JANUARY 18, 1921

The Thirty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary opened with celebration of the Holy Communion, the Reverend A. E. Marsh and Rev. Carl Worden as celebrants, and an address by Bishop Shayler at ten o'clock in Trinity Cathedral, Omaha, Tuesday, January 18th. Owing to illness the Bishop had to leave after the address. The business session was held in the crypt of the Cathedral. Roll call showed one hundred and fifty-seven present, although more than two hundred were at the luncheon at noon.

Reports of officers followed in order, Vice-President-at-large Mrs. W. H. Young; District Vice-Presidents: Mrs. George C. Smith, Mrs. Henry Hockenburger, Mrs. D. C. Pattee, Mrs. Clarence Graff (being absent, report given by Secretary), and Mrs. John Flockhart; Educational Secretary, Mrs. S. W. Townsend; Supply Secretary, Mrs. W. H. Wheeler; Secretary, Mrs. William H. Jones; United Thank Offering Treasurer, Miss Barbara Gering; Correspondent Church Periodical Club, Madam Joshua Leete; Librarian not present, no report read; Treasurer not present at the time report was read later. These reports were all approved as read.

Discussion on the new system of Box Work followed, Mrs. Wheeler explained fully the details. The Reverend Roy Fairchild, of Nebraska City, also joined in the acclaim for more information on the changed conditions. Moved, seconded and carried that all hospital

or other supply work done in the Diocese should come through the Supply Secretary. Mrs. Blundell thought branches were ignorant of the fact that it is necessary to receive all orders for supply work from the Secretary. The branches may write that they had sent a box, and its value, to the Supply Secretary and she should give them credit in her reports.

It now being the noon hour, noon-day prayers were said by the Reverend Mr. Fairchild.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Fairchild, having just arrived from Lincoln, gave her report. It was moved, seconded and carried this report be accepted.

The President recommended that Officers' Conferences be held for branch officers, by retiring branch officers, for instruction on the proper handling of Auxiliary affairs, finances, etc.

Adjournment was now taken for lunch, which was served in Trinity Parish House by the Omaha branches.

The business session was resumed at two-fifteen. The President read the annual letter from the General Secretary, Miss Grace Lindley, which was sent to all Diocesan branches.

The Chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mrs. Tracey, was then asked to present the nominations for the coming year. These were: President, Mrs. W. H. Jones; Vice-President-at-large, Mrs. W. H. Young; no secretary had been secured; Educational Secretary, Mrs. S. W. Townsend; Supply Secretary, Mrs. W. H. Wheeler; United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. George Falter; Librarian, Miss M. E. Musser.

Mrs. Scott P. Child of Kansas City, speaker of the day was then introduced; all branches of Church life and work being included in her talk, which was most interesting and instructive and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

The Chairman of the Central Fund, Mrs. Leigh Leslie, was next asked to present the plan for this new fund, discussion followed. Mrs. Leslie moved that a fund of \$200.00 be created to pay traveling expenses of the President, Secretary, Educational Secretary, and Supply Secretary. This Fund to be used at the discretion of the Executive Committee for the transportation of the officers above named and for speakers when needed. Motion seconded and carried.

Next the pledges for the coming year were taken by the Treasurer.

Offering taken amounted to \$24.00.

The Nominating Committees Chairman here declared nominations were now in order, and that Mrs. W. H. Jones had been nominated for President; were there any nominations from the floor? No others were offered. Mrs. Janecek moved the rules be suspended and the nominations closed and the President cast the ballot for Mrs. W. H. Jones for President, which she did. Nominations for the Vice-President-at-large were next in order; there were three, Mrs. W. H. Young, Mrs. J. J. Stubbs, and Mrs. Philip Potter. Ballot had to be taken. While this was taking place, nominations for Secretary were called for. Mrs. Philip Potter, Mrs. Burt, and Mrs. Charles Frankish were nominated, but they withdrew their names. Mrs. T. H. Tracy was then nominated, and she said she would be glad to serve. It was moved, seconded and carried that the rules be suspended and nominations closed and the Secretary cast the ballot for Mrs. Tracy for Secretary, which she did. Mrs. S. W. Townsend was nominated for Educational Secretary, Mrs. W. H. Wheeler, Supply Secretary; Miss M. E. Musser, Librarian. It was again moved and carried that the Secretary cast the ballot for these, and this was done.

Mrs. J. B. Jones told of the new Card Index System for reference work.

Tellers reported on the ballots cast for the Vice-President-at-large. Forty-one votes cast. Mrs. J. J. Stubbs, 21; Mrs. W. H. Young, 18; Mrs. Philip Potter, 2; making Mrs. Stubbs elected. Mrs. J. B. Jones read a letter from Mrs. Ely, St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai. The President read her annual address.

Mrs. Blunde proposed a rising vote of thanks for Mrs. J. B. Jones, the retiring president, which was given, and was graciously acknowledged by Mrs. Jones.

Announcement was made of a Social Service Meeting to be held in the evening in the crypt of the Cathedral.

Mrs. Tracy announced that Mrs. Stubbs had been telephoned, and that she declined to accept office, thanking the meeting for the honor conferred, there-

fore Mrs. Young becomes Vice-President-at-large, having the next highest vote.

Mrs. Philip Potter addressed the meeting on the Shepherd-Towner bill now before Congress.

Mrs. O. B. Williams moved that the name of the Auxiliary be changed to be the "Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council." Carried.

The Treasurer was asked if any special pledges were expected and replied these should be devoted to Bishop Williams' Scholarships, as that is our greatest need and is our own diocesan work.

Mrs. Janecek suggested an amendment to the Constitution to read "officers of the Auxiliary should be communicants of our Church." Mrs. Potter thought this was a matter for the Bishop to decide. The President appointed Mrs. Philip Potter, Mrs. B. E. Diggs, Mrs. O. B. Williams and Mrs. Chas. Janecek a committee to bring this before the Bishop and report at the next annual meeting.

Mrs. Blundell asked all to respond more at service in singing and responses.

Miss Mary Case Marsh, Organizing Secretary of the Girls' Friendly Society spoke on her work.

