CONSTITUTION.

I.

NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF
MISSIONS."

II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general missionary work of the church, to communicate missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the gospel of Christ.

III.

OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a president, five vice-presidents, and a secretary and treasurer, to be chosen by the delegates from parish societies at the annual meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The president shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The president and vice-presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedmen, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The secretary and treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, preparing and reading the minutes of each meeting.

V.

REPRESENTATION.

Any parish may become a member of this Society, by appointing a secretary, and notifying the president. The sec-

retary of the parish society is expected to correspond with the diocesan officers, and they *alone* correspond with the secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

Each parish shall send to the annual meeting two or more delegates.

VI.

VOTES.

Two votes are allowed for each parish. (If delegates disagree, the votes are lost).

VII.

The annual meeting shall be held the last Wednesday of April.

There may be division meetings appointed by the corresponding secretary, with the approval of the president.

The work must be directed by the officers of the different branches, and no collections of moneys or work done be reported hereafter through the corresponding secretary, as it complicates the reports of the officers to whom they properly belong, and sometimes causes duplication of the same.

The collections at division meetings shall be used for the contingent fund of the auxiliary, and sent to the diocesan treasurer.

VIII.

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting.

REPORT OF SECRETARY AND TREASURER.

IN presenting the fifteenth report of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, it is encouraging to record not only an increase in membership, but also a substantial gain in contributions, the sum total of receipts for the past year giving an increase over the preceding of \$1,259.51.

The annual meeting was held at Trinity Church, Trenton, on Wednesday, April 30th, at 10 A. M., and was attended by delegates from thirty-four parishes. The opening service consisted of the celebration of the Holy Communion, with an address by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Rector of the Parish, the Rev. Mr. Barbour, extended a most cordial welcome to the members of the Auxiliary.

The reports of the President and Vice-Presidents of money and boxes sent to different parts of the mission field were as follows:

The Ten Cent Missionary Assessment Fund amounted to \$109.40, the largest sum ever collected from this source. Its uniform collection throughout the diocese is greatly to be desired, as appropriations are made from it at the annual meeting in response to special appeals presented at that time.

At the annual election, the resignations of Miss Thompson, Vice-President of Indian Missions; Mrs. Ryder, Vice-President of Foreign Missions, and Mrs. Hale, Vice-President of Freedmen Missions, were received with much regret. Mrs.

Benj. Williamson, Mrs. Roberts and Miss Townsend were chosen to fill their places. With these exceptions, the old officers were re-elected.

The election of corresponding secretaries and librarians of the Divisions resulted as follows: Corresponding Secretaries—Mrs. Taggart, Mrs. Conover, Mrs. Roberts; Librarians—Miss Earle, Mrs. Franklin, Miss L. Townsend.

At the afternoon session, the Rev. Mr. Page gave an interesting account of the work in Japan, making a special appeal for the parish building of Trinity Church, Tokio, Japan. He was followed by Rev. Dr. Langford, General Secretary of the Board of Missions, who presented most eloquently the claims of the various branches of missionary work.

The appropriations from the Ten Cent Missionary Assessment Fund were for the following purposes: General Missions, \$52.30; parish building, Tokio, Japan, \$50; education of Japanese boy, \$25.

Again, my friends, we have listened to the annual reports of our work, and we believe them to be accurate. Far be it from us to consider them with undue satisfaction, or the reverse. If, in looking backward over the year that is past, we feel in our heart of hearts that our full measure of duty has been performed, it will indeed be well for us to thank God and take courage. Should the review bring to our minds some delinquencies, still let us give thanks for what was put into our hearts to do, and pray for grace to accomplish more in the future. There has certainly been a fresh impetus given to our work the past season through the grand opportunities which the missionary meetings of the last General Convention afforded our members of hearing about the state of missions, and inspiring them with fresh zeal and energy. Eight interesting Division meetings have been held, and of six we can personally testify to their benefit and increased ardor given to work. A growing desire for missionary information has been a very marked feature in these meetings.

Could we know that each parish (as indeed some already do) has its monthly or semi-monthly meetings for the members of the Auxiliary, who will consider it as sacred a duty as their Church Guilds or Parish Society work, we should be assured of the greatest success.

We can find help for all needs if only we are able to bring tender hearts into sympathetic communication with loving hands.

We have had some discouragements and worked under disadvantages the past winter. Our dear friend and helpful Vice-President for the Indian work has been sick and unable to direct the work with her usual care. She fortunately was able to secure the services of another to assist in this branch. Our Foreign Vice-President, by reason of family affliction, could not give it her attention, and the report will probably show that less has been done. A parish branch, however, thoroughly aroused to the needs of this work, will be a truly spiritual one, and if we are ever permitted to send from our own midst a substitute to the field, there will be no lack of interest.

The visit of the Rev. Mr. Gordon was of great benefit to the Mexican work. May we soon be able to show New Jersey one of the strongest dioceses in aid of this noble mission, which is truly domestic as well as foreign in its nature.

The Freedmen have received, we think, special help the past year. But we hope that this branch will do its full duty, as we owe it to our dusky neighbors.

It is with pleasure we have seen our new Vice-President winning all hearts, as she has faithfully put her shoulder to the wheel. May each revolution bring large sums to the aid of the Bishop's valuable trust funds.

The reports of our Librarians have been most encouraging ; though a new feature in our work, we have cause to be most thankful for what has been accomplished. More than one hundred and fifty Missionaries and struggling missions have been supplied with literature of different kinds, and we look forward hopefully to the extension of this method of aid and sympathy.

In proposing to raise \$200 as our proportion for the furnishing of the Missions House, we have received from all parts of the Diocese kind responses, and are able to report more than half the sum already made up.

