THE FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

President's Address

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri, the Rt. Rev. Frederick F. Johnson, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor, Officers and Members of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, to the Presiding Bishop and Council:

"A work that requires no sacrifice does not count for much in fulfilling God's plans, but what is commonly called sacrifice is the best, happiest use of one's self and one's resources—the best investment of time, strength and means." Such, I think, would be the definition of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, if the members were called upon to express themselves. If the year's reports are encouraging, if we can look back and see bright moments of events worth while, it will be because loyal women have prayed and worked and given that Christ may be better known in the Diocese of Missouri, as well as elsewhere.

Now, for the three years to come, we are being given a definite program of work and while in Portland, at the meetings of the representatives, our delegates pledged our support to every measure recommended as worth doing. First, our whole strength is to be placed at the disposal of our leader, Jesus Christ—let us stop talking about the Church and speak in such intelligent terms of what He wants done in the Diocese and the world, let us show such enthusiasm for "advancing the line," that isolated individuals and small groups will be reached, cheered on by the interest shown in their needs, to join with us as a united whole for a common task.

Then our prayers and effort must be given towards maintaining a higher Christian moral standard in our homes and in society; we must actively work for better laws for the protection of women and children, for Christian inter-racial and inter-national relations, prison reforms, the practising of proportionate giving, anything, everything that hands, hearts, and minds can find to do. Every woman communicant in the Diocese must have a Blue Box and understand its power and usefulness; then the great offering of \$681,145.09 presented, at Portland, by thankful women, will sink into insignificance at New Orleans, in 1925, as we join with our sisters throughout the world, in giving to God for His use, even that small part of all He has given to us. The Women's Triennium Special is raising funds to establish two Church Houses for Women—open doors to opportunity and service—one for colored women who wish to train themselves as Deaconesses, the other for white women, where they can be properly housed while preparing themselves for work in the Church. God needs more and more the best trained and skilled people to work for Him!

If we are happy in our year's work and a bit proud of it, let us not feel we can fold our hands awhile, nor close our ears to the calls of need which came louder and more insistent "to come on over and help." God has given each one of us, opportunity, ability and means; let us put all of it at His disposal.

I had meant to voice here, what I am sure everyone feels, the absence from our ranks of Miss Mary W. Triplett, but this letter, which I have received from Miss Lindley, expresses so much better than I can, our appreciation of her and I will ask you to rise while I read it.

My Dear Mrs. Dix:

I cannot let this first annual meeting, since Miss Triplett's death, pass without sending you at least a few lines. You will be thinking of her and speaking of her, and I should like to share your thoughts of her and share, too, in your admiration of all she was and did.

Miss Triplett was a national figure in the Church and her love and service in the Woman's Auxiliary is too well known to need any words from me. When I remember my first contact with the Auxiliary outside of my own diocese, I remember discovering how much Miss Triplett meant not only to the Missouri branch but to the whole Auxiliary. I think I have never known anyone who loved it more or who more truly lived for it and found her greatest joy in its service.

My own personal friendship with her began when I went to St. Louis for my first visit, even before I was at the Church Missions House, and I have many memories since then of many kindnesses from her. We who have the privilege of service in the Auxiliary today, must never forget the example of those who loved and served before us and who make it possible for us to build the more beautifully today, because they laid foundations so wisely and faithfully, and when we think of those who, with Miss Emery, built in this way, we think naturally and lovingly of Miss Triplett. It is good, too, to think that perhaps they serve again together in that blessed land of Light. So I hope that you will let me add these few words of admiration and gratitude.

Report of Recording Secretary.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri, the Rt. Rev. Frederick F. Johnson, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor, Officers and Members of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council:

The four Quarterly Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary were held in Columbia, January 26th, at Calvary Church, May 26th at St. Michael and All Angels', October 27th at St. Peter's Church, January 3rd at the Cathedral—all were well attended.

While the Annual Meeting at Columbia was well represented, a majority of Parishes being present, it was not considered best to hold the meeting outside of St. Louis at present. The day was a particularly happy one as it was our beloved Bishop Tuttle's 85th Anniversary of his birth and he received many congratulations as well as two very handsome birthday cakes. The Speaker of the day, the Rt. Rev. Arthur W. Moulton, Bishop of Utah, gave us a very crisp and realistic picture of his work in that far Western Diocese.

