Constitution.

I.

NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general Missionary Work of the Church, to communicate Missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

III.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, five Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary and Treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from Parish Societies, at the Annual Meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The Presidents and Vice-Presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedman, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The Secretary and Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, preparing and reading the minutes of each meeting.

V.

REPRESENTATION.

Any Parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President. The Secretary of the Parish Society is expected to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, and they *alone* correspond with the Secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each Parish shall send to the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, two or more delegates.

VI.

VOTES.

Two votes are allowed from each Parish. (If delegates disagree, the votes are lost.)

VII.

MEETINGS.

Two meetings will be held, Annual and Semi-Annual, and Special Meetings may be appointed by the President, at the call of four or more Parishes.

VIII.

AMENDMENTS.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting.

Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

The New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions held its eleventh annual meeting at Trinity Church, Trenton, on Wednesday, May 18th. The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion and made an address, being assisted in the services by the Rev. H. M. Barbour (the rector of the parish) and the Rev. J. McA. Harding.

Delegates from thirty-two parishes attended the business meeting—an increase in representation of thirteen parishes over that of last year.

The elections for the ensuing year resulted in the reinstatement of the old officers.

The reports of the Corresponding Secretaries of the Upper, Middle and Lower Divisions showed that the frequent meetings held during the past year with their instructive addresses and discussions had added fresh life and enthusiasm to missionary work.

In the Upper Division, by means of systematic offerings the sum of \$67.42 had been raised, which was divided between Domestic and Foreign Missions. In the Lower Division, the sum of \$22.19 had been contributed and devoted to general missions.

It being thought advisable that the annual meeting of the Auxiliary should be held before that of the Diocesan Convention, a resolution was passed changing the day to the last Wednesday in April.

The reports from the Vice-Presidents of money and boxes sent to the different departments of the mission field were called for and showed the following results:

Report of Upper Division of the Diocese of New Jersey.

Three meetings have been held in the Upper Division during the fall and winter—one in November, at Elizabeth, with Mrs. Williamson; one in January, at Plainfield, with the ladies of the Church of the Holy Cross; and one in March with the ladies of New Brunswick, in the Chapel of St. John Evangelist. These were all well attended, between sixty-five and seventy-five ladies being present. Addresses of interest and power were given by Mrs. Schereschewsky and Miss Carter. These meetings are considered as experimental in a measure and introductory to greater results another year.

Some encouraging features may be noted. The matter of systematic offerings to Missions has been discussed and tried in several parishes with the following result:

From Grace Church, Plainfield, the sum of \$38.89 has been collected for the past six months; from Holy Cross, Plainfield, \$18.53; from St. Luke's, Roselle, \$6.00; from Trinity Church, Woodbridge, \$4.00; making altogether a total of \$67.42.

Can we not see even greater results another year in this direction?

Other sums have been also raised in the Division. Sixteen dollars was sent to Miss Thompson for the Indian Work (for a special case of need) by the ladies of Holy Cross and Grace Parishes, also more than one hundred dollars was sent to Mrs. Williamson for Diocesan Work.

Another hopeful feature is the fact that many have expressed a desire for "all day" meetings next year so that more time can be given for conference, reports from each parish represented, and discussion of methods of work, etc.

And still another most satisfactory result has been the awakened desire for united work in the parishes of Plainfield, and consequently during Lent the ladies of Holy Cross and Grace Churches worked together and sent off a most valuable and generous box to a missionary in Alabama, including even a trousseau and silver to an expectant bride, which gave unexpected satisfaction to the young lady and her parents. And this working together during Lent made the united action of the two parishes still more satisfactory in preparing and serving the collation during the late Convention in Plainfield—both the luncheon and Convention leaving a pleasant impression with all who enjoyed either.

On the whole, we think the experience in our Upper Division has

demonstrated the wisdom of the plan of dividing the Diocese, thus making more frequent meetings possible and thereby promoting increased and cordial interest in parishes adjacent to each other, and also in the great work of Missions.

Report of Middle Division.

There have been three meetings of the Parishes in the Middle Division of the Diocese since our last annual meeting in Trenton. The first was in Princeton in October; the second in Trinity Church, Trenton, on the 17th of November; and the last in Freehold, March 3d.

None of these meetings were very largely attended owing to a variety of causes, among which were bad weather, difficulty of access, and want of knowledge of the Women's Auxiliary and its ways of working. In spite of these difficulties we have had much to encourage us. Although the meetings were small, much interest was aroused and the work done very satisfactory.

At the meeting in Freehold, in March, it was proposed that the Division should unite in making up a "hospital box," each parish giving what it could and sending them all together. This plan was adopted and the result was extremely gratifying. Seven parishes sent contributions and, as the packages began to arrive in Easter-week, it was very pleasant to open them and see the nice things. Where all were so acceptable, it will not do to make comparisons, but I cannot help mentioning the little box containing an infant's outfit sent by the members of St. Agnes Guild, Trenton. The little clothes were so pretty and so well made that they excited great admiration. We had sheets, pillow cases, underwear suitable for hospital use, many delicacies of various kinds, in fact, all that was most needed. We sent a large box, worth at least \$90, to St. Luke's Hospital, Denver. I hope the kind friends who helped us will continue their interest in Mission Work and that the Middle Division of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will increase in zeal and good works as each year goes on.
