MINUTES
OF THE
Twenty-Eighth Annual Meeting
OF THE
Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the
Board of Missions

MAY 19, 1914



The twenty-eighth annual meeting of the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held Tuesday, May 19, 1914, beginning with a celebration of the Holy Communion in Trinity Cathedral at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Williams being the celebrant, ninety-four women receiving.

At the close of this service, the business meeting was called to order by the Diocesan President, Mrs. Philip Potter, in Jacob's Memorial Hall.

The roll call showed the following Parochial branches represented: Ashland, St. Stephen's, three; Blair, St. Mary's, three; Beatrice, Christ Church, two; Central City, Christ Church, one; Columbus, Grace Church, one; Fremont, St. James, one; Lincoln, Holy Trinity, five; Nebraska City, St. Mary's, five; Omaha, All Saints', seventeen; Omaha, St. Andrew's, twelve; Omaha, St. Paul's, ten; Omaha, St. Barnabas, fourteen; Omaha, St. Philips the Deacon, one; Omaha, Trinity Cathedral, twenty-three; Omaha, Good Shepherd's, thirteen; Plattsmouth, St. Luke's, two; Schuyler, Holy Trinity, four; Superior, St. Barnabas, one; Wymore, St. Luke's, three; three were welcome visitors from Council Bluffs, The Rev. Dr. Rollit, The Rev. S. Mills Hayes, rector of Holy Trinity, Lincoln; Rev. Cannon Marsh, Blair, Rev. Wilbur S. Leete, Plattsmouth; Rev. F. D. Tyner, vicar of St. Andrew's, Omaha; Rev. John Albert Williams, vicar of St. Philips the Deacon, were also present. The total attendance was about 250.

Bishop Williams gave an address of welcome and Mrs. Potter, the Diocesan President, read her report.

Miss Babcock, a Missionary from Japan, brought greetings from that important field. Miss Katherine Hilliard, Directress of the Juniors, presented her report.

Mrs. T. H. Tracy, Diocesan Secretary, read her report which, on motion, was approved.

The Report of the Educational Secretary was read by Mrs. S. D. Barkalow. On motion, it was approved.

Mrs. John Williams, Custodian Diocesan Box, presented her report. On motion, it was approved.

The report of the Diocesan Librarian was read by Mrs. J. P. Trimble. On motion, it was approved.

Noon-day prayers for Missions by Bishop Williams.

Miss Jessie Royce, Treasurer of the United Offering, read her report, which was accepted.

Miss Updike read the report from the Bishop's Guild.

Reports were then presented by the District Vice Presidents:

Mrs. J. B. Watkins for the Northeastern District.

Mrs. M. E. Blondell for the Southeastern District.

Mrs. George Thomas for the Northwestern District.

Mrs. Yoder for the Southwestern District.

These interesting reports were, on motion, regularly approved.

Two Minute Reports were then presented from the following Parish Branches: Ashland, Blair, St. Margaret's Guild, Blair; Beatrice, Central City, Columbus, Fremont, Lincoln, Nebraska City, St. Andrew's, All Saints', St. Barnabas, Good Shepherd's, St. Philip's, Trinity Cathedral, South Omaha, Schuyler, and Wymore.

Adjourned for lunch until 2:15.

The Afternoon Session was opened with short services. The Secretary read Miss Emery's annual letter to the branches. A letter was read from the Tanana Valley Mission in Alaska, one from Miss Mills from St. John's in the Winderness, Alaska; and one from Miss Emery, in regard to the Foreign Missionary Insurance Fund.

Bishop Williams in his address to the Auxiliary, spoke of three new undertakings for the coming year—the new Clarkson Hospital, the new Nurses' Home and the new Brownell Hall. He also requested that the "Bishop Williams' Special" be used in St. John's Mission in the North part of the city.

Miss E. Johnson of Brownell Hall, spoke of the great need of a new building for the church school for girls in Omaha.

Pledges for the coming year were then taken.

Mrs. Clinton Miller moved, and it was duly seconded and carried, that the Constitution be so changed that the office of Directress of the Little Helpers be omitted from Article 4, and the work of that office be given the Junior officers.

The chair appointed Mrs. John Williams and Mrs. Tancock a committee to suggest a name to the Bishop for the office of Custodian of the Diocesan Box.

