May 20, 1919

After the beautiful and impressive Communion service in the Cathedral at 9 A. M., with Dean Tancock as celebrant, the Auxiliary repaired to the Cathedral Parish House auditorium, where the meeting was organized, Mrs. T. H. Tracy, the President, in the chair.

Rev. Dr. Mackay, of All Saints Church, offered the prayers and made a short address.

Mrs. Tancock, wife of the Dean, welcomed the visitors in a few well chosen remarks.

Roll call showed about 200 present. The following branches sent delegates: Ashland, St. Stephens, 1; Beatrice, Christ Church, 2; Blair, St. Mary's 4; Central City, Christ Church, 4; Columbus, Grace Church, 4; Falls City, St. Thomas, 2; Fremont, St. James, 3; Lincoln, Holy Trinity, 6; Lincoln, St. Lukes', 2; Nebraska City, St. Mary's, 3; Norfolk, Trinity, 3; Neligh, St. Peter's, 1; Omaha—All Saints, 14; St. Andrew's, 14; St. Barnabas, 12; Good Shepherd, 10; St. Paul's, 11; St. Philips, 4; St. Matthias, 1; St. Martin's, 5; Trinity Cathedral, 18; Plattsmouth, St. Luke's, 16; Schuyler, Holy Trinity, 3; Silver Creek, St. Stephen's, 1; Winnebago, All Saint's, 3; Wymore, St. Luke's, 1; Wyoming, Christ Church, 3; York, Holy Trinity, 1.

The names of those who had died during the year were reported and a few moments of silent prayer were observed.

The following officers read their reports: Mrs. Alfred Blundell, Vice-President-at-Large; Mrs. W.

H. Young, First District Vice-President; Mrs. J. B. Maylard, Second District Vice-President; Mrs. T. H. Tracy reported for the Third District, in the absence of Mrs. Bousfield, the Vice-President; Mrs. Potter reported for Fourth District as acting Vice-President in the absence of Mrs. G. M. Coupland.

Mrs. Young gave a message of love from Mrs. A. L. Williams, wife of our late Bishop, to the Auxiliary. Mrs. Tracy read a letter from Mrs. Williams acknowledging the gift of love from the Auxiliaries in the Diocese and expressing her great appreciation of the same.

Mrs. John Williams, of St. Barnabas, was asked to report on the fund pledged to the work in St. Raphael's school, at Monterey, Tennessee. A letter was read from Miss Bowen asking that a part of the United Offering at the Triennial be set aside toward the building fund for a hospital at St. Raphael's. It was moved by Mrs. Janecek, seconded by Mrs. John Williams, and carried that the delegates to the Triennial be instructed to ask that a sum be set aside for that purpose.

Reports of the officers were resumed as follows: Mrs. J. B. Jones, Secretary; Mrs. J. D. Fairchild, Treasurer; Mrs. Janecek asked an explanation of the reports and some discussion followed relative to the change of the financial year, making the reports from January to January.

Mrs. Jones, the Secretary, explained why there were conflicting impressions regarding the reports and Canon Marsh was called in and asked to explain the change. Mrs. Oscar Williams asked if it would not be better to change the date of the Council to conform to the change in date.

Father Marsh said he himself favored that plan, but that there were some objections to it.

Mrs. Yoder said that St. Luke's, Wymore, has made an effort the past three years to pay all their pledges before January 1st, then do their work later. It was then moved, seconded and carried that the Treasurer's report be accepted.

Miss Barbara Gering reported for the United Offering, and begged that the women should not let

the United Offering fall behind as it has the past year. Miss Gering was asked to explain what the United Offering was for, which she did, and said that the Board of Missions hoped to present \$500,000 at the next Triennial.

Mrs. Oscar Williams reported on the work of the Educational Secretary, and was very earnest in her plea for the study classes. It being twelve o'clock Mrs. Williams was interrupted for the noon-day prayers, which were offered by Father Leete, of Plattsouth, after which Mrs. Williams concluded her report. Mrs. Blundell spoke of the study class in Nebraska City and said they had enjoyed it very much.

Mrs. Wm. H. Jones, Secretary-Treasurer of Box Work, made her report, showing excellent results for the year's work. She spoke of her effort to raise a special fund for scholarships for Winnebago, as a memorial to Bishop Williams. The motion was made by Mrs. Jones, seconded by Mrs. Janecek that the Bishop Williams special be used hereafter as a fund for these scholarships. Remarks: Mrs. Marsh objected to the Bishop's Special being withdrawn from the work of the Bishop and suggested that a special fund be created for the scholarship fund. General discussion followed. Rev. Mr. Wilson, of Winnebago, made a short talk about the work of All Saints Mission, and told of their struggles to maintain the school at the present high cost of living. Mrs. Klein moved, seconded by Mrs. Fairchild, that the motion be laid over and brought up under new business. Carried. It was moved, seconded and carried that the report on Box Work be accepted.

