## Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

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The New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions held its sixth annual meeting in Christ Church, New Brunswick, on Thursday, October 27th. Delegates from eighteen parishes were present. After the opening services, Bishop Scarborough made a brief address, commending the work of the Society thus by his words, as well as by his attendance, giving, as he has done from the beginning, strength and encouragement to the women of the Auxiliary.

At the close of his remarks he introduced Arch-Deacon Kirkby, of England, who gave an interesting account of his labors among the Indians of British America.

Dr. Twing was also present and made the closing address.

At the business meeting, the election of officers being in order, Mrs. F. S. Conover was elected as Vice-President of Foreign Missions; Mrs. Hale as Vice-President of Missions to the Freedmen, and Mrs. Clarkson as Vice-President of the Mexican League, Mrs. Vought and Miss Reed having declined a re-election. With these exceptions the old officers were re-instated.

Resolutions expressing great sorrow at the loss the members of the Auxiliary had sustained in the death of Mrs. Robert Bowne, the Vice-President of the Mexican Branch, were adopted. It was, moreover, unanimously resolved as a fitting memorial to her, that the parishes of the Auxiliary should establish a scholarship in the City of Mexico to be known as the Mrs. Anne F. Bowne scholarship.

The Rev. Mr. Kenny, of Cuba, being present, in a short address made an earnest plea for reading matter for the hospital at Havana.

The semi-annual meeting was held at St. John's Chapel, Elizabeth, on Tuesday, May 30th. The attendance was prompt and full, twenty-eight parishes being largely represented.

A constitution was adopted, and interesting papers and letters were read bearing upon the different branches of missionary work.

The amount of money raised last year by the Woman's Auxiliary shows an increase of \$6,080.69 over that obtained the previous year, of which \$2,863.96 represents the increase in Mission Work, and the remaining \$3,216.76 the increase in money raised by women in the Diocese for Church Work—a gratifying evidence of increased interest and an inspiration to renewed effort.

Since my last report the names of ten new parishes have been entered upon the roll, the Auxiliary now numbering fifty-seven parishes.

A few extracts may be excused, as some of them are the grateful tokens of love to their helpful friends at home.

DEAR MRS——Your very kind letter was duly received. The box came day before yesterday and contents agreed with your list. It is impossible for me to explain my thankfulness to you and the ladies of the guild. When I tell you that I am my own kitchen-maid, you will see how great a relief your box brought to me.

Everything is so good and so pretty, the sacques and flannel wrapper especially; please to thank Mrs. A—— for me, I think her eyesight must be something wonderful, as you said they are pretty enough for the street. Please give her my love. Give my thanks



to the children for the quilt, and to every one for all the pretty things that came. I hope I have expressed myself so you can see how delighted and grateful I am. Tell the ladies, I hope they will persevere in their good work of helping missionaries. The labor is hard, but these things are bright spots in our lives and cheer and encourage us very much. May God bless you all in your efforts. I would like to hear from you again, if you feel like writing, etc.

Another, this time a clergyman, writes :

MY DEAR FRIEND: Your very kind letter of the 15th, was duly received, and to-day the box, a most generous gift from your society, has arrived. We have not yet seen its contents, for I have to go three miles to get it, but from letters we are quite satisfied that it will prove enough to make glad our hearts for a long time to come. I know quite as well as if I had seen them, how nice they are, and feel that love to the Master, prompted the kind deed. Our Christmas joys will be increased much by the coming of such a generous donation for our comfort. May the Father who gave His Son for us, fill up the measure of your rejoicing, by the bestowal of His perfect peace.

Please present our united thanks to Dr. and Mrs. ——— and to all the dear friends, who so kindly helped in this good work and believe me your very thankful brother.

Another lady writes :

I can scarcely find words with which to express our heart-felt gratitude for these kind and helpful gifts. Could you and the other kind donors have witnessed the unpacking of the box, and heard the children's exclamations of delight, you would have more fully realized the blessedness of giving. So many garments for our little ones, and made up too, thus saving us so much expense, and me so many weary stitches. Lloyd's suit was a pleasant surprise to him. It fits so beautifully and is very becoming to our fine-looking boy. The little girls are very glad to have the hats, pretty dresses and good supply of underclothing. The table-cloth and towels are very acceptable, and so are the unexpected groceries, soap, etc. All of us are fond of reading and are very glad to have the interesting books and papers. Dr. E—— sends special thanks for that nice good book, Riles Commentary on St. Matthew. I am much pleased to have the much needed sewing materials, scissors, pins and hairpins. How thoughtful to send even darning needles and cotton.



We hope that each kind contributor, who spent Lent in thus ministering to our comfort, had a glad and happy Easter, and pray and believe that each one will be amply rewarded by Him for whose sake this kindly work was done. You can scarcely realize what a help, comfort and encouragement your valuable gifts are to us.

From year to year we are glad to find our work steadily increasing. A parish makes a box for a missionary in the west or south. Hearts are stirred, hands are at work and the interest gradually deepens. It may be near Christmas time, when the box is ready for packing. Full of the thought of our own happiness in family Christmas gifts, one member after another of the missionary's household is remembered, and toys, confections and pretty articles of ornament and dress are gladly contributed to make another family joyous at this time of Christian good will and peace. The refined, well educated missionary may have been the companion in study of our own Rector, and he will have his heart gladdened, his pulses stirred, as from the depths of this box so heavily laden with warm winter wraps and comfortable clothing, he draws forth his own share of these loving gifts. Some volumes of instructive and pleasant reading will add much to the well worn library, which perhaps has seldom been enlarged since he left the theological seminary. Could we witness some of these happy occasions when, after days or weeks of waiting, the expected box is opened in a parsonage home and every child anxiously looks for his or her gifts so lovingly inscribed with their names, and just what they seem most to have desired, our eyes would surely moisten, and our hearts respond, "they shall have such pleasure every year while we are spared to work for them, as we well know how truly it is more blessed to give than to receive."

I should like to add a few words to my statistical report of women's work in the Diocese.

For the year ending May, 1880, I reported to you \$726.19; for the year ending May, 1881, \$4,529.15, and to-day \$10,009.33—think of the increase?

Figures are dry and fail, in my thinking, to touch the hearts and impress the mind with the good work they really represent. So let me call to your attention, in another way, what this large sum represents. Mothers' Meetings and Sewing Schools—two glorious methods of work among God's poor—for in teaching the mothers and children to help themselves you teach them to respect themselves. I am very glad they are so steadily upon the increase; before another year has passed, I trust each parish will report a mothers' meeting and a sewing school; make a beginning if only with one mother and one child.

Employment societies, clothing the children and perhaps providing warm garments for the hard working fathers, all neatly made by the poor wife and mother. You little know the comfort it is to her to be helped to make comfortable her dear ones.

Parish Homes for sick and infirm and Nourishing Committees, supplying pure air, quiet, good care, good nourishment and loving ministrations from Christian hands. Let us double our efforts during the next year. Our Saviour left his poor to us.

Before closing, I must say a word of the loving work done by the



women for God's House. As I look down my report, I see large sums raised for Church debts, and Church and Rectory repairs, for salary of assistant minister, and in one case for an organ, Chancel Committees, Sunday School Libraries, choir expenses, vestments, etc. One Secretary writes: "For twenty-three years an elderly lady of our Parish has had entire charge of the linen and Communion service, preparing herself the bread and wine for each celebration. And one poor woman has kept clean and fresh the surplices without pay" because it was all she could do. Added to all this many noble workers in the mission field of this Diocese, have had their hearts made glad by boxes filled with many comforts. This is women's work.
