Board of Missions

MAY 18, 1915



The twenty-ninth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in the Church of the Holy Trinity, Lincoln, Tuesday, May 18, 1915, beginning with the celebration of the Holy Communion, at 10:30 o'clock, Bishop Arthur L. Williams being the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. S. Mills Hayes and the Rev. James Wise. The offering at this service was \$18.55. One hundred and fifty women were present and one hundred and twenty-six received the Holy Communion.

The business meeting was called to order by the Diocesan President, Mrs. Philip Potter. After singing a mission hymn and prayer, led by the Bishop, the Rev. S. Mills Hayes gave a very cordial welcome on behalf of Holy Trinity Branch.

Bishop Williams took the chair, while Mrs. Philip Potter read her address.

Noon day prayer was said by Bishop Williams.

Roll call showed the following Parish Branches represented:

Ashland, St. Stephen's, five; Beatrice, Christ Church, eleven; Blair, St. Mary's, one; Central City, Christ Church, three; Columbus, Grace Church, three; Fairbury, Emmanuel, five; Falls City, St. Thomas, two; Fremont, St. James, three; Lincoln, Holy Trinity, twenty-seven; Lincoln, St. Luke's, four; Nebraska City, St. Mary's, four; Omaha, St. Philip the Deacon, three; Omaha, Church of the Good Shepherd, seven; Omaha,

St. Andrews, six; Omaha, St. Paul's, one; Omaha, Trinity Cathedral, ten; Omaha, St. Barnabas, six; Omaha, All Saints, seven; Plattsmouth, St. Luke's, five; South Omaha, St. Martin's, three; Schuyler, Holy Trinity, five; Wymore, St. Luke's, three; Wyoming, Christ Church, one; York, Trinity, six; DeWitt, St. Augustine, two; Decatur, Incarnation, one.

Reports of the District Vice Presidents were then presented by Mrs. Albert Noe of the Northeast District; Mrs. Alfred Blondell of the Southeast District; Mrs. S. E. Yoder of the Southwest District, and Mrs. George Thomas of the Northwest District. Mrs. T. H. Tracy, the Diocesan Secretary, then read her annual report, all of which reports on motion were approved.

The meeting adjourned until two o'clock for lunch, which was served at the Lindell Hotel by the Holy Trinity Branch, and it was a most delightful affair.

The afternoon session was opened by singing hymn 239, and the report of the Educational Secretary was read by Mrs. J. P. Trimble, Mrs. S. D. Barkalow being unable to be present.

The report of the Treasurer was read by Mrs. J. D. Fairchild. It was moved by Mrs. Charles Frankish, duly seconded and carried, that the report be accepted.

The report of the Librarian was read by Mrs. J. P. Trimble. Approved.

The report of the Custodian of the Diocesan Box was read by Mrs. Albert Noe, who has had charge of the box; also the General Box work, Mrs. John Williams being unable, on account of illness, to have charge of the work during the past year. On motion the report was approved.

The report of the United Offering was read by Miss Jessie Royce. Approved.

The report of the Juniors was read by Miss George Trimble.

The report of the Assistant Directress of the Junior and the Secretary and Treasurer was read by Miss Eleanor Sprague.

These reports were, on motion, duly approved.

Miss Leonore Williams read a report from the Bishop's Guild.

It was moved, duly seconded and carried, that the following Article be inserted in the Constitution:

"All church societies composed of women or children in this Diocese, if they desire, will be considered branches of this Auxiliary. They will be expected to send annually a report, of money given and work done for Missions, to the Secretary."

Moved by Miss George Trimble, duly seconded and carried, that the word "Society," in Article 7 of the Constitution, be changed to "Auxiliary."

Miss Trimble also suggested that Article IV of the Constitution be changed to read "a Secretary-Treasurer of the Junior."

Bishop Williams then delivered his annual address, speaking briefly of the Bishop Williams Special, and asking that the same pledge of \$300 be given again the coming year.

The pledges for the coming year were then taken by the Treasurer, and special pledges were taken for the Bishop Williams Special.

The offering, amounting to \$16.73, was taken.