Business being concluded, the President, with her best wishes handed the gavel to the new president, and pronounced the meeting adjourned, and invited the visitors to tea in Trinity Parish House.

President's Address

Right-Reverend Sir, and Women of the Auxiliary:

Another annual meeting is upon us; another year of joyous anticipations and bitter disappointments, of cordial friendships cemented and antagonisms unavoidably aroused, has gone forever; it is the same old story the world over with which every president of a society is more or less familiar.

We have had the loyal cooperation of all officers and committees, new plans have been put forward, confident that they were for the ultimate good of the society, and which have met with more or less success.

I wish that I might honestly give you a glowing report of work accomplished, of a greatly increased membership in the Woman's Auxiliary, of many new branches organized, of a deeper spiritual insight into the missionary work of our beloved Church, but truth forbids me to do so.

We have not gained in membership as we should in this rapidly growing mid-western section. People seem to be tired of doing good, of hearing about missions and working for missions. Your Diocesan officers have gone to the various District meetings, after careful preparations to give something worth while, only to find just a few people who were interested enough in the missionary work—the really big work of the church—to spend a few hours once a year in attending these meetings. They seem to prefer the lighter side of life, and more than one parish President has apologized for the small number present by saying that "the *Guild* was giving a luncheon today, or Mrs. So-and-So is having a card party."

The role of Good Samaritan does not appeal to the popular fancy any more than it did two thousand years ago, and yet almost the last command of our Blessed Lord while on earth was "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," and then this significant fact is further recorded—"and they went forth and preached everywhere, the *Lord working with them.*"

Is it not just as true today that if we go on doing the things that He has commanded us to do that the Lord will work with us?

He has not forgotten his promise, but it is we ourselves who have grown careless and indifferent, it is we who are failing to keep our lamps trimmed and burning that we may be ready for the Bridegroom when He cometh.

Service—

The keynote of a Christian life is *Service*, and unless we are willing to take up the cross and follow Him we are not his faithful followers. *Service* for Christ means service to our fellow-men: “As ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto me.”

Prayer—

And we must build up our spiritual selves by more heart-searching, earnest prayer, *personal* prayer that will say “Lord, what wilt thou have *me* to do?” then be still and listen for God to answer us. Nor must it stop there or our prayers would be futile. When the still small voice tells us what to do that His will may be done on earth as it is in Heaven let us do it joyfully and willingly. *Prayer* and intercession! the greatest tonic our spiritual natures can have. Sometimes I think that we live in so much haste, so much running hither and thither, so much activity of every indescribable sort that we have no time to listen to the still small voice of God. We need also to cultivate more the spirit of harmony in our work, and the willingness to follow our appointed leaders.

Suggestions—

I should like to suggest as an aid to creating interest in the mission work two things: 1st, that every Auxiliary open every meeting with roll call which shall be responded to with some brief fact about missions, quotations from the Bible or other sources, and 2nd, that at least twenty minutes of every meeting should be devoted to the study of missions or the lives of missionary workers, a reading by some one from the Spirit of Missions or other source, a story told, a letter read from some worker in the missionary field, or anything of interest about missions and this *before* the work period begins. You will be astonished at how much may be learned in a year's time and at the interest it will arouse.

Miss Lindley says that “Auxiliary enthusiasts are more and more appreciating their opportunities and

increasing their efforts for intensive work. The woman who has not been reached or who remains indifferent will soon go out of fashion. Every woman in the church is permitted and urged to share in the life of the Auxiliary. The wonder is that there are still so many who do not."

I should also like to suggest that when the annual parish elections take place the retiring officers each hold a short conference with the incoming officers, instructing them so far as they are able on the duties of their office, how to make reports, where to send the different reports, monies, etc.

Church Service League—

It is hoped by its sponsors that the Church Service League will be a valuable means in bringing about a greater interest among all the women of the church in the missionary work. That the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Parish Guilds may be so co-ordinated that all women will get the larger vision of the whole church at work.

When our interest is centered in our own parish and we fail to see the needs and opportunities of the great work to be done in the Diocese, or when our range of vision is still so narrow that we cannot see beyond the confines of our own Diocese and realize the great need and appeal of the whole Church, then we are indeed myopic of vision and are in need of the Great Surgeon to enlarge our vision and open our eyes. True Christianity is not selfish, it realizes that the whole world is its brother and God the Father of us all.

Membership Committees—

Last Annual Meeting you were advised that our Bishop requested every Auxiliary to have a membership committee to enlarge their numbers, and report same to the Diocesan Secretary for the next annual meeting, but I am advised that so far this has not been done to any noticeable extent.

The Districts—

Some changes were made in the districts last year, one or two of which proved to be impractical, so with the advice of the Bishop we recommend the following change: That Fremont be again put in the Omaha district, leaving the parishes contiguous to the Union Pacific in the Columbus district, and one more district made to be known as the Falls City District, the

rest to remain as last reported. These changes will be correctly made in the Annual Report.

The Supply Bureau has been very ably conducted during the past year by Mrs. W. H. Wheeler, who is gradually getting it thoroughly organized on a systematic basis, using Red Cross methods as far as practical. She must have your loyal support.

The Educational work under Mrs. S. W. Townsend has advanced splendidly along broad lines, and she has outlined fine programs for the year, which I believe have been accepted and put into operation by many of the branches.

The United Thank Offering is the most beautiful of all our work, and is growing steadily in favor, thro the efforts of Miss Barbara Gering.

The Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. W. H. Jones, has been a most faithful and efficient help in every way, bringing to the work her rare tact, spiritual understanding and willing service.

The Treasurer, Mrs. J. D. Fairchild, has had many perplexing problems, but has met them all with her usual graciousness.

The Executive Committee, being an altogether new aid to the Diocesan work, probably has not been called upon as much as should have been done, or as they will be in the future; their function is a growing one and will mean much in advising the President. They have been called together on an average of once each month, consulted on all important matters and have given loyal response and efficient help.

The vice-president-at-large, Mrs. W. H. Young, has not been with us very much because of the illness of her husband, but has responded to call whenever possible.

