Proceedings.

THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Church, Yazoo City on May 7th and 8th, 1907.

FIRST DAY—May 7, 3:30 P. M.

Meeting opened with devotional service, a shorter form of Evening Prayer being used.

Rev. R. W. Patton, Secretary of the Fourth Missionary District, gave a forceful address on Missionary Work in general and of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At 4:30 p. m., the meeting was called to order by the Bishop. Secretary's report read.

Report of the Junior Department read by Miss Walthall, Secretary.

Report of Babies' Branch sent by Mrs. Carter, Secretary, who on account of ill health, could not attend meeting. Rev. Mr. Carter, of Woodville, read report. Mr. Carter then tendered the resignation of Mrs. Carter, which the Bishop accepted with reluctance and profound regret. The Babies' Branch in the Diocese owes its origin and success to this noble woman, who with untiring energy and tender love has enrolled a long list of babies who are taught in infancy to give their prayers and pennies for Missions.

Mrs. W. Balfour Klein, of Vicksburg, was appointed to succeed Mrs. Carter.

Miss Flora Walthall, of Jackson, was re-appointed Secretary of the Junior Department.

Discussion of difficulty experienced in securing from time to time information as to current progress of local branches. Mr. Carter suggested that blank forms be drafted and sent out to the separate branches, to be filled out quarterly and returned to Diocesan Secretaries.

Motion was made by Miss Maganos, of Vicksburg, to pro-rate apportionment among different branches. After some discussion, action was postponed.

Evening Session, 8 O'clock.

Evening Prayer read by Rev. Albert Martin, of Yazoo City.

Address by Rev. L. W. Rose, of Laurel; Subject: "The Origin and History of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

Address by Rev. William Mercer Green, of Meridian. Subject: "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Parish."

Address by Rev. J. R. Carter, of Woodville. Subject: "The Junior and Babies' Branches."

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

SECOND DAY—9:30 A. M.

On account of the Council being in session in Trinity Church, the Woman's Auxiliary met in the Presbyterian Church.

Morning session opened by saying of Creed. Bishop presiding.

Letter read from Miss Emery announcing the Triennial Convention would meet in Richmond, Va., in October, 1907, and that St. Mathew's Day, September 21 would be a special day for the intercession for Missions.

Miss Emery stated that last year the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Mississippi gave \$240 toward the United Offering, and she desired to know what we were doing towards the amount for this year.

She urged an increase of Branches and an increase of membership.

A communication from Rev. Everett P. Smith, Educational Secretary, stated that the study this year would be on China.

The discussion of the pro-rating of apportionment was renewed. Motion was made and carried that the parochial branches pay to the apportionment 50 cents per member.

The Bishop explained that the apportionment is that part of the \$100,000.00, pledged annually by the Woman's Auxiliary for General Missions which the Diocesan branch is assessed for.

Mrs. Phelps, Miss Fox and Mrs. Graves were appointed a Committee on Memorials.

Motion by Mrs. Phelps that the Woman's Auxiliary express to Mrs. Carter their sincere regret that illness compels her to resign the important position of the Babies' Branch, and that she may soon be restored to good health. Carried.

Mrs. Phelps, in the name of the Woman's Auxiliary, thanked the Bishop for the assistance and co-operation he has given us this past year.

Bishop retiring, the President, Mrs. Bratton took the chair. In assuming the Chair, Mrs. Bratton expressed her appreciation of the office conferred upon her, saying she considered it a most high honor and hesitated in assuming it on account of feeling her unworthiness.

She desired to be a President worthy of the Branch, and to represent them creditably in Council.

Treasurer's report.

Recess to attend opening of Episcopal Council.

Afternoon Session, 4:30 O'clock.

Meeting called to order by the President.

Reports from the different branches read.

Motion by Mrs. Phelps: That election of officers be made on the first meeting of the parochial branches after the Annual Diocesan Meeting, and on election of new officers the Diocesan Secretary be sent result of election at once. Carried.

Discussion in regard to delegates to Triennial Convention at Richmond, Va. Delegates to be appointed later.

Secretary was directed to write a letter of thanks to the President of Woman's Guild, of Trinity Church, for hospitality and courtesy extended the Woman's Auxiliary while in session in Yazoo City, and to the ladies of the Presbyterian Church for the use of their handsome edifice.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

It is said that nothing stands still—so at this, the Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, it is most gratifying to find that the work has gone forward.

