

The thirty-sixth annual meeting of the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council was opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion in Trinity Cathedral.

The Rt. Rev. E. V. Shayler, celebrant, assisted by the Very Rev. S. E. McGinley, and Canon A. E. Marsh.

For the first time in the history of this organization it was necessary to hold these meetings in the Cathedral proper on account of the greater number in attendance compared with other years.

President's Address

Right-Reverend Sir and Women of the Auxiliary:

Another year of concentrated effort on the part of your Diocesan Officers has past, with what results, you, in your respective parish branches are the better able to judge. The Auxiliary Board, I believe, would unite with me in saying it has been a successful year. Our watchword now should be "Forward." "Go forward, Christian Soldiers!" Just one thing will help in a forward movement and that is Service. More and more *Service* is what we need. *Service* is the *highest possible motive of life*. Service is the keynote of my message to you today. Teach service, personal service, from childhood. By service we of the Auxiliary mean the giving of time, mind, money, self, in Parish, Community, Nation and World. The bible reveals to us God's purpose in the world is missionary.

What is the Missionary Idea?

That the *Love of God* is for *all* men and that those who know His love must perforce make it known to others. This is the fundamental principle of the Kingdom of God, Missions.

Every woman in the church is just as responsible for the Missions of the Church as anyone else in the church. We cannot be Christians, then seek absolution from the cause of Christ, Missions. Woman's Auxiliary women of the church are holding up the hands of the church that she may testify to the cause of Christ.

Winnebago—

All Saints Indian School at Winnebago is one of our Diocesan Missions and has been one of the responsibilities of the Auxiliary, and calls to us with outstretched hands, let us answer this call more willingly than ever this New Year. We made it possible to keep this school open the past year. I think you all have a good understanding of this Mission School, its condition, its possibilities, and its needs, for I have talked insistently of it at all meetings in the State this year. Bishop Shayler has new plans for this school and I sincerely urge all to help him.

Spiritual Activities—

Letters were sent out at the beginning of the year asking co-operation for a fuller spiritual life in each

branch by the formation of Prayer Groups, using Prayer Leaflets to be obtained for the asking from the Church Missions House. In response to a questionnaire recently sent as a follow-up, replies indicate no Prayer Groups have been formed. When we do realize more fully the need of more praying I feel sure we will have these Prayer Groups and then I am convinced we will make greater strides ahead in our work. If we seek God more he will walk abroad with us. If we want to see the Glory of God we must have faith in God.

Religious Education—

Reams of paper could be used to write of Religious Education. Space permits only that I urge more and more study classes, more subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions to learn more of what our Church is doing. Also classes teaching the history of our Church, from the beginning with Christ, and down through the Apostolic Succession to the present time. Excellent work has been done this year in this department under the capable leadership of your Educational Secretary.

Conferences—

I would urge that women whenever they can should attend Church Conferences. There is one held yearly in the Province of the Northwest at Racine, Wisconsin, and others in different places over the country. In ten days attendance at a conference one can learn more of our church and its work than in years of parish attendance.

Memberships—

For two years we have urged Membership Committees in each branch, to make an every-woman canvas, inviting the women of each church to join the Woman's Auxiliary, explaining something of its purpose and work. Every woman in the church should be interested in Missions, for Missions are the Church, and the Church is the Visible body of the living Christ. Every baptized woman is a member by virtue of her baptism into the Church, though she may not know it, and we *must have active members.*

Co-operation—

Correspondence is invited by Parish officers with Diocesan officers that they may the better co-operate.

Boxes—

The response to the Supply Department has far surpassed that of last year which is exceedingly gratifying. We will leave it to the conscience of each branch to decide if they can do even better this year as there can never be too many boxes sent. Great credit is due the Supply Secretary for the greater interest shown this year in this department.

Social Service—

Since we are an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council and the Council includes Social Service as part of their program it should also be on our program. My first communication, however, from the Social Service Department has just reached me, and I hope that very soon letters about this work can be mailed each branch explaining what is expected of us. Americanization will be strongly emphasized. I trust there will be good reports of this work next year.

The new plan of personal visits to each branch has proved very successful. Each one visited declared they much preferred these visits to the former district meetings.

Your Educational Secretary and President carried the message of all departments of our work to each branch visited particularly emphasizing Religious Education, Box Work and the United Thank Offering. The one-hundredth Anniversary of the Missionary Society of the Church and the fiftieth Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary was observed in a fitting manner. It was impossible to visit all branches but those not visited this winter can be visited this coming year. As a delegate from our Nebraska branch of the Woman's Auxiliary I attended the Provincial Meeting in Denver and there was put on a Committee on Provincial Organization to meet at the Triennial. We have at present but one Provincial Officer, a Secretary-Treasurer, and it was thought we should have more of a Board or Executive Committee.