Mrs. Philip Potter, Mrs. Albert Noe, Mrs. Robert Doherty, Mrs. S. Mills Hayes and Mrs. J. P. Trimble were elected delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the province of the Northwest, with Mrs. A. E. Marsh of Blair, Mrs. Alfred F. Blondell of Nebraska City, Mrs. Byron Reed of Omaha, Mrs. John Wallis Ohls of South Omaha and Mrs. G. P. Schidler of York as alternates.

Mrs. John Albert Williams read a most interesting paper on the Missions in Africa.

Mrs. A. E. Marsh read a paper on the "Missions in Alaska," and Mrs. S. E. Yoder a paper on "Miss Haywood of Japan."

Bishop Williams adjourned the meeting, to meet again at 8 o'clock.

The evening session was opened with singing hymn 261 and a short service by the Bishop.

Miss Williams read a paper on the "History of the United Offering," followed by a stereopticon lecture by Rev. C. C. Rollit and Rev. G. S. Tyner.

Rev. James Wise gave an address.

Hymn 143 was sung and the Rev. C. C. Rollit gave a short talk.

The minutes were then read and approved, and Mrs. Potter thanked the Holy Trinity Branch for the pleasant day spent as their guests.

Offering, \$8.87.

Bishop Williams adjourned the meeting.

President's Address



Right Rev. Sir and Women of the Auxiliary:

We have just closed a most successful year as you will notice by our reports.

The District Meetings will be reported by the District Vice Presidents, all other meetings by the Secretary, and each officer will give a report of work done in her own department, so I shall dwell more particularly upon "ways and means" which, if used, will surely increase our membership and our gifts.

In God's great plan, the world is evidently intended to be one household. Our mission is to make it such, *our* household, God's household, in which all shall be brothers and sisters. What is the personal contribution each of us is making toward the consummation of God's plan?

Our Lord was the first Missionary and at the *close* of his work, after the selection of the twelve Apostles, he gave them the great commission, "Go ye into all the world," etc. The Church recognizes this command and has evolved a system, or plan of work. Individuals have not evolved it, 'tis the authority of the Church to which we bow when we send to Missions—Diocesan, Domestic or Foreign—so we are not here to discuss *whether* we shall give to Missions or not, but we *are* gathered here in conference to see if there is any way that *we* can take, to make us more efficient in carrying out our Lord's commands.

First, I do not know of any more splendid inspiration for Mission interest than one gets from Mission study. From it we get the first requirement for efficiency, viz.: conviction that the *cause* is great. From a thorough knowledge of the subject comes clearness of thought and ability to express ideas, and this gives us the power to interest our friends in the work. If we are interested we will help. "One can give without loving, but one cannot love without giving."

For *study* this year we advise you to take for your

subject, "Current Topics in the Mission Fields" and try to get acquainted with the women workers, by name, in the different fields. Get teachers, if you can, for leaders—either day school or Sunday school teachers. Have small classes. Limit your time for lessons. Don't stray away from your subject. Give each member something to do. Encourage members of the class to express themselves. Show curios or costumes. Use maps freely. Make scrap books, not just one scrap book, but one for each Missionary District. Have plays. Have stereopticon lectures. These last your rector will always help with, if asked.

In working with the *Juniors*, remember they will soon be Seniors. They really belong in "Section B" of the Woman's Auxiliary as soon as they are through school. Train them in parliamentary practice; teach them to be regular and prompt at meetings; to introduce all newcomers and be friendly with them. Talk about the work and encourage them to talk about it, so that idle gossip will be eliminated, and make them realize that, year by year, *we* are going to depend more and more upon *them*.

As to pledges and gifts, first watch your Diocesan Assessment and your General Apportionment. Don't pay them if the men and general congregation will pay them, but be interested and see that they are paid.

Then think of the slogan for "The Forward Movement," "The World for Christ in this Generation" and ask yourselves, "How much more can we give?" How much more can we deny ourselves to aid in the spreading of the Gospel?" The Gospel which means "Peace on earth, good will to men;" the Gospel which our Lord demonstrated by his humility and self-sacrifice and protection of the weak.

When you go home, can't you have a garden party or a picnic, or some sort of a general meeting of all the ladies of your parish, and make your aim for the meeting to get more members and larger subscriptions, and don't forget to have your Juniors do the same thing, for remember that Seniors and Juniors are "One army with two Departments."

We are passing through a strenuous time in the

world's history, and a time when our blessed work is needed as never before.

