THE ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1936-37 has been a year of enthusiasm and hard work for the women of this Diocese. Our aim has been to unify the womanhood of the Church. Through the splendid leadership of the Deanery Presidents, by their conferences, teas and friendly gatherings and through the efficient guidance of the parish presidents, a consciousness of doing things together is gradually evolving. Each parish is beginning to feel a part of the whole.

Many of the younger women have caught the larger vision of the Church's work and it is a deep pleasure for me, as I go about the Diocese, to see them enthusiastic and willing to do their part in the building of the Kingdom.

The semi-annual meeting was held in St. Paul's Church on Wednesday, October the 7th. Prof. R. W. Scott, professor of romance languages in St. Paul's University, Tokyo, addressed the women on the "Church in the Orient." He was a charming and entertaining speaker. The entire afternoon was given over to an exhibit and sale of mission-made handicrafts. Some five hundred women were present.

The mid-winter meeting was held at Gethsemane Church, Minneapolis, January the 20th. It was a cold, blustery day, but several hundred women braved the cold. Both Bishops were present and they, with the Rev. Mr. Pardue of Gethsemane, gave brief addresses in the morning. In the afternoon, the newly elected Bishop of Wyoming, the Rt. Rev. Winfred H. Ziegler, D.D., spoke to us of his missionary work in the West.

The annual meeting was held at the Cathedral in Faribault on May the 15th, 1937, where fifty-four years ago the first annual meeting was held. At this first meeting fifty-four years ago, twenty-four delegates were present, two from Christ Church, St. Paul; two from the Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Paul; four from St. John the Evangelist, St. Paul; four from Gethsemane, Minneapolis; one from St. Mark's, Minneapolis; two each from the Churches in Stillwater, Lake City, Shakopee and Moorhead, and one each from Sauk Center, Brownsville and Duluth. Bishop Keeler says that progress should be measured by a hundred year yard-stick. Thinking of the twenty-four delegates at the first annual meeting, it was a thrill to see almost six hundred at this fifty-fourth anniversary. At the meeting, however, I

couldn't help wondering how the diocesan President of 1987 would take care of the twelve hundred women who should be present at the one hundredth anniversary. We were honored in having as our guest speaker of the afternoon the Rt. Rev. Henry W. Hobson of Ohio, the Chairman of the Forward Movement Commission.

All through the year, in obedience to the resolution passed at the triennium, Mrs. Collins, and the Deanery United Thank Offering Chairmen, have stressed the United Thank Offering. In Minnesota an attempt has been made to personalize the United Thank Offering workers. This has been ably done through Mrs. Latta's hand-book and the many talks she has given on the workers, Miss Nelson's pictures and the moving pictures of our missionary work. The handicraft exhibit under the capable direction of Mrs. Ralph Brownson, Jr., of Hastings, has been our most important venture this year. Mrs. Brownson gathered together handicrafts from both foreign and domestic mission stations, and as this Year Book goes to print, some \$1,400 worth of articles have been sold. It was a great success and we have been able to send back into our children's clinics, mission schools, etc., and into the homes of under-privileged people connected with these stations, concrete and practical help in the form of much needed money. One missionary wrote that if all dioceses would have this exhibit and sale, most of the financial worry of our United Thank Offering workers would be removed.

The Summer Conference was held as usual the last of June at Carleton College, Northfield. Mrs. G. A. N. King had charge of the woman's division, and that in itself insures success. Under the leadership of Mrs. C. P. Deems and Miss Margaret Densmore, the women who attended were filled anew with a consecrated enthusiasm for the work of their Master, and we feel sure that the Diocese will reap the fruits of that conference for a long time to come.

We Auxiliary women of Minnesota are greatly blessed by the physical as well as the moral support of our Bishops. Bishop McElwain, coming from Chicago, often at a great inconvenience, to be present at our meetings, and the faithful attendance of Bishop Keeler, who, since he has been in the Diocese, has never missed an Auxiliary meeting, together with their continued inspiration and support help more than we can say. We are very grateful to them.

Space will not permit the mention in this report of the outstanding work of the Executive Board, the Diocesan office,

heads of departments and Deanery officers. Their reports will be printed in the Year Book. They are all so modest, however, that I think space should be allotted for their praise.

