To My Co-Workers of the Auxiliary:

It seems to me that never in the history of our Auxiliary, have there been questions of more interest to command our serious consideration, than at this present time. We are in the midst of perplexities and distress. It is impossible to tell what new sacrifices we may be called on to make for those who are daily giving this life and blood, for the vindication of right, or for the faithful soldiers, who are struggling to make known the Christ, as the sole source of real Peace.

Are we standing loyally for both National and Church duty? Do we realize the largeness of our opportunities? The Spirit of service should be in the heart of each one of us; daily should we pray the Lord, "What will Thou have me do?" Constantly urgent appeals and helpful suggestions come to us from our headquarters, the Church Mission House. It is well for us to keep in close touch with our General Secretary, who is anxious at all times to give us help and advice.

Of special interest at this time, are the two leaflets, "War and Missions," by Dean Robbins of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, and a short one written by Miss Lucy Sturgis, bringing out our responsibility to the Christian Army, as well as to the Army of our Country.

"The war work of the Woman's Auxiliary" will, as you know, be the subject of discussion at the Officer's Conference, at Church Mission's House to-morrow, April 18th. I ask your earnest consideration of the suggested plan, and that you will take immediate action, and wire Miss Lindley to-night. She wishes the "Mind of the Auxiliary to decide this question."

Of course you have read the appeal for St. Agnes School, Kyoto, in the March Spirit of Missions, of the \$15,000.00 more asked by the Committee; our proposition is \$100.00. I would suggest that this be apportioned to our various branches, both Senior and Junior, and attended to as early as possible.

Will you not consider the advisability of an Extension Campaign? Why not adopt the suggestion made at the Auxiliary Meeting in Charleston last November? Use Mrs. Talley's leaflets, and endeavor to reach the uninterested women. I urge each one of you to enter freely and diligently, into the business of this council, that you may take to your several branches, the inspiration necessary to help us gain the co-operation and interest of every woman in our diocese.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

MY DEAR FRIENDS:

It is hard to know whether this annual letter should speak first of what we have done or of what we are to do. Perhaps it is better to follow the natural order. First, then, of our work during the past year. Of course, the war work has made it harder; anxious hearts, hands more than full, appeals from every direction have all tested our faithfulness, but it is a joy to say that as far as we are able to tell the work has not fallen off. When we look back to last fall and realize the questions with which we faced the future, it is good to know that the war has not interfered with our work, but that it has probably deepened our love and willingness to sacrifice. Those who have worked hardest at Red Cross and other relief organizations have often been most faithful in work for the Church's mission. Let this give us heart to face the future no matter how long or how terrible may be our time of testing. We are learning more and more to put first things first, to realize that what matters supremely is that God's will shall be done in this world, and realizing that, we naturally care more and do more for the Church's mission, for what we call "missions" is the Church's effort to hasten the time when God's Kingdom shall come because His will be done.

For these same reasons we shall turn to the future. Of course, we shall be faithful to all the old regular responsibilities, but beside that we shall take up our war work eagerly. Many of us have been saying that we wished the Woman's Auxiliary might do something big, something worth while in these times, and that is what we are attempting. The enclosed outline will, we hope, explain itself (See Note.) It is a tremendous undertaking; one which may well appall us unless we have come to the place where we expect to do big things, and even then this is too big for us unless we know that God's power and grace can accomplish anything in us as individuals and as an organization. So we believe that we will read the plan and then, knowing the difficulties, count them not as obstacles but as conditions under which we shall carry on this campaign.

It hardly seems necessary to add this word, but let us remind each other to put our best strength into this big work, and from this time till December 8th., let us pray for it. We believe (or we should not have undertaken it) that God is guiding us in our plans and we know that we must listen for his directions, that we must look to Him for power to carry out His plans and that only as we receive this strength from Him shall we dare attempt the thing to which we have set ourselves. Let us make our adventure in the spirit of S. Theresa: "I would have you, my daughters, to be strong and valiant men."

NOTE:—Refers to War Work of the W. A., the plan of which is:

The Auxiliary will make an effort to reach the women of America directly and indirectly. To do this, they will try first to reach and enlist all Churchwomen. After this has been done and with the help of these women they will make an attempt to reach those not belonging to any religious body. The first part is to be undertaken next Advent. The second, not until the year after. The Woman's Auxiliary is also suggesting to the women of other communions that they shall attempt the same plan among themselves.

To the Officers and Delegates of the Council:

This year has been a very busy one, and I feel that last year's attempts formed stepping-stones by which this year's work was made more efficient.

In the first place, I have had a more hearty response to my letters and appeals. I am sorry to say that there are still a few branches from which I am unable to obtain any sort of information. To me they exist as a tiny section in a tabulated report. How to arouse them to the importance of a closer union of the branches within the diocese is still a grave question with me. I ask your assistance in finding a response to it.