The district vice-presidents have given faithful service and to all officers I wish to extend my sincerest thanks and hearty appreciation of their good will, co-operation and loyal support. The problems of the past two years have been many and difficult, but by tireless energy and co-operation we have tried altogether to do the very best for the ultimate good of the Auxiliary.

And last, but not least, I wish to express my personal thanks and appreciation to you, Right Reverend Sir, for your ever helpful advice, patience and sympathy

in the many perplexing problems that have come to me as Diocesan President. This work has been very close to my heart, and always will be, and in laying down the responsibilities of office I shall cherish very dearly the warm personal friendship which I have received both from yourself and all the officers in this diocese.

Report of District Vice-Presidents

JANUARY 18, 1921

OMAHA DISTRICT

The first Omaha District Meeting was held at Trinity Cathedral on Michaelmas. The Holy Communion was celebrated at 10:30. Dean Tancock being celebrant, and the business meeting was held immediately after the services in the crypt of the Cathedral.

Bishop Shayler addressed the meeting on the Lambeth Conference, and Rev. T. J. Casady spoke on the Nation-wide Campaign.

As this was the opening meeting of the Auxiliary it was largely concerned with plans for the winter work. The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Townsend, outlined her plans; the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Wheeler, explained the system for the mission boxes, and the heads of the Periodical Club the Church School Service, league, and the United Thank Offering spoke of their plans for the winter's work.

In accordance with the advice of the National Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, it was agreed to try to hold a day of Intercession for Missions in the first week of Advent. The generous offering was used for a special gift, and the attendance was a source of satisfaction, each parish of the district being well represented.

Two monthly meetings were held for October and November, the first being addressed by Bishop Burleson, and the second heard a program on Alaska by Section B of All Saints.

There were about 20 present, all from St. Thomas, except the Diocesan President, Mrs. J. B. Jones, Secretary, Mrs. W. H. Jones, and Educational Secretary, Mrs. S. W. Townsend, these three from Omaha.

Mrs. Townsend, educational secretary, spoke for educational work. She advised discussion meeting and recommended the study of the Survey and Alaska.

Mrs. J. B. Jones gave an outline of the new plans for the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. Falter spoke for the U. T. O. as the diocesan officer for this work was unable to be present.

The President asked that the women think seriously of creating a Central Fund for Diocesan Presidents traveling expenses.

Offering taken at this meeting amounted to \$5.00.

Memorial prayers were offered by the Rector of St. Thomas for Arch-Deacon Stuck of Alaska.

As there was no further business the meeting adjourned.

As the Vice-President cannot be there in person, she would like to take this opportunity to state that Superior is too far removed from the rest of this district and too inaccessible for the Vice-President to be able to visit there or for delegates from there to attend District meetings.

Secretary's Report

ENDING JANUARY 18, 1921

Madam President, Ladies of the Auxiliary:

Your Secretary respectfully submits the following Annual Report from May, 1920, to January, 1921.

Two Diocesan Board Conferences, four Executive Committee Meetings, two Monthly Meetings, and five District Meetings, making in all thirteen meetings since September.

The Diocesan Board held its first conference in Bishop Shayler's office on September 17th. After short prayers Bishop Shayler addressed the meeting, his topic being, "getting ourselves adjusted to the new conditions and changes in the Auxiliary and enlisting greater energy, more missionary spirit and larger membership."

Work and requirements were explained to all the new officers and instructions given for the year. The new Central Fund was suggested and approved by all and the Secretary instructed to write of it to all Branches for their consideration.

The second Board meeting was held in Holy Trinity Rectory at Lincoln just before the business session of the Lincoln District Meeting on November 11th.

The fifty cents per capita tax for each branch to finance the Supply Department was discussed, also the Advent Intercession Services.

The Executive Committee of five members, a new advisory committee appointed for the first time this year held four meetings. The members are Mrs. J. B. Jones, Mrs. W. H. Jones, Mrs. Clarke Powell, Mrs. Sam Burns, Chas. Trimble. The first Executive Committee meeting was held on September 10th, four members present. The creation of a Central Fund for Officers' traveling expenses was suggested and unanimously favored, and the Secretary instructed to write to all branches which has been done.

This meeting also favored having all Omaha Monthly Meetings held in Trinity Parish House, it being so centrally located and since Dean Tancock had agreed to its use for this purpose.

It was decided if the Annual Meeting came in January it would be advisable to print but one year book for

last year and this short year, from May to January, and thus save a considerable expense.

The second of these meetings was held at the home of Mrs. W. H. Wheeler, Supply Secretary, four present. The possible creation of the Provincial Supply Bureau in Omaha was discussed and Mrs. Wheeler was asked to write for further information on it. It had been decided at the Provincial Meeting at Davenport, Iowa, that Omaha would be the most central location for this Bureau.

The President appointed a nominating committee as follows: Mrs. T. H. Tracy, Mrs. Chas. Haller, Mrs. M. E. Nicol, Mrs. J. B. Watkins and Mrs. H. R. Secord. The third meeting was held at Trinity Parish House on December 20th. Four present. At this time luncheon for the annual meeting was discussed. It was considered right and proper to serve luncheon on both Auxiliary and Council meeting days and to have these in Trinity Parish House because of its nearness to the Cathedral. It was decided to finance these luncheons in the same way the Progressive Tea had been financed a year ago. That is, by apportioning the expense between the several parishes of the city.

At a fourth meeting at the home of the President the menu for lunches was selected and committees appointed. Mrs. Chas. Trimble was made chairman of lunch committee, Mrs. C. K. Robertson, chairman of dining room.

Five District Meetings were held as follows: The first in Omaha on September 29, St. Michael and All Angels' Day, a day set apart yearly as Corporate Communion Day for members of the Auxiliary.

Roll call showed 46 present. All Saints 5, St. Barnabas 6, Trinity 13, St. Paul 2, St. John 1, St. Andrews 2, Good Shepherd 3, St. Philip 1, Blair 2, Plattsouth 9, Fremont 2.

The offering amounted to \$10.23.