And to every loyal Churchwoman in this Diocese, I give my heartfelt thanks. Let us all re-dedicate ourselves to His service in 1937-38.

REPORT ON ADULT DIVISION OF THE
CHURCH IN THE HOME
TO THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

May 12, 1937

For many years one of the projects close to the hearts of the Woman's Auxiliary has been work among the shut-ins, a work which has been carried on always with a personal touch, and to many the mention of this work brings to mind the names of Mrs. E. S. Merrill and Miss Mary Share, both of whom have devoted much of their time to those who unfortunately were among the shut-ins. The past year Mrs. George B. Keenan was named as Secretary for the Shut-ins and in spite of being handicapped by illness she has found time to bring cheer to many.

During the early part of 1936, the Department of Religious Education, through its Chairman, The Very Rev. V. O. Ward, became much interested in developing work among the isolated and through the efforts of Dean Ward a committee was appointed to organize such work, the result being "The Church in the Home." Heading this committee is Miss Margaret Densmore, who has been successful in establishing the two divisions, a Correspondence Church School for Children which is being directed by Mrs. J. A. Lovgren, of Red Wing, and the adults.

Naturally, the work among the adults fitted in with the Auxiliary shut-ins, and it was at the suggestion of Dean Ward that the Auxiliary was contacted by the Committee for the Church in the Home, the result being that the following key women were appointed for their respective Deaneries: Mrs. George B. Keenan, Minneapolis; Mrs. Paul W. Thorne, St. Paul; Miss Mabel Paige, Marshall; Mrs. Charles Edward Wise, Mankato; Mrs. George Akenhead, Winona; Mrs. Ralph Brownson, Jr., Red Wing; Mrs. George L. Weinberger, Faribault, and Mrs. Irving Hudson, Willmar.

The Church in the Home now has a membership of a little over a hundred, made up of adults who perhaps are invalids or for some other reason are unable to take active part in any parish life, many times there is no Episcopal Church near enough for regular attendance.

A few, we believe, have misinterpreted "The Church in the Home" and are confusing it slightly with the social service

division. Our aim is to bring the Episcopal Church to each individual, making that individual feel that he or she is quite as much a part of the Church as those who are actively engaged in parish life, and to pass on such material and assistance as are of interest to that individual. There is also the personal side to be touched through various greetings, such as birthday, Christmas and Easter cards. Even as new a beginning as we have made, there are a few who are interested in confirmation either for themselves or perhaps some other member of the family. These names will be referred to the nearest rector or priest in charge as we continue with the work.

We hope that every parish will in time have a representative responsible for forwarding to her Deanery key woman such names as may be handed to her either through her rector or through some member of the parish, for only in this way will The Church in the Home be able to be of real service.

Unfortunately in this work, as in everything else, there is the financial problem. Since last August, up to the present time, we have operated on \$10.60, the balance on hand at the present time being \$5.40. This represents stationery, postage, educational tracts, copies of "The Episcopal Evangelist" and birthday cards. CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

The objective of the Department of Christian Social Service is to give women of the Church an opportunity to participate actively in the work of alleviating human suffering, and to provide for the unfortunates of humanity some of the benefits to which they are entitled. This work, in some respects, is unique in that it gives women the privilege of knowing and helping people with whom they would have no contact in the ordinary tenor of their lives. Social service necessitates action and means actively participating in a great work. There can be no substitute for this participation; and speaking in psychological language, it demands that one literally give of one's self. This aspect of auxiliary work must not be ignored for in it inheres its spiritual value. Whether it is sewing of garments, visiting the bedridden or directing committees of social welfare, personal interest must be contributed.

The Church always has been engaged in social work. However, the past decade has witnessed a constant decrease in this interest of the Church, while that of private and governmental agencies has increased. At present, in this changing social order, there is grave danger of the Church and its adherents neglecting this elementary and basic phase of religious life.

This spring a survey was made of the social work which the various women's organizations of the diocese were doing. Reports have been received for a good share of the churches and it is gratifying to know that all churches of the diocese are assuming some responsibility for some phase of social work. Great credit is due the small churches for the variety and volume of work they accomplish. From the reports received, all the women sew for various missionary groups for persons within their own parish, visit the sick, donate Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets, and perform other philanthropic services. The larger city churches are closely connected with various private and public agencies, and in several instances make possible the existence of private social agencies which perform special service. It would be impossible to estimate the amount of money and the personal time and effort contributed by church people. The diocese may feel justifiably proud of this part of its program.