The Diocesan Librarian, Mrs. M. E. Nicol, made her report, and made the suggestion that the librarian's office be merged with the work of the Educational Secretary. Moved by Mrs. Fairchild and seconded, that the Librarian's suggestion be adopted. Remarks: Mrs. Potter suggested that the Librarian's report be accepted and the merging of the two offices be laid over to come up under new business.

Miss Sprague, President of the Junior Auxiliary, made her report, which was accepted.

Mrs. S. D. Barkalow invited the Auxiliary to a reception at the old Deanery, given by the vestry of the Cathedral, for the visiting ladies, at 4:30.

Mrs. Doherty suggested that more time be given to the Annual Meetings, as one day seemed too short.

Mrs. J. E. Flockhart, Secretary-Treasurer of the Juniors, reported for her work.

Madame Leete reported for the Church Periodical Club and begged for a more generous response to this work.

Report of the nominating committee was made by Mrs. Sloane, the chairman. Mrs. Pattee, of Lincoln, asked if a nominating committee was provided for in the constitution and if nominations could be made from the floor.

Mrs. Tracy replied that the nominating committee was not provided for in the constitution, but had been appointed both last year and this, and that it did not prevent nominations from the floor.

Miss Hilliard, chairman of the Nation-wide Campaign committee for the Auxiliary, also on the Diocesan Board committee asked for the loving, loyal co-operation of every woman in the Diocese of Nebraska.

As lunch was announced the meeting was adjourned until two o'clock.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

The business of the Auxiliary was resumed at two o'clock, beginning with the creed and prayers by Rev. John Albert Williams.

The President, Mrs. Tracy, gave her annual address.

Mrs. Oscar Williams, Chairman of the Committee on Changes of the Constitution, read her report and each article was taken up and voted upon. The following amendments and additions were finally adopted:

## AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

---

### Article II—Objects of the Society.

*Section 1.*—To diffuse Missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.

*Section 2.*—To unite previously existing societies in a common interest and to encourage the formation of new branches for Missionary work.

*Section 3.*—To carry out the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary; daily prayers for Missions, study of Missions, and systematic giving for Missions.

### Article IV—Officers.

*Section 4.*—Vacancies in office shall be filled by persons recommended by the Executive Board and confirmed by the Bishop.

### Article V—Duties of Officers.

*Section 5.*—The Box Secretary-Treasurer shall receive and distribute all information relating to the Missionary Boxes, and all gifts of material and clothing for the same, and shall report annually to the Secretary all work done.

*Section 6.*—The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all Missionary Educational work of the Diocese carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

### Article VI—Meetings.

*Section 3.*—The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five Officers shall constitute a quorum.

### Article VII—Fees.

Each Parish Auxiliary becomes a branch of the Diocesan Auxiliary by paying annually a fee of three dollars, which with the offerings from the Annual and District Meetings, shall constitute a contingent fund for defraying necessary expenses of the Diocesan Branch.

### Articles VIII—Branches.

All church societies desiring to become Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary may do so upon payment of fee; and shall report annually to the Diocesan Secretary all gifts of work and money for Missions.

### Article IX—Amendments.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at any annual meeting, provided that notice of such alteration or amendment has been sent to each Branch, not less than thirty days before said meeting.

The election of officers being next in order resulted as follows:

President, Mrs. J. B. Jones; Vice-President-at-Large, Mrs. Alfred Blundell; Secretary, Mrs. Wm. H. Jones; Treasurer, Mrs. J. D. Fairchild; Secretary-Treasurer of Box Work, Mrs. Chas. W. Haller; United Offering Treasurer, Miss Barbara Gering; Educational Secretary, Mrs. T. H. Tracy; Librarian, Mrs. Charles Merle.

President of Juniors, Miss Alice Fry; Vice-President-at-Large, Miss Eleanor Sprague; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. M. E. Nicol.

Delegates to the Triennial were elected as follows: Mrs. J. B. Jones, Mrs. Oscar B. Williams, Miss Alice Fry, Mrs. J. D. Fairchild, Miss Barbara Gering. Alternates: Mrs. Wm. H. Jones, Mrs. James A. Tancock, Mrs. A. E. Marsh, Miss Dora Wiggenhorn, Mrs. Wilbur S. Leete.

Under unfinished business came the disposal of the Bishop Williams special. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Bishop's Special be left as it is for the work of the new Bishop, and that a new fund be created to be known as the Bishop Williams Memorial Scholarship.

Mrs. Oscar Williams moved, seconded by Miss Jean Morton, that pledges be made for the scholarships. Carried. Pledges were made from the floor for more than eleven scholarships.

