Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

The New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has held, as usual during the past year, its annual and semi-annual meetings. The fifth annual meeting was held in Trinity Church, Princeton, Oct. 28, 1880. Ten parishes were represented.

After the opening services interesting addresses were delivered by the Bishop of the Diocese, Bishop Spaulding and Bishop Hare. The society received with great regret the resignation, in consequence of removal from the Diocese, of Miss Taylor as Secretary and Treasurer.

The usual election followed, resulting in a re-election of the previous officers, with the exception of Miss Tweedy, who was elected as Secretary and Treasurer.

After the business meeting Miss Emery made a short address followed by Dr. Syles, who spoke of the missionary work in Japan.

The semi-annual meeting was held at Trinity Church, Mt. Holly, on Wednesday, May 25, 1881. At the calling of the roll, twenty-two parishes were represented and one hundred ladies present.

In a short and feeling address, Bishop Scarborough paid a touching tribute to the memory of the late Mrs. Paddock, a name so dear to all workers of the Auxiliary, after which, it was directed by the unanimous vote of all present, that a letter, conveying the sympathy of the members of the Auxiliary be sent to Bishop Paddock.

You have now before you the account of our winter's work in Domestic Missions. It is larger than any previous year. But we cannot compute the value of our contributions in money. A few extracts from some letters received will better show the amount of good accomplished. To the Secretary of one of our best regulated parish societies comes this acknowledgment of two grand boxes for a missionary's family. "The contents of both boxes were intrinsically valuable; they supplied actual wants which my salary would hardly have enabled me to supply. This one thing alone entitles you to the sincere and earnest thanks of every member of the family, because each one of us has been generously remembered. But this, after all, is the least cause of gratitude. The words of cheer, of sympathy, which have been sent to us, the evident heartiness and love which have gone into these two boxes, the marks of consideration shown in forwarding the warm clothing at the beginning of winter; all these things unite in proving to us that the donors have been actuated in the their work by love of the same Master for whose church we are all working. I feel that

we shall all be more satisfied in our Western home, and will be enabled to work more heartily in the cause of Christ and His Church, in consequence of your kindness thus manifested."

From the South comes another thankful letter. "The valuable and welcome box came all safe last Friday; the surplice is elegant, the suit of clothes is handsome and fits well. The clothing for my wife and little daughter is nice. The little Moses in his basket with his covering of gold (worth eleven shekels of the Sanctuary) is not only useful and valuable, but very ornamental. On my writing table he will remind me continually of the all wise Providence of God, of the types and shadows of the Redeemer, of the law over which Grace rises all powerful, and many other things; but especially of that most Christian love of the brethren, which looks beyond the uses and enjoyment of one's own field to help and bless those afar. A like valuable gift of a golden coin was found in the upper hem of one of my wife's garments. We both, or all three, bear upon our hearts remembrances of our brothers' and sisters' kindness to cheer us in our efforts to do good, and moving us to pray for power and opportunity to do good ourselves also more abundantly."

Still another writes. "On opening the barrel we found its contents in good order, and every article taken out is of excellent quality and suitability which have exceeded our most sanguine expectations. My wife and daughter are very much pleased with the kind, generous and excellent selection of the articles sent for their use, and for which they are most grateful to the noble-hearted ladies, composing the aid society. For the several and useful articles sent for my wear and benefit, I beg the good ladies to accept my cordial thanks. I need not enumerate particulars, but feeling as I do, with an overflowing heart of gratitude, I will say, that every article sent for use, so good and so well adapted for my comfort, calls forth my warmest feelings of love, and best wishes for those generous hearts and willing hands that have thus ministered to my wants and those of my dear wife and daughter. Though last, yet not least, to be thanked for their admirable selection of the clothing sent me, are the young men of the Bible class. The quality of the material, and the exactness of the fit of the same, are as satisfactory as could be wished for to suit in every particular. Please convey to those dear, young men my grateful thanks and best wishes for their spiritual and eternal welfare. May God

bless them in their study of His precious word, and, by the teaching of His Holy Spirit may they be duly qualified for usefulness in the church militant, and for eternal happiness in the church triumphant, through Christ Jesus; there to meet together, arrayed in the glorious robes of His righteousness, as members of the Sacramental Host of the Triune Jehovah."