The second meeting was at Falls City, October 15th. Twenty present, including the Diocesan President, Secretary, and Educational Secretary from Omaha who presented the different phases of the Auxiliary work. Offering amounted to \$5.00. There were memorial prayers for Archdeacon Stuck, whose death had occurred October 10th. As the Omaha officers had to come the day before the meeting because of train

service there was an evening meeting held that evening when men as well as women were present and the Ideal Woman's Auxiliary discussed.

The third meeting was held at Lincoln in Holy Trinity Church, November 4th. Attendance 46. Holy Trinity 27, St. Lukes 3, Ashland 2, Nebraska City 1, Albion 1, Omaha 8, Norfolk 1, Plattsburgh 2, and 1 from Connecticut.

Bishop Shayler, in speaking on Box work, asked the women to "Let not your energies slacken, let not your love lessen." Rev. Mr. Casady presented his Ideal of a Woman's Auxiliary.

Officers' reports were read and discussion followed. Offering amounted to \$6.45 and a special offering taken for the baby carriage amounted to \$5.45.

The fourth district meeting was held at Neligh, November 11th. Roll call showed 26, but 40 were present later. Four from Norfolk and three from Omaha. The President, Secretary and Educational Secretary talked for the different departments of the work. Offering was \$6.01 and a special baby carriage offering amounted to \$10.40.

The fifth meeting was held in Fremont, December 3rd. 15 present. Subjects of talk were What a Woman's Auxiliary Ought to Be, by Rev. Mr. Watkins of Fremont; Educational Work, by Mrs. S. W. Townsend, Educational Secretary, and Box Work by Mrs. W. H. Jones.

Special mention is due the branches where these meetings were held for the entertainment offered the Diocesan members attending. Splendid luncheons were prepared and served to all.

Two monthly meetings were held. The Omaha district meeting took the place of the September monthly meeting. The first was held on October 29th, in Trinity Parish House. Roll call showed 65 present. All Saints 6, Trinity 29, St. Barnabas 9, St. Paul 5, St. Philips 4, St. Martins 2, St. Johns 5, Good Shepherd 1, St. Andrews 1, Winnebago 1, Blair 1, Nebraska City 1. Speakers were Bishop Shayler on "The Ideal Woman's Auxiliary," and Bishop Burleson of South Dakota, on "The Ideal Missionary Box," with the element of personal ministry and loving work in it. Reports of officers were given. Miss Euphemia Johnson of Y.W.C.A. and Deaconess Propper of Winnebago spoke. Offering amounted to \$8.23. A special

offering for the baby carriage amounted to \$12.25. A social half hour was later enjoyed with Trinity branch as hostess.

The second monthly meeting was held in Trinity Parish House on November 26th. Attendance 47. Trinity 18, All Saints 18, St. Barnabas 4, St. Philips 1, St. Martins 1, St. Andrews 2, St. Johns 3. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The Mission to be held by Rev. Mr. Nash in the Cathedral the following week was announced, also the Day of Intercession to be held by the Auxiliary women on December 3rd. Mrs. Philip Potter spoke in the interest of our Social Service work and All Saints Section B had charge of the educational program for the day. The subject was Alaska. This was splendidly given. Offering amounted to \$7.92. All Saints Auxiliary was hostess for the social half hour after the business meeting.

In looking over the membership reports I find some branches have lost and some have gained, the result being a general gain in the diocese of 76 members in the two years just past.

I visited the Chicago Diocese monthly meeting on December 2nd. There were 126 in attendance from 44 branches, their secretary's minutes showed a \$90.00 offering for the month of November. They have a plan whereby certain women of the Diocese may be called upon for visiting different parishes to speak on various subjects. This meeting was devoted to Social Service. I found them progressive and big workers. Seventy-five letters have been written, 3,500, leaflets mailed. Have attended all meetings but one and promoted the Bishop Williams Scholarships, United Thank Offering, and Box work whereever and whenever possible.

When He saw the multitude He was moved with compassion because they fainted and were scattered abroad as sheep having no shepherd. Standing in the midst of a great flock of sheep, we may see not much more than those in the front ring around us. We may think there is no more to see, *but* if we go up even a small space we shall see ever so many more. If we go up to where our Lord is we shall see the multitude. Let us deal with all our Auxiliary work in the same spirit of those who with our Lord have seen the multitude and are caring for nothing but to serve and save them.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The report of the Educational Secretary is rather brief as the change in the church year gives us just four months of active work to report.

Four District meetings have been attended by the Secretary: At Falls City, Lincoln, Neligh and Fremont, and a distance of more than 800 miles traveled in this work and in visiting parishes. At these meetings every effort has been made to interest all women in the study work. In most cases interest has been manifest and response gratifying.

We have tried to impress upon all Churchwomen that membership in the Church makes every woman a member of the Auxiliary whether she be active or not.

Eighty-five letters have been written; literature furnished and personal visits to parishes made.

Mission programs for the regular monthly meetings have been arranged by the Secretary, and subject matter for study and presentation furnished.

Study classes for Lent are being formed now in every parish where possible and the books for study are on their way from the Missions House. These may be had from the Secretary as soon as they arrive. Leaders are being appointed and normal classes formed. Arch-Deacon Stuck's "Alaskan Missions of the Episcopal Church" is the text book to be used.

August 29th, 1919, I received \$10.49 from Mrs. M. E. Nichol, retiring Diocesan Librarian.

In June 1919, I was appointed by Mrs. J. B. Jones to represent the Spirit of Missions, also to solicit subscriptions to any other Church Magazine. This office and that of Librarian to be merged in one.

On November 6th, 1919, I wrote twenty-two letters to the different presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary, out in the state, asking them to appoint a representative in their parish to solicit subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions, and as a result I had response from only three. Ashland four, Wymore eight, and Plattsouth eight.

In Omaha, fifty-three subscriptions have been taken by me.

On December 15th, 1919, at a meeting of the Diocesan Board, it was decided that a year's subscription to the Living Church and Spirit of Missions magazines, be placed in the Omaha Public Library, which was done.

MINUTES
OF THE
Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop
and Council

Meeting opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion in Trinity Cathedral at ten in the morning, and the business session was called to order by the President, Mrs. J. B. Jones, at two in the afternoon, on Friday, the twenty-first of May, 1920.