The October Meeting was especially interesting on account of the five-minute talks given by members who attended the Triennial at Portland and a very vivid account of the work of the Church in China by the guest of the day, Deaconess Stewart of Changsha. At St. Michael's great interest was aroused in the Student Building at Columbia, and pledges made toward the equipment of the building now in use.

The last active work done by our late Hon. Secretary Mary W. Triplett was her preparation for the Quiet Day conducted by Bishop Sherwood, who kept his address on high spiritual lines which were most interesting. In future Miss Triplett's name will always be associated by her friends with the Quiet Day she loved so well.

The various Secretaries and Treasurers have made reports of their work, which is in a very healthy and flourishing condition.

We do not want to close the year's work without expressing our appreciation of the ready response from the Parishes at large, but think what a glorious amount of work could be done, if each Parish would have some share in the program of suggested work as outlined by the Executive Board.

One of the values of the Woman's Auxiliary was demonstrated by the ease and rapidity by which an audience was secured to hear Bishop MacInnes, Anglican Bishop in Jerusalem; his address was a most memorable and interesting one, the only regret being that every member was not present. Again those absent from the afternoon given to the Rt. Rev. Edward T. Demby, Suffragan Bishop of Arkansas, missed another rare moment in the life of the year. Bishop Demby won his hearers' complete attention and interest, when he presented, simply and with dignity, our responsibility toward the people of his race in our province.

The needs of the coming year will be many—let us bear in mind not only, "He prayeth best, who loveth best," but, "He loveth best, who giveth best." Also the lines in our own Church News:

"The Church is the one force that can better mankind.
By neglecting the Church one hinders every advance.
Don't hinder—help! You know it is your Church—use it."

Report of the Supply Secretary.

To the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, D. D., Bishop of Missouri, the Rt. Rev. Frederick F. Johnson, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor, Officers and Members of the Missouri Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council:

Owing to the unusual character of this year's allotment from the Supply Department, it is not possible at this time to give a complete report of the work done. Equipping the Emerald-Hodgson Hospital at Sewanee, Tenn., with a year's supplies is the largest part of our assignment, and the branches are at work on the articles asked for.

The gauze work, bandage making of many kinds, brings an element of variety, but many are yet unmade and none of the dispensary needs of drugs, adhesive tape, ice bags, etc., have been met; these are urgent needs, help us meet them. Three personal boxes were sent at Xmas to the Rev. Edwin Johnson, Glenwood Springs, Colo.; the Rev. Wm. H. Haupt, Halls City, Neb., and the Rev. Hunter Lewis, Messilla Park, N. M. Sewing through the summer months was continued and 51 excellent dresses were made by the few faithful workers. This summer work has great value and deserves better support. Needy girls, with whom Miss Cora Pearce has come in contact, are the beneficiaries. The value of supply work to date is \$1,910.51, and \$268.00 has been contributed this year for use in the Supply Department.

Report of United Thank Offering, Woman's Auxiliary of Missouri.

Our U. T. O. report for 1922 is the best one we have ever had, larger in numbers contributing and larger in gifts. Our offering sent to Portland was \$7,850, an increase of 75 per cent over the previous one, and we have \$850.00 in the one for 1925.

Valley Park came in during the year, our only first gift, but some parishes have had a wonderful awakening. For St. Michael and All Angels it came in May, and as we close the year's report they are second on the list, a close second to the Cathedral. Holy Communion comes third. St. Philip's has done finely. The Redeemer has taken a fresh start. But if I should mention all who have done well, I should have to mention practically all, and the figures will speak for themselves.

In making this final report before going out of office I cannot refrain from a few personal words. I have watched the U. T. O. since its beginning, and have seen it grow to be a great power in the

missionary work of the church. It has grown from the gift of \$1,000 for building a small chapel in Alaska and the support of one woman missionary to the gift of \$20,000 towards three buildings and the support of 200 women. In our own diocese I have had the care of it since our first part in it. Our first U. T. O. was \$1,175 for three years. It has grown to nearly four times that amount in one year. But still I am confident that we have made only a beginning. It is a great satisfaction to me that I can pass on the care and direction of the offering in good condition. I wish to thank you all and especially the parish treasurers for your unfailing loyalty and support, and can ask nothing better for my successor than to have the same help and responsive co-operation. This is not a farewell in any sense, for I am leaving only the office and not the work, for as long as I live I hope to be able to give and work and pray for our beloved United Thank Offering.