Sincere appreciation and thanks are hereby extended to all who so hospitably entertained your officers on visits, for the kindly reception we received everywhere; also to all members of the Board and Executive Committee for their efficiency in their

several departments of work and their unfailing helpfulness and co-operation.

We all feel, I am sure, what a great loss the passing away of Miss Emery is to the Auxiliary but let us keep her wonderful, faithful, spiritual service ever before us as an example to lead us on to better and greater accomplishment. Again let me urge more emphasis be placed on spirituality in our lives and let us begin the new year with increased interest and activity.

Four multigraphed letters have at different times during the year been sent each branch and 130 letters written by your President.

LINCOLN DISTRICT

NEBRASKA CITY DISTRICT

The Nebraska City District has three active branches: St. Thomas, Falls City; St. Mary's, Nebraska City; and Christ Church, Wyoming.

I have made no personal visits to these branches, but have kept in touch with them through correspondence. Good work has been done in all of the branches and pledges met.

St. Thomas (Falls City), has paid its Nation-Wide Campaign fund twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), sent two boxes valued at seventy-five dollars (\$75.00), and the past year have been studying Missions as outlined by the Survey. They hold monthly meetings, have fourteen members, but have gained no new members this year, in fact they have lost several.

Nebraska City, the past year, has done the best work in its history. They have lost seven members and gained nine new ones, so there is a gain of two. Two members, Mrs. Charles M. Hubner and Mrs. W. T. Hathaway, have answered the last call and we miss their cheery smile and pleasant word of encouragement, and last but not least their hearty co-operation in all church work. The only study work has been reading from "The Spirit of Missions" at the meetings. A meeting is held every week during Lent, on Friday, and the rest of the year, at the call of the President, until the year's work is done and the pledges filled, unless the Bishop asks for more help, when they give a pantry sale or something to help out.

Twenty-five dollars at one time and twenty dollars at another was given to the Winnebago Indian School, besides the scholarship pledge, fifty cents a member to the Supply Department, which they were asked to give and were glad to help start it on its next basis of preparedness.

Christ Church, Wyoming, has twenty-four members, but has gained no new ones the last year. However, they have grown from nine when I organized it, and they can only meet in the pleasant weather and they are our only country parish, no one does better work.

They have sent a box of fruit to Clarkson Hospital, and two cases of eggs, gave twenty-five dollars at

Thanksgiving time, and sent a box of clothing valued at forty dollars.

In December the District had a visit from our Diocesan President, Mrs. Jones, and Educational Secretary, Mrs. Townsend, which Falls City, Nebraska City, and Wyoming enjoyed. They went to Falls City first where they had a luncheon and an afternoon meeting. In the evening they came to Nebraska City, when I had the pleasure of entertaining them twenty-four hours. Tuesday afternoon at St. Mary's Church they each gave an interesting talk on the church work to the women of St. Mary's Parish, and Christ Church, Wyoming. Mrs. Townsend told the ladies so plainly their duty, especially to support the church magazine, that she received many subscriptions to the magazine and calendar.

This is only a small part of the work these branches have done, but I have always enjoyed hearing what the branches have been doing, so have tried to tell a few of the most important things accomplished during the year. Have had no work in Peru.

Auburn has lost one faithful church woman, Mrs. Boyd.

Report of the Educational Secretary

January 17, 1922

The progress made by the Auxiliary and other woman's organizations in the diocese has been very gratifying to the educational department.

Lenten study classes were organized in fifteen parishes and missions for the study of Arch Deacon Stuck's "Alaska." The attendance at these meetings more than doubled that of any previous year. Requests for books came from parishes and missions in which classes were formed for the first time.

The Educational Secretary had charge of the programs for the Omaha district meetings during the year, presenting the mission fields of Mexico, Canal Zone, Virgin Islands, Cuba, Porto Rico, and Liberia. Papers and interesting talks were furnished by the women of Trinity, All Saints, St. Andrew's, St. Barnabas and St. Martin's.

During the year the Educational Secretary visited 18 parishes and missions where the general study work and the discussion groups were explained and urged as an important branch of Auxiliary work.