Miss Babcock spoke of her work in Japan.

Wm. M. Purce, General Missionary, North of the Platte, gave a short address and pledges were taken to assist in the purchase of a motor car for his use.

Mrs. A. K. Gault moved that a vote of thanks be given the Diocesan officers for their work during the past year, and that it be so recorded in the minutes.

The following names were elected delegates to the Sixth Provincial meeting at Minneapolis in October: Mesdames Potter, Noe, Tracy, Tancock, Williams, Hayes, Fairchild, Barkalow, Thomas, Marsh, Gault and Miss George Trimble.

Minutes of the meeting were then read and approved.

Dr. Rollit adjourned the meeting with the Benediction. Offering, \$13.30.

President's Address



RT. REV. SIR, REV. GENTLEMEN, AND WOMEN OF THE
AUXILIARY:

We have assembled to make our annual report of work accomplished, to our Bishop under whose *special* direction we labor.

WELCOME—It becomes my pleasant duty to welcome most cordially the Delegates, especially those who have come to us from a distance thanking them for all the trouble they have taken to be with us at our annual meeting. We hope we have provided satisfactorily for their comfort and pleasure, and we would thank those also who have made it possible for us to extend to them a welcome. Hospitality I bespeak for them from you all and any little attention you can show them. They are of us, yet often strangers face to face.

ORGANIZATION—We first have endeavored to make every Parish or Mission, feel that it had a *right* to representation here and that it would be cordially welcomed. We have urged the forming of Junior Branches at every possible opportunity. In many instances the Woman's Auxiliary and the Ladies' Aid Society are composed of the very same women, and they are the main support of their Parish, but we think, Rt. Rev. Sir, that they are ready to assist you, to the extent of their ability, in the General work of the Diocese, and ready to help the Board of Missions also, to the extent of their ability, in the General work of the Church.

We have visited most of the branches in the Diocese, and in every instance have met with a cordial welcome, and found an earnest desire to increase their own efficiency. The question *how* to do this is a vexed one. We have made four principal suggestions:

FIRST—Organize the Juniors, and be more interested in having the children and young people work for Missions.

SECOND—Make a house to house canvas, and *talk* more about Missions.

THIRD—Make a systematic study of the Mission Field.

FOURTH—We have suggested as most important of

all, that more *time* be spent on our own consecration to the work—this by means of Bible reading, prayer, special communion services with special addresses. At the Cathedral, for Omaha, South Omaha and Florence as most of you know, there was a special service on Holy Thursday, with a Quiet Hour conducted by the Bishop, and in two or three other towns such services have been held with special addresses on Auxiliary Work.

MISSION STUDY—Our next efforts were devoted to the Mission Classes, always emphasizing the study of the Bible first, and the Book of The Acts has been the special basis for study, with Morris's Key for a guide.

We seemed to be somewhat handicapped at the outset because we had no Educational Secretary, but Mrs. Trimble, as Librarian, was an invaluable assistant in attending to the purchasing and distribution of the books and other literature and we did the best we could until a Secretary was found. We attended a Normal class, at the Summer School for Missions, conducted by Miss Patterson of Chicago, she using the same book that was prescribed by our own Board.

Then we had an "Institute," the last of October, conducted by the very efficient Secretary of the Juniors, Miss Grace Lindley, and she, in her beautiful and inspiring way, put us into a very receptive state of mind for what was to follow as a result of the "Study Classes" at the General Convention.

One of our members, though not a delegate, was interested enough in the General Convention to go clear to New York to attend it, took her daughter, paid her own expenses, went into Miss Crosby's Study Class, and upon her return home offered to conduct a class. We thought she might better be the Educational Secretary, but she hesitated to do more than simply conduct a class. After she had finished the course with this class, she was more willing and finally accepted the appointment. She, as Educational Secretary, will make her own report.

GIFTS—As to our Gifts, we have made no special exertion, trusting that larger gifts will come with a larger membership, and more thorough knowledge of the Mission Field.