Not only are our sympathy and gifts needed in Europe during this terrible war, but never before have we had such opportunities in the Foreign Mission Field. Let us practice self-denial as we never have in the past. Let us not take away from our contributions to Missions to send to Europe, but let us, if need be, go without luxuries to an *extreme* degree, that we may share our blessings with *both* the sufferers in Europe and our representatives in the Mission Fields.

Let us enter upon the work of the new year gladly, with enthusiasm and earnestness, and let us make it one whose success has never been approached.

Reports of District Vice-Presidents



NO. 1—NORTHEASTERN

In this district, composed largely of local branches meeting monthly, the need of visiting by Diocesan officers does not seem very great. However, I have visited a number of branches in Omaha, and in company with Mrs. John Williams and the Rev. Arthur Marsh I visited Tekamah and Decatur last October. We were cordially received and hospitably entertained. The branch in Tekamah is small, though all seemed much interested. There was not an organized branch in Decatur, though a good field for one, which has since been organized. We held a missionary meeting in the morning in Decatur. Mrs. Williams and I explained the work of the Auxiliary. Mr. Marsh told very clearly the work of the Board of Missions. In the afternoon we met with the Auxiliary in Tekamah. Mrs. Williams explained the box work we were undertaking this year, and we all talked informally about the missionary work of the Church. In Decatur Mrs. Williams and I were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. James Hastings, who lavished kindness upon us. In Tekamah we were the guests of Mrs. A. B. Thomas, whose hospitality is never failing.

In April Miss Trimble and I visited the Auxiliary in Fremont. We had a very nice meeting at the rectory. Miss Trimble spoke in behalf of the Juniors, and aroused much interest. The members of St. James' Auxiliary are very earnest and faithful. We only wished more of the church women of St. James were interested in missions. All of the branches of this district have many members interested in studying about missionary work and workers. In several churches the young women and young married women are organizing as Section "B" of the Woman's Auxiliary.

This seems to be the most important movement in the history of the Auxiliary.

NO. 2—NORTHWESTERN

I have the honor to submit the following report of district work done during the past year.

June 1, 1914, I made a short visit to Albion, where I met three church women and received some encouragement with reference to Junior work. On the same day I continued my journey to Elgin, where I remained until the following day, being entertained most pleasantly at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Coupland, both of whom are earnest church workers.

June 3 and 4 I visited Neligh, where I enjoyed the splendid hospitality of Mrs. Anderson. A meeting of the Guild was held at her home. Here fine work is being done by all Guilds.

June 4 and 5 I visited Norfolk, where Rev. and Mrs. Blunt gave me a most cordial welcome. A meeting of the Guild was held at the home of one of the church women. Here is a vigorous, earnest organization; also a St. Agnes Guild in two sections.

August 28 I attended a Board Meeting at the home of our President, Mrs. Potter, where a delightful luncheon was followed by a business meeting.

February 4 met the ladies of the Auxiliary at Schuyler. They were then hoping to renew the work of the Juniors, and soon thereafter I received word from Mrs. Moore that the good work had begun and was progressing nicely.

I had intended and arranged to visit Silver Creek, Clarks and Central City in early March, but the severe storms of that period prevented. I might add that I was unable to get to Niobrara by reason of floods. I have tried to arrange for visits to Monroe, but have been unable to do so.

April 12 I visited Fullerton, where I found good work being done by the Juniors. The Columbus Junior Guild has held no meetings during the year, but has earned some money for missions, and we intend to have regular meetings this summer.

I regret to say that my work has been much hindered by sickness in my family.

NO. 3—SOUTHEASTERN.

I am glad to report good work done in the South-eastern District and all branches active except Tecumseh.

In July, 1914, I went out to Christ Church, Wyoming, and after the sermon gave a talk on Auxiliary work. The ladies asked me to come out July 16 and organize a branch, which started with nine members and now numbers fourteen. They meet, beginning as soon after Easter as possible, every two weeks until cold weather sets in, and I am glad to report this enthusiastic branch, the only country branch in the Diocese, and its good work.

Plattsmouth branch invited the Southeastern District to meet with them last fall, and October 2 a splendid meeting was held there.