Women's auxiliaries of the diocese made garments for babies of unwed mothers as their spring sewing project. Gar-

ments have been received thus far from 28 churches and 503 separate items were contributed. Since there are always several hundred girls in the maternity homes of the Twin Cities, a large number of garments are needed. It is hoped that this might become an annual project of the Auxiliary. On behalf of the Children's Bureau and the girls who have received clothing, I wish to thank the women for their great assistance.

The State Legislature enacted laws which will lead to the development of a new welfare program for the state and it is possible that the interests of the women of the diocese may be worked into that program. There is need for expanding the social work of the diocese. A committee to direct and encourage visiting of chronic patients in private convalescent homes in Minneapolis is needed. The membership of this committee should be comprised of nurses and individuals conversant with the needs of illness. There also exists a need for a committee of professional social workers to assemble information on the various aspects of social work which would be of value to women throughout the diocese.

A section of the department of Christian Social Service should be concerned with civic problems and political factors which influence the attainment of better social conditions for the masses of people—an improvement which depends on honest and efficient government. This can be secured only when people understand conditions and make their wishes articulate through action.

I wish to thank the women of the auxiliaries for their kind assistance and co-operation.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

For the Year Ending May 13, 1937

There is every evidence that the educational work is becoming an important factor in the plan of the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese. A survey of this work was recently completed which showed that groups both large and small

were having carefully planned programs with an educational objective. The suggested theme for the year was Africa, with stress upon our church work in Liberia and the American Negro. This was adapted by individual groups. A single meeting or a series was given to the subject. Inter-racial good will was developed and in many cases an Episcopal Church Negro worker spoke to appreciative audiences.

An endeavor is made to keep up to date the record on the card index of the 105 units. A number of new loan packets were prepared, dealing with the current topic, also one on the presentation of the United Thank Offering at the last General Convention. Loan packets were assembled on requested subjects and outlines supplied. An outline for the study of the History of the Prayer Book was completed, based on Bishop Wilson's book. It is hoped that more groups will avail themselves of this next season. The History of the Episcopal Church in the United States was a very popular series.

A mimeographed bulletin was sent out in August, outlines were prepared on "Consider Africa" and "Preface to Racial Understanding." There have been 106 loanings of packets and program material, and 250 leaflets were distributed. Letters to the number of 245 were written. The office of deanery educational secretary is being developed with increasing responsibility placed upon that office. Mimeographed notices of the "Church of the Air Broadcasts" were prepared and sent to the deanery secretaries for distribution.

A file of all mimeographed or printed parish educational programs is being assembled. The Educational Secretary attended all diocesan meetings and all meetings of the Executive Board. Deanery meetings were attended whenever possible. Meetings were held in both St. Paul and Minneapolis for group leaders, and methods were discussed. The Synod at Omaha was attended by the Secretary as a delegate with expenses paid. Summer Conference was attended for the entire period.

The Secretary has co-operated during the year with the diocesan department of Religious Education and the Junior Auxiliary. The diocesan work for the isolated, termed the Church in the Home, was organized during the year with the Educational Secretary as chairman, and active workers are in charge of the adult division and the correspondence Church School.

The Secretary has worked under an allowance of \$150.00 and there is a balance remaining at the close of the year. An itemized account of the expenditures has been presented to the financial committee at each meeting of the Executive Board.

The national topic for next season's study is "This Moslem World" as the foreign mission topic, and "The Church in Rural America" as the domestic theme. Outlines for both are being prepared.