Decided to continue the Diocesan Librarian as heretofore, and that she might work with the educational secretary.

Mrs. F. H. Cole spoke for the social service work of the church and especially recommended the scholarships.

Mrs. Tancock spoke of the work of Dr. Cassell, the colored priest, who is in charge of the work in Liberia. Mrs. John Albert Williams also spoke of the work and told of the struggle Dr. Cassell is making in the school and church to bring them to christianity. Special pledges were taken for the work.

The Secretary read the minutes of the meeting which were approved. She was instructed to send

a message of greeting from the Annual Meeting to Mrs. A. L. Williams, at Kent, Connecticut. After the benediction by Father Leete the meeting was adjourned.

From the Pilgrimage of Prayer came the Advent Call, from the Advent Call came the Call to Service and from the Call to Service comes the Nation Wide Campaign. And like a soldier taking stock after the smoke has cleared off the battlefield, I think, with all the sorrow the past year has brought us, by the loss of those who have been taken away, yet whose kindly spirits will always be with us, that after all it has been a most wonderful year and a wonderful time to be living. Society, to diffuse Missionary activity  
among the women of the Diocese, to unite  
previously existing Societies in a common  
interest and to encourage the promotion of  
new branches for Missionary work.

Fifth, that we become a praying body of God's  
Kingdom.

#### NO. 1—NORTHEASTERN

Although the year just past has been so full of  
sorrow, sickness and anxiety, I found in most all the  
branches of the Auxiliary in this district and others  
that the women have continued their ever untiring  
work with as great or greater zeal than in the past.

No new Auxiliaries have been formed in any of the  
Missions, in fact I found that Hartington had  
dropped its Auxiliary, and could not make a date  
to go and talk to the few members who comprise a  
Guild there, and who meet very irregularly as I was  
informed by the President, Mrs. W. F. Bryant.  
I wrote also to Tekamah asking for a date there, to  
meet the Auxiliary, and was informed it was a thing  
of the past and only three women were interested in  
church work, and only three comprised the congrega-  
tion.

Decatur has no Auxiliary, but a working Guild.  
Bancroft has neither Auxiliary nor Guild.

Winnebago reports show they are very active in  
Auxiliary work, both women and children under the  
untiring efforts of Father Wilson and Mrs. Nettie  
Fowler.

I did not visit the nine branches separately in  
Omaha, but attended a united meeting held in St.  
Philip's, March 28th. In their study classes and  
practical work I found them earnestly and devoutly  
working.

Coming to our own branch in Fremont, never has  
it been so prosperous and earnest in its work (since,

I have been here) as it has during the past year, under the guidance of our good and patient Rector, Rev. Geo. St. G. Tyner. The meetings have been held every Thursday afternoon, 1st, devotional; 2nd, educational; 3rd and 4th of the month practical.

The District meeting was held in St. James' church, October 10th, at 11 o'clock, opening with the communion service, Rev. Tyner, celebrant, after which a luncheon was served at the Y. M. C. A. by the St. James' Auxiliary. At 1:30 the meeting was called to order, Mrs. T. H. Tracy presiding. Roll Call, 21 present, 6 parishes represented. Reports were made by the different representatives, regarding work planned for the coming winter. Mrs. Tracy made a special plea for the Church Periodical Club. Mrs. Philip Potter presented special work for the diocese, taking for her subject the \$8,000 deficit which the Woman's Auxiliary of the country is facing. Pledges were made individually towards the amount and \$50.00 was raised. Mrs. Wm. H. Jones, Custodian of Boxes, talked of the work and needs in box work.

Miss Alice Fry presented the Junior Auxiliary, planning for the Boys' Auxiliary to work with the Juniors.

The United Offering was presented by Mrs. J. B. Jones, in absence of Miss Gering, United Offering Treasurer, and was conducted in form of conference. This concluded the business session.

Mr. Tyner offered prayer, Mrs. Oscar Williams talked of the Auxiliary aspect of our War Work, emphasizing the spiritual side. Miss Hillard then took up work of "Advent Call" and presented it in a very clear, concise manner outlining the working organization. Offering of \$3.50 was taken and meeting adjourned.

Mrs. Tyner has a Junior Auxiliary of nine faithful members. I attended two Advent Call meetings in Omaha, one a Quiet Day. Visited two District meetings, the third and fourth, held in Plattsmouth and Lincoln. Wrote eighteen letters.

#### NO. 4—SOUTHWESTERN

The Vice-President for this district having resigned soon after Christmas, I was appointed in March to take her place for the rest of the year. It has not been possible to make the personal visits to each Branch, which are so necessary to any progress, and only two of the ten branches have a Rector to advise with, or direct the work, but there is splendid material for auxiliary workers. The people in this part of Nebraska are financially well-to-do and a presentation of the needs of any mission, whether in our own or other Dioceses, brings forth a generous response. With the exception of one station the Parish Society and the Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary are one and the same organization and help to earn the money that supports the Parish or Mission as the case may be.

