REPORT OF SECRETARY AND TREASURER.

THE annual meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at the Church of the Holy Cross, North Plainfield, on Wednesday, April 26th, 1893, the parishes of Grace Church and the Church of the Holy Cross uniting in entertaining the delegates. At the morning service after the celebration of the Holy Communion, a cordial welcome was extended to the Auxiliary by the Rev. Mr. Murphy, the rector of the parish, after which forcible addresses were made by the Bishop of the Diocese, Rev. Dr. Langford and the Rev. Mr. Pott of the China Mission, the latter presenting the needs of St. John's College, Shanghai. The Auxiliary maintained its usual high standard in interest and attendance, about one hundred and fifty delegates being present, representing thirty-four parishes.

At the opening of the afternoon session, resolutions were adopted expressing the great loss the Auxiliary had sustained in the death of Miss Sarah Neilson and of Miss Letitia Townsend, two of its most earnest and efficient members. Miss Neilson for two years filled^{most acceptably} the office of diocesan vice-president, and Miss Townsend for three years discharged with great faithfulness the duties of librarian of the Lower Division.

The reports of money and boxes sent to the different departments of the mission field were then called for and were as follows:

The reports of the corresponding secretaries were also read showing that the division meetings which had been held during

the year had been made instructive and stimulating by addresses from missionaries and others representing the different branches of work.

The librarian of the Lower Division presented an interesting report which stated that one hundred periodicals are being regularly mailed from that division. These, together with ninety reported from the Upper Division and thirty from the Middle Division, make the whole number of periodicals in circulation for the current year two hundred and twenty. Many books, leaflets, odd numbers of papers and magazines have also been contributed. Such a work as this commends itself to all Christian people.

The president, Mrs. Clark, then read her annual address, in which she gave a brief review of the year's work and urged upon the Auxiliary the need of greater efforts in behalf of Foreign Missions.

Mrs. Fordyce Barker also addressed the meeting, giving an account of the work in Mexico and paying a beautiful tribute to the noble life and work of Mrs. Hooker.

After the annual election which resulted in the reinstatement of the officers then serving, attention was called to some necessary changes in the constitution which the growth of the association demanded. The desired amendments were then adopted with the approval of all present.

The Bishop made an appeal for twelve hundred dollars to pay the salary of an itinerant missionary in the diocese. He stated that on account of recent bequests to his fund for the relief of needy missionaries in the diocese, it would be unnecessary to ask for continued contributions for that object, and therefore suggested that in its place money be contributed to this important work. It is hoped that a generous response on the part of all the parishes will be made to the Bishop's request.

During the year a cordial welcome has been given to six new branches: Trinity Church, Red Bank; St. Luke's, Metuchen; Trinity Church, Vineland; St. Paul's, Rahway; Doane Memorial Chapel, South Amboy; Christ Church, Waterford Works.

It has been thought advisable to add to the annual report a list of the parish secretaries. Any changes that may occur should be promptly reported to the diocesan secretary that the list may be correct at all times.

The secretary is glad to report that the united offering from the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, presented at the triennial meeting held in Baltimore, October, 1892, amounted to \$638.09. From the Ten Cent Missionary Assessments the sum of \$130.85 has been collected, representing the dues of fifty-four parishes. Will not all the parish treasuries during the coming year collect from the members of the Auxiliary in their parishes this small assessment and send it before the month of April to the diocesan secretary?

From this fund the following appropriations were made: Building fund, St. John's College, Shanghai, \$50.00; general missions, \$50.00; education of Japanese boy, Osaka, \$25.00.

The reports of the year show a gratifying increase, the total in boxes and money amounting to \$9,224.76, a gain over the preceding year of \$1,181.29.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Mingled feelings of encouragement and sadness cluster about our meeting to-day. Much of interest to the Woman's Auxiliary has taken place since we met last year in Burlington. During the summer months our thoughts were busy in planning for the general meeting at Baltimore. Our secretary was enabled to carry six hundred thirty-eight dollars and eighty-nine cents to the united offering, which, with gifts from China, Japan, Indians, Africans and other dioceses, was laid with thankfulness upon the altar. Many of our own women were privileged to attend the grand anniversary of the birth of the Woman's Auxiliary, thus testifying their interest and support. It was not possible that such interesting services should pass without inspiring thoughts and purposes of effort and deeper consecration.

New Jersey was justly proud that from one of our own number, an honored member of the Woman's Auxiliary, should have emanated a resolution to release the enrolment fund from its useless sleep. To Mrs. Swift belongs the credit of this inspiration, while by her earnest prayers and faithful efforts success was assured to the plan, and by an overwhelming vote it passed the general meeting and was presented to the general convention. To her labors are due the salaries of the two new missionary bishops from the accruing interest and the promise that the work may still go forward.