Bishop Shayler addressed the meeting, bringing enthusiasm to all, and Mrs. E. V. Shayler, wife of our Bishop, welcomed the visitors in a very gracious and cordial manner.

Roll call response showed 205 present. Branches represented and the number of their members present were: Ashland, St. Stephen's 3; Beatrice, Christ Church, 6; Blair, St. Mary's, Sec. A, 3; Sec. B, 1; Central City, Christ Church, 4; Columbus, Grace Church, 2; Fairbury, Emmanuel, 1; Fremont, St. James, 5; Falls City, St. Thomas 7; Lincoln, Holy Trinity, 11; Lincoln, St. Lukes, 1; Nebraska City, St. Mary's, 6; Neligh, St. Peters, 1; Norfolk, Trinity 2; Omaha: All Saints, 21; Good Shepherd, 12; St. Andrews, 15; St. Barnabas, 15; St. Johns, 10; St. Martins, 9; St. Pauls, 16; St. Philips, 6; Trinity Cathedral, 26; Plattsmouth, St. Lukes, 15; Schuyler, Holy Trinity, 1; Silver Creek, St. Stephens, 1; Tekamah, Holy Cross, 1; Winnebago, All Saints, 5; Wymore, St. Lukes, 3; Wyoming, Christ Church, 1; Cedar Rapids, Trinity 1.

The Credentials Committee, Mrs. Fairchild, reported all fees paid so all delegates could vote.

Names of women members who had passed away during the year were reported and the assembly stood in silent prayer in their memory and also for the Rev. T. J. Mackay. Mesdames J. P. Trimble, S. M. Hayes, T. H. Tracy and Philip Potter were appointed a committee on resolutions to be sent Mrs. Mackay.

Secretary Mrs. W. H. Jones' annual report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer, Mrs. J. D. Fairchild's, report was next read and accepted. Mrs. Fairchild asked that the Auxiliary make up the deficiency on the "Bishop's Special," which was \$110 short; she also reported only \$3.52 in the treasury and still owing \$13.00.

Miss Gering, the United Thank Offering Treasurer's report was next read and accepted. It showed a total of offerings received \$432.39.

Mrs. Haller, Box Secretary, gave her report, accepted, showing numerous boxes as usual sent, with the splendid valuation of \$1,555.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Tracy's report, accepted, showed excellent work accomplished. Mrs. Tracy urged more women to attend the Summer Conferences as much can be gained there.

The President called for the Junior President, Miss Alice Fry, to make her final report to the Woman's Auxiliary, as the coming year it begins its career as a separate organization. The report showed splendid work among the Juniors under the energetic leadership of Miss Fry.

The President next introduced Miss Emily Tillotson, Secretary, from New York, who spoke on Auxiliary work and the Church Service League, and explained that the Auxiliary now includes Social Service and Religious Education since the Presiding Bishop and Council include these in their work.

The President asked the Committee on Resolutions to retire and later bring in their report, then an adjournment was taken to give time for the Auxiliary in a body to attend the Church Council to hear the discussion of "the state of the Church's finances" by the Finance Committee, for which the Bishop sent a special invitation to the Auxiliary meeting.

After this privileged hour with the Council the Auxiliary business session was resumed.

Miss Mary Hewitt, a missionary worker from China, was introduced and gave a very instructive talk on the work in China.

The President then announced that the name of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions would have to be changed to accord with the National. It was then moved, seconded and carried that it be changed.

Mrs. Jones next asked for authority to appoint an

Executive Committee of three to act between diocesan board meetings. A motion to this effect was made by Mrs. O. B. Williams, seconded and carried, these women to hold office one, two, and three years, one retiring each year so all would not drop from the committee at once. Mrs. Jones then appointed Mrs. Clarke Powell, Mrs. Samuel Burns, Mrs. Chas. Trimble. The Secretary and President being members by virtue of their office.

The President's address followed this and was a carefully prepared explanation of the changes in the Woman's Auxiliary and the program for the coming year. It paid a hearty tribute to all her helping officers and to all the Auxiliary in general for their faithful co-operation.

Offering taken amounted to \$22.67.

Mrs. Potter asked that as offerings had not come up to near what they usually were, \$160 should be collected to pay up the shortage in the treasury and said she would be responsible for \$25.00 of this. More was then pledged.

Mrs. Oscar Williams, chairman, read the report of the Nominating Committee, explaining that nominations from the floor would also be in order. This report was accepted.

Mrs. Noe moved that the Nominating Committees slate be accepted; seconded and carried with one exception—office of Vice-President-at-large, for which ballot was taken. Nominations for this office were made. The chairman of the Committee on Resolutions read their report, which was a sympathetic letter to Mrs. Mackay in the loss of the beloved Rector of All Saints Parish, Rev. T. J. Mackay. The secretary was instructed to convey this to Mrs. Mackay.

New business consisted of the redistricting of our Districts and Mrs. W. H. Young, of Fremont, the chairman of this committee, read her report. It was moved, seconded and carried to accept the five new districts as arranged by this committee.

The report of tellers showed Mrs. W. H. Young of Fremont was elected by ballot Vice-President-at-Large. The reports of other officers were called for to be turned in to the Secretary, as time was so limited they could not be read.

The new Emery Fund was explained by Miss Tillotson. She also told what new pledges would be required during the new year.

Mrs. J. B. Jones said there would be an officers' conference in the evening if enough parish officers desired and a number decided to meet for this.

Mrs. W. H. Jones asked for a rising vote of appreciation for the President's faithful and conscientious service during the past year.

The Secretary read the minutes of this meeting, which were approved and accepted as read.

The meeting then adjourned till next morning.

Next morning, Saturday, after services in the Cathedral, the Auxiliary met again for a short finishing session.

The Secretary read Miss Grace Lindley's annual letter, also a letter from Bishop Rowe in Alaska.

Pledges for the new year were made to the Treasurer, Mrs. Fairchild, and she reported to the Secretary that among these were fifteen Bishop Williams scholarships.

Mrs. J. B. Jones announced that the new Church Service League would hold its first meeting immediately at the close of this meeting, saying also that Bishop Shayler had appointed the officers for this first year, which are Mrs. O. B. Williams, chairman; Miss Eleanor Sprague, secretary; Mrs. M. T. Barlow, treasurer.