I made visits to the following places: Columbus, Vicksburg, Brookhaven, Hazlehurst, Meridian and McComb. These visits had, of necessity, to be made at the week-end, which you know is a very busy time for housekeepers, but everywhere I received such open-handed hospitality, such sympathetic attention, and an eager response to all my appeals. The little I could give was always eclipsed by what I received. I believe much good can come of such visits, if you can arrange for a secretary who can give regular periods to the work.

The number of study-classes is greatly increased and I am glad to report that classes were held both in Advent and in Lent. Several branches have reported program meetings that were very successful. There have been thirty-seven classes held since our last Council.

In order to widen our influence, I tried a plan of interesting the women of the Parish Guilds in Mission study. The clergy gave me the most cordial and helpful service. Rev. Mr. Perry of Brookhaven, arranged for me to speak to the ladies after the morning service, and then led the class for me.

I have written 148 letters. This does not include orders sent to the Missions House for supplies for those who did not know how to order. Much delay is avoided by this plan.

Three new branches are to be reported. One of these, due to the efficient work of Mrs. Frierson, is in Clarksdale; the second in Bay St. Louis, is the result of the earnest effort of Mrs. Clifford, the Rector's wife; the third, at McComb, I can claim as a result of the plan I attempted.

My expense account is enclosed. I am very sorry it is so large. Distances are so great in Mississippi and as I can visit but one town at a time, it makes me use a great deal of mileage. It is a great responsibility to use money thus given and I feel it very much. This is the second reason why I think you should appoint another secretary. I am too *expensive* as my efficiency does not measure up to my expenses.

I ask you to consider these points very carefully. It is necessary to the future work of the Auxiliary. There is so much to be done that all our effort should be rightly directed so that nothing is lost.

With the deepest regret that I am unable to be with you.

PROCEEDINGS:

THE TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL COUNCIL OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY began Tuesday evening, April 16th., at Eight o'clock with Evening Prayer at Christ Church, Vicksburg.

The Annual Sermon was preached by the Rev. William Mercer Green.

After the service, an Easter Cantata by Hershey was beautifully sung by a fine choir.

The Executive Meeting followed.

Wednesday, 9:30 A. M.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rev. Charles E. Woodson, assisted by the Rev. J. C. Johnes.

10 A. M.

Twenty delegates were called to order by the Vice-President, Mrs. Berry, as the President was unable to be present.

This number was afterwards increased to Forty-two, representing nineteen Branches.

Cordial addresses of welcome were made by Rev. Charles E. Woodson and Miss Mary Maganos, the President of Christ Church Auxiliary. After a short talk by the acting President, Mrs. Berry.

Mrs. Carter's letter was read. Her recommendation that \$100 be given towards the \$15,000 needed by St. Agnes School, Kyoto, was moved and carried, and the Secretary was instructed to apportion that amount to the Branches.

Miss Lindley's letter was read. Mrs. Frierson, Mrs. Gardiner and Mrs. Conway were appointed a committee to act upon it.

The Secretary's report was read and accepted.

This was followed by the Treasurer's report which was accepted.

The report of the Educational Secretary, who could not be present, was read.

The Secretary was instructed to convey to her the regret of the Auxiliary that she could not be present; their appreciation of her work; and their refusal to accept her resignation.

Mrs. P. S. Gardiner, Custodian of the United Offering, read her report, which was accepted.

Mrs. Kuehnle, President of the Junior Auxiliary, sent her report, which was read and accepted.

When her resignation was read, Mrs. Bratton moved that the Auxiliary refuse to accept it, and the Secretary was asked to write to her, asking her to keep her office—promising that an assistant should be appointed by the Bishop.

Mrs. John M. Jones, Secretary and Treasurer of the Juniors, read a good report, which was accepted.

Mrs. Berry read her reports, as Leader of the Scattered Sheep, Representative of the Spirit of Missions, and her work as Convocational Vice-President, all of which were accepted.

Mrs. Phelps, of Greenville, asked for the privilege of organizing a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in Indianola. Consent given.

Mrs. Holley's letter of regret for her unavoidable absence was read, and Mrs. Jones appointed to fill her place on the program.

Mrs. Frierson read the report of the committee, appointed April, 1917, at Greenwood, upon Miss Delafield's letter in regard to placing women on the Board of Missions:

"If the placing of women on the Board, will not in any way interfere with or detract from the interest of men in the work of the Church and Her Missions, we are heartily in favor of the appointment, so long as the percentage is kept at the figure proposed, and the movement will never be allowed as an opening through which to crowd in more women and to crowd out any of the men.

The Committee feels that the interest of the men should be kept and furthered and everything done to bring in more men workers rather than lessen the number; and we, the women, are glad to do everything in our power to assist. As there are women in the field of Missions, we are convinced that it would be wise to have some women on the Board.

Accepted

Miss Finley's report of "The League of the Baptized," now discontinued because of the Pension Fund, was read and accepted, and the Secretary asked to convey to her, the appreciation of her work by the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Rose, Mrs. Phelan and Mrs. Williams were appointed a Courtesy Committee.

