Proceedings.



THE Fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. Andrew's Church, Jackson, on Wednesday, May 9, 1906.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 10:30 by the Bishop. There were present the Archdeacon, Rev. R. E. Lee Craig, the Rev. Mr. Carter, of Holy Trinity, Vicksburg, and the Rector, the Rev. Halsey Werlein.

In his address of welcome the Rector paid a beautiful tribute to woman—her power for good in the world and her uplifting influence.

At the conclusion of the service the Bishop in the Chair called the meeting to order.

Delegates responding to the roll call were: Greenville 1; Holly Springs 1; Jackson 3; Port Gibson 1; Vaiden 2; Winona 2; Holy Trinity, Vicksburg, 1. Juniors responding: Jackson 1; Vicksburg 1; Babies Branch, Holy Trinity, Vicksburg 1.

Reports of the branches were taken alphabetically and Mrs. Craig appointed Recording Secretary.

Miss Kate Adams read report of Jackson branch of Juniors. Holy Trinity, Vicksburg, was represented by Miss Bethel Clark, who read report.

Pass Christian reported Juniors organized in 1904, 12 members.

The report of the St. Andrew's Babies Branch was then read.

The reading of the Officers' reports followed, and Miss Walthall, Secretary of the Juniors, read her report.

Mrs. Carter, the Secretary of the Babies Branch, was next in order.

The Treasurer, Miss Fox, read her report, which was as usual, clearly stated, showing a gradual increase in each department of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Secretary's report was read and corrected.

The new organizations reported were Biloxi, Columbus and Raymond.

A Committee was appointed to tabulate the reports. The Committee were: Mrs. Craig, Miss Marshal and Miss Jones.

Letters from Miss Emery were read, in which the apportionment for the Mississippi branch of the Auxiliary is raised to \$160.00, which includes Juniors and Babies Branch. \$15 for Juniors and \$10.00 for Babies.

Mr. Craig asked for an explanation of the apportionment, as he was under the impression that it was part of the Diocesan apportionment. It was explained by the Secretary.

The Treasurer called attention to the gradual increase of our United Offering from \$72 in 1898 to \$210 at the triennial at Boston.

"RESOLVED, That each member of the Auxiliary be assessed 10 cents per capita for the current expenses of the Diocesan Branches;

Second, That each Parish branch be requested to forward these sums to Diocesan Treasurer as a fund to meet the current expenses.

At 1 o'clock the Auxiliary took a recess until 8 p. m., and an Officers' meeting was called for 3:30.

At the evening session the meeting was called to order by the Bishop.

The report of the Committee on Reports was read and accepted.

Article IV of the Constitution was changed to read: The Officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice President, a Treasurer and a Secretary, elected by the Woman's Auxiliary in annual meeting; and when practicable a board of managers consisting of the officers and of two other ladies.

The election of officers by ballot then followed. The officers elected were: Vice President—Mrs. Phelps; Secretary—Mrs. J. F. Graves; Treasurer—Miss Fox.

The annual meeting was closed with an address from the Arch-deacon, followed by benediction.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

FRIENDS AND CO-WORKERS—GREETING:

If there is but one object in the assembling of ourselves together, and that is the expression of a common sympathy expressed by the pressure of the hand which brings us in touch with our mutual work for the advancement of the Kingdom of our blessed Lord, it alone would be worth the effort made, and the time given to this annual meeting. It teaches us the meaning of that dear old hymn:

Blest be the tie that binds
Our hearts in Jesus love.
The fellowship of Christian minds
Is like to that above.

It is much to be regretted that your Diocesan Secretary cannot come more in personal contact with all the branches by an occasional visit to each one during the year. That not being practicable for one who has other duties, the pen must come to her assistance, which I have endeavored to use as freely as possible.

At our last annual meeting the subjects under consideration were:

1. What were we doing toward raising our part of the \$100,000 annual gift from the Woman's Auxiliary, to the Board of Missions? I was instructed to notify the branches of their apportionment according to membership of the \$120 asked of Mississippi branch, including Junior and Babies. I complied with the instruction and I believe it was generally responded to.

2. The United offering mite boxes. Only one branch has asked through me for the United Offering Mite boxes. I wrote to the General Secretary requesting that they be sent direct. I hope, however, that it does not indicate a lack of interest in the triennial United Offering; but I would urge an increase of interest there. To that end I wrote to the Church Missions House for leaflets, "The Story of the United Offering" and others, and took advantage of my correspondence with the branches, slipping them into the letters. Thus hoping to keep the subject constantly before the members, expecting the Secretaries to read them at their regular meetings.

3. I entered into correspondence with the Educational Secretary. The subject of the International Lenten Study Course had not been published at that time, and he only gave me very general information, recommending books to be read in connection with the different Mission fields. Owing to the strike among the printers, it was late very before the Lenten Study Course was issued, and I know of but one branch which has made a beginning even on the study of what the Church is doing for the Mormon, the Indian and the Negro. I would recommend it to each of the branches in the Diocese, as these subjects are very intimately intertwined with our national life. The Study of Missions has become part and parcel of the Woman's Auxiliary; one might say it is its life blood.

