Constitution.

I.

NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general Missionary Work of the Church, to communicate Missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

III.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, five Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary and Treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from Parish Societies, at the Annual Meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The President shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The President and Vice-Presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedman, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

V.

REPRESENTATION.

Any Parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a Secretary and notifying the President. The Secretary of the Parish Society is expected to correspond with the Diocesan Officers, and they

alone correspond with the Secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each Parish shall send to the Annual and Semi-Annual Meetings, two or more delegates.

VI.

VOTES.

Two votes are allowed from each Parish. (If delegates disagree, the votes are lost.)

VII.

MEETINGS.

Two meetings will be held, Annual and Semi-Annual, and Special Meetings may be appointed by the President, at the call of four or more Parishes.

VIII.

AMENDMENTS.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting.

Report of the Secretary and Treasurer.

The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held at St. Michael's Church, Trenton, on Wednesday, April 25th. The meeting was a large and interesting one, and was attended by delegates from thirty-eight parishes.

The opening services consisted of the celebration of the Holy Communion and an address from the Bishop, in which he spoke of the work and needs of the Auxiliary.

At the close of the service the business meeting was organized, Mrs. Clark presiding. The elections for the ensuing year resulted in the reinstatement of the officers then serving. The reports of the Secretaries of the Divisions were read, and showed especially in the Upper and Lower Branches most encouraging signs of interest and growth.

The President read her annual report, and interesting addresses were given by different members of the Auxiliary.

From the “Ten Cent Missionary Fund,” which is raised by an assessment of ten cents upon each member of the Auxiliary, the following appropriations were made: For Scholarship in a preparatory school at Osaka, Japan, \$25.00; for Domestic Contingent Fund, \$25.00.

Two Scholarships have been established in the Japanese Theological School, to be called, respectively, the “Bishop

Scarborough" Scholarship, supported by St. Paul's, Camden, and the "Bishop Odenheimer" (in memoriam) Scholarship, supported by nine parishes of the Lower Division. The Auxiliary is also pledged for the support of a Japanese boy in a preparatory school at Osaka, Japan.

Since last May, six parishes have been added to our list: Grace Church, Crosswicks; St. Paul's, Camden; Grace Church, Westfield; St. John's, Chew's Landing; Christ Church, Middletown; and Church of the Ascension, Atlantic City.

We need the co-operation of *every* parish to respond to the earnest calls for help which come from all parts of the mission-field. In the opening of the new year, may we not hope that many more parish branches may be formed, and that *all* may realize how essential they are to the growth and prosperity of the entire work?

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The year's report for Domestic Missions has been summed up. It compares most favorably with former work, as only one year in the ten, during which we have worked together, has yielded a larger amount. About \$28,000 in boxes and money have been contributed by the New Jersey Branch in those years. We would recount the work, not in a spirit of pride or satisfaction, but with gratitude to God, who has permitted us to labor in His service.

The work of providing missionary boxes was the first effort in the cause of missions entered into by the women of our Church. As children we needed then the stimulus of seeing results. Now the outlook shows that an era of more noble self-denying work is fast approaching. Our annual meetings with reports are cheering and healthful; but the missionary spirit in our women is fostered and strengthened by the hours passed at our Division Associations. There we meet to inquire about our personal duty in the cause of missions; there we see and hear the missionaries who are doing the work we can only share. Our prayers and praises are offered with theirs to the Lord of the whole earth; we are led to ask most earnestly whether we are doing all in our power for God's glory; and we return to our homes with hearty desires to do more for that Master who accepts even our feeblest efforts in His name.

Among the different reports of mission and parochial work sent in by women during the past year, we note with pleasure a most cheering feature. This is the growing interest shown in the formation of children's societies. Every mother before me knows full well what pleasure the little ones take in helping her in all she does. How happy they are

to work as *mother* does; how glad to add their mite to the interest manifested in all they see at home. A *Boys' Guild* was mentioned in a report from one of our noblest working parishes; and why may we not have one in every church? It appears to me that were all our boys and girls interested in missionary work this year, in ten years' time our Rectors might never have to plead for missions at home or abroad. This education of the young would result in such a love for others—such delight in doing their Master's will—that we might see many offering even their own lives to the glory of God and the interests of His cause in foreign lands. Let us work for this end. No labor is too great in connection with the youth of our parishes. "Give me the children," once said a valued Rector, "and I care not who has the hearts of the men and women." No child old enough to attend church services but can be led to an ardent love for missions, if the mother loves the cause also.

To-day we have garnered the sheaves of our year of work and presented them to the Lord of the harvest, who alone seeth the motives and knoweth full well if each worker "hath done what she could." To Him be all the praise, and from Him we must await our reward.

One who labored in earnestness with us has been called to her rest. Our friend and associate, Mrs. Elvin K. Smith, has joined the company of the redeemed, and hers is now the glad refrain of the Harvest Home. May her example prove an incentive to fuller growth in grace and the love of good works, through our Lord Jesus Christ.