CONDITIONS—So much for the review of the past year's work. In addition we wish to add that we find in Nebraska the same division of Missions that we find

everywhere, viz., Evangelistic, Medical and Educational, and in studying conditions in the Diocese, we find two things that we can do to aid the maintenance of the Evangelistic division, namely to be more careful to see that our Diocesan Assessment and our Diocesan Apportionment are both paid—the former to sustain the work already begun within the Diocese, the latter to sustain the work already begun outside of the Diocese, in this country and in foreign lands. On the last page of The Crozier will be found the amounts fairly distributed to each Branch, and it would help our Bishop and the Diocese if both the Assessment and the Apportionment were paid promptly either monthly or quarterly. Our Auxiliary can help, then, in the *Evangelistic Work*, by urging promptness in paying pledges.

In the *Medical Division*, our Auxiliary need not be ashamed. We like to think of the part we have taken in the work of Clarkson Hospital, and we have many among us who can testify to its usefulness and efficiency. Plans are on foot for enlarging the present building, and if there are any among you, who wish to make an offering for this purpose, it will be most gladly received.

But at present the most important and pressing need in the Diocese is in the division of *Educational Missions*. We refer to the demand for a new location and new buildings for Brownell Hall. The land has already been given conditionally, and to meet those conditions we hope to have not a long pull, but a *strong* pull, and a pull all together. Let Brownell Hall be our extra special undertaking, for this year in Diocesan Missions, and be assured that there is no more influential Missionary Agency in the Diocese.

We wish in no wise to abandon work already undertaken, one must not "rob Peter to pay Paul," yet we trust that there will be aroused such a splendid interest in this institution that when the call is made, everyone will be ready to unite with the Bishop in his plans, whatever they may be, for this most important and special branch of Diocesan Missions—our Church School—Brownell Hall.

NO. 2—NORTHWESTERN.

Columbus, Neb., May, 1914.

To the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary:

I have the honor to submit the following report of district work done during the past year.

July 10, 1913. Organized Junior Auxiliary, Grace Church, Columbus, Nebraska, with twelve members. Since this time regular meetings have been held, bi-weekly, and some new members have been added, but I am unable to state the present membership.

September 10. District meeting was held at Columbus, Nebraska, which was attended by thirteen members from other branches. Mrs. Potter, President, was present and gave an interesting talk.

October 13. Visited Palmer; had a very nice meeting, and the women are to organize a Junior Auxiliary, but I have not yet been advised that it has been consummated.

October 14. Visited Central City; found vigorous enthusiastic workers and great progress being made. The work here will certainly be taken care of by the resident

members. Here they have a St. Agnes Guild, an Altar Guild, and a Woman's Guild. They also have a well organized and conducted Sunday School.

October 22. Visited Schuyler; was promised that a Junior Auxiliary would be organized. November 8th, I was advised of its organization with twenty-three members, and on November 22nd, I paid them a visit and found a membership of twenty-eight. I gave a short talk on Mission work. December 22nd, I again visited this Branch and found a membership of thirty. Great interest is taken in the work here, with a promise of abundant good.

November 3. I visited Humphrey, where I was entertained by Mrs. Benham, a devout churchwoman, but I was unable to assemble the few church women, hence cannot now promise as to what may be accomplished.

November 4. Visited Fullerton. Had a Guild meeting at Mrs. Penney's on the 5th. I feel that there is a revival of interest here, although no organization has been effected, as on a subsequent visit, March 12th, I was advised that all arrears in church obligations had been paid.

I have not been able to arrange for a visit to Monroe, but I hope to do so in the near future.

February 4. Visited Silver Creek. Mrs. Bell and Mrs. Caulton gave a luncheon to the Guild; twelve present. All of these met at the church in the evening, where services were conducted by Rev. Wm. H. Moor. After services arranged to organize a Junior Auxiliary, and I have since been advised that the organization has been perfected.

I had arranged to visit Clarks at the time of visiting Silver Creek, but circumstances prevented, and I have not since been able to make this visit.

March 11. Visited Cedar Rapids, where I was most pleasantly entertained. I did not succeed in organizing a Branch, but I am very hopeful, as there are some very enthusiastic and devoted workers here.

May 6. Visited Albion; met the Guild, but it was thought doubtful whether a Branch could be organized, there being so few young people in the Parish.

NO. 3—SOUTHEASTERN.

