Constitution.

I.

NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general Missionary Work of the Church, to communicate Missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

III.

OFFICERS.

The Officers of this Society shall consist of a President, five Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary and Treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from Parish Societies, at the Annual Meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties, as usually appertain to that office. The President and Vice-Presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedman, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The Secretary and Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, preparing and reading the minutes of each meeting.

V.

REPRESENTATION.

Any Parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a Secretary, and notifying the President. The Secretary of the Parish Society is expected to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, and they *alone* correspond with the Secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each Parish shall send to the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, two or more delegates.

VI.

VOTES.

Two votes are allowed from each Parish. (If Delegates disagree, the votes are lost.)

VII.

MEETINGS.

Two Meetings will be held, Annual and Semi-Annual, and Special Meetings may be appointed by the President, at the call of four or more Parishes.

VIII.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote, at any Annual Meeting.

Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

The record of work done during the past year by the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shows very encouraging results and undiminished interest. Three new parishes have assisted in the work, and it is earnestly hoped that others who have not helped in the past will, during the ensuing year, report some work done for missions through the Woman's Auxiliary,

Two meetings—the annual and semi-annual—have been held as usual. It is to be regretted that all the parishes of the diocese are not represented at these meetings, for by the assembling together and conference of the members a great impetus is given to Missionary work.

The annual meeting was held at Trinity Church, Moorestown, on Thursday, October 19th, delegates from eighteen parishes being present. At the close of the services Bishop Scarborough made an earnest address, in which he spoke of the necessity of greater efforts for the future in behalf of Foreign Missions.

At the business meeting, the annual election of officers being in order, the old officers were re-elected, with the exception of Miss Thompson, who takes the place of Mrs. Merritt, as vice president of Indian Missions, and Miss Tuthill that of Mrs. Conover, as vice president of Foreign Missions.

The president, Mrs. Clark, then read her annual address, in which the work of the Auxiliary was clearly defined and valuable suggestions made for the work of the coming year.

The Rev. Dr. Syles being present, spoke briefly upon the subject of Missions in China and Japan.

The semi-annual meeting was held at St. Michael's Church, Trenton, on Wednesday, May 16. Delegates from twenty-seven parishes were found to be present, who made with others a large and attentive congregation.

At the morning service addresses were made by Bishop Scarborough and the Rev. Mr. Thomson, for many years a missionary in China.

At the business meeting appropriate resolutions in reference to the death of Rev. Dr. Twing were unanimously adopted.

The Treasurer reports \$71.30 as the sum of ten cent assessments collected from the members of the Auxiliary of twenty-seven parishes, in accordance with the following resolution, adopted at the annual meeting :

Resolved, That each member of the Auxiliary be assessed ten cents annually toward a general missionary fund.

After the transaction of business the Auxiliary listened to an address from Mrs. Thomson, who gave her own interesting experiences in China. This was followed by a short address from Miss Emery.

Twenty-two boxes from Domestic Branch sent to missionaries North, South, East and West, with four to our own Diocesan missionaries, makes the number twenty-six for the winter's work.

The monied valuation gives no idea of the true worth of these boxes. For one moment let us consider what the preparation of a

box involves. If possible, in our own minds, let us compute the number of stitches put into the manufactured garments—the plans devised, the weeks when busy women, untiring in their devotion, are giving the work of brain, hearts and hands, to say nothing of the miles their feet travel to carry out these liberal designs. Is it any wonder that when spring comes they feel the need of rest?

And yet the delight which a cheerful response from the missionary's pen seems fully to compensate for all these labors, and renders them anxious to begin work again when the time draws near. One letter received this year, says of a box: "It came in a very acceptable time. Words can hardly express my thanks to you and the kind ladies of your noble and beneficent society; everything in the box is very useful and satisfactory. It is very cheering in this far Western country, out on the frontiers, in the midst of so much religious indifference, to be remembered by kind and Christian friends. But, notwithstanding the religious indifference, the ignorance of adults, and their extreme aversion to the Church, I have much to be thankful for and to rejoice over as the fruits of two years' hard work. God has made me the instrument of bringing many souls into the Church. Pray that God will bless the work among us, and send us more laborers. May Heaven's benediction rest on you and your noble society."

When one of the colored clergymen of the West writes such a letter, we may well thank God and take courage.

A missionary in the South expresses his gratitude to the ladies for their "kindness in sending us such a valuable box; it will give comfort to many a needy one. The box came at the time we had called the children together for a little entertainment, and if you could have seen the sparkling eyes and bright faces of those who were poorly clad at the prospect of having their wants supplied, you would have felt amply repaid for your labor in preparing them such valuable presents. Upon the part of the children, ladies of the parish and myself, accept our hearty thanks for your kindness. I pray that the richest blessings of Heaven may rest upon you, with the best wishes of the season. Yours, etc."

When at our last meeting it was proposed to contribute a tangible expression of good wishes to the Fanny C. Paddock Memorial Hospital, of Tacoma, it seemed a question whether the Diocese could undertake such a work in connection with all our other claims. But we were not disappointed in the women of New Jersey. As soon

as the call was sent out for a Lenten effort, glad responses met us on every side. And when after Easter the packing began, it was a doubtful matter how it should be accomplished, so full and fast flowed in the loving contributions of boxes, barrels and packages. The wealth of the donation filled three large cases from New Jersey. One box, packed at Woodbury, carried the good will of that parish to Tacoma, and the others, weighing over 1,000 pounds, were sent from Elizabeth to their destination on the Western coast, assisted by the kindness of the railroads to San Francisco. Touching, indeed, were many of the gifts. Little hands of boys, as well as girls, made picture-books and cards. Children put their first stitches into patchwork spreads, to gladden the eyes of the sick.

Women who had almost laid down life's burdens, and were waiting the Master's call, again took up their needles to fashion little comforts for suffering invalids. One young girl, confined for weeks to her couch by a sad accident, with heartfelt sympathy for others, made an elegant scrap-book of cards and pictures as her contribution of love. Other invalids sent from sick rooms their loving appreciative offerings. Housekeepers added stores of nourishing food and delicacies, and the bed linen—towels, blankets, comfortables and hospital wraps were in almost fabulous numbers. New Jersey women have, indeed, come to the front, and we record the gifts of twenty-four parishes aiding in this memorial work.

While our total amount is but little over one hundred dollars in excess of last year's report, the interest in work shows that we shall continue to do more and more in the future. Again we are led to feel that *money* does not measure the *value* of our gifts, and whatever has been done as to our Father in Heaven will in no wise lose its reward.
