PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
WOMAN'S PAROCHIAL AND MISSION-
ARY SOCIETY

Billings, Montana, June 20, 1906.

The Third Annual Meeting of the Woman's Parochial and Missionary Society of the Diocese of Montana was held in St. Luke's Church, Billings, June 20th, 1906, opening at 9:30 a. m.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. H. E. Clowes.

After the Service, the business meeting was called to order by the Vice-President, Mrs. J. L. Patterson.

The Secretary called the Roll, and found the following number of Representatives present: Anaconda, 2; Billings, 3; Big Timber, 3; Bozeman, 4; St. John's, Butte, 4; Great Falls, 1; Helena, 2; Livingston, 1; Marysville, 1; Miles City, 2; Missoula, 1; Philipsburg, 1; Red Lodge, 2; Joliet, 1; Townsend, 2. Total, 30.

A motion was made and carried that all women present belonging to the Woman's Parochial and Missionary Society of Montana, and to Organizations affiliated therewith, be given all privileges of this meeting.

The Report of the Secretary was read and approved.

The Report of the Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary was read and approved.

Mrs. Dodds of Anaconda, read a short account of the work of the Junior Auxiliary being carried on in St. Mark's, Anaconda.

A short discussion of Junior work followed participated in by Mrs. Wipf of Philipsburg, the Rev. Mr. Messias of Butte, and Mrs. Stillman of Big Timber.

Noonday Prayers were said by the Rev. S. D. Hooker.

The Treasurer reported the morning Offerings to have amounted to \$33.10, and the Chairman explained that a vote on its disposition would be taken later.

After a few remarks by the Treasurer, pressing home the importance of sending the Auxiliary pledges through the Auxiliary Treasury, a recess was taken until 2 p. m.

At 2 p. m., the meeting was called to order by the Vice-President. Hymn 249 was sung.

A short Report of the work of the Daughters of the King was made by Miss Peters of Butte, and supplemented by Miss Baldwin of the same city.

A desire being expressed for further discussion of the Junior Auxiliary work, the Secretary, Miss Baldwin, gave a short talk on that subject, and it was then thrown open for general discussion.

The Treasurer's Report was then read and approved.

Miss Rumsey then gave a short Report of work among Chinese in Helena.

The President's Address was read by the Vice-President.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Ever since the great catastrophe at San Francisco, the world has been full of admiration for the bravery and heroism of its people—who, while watching the destruction of their homes and places of business, were planning how to rebuild them finer and more substantial than before.

Such enthusiasm and vigor is wonderful, but the true test of their strength of character will come when, as the days and months, and even years, go by, they patiently, brick by brick, and dollar by dollar, build up their homes and fortunes again. So we have our enthusiasms for extending the life of our Church at home and abroad. We see what improvements we could make in our Parish and Missionary work, and delight our souls in glorious visions of great results; but it takes much less time to build a house than to teach a person to be "true and just in their dealings," or "to bear no malice nor hatred in their hearts"—and I don't know but what it is harder still to inspire them with the Missionary ardor.

We are such weak human beings compared to what is to be done, we sometimes wonder why God chose us to be His instruments to carry the Gospel to all Nations. But He did choose us, and we can do it, with His help, and the way to accomplish it is—after realizing our dependence on Him—to patiently look after each detail; take one step after another, and, not looking for results, keep our eyes fixed on the beautiful vision of what we hope may be accomplished at the end—if not by ourselves, at least by those who shall have worked on our foundations and found them well laid.

And so today we must go over again the various matters that call for our attention. First will come our Parish or Mission. There is always a chance for renewed efforts there, and more patience.

It is an immense comfort to a Rector if he has two or three women who always look on the bright side of Parish affairs, and by their influence make an atmosphere of kindness and cheerfulness in the Guilds and other Parish organizations. We can all do this if we set our minds to it, whether we are rich or poor, and have much strength or not.

Outside the Parish are the same objects as of old; first the Henrietta Brewer Memorial Building at St. Peter's Hospital, Helena. We hope it will not be long now before enough money is raised to begin this building; and then we shall be called upon to redeem our pledges to help toward the furnishing. At our Annual Meeting in 1903, at Butte, the following Resolution was passed:

"Resolved, That the women of the Missionary Jurisdiction of Montana, working under the Woman's Auxiliary or Local Guilds, propose that when they have sufficient strength and ability, they furnish and maintain, either separately or with two or more Guilds working together, rooms in the Henrietta Brewer Memorial Hospital at Helena."