After the Noonday Intercession, led by Mrs. Bratton, Miss Mary Maganos led the conference of Branch Presidents, of whom twelve were present.

Mmes. King, of Bovina; Phelps, Greenville; Rose, of Greenwood; Griggs, of Meridian; Graves of Jackson, and the President of All Saints' College Branches spoke on methods of work and study.

2:30 P. M.

The afternoon session was opened with prayer by Mrs. Graves of Jackson.

Miss Sloan led the Educational Conference, for which Miss Howard had furnished notes.

Mrs. Bratton's motion that a fixed amount be given to Miss Howard for her Educational work, to be given by the Juniors as well as the Woman's Auxiliary, was carried; and the Executive Board was asked to decide upon the amount necessary and report to the Council.

Mrs. Graves offered to the Diocesan Auxiliary, the hospitality of St. Andrew's, Jackson, for the meeting in April, 1919, and Mrs. Gardiner, of Laurel, accepted the cordial invitation for the Council.

Mrs. Frierson read the report of her committee on "The Spiritual Drive." The Secretary cut it to the number of words possible for a night message, and sent it to Miss Lindley, as follows:

"The Mississippi Woman's Auxiliary think plan admirable in general, but owing to present obligations and expense of the undertaking, it seems best that the messengers make the canvass in their own parishes.

Further, it seems best to confine work to our own Church people, and to the Unchurched."

4 P. M.

At the Juniors' open meeting, the Rev. Charles E. Woodson presided. The Little Helpers, Christ Church, Section II, Holy Trinity, and the Sunday School of Christ Church appeared in a delightful program, after which Bishop Bratton gave his Annual Address.

A social hour followed, during which delicious refreshments were served.

8 P. M.

The Missionary Service was held at Holy Trinity. After a most inspiring sermon by Bishop Bratton. Five people received the rite of Confirmation.

Thursday, 9:30 A. M.

Morning Prayer was read by Rev. Charles E. Woodson. A quartette choir rendered some fine music.

10:30 A. M.

The Executive Committee recommended that the sum of \$150 be placed at Miss Howard's disposal and that the Secretary pro rate this amount to the Branches of the Junior as well as the Woman's Auxiliary. A motion that this report be accepted, was carried.

Mrs. Bratton led a fine Conference on the subject "How to Create Workers Among the Women of the Auxiliary." Those who took part were Miss Newton of All Saints' College, Mrs. Griggs, Mrs. Frierson, Mrs. Gardiner, Mrs. Oates, Miss Maganos and Mrs. Tuller.

11:30 A. M.

Mrs. Jones led the Conference on Junior Methods. Among the speakers was Mrs. M. M. Robertson of the Christian Church.

Noonday Prayer was led by Bishop Bratton.

Miss Lillian Sloan interested everyone in the "Model Story Hour."

The Treasurer reported that the Council offerings amounted to \$44.44, and Mrs. Bratton moved that this sum be sent to the Committee on Armenian and Syrian Relief. Carried.

In reply to the Secretary's question, she was directed to make the Annual Report as short as is consistent with preserving the history of the Auxiliary.

Bishop Bratton spoke of the necessity of emphasizing spirituality at this time—of the importance of putting first things first.

After opening prayer, led by Miss Newton, the minutes were read and approved.

Miss Newton spoke of the Juniors at All Saints.

Mrs. J. M. Berry led a Conference on "The Line of Work Available for Convocational Vice-Presidents."

Mrs. Phelan, of Grenada, spoke.

Mrs. Frierson talked of "Helps to Mission Study."

Mrs. J. R. Carter's resignation was read and accepted, and the Secre-

tary instructed to write her of the regret of the Auxiliary that the state of her health made it necessary for her to give up her office.

Mrs. W. V. Frierson was unanimously elected to fill the unexpired term.

Mrs. Saunder's resignation was read and accepted with regret.

Mrs. Monroe McClurg, of Greenwood, was unanimously elected for the unexpired term.

Mrs. Bratton and Mrs. Lee Richardson were chosen delegates to the Provincial Synod which will meet in November at Louisville, Ky.

Mrs. Rose, chairman, read the report of the Courtesy Committee:

"WHEREAS, We, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary, in Council assembled, having enjoyed the cordial and gracious hospitality of the people of Vicksburg; be it

Resolved, That the Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Mississippi, do extend our sincere thanks and appreciation of the generous hospitality extended to us by the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Christ Church. And be it

Further Resolved, That we thank our Bishop and the clergy for their inspiring messages, and the choirs for their delightful music during the services.."

Mrs. Bratton moved a vote of thanks to Mrs. Berry for the able manner in which she had directed the work of the Council so unexpectedly laid upon her. Carried.

After a brief talk by Rev. Charles E. Woodson, followed by prayer, the Council was adjourned.

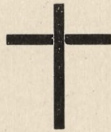
