Constitution.

I.

NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.

OBJECT.

The object of this society is to interest all women in the general Missionary Work of the Church, to communicate Missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

III.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, five Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary and Treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from Parish Societies, at the Annual Meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties, as usually appertain to that office. The President and Vice-Presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedman, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The Secretary and Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, preparing and reading the minutes of each meeting.

V.

REPRESENTATION.

Any Parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a Secretary, and notifying the President. The Secretary of the Parish Society is expected to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, and they *alone* correspond with the Secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each Parish shall send to the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, two or more delegates.

VI.

VOTES.

Two votes are allowed from each Parish. (If Delegates disagree, the votes are lost.)

VII.

MEETINGS.

Two meetings will be held, Annual and Semi-Annual, and Special Meetings may be appointed by the President, at the call of four or more Parishes.

VIII.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote, at any Annual Meeting.

Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

In summing up the work of the Auxiliary for the year just ended, we find that our receipts have fallen short of the preceding one, but we must not attribute it to diminished interest.

We record with grateful appreciation what has been accomplished, and trust that fresh energy and zeal will be infused into the work during the coming year.

While the contributions for Domestic Missions have not equalled those of last year, an increased interest has been shown for the Freedmen, and more has been done for them than ever before. The pledge of \$100, which was made a year ago in response to a special appeal from Mrs. Buford for the endowment of a free bed in the Hospital at Lawrenceville, Va., has been redeemed.

In answer to an earnest appeal for money to provide for the education of the children of Foreign Missionaries, New Jersey has given \$50.

The Scholarships supported by the Auxiliary are eight in number—two in China, one in Africa, four in Mexico and one among the Indians.

The "Ten Cent Missionary Assessment Fund" amounts this year to \$84.80, thirty-four parishes having paid their annual dues. It is hoped that in future this small assessment will be collected in every parish.

During the past year two meetings have been held, the annual and semi-annual. The annual meeting was held in St. Mary's Church, Burlington, on Wednesday, October 24th, twenty-three parishes being largely represented. Most interesting addresses were made by Bishop Scarborough, Bishop Garrett of Northern Texas, and Mr. Herbert Welsh of Philadelphia.

At the annual election of officers for the ensuing year, the old officers were reinstated. After the transaction of business, the President, Mrs. Clark read her annual address. She was followed by Mrs. Spaulding who spoke of the work in Colorado and especially of the needs of St. Luke's Hospital, Denver.

The semi-annual meeting was held at Christ Church, South Amboy, on Wednesday, May 14th. Representatives from twenty-one parishes were present. At the opening service, Bishop Scarborough made an address in which he spoke earnestly of the work and influence of the Auxiliary.

While Domestic Missions have not as large an amount to report this year, some of the other Branches have been more prosperous. But we have something very hopeful for the future to bring to your notice to-day. In no year has there been more interest in Missions among the young; several junior Missionary Societies have been organized in different parishes, and their work grand for a beginning. It is only necessary to show our children the pleasure of being helpful to others, and they will be ready to take up our work when we are called to lay it down.

The letters received from families of Missionaries to whom boxes have been sent are unusually interesting. There have been so many, it was hard to choose for our meeting to-day. After expressing her gratitude, for one of the boxes, a Missionary's wife writes thus—"I cannot find words to express all my heart feels, when these kind remembrances come so far, and from unknown friends; and again let me thank you for so much

kindness. My husband has his hands full and works far too hard for his strength, which makes me uneasy about him ; his energy surpasses anything I ever knew, he has enough I tell him for two people—with his church here, with three Missionary points and a school of fifty-four pupils, he is hard at work almost day and night, for night is his only time for reading and preparing sermons. He has two teachers to assist in school, and after Christmas I hope to be able to take some of his classes, so as to rest him, or rather to give him more time to read and visit." Then the Missionary himself writes—"Your box has proved such a comfort. We have had arctic weather here for many days. But for your blankets, I do not know what would have become of us. I wish I could speak to your ladies and society. Please say to them that one box, such as sent to us, speaks louder for Christ and His cause, than all the most eloquent sermons. 'Let us not love in word and tongue, but in deeds.'"

From Bishop Tuttle's diocese come many thanks to New Jersey this year—one writes : "The box arrived on Saturday, and was duly deposited on the back porch, where some of the family proceeded to open it. I could only watch them through the window, an account of having a severe cold. We had expected a good box, as Mrs. Tuttle had intimated as much to us ; but we had not hoped for half so many or so nice things. We can't understand why you should go to so much expense and labor for those you do not know nor have ever seen.

"We thank you all who helped in making up the box. Thanks at best seem such a poor return for so munificent a gift ; but how much poorer they appear when *written* than if we could thank you by spoken words."

A letter from the far West expresses the satisfaction of a Missionary's wife for a helpful box, "It is impossible for me to express our thanks. Our wants are fully met. My husband has not been so comfortably clothed in many years. The cloak is so warm it will defy the prairie winds. He will take his eighteen miles' ride next Saturday morning, wearing his warm clothing. He will not soon forget the kindness of your ladies."

After mentioning how well the garments fitted each child, she writes, "May God bless you all for providing so bountifully for the children."

Can any mother's heart help responding in sympathy with this mother's happy contentment, knowing, as we do, that there are diversities of opinion about the wisdom of sending boxes.

Shall we not take courage from such successes and continue as heretofore to provoke others "unto love and good works."

This report shows a total somewhat less than last year, but we must not consider it an indication of lessening interest, but rather the effect of circumstances which render a full report impossible. Late in February, as most of you know, a fire swept away one of Bishop Hare's most flourishing schools; soon the appeal came, asking what New Jersey could do to assist in repairing the loss, it was at a time when most of the parishes were engaged on pledged work, but the matter was laid before many of them and was well responded to, but it was so late only a few have been able to report the work finished and give the amount, but if the dollars and cents equal the cordial expressions of interest from most of them, in this added task after a busy winter, I think the total will be very satisfactory. In concluding my report I must allude to the pleasure the friends of the Indians must take in the growth of the work of the Indian Rights Society. By their efforts the Bill to correct many of the abuses under which these Indians have been suffering, has passed the Senate which is, we hope, a step towards its final passage in the House, and has awakened the interest of some of the best papers.

Those who listened to Mr. Welsh at our last meeting and know how much he had this at heart, will feel that the efforts and prayers he asked for have not been unavailing.

Let us give thanks for this little ray where all has been so dark and pray on for still broader light.