At the invitation of Rev. Dr. Hayes, of Holy Trinity, Lincoln, Miss Bowen visited his Parish Association and gave the story of her work among the southern mountaineers, and the Southwest District gave \$75.00 of the \$500.00 which was raised in this Diocese for her work at St. Raphaels. So far as I know, this is the only Missionary Speaker who has been invited to address a Parish Branch in the Southwest District this year.

We held a District meeting at Lincoln in Lent, where five of the ten branches were represented. The Diocesan President and Secretary, Vice-President and the Northwest District Vice-President attended and they helped to make the meeting interesting. Rev. Dr. Hayes gave a most helpful address and with the members of his Woman's Auxiliary, was thoroughly cordial and hospitable, and invited us to come to Holy Trinity at any time for meetings. The Rev. Mr. Wilson of the Winnebago Mission was the speaker of the day and his quiet, earnest presentation of the work among the Indians at Winnebago inspired his hearers, one and all, to try to do more in this mission that is so peculiarly our very own.

The women showed their interest by sending delegates from branches to represent them at this meeting.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT

For the year ending May 20, 1919.

On May 28th, 1918, Mrs. Tracy called the first meeting of the Executive Board in All Saints' Parish House for the express purpose of hearing the report of the committee on changing and revising the Constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary, as suggested by the Committee on Constitution from the 6th Province. Mrs. Philip Potter, as Chairman of this Committee, presented the revised copy with the changes and amendments, which was agreed upon by the Board.

A special meeting was called for September 22nd, to consider the work of the Advent Call with Miss Hilliard, who was Chairman of the Committee on that work, and plans were made for the work.

On September 28th a meeting was called to confer with Miss Barbara Gering, the newly elected United Offering Treasurer.

October 4th a special meeting was called to plan for the War Emergency Fund, Mrs. Potter, chairman. It was decided to set a goal of \$200.00 to be raised in this diocese toward that fund.

Resolutions of sympathy were offered for the family of Rev. A. E. Marsh, Canon of this Diocese, on the loss of their son, Rev. Arthur Marsh, who died on the battlefields of France in the service of his church and country, and the same were recorded in the Minutes.

The first monthly meeting was held in the Cathedral Parish House on November 8th, Rev. Harry Tancock opening with prayers. Rev. Chas. Tyner spoke of his work as Y. M. C. A. worker in France. Bishop Williams spoke very feelingly of the call to duty of all christian people. This was the last time our beloved Bishop spoke to us as an auxiliary body.

The Quiet Day was held in St. Andrew's Church on Friday, November 29th, the services were conducted by Father Leete, in place of Bishop Williams, who was ill in the hospital.

On January 29th we were shocked by the death of our dear Bishop.

On February 7th, the monthly meeting was held in Trinity Cathedral Parish House. A committee was appointed to take a message of sympathy and love to Mrs. A. L. Williams. Miss Elizabeth Bowen talked of the work at St. Raphael's school, Monterey, Tennessee.

February 20th, Mrs. Tracy called a meeting of the Executive Board and suggestions were made to amend and revise the Constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary in this diocese. Mrs. Oscar Williams was appointed chairman for this committee, two others to be selected later.

February 28th the monthly meeting was held in All Saints' Parish House, Dr. Mackay offered the prayers.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions of Condolence to Mrs. Williams was read and placed upon the Minutes.

March 28th, the monthly meeting was held in the Church of St. Philip the Deacon. Prayers were offered by the Rev. John Albert Williams, and the speaker was Mr. C. B. Hosmer, field secretary of Tuskegee Institute in Alabama, who spoke of the work for colored people in the south.

The last monthly meeting was a social one, held in the Cathedral Parish House on April 28th. Lunch was served and arrangements for the Annual Council were made, 68 were present.

There have been eight Executive Board meetings, six monthly meetings and four district meetings held during the year, eighteen meetings in all.

At the District Meeting in Fremont, October 3rd, seven Diocesan officers were present; at the one in Columbus there were three, at Plattsmouth, seven and at Lincoln, five.

The branch at DeWitt has been discontinued, St. Barnabas, Superior, report no work done this year, and St. Matthias, Omaha, is not active now. It is hoped that these branches are only temporarily inactive.

Notices of all meetings have been sent to the clergy in the city and to all daily papers, and some reports to the Crozier. The journal of the Annual

Report was printed and distributed in July. One hundred and twenty letters and cards pertaining to the work have been written and report blanks sent to all branches.

