Constitution.

I.

NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general Missionary Work of the Church, to communicate Missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

III.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, five Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary and Treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from Parish Societies, at the Annual Meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The Presidents and Vice-Presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedman, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The Secretary and Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, preparing and reading the minutes of each meeting.

V.

REPRESENTATION.

Any Parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a Secretary, and notifying the President. The Secretary of the Parish Society is expected to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, and they *alone* correspond with the Secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each Parish shall send to the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, two or more delegates.

VI.
VOTES.

Two votes are allowed from each Parish. (If delegates disagree, the votes are lost.)

VII.
MEETINGS.

Two meetings will be held, Annual and Semi-Annual, and Special Meetings may be appointed by the President, at the call of four or more Parishes.

VIII.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting.

Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

The New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions held its Tenth Annual Meeting at St. John's Church, Elizabeth, on Wednesday, October 20th. The meeting was one of much interest and was attended by delegates from nineteen parishes. The elections for the ensuing year resulted in the re-instatement of the old officers.

In order to increase missionary interest and thereby extend the work of the Auxiliary, it was resolved to sub-divide the Diocese into districts, each district to hold its meetings, the yearly meeting of the entire Branch to be held hereafter at Trenton in the spring.

Interesting addresses were made by the Bishop and the Rev. Dr. Langford. The meeting was also addressed by Miss Emery and by Mrs. Brewer, wife of the Missionary Bishop of Montana, who gave a brief account of church work in Montana, speaking especially of the need of a hospital. In response to her appeal, the sum of twenty-five dollars was immediately voted from the general fund for this object.

The semi-annual meeting was held at Trinity Church, Trenton, on Wednesday, May 19th. At the opening service, an address was made by the Bishop. Nineteen parishes were well represented.

The President read an address giving a review of the work of the past year after which she presented the report of the Committee for the division of the Diocese which was adopted and is as follows :

The Committee on the division of the Diocese, report that they have divided it into Upper, Middle and Lower. Each to be represented by a Corresponding Secretary to the present Auxiliary Secretary.

The Upper Division consists of the parishes situated in the four counties, namely Hunterdon, Somerset, Union and Middlesex. This Division comprises :—

President's Annual Report.

The first lesson taught us by the reports from all the Branches this year, is, that our women of the Auxiliary need only to know of distress at once to attempt relief.

In the depth of the past winter, through the daily papers, came loud calls for the poor Basket Makers of Rockland County, New York State.

Immediately the hearts were stirred, and many willing hands busied themselves to help these needy ones. The result we have just heard.

We feel that our Lenten work has taken a new impulse, and almost every parish does some special service at that season.

It has been a great source of pleasure and gratitude that in places where there are two or more parishes, they have found the benefit of united work. Nothing can, we think, serve a better purpose to bind as in *one* all the women of our Church, when together they pray and work in the service of our Lord and Master, who has given us all we enjoy of life, and to whom surely we owe the small duty we are able to pay.

We cannot but feel that the past year has been one of gain for our own Auxiliary. More interest in all the Branches, and many more of the young encouraged to work. In our efforts for the foreign field, scholarships and schools aided, return us four-fold in interest for all we can do for them. Letters from China, Japan and India have cheered the hearts of many workers.

There has, we think, been an added zeal in the cause of the colored population of our own Country. Perhaps nothing gives greater ardor to work, than visits we have had from laborers fresh from these different fields, with their graphic pictures of the real needs among their people.

The Indian cause is, we trust, advancing. Certainly there are cheering accounts from the various stations.

A new interest has been aroused in the *Spirit of Missions*,

so ably edited and enriched by the pen of our General Secretary, whom many of us value so deeply and lovingly.

At our last meeting, in October, our Bishop gave utterance to a wish that all parishes in his Diocese might take up the work of the "Girls' Friendly Society." It gives me pleasure to report two parishes as Associates in this effort for the well being of girls in our working classes. Christ Church, South Amboy, and St. John's, Camden, besides one unattached Associate at New Brunswick; and we hope the day is not distant when we shall have many more of our women interested in this good work.

I must remind you that the Enrolment Fund will be called for before our work commences in the Fall. Let each one find the sum promised ready in her mite chest, and it would be a good aid to the mission cause this Summer, if each member will secure another five dollars from some other communicant, to add to her own gift, before it is sent to the Bishop, who we trust will have a fitting large offering to present from New Jersey, which now holds the *eighth* place in the statistics of our Board of Missions for the last year's receipts.

May we not take for our future guidance in good works, the lesson of the wisest Preacher, as he counsels us to, "withhold not good from them to whom it is due, when it is in the power of thine hand to do it."

Charles Cook, Pine Ridge Agency. "These people live so with, and in, their Prayer Books and Hymnals, that truly these two weapons of the Church, I do believe, win more souls in a year than all the sermons delivered in a twelvemonth. For a long time there were but nine in a congregation of two hundred worshippers, now, we have about sixty, but if you could interest any person to send us some of these books, we should be most thankful." In this way even a few dollars may do good work.