Our President, Mrs. Potter, and her mother, Mrs. Clark, were with us, Mrs. Noe, Miss Trimble, Mrs. Sloane and Mrs. Watkins, former Diocesan officers, two delegates from Falls City, eleven each from Nebraska City and Wyoming and other Auxiliary members from South Omaha, Omaha and Plattsmouth.

The President of the Plattsmouth branch gave us a cordial welcome and each branch represented told of their plans for the coming year's work. Fifty-seven people were entertained at luncheon and many others attended the meeting at the church. Mrs. Potter, Mrs. Noe, Miss Trimble, Madam Leet, Miss Gering and Mr. Barnes all gave splendid talks. Collection, \$12.36.

I have visited both Auburn and Falls City and found both branches wide awake and interested in their work. Nebraska City has done good work and our best work was for the Theological Students' Special and will be while we have a student from Nebraska City, but last year it was for others, whom the Bishop told us we might help. We had good talks during Lent every Friday by our Rector on Mission Work in Mexico, Alaska, the mission work in cities, China and Japan.

At our regular meeting March 12 we enjoyed a visit and talk given by Mrs. Potter. We have a Mission Study Class of eight—leader, Mr. Barnes, but have not completed the Social Aspects of Foreign Missions which we are studying.

Plattsmouth has done especially good box work and also sent a sewing machine to a much needed southern place. Auburn, too, has been strong in their box work and Falls City meets its pledges promptly, has a meeting once a month, but I do not know just what their box work is, only they are a busy branch.

Plattsmouth and Falls City both expected to have a Mission Sunday and talks by the Rector, also corporate communion in May. Our plans were changed in Nebraska City, so we had our corporate communion at the early celebration—May 9—and our sermon May 2, as Mr. Barnes thought he might be away on the 16th of May.

Our Constitution and By-laws, we found, had been lost, so April 30 we called a meeting to make new ones, our Rector meeting with us, and one special feature was that one Sunday in May before the annual meeting there should be a sermon to the Auxiliary members and corporate communion.

On May 9 we had a dedication, thirteen windows, given as memorials. One was given in memory of Bishop Talbot, the first Bishop designated "Bishop of the North-West," who made his home in Nebraska City during the five years of his residence in the district.

To me, coming as a stranger a few years ago to St. Mary's Parish, I always wondered that so little was apparently thought of his work in those pioneer days in this Diocese, and yet I knew that the future would bring its own reward. We of St. Mary's Parish are proud to have that beautiful east window of special design, with the pioneer and the Indian, the river and the inscription, "Come over and help us," to remind us of that splendid man and what was done by our Church workers in the past generation.

Plattsmouth and Nebraska City have Junior branches organized and ready to do good work next year. Plattsmouth has seven members; Nebraska City, ten.

NO. 4—SOUTHWESTERN

There are nine organized branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Southwestern District, with five Missions not yet organized. Of the nine active branches, three have not as yet done any special work.

I have made visits as follows:

In October, 1914, at Crete, but found it impossible to have a meeting as owing to the fact of there being no regular services. As I am informed that services are to be resumed there, I am in hopes that an organization of the Church women may be effected during the coming year.

Beatrice was visited during Lent, as was DeWitt. At the latter place there is such an active Parish Guild that it seems there is the very best material for an Auxiliary, but the Church women thought it unwise to take up further work at present.

April 8 I went to York. Owing to a mistake and disagreeable, rainy weather, I did not meet the entire Branch, but saw a number of Church women whom the President, Mrs. Behling, called together, and I think the work promises well for next year.

April 9 I visited Geneva. It was impossible to have a meeting on account of rain and an epidemic of measles and pneumonia in the town, but as nearly as was possible, I visited the members at their homes, and trust they may be able to take up the work in earnest during the coming year.

April 12 I went to Superior, where we had a very pleasant meeting. The membership has increased there, and they have had a very successful year, both as an Auxiliary and as a Parish Guild. As the latter, they are accumulating a building fund, and have over \$70.00 banked to its credit.

All the Branches active have their pledges paid in full.

April 15 a meeting was held at Christ Church, Beatrice, attended by the Beatrice Branch and delegates from Wymore. The Rev. Mr. Mulligan of Beatrice conducted the services, and the Rev. George Tyner of York delivered an address. At the close of the meeting the ladies of Christ Church entertained the visitors most pleasantly at the Rectory.

