Appended is our mode of raising funds for all Branches of our Mission work. Each woman on the Parish list, as a communicant, is solicited for a subscription, and our pledges run from 25 cents to \$25.00 per month. This has proven a most successful method wherever adopted.

THE CATHEDRAL PLAN ON FINANCES.

In this very simple plan for obtaining money, the part to be emphasized first and last is—regularity in collecting.

To inaugurate this system, the first step is to send a circular letter, such as is subjoined below, to every person from whom a subscription will be asked. Then let solicitors from the society go once a year to all the women in the Parish, and obtain from them a pledge of some amount, no matter how small. The third and important step is the collecting. In small Parishes it would be easy for one or two members of the society to do the collecting, but in large Parishes it is *much* better to pay a collector—in any case the collections should be made on the first of the month, unless the donors appoint some more convenient day. Sometimes it is easier for the subscriber to pay for the year in advance, which saves the time and expense of calling for the amount, but there are many who would feel unable to pay their full subscription at one time, and to them we should be careful to show that we make it a business to collect monthly and that we do not consider their subscription too small to bother about calling to obtain. Many ladies cannot be working members, but there is rarely a communicant who cannot

afford to pay a dollar a year, so that while the list of *active* members may not be long, there should be a goodly number of *sustaining* members.

The ladies of the "TRINITY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY" are anxious to make the work of their Society more effective, and with this end in view are introducing a new method of collecting Missionary contributions.

Instead of soliciting for objects that are brought before them, such as "Boxes," City Missions, Diocesan Missions, Bishop Graves' Work, &c., the Members of the Society have decided to solicit once a year, (excepting for lunches, teas, &c., where food is required,) from each lady of the Parish, and in that way obtain *all* the money they give to the Missionary work.

For this purpose some of our members will call upon you within the next week or two, and ask you to contribute monthly to the Missionary work.

If you prefer to pay yearly or quarterly, there would be no objection to so doing, but we shall send a collector out, on the first day of each month, and she will call upon all who have not already paid our Treasurer, to pay their subscription for the month in advance. We do not ask for any special sum. Let each one give what she can afford, whether it be twenty-five cents, one dollar, five dollars, or any other amount. All of it is sorely needed.

If you have a preference as to how your subscription shall be spent, you can indicate it on the solicitor's book. There are four divisions of the general missionary work, (Parish, Diocesan, Domestic, and Foreign,) and among these all funds will be divided, Boxes generally going to Domestic or Foreign departments.

If you do not indicate how you want your contribution apportioned, our Executive Committee will divide it into four equal portions and send a fourth to each of the Missionary fields.

Any lady who contributes will become a member of our Society, and will be most welcome at our Friday afternoon meetings in the crypt of the Cathedral.

We know that all cannot be *working* members, but cannot *all* be sustaining members? We send out this letter with some diffidence, but with the prayer that you will receive our solicitors kindly, and that God will put it into your hearts to be very generous.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

"Our sixth annual meeting finds us, dear friends of the auxiliary, with our membership unbroken by death and with increased numbers, strength and enthusiasm. We are more and more encouraged with the results of united women's work. The wonderful achievements of the women's division of the World's Fair Commissioners show in vivid light what may be done with intelligent zeal, energy and united effort. Shall we not take heart of grace and go forward? An interesting example of the grand results that may be obtained by earnest, united women has been given us recently in the thrilling reports read by our visiting friends of the Methodist conference. The work of their women in the foreign field has been marvelous. These stories of consecrated effort should bring the blush of shame to those of our own church who declare their disinclination to work for any interest beyond the narrow borders of their own parish. "There is that scattereth yet increaseth," and those who reach out the tendrils of sympathy and help to others destitute of their blessings may find themselves repaid a hundred-fold in ways they dream of not.

"This afternoon you will have a paper read on the Junior Auxiliary, an agency that we hope will lift our young people above the enjoyments of social life, or the absorbing pursuit of business to an interest in the welfare of the world, its well-being and well-doing. As a means toward the forwarding of greater results in the mission work of the church, the claims of the enrollment fund will be presented. How can any woman be indifferent, when the needs of the great fields of labor are known. To help carry the light of civilization to those in darkness is glorious work. Said one of the Methodist Missionaries, 'To have relieved one woman of the torture of bound feet is worth five years' work in China.' To lift the veil of the Zenana, giving the vision of the outer world to the little unhappy child widows of India should be to the Christian mother of happy daughters, a blessed privilege. To aid the ambitious efforts of Japan to better the condition of her people, should be a pride to us whose government and institutions of art, science and literature are objects of her emulation and envy. To carry the inestimable blessings of modern antiseptic surgery scientific medical treatment and skilled nursing to the millions of women in China and India who suffer untold miseries under the ignorant and superstitious treatment of their so-called physicians, should appeal strongly to humane tender women of our

favored land as an imperative duty. The medical missions that are proving such blessings to those poor unfortunates claim our sympathetic and earnest aid. In our own country true patriotism demands our aid in elevating the colored race to that intelligent citizenship which an educated Christianity alone can give. Humanity toward our friends and neighbors on our frontiers calls for co-operation in the religious efforts made among the Indians—to civilize and humanize them so that among them there may not be war any more.

“In our own diocese aid should be given to establish the church with her schools and other beneficent institutions that good citizenship may be aided and established thereby. In the East that most interesting agency, the Church Periodical Club, whose work has been sanctified by the recent death of its founder, Mrs. Fargo, is carrying intellectual and spiritual profit to the homes of clergymen and laymen—unable to afford the luxury of good reading. This work asks of us only interest, forethought and care, with a few cents postage to forward to addresses furnished by the central bureau, loads of reading matter otherwise cast to the waste heaps, but by this agency made like ‘charity,’ twice blessed.

“Another agency, most happy in its influence, bringing into the lives of hard worked, lonely girls a little of the brightness of happier lives, is the ‘Girls Friendly Society.’ Its work has been mainly in England and in the large cities and factory towns of the East. Many are those whom it has lifted from despair to a higher and nobler life. Few dream of the romantic story that lies in the experience of many a lonely missionary. How few know of the lonely man in our farthest border, ice-bound Alaska, now waiting for the summer visit of the one ship of the year with its yearly mail, and bringing—he fondly hopes the man and woman to share his labors among those interested people, whose eagerness to learn outstrips his unaided ability to teach.

“I have endeavored to present to you some points of interest in the work of the Lord’s great vineyard, hoping thereby to stimulate interest and effort in the work in which all church people should share. I have presented these interests, not in their higher aspects, the christianizing and saving of precious souls—but from the lower points of view, of patriotism and humanity.

“Subjects crowd upon me, but I must not detain you longer, except to claim from you, what all can certainly give who will—the inestimable gift of your interest—the priceless gift of your prayers—that the Kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ may prevail.”