I would like to add for the benefit of the branch officers present, that no credit can be given in their reports to the Diocesan Secretary for any work done other than strictly missionary work.

The past two years work with Mrs. Tracy, our President, have been both pleasant and profitable to me, and now that the war is over let us bend all our energies toward building up the Auxiliary.

## REPORT OF THE CUSTODIAN OF BOXES

On looking over the year's work, I find some branches taking a keener interest in box work than heretofore. I wonder if it is not the persistent call for the missionary spirit toward our Indian School at Winnebago, (for I have been most persistent about Winnebago this year) that has awakened added warmth and energy in box work.

I think it was just this call, "within our gates" that was needed and more than all, it was the special appeal from our dear Bishop Williams to "assist him with his load at Winnebago," which he made to me in December, that aroused myself to greater endeavor to awaken more interest among the branches for our Indian School. This I did by the special offering envelope system. This offering, together with the Sunday School offering, was the means of keeping the school open at that time, when the funds available for it were at a very low ebb.

I know Bishop Williams was anxious to see the school at least partially supported by scholarships and what better system of support could one propose—for this will keep alive a keener interest in the Diocese for the school. Knowing this I have written all branches suggesting that, now the Bishop for whom we always pledged the Bishop "Williams" special for his use in the Diocese is no longer here to ask for it, we in future enlarge and change this pledge into a Bishop Williams Memorial Scholarship fund; this not to interfere with a new Bishop's special.

What more fitting and distinctive Woman's Auxiliary Memorial than this, that we make possible something definite for the school to depend on. We know the Bishop took a deep interest in his work at Winnebago.

I have received many favorable replies already, indicating that the suggestion has found favor.

I know of three scholarships to be promised today if this goes into effect and hope to hear of several more as I asked all branches to be prepared to give their decision and to make pledges at this meeting. I have written 133 letters and mailed 20 packages of special offering envelopes, besides distributing envelopes to the Omaha Churches. Have received 106 letters. My report will show an increase of about \$100.00 as compared with last year, but much more of it was cash than last year, having last year received \$131.00 in cash and this year \$405.00, a big increase. Have made several visits in the state.

Having declined renomination for office of Custodian of Boxes for the coming year, I deem it fitting to say that while it has required a great deal of time and real work yet it has been something I have loved to be able to do; making people happy cannot fail to bring its own reward and the boxes if properly prepared and distributed do make the recipients happy. So I ask you all to make your box records even better the coming year and I wish the new Custodian as much joy in her work as I have had.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The year 1918-19, fraught with the dangers and sufferings of a world at war, has been a difficult one, and a very slight advance seems apparent, as the result of our labors.

It has been hard to arouse a living interest in the need of education, but perhaps no one branch of the work has suffered more than another, and the touch of the whip of failures past must serve to spur us on to a future of greater effort and faithfulness.

The illness and loss of our good Bishop, and the absence of several clergymen from their accustomed places in the Diocese, removed from us a great source of strength and help, and left many churches partially disorganized and discouraged.

This condition was a serious drawback in the work of the Advent Call, which was the great war work we women of the Auxiliary were called upon to undertake this year.

The many difficulties which beset and hindered its preparation and fulfillment are fresh in our minds and must be considered in the presentation of all reports.

Literature was sent to the four district Vice-Presidents and letters written, but only one Vice-President reported to the Chairman. As your Educational Secretary was Chairman of the Advent Call the regular work of the office was delayed until after January first.

Only three Branches outside of Omaha reported any work done, and in these three real results were obtained.

In Plattsmouth and Central City personal visits were made by especially prepared messengers, and 150 pledge cards signed and returned. A quickening of the spirit of fellowship and service is apparent from these visits.

In Fremont no calls were made, but a daily service of intercession with address by the Rector was held, and well attended.

In Omaha all the branches joined in "a quiet day" for instruction and inspiration of messengers and intercessors, given at St. Andrews church by the Rev. W. S. Leete, of Plattsmouth, to whom the thanks of the Women of the Auxiliary are due.

Each Rector in his own parish, at the service of the Holy Communion on Advent Sunday, commissioned his messengers,

sending them out in the name of the Church to carry the message to every woman in the parish.

These calls, made in the first week in Advent, were as follows:

Results—Not to be judged by this pitifully small per cent. of the women in our beloved Church in Nebraska, but that this number, small though it be, may be the leaven to leaven the whole lump.

Three district meetings were attended by the Educational Secretary, when the Advent Call and outline of the year's study were presented. If these meetings could be more frequent and more generally attended, the renewed interest resulting would increase the personal service and zeal of the members, and fill us with desire to carry the work into broader fields.