The active Parishes in my district have met their obligations—Falls City, Auburn, Nebraska City and Plattsmouth—and a temporary President and Secretary were appointed by the Rector in charge, Mr. Barnes for Wyoming, but no results in the form of active work and organization have been accomplished as yet. Tecumseh is still not actively working but writing and talking with members of the church from there gives me hopes of an organization there this fall. Junior Auxiliary—no branches organized, but in Auburn and Nebraska City children, 6 to 10 years old, will have classes.

Mrs. Potter asked me to tell you of a plan for a Mission Sunday and also a corporate Communion Service on that day which I planned last fall in the first place for Nebraska City. In thinking and planning for my work as President of the Auxiliary in Nebraska City and reading in the "Spirit of Missions" what others were doing, I first thought of a corporate Communion and then in the fall several times from people whom I talked with came the same old cry: What good are Missions! You can surely find enough to do at home. When Mr. Barnes returned from the Triennial meeting, I asked him if we could have a "Mission Sunday" and a sermon telling of the different branches of our work and what the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was doing. He said he would gladly give us a Sunday—the time to be decided later. So many things interfered that all we accomplished before Christmas was a corporate Communion the Sunday before Christmas at the early celebration. Then very soon we had our Lenten work and Easter services, so it was decided on Easter Sunday by Mr. Barnes and myself to have our corporate Communion and "Mission Sunday" on May 3rd. In the meantime it occurred to me that perhaps Falls City and Plattsmouth would observe the same Sunday, also Auburn, Tecumseh, Wyoming. I wrote to Father Noble and the Secretary of the Auxiliary of Falls City, explaining my plan and he said he would be glad to help carry out the plan. Mr. Leete would have corporate Communion at Plattsmouth and speak of the Auxiliary work, but as he had just come to the Parish he could not at that time give a sermon. Mr. Barnes prepared a sermon which he gave us and the lay readers at Tecumseh and

Auburn had a duplicate of it to be read at their service, May 3rd, and Mr. Barnes also gave it at Wyoming. He spoke of the part women have always had in the church's work from the time of Christ to the present day—the wonderful growth of the "United Offering," which is a penny a week more and that the Auxiliary meeting at the Triennial every three years at the same place, almost overshadows the General Convention in its size and the work it accomplishes. Also the boxes which are prepared by the different Parishes and that they do their good work, in helping others, not only by the contents, which are welcome, but the spirit of the giver is felt by those receiving them. When Mr. Barnes finished we felt glad that we were women and could do our part in this good work. I think the early communion and the sermon were an inspiration to us in Nebraska City and the facts about our work a surprise to many people.

I hope the others in my District feel repaid for the extra effort and work and I appreciate more than I can tell, those who helped me carry out the plan.

NO. 4—SOUTHWESTERN.

In September of 1913, a very interesting meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Fourth District was held in Beatrice at Christ Church, Mrs. Potter and Miss Trimble of Omaha, being present, and Mrs. Conn of Beatrice presiding. As it was still exceedingly warm, the attendance was confined to Beatrice and Wymore women, with the ones mentioned, from Omaha.

The meeting was very helpful, an interesting exhibit of Junior work being shown by Miss Trimble.

After the business meeting, the visiting women were most pleasantly entertained at the Rectory by Mrs. Mulligan and others of the Christ Church Branch.

A second meeting of the Southwest District was held at Lincoln on Thursday, January 29, 1914. The meeting was opened by a celebration of the Holy Communion, at 10 o'clock, the Rev. S. Mills Hayes being the celebrant.

The business meeting followed at 10:45. Mrs. Potter being present, and Mrs. Fairchild of Lincoln, acting as Secretary. There were present from Ashland, 1;

Beatrice, 2; Wymore, 2; Omaha, 4; Lincoln, 15. Encouraging reports were given of Junior work at Ashland, Lincoln, Omaha and Wymore, beside accounts of the work done by the women's branches.

Noon-day prayers were held by Mr. Hayes, and after a short recess for luncheon, the remainder of the afternoon was taken up by an exceedingly helpful talks on Missionary Organization by Mr. Hayes, and the Study of China, by Mrs. Barkalow of Omaha, and earnest appeals by Mrs. Potter and others for more interest and help in the work. The session closed with a meeeting of the Juniors at 4 o'clock.

On the 23rd of April, a visit was made to Superior, where thirteen earnest women are working as a combined Parish Guild and Auxiliary, having been organized only since last October. After they have secured a proper place for the regular church services, they feel that they will be able to do much more for general missions.