There were personal cards and letters sent to all the different parishes and missions in the district, and United Offering boxes to a number of places, where they have not before been used.

Secretary's Report

For the Year Ending May 18, 1915.



The Auxiliary started the new year's work very pleasantly with a meeting of the Executive Committee at the home of our President, Mrs. Philip Potter, when the work for the coming year and the United Offering were discussed, and it was thought best to make the usual annual offering in May. October 26, 27 and 28 an Institute was held in Jacobs Memorial Hall for the Mission Study Classes, and was conducted by Miss Tillotson, Secretary from the Church Mission House, New York City. "Social Aspects of Foreign Missions" was the text book used by Miss Tillotson.

January 2 Mrs. Ely Spoke in the interest of St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China, and was entertained by the Auxiliary at a luncheon at the Loyal Hotel.

The semi-annual meeting was held in Omaha December 4, when the Rev. George St. George Tyner gave the address.

The Northwest District Meeting was held in Trinity Cathedral April 27, Mrs. Albert Noe presiding, and Bishop Lloyd, President of the Board of Missions, being the celebrant at the Holy Communion service, assisted by The Very Rev. J. A. Tancock.

The District Meeting of the Southwest was held April 15 in Christ Church, Beatrice, Mrs. Yoder presiding, and Rev. Chas. R. Tyner gave the address, followed by a reception at the Rectory.

The District Meeting of the Northwest was omitted Mrs. Thomas thinking it best to visit each Branch herself.

The District Meeting of the Southeast was held at Plattsmouth, October 22, Mrs. Blondell presiding, Mrs. Philip Potter and Miss George Trimble, Mrs. Albert Noe, Madam Leet, Miss Gering and Rev. W. W. Barnes all gave talks. The members were entertained at a luncheon.

The first of the monthly meetings of the Omaha, South Omaha and Florence Branches was held at the Church of the Good Shepherd. Mrs. Albert Noe had

charge of the program and Rev. John Williams, Miss Hilliard and the Rev. T. J. Collar were speakers, followed by a tea in the Parish House.

The second meeting was in Jacobs Memorial Hall, October 30. Mrs. S. D. Barkalow had charge of the program and reports were given from the delegates to the Sixth Province Meeting by Mrs. Philip Potter and Miss Katharine Hilliard.

The third meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church, January 29, with Mrs. Oscar Williams in charge of the program. The Rev. F. D. The fourth meeting was held in All Saints Church, February 26, with Mrs. Oscar Williams in charge of the program, and papers were given on the third and fourth chapters by Mrs. Albert Noe, Mrs. Clinton Miller and Mrs. J. B. Reynolds.

The fifth meeting was held in St. Martin's Church, South Omaha, March 26, and papers on the fifth and sixth chapters were given by Mrs. J. B. Watkins, Mrs. R. V. Falkner and Mrs. W. B. Adkins.

The sixth meeting was held in connection with District Meeting of the Northeast, April 27, in Jacob's Memorial Hall, with the Cathedral Branch in charge. The stereopticon lecture which they had prepared was postponed on account of the lantern, but was given after the Annual Meeting of the Juniors in All Saints Church, and work for the coming year was discussed.

Current Topics was the subject decided upon for the next year's study.

Reports have been received from twenty-nine parishes having branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. The first complete report returned was from St. James Church, Fremont. Total membership as given in reports, 623. All notices have been given the newspapers. One hundred and twenty cards sent out and fifty letters written.

Report of the Educational Secretary



When in New York September last, it was my good fortune to spend a delightful hour at the Church Missions House, meeting our good friends and co-workers, busy in their various departments, but apparently so ready to give of their time to a visitor of a western diocese. When I learned that Miss Tillotson, Associate Secretary, was coming to Minnesota and Iowa to conduct institutes in October, I asked if it were possible for her to come to Omaha while west. After consulting the calendar Miss Tillotson found that she could be with us on October 26 and 27, and until noon on the 28th. I at once communicated by wire with our President, Mrs. Potter, and in a few hours learned that arrangements could be made, as she would be most welcome. The institute opened on Monday, the 26th. There were morning and afternoon sessions Monday and Tuesday and one on Wednesday, closing at noon. Juniors served the luncheon to the members.