Even a dear, little girl with the evident tokens of a first letter, says: "I am so much obliged to all you kind ladies for all the nice things you sent me. I think the doll is lovely; I am so much obliged to you for putting buttons on her clothes, so I can undress her. I am so glad to get the bureau to keep her clothes in. Your loving, little Belle." How encouraging and appreciative these returns from our correspondents, and how they cheer our busy workers. Let them stimulate to greater zeal in the future.

One of our most efficient Secretaries, who has the duty for two parishes, during the last winter with hands crippled by the care of a dear invalid, reports two very large boxes sent to missionaries in the West and still feels anxious for the work to go on.

Shrewsbury has been to-day placed last upon our list, because they have not only finished one good box, but have already begun another. This way has been proved to work excellently, as by planning and beginning another during the summer months, the missionary is not obliged to wait until mid-winter for his supplies, but has his box and warm clothing in good season for the severe weather. In other branches we find our work progressing. For the Indian department, if not such large gifts in money, yet the call of Bishop Hare has met with a most noble response among our women. Surely there must be a large shelf in the Niobrara store-room filled with comfortables from New Jersey.

Then our Vice-President for Freedmen and Mormons acknowledges that the pledge made for Bishop Tuttle's lady assistant was made up and doubled again. She writes: "My appeal has been answered very generally and generously. I was surprised, indeed, asking for only a small sum that the amount became so large; I had such bright, cheery letters too with the offerings. Going forth begging, it was pleasant to be so received and answered."

The work among the Freedmen also progresses, and Mrs. Buford's, as well as other schools in the South have been assisted.

In our Foreign work we have never expected a very large sum for our treasury, as the collections are mostly taken in each church

and forwarded by the Rector to the Board of Missions. Yet we feel encouraged that the women are learning that if charity does begin at home, it shall not stop there. In one department we feel sorry to see a falling off in the usual interest. This may not be the reason why our report for Mexico is so small this year, still may we not hope that having put our hands to the plough for our neighbors there, the recollection of the name that infant church bears, will lead us in the future, even through discouragements, to make our contributions to the Church of Jesus as large as our loyal hearts could wish, in memory of His great love to us.

We now turn to the Diocesan Branch and bring our thoughts nearer home again. You will see that our Vice-President has inaugurated a different style of report this year. She has told us of the work done for our Diocese and its missionaries, and has shown that the same anxiety to do everything in aid of our Bishop still continues to actuate the workers. Then in response to his desire, she has collected what information she could, in regard to all branches of woman's work, among our parishes, not that this will interfere with the Rector's parochial reports at convention, but that the Bishop may know exactly what all his helpers do in every good work at home. By this you will learn of the labors of our individual parishes. In every department in which women engage, this report will be furnished hereafter as an encouragement to other churches.

Not in a spirit of self gratulation or boasting, the desire for work for the Master is the gift of the spirit of love, the thought is not our own, the loving duty, our little offerings for the great love shown us all in God's gift of His dear son. The consecrated life finds its delight in thus using the one talent it may be. In such devoted lives there are sacrifices of which sometimes we know but little. One woman, whose education and refinement fit her for many good works, was asked by her Rector to oversee the linen used in the chancel. For years has she shown her steady delight in this service of love, and with her own hands has kept the table cloth which adorns the Holy Feast, spotless as it should be.

Another has devoted years to sewing school work. Among children whose opportunities are small for this great need. Though the rooms be close and uninviting, yet week after week finds her at her post of usefulness, giving up the housekeeper's busiest day, and meeting her reward in the knowledge of reward done to many homes.

So amongst us are many followers of Florence Nightingale, though we may not mention their deeds of love in hospital work. The employment and nourishment societies for the relief of the poor and the sick, the preparation of garments for the children of the Sunday schools, are all deeds of love quietly performed. So may we one and all "thank God and take courage" knowing that each duty well performed will fit us for the next.

I received leaflets from Miss Emery in regard to the Mission work among the Plantation Negroes of Georgia, which I have sent in packages to forty parishes, or addresses. The contributions toward the establishment and support of schools in this fearfully malarial district were desired to be sent to Miss Emery. I cannot know if any have given. Religious instruction is greatly needed among this ignorant people. Owing to the climate, they are much isolated. Their sense of right and wrong is very indefinite. So few can go to them to do them good. There are those, however, who, with the means provided them to live, are ready to instruct

them to be better men and women ; to teach them of God and of the way of holiness. I shall be glad if this work among the Freed-men should receive some consideration at this time.

There have been expenses for stationery and postage, for which there will be no charge.