With few exceptions each Branch shows an increase of work accomplished.

When true knowledge of Missions has quickened our minds, our eyes and ears will be opened; our hearts will be touched; then we will take up the battle cry and shout it from end to end of the Diocese until every woman is awakened to the serious need of the Woman's Auxiliary.

St. Paul says: "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call upon Him in Whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of Whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach unless they be sent?" On whom does this grave responsibility lie?

This year the Woman's Auxiliary has given about \$1422.68 to Missions. Have sent 12 boxes to different Mission Stations. One Branch supports a Bible woman in Hankow, China. Another Branch has a Church Periodical Club which sends literature, such as books and magazines, together with Easter and Christmas cards to different Mission Schools and Hospitals. This is a most interesting and noble work. If each Branch would send their share of literature to this Club after they have enjoyed it, it would aid the Club in doing a greater work.

There are 480 members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese. Six new Branches have been organized this year: Biloxi, Moss Point, Lexington, Raymond, Laurel and Scranton. We extend to them a warm welcome, and assure them that we need their prayers and co-operation in this great and noble work for Missions.

The Master has called one of our number to join the Saints in Life everlasting—Mrs. Keyes was for many years the efficient Treasurer of St. Peter's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, Oxford. While she has passed on to the joys of Paradise, she has left us a sweet and noble example of a Christian life.

For all the saints who from their labors rest,
Who, Thee by faith, before the world confessed,
Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blest.

Our first duty in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary is prayer. Our hearts should be so full of Christ's great love that we stretch out our arms to take the whole world as our kinsmen.

The second thing necessary is knowledge of Missions. Our Bishop will plan a study course for the year. With these leaflets and the "Spirit of Missions" we should be so enlightened as to become enthusiastic over our work.

A most important part of our work is the sending of boxes to Missionaries, schools and hospitals. The labor and little self-denials necessary to fit out these boxes are most insignificant when compared to the comfort, joy and happiness they carry to those to whom they are sent.

During the year I have enjoyed the correspondence with the Secretaries of the different branches. It is a pleasure to feel the warm clasp of a tender hand even through the mail, and often when discouraged some of these delightful letters have been an inspiration to me. I have written 242 letters and 22 postals.

There is much to do in this noble work of the Woman's Auxiliary. Discouragements seem mountain high, but we are soldiers of Christ. When we awaken to the realization of the battles to be fought, we women of the Church will polish up the armor, bring forth the sword and shield and follow the banner to the foot of the Cross.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY

To the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Mississippi, held at Yazoo City, Miss., May 7 and 8, 1907.

MISS FLORA WALTHALL, Secretary.

At the time of the last Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Mississippi, there were five parochial branches of the Junior Auxiliary in the Diocese. I have to report today the existence of twelve, located at Aberdeen, Biloxi, Columbus, Greenville, Gulfport, Jackson, Meridian, Natchez, Pass Christian, Vicksburg, Winona and Woodville. Of these the branches at Biloxi, Gulfport, Winona and Woodville are too recently organized to be able to report to this meeting any actual work done. I append hereto the reports received from other branches. Complete reports have not been received from Meridian or Vicksburg. I also append tabulated statement of all work done by the Juniors during the year, so far as reported to me, showing a total of \$258.90 contributed, in money and boxes; also statement as to all money which has passed through my hands.

At the beginning of the year, the Mississippi Juniors were asked by the Bishop to undertake the support of a scholarship at St. Mary's on the Mountain, near Sewanee. Only \$50 is needed to pay the expenses of a child at this mission training school for the eight-months' school term. The sisters expressed much gratification at the idea of the Mississippi Juniors supporting a scholarship, and asked that we take upon us the charge of a girl of thirteen, whose father had recently died, and whose mother was ill with an incurable disease. The Junior branches were all communicated with, and from some of them a hearty response was received. Some of them have given liberally towards this scholarship over and above the other work which they have done. Some have not responded, and I regret to state that the amount needed is not yet complete, only \$37.50 having been given. I urge the Juniors who have not helped with this fund to consider the matter carefully, and let us have the deficit made up as quickly as possible. The whole amount should be paid at once.