A Sunday School Institute was held at All Saints' church on May 8th, when the Bishop Co-Adjutor of Iowa, Harry S. Longley, made a stirring address on the need of the layman in the life and work of the Church. A supper was served by the Woman's Auxiliary of All Saints, followed by conferences for teachers and lay workers, which were informal and helpful to all who participated. This Institute was under the auspices of the Diocesan Board of Religious Education of which the Educational Secretary is a member.

This Board is preparing a stereopticon lecture on the work of the church in the diocese and each branch of the auxiliary has been asked to furnish a brief sketch of the work in its own parish together with several pictures of interest to be made into slides. When completed this lecture will be for use throughout the diocese and should prove an educational feature of great value.

The book prepared for our study this year was written by Bishop Burleson, entitled "Our Church and Our Country," and the Junior book "His Star in the West," a simplified edition told in story form, was arranged by Miss Dorothy Giles. Both books have an especial appeal and it is unfortunate that so few classes have used them this year.

Board of Religious Education and others will be sent this year. The importance of trained leaders in every branch of church work should impress itself upon every person here today. No longer is it possible to hope for big results from hap-hazard methods, and the women of the Auxiliary should face this problem of education, using every effort to assist in the training of leaders among the younger women that they may be fitted to carry on more efficiently the work of spreading the Kingdom and making the Gospel known throughout the world.

In closing, let me repeat that the most serious need of the Auxiliary today is trained leaders, and the summer conference offers a rare opportunity for acquiring this training and inspiration.

Let us unite in an effort to interest parishes and individuals in these conferences, that by meeting with others who like ourselves long to see our Church in the place she was meant to fill, we may give of our own zeal and ability, while receiving the gifts from others, and may be encouraged and helped to carry on the command with which Bishop Burleson opens his study book for the year, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth."

## REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF JUNIOR AUXILIARY

In looking over our reports for the past years I find that every year since 1913-1914, I have made a report at the Woman's Auxiliary Annual Meeting, either as Secretary-Treasurer or as President of the Junior Auxiliary. After this continuous service in office I feel that I need a rest and the Junior Auxiliary a change. Also recently I have taken a business position and I feel that the Junior work requires more time than I can devote to it and I have asked your committee to nominate a new President.

I remember well my first introduction to Diocesan work when Miss George Trimble and I served as a committee of two to make scalloped potatoes for about 150 hungry Juniors at an Annual meeting. I felt that it was a big undertaking but I liked it and it was successfully accomplished. I felt at that time that the Junior Auxiliary offered unlimited opportunity for service, and I am still convinced that it does. In fact, there is room enough and work enough for all the young people of the church in the Junior Auxiliary.

On May 10th, we had our Annual Junior meeting at All Saint's church. The attendance was good, both at the Communion service in the morning and at the business meeting during the day. We missed Bishop Williams who was always present to celebrate the Communion and give the Juniors a word of encouragement and of instruction in their work. Rev. Mr. Worden gave a splendid talk reminding the Juniors that Christ's last command was to "Go into all the world and preach the gospel," urging us all to make it possible for some one else to go if we could not go ourselves, and to give, study and pray for missions.

Eighteen were present from Plattsburgh, twenty from Blair and eight from Fremont, including the Rector.

In the afternoon, the Good Shepherd Juniors gave a little play called "The Book of Life."

At our Annual Meeting last year we talked of

starting a scholarship for a boy and the Blair boys went home and went to work with such a will that by early fall they sent in \$20.00 towards a \$50.00 scholarship. They reported that the money was raised by personal pledges of from five cents to \$5.00 and I think you can all imagine the self sacrifice that a voluntary offering of \$20.00 meant to a small band of boys. It was decided to call the scholarship the "Arthur Marsh Memorial," and for this year it is to go to Africa, where the Adelaide Williams scholarship is placed. These two scholarships, the Adelaide Williams and the Arthur Marsh Memorial cost \$50.00 each per year or \$100.00 and surely it is worth that to keep a boy and a girl in a Christian school for a year. I have heard indirectly that there is to be a scholarship for Bishop Williams. The Juniors will wish to give to this also, and let me ask each one of you to tell your Boys' Club and the boys in your Church School about them.

A word in regard to pledges. All must be paid by January 1st this year rather than before the Annual Meeting and will all who are in Junior work send Junior pledges to their treasurer first. She will then forward them to Mrs. Fairchild. This helps materially in keeping our records straight.

Three Christmas boxes were sent out this year, one to Mrs. Hugh Binns, Nora, Virginia, one to a mission in South Richmond, Virginia, and one to the Winnebago Mission. Letters of appreciation and thanks were received from all. One branch, which pledged school supplies to Winnebago at the Annual meeting last year reported that they hit upon the novel plan of giving an entertainment and asking pencils, tablets, etc., for admission instead of money. It is interesting to hear these various parish reports and see what a variety of things the Juniors do.