The idea then was that we should put aside a small sum each year for this purpose, and so have it ready when the time for furnishing came. It was estimated that it would cost \$150 to furnish a room. It has also been the custom in Helena, since the death of Mrs. Brewer, to give, on the anniversary of that event, a gift of towels, sheets, pillow cases and other hospital furnishings to St. Peter's, in memory of her beautiful life, and of the great good she accomplished in founding that Hospital. I wish that all the women in Montana would follow the example of the Helena women.

The Alaska Box is getting to be well known in the Diocese, but a great deal more could be done. Last year, out of thirty Parishes and Missions whose women's Organizations gave to Missions, only ten sent anything to the Alaska Box. I am afraid you do not understand that even one garment is acceptable; one pair of woolen stockings, one pair of warm mittens, one doll to cheer the heart of some little girl, who has the mother instinct and loves her dollie as strongly as our own little ones. I hope that every delegate present at this meeting will see that at least one thing is sent from her Parish this coming year. Mrs. Moore will tell you what articles are most needed.

As to the Fund for the Bishop's Missionary, twenty places gave towards that object last year, though twenty-four pledged something. It may be that some money given for Diocesan Missions was meant for the Bishop's Missionary, but we all ought to give it; it should come next to our Parish work.

The Mission Study Classes are to my mind most important in arousing an interest in Missions. I think seven or eight have been carried on in the Diocese this year, and I hope another year will see as many more. I will gladly correspond with anyone on this subject and help them to start a Class in their Parish. If you cannot find even one person willing to study about Missions, why not study by yourself? There are a great many interesting books on Missions, and many study leaflets, and I am sure that when you once know something about the subject, you will find it most interesting.

Eleven places gave towards General or Domestic Missions last year. General Missions includes Foreign Missions and Missions in the United States. We have a great deal of work among the Negroes and the Indians, as well as in our Home Missionary Jurisdictions; and this, as well as the work in foreign countries, is supported by our contributions. All our Foreign Missions are most prosperous, and there is a great demand among the natives for more churches and schools and hospitals. In China and Japan they do a great deal towards self-help, but they do not yet realize the blessedness of giving, nor are they as well off as Christian nations, and we shall have to send them both money and workers for some time to come.

This is the year when we must keep the United Offering most closely in mind. In October, 1907, it is to be presented at the Triennial Service of the Woman's Auxiliary, in Richmond, Virginia. It is the custom to give this Offering at the Service for administering the Holy Communion, with which the Triennial Meeting begins. This

is a Service of Thanksgiving for all the blessings God has bestowed upon us, especially for the great blessing of having been born and brought up in a Christian land—a blessing which we cannot realize unless we know about the degradation and misery of heathen women. A part of this Offering comes from the native Christian women in Foreign Missions, and is much larger in proportion to their number than what we give. They realize what the blessings of Christianity are, and are thankful to help carry it to others, while many of us who appreciate our Christian privileges do not seem to care to share them with others.

In order that you may understand fully about the United Offering, I have provided our Secretary, Mrs. Mynard, with some leaflets on the subject. There are two of them, "The Story of the United Offering," and "Some of Our United Offering Missionaries and Their Work," and I wish every Delegate present would ask Mrs. Mynard for these two leaflets, and then read them to her Guild at home and ask them to give something this year to the United Offering.

Have I asked you to do too much? I think not; other women in the United States do this much and more; and, after eighteen years' acquaintance with the women of Montana, I do not find that they have any less ability or any less kindness of heart than any others. It is because you do not know; you will not realize how much your help is needed and how great your powers are. Why should we narrow our thoughts and efforts down to our own Parish, and sometimes to our own selves? When we do, the little troubles and trials in our lives assume great proportions and we are overwhelmed by them. Let us take a broader outlook, and wherever there is sin and sorrow, and degradation and pain, let us do what we can to remedy it. Why does the world grow better every year? Because so many men and women have done all they could to make it better. If no one had ever tried, how would we be living? In heathenism and savagery, with no hope of future life and nothing but pain and misery in this.