Our apportionment for General Missions this year is \$20. Of this the Juniors have paid \$15.65. It is very much to be desired that the remaining sum should be paid within the next ten days. The report of work done in this Diocese during the year must be forwarded very soon to the Church Mission House for incorporation

in the general report of the whole Auxiliary. This report must be in the hands of the printers nearly a month earlier than usual, this year, in order to be ready for the General Convention in October. I do not think our Juniors want to fall short of the amount asked of them by the representatives of the Board of Missions. It will be remembered that at the time of the last Annual meeting it was found that the whole amount of the apportionment had not been paid. The amount was collected and reported in time to appear in the yearly report of the Auxiliary. I hope this may be the case this year. It would be better, however, to dispose of this matter earlier in the year. The apportionment is, and should be regarded as a first obligation—a duty which must be discharged before we consult our own pleasure as to working for the individual objects which especially appeal to us personally. I would recommend that as soon as each branch gets together in the fall and prepares for the year's work that the secretary of each branch write the Diocesan Secretary advising her of the exact number of members in the branch, and that the Diocesan Secretary being thus supplied with the necessary data shall then pro-rate the apportionment for the year among the branches, according to their membership. Then let each branch see to it that the amount of this apportionment and of the annual dues (for contingent fund) to the Diocesan Auxiliary shall be paid as soon as possible, so that our hands may be free for other work, and that the other work may be performed without the hampering sense of obligations unfulfilled. Let us remember, also, that the amount of the apportionment is a minimum and not a maximum standard for our gifts to General Missions.

I would call the attention of the Juniors to the United Offering. Only one branch, so far, has reported any contribution to this great tri-ennial offering. This is the first time that there has been opportunity offered to the Juniors of Mississippi to share in such an offering, as at the time of the last General Convention there were no Junior branches in existence in our Diocese. Only a few months remain before the offering will be presented in Richmond, and if we would share it, we must take advantage of the opportunity at once.

I have again been asked, by those having the matter in charge, to call the attention of the Junior Auxiliary to the work for the new class-rooms at St. Paul's College, Tokyo. The Juniors undertook last year as united work, to raise the \$2,000 necessary to cover the cost of building two class-rooms. About \$1500 was given; so the Juniors were asked to give another \$1500 this year, and furnish three rooms instead of the original two. This is united work for the Juniors all over the country.

I do not know that any of the Mississippi Juniors or their leaders will be present at the tri-ennial meeting at Richmond next October. The Richmond Juniors have written me, stating that they want to have an exhibit of Junior work from all over the country, at the meeting, and requesting that Mississippi be represented by an exhibit showing what the Juniors are doing in the way of work for Christmas and other boxes; also suggestions, etc., as to educational and other work. Anything sent should be in Richmond by September 10.

It does not seem well to let any opportunity go by without saying a word as to the value and necessity of educational work. Lack of knowledge is almost invariably the prime cause of lack of interest; and if we are to be truly "auxiliary" to the Board of Missions, we ought to regard ourselves as bound to use every effort to learn all we can of that Board's work, and to diffuse such knowledge as widely as we can. This department of the work is especially important among the Juniors. So much excellent material and so many effective aids are to be secured, for such work, that no one ought to be at a loss as to how to conduct it. I would again urge each branch to take at least one copy of the weekly edition of the Young Christian Soldier; after once using it, you will find it hard to realize how you ever got along without it.

I believe that the Juniors generally appreciate something of the importance of the great mission-field within the borders of our own Diocese. Every branch, no matter how weak in point of numbers, may help the Bishop and the Missionary Committee in at least some small degree; and should think it a privilege to do so.

In closing, I would like to ask the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to consider carefully the importance and the effectiveness of the Junior work; to remember that the children and young people of the Church have a right to share the privilege of helping in the Church's work; to remember that in helping them to realize their right and their privilege and teaching them to claim it, they are helping the Woman's Auxiliary and the Missionary work of the near future; and, therefore, I would ask the older members of the Auxiliary to interest themselves in this Junior work, and to help as fully as they can in its organization and development.

To the Juniors who have worked faithfully and courageously and enthusiastically I can say nothing which can add to the joy which the work must bring. It does not matter if our work is small, if it be sincere—if it be the very best that we can do. We are laying the foundations now, here in Mississippi; let us lay them aright. The Junior Auxiliary has not been in the Diocese long; it has not

accomplished a great deal; its membership is not large. But we must not think that for that reason it amounts to little. Let us each do our part with faithful and true and willing service, remembering that though the work seems small, it is a part of the great work of the Church of God.