The Auxiliary meeting then stood adjourned.

President's Address

*Members of the Nebraska Branch of the
Woman's Auxiliary:*

Even the name by which we are hereafter to be known suggests something of the many changes that are taking place in the life of the Woman's Auxiliary. We are no longer Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, but to the Presiding Bishop and Council. But in change there is health, stagnant waters produce only disease and death.

Everything in our modern life has just one song which is "speed up, speed up." The electric cars which barely hesitate at the street crossings, the whirling motor cars, the dizzy aeroplanes all pay mute tribute to the master passion of speed, so it is no wonder that our Auxiliary work has felt the throb of this mighty impulse and we too must "speed up, speed up."

Never have the opportunities for women's work in the Church been greater or more appealing than now. And through our ideals we are brought to a nearer sense of realization. Thus analyzed we get the larger vision of the work before us, with its three departments: Missions, Religious Education, and Social Service; all of which must be carried into the five fields of service—the community, parish, diocese, nation and world.

To meet this larger vision of the whole Church two important actions were taken by the Woman's Auxiliary at the Triennial Convention in Detroit last fall, the first in enlarging its own sphere of work, the second in helping to create a federation of all societies of Church women, the Church Service League.

Let us endeavor as women to widen our horizon, to take our lives out of the narrow pit of prejudice and set them upon the high mountain peaks of Service. Let the spirit of co-operation be a light to guide us thro the difficult period of reconstruction and thereby deepen our individual spiritual life. Let us break down intense parochialism and even diocesanism that we may get a broader view of the whole Church at work.

Plans—

The new plans for the reconstruction of the Box Work brings to us the large vision of its possibilities and while it involves radical changes they are changes which have been thoroly tried and put to the severest test in the Red Cross work. Mrs. Leonard Wood and Mrs. Powell Clayton, both national figures in the Red Cross work, have undertaken to put the box work on the same systematic and well organized basis that the Red Cross work so efficiently accomplished and they ask the co-operation of every woman in the Church.

There is no longer a Board of Missions, but a Department of Missions under the Presiding Bishop and Council. The following resolution, which was passed in February, will show our new relationship:

“Whereas, the Presiding Bishop and Council recognized the splendid and necessary work which the Woman’s Auxiliary to the Board of Missions has carried on for so many years, and desiring to conserve in every way this devoted service, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Presiding Bishop and Council hereby constitutes the Woman’s Auxiliary an auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, it being understood that further action in the matter may be taken if and when there should come into existence in the church a Federation of women’s societies which can be made auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.”

The Departments of Religious Education and Social Service open up many fields of work and opportunities for service and asks the support and help of the Woman’s Auxiliary.

The Junior Auxiliary is no more, they have been separated from the Woman’s Auxiliary and are under the Board of Religious Education and are hereafter to be known as the Church School Service League, and are to include boys as well as girls.

The United Thank Offering is to be extended to all the women of the church and should be made an expression of our thankfulness to Almighty God for His great mercies.

We are to continue our pledges for the Diocese, the Bishop’s special, Bishop Williams memorial scholarship, our work for Winnebago and to make as many

pledges as possible wherever the Auxiliary is able to do so over and above its assistance on the Nation-wide Campaign.

Our special gifts are required to take care of many obligations of the Church which are not included in the Nation-wide Campaign, such as special work in Alaska, the Seamen's Institute, the work in Liberia, and others, and it must be remembered that the interests and welfare of the whole work are *identical* not competitive.

The Emery Fund of \$50,000 was voted at Detroit to be a thanksgiving commemoration of the fifty years of the Woman's Auxiliary, to be known as the Emery Fund, in loving appreciation of the devoted labors of three sisters, Mrs. Twing, founder of the Auxiliary, Miss Julia C. Emery, General Secretary and Miss M. T. Emery, head of the Box Committee. This fund is to be raised before October, 1921, and is to be given over to the Presiding Bishop and Council to be kept as a trust fund for all time, for the benefit and pleasure of missionaries who are on furlough for study, health or recreation.

The Auxiliary has been indeed fortunate in having our dear Miss Lindley appointed as General Secretary for another three years. With her clear and constructive mind we may be sure that the work will continue to progress under her splendid judgment.

After nearly fifty years of Auxiliary life it will take time to become adjusted to the new plans, but we must meet the new tasks with brave hearts and good cheer. The tasks are mighty, but so are the opportunities and the needs, and we have the promise of the Everlasting Arms to sustain us, if we do our work in His name.

I cannot close without a tribute to the loyal support I have had during the past difficult year from all the Auxiliary, both the officers and those in the ranks. The Secretary has given efficient, faithful service in every way, the district vice-presidents have responded splendidly to the demands made upon them for district and special meetings and all have worked in a spirit of harmony, Mrs. Williams has pushed the Church Service League until we have five.

Your officers all realize their responsibilities and have performed them to the best of their ability; therefore, I beg of you to be charitable to their faults and let your criticism be specific, direct and constructive.

The period of change has been a difficult one for us all, but I have tried to do my best; the mistakes I have made have been from the head and not the heart, therefore, I hope you will remember only the good things I have done and please forget the mistakes, and may I invoke your loving loyal support for your new officers in the coming year.

The Secretary's Report for the Year Ending
May 20, 1920

Six Diocesan Board conferences and five regular and one extra monthly meeting of the Omaha branches of the Woman's Auxiliary were held in Omaha, also two meetings for Mrs. George Biller in place of the regular March monthly meeting. Three Mrs. Biller meetings were held out in the state, at Lincoln, Columbus, and Nebraska City, and there were four District meetings, making in all twenty-one meetings during the year.

The first monthly meeting was held in Trinity Parish House, on October 31st. Prayers were offered by Dean J. A. Tancock. Mrs. Leffs-Caldwell spoke on Social Service. Offering amounted to \$8.50 and was given Mrs. Caldwell for her work. Forty-three responded to roll call.

The November monthly meeting was held in Trinity Parish House on the 21st, and 39 were in attendance. Offering amounted to \$3.95. Mr. Charles Hopper, Superintendent of Good Shepherd Church School, was the speaker.