We have done well in the past, we women of Montana, but not nearly as much as we might have done, so this year let us take a long step forward, and, fixing our eyes on the glorious vision of the whole world ready and waiting for the coming of our Lord and Saviour, do each duty faithfully, whether it be in our own land or in those crowded countries so far across the seas.

A letter from Miss Julia C. Emery, Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was read by Mrs. Dennison of Billings.

After a solo sung by Mrs. Bennett of Billings, Mrs. Mynard of Great Falls read a paper on "The Auxiliary and the Responsibility of Church Women to It."

Mrs. Booker read a short account of Auxiliary work in Helena, after which the following Resolution, offered by Mrs. Moore of Butte, was adopted:

Be It Resolved, By the Woman's Parochial and Missionary Society, that each Guild and Organization in connection with the Society be, and is hereby asked to make a contribution annually of hospital supplies to St. Peter's Hospital, on the 17th of March, in memory of Mrs. Brewer."

Mrs. Moore of Butte reported on the Alaska Box, and was followed by a paper on Alaska Missions, by Mrs. Conrad of Bozeman.

Mrs. Booker moved that the Alaska work be continued. Carried.

The following pledges were then made to the Bishop's Missionary: Anaconda, \$20; Billings, \$35; Bozeman, \$35; St. John's, Butte, \$200; Cameron, \$5; Dillon, \$30; Great Falls, \$75; Helena, \$200; Joliet, \$10; Livingston, \$20; Madison Valley, \$10; Missoula, \$20; Miles City, \$10; Philipsburg, \$15; Pony, \$5; Red Lodge, \$30; Sheridan, \$5; Virginia City, \$15; Kalispell, \$15; Fridley, \$5; Gardiner, \$5; St. Paul's, Butte, \$10; Big Timber, \$10. Total, \$770.

Mrs. Moore read a short paper, prepared by Miss Paxton of Dillon, on the "History of the Diocese of California," after which it was moved and carried that a number of articles which had been left from packing the Alaska Box, be sent to Bishop Nichols for use in his work.

It was moved and seconded that the morning's Offering be divided between the Contingent Fund and the Bishop's Missionary. Carried.

The following women were elected as Delegates to the meeting of the Auxiliary to be held in connection with the Conference of the Sixth Missionary District in Minneapolis, October next: Mrs. Patterson, Bozeman; Mrs. Mynard, Great Falls; Mrs. Nicholson, Big Timber; Mrs. Cobban, Butte; Mrs. Hoyt, Billings.

The following Resolution, offered by Mrs. Lewis, was, on motion, adopted:

"Resolved, That we, the members of the Ladies' Parochial and Missionary Society, very much regret the absence of our President, Mrs. S. D. Hooker of Dillon, on account of her long-continued ill-health. And we hope and pray that the next year may find her in her place in our midst completely restored to health again."

The following Resolution, presented by Mrs. Williams, was, on motion, adopted:

"Resolved, That the Woman's Parochial and Missionary Society, assembled in Convention at Billings, desire to express their deep sympathy to the Rev. H. G. Wakefield and family in their sad hour of affliction, and to commend them to our Heavenly Father for comfort and reconciliation."

The following Resolution, presented by Mrs. Mynard, was, on motion, adopted:

"Resolved, That the Montana Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, assembled in Annual Meeting, extend to our sister branch in the Diocese of California, our sincere sympathy with them in their deep affliction which they have suffered, and which means so much of loss in that which has been gained by years of faithfulness and zeal. We pray for them grace to endure, and courage and strength to continue that work they have ever done so well."

It was moved and seconded that Convention be asked to print 500 copies of the Proceedings of Woman's Day. Carried.

The following Resolution, presented by Mrs. Booker, was, on motion, adopted:

"Be It Resolved, That the Woman's Parochial and Missionary Society extends thanks to the Rector, Wardens, Vestry and Guilds of St. Luke's Church for their splendid services, fine music, and last, but not least, their genial Hospitality, which have made the Third Annual Convention such a success."

The Minutes of the day's Session were then read and approved. The meeting then adjourned.