"All we can do is nothing worth, unless God blesses the deed;
Vainly we hope for the harvest, till God gives life to the seed;
Yet nearer and nearer draws the time, the time that shall surely be,
When the earth shall be full of the glory of God, as the waters cover
the sea."

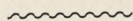

Heavenly Father, Who unto babes hast revealed what is hidden from the wise and prudent, without Whom our labor is but lost, and with whom Thy little ones go forth as as the mighty; bless, we beseech Thee, all "Little Helpers" and officers of the Babies' Branch of the Junior Auxiliary, especially in the Diocese of Mississippi. Accept the service and offerings of the Lambs of Thy flock. And fill the officers with wisdom, zeal and discretion in their work. Kindle in all hearts a zeal for Missions, and bless all Missions and missionaries throughout the world. In the Name of Thy Holy Child Jesus. Amen.

Report of Babies' Branch

MRS. HATTIE CARTER, Secretary.

The circle of another year has been completed, and while we may say we have done our best, there follows always the wish that our record had been better; so it is with regret that this report of The "Babies' Branch" in the Diocese does not show the progress we wish. Many letters have been written explaining the object and purpose for which this work stands, and mite boxes sent to those requesting them, and had they been used for what they were intended, the effect would have been blessed, and results followed.

The purpose and ideal of this Society of "Little Helpers" is educational. Knowledge is power, and if children from babyhood, and, through them their parents, are taught to know what the great cause means, and that the responsibility for its support rests upon each one of them individually, the work for God in this present generation will show His glory to a future one, and make His power known. Hence, the teaching of the Babies' Branch is embodied in six rules: That every child in baptism becomes a member of the Missionary Society and the Missionary Society is the Church. This truth cannot be emphasized too often. The Church of Christ is put in trust with the Gospel and every member of the same, from the infant at the font to the aged man upon the threshold of eternity, is more or less responsible according to the opportunities for the fulfillment of that tremendous trust, in making it known to all mankind. To be a member means to be a living, active worker. In the baby's name something must be done to make him a living active member of Christ Church. The first day of the week is the

time to lay apart for the Lord, as the Apostles did, forming this habit in the child's life. Habit is a strong thing, and that learned in infancy and childhood is not easily forgotten. These little human flowers of ours, writes the Michigan secretary, "should be trained in their infancy to do good deeds, and when they get older, because of this training they will blossom forth of their own strength. And who dares say that this blossom will not bear fruit an hundred fold, not only in the child's life, but in our own? The Babies' Branch teaches the consecration of every penny to God. A penny a week may seem small, but a penny a week with a prayer has a value, and does a work that those only know who have tried it and proved its influence."

Each secretary should consider it her duty to interest all parents of her parish in the Babies' Branch and get any and every baptized child under eight or ten years to become a "Little Helper." It has been suggested that the bringing of the offering each year be made a beautiful time to both mothers and children—a red letter day in the parish each year. The Woman's Auxiliary giving their time and care to the young plants. The Rector receiving their gifts with the prayer of the little ones.

Minnesota and Western New York, and many other Dioceses have adopted this method of gathering in the boxes. The Secretary of Western New York writes: "We found this meeting of the Little Helpers in each parish for the purpose of bringing in the pennies saved so lovingly for the dear Lord's work of the greatest inspiration to the children, the mothers, and to the secretaries. It was always announced before-hand in Church and in Sunday School, and all were asked to come. Often we had many of the older children as well as the grown people, but the Little Helpers were made to feel it was especially their service. Never shall I forget hearing one wee mite after another, the face radiantly lighted up, lisp the prayer for God's blessing upon the Missionaries, as the pennies were placed on the alms basin."

Every year the parish secretary should see that the contents of all mite boxes in the parish are returned to her, and forwarded as promptly as possible, the full amount of the Offering to the Diocesan Secretary. At the same time the Diocesan secretary would like to know the names of the babies composing the "Memorial Circle," only that they may be printed in the report and thus kept in constant remembrance, as an influence in the work. When the Little Helpers leave the Babies' Branch the Secretary should personally see that they become active members of the Junior Auxiliary.