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This report is numerically smaller than usual, but it represents the work of more parishes than ever before, since the year 1883. There have been twelve and thirteen working for this branch; this year there are twenty.

Some preparing boxes for the far-off field could not report just now, and others sent packages after full work for other branches and naturally they could not be large, but assisted in filling boxes which have carried pleasure to many Indian children. Mr. Cook writes from Pine Ridge, thanking all who enabled him to fill so generously seven Christmas trees, one at each camp and mission station in his Agency. He says: "At each tree service, I endeavor to impress on their minds, as a consequence of God's loving Gift of His Son, these good things are sent to His children, and that the tree with its abundance is an effort to show us and help us to gain some idea of His inexhaustible blessings to usward, especially in the Gift of His only begotten Son."

If our work (small though it has been) has helped to carry home this lesson to the hearts of these people, shall we not thank God for such a privilege and continue to scatter the seeds, praying Him for the increase?

Report of Upper Division.

The work of the Upper Division during the past year presents to the interested observer many signs of growth and progress.

The experiment of “All Day” meetings has been tried successfully. The first one at Roselle in November was marked by an earnest, genial atmosphere, quickened interest in all subjects discussed, and good attendance.

Even the great blizzard of '88 could not prevent forty faithful women of the Upper Division from gathering in Plainfield on the 16th of March and holding a successful meeting; our only regret being the absence of our friends from New Brunswick, Rahway and Woodbridge, who could not reach Plainfield—because of the blockade of snow on the roads—from those points.

Several new subscribers to the Spirit of Missions have been obtained in various parishes which will yield good results in the future.

The plan of Systematic Offerings to Missions has been urged earnestly, and five parishes have responded, as follows:

This sum has been divided between the various departments of our work: Foreign, Domestic, Diocesan, Freedmen, Indian, and work in Mexico, under Rev. Mr. Gordon.

In Plainfield, a society of young ladies called the “Helping Hand,” has been formed, some of whom have contributed to the Systematic Offerings, besides taking up the preparation of a box for Bishop Talbot's Indians. Other parishes not represented in this particular way, have still been doing good work.

The Elizabeth Branch has been active, as usual, supporting a girl's school in China under Miss Thompson, and contributing also toward the “Scarborough” and “Anna Bowne” Scholarships in Mexico. The “Church League,” composed of young ladies from three parishes in Elizabeth, contribute a scholarship in Mrs. Brierly's school in Africa, and are also preparing a box for the Indians in Bishop Hare's Diocese.

We hope to secure a larger representation of parishes at our meetings next year, and also to induce women to admit the duty of giving regularly to the Board of Missions through our treasury each year by means of the Systematic Offerings. If each Church-woman in our Diocese could be led to give at least one or two dollars a year as a matter of course, what a cheering result we would find!

We all know that many important elements in our work cannot be reported. The interest awakened in individual hearts, the quiet prayers offered, the sympathy developed by the reading of missionary items, the inspiration gained by meeting with those of “kindred minds” whose hearts are alive to the importance of the work of missions—all these things cannot be reported, but are nevertheless essential to success and growth.

"Missionary work," as remarked by an able writer recently, "is sowing, not reaping; and the sowing of a plant that is slow to bear." Another writer in the Nineteenth Century, in quoting this remark, adds: "At times the difficulties and discouragements may daunt the stoutest heart and the most living faith. But God is greater than our hearts, and wider than our thoughts; and if we are able to believe in him at all, we must also believe that the ultimate triumph of Christianity is not problematical, but certain, and in His good time, across the lapse of ages, will prove to be, not local, but universal; not partial, but complete; not evanescent, but eternal."

Report of Lower Division.

Three "All-Day" meetings of the Lower Division were held during the year: At Trinity Church, Swedesboro, October 13, 1887; at St. Paul's, Camden, January 25, 1888; at Christ Church, Riverton, March 7, 1888. Eighteen parishes and three missions were represented by an average attendance of over one hundred. The Rector of each entertaining parish received the delegates with cordial words of welcome. Missionary addresses were made by Rev. John McKim, Mrs. Schereschewsky, Miss Emery, Miss Sybil Carter, Mrs. B. Williamson, Jr., Mrs. Thomas Neilson and Mrs. Samuel Clements.

The offertories amounted to \$85.55. From parishes unfamiliar with routine methods of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Corresponding Secretary has received \$278.50; all transmitted to the Vice-Presidents of the various departments.

St. Paul's, Camden, is pledged for a Scholarship, to educate a native clergyman in Japan, to be called the "Bishop Scarborough" Scholarship.

Nine parishes of the Lower Division have made up the amount necessary for another Scholarship in the Japanese Theological School, to be called the "Bishop Odenheimer" (in memoriam) Scholarship.

The Division also supports a Scholarship in the Bishop Payne School, Petersburg, Va.

The detailed results of the year's work will be found in the Department reports. "By their fruits ye shall know them."