At the Triennial this year, the question will be discussed of making a separate organization of the Junior Auxiliary, and no longer having it under the direct jurisdiction of the Woman's Auxiliary. This is primarily on the account of the boys who are coming into the Junior Auxiliary in large numbers in connection with the New Junior plan which I spoke of last year.

The five fields of service, the parish, community, diocese, country and world are constantly referred to the Christian Nurture Series, and the New Junior plan is to give a wider opportunity for service in each of these fields by occasional week day activities.

A word in regard to study work. A few branches report classes in the book "His Star in the West." At our leaders' meetings we tried telling the stories from the book, but some of us were not very experienced story tellers and the unanimous decision seemed to be that the book was so well written by Miss Giles, who is a real story teller, that it can be read to all but the youngest Juniors with very good results, so let all who want to be Junior leaders and who are not real story tellers take heart. I also want to urge that all Junior branches and Sunday School teachers give more attention to plays as a method of teaching. Our Church Mission house supplies us with a fine collection suitable for all occasions and nearly all children like to be in a play and make believe. Recently I saw the "Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved," for the fourth time and never before was I so impressed with it and the lesson it teaches to those who see it or take part in it.

In closing, let me thank all members of the Woman's Auxiliary for the privilege of serving as an officer in the Junior Auxiliary. I have enjoyed every bit of the work. I came into office knowing little of diocesan affairs and I still have much to learn, but I have done what I could and was glad of the opportunity to serve. I have had splendid cooperation from Miss Fry, Miss Barkalow, Mrs. Flockhart and Miss Donelan, as well as all leaders in Omaha and out, and our friends in the Woman's Auxiliary have always been ready and willing to help in any way when we have asked them. Let me thank you all again and wish the Juniors and the Woman's Auxiliary success for the coming year.

## The Junior Plan

The following constructive plan for the Junior work has been arranged by Mrs. W. S. Leete, of Plattsouth, Junior Vice-President for the Southeast District.

### *Object of the Work*

First, to make good Church children.

Second, a study of Missions, in praying, giving and working for the cause.

Third, to teach some idea of parliamentary law in learning to conduct the meetings.

Fourth, special attention in courtesy and manners, respect for those older than themselves.

### *The Font Roll*

The work begins with the baptism of the child. The Rector should appoint some person to be supervisor of the Font Roll; she will keep a record of the names, birth and baptism of all children. Once a year a children's service is held in the Church, at which the parents and god-parents should be present. The babies receive certificates of membership for the Font Roll and the Red Boxes to be kept at home for the offering during the year for Missions.

At the anniversary of their baptism a card is mailed to the babies by the Font Roll Supervisor.

When the child is old enough to enter the Church School he is given at the annual children's service, a certificate of promotion. It is of special interest if the rector will call the babies and children to come forward to receive their certificates. People like to see the babies brought to the front and the children generally enjoy it.

### *Little Helpers*

When a child is of school age she is old enough to be a Little Helper. A person who loves children and is willing to consecrate herself to this work must be found, as it requires study and time for preparation.

The Little Helpers meet weekly for one hour after school. It seems to add interest to both parents and children when they meet at the different homes.

Work is started at once, and any child coming after a stated time is tardy and is so recorded.

Hand work is taught, as cutting pictures and making scrap books. Cutting, coloring and making paper dolls, sewing marble bags, bean bags, hemming dish towels, collecting pieces for quilts and sewing them. The work is all put away in proper time and a business meeting held. The Director necessarily must lead, with the Secretary-Treasurer for assistant, the children being taught to address the chair and take part in the business. An offering is taken when the roll is called and the children given an opportunity to tell if the money is earned, saved or given them. They are taught systematic giving, one-tenth of their money being the Lord's and for His work. The meeting is closed with a hymn, the Creed, prayers and Little Helpers' Collect. The Director, also hostess, is greeted by each child with a curtsey on coming and going with thanks for the use of the home.

On opening the meeting give each child a card with the Little Helpers Collect and teach them to use it. Give a play once a year, if possible, and always use five or ten minutes for games.

#### *The Junior Auxiliary*

The children have now arrived at the age where they must be taught to assume certain obligations and faithfully perform them.

Making dresses for babies and little children seems to be favorite work. Material is secured by two girls who are appointed to call on the women of the Auxiliary and mothers and ask for any pieces of material suitable for dresses for the Indians and colored people of the Missions.

Four officers are elected from the members, the business meeting being entirely conducted by them taught by the Director, who will see that it is conducted in the proper order. This is very important, and the "Order of Business" printed in the back of the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary is used for a model. Each child is taught to stand and address the Chair—Madam President—when making a motion. Close meeting with hymn (have one of the members for

musical director if possible who will choose and play the hymn), the Creed, closing prayers and Junior Collects.