The Bishop made the experiment last year of changing the time of the annual meeting of the Auxiliary to the week following the Diocesan Council. It has been adopted by the Western New York branch, and several others, and they have found it to be to the advantage of the Auxiliary. When we adjourned he left it to the decision of the officers to continue to meet with the Council, or to hold our meetings the week following.

Although it was with regret, yet we saw for the good of the Auxiliary it was better to make the change. So I think the change will be permanent. The failure of crops in the delta country, fever and quarantine has been a serious obstacle to our work. I have written 140 letters, 23 postal cards and sent 500 Reports.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

MISS FLORA WALTHALL, Secretary, Jackson, Miss.

At the last annual meeting of the Mississippi Woman's Auxiliary in May, 1905, representatives were present, and reports were read from three Junior Auxiliaries—those of Holy Trinity Parish, Vicksburg, St. James', Greenville, and St. Andrew's, Jackson. The organization of a Junior branch in Trinity Parish, Pass Christian, was also announced, but the report of this branch seems not to have been received.

Shortly after the annual meeting, 1905, the Bishop appointed me Secretary of the Juniors. Acting under his instructions, I have written to a number of clergymen and others, calling their attention to the Junior Auxiliary and its work, and asking for co-operation in an attempt to extend its organization. Some of these letters have had no reply; from other points we have heard that the parish is too weak, the Sunday School too small, or for one reason or another it is not advisable to undertake the organization of a Junior Auxiliary. More favorable replies have been received, however, from Gulfport, Biloxi, and Enterprise; and it is hoped that we may soon have active branches at these points. A new Junior branch has been recently organized in St. Paul's Parish, Meridian; and that in St. Andrew's, Jackson, has been reorganized, and its membership increased.

Thanks are due to the Rev. Mr. Hinton for publishing in the Church News a series of questions on Missionary subjects—so far mostly Diocesan—intended for the Juniors.

An offer received by Bishop Bratton from the publishers of the Southern Churchman, Richmond, Va., was turned over by him to the Junior Auxiliary. The publishers requested the Bishop to give them the names of various persons throughout the Diocese who might act as agents, one-half the amount of all subscriptions secured to be retained and used for any Church purpose which the Bishop might designate. Each local Auxiliary was advised of this offer, and copies of the paper sent out. So far one subscription has been reported—secured by a member of the Pass Christian branch.

A letter from Mrs. A. B. Hunter, wife of the principal of St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C., received January 23, 1906, asks that the work of this institution and its claims to assistance and support from Church people in the South, shall be brought to the attention of the Mississippi Juniors. Mrs. Hunter suggests that if possible, our Juniors make an annual gift to the school, or support a scholarship. I replied that the Junior Auxiliary was still new in this Diocese, and in point of numbers not strong, but that I would lay her request before the Auxiliary at its annual meeting. As is no doubt well known

to all present, St. Augustine's is a manual school for negro pupils of both sexes, and has been specially commended by a committee appointed by the General Convention to investigate the matter of colored schools, and recommended to the care and support of our people. However, we have a colored Mission school in our own Diocese.

A letter was received from Miss Emery, late in December, calling attention to the request made of the Juniors generally for their united work this year—for additional classrooms at St. Paul's College, Tokyo. Copies of this letter were sent to the different branches, and their co-operation asked. St. Andrew's, Jackson, gave \$7.00, and same was at once forwarded to the Church Mission House. I have now on hand \$2.00, sent in by Pass Christian Juniors for this purpose.

Seventy-five letters on Junior Auxiliary business have been written, and forty-seven received during the year. So far as I am able to ascertain, the number of members of the Junior Auxiliary in the Diocese is 82, and the amount contributed by them for all purposes during the past year, is \$157.10. Fuller details will be shown in the various parochial reports. It should be noted that the report from Pass Christian includes work done in the year 1904-1905, but not reported in time to be shown in the records of the last annual meeting.

In regard to the apportionment for General Missions, assigned the Juniors for the present year, it appears on the records of the last Diocesan meeting that the total amount assigned by both the Juniors and the Babies' Branch was \$10, but in several communications from Miss Emery I find the amount given as \$15. Would it not be well to make definite apportionments to each parochial branch? I have just received \$5.00 from St. Andrew's, Jackson, \$1.00 from Miss Kausler's subdivision of the St. Andrew's Juniors, \$1.00 from Holy Trinity, Vicksburg, and \$1.00 from the Pass Christian branch, for this purpose.

The use of the "Missionary Catechism" is reported by most of the branches. It seems highly important that proper prominence should be given in the local Auxiliaries to the study of Missions; and it might perhaps be well if the Auxiliary in the Diocese approve, to write the Educational Secretary at the Church Missions House, or the Secretary of the Fourth Missionary District, in which our Diocese is included, for suggestions as to the best courses of study.

The Junior Auxiliary in this Diocese is still in its infancy, but it is growing. It has so many good reasons for growth, and occupies such a unique and important place as a practical method of training the children of the Church to a realization of their duties and privileges as members, not only of a particular parish, but of the world-wide and all embracing universal Church, that we cannot but believe in its having a splendidly successful future before it.
