxiliary year find us ever ready to do our part in parish, deanery and diocesan work and not forgetting that the women of the Church are organized to help the National Council in its work of bringing Christ's Kingdom to all men everywhere.

The fifty-first annual meeting was held at Red Wing on Thursday, May 18, 1933, with the Rev. Mr. Wm. Poyseor, Archdeacon of the Diocese of Marquette, as the speaker at the afternoon session and Miss Margaret Van de Grift of Austin, speaker at the morning session on "The Junior Auxiliary at Work." The semi-annual meeting was held at St. Luke's, Minneapolis, on Thursday, October 5, 1933, with Mrs. Marguerite Harmon Bro as the speaker at both morning and afternoon sessions. The mid-winter meeting was held at St. John's, Linden Hills, Minneapolis, on Wednesday, January 24, 1934, with the Rev. Mr. Harold Holt of Oak Park, Illinois, as the speaker of the afternoon session. Bishop McElwain attended the annual meeting and Bishop Keeler all three meetings. The attendance at these meetings has been between 350 and 400 persons. Mrs. J. O. Bach attended the Synod meeting at Hastings, Nebraska, as a delegate from the Diocese of Minnesota.

It does not include any diocesan work. The value of the large amount of second-hand clothing this diocese sent to Birch Coulee and to the mission stations cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.

REPORT OF JUNIOR AUXILIARY WORK

There are now at least twenty seven active girls' organizations, using our Junior Auxiliary program in whole or in part. Of these six are newly started during the past year. Besides these twenty-seven groups there are five or more who meet irregularly, or for one special purpose only.

The work done by the girls includes sewing for mission boxes, doing much Church Periodical Club work, giving money and service to their local churches, doing Christian Social Service, reading and studying missionary and church literature. Many of them are working now making little doll beds of candy boxes for a Minnesota missionary, Miss Bernice Jansen, to use in her kindergarten work in Japan. Some of the girls have U. T. O. boxes and we expect many more to use them this year.

We hope to have a united service for the girls in the early fall at a Twin Cities' church.

The group at Austin won an award for the amount of reading done by the girls in 1933.

In conclusion, may I leave with you one thought to take back to your parishes? Who is going to do the work of the Auxiliary, the work you all do now—ten, twenty, thirty years from now? And how will our girls learn about that work—its interest, its bigness, the satisfying rewards of it—if we do not teach them?

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY TO THE SHUT-INS AND ISOLATED

As no report was made last October, the following outline is for the year from May, 1933, to May, 1934.

Statistics are boresome, but a few are necessary to indicate the work done. In the past year there have been sent out:

240 letters (nearly all with enclosures).

210 cards (Christmas, Easter, Birthday, etc.)

Approximately 200 church papers.

Many miscellaneous articles such as jig-saw puzzles, prayer books, book-marks, quilt pieces, etc.

212 calls have been made and last summer over 70 bouquets of garden flowers were carried to shut-ins.

The attempt has been made to permeate these material objects with a spirit of real friendship and there have been rich returns.

I shall be most grateful for any additional names of shut-ins. I can be addressed in care of Gethsemane Church, Minneapolis.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB FOR THE YEAR 1933

The Church Periodical Club is constantly seeking new outlets. This year two very definite lines were developed, the work for institutions of the diocese and that for the men in government camps. The various branches reached 72 institutions in the diocese. These included nine county farms, five county jails, sixteen hospitals, four tubercular sanatoriums, four settlement houses, also orphanages, old people's homes, and the Veterans' Hospital.

Contacts were made at six government camps in the state, with one in Iowa and with Archdeacon Poyseor who visited camps in northern Michigan. Material distributed included prayer books, magazines, puzzles, games, playing cards and seasonal cards. Much special work has been done, one branch reports 23 knit caps made for the Veterans' Hospital, and another five crib-quilts for a colored settlement house.

During the year the Club distributed 21,835 seasonal cards and 13,045 magazines. The Woman's Auxiliary, the Junior Auxiliary, the Daughters of the King and many church schools have co-operated in the work.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

May 16, 1934.

The service given by the library goes on as usual. We find all the time, even among the dyed-in-the-wool Episcopalian, many who have never heard of it, who do not know that they can read all these good books, without charge, and they all exclaim at the great privilege of being allowed to borrow the books in this way. One interesting thing this year is the surprising number of young people from a number of parishes in Minneapolis who have been interested in reading everything we have about the Church.

From May 1, 1933, to May 1, 1934, we issued ten hundred and twenty-six books, the largest circulation so far. We have received this year from the Auxiliary Board and from fines \$84.95. With this we have purchased thirty-four books, and still have on hand a balance of \$24.52, most of which will be spent this month on books for summer study on Japan.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF EDUCATIONAL AND RURAL WORK

I compiled and sent out the study book program for the year. I contacted seventy-two parishes, in groups or separately, some city parishes twice. I instituted three evening groups.

I spoke before Y. P. F. and Junior Auxiliary gatherings, and addressed nine reciprocity meetings.

I attended this Synod meeting of the Province at Hastings, Nebraska, and ten deanery meetings of the diocese.

I held teachers' institutes for study group work in St. Paul, Minneapolis and Anoka. I held six Lenten classes in St. Paul at Christ Church, and six in Minneapolis at St. Mark's Church.

I have written 374 letters.

I have attended meetings of Diocesan Board of Religious Education and represented the Woman's Auxiliary on the State Board for Adult Education and on the Federated Council for Allied Church work.

I conducted survey of educational facilities in selected parishes of the diocese for the National Educational Department, New York City.

I am at present conducting a like survey for the Woman's Auxiliary in all parishes outside the Twin Cities.

REPORT OF MARSHALL DEANERY

The second annual meeting of the Marshall Deanery was held at St. Paul's Church, Pipestone, in mid-October. The meeting opened with a short devotional service by the Rt. Rev. Stephen E. Keeler, D.D. After this service Bishop Keeler outlined the program of the diocese for the deaneries. A nominating committee was appointed to select nominees for the various offices of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Marshall Deanery.

After a delicious dinner served by the women of the Guild, the Rev. O. H. Aanestad, as dean of the Marshall Deanery, presided at the evening session. The speakers were Bishop Keeler, the Rev. Addison Knickerbocker, D.D., and Mr. E. R. Coppage. Representatives from nearly every parish in the deanery were present and a considerable number of instructors and students from the Indian school were in attendance.

The parishes of the deanery are showing an increased interest in supply work and study of the Church and its work as a whole.