Owing to the holidays no December meeting was held.

The January meeting was held in All Saints Parish House on the 30th, with thirty-six in attendance, the offering was \$8.00. The new Church Service League was discussed and Bishop Shayler addressed the meeting. The Secretary was instructed to send condolences to Mrs. A. K. Gault, a former President, in the loss of her husband.

The February meeting was held on the 27th, in St. Paul's Church. Thirty-six present. Offering amounted to \$4.28. Miss Mary Anthony spoke on Social Service. The meeting rose in sympathy for Miss Barbara Gering in the loss of her mother. Announcement was made of Mrs. George Biller meetings to be held in March and a committee appointed to make arrangements for these meetings.

Mrs. George Biller meetings on the 18th and 19th of March, at All Saints Church took the place of the March monthly meeting, sixty attended first day, offering \$10.47. About seventy-five attended the second day and offering was \$10.22. All stood in

loving sympathy for Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Tracy, who were injured recently in an automobile accident. There were three other meetings held in the state for Mrs. Biller. These were at Lincoln, Columbus, and Nebraska City, and the combined offering at these amounted to \$27.61.

Mrs. J. A. Tancock opened her home, the Deanery, on Saturday, March 20th, for all to meet Mrs. Biller. The April monthly meeting was held in the crypt of the Cathedral, 41 in attendance. The annual meeting was discussed and some arrangements made for it, also it was decided to have a Progressive Tea as the only entertainment this year. Special committees were appointed. Offering was \$4.02. An extra meeting was called again on April 3rd, and further arrangements made for the annual meeting and tea.

Minutes of all meetings were read and approved. The Secretary attended all four District Meetings. At the Northeast held at Blair, 72 were present; at the Northwest, held at Norfolk, November 8th, 42 were in attendance; at the Southeast, at Nebraska City, 65 were present, and at Southwest, at Beatrice, 40 were present. Offerings went to Mrs. Fairchild as usual.

Notice of all meetings were sent to the clergy and all daily newspapers and some reports to the Crozier.

Have written about 260 letters, mailed 226 copies of our Year Book, sent 1,541 packages of leaflets and 2,035 multigraphed letters were sent out.

One parish Church Service League has been organized, that of the Cathedral. A new Auxiliary started in St. John's parish, Omaha, and a Section B in All Saints, Omaha. Two Girls' Friendly Societies and one Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses. The women did much for the Nation Wide Campaign.

One special Corporate Communion service was held in practically all branches on August 6th, the Feast of the Transfiguration. Also a special Communion service for the Triennial Meeting was held in the fall.

The Secretary attended the Conference of the Midwest Province held at Racine, Wisconsin, July 8th to 18th and received much helpful knowledge from it and wishes more members could and would attend these conferences.

I would like to make a clarion call to all women to

put more enthusiasm in our work, answer all correspondence promptly and respond willingly to the working out of the new Supply Department, thus helping the officers of that department who will have a great deal of work introducing the new system of Box Work.

This report of necessity must be brief, but in listening to it I ask you to remember that it has been a busy year, a year when it has been hard to find time to think of study, but in the face of all obstacles our list of Mission study classes has made a brave showing, which is evidence of the sturdy Missionary spirit implanted in the women of the Diocese by our former Secretary, Mrs. Oscar Williams, and fostered by faithful parish Priests, studious class leaders and Auxiliary presidents. The list is as follows, beginning February 16, 1920, Miss Katherine Hilliard conducted a normal study class with eight members using the text book, "Neighbors." The following parishes have had study classes, All Saints, Trinity Cathedral, St. Barnabas, St. Philips, St. Martins, St. James, Fremont; St. Mary's, Blair; Holy Trinity, Schuyler; St. Stephens, Silver Creek; St. Lukes, Plattsmouth; St. Peters, Neligh, and Grace Church, Columbus.

I will ask you to please bear in mind that from now until 1922 the main topic for study throughout the Church will be the Survey issue in connection with the Nation Wide Campaign. Each year there will be issued a book for special study, the one for this year will be Arch-Deacon Stuck's new book on Alaska. I trust that each one of you will do your utmost in your parishes to stimulate the study of "The Survey."

We must face the task of reconstruction and we can best do it through leaders trained for Christian service, so in conclusion let me urge all who can to remember the summer conferences with their vast opportunities for the Church worker and the Church student. Cannot some of you take advantage of what is so well provided. Every one of us acknowledges the need of such instruction, surely some one of us can supply that need.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF WOMAN'S WORK FOR THE NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN

I was appointed as Chairman by Mrs. Tracy just before the Council in May, 1919, and spoke briefly at the Annual meeting, urging on the women of the Diocese a loyal support of the Nation Wide Campaign.

I spent ten days at the Conference of Church workers held at Wellesley, Massachusetts, from June twenty-first to July first, gaining all the information on the subject that could be given at that early stage in its development. Added information and inspiration was secured by correspondence during the summer.

On returning to Omaha in the fall I found that the Diocesan Central Committee, of which I was to be a member, had never been organized; I therefore applied to the Bishop and received his cordial sanction and encouragement to do what I could independently to stimulate interest in the campaign among women. It was a difficult matter for me, as representing the Woman's Auxiliary to reach many parishes, as the woman's work was to be subsidiary to the Diocesan organization which did not begin to function till after the new year. This will account for the small number of visits I was able to make.

I spoke at a number of parish Auxiliary meetings in the city, and at the District meeting held at Norfolk in October, and again at Nebraska City I addressed a most enthusiastic meeting of the Southeastern District. I was prevented by the heavy snow storm from attending the meeting of the Southwestern District held in Beatrice on November twenty-ninth.

At the invitation of Father Leete, I addressed a mass meeting in St. Luke's church, Plattsmouth, Friday evening, December fifth, and went the next day to Falls City, where, at the urgent request of Father Noble, I addressed the congregation at both morning and afternoon services, and also gave a talk to the Church School children. In January I assisted in the preparation of the Pageant of the N. W. C. in Trinity Cathedral.

This covers the specific work I was able to do as your representative for the success of the campaign in the Diocese.