REPORTS OF DEANERY PRESIDENTS REPORT OF FARIBAULT DEANERY

1936-1937

As the retiring president of the Faribault Deanery looks over the reports of the various Auxiliary branches belonging to the deanery, she is impressed by the sincere effort made to carry on gallantly the work of the Auxiliary during the year 1936-1937. There are fourteen branches in this deanery, and all but one have made reports. Each parish was requested in its report to state whether it had paid its Auxiliary dues, its special pledge toward the work of the Rev. Mr. Brown in Rochester, sent in its contributions to the United Thank Offering, responded to the requests of the Supply Secretary in regard to boxes and carried out some plan of study. The answers are as follows: of the thirteen branches which reported, all but one had paid Auxiliary dues; seven had contributed to the special Rochester work; all but two had sent in contributions to the United Thank Offering; all but one sent boxes asked for by the Supply Department, and nine had carried on regular study topics such as the Negro both in Liberia and America, Church history, and Latin America.

Every Auxiliary branch has responded splendidly to other parochial and diocesan needs and carried on philanthropic projects in its community and at large. In diocesan work two parishes have sent special gifts for the Christian Social Service work; one has assisted in paying the diocesan assessment; three have sent gifts of money or canned fruit to the Church Home; one has sent in boxes of clothing to the Indian mission at Birch Coulee. In parish activities two parishes

have emphasized work with the Young People's Fellowship, three mention calling on and sending flowers to the sick, three have assisted in balancing the parish budget, one has helped pay the rector's salary, one contributed toward a new car for the rector. Many parishes have done much philanthropic work in their communities and outside, such as sending magazines and scrap books to hospitals, magazines to the jail, supplying poor families with food and clothing, assisting flood sufferers, and sending boxes of used clothing to the Salvation Army.

Almost every parish had at least one delegate attending the Summer Conference for Church Work at Carleton College in June, 1936; one had five who attended for part of the sessions; one had four.

The work of the Educational Department has been progressing satisfactorily. The subjects for the study groups have been varied. The majority of the parishes studied the Negro, either in Liberia or in America. Two interested themselves in Church history, and one or two went on with the study of Latin America. A number of parish branches asked outside men and women interested in various phases of church work to speak at their meetings. One parish had seven such speakers.

At the deanery meeting held at Faribault in November, 1936, Mrs. Frank Thompson of Albert Lea was elected vice-president for the usual term of two years, and Mrs. Gunnell was re-elected as educational secretary. It was voted that hereafter two regular meetings of the deanery be held, one in the fall and the other in May or June, and that the election of officers be held at the spring meeting. At the May, 1937, meeting the following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Kelsey Johnson of Albert Lea, and secretary, Mrs. Carl Leuthold, also of Albert Lea, each for a term of two years.

Every sign seems to point to a splendid year of achievement for 1937-38, with every good deed that should be done brought to fulfillment.

REPORT OF RED WING DEANERY

1936-1937

The Red Wing Deanery comprises eight units, viz., Wabasha, Lake City, Frontenac, Prairie Island (White), Prairie Island (Indian), Red Wing, Hastings and Basswood Grove.

All but one of these units have handed in excellent re-

ports of their year's work. These were read at the annual summer meeting on Wednesday, June 2nd. This meeting was in the nature of a delightful one o'clock picnic luncheon held at Colvill Park, Red Wing, with seventy-five women in attendance. The Rev. Wm. Creighton of St. Clement's Church, St. Paul, gave an excellent talk.

During the Lenten season all units were supplied with Lenten study literature and the larger units conducted well attended Lenten study classes with well planned programs. The general subject of study was "The Negro Problem." Outside speakers were secured in many cases.

The Red Wing Deanery units are contributing a total of \$142 to the Rochester fund.

All units but one have contributed to the United Thank Offering, one unit, alone, having contributed over \$140.

All units but two have sent supply boxes and several have sent, in addition to these, large boxes to the Church Home and to Annie Laurie Baker for Social Service work.

In addition to these projects, the Red Wing Deanery units have contributed to the following: flood relief, Birch Coulee Missionary Christmas gifts, Girl Scouts, delegates to the Summer Conference, the C. P. C. Secretary, vestments for choir, Clara Cogul fund, advance work, Emerald Hodgson Hospital and the Seaman's Institute.

There are two active Junior Auxiliaries in the Red Wing Deanery. These inspire their young members toward service and give them a foundation for later Auxiliary membership.

The annual fall meeting of 1936 was held at Wabasha on October 27th with Miss Grace Lindley of the Church Missions House, New York City, and the Rev. Edward Mullin from the Philippine Islands as the principal speakers.