A very excellent pageant was witnessed at St. Luke's, Plattsmouth, having been written by an Auxiliary member of that parish. We do not look for immediate and startling results, but a gradual increase in interest and a marked increase in attendance is gratifying.

We try to remember that the purpose of all education in the church is to make intelligent church members loyal to their Leader and to His purpose for the world with all the qualities which that loyalty involves.

REPORT OF DIOCESAN LIBRARIAN

My active duties as Librarian did not begin until September 29, 1921, owing to absence from the city. On that date I received through Mrs. Tracy, Diocesan Secretary, check for \$6.84, balance in the Treasury January 18, 1921 as reported by Mrs. Charles Merle, former Librarian. I found in the Library seventy-three books to which we have added this year Miss Emery's "A Century of Endeavor," four bound volumes of the Cosmopolitan magazine, two bound volumes of Scribner's magazine, one bound volume of Harper's magazine and The Art Album. All these, with the exception of "A Century of Endeavor" were donated. The books in the Library have been numbered, and indexed by titles and by authors.

The greater part of the Librarian's duties is as representative of The Spirit of Missions. In the interests of our splendid Missionary Magazine, I have written seventy-nine letters not entirely without results. Fifty subscribers have been secured, thirty-four of which are entirely new. These come chiefly from the Omaha Parishes only, Nebraska City, Plattsmouth and York being represented. I have promises, however, from a number of our Auxiliary Presidents throughout the Diocese to assist the Librarian in this great work. Our slogan should be The Spirit of Missions in every home.

Constitution.

ARTICLE I.

Name

This Society shall be called the Nebraska Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE II.

Objects of the Society

Section 1.—To diffuse Missionary activity among the women of the Diocese.

Section 2.—To unite previously existing societies in a common interest, and to encourage the formation of new branches for missionary work.

Section 3.—To carry out the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary; daily prayer for missions, study of missions, and systematic giving for missions.

ARTICLE III.

Membership

All baptized women of the Church in the Diocese of Nebraska shall be considered members of this Society.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers

The Officers of this Society shall be a President, a Vice-President-at-Large, six District Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, a Secretary-Treasurer of Boxes, an Educational Secretary and a Diocesan Librarian.

These officers, with the exception of the six District Vice-Presidents, who shall be appointed by the Bishop and the President, shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting and a majority of those present and voting shall constitute an election.

Vacancies in office shall be filled by persons recommended by the Executive Board, and confirmed by the Bishop, said appointees to serve until the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE V.

Duties of Officers

Section 1.—The President, and in her absence, the Vice-President-at-Large, shall preside at all meetings of the Society, call special meetings of the Society, and countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

Section 2.—It shall be the duty of the District Vice-Presidents to visit and organize Auxiliaries and to superintend the work of their respective Districts.

Section 3.—The Secretary shall give notice of all meetings and conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the Secretaries of the Associated Branches, and with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in New York. She shall keep a record of all meetings, prepare and keep a list of the names of all Associated Branches with their officers, and shall report the same once a year to the Bishop of the Diocese and the General Secretary in New York.

Section 4.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys contributed to the work of the Association, to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President, and present an annual report of the same. It shall be the duty of all other officers to perform such duties as shall pertain to their respective offices.

Section 5.—The Box Secretary-Treasurer shall receive and distribute all information relating to the Missionary boxes and all gifts of material and clothing for the same, and shall report annually to the Secretary all work done.

Section 6.—The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all Missionary educational work of the Diocese, carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings

The annual meeting of the Society shall be held at the time and place of the Diocesan Council.

District meetings shall be held at such time and place as the District Vice-President shall direct. All

members may participate in the deliberations of these meetings, but only three delegates or their alternates of each Associated Branch shall be entitled to vote at the Annual Meeting.

The Diocesan Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five Officers shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VII.

Fees

Each Parish Auxiliary becomes a branch of the Diocesan Auxiliary by paying annually a fee of three dollars, which with the offerings from the annual and district meetings shall constitute a contingent fund for defraying the necessary expenses of the Diocesan Branch.

ARTICLE VIII.

Branches

All Church societies desiring to become Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary may do so upon payment of fee, and shall report annually to the Diocesan Secretary all gifts of work and money for Missions.

ARTICLE IX.

Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-third vote of the whole number of delegates present at any Annual Meeting, provided that notice of such alteration or amendment has been sent to each Branch not less than thirty days before said meeting.

NOTE: Under advice of Bishop Shayler the Executive Committee decided personal visits by the President and Educational Secretary would be a beneficial change from District Meetings, therefore these were made to as many branches as possible and proved very successful.