A quaint sentence in one of Prof. Henry Drummond's addresses explains the subject of benefits to be derived from the work before us. "There is no happiness in *having* or *getting*,

but only in *giving*." When the women of our church practically understand this truth there will be no need of soliciting for missionary objects; no necessity for missionary meetings. It is not the *amount* we give, but the whole-hearted consecration which ensures the promised blessing. Far more valuable the "brown penny and the prayer," of which the children's verse speaks, than thousands of dollars without *charity*.

REPORT OF UPPER DIVISION.

There have been but two meetings held in the Upper Division this year ; the first in October, at Trinity Church, Woodbridge, and the second in January, at Christ Church, New Brunswick. The autumn meeting was an exceptionally interesting one, following so closely upon the Convention and Triennial Meeting of the Women's Auxiliary. The different Missionary Bishops and delegates going about among the people, telling of their work and needs, had aroused unusual interest in the subject of Missions. Mrs. Williamson made an earnest appeal for Christmas boxes for the Indians, and I

know of many hearty responses. Mrs. White gave a very interesting account of the work in Japan. At New Brunswick, Mrs. Thomas Roberts read a paper on Alaska, the first time this subject has been brought before the Upper Division, and we all felt deeply indebted to her for much useful information about this new field for missionary work. Both of the meetings were largely attended, and the hospitality extended to the delegates was most generous. The speakers at the meetings were the Rt. Rev. Bishops Scarborough and Talbot, the Rev. Wm. B. Gordon, of the City of Mexico; the Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Jaeger, of Rustburg, Va.; Mrs. S. A. Clark, Mrs. B. Williamson, jr., Mrs. E. K. Hale, Mrs. Clarkson, Miss Sarah C. Neilson, and Mrs. Thomas Neilson; also, Mrs. Thomas Roberts, who spoke (by request) of the domestic work in the Northwest, and of Alaska.

There have been ten parish and neighborhood meetings.

Two meetings, which included the parishes in Mt. Holly and Camden, were conducted by Mrs. and Miss Neilson.

Owing to illness the Corresponding Secretary was obliged to relinquish six parish and neighborhood meetings, for which arrangements had been made.

Systematic giving, which has been a frequent theme during the winter, is beginning to take root as a duty in a few of our parishes, and, although there is no large tree yet from any of the seeds scattered, the method is growing, and permanent results must follow in a more or less distant future.

REPORTS OF LIBRARIANS.

The Librarian of the Upper Division reports that "with but few exceptions the parishes have responded to the call for church papers and other good literature. Eighty-four periodicals are now being regularly sent, added to which there have been thirty-eight prayer books and hymnals sent to a band of faithful church workers in South Dakota. These numbers do not begin to comprehend all that is being done in this work, for there are many families who have been in the habit of 'passing on' their church papers for years. The letters received acknowledging these favors are grateful and touching in the extreme."

"The Middle Division supplies fifty-three clergymen with church papers and magazines. Twenty small new books have been also sent from Shrewsbury to the West and South. Princeton, Trenton, Freehold, Perth Amboy, South Amboy, Middletown, Red Bank, Shrewsbury, Fair Haven and Allentown have responded to the appeal."

The Librarian of the Lower Division reports as follows:

"The office of Librarian, to which I was appointed one year ago, had for its object the systematic distribution of church periodicals among missionaries and church workers

who desired them, which were to be sent regularly after reading by the subscribers in New Jersey, and the duty of the Librarian was to put the two in communication. Aid was asked from the Parish Secretaries, and thanks are now due to those of Atlantic City, Beverly, St. Paul's and St. Barnabas', Camden; Haddonfield, Merchantville, Mt. Holly, and Woodbury. From these places *forty-six* papers are now regularly sent out, beside packages of back numbers of the same.

Although these offers have been so numerous and so kind much more is needed. Having the reputation of this literature at our disposal the petitions for it are frequent, but I feel that the cases need only be stated to win a response. Perhaps people would be more moved to subscribe for church papers if they realized the good use they could make of them. Instead of being preserved, as they often are, for the book-worms (as no one likes to destroy them), they would here enter on an enlarged field of usefulness, which would continue until they were worn out.

There is a reflex benefit in many cases. Our hearts have been often touched as we have read the written words of those in the field, of their minor difficulties and perplexities, which do not often appear in print. They are sometimes so akin to our own, only intensified, that we are insensibly lifted by their courage and helped by their patience.

Sometimes this venture of faith has wrought an unexpected, an amusing result. A farmer in Kansas came to consult the rector about getting married, and he said he had found out from reading the 'Churchmen' that 'this was a church which makes people stay married.' A fact which recommends it to those who abhor the slack marriage bonds of Kansas.

If Domestic Missions are so interesting how much more so would be the Foreign, and Miss Emery has asked if we will not undertake that also. Of all the societies and clubs that supply periodicals there have none taken up this section, and yet here it will be even more acceptable.

This report has the nature of an appeal, and I wish for three things :

1. That all donating boxes would send to me the address of the Missionary.

2. That all contributing individually would work through our Branch of the Women's Auxiliary by giving me their own and the recipients' names and addresses, especially his.

3. That all persons taking church papers and good magazines would enter into some arrangement whereby their value may become infinitely increased by pursuing this plan I have outlined.

To forestall the new interests that will be awakened I have tried to accumulate information regarding them, such as is contained in files of Spirit of Missions and Church Mission News in Missionary reports, leaflets, etc., which I shall devise to the future Librarians of New Jersey, trusting they will be able to include the care of it among their duties and the dispensing of it among their pleasures."