A branch of the Juniors was organized at Wymore, in October, 1914, meeting weekly at the residence of the Treasurer, Mrs. Yoder. They promise to more than double their work next year. The Church Boys' Club, also organized at Wymore during the past year, contributed toward the China fund.

Secretary's Report



For the Year Ending May 19, 1914.

Reports have been received from Twenty-three Parishes in the Diocese having a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Total membership as given in reports, 525.

Nebraska City was the first Branch to send in its report from the State and St. Andrew's the first from Omaha.

The Auxiliary started the year's work with a meeting Sunday, June 22nd, to wish Godspeed to Miss Mills, a Missionary, on her way to Alaska. Addresses have been given during the year by the Rev. Frederick Tyner, Dr. Rollit, Mr. Parshall, Mrs. Hartford and Deaconess Goodwin.

October 30th, a Missionary Institute was held in Gardner Parish House, when Miss Grace Lindley was sent out by the Board of Missions to be the instructor.

The First district meeting was held at Beatrice.

The Second district meeting was held at Nebraska City.

The Third district meeting was held at Columbus.

The Fourth district meeting was held at Tekamah.

The Semi-Annual meeting was held at Blair, November 15th.

The Auxiliaries of Omaha, South Omaha, and Florence have held four meetings when the programs were furnished by the Study classes, which have completed the Study Work on the "Emergency in China." The offerings at these meetings amounting to \$64.84 were used for the expense fund of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, with the exception of that of the meeting in April, when half of the offering was given the Diocesan Library.

Many notices have been given the newspapers, one hundred and twenty cards sent out and fifty letters written.

Report of the Educational Secretary



The work of the Educational Department for the year 1913-1914, began October 3rd, when Miss Lindley, Associate Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, conducted an Institute in Omaha for two days.

In December, a Normal Class was formed hoping thereby to train and enlist leaders. From this Study class seven groups were formed in the city, including one in St. Martin's, South Omaha; The Emergency in China, by Dr. Pott, was the text books with the aid of two small pamphlets on "Suggestions to Leaders" and "On Study Meetings." The reference books, namely, "The Sketch of China," "History," "The Story of the Church in China," "The American Church Mission in China," "The Life of Bishop Ingle," and an accompanying map, all assisted greatly in the study and interest of the subject.

The President of the Auxiliary and one or two others made several visits in the Diocese during the year and report an advance in Mission Study in several localities, including Blair, Lincoln and Nebraska City.

In March, the Bishop appointed Mrs. S. D. Barkalow, as Educational Secretary. She feels so inadequate to the task and in accepting begs the assistance of every member of the Auxiliary, knowing well that she needs their prayers, their sympathy and hearty cooperation in this important department of Missionary Work.

During the past year meetings were held on the last Friday of each month, the program given by Study Class leaders and members in their respective Parishes and thereby given to the Woman's Auxiliary Society the benefit of the work accomplished along this line, which plan was suggested by the Board of Missions.

The General Educational Secretary, Rev. Arthur R. Gray and his associates, have recently written to us their plans of instruction for the coming year.

The General Missionary Study text book for 1914-1915 is to be "Social Results of Foreign Missions," by President Faunce of Brown University. For collateral reading we shall have Dean Churches' five lectures on "The Effect of Christianity Upon European Civilization;" Speer's "Light of the World." Another book en-

titled, "Gospel and Democracy." Fourth, a book by Rev. Arthur Gray, which is furnished with material given him by Bishops Brent, Graves, Tucker and others.

The Junior Classes will receive a book written by Miss Sarah Payson, which will emphasize the hold which Christianity has upon the home life in different ages and countries of the world.

We feel that the success in the work this year has given us reason to be encouraged and to push forward, hoping that ere long every Parish in our beloved Diocese will have a Mission Study Class and that every member will be imbued with faith, with courage and a desire to take part in the wonderful world movement—realizing that the great need can only be supplied by Christ's Gospel of love.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary, 1913-14



While the proportion of Parishes and Missions having organized branches of the Junior Auxiliary is still very small, there is decided encouragement to be found in the growth during the past year from *nine* to *fifteen* Branches. The total offerings, \$640, shows an increase over that of last year of \$125.