Girls form line, president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer leading, make a curtsey and bid the Director and hostess good bye, after picking up all scraps and putting room in order.

#### *System of Honors*

Director bought a medal and had engraved on it "J. A. 1918-1919." The object being to increase interest and emphasize certain things. Credits are given as follows:

New members in Juniors and Church School, 5; work finished on time, 5; attendance at Junior Auxiliary Church and Church School, 2; Deportment, 1. Chewing gum or eating deducts, 1; forgetting, deducts 1.

Medal goes to highest in honor each month to be worn for a month. At the end of the year it is presented by the Rector at the annual children's meeting, to the person having highest honor during the year.

#### *Suggestions*

During Lent no sewing was done. The Director told stories from the Mission study books. Each child was given a note book and after the story was finished wrote a story at home from their notes, and at the next meeting one of these stories was chosen to be read aloud. Some were illustrated with original drawings, others with pictures pasted on cards. One set of these was chosen to be sent to the General Convention for Exhibition, also a sample quilt.

Join with Woman's Auxiliary in Days of Intercession, five or ten minutes each.

A Magic Lantern exhibition was held, pictures of Bishops, churches and missions studied about being used. The pictures prepared by the Board of Religious Education would be splendid for this purpose. Parents, friends and Woman's Auxiliary were invited, light refreshments were served and an offering taken.

Once or twice a year a play is given and repeated in the Public Library for their story hour.

Visits made to Masonic Home, Old People's Home, or any town institution, singing for the occupants, sometimes meet with the Woman's Auxiliary to secure co-operation.

## Constitution

### ARTICLE I.

#### *Name*

This Society shall be called the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions.

### ARTICLE II.

#### *Objects of the Society*

*Section 1.*—To diffuse Missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.

*Section 2.*—To unite previously existing societies in a common interest, and to encourage the formation of new branches for missionary work.

*Section 3.*—To carry out the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary; daily prayer for missions, study of missions, and systematic giving for missions.

### ARTICLE III.

#### *Membership*

All baptized women of the Church in the Diocese of Nebraska shall be considered members of this Society.

### ARTICLE IV.

#### *Officers*

The Officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-President-at-Large, four District Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a President of the Junior Auxiliary, a Vice-President-at-Large of the Junior Auxiliary, four Junior District Vice-Presidents, a Secretary-Treasurer of the Junior Auxiliary, a Treasurer of the United Offering, a Secretary-Treasurer of Boxes, an Educational Secretary and a Diocesan Librarian.

These officers, with the exception of the eight District Vice-Presidents, who shall be appointed by the Bishop, and the Presidents, shall be elected by ballot

at the annual meeting and a majority of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

Vacancies in office shall be filled by persons recommended by the Executive Board, and confirmed by the Bishop, said appointees to serve until the next annual meeting.

## ARTICLE V.

### *Duties of Officers*

*Section 1.*—The President, and in her absence, the Vice-President-at-Large, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, call special meetings of the Society, and countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

*Section 2.*—It shall be the duty of the District Vice-Presidents to visit and organize auxiliaries and to superintend the work of their respective districts.

*Section 3.*—The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings and conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the Secretaries of the Associated Branches, and with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York. She shall keep a record of all meetings, prepare and keep a list of the names of all Associated Branches with their officers, and shall report the same once a year to the Bishop of the Diocese and the General Secretary in New York.

*Section 4.*—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed to the work of the Association, to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President, and present an annual report of the same. It shall be the duty of all other officers to perform such duties as shall pertain to their respective offices.

*Section 5.*—The Box Secretary-Treasurer shall receive and distribute all information relating to the Missionary boxes and all gifts of material and clothing for the same, and shall report annually to the secretary all work done.

*Section 6.*—The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all missionary educational work of the Diocese, carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

## ARTICLE VI.

### *Meetings*

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the Diocesan Council.

Semi-annual meetings shall be held at such time and place as the District Vice-President shall direct. All members may participate in the deliberations of these meetings, but only three delegates or their alternates of each Associated Branch shall be entitled to vote at the Annual Meeting.

The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five Officers shall constitute a quorum.

## ARTICLE VII.

### *Fees*

Each Parish Auxiliary becomes a branch of the Diocesan Auxiliary by paying annually a fee of three dollars, which with the offerings from the annual and district meetings shall constitute a contingent fund for defraying the necessary expenses of the Diocesan Branch.

## ARTICLE VIII.

### *Branches*

All Church societies desiring to become Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary may do so upon payment of fee, and shall report annually to the Diocesan Secretary all gifts of work and money for Missions.

## ARTICLE IX.

### *Amendments*

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at any Annual Meeting, provided that notice of such alteration or amendment has been sent to each Branch not less than thirty days before said meeting.