At the diocesan officers' meeting a plan for the furtherance of the work of the General Auxiliary was offered, but misunderstood, and the minority met with a sorrowful rebuff. But we have been assured that the matter was educational in its tendency, and doubtless when the time comes to mature such plans for the benefit of the missionary cause, we feel they must prevail. We have also had encouragements in our own diocesan work. Six new parochial branches have been organized and many members added to those already belonging to us.

Seven division meetings have been held, with good results and interest aroused in the different branches. We have listened to stirring addresses, our meetings have been pleasant and profitable in their influence, and we believe the work has made advances in various ways.

Sadness clouds our meeting to-day, as we miss some, who in the past were ever in their places and aided in our work. Soon after our bright Burlington day the Master called one of our best and loveliest to Himself—one whose life of consecration and earnestness made her a most successful worker in the vineyard. For years Miss Sarah

Neilson had been the parochial secretary of St. Stephen's, Florence. For that parish she labored and prayed, and her work there will never be forgotten.

While she served the Auxiliary as diocesan vice-president her earnest words and loving appeals showed all hearts the importance of the work she sought to bring before us. We miss her from our midst to-day, but in Paradise we know our Easter lily blooms, and the jewel that shone so brightly on earth has been placed upon her Saviour's crown. We have still her example and loving service to keep her memory fresh, and daily may we strive to follow her as she followed Christ.

One of the first vice-presidents of the New Jersey Auxiliary has also been called away from earth. Full of zeal for missions Mrs. Merritt ever aided the work with her efforts, her gifts and her prayers.

She, too, has gone to the brighter home where all her dear ones dwell, and the remembrance of her usefulness should bring fresh courage to those who enjoyed here her society and friendship. For the missionary work of the diocese she left a substantial gift; we doubt not she has entered into her reward.

As we have gathered here on this lovely spring day sad services have been taking place in a neighboring diocese. One who was with us last year and interested in the different departments of our work has been carried to her grave. Miss Letitia Townsend, always eminently faithful in every relation of life and in devotion to her special work, has doubtless heard the welcome approval of her Divine Master bidding her "enter into the joy of her Lord."

"The strife is o'er, the battle done !
The victory of life is won ;
The song of triumph has begun,
Alleluia!"

Before closing this lengthy report I would ask you, my friends, to pardon a few words upon our duty in the matter of foreign missions. Could you open with me some of the letters which accompany the annual reports you would realize that I am bringing to you somewhat of a problem. Some suggest that having been obliged to do so much for parish work they are not able to do any for missions; others that their rectors need all their efforts. One writes that while more money has gone out for missions from her parish than for many years, it has not been given through the Auxiliary. Another, that all went to the Enrolment Fund. The answer to most should be: "This should ye have done and not have left the other undone." We received our first missionary commission at our baptism, and our membership in the

Auxiliary only deepens our duty in this matter. A rich blessing is ever upon all parishes that feel "there is that scattereth and yet increaseth," and the words of one of our self-denying missionaries, "because the minute our church gives up her foreign missionary work she will begin to lose all healthy life," demonstrates this more fully. The best solution of this trying problem appears to be "systematic giving." Let every woman be fully assured in her own mind of her individual duty in this matter and prayerfully discharge it. One cent a week from each of our members would give us thirteen hundred dollars a year, and many who are able could readily promise five cents. What *home* object need, through this effort, be neglected? Or we would suggest that for each cent given to church or charitable calls, the same amount should conscientiously be laid by for missions. My dear friends, there is an imperative duty belonging to every one. Let us not fail to discern it. Were our blessed Lord, whose presence we are assured is with us in His church, were He visibly in our midst, what answer could we give to his words of command to "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," and "As ye would that men should do to you, do ye to them likewise"? How are we caring for the millions of heathen who have never heard His name? Are our hearts truly stirred to bring that knowledge to theirs?

A few days ago, while crossing a long stretch of water in one of our ferries, a tiny steam tug came bounding over the waves. It was newly painted in bright spring colors and looked like a toy upon the waters. But just behind, following in its wake, one saw a schooner fully six times larger than the little tug, connected by a strong cable, to its care. How could that miniature steamer manage to bring the larger vessel to its moorings was the question suggested to the mind? But as the sun shone upon the name inscribed on the side of the little boat we read the answer, it was the "Golden Rule."