Two boxes were sent out Christmas, one to the Indian Schools at Onigum, Minn., in charge of Miss Pauline Colby, and the other to the Rev. George Ware at Alliance, District of Western Nebraska. These boxes with gifts from individual branches to Clarkson Hospital, to the Indians in Oklahoma, and to Grace Hospital, North Carolina, were valued at \$155.

The gifts of money amounting to \$495 were devoted to the following objects: The Adelaide Williams' Scholarship, at St. Mary's School, Cape Palmas, Africa. The Brownell Hall Scholarship at St. Mary's School, Shanghai; General Missions, including both Foreign and Domestic; Diocesan Missions and the Bishop Williams' Special, and some small amounts for local charities. The Special Offering at the annual meeting, and other special gifts were devoted to the Diocesan Offering for Land and Building for St. Mary's School, Shanghai.

The leaders and some members of Section III of the City Branches have been entertained each month by Miss Trimble, the Assistant Directress. These meetings have been devoted to reports of activities in the different branches and to the discussion of methods of work and study.

An encouraging increase is also to be noted in the number of branches that have pursued some study during the year. This has been generally in connection with the Junior story, "Forward March in China," which has been used in a variety of ways; but some have chosen other books. Section III of one branch having had a course of reading in Church History.

In response to an invitation from Miss Johnson and the Brownell Hall Branch, the Junior Auxiliary with its leaders and the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary, assembled on May 9th for its all-day annual meeting. At 10 o'clock a large number of Juniors gathered in St. Matthias' church for the corporate communion celebrated

by the Bishop, assisted by the Vicar of the Church. This was followed by a business meeting consisting of a review of the work of the past year by local and Diocesan officers. In the afternoon, the children listened to several addresses, after having made their pledges, for gifts next year. The meeting closed with an impersonation of a Chinese girl from St. Mary's, Shanghai, most effectively presented by a member of the Brownell Hall Branch.

The one regret of a most happy and inspiring day was caused by the absence of Miss Edith Earle, our friend and most efficient and faithful Secretary.

In closing I should like to urge all Junior leaders and all branches of the Woman's Auxiliary that have no Junior organization to procure a copy of the new Junior Book, in which are to be found complete directions for organization under the regulations adopted at the last Triennial, and also many helpful suggestions for carrying on the work.

Constitution of the Nebraska Branch



ARTICLE I.

NAME.

This Society shall be called the NEBRASKA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

The objects of this Society are 1st., To diffuse Missionary activity among the women of this Diocese; 3rd, to unite previously existing Societies in a common interest; 4th, to encourage the formation of new branches for Missionary work.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

All baptized women of the Church in the Diocese of Nebraska shall be considered members of this Society.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

The Officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-President, at large, four District Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Directress of the Junior Auxiliary, an Assistant Directress of the Junior Auxiliary, a Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, a Treasurer of the United Offering, Custodian of the Diocesan Box, an Educational Secretary and a Diocesan Librarian.

These officers, with the exception of the four District Vice-Presidents, who shall be appointed by the Bishop and the President, shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and a majority of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

Vacancies in office shall be filled by persons appointed by the Bishop, said appointees to serve until the next Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE V.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President, and in her absence, the Vice-President at Large, shall preside at all meetings of the Society,

call special meetings of the Society and countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

It shall be the duty of the District Vice-Presidents to visit and organize auxiliaries and to superintend the work in their respective districts.

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings and conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the Secretaries of the Associated Branches, and with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York. She shall keep a record of all meetings, prepare and keep a list of the names of all Associated Branches with their officers, and shall report the same once a year to the Bishop of the Diocese and the General Secretary in New York.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed to the work of the Association, to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President, and present an annual report of the same. It shall be the duty of all other officers to perform such duties as shall pertain to their respective offices.

ARTICLE VI.

MEETINGS.

The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the Diocesan Council.

A semi-annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as the President shall direct. All members may participate in the deliberations of these meetings, but only three delegates or their proxies of each Associated Branch shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE VII.

FEES.

Any Parish Society becomes a branch of Diocesan Auxiliary by paying annually one dollar, which with the offertories at the general meetings shall constitute a contingent fund for defraying the necessary expenses of the Diocesan Branch.
