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## CONSTITUTION.

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### I.

#### NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

### II.

#### OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general missionary work of the church, to communicate missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the gospel of Christ.

### III.

#### OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a president, five vice-presidents, and a secretary and treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from parish societies at the annual meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

### IV.

#### DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The president shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The president and vice-presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedmen, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The secretary and treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, preparing and reading the minutes of each meeting.



## V.

## REPRESENTATION.

Any parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a secretary, and notifying the president. The secretary of the parish society is expected to correspond with the diocesan officers, and they *alone* correspond with the secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each parish shall send to the annual meeting two or more delegates.

## VI.

## VOTES.

Two votes are allowed for each parish. (If delegates disagree, the votes are lost).

## VII.

The annual meeting shall be held the last Wednesday of April.

There may be division meetings appointed by the corresponding secretary, with the approval of the president.

The work must be directed by the officers of the different branches, and no collections of moneys or work done be reported hereafter through the corresponding secretary, as it complicates the reports of the officers to whom they properly belong, and sometimes causes duplication of the same.

The collections at division meetings shall be used for the contingent fund of the auxiliary, and sent to the diocesan treasurer.

## VIII.

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

## REPORT OF SECRETARY AND TREASURER.

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BY invitation of the Elizabeth Branch, the annual meeting was held at Trinity Church, Elizabeth, on Wednesday, April 29, at 10.30 A. M., a number of the clergy, together with a large representation of delegates from thirty-two parishes of the diocese, being present.

At the opening service there was a celebration of the Holy Communion, the Bishop of the diocese officiating. At the close of the service, most inspiring missionary addresses were delivered by the Bishop and Miss Sybil Carter, the latter dwelling with especial emphasis upon the great needs of the work in China and Japan.

At the afternoon session, the reports of the president and vice-presidents of money and boxes sent to different parts of the mission field were submitted and were as follows :

The president gave an interesting review of the work, which was followed by the annual reports of the corresponding secretaries and librarians of the Divisions.

Through the efforts of the latter, the work of supplying missionaries, laymen and struggling missions with suitable literature of different kinds has been successfully carried on; The librarian of the Upper Division stated that eighty periodicals and papers are being regularly sent for the current year. In addition to these, prayer books, hymnals, Sunday-school books, leaflets, Easter cards and tracts have been sent into missionary fields of the west and have been highly appreciated.



From the Lower Division ninety-three papers and periodicals are being sent, added to which a number of books and odd numbers of periodicals have also been sent, forming in several places the nucleus of a guild library.

A valuable gift from Mount Holly is worthy of especial mention; that of bound volumes of the Spirit of Missions from 1833 to 1872. This, probably, will find a home in the new Missions House.

The Ten Cent Missionary Assessment Fund amounted to \$99.75, of which the sum of \$50 was appropriated to Mrs. Hooker's Orphanage; \$25 to the education of the Japanese boy at Osaka, and \$28 for work among the Indians through Miss Carter.

At the annual election, the resignations of Miss Neilson, vice-president of Diocesan Missions, and of Mrs. Roberts, corresponding secretary of the Lower Division, were received with much regret. Mrs. Charles Ryder and Miss Mary McKeen were chosen to fill their places. With these exceptions, the officers, corresponding secretaries and librarians of the preceding year were re-elected.

The past year has been one of increased activities and interest, the total receipts amounting to \$8,851.53, an increase over the preceding year of \$1,351.68.

Five new branches have been added during the year : St. Paul's, Rahway ; St. James, Piscataway ; St. Peter's, Clarksboro ; St. Thomas, Glassboro, and Trinity Church, Asbury Park, making the present number of parishes and missions represented in the Auxiliary sixty-seven.

We learn from the eleventh chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, that "the disciples were called Christians, first in Antioch." "Then the disciples according to their ability determined to send relief to the brethren which dwelt in Judea." A great famine we are told, brought out this desire of the favored few, to give as they had received. It is often some special emergency which opens the hearts to the calls of Mission work. In making up the report of Domestic boxes this year, we find fewer than usual. This is the case in many other Dioceses. Perhaps we may have cause to rejoice, if we find that gifts of *money* are finding a more generous response in the hearts of our members.

The sad *fact* that 75 per cent. of church women in our country give *nothing* to the cause of missions should teach us who have learned to love the work, to be doubly earnest in our exertions.

The missionary standpoint is at present a peculiar and embarrassing one.

While we should be sorry to feel with many that the work of missions is a failure, we cannot but think the enlightenment of the church has been very slow.

When our missionary agencies were first organized, so many countries in heathen lands had been closed to the influence of the Gospel of Christ. How earnest then were the prayers of



God's people, that He would open a way and unbar the gates. When at last the whole world was thrown open to the Christian religion, the *men* were not to be found. Now that the workers so earnestly asked for are ready, the church has not the means at her command to appropriate for this purpose.

My dear friends some of the fault surely lies at our own doors.

Fifteen years ago last December, a few women from fewer parishes, met in this church to attempt the organization of a New Jersey Branch Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

Upon its first anniversary the sixteen parishes reported in work and money about \$2,250. Four times the number of parishes are upon our roll to-day, are our receipts four fold?

We have had many enthusiastic meetings; we learn of the work all over the world; with what result? Are the 25 per cent. of church women in New Jersey doing their whole duty?

From the pages of the last "Spirit of Missions" we cull a few lines most appropriate at this time: "Women of the church do we realize what is the privilege and what the responsibility which God has laid upon us, and are we ready with heart and mind and strength to do the work? If we are we must put *soul* into it, we must stop at no *cost*, but be willing to sustain the work with a liberality far beyond anything we have done hitherto."