Miss Tillotson used for the text book, "Social Aspects of Foreign Missions," by Professor Faunce of Brown University. Two small pamphlets, "Suggestions to Leaders," and one on "Study Meetings" aided in preparation for the year's work. The coming of Miss Tillotson was most timely, and we felt more ready to take up the study after her valuable instruction and suggestions were given us. On Monday an informal reception was given Miss Tillotson at the Deanery by Mrs. Tancock.

In November a normal class, conducted by Mrs. Oscar Williams, was formed from members of the various parish branches. Seventeen classes have been interested in the Mission Study work. This report includes work in the Junior Department. We have heard with interest of the Bible Study classes conducted in some parishes, either under the instruction of the Rector or a member of the Auxiliary, and also of one or two reading circles using the text books sent out by the Board. We learned, too, that a large number of books have been sold to individuals who greatly desired to be in touch with

the work, though not belonging to a class. There have been five monthly meetings held on the last Friday of each month (save in December), given by class leaders in their respective parishes.

The plan of study work for the monthly meetings during the coming year appeals to a great many of our Auxiliary women. It is to be "Current Topics in the Mission Fields." We feel that the "Spirit of Missions" will help us greatly in learning of the great work that is going on in places that are near and those far away, each and everyone needing our help, our interest, and our united prayers. Most sincerely do I believe that we may feel encouraged in this most important branch of our missionary work, and with renewed courage and faith let us press forward, ever ready to listen to the call from the field, and always willing to do our share in the furtherance of Christ's Kingdom in the world.

For the Year 1914-15.

Though in one or two cases the work has not progressed as we hoped, we feel that on the whole it has been a successful year.

Nearly all the branches in the Diocese have been visited and everywhere we found an enthusiastic work going on.

One of the most gratifying things about our work this year is the increased interest shown by the Woman's Auxiliary in the Juniors, and our greatest need, we think, is leaders, competent and willing, to organize new branches and revive "drooping" ones.

We feel quite safe in saying that our Christmas boxes this year are the best we have ever sent off—one went to Rev. C. H. Male at Oxford, N. C., and one to Rev. Luke Walker at Lower Brule Agency, S. Constitution



ARTICLE I.

NAME.

This Society shall be called the NEBRASKA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS OF THE SOCIETY.

The objects of this Society are: 1st, To diffuse Missionary activity among the women of this Diocese; 2nd to unite previously existing Societies in a common interest; 3rd, to encourage the formation of new branches for Missionary work.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

All baptized women of the Church in the Diocese of Nebraska shall be considered members of this Society.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

The Officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-President at large, four District Vice Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Directress of the Junior Auxiliary, an Assistant Directress of the Junior Auxiliary, a Secretary-Treasurer of the Junior Auxiliary, a Treasurer of the United Offering, a Custodian of Boxes, an Educational Secretary and a Diocesan Librarian.

These officers, with the exception of the four District Vice Presidents, who shall be appointed by the Bishop and the President, shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and a majority of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

Vacancies in office shall be filled by persons appointed by the Bishop, said appointees to serve until the next Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE V.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President, and in her absence, the Vice President at Large, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, call special meetings of the Society and countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

It shall be the duty of the District Vice Presidents to visit and organize auxiliaries and to superintend the work of their respective districts.

The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings and conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the Secretaries of the Associated Branches, and with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York. She shall keep a record of all meetings, prepare and keep a list of the names of all Associated Branches with their officers, and shall report the same once a year to the Bishop of the Diocese and the General Secretary in New York.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed to the work of the Association, to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President, and present an annual report of the same. It shall be the duty of all other officers to perform such duties as shall pertain to their respective offices.

ARTICLE VI.

MEETINGS.

The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the Diocesan Council.

A semi-annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as the President shall direct. All members may participate in the deliberations of these meetings, but only three delegates or their proxies of each Associated Branch shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE VII.

FEES.

Any Parish Auxiliary becomes a branch of the Diocesan Auxiliary by paying annually one dollar, which with the offerings at the general meetings shall consti-

tute a contingent fund for defraying the necessary expenses of the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE VIII.

All Church societies, composed of women or children in this Diocese, if they so desire, will be considered branches of this Auxiliary. They will be expected to send annually a report of money given and work done for Missions, to the Diocesan Secretary.