The following is the result of the investigations up to the present time: Fourteen parishes are sending publications of various kinds to about twenty dioceses and missionary jurisdictions, viz.: Western and Central New York, Albany, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Virginia, Indiana, Tennessee, South Carolina, Florida, Kansas, Minnesota, Nebraska, Colorado, Oregon, California, New Mexico, Washington and Japan. Publications mailed regularly, about one hundred in number, are: The Churchman, Living Church, Church Standard, Church Review Eclectic, Spirit of Missions, Young Churchman, Church Mission News, Young Christian Soldier,

Parish Visitor, American Church Sunday School Magazine, Century, Girls' Friendly Magazine, Harper's Monthly, Ladies' Home Journal. The full volume of Scribner for 1891 was sent at the end of the year, and regularly for 1892. A number of books were sent to a Sunday school. A few copies of the new edition of The Prayer Book, also Christian Year Kalendar and Girls' Friendly Society Calendar have been given. Lesson leaflets, Lowrie's tracts, leaflets on Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Communion, pictorial papers, Easter and Christmas cards, booklets, Demorest's Magazine complete for 1892, back numbers of the Churchman, Youth's Companion, and magazines to various persons. In addition to these a variety of literature to a reading room in one of the small western parishes, and about one hundred copies of Y. X. Soldier at various times to different persons. By referring to the first report of the Church Periodical Club it will be seen that during their first year *thirteen dioceses*, working together, sent literature to *seventeen dioceses*; the number of periodicals, eleven hundred. When we remember that the work now reported is done by *one-third* of a small diocese, and the reading matter distributed over twenty dioceses and missionary jurisdictions, the number of publications mailed regularly about one hundred, we may thank God and take courage. While under great obligations to several, who have rendered great assistance, I must particularly mention the parochial librarian of St. Paul's, Camden, by whom a large portion of this work has been accomplished. If one woman in each parish would make this her special work, great results might be reported at our next annual meeting. Another need is *money*. In a few instances, where the addition of fifty cents per year to the subscription price would be something of a tax, the librarian has been able to pay the postage in order to secure the papers. The same may be said of many packages of good reading matter. A small sum would furnish leaflets, which the missionaries find so helpful, or a good magazine, paper or book. If the Auxiliary funds cannot be used, why cannot each parish make an offering annually for this purpose? A small parish, having no literature to offer, might give a small sum, say twenty-five or fifty cents, or, perhaps, a dollar to pay for one paper. A beginning has been made in St. Mary's, Burlington. Who will follow?

DIOCESAN CONSTITUTION.

I.—NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF
MISSIONS."

II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general missionary work of the church, to communicate missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the gospel of Christ.

III.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a president, vice-presidents, secretary and treasurer, division corresponding secretaries and librarians, to be chosen by the delegates from parochial branches at the annual meeting, and approved by the Bishop.

IV.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Board shall be composed of the president, vice-presidents, secretary and treasurer, and corresponding secretaries. The board shall meet twice or more each year, these meetings to be arranged by the president.

The Right Rev. Bishop of the Diocese shall be a member *ex officio* of the Executive Board.

V.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The president shall preside at all meetings, and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The president and vice-presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedmen, one for Foreign, one for Mexico, and one for Diocesan Missions.

The secretary shall call the roll at the annual meeting, and prepare and read the minutes, performing all duties belonging to the office ; and the treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society.

The corresponding secretaries shall send to the rectors vice-presidents, and parochial secretaries notices of each Division meeting, keep the minutes of said meetings, make an annual report of the same, and diffuse among the parishes intelligence concerning the missionary work of the church.

The collections at Division meetings shall be used for the contingent fund of the Auxiliary and sent to the diocesan treasurer.

Librarians shall communicate with all the parochial secretaries about such literature as may be contributed for missionary work, and keep an account of all given and where sent, reporting the same at the annual meeting.

VI.—REPRESENTATION.

Any parish may become a member of this Society by appointing a secretary and notifying the president. The secretary of the parochial branch is expected to correspond with the diocesan officers, and they *alone* correspond with the secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

A membership fee of ten cents shall be paid annually by all members towards a general missionary fund. Each parish shall send to the annual meeting two or more delegates.

VII.—MEETINGS.

The annual meeting shall be held the last Wednesday of April. On the second, third and fourth weeks in October and January, there shall be meetings respectively in the Upper, Middle and Lower Divisions to enable the vice-presidents to present their several branches of work. Any other meetings which may be deemed advisable can be held at times proposed by the parishes or corresponding secretaries and concurred in by the president.

VIII.

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting. Any proposed alteration in the constitution must be submitted to the Executive Board in writing before bringing it before the Auxiliary.