In closing I wish to thank the Diocesan officers for their cordial support and to express hearty appreciation of the courtesy and eager response to my message which I met with in the parishes it was my privilege to visit.

It is with gratitude that I come before you today to make my report of the work of the Junior Auxiliary for the past year; gratitude for all of your splendid help and cooperation, and regret that we are no longer to be under the guidance of the Woman's Auxiliary who have always been the Junior's best friends.

At the Triennial Convention in Detroit, the Junior Auxiliary was separated from the Woman's Auxiliary in order to allow its work to be more closely connected with the Church Sunday

Schools and to take in the boys. Since then, it has been transferred from the Department of Missions to that of Religious Education and is to be developed into the Church School Service League, including all the activities of the youth of the church. We will still be connected with the Woman's Auxiliary by your having one representative on our executive board and our having one representative on your board to keep us in touch with each others work. But I beg you, women of the Auxiliary, not to drop the Junior Auxiliary from your hearts and minds, because you were the starters of it and you have developed it and know its value in the Christian education of the child and also its value to the future of the church. You have been its very best friends and helpers and I for one, feel that the work cannot go on successfully without your continued help which has always been so generously given in the past.

Our past year has been a very good one. The Junior District Vice-Presidents, Mrs. A. Engleman of Omaha, Mrs. Chas. Janecek of Schuyler, Mrs. W. S. Leete of Plattsouth, and Mrs. S. E. Yoder of Wymore, have been very active and successful with the work in their districts and each have attended the district meetings of their districts.

We have new or renewed branches in each of our districts totaling nine in all and three new Little Helpers branches. Our box work has grown and our two scholarships were completed besides the other usual gifts and pledges. Brownell Hall has again taken up its scholarship to St. Mary's Shanghai, sending in enough to pay for last year also, as they were not organized then and they wished it to be continuous. They have also sent a scholarship to Winnebago.

Three of our branches have organized as Church School Service Leagues, thus providing organization and activities for a majority of the Church School children. Fourteen of the Church Schools helped with the Christmas box work. So we feel that Junior Auxiliary of Nebraska is well on its new course.

Our Annual Meeting was held May 15th at All Saints Church. The attendance was over two hundred, including more than sixty out of town children. An exhibit of the work sent in by the various branches showed the keen interest taken by both the leaders and the boys and girls in the Junior Auxiliary.

I have visited in each district and was very much pleased at the interest and work being done in each place I was able to visit.

In closing, I want to thank all the Junior leaders (who are almost all Woman's Auxiliary members) and all you women of the Auxiliary, for your splendid help this past year. Let me ask you again not to forget the Juniors as we leave you, for if we are to grow under our new order we will need even more of your help than ever before, especially as leaders. I am most grateful to you all for all you have done for us and also for the privilege of serving you in this interesting work. I hope that the coming year will be filled with success and growth for both the Auxiliary and the Juniors.

Constitution

ARTICLE I.

Name

This Society shall be called the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE II.

Objects of the Society

Section 1.—To diffuse Missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.

Section 2.—To unite previously existing societies in a common interest, and to encourage the formation of new branches for missionary work.

Section 3.—To carry out the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary; daily prayer for missions, study of missions, and systematic giving for missions.

ARTICLE III.

Membership

All baptized women of the Church in the Diocese of Nebraska shall be considered members of this Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

The Officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-President-at-Large, six District Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Thank-Offering, a Secretary-Treasurer of Boxes, an Educational Secretary and a Diocesan Librarian.

These officers, with the exception of the six District Vice-Presidents, who shall be appointed by the Bishop and the President, shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and a majority of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

Vacancies in office shall be filled by persons recommended by the Executive Board, and confirmed by the Bishop, said appointees to serve until the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1.—The President, and in her absence, the Vice-President-at-Large, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, call special meetings of the Society, and countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

Section 2.—It shall be the duty of the District Vice-Presidents to visit and organize Auxiliaries and to superintend the work of their respective Districts.

Section 3.—The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings and conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the Secretaries of the Associated Branches, and with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York. She shall keep a record of all meetings, prepare and keep a list of the names of all Associated Branches with their officers, and shall report the same once a year to the Bishop of the Diocese and the General Secretary in New York.

Section 4.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed to the work of the Association, to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President, and present an annual report of the same. It shall be the duty of all other officers to perform such duties as shall pertain to their respective offices.

Section 5.—The Box Secretary-Treasurer shall receive and distribute all information relating to the Missionary boxes and all gifts of material and clothing for the same, and shall report annually to the Secretary all work done.

Section 6.—The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all Missionary educational work of the Diocese, carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the Diocesan Council.

District meetings shall be held at such time and place as the District Vice-President shall direct. All members may participate in the deliberations of these meetings, but only three delegates or their alternates of each Associated Branch shall be entitled to vote at the Annual Meeting.

The Diocesan Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five Officers shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII.

Fees

Each Parish Auxiliary becomes a branch of the Diocesan Auxiliary by paying annually a fee of three dollars, which with the offerings from the annual and district meetings shall constitute a contingent fund for defraying the necessary expenses of the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE VIII.

Branches

All Church societies desiring to become Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary may do so upon payment of fee, and shall report annually to the Diocesan Secretary all gifts of work and money for Missions.

ARTICLE IX.

Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at any Annual Meeting, provided that notice of such alteration or amendment has been sent to each Branch not less than thirty days before said meeting.

Guard and guide the workers in the field, and draw us into closer fellowship with them. Dispose the hearts of all women everywhere to give gladly as Thou hast given to them. Accept, from grateful hearts, our United Thank Offering of prayer and gifts and joyful service; and bless it to the coming of Thy Kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

FOR THE DIOCESE

O Eternal and Unchanging God Whose mercies are over all Thy Works, we humbly beseech Thee to bless our efforts in this Diocese to revive, restore, quicken and enlarge Thy Church. Enlighten our minds; Purify our spirits; Inspire our wills; and pour Thy grace into our hearts that we may lovingly serve and generously give.

So shall Thy Kingdom come and Thy will be done by us, through Jesus Christ our Lord and the Holy Spirit our Guide. Amen.
