REPORT OF SECRETARY AND TREASURER.

THE New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary held its twentieth annual meeting at St. Mary's Church, Burlington, on Wednesday, April 24th, 1895. Thirty-six parishes were represented by about one hundred and fifty delegates. After the celebration of the Holy Communion, a cordial welcome was extended to the members of the Auxiliary by the assistant minister, Rev. Wm. P. Taylor, in the absence of the rector of the parish. Much regret was also felt that the Bishop was unable to be present.

At noon, after the mid-day prayers for missions, an impressive missionary address was delivered by the Rev. Dr. Langford, which was well fitted to inspire the Auxiliary with new enthusiasm for the new year's work. At one o'clock the Auxiliary was most hospitably entertained at luncheon by the ladies of St. Mary's Church. The business meeting followed, at which the vice-presidents presented the following reports of money and boxes sent to the different departments of mission work :

The annual address of the president, Mrs. Clark, the reports of the corresponding secretaries and librarians were also read, the details of which are given elsewhere.

A new and interesting feature of the work was the establishment, in connection with the Auxiliary, of a Missionary Literature Bureau. In order to provide in the Constitution for such a bureau, Article V. was amended by adding after the words "Junior Auxiliary work" the following :

"There shall be one vice-president whose duty it shall be to take charge of a Missionary Literature Bureau, said bureau to consist of books, maps, reports and all other literature that may be helpful to the women missionary workers in the diocese. Said bureau to be for the use of all members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the diocese of New Jersey."

With the consent of the Bishop, it was decided that hereafter there should be but two divisions of the Auxiliary in the diocese, and that these should follow the lines of the Convocations of New Brunswick and Burlington, and be known as the Upper and Lower Divisions of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is hoped that this change will simplify the working of the Auxiliary and at the same time increase its strength.

The annual election resulted in the reinstatement of the former officers, with Mrs. F. S. Conover as vice-president of the Missionary Literature Bureau.

The following appropriations were made from the Ten Cent Missionary Assessment Fund, which, with the balance on hand, amounted to \$142.37: For education orphan boy, Osaka, \$25.00; Deaconess Home, China, \$50.00; St. Mary's School, Spokane, \$25.00; missionary deficit, \$42.37.

The Auxiliary has added two to its list of parish branches during the year—Church of the Redeemer, North Plainfield, and Trinity Church, Matawan.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Twenty-seven boxes for Missionaries, besides those sent to hospitals and schools, show most conclusively the interest the women of New Jersey take in Domestic Missions. Though our gifts of money bear witness to the stringency of the times, yet the busy fingers of our workers and their devotion be-token deep sympathy, as they have poured forth a wealth of love and self-sacrifice for our earnest clergymen in the West and South.

In one instance a box was filled, and many sacrifices made for a western rector, when the young parish had not even a church of its own in which to worship. Our Father in Heaven sees not as man seeth, and we rejoice in commanding the work of the Domestic Branch during the past season.

The faithful, untiring efforts of our vice-president for the Freedmen have borne good fruit. We owe these colored brethren more than we really can appreciate, and if we have not large means to bestow, we surely can offer for them our daily prayers, which are *their* right and *our* bounden duty. It is a great comfort to feel that we, as an Auxiliary, are pledged to a definite effort for their benefit. Let us look carefully for the *results* of our labors.

The teacher we promised to support will doubtless aid in the good work among the Indian women of Minnesota; but let us ever remember the many more tribes of our red brothers and sisters to whom our country owes a heavy debt, which we are bound to pay with ever increasing yearly interest.

The example of the Christianized Indians of South Dakota, where more than thirty branches of our Woman's Auxiliary attest the wonderful work there accomplished, shows that nothing falls upon stony soil in that Diocese.

But the Alaskan needs, so vividly portrayed by Mr. Prevost, send out a trumpet call for earnest prayer and faithful Christian effort. Let us *study* the Indian problem, before deciding upon the merits of the work, in every Diocese where they are found.

For Mexico we would ask renewed interest and gifts. We know that the vice-president has the hardest task in mission work, which, while apparently considered neither

Domestic nor Foreign, is yet liable to be overlooked, amid the many calls which appear nearer our own homes.

For Foreign work we hardly know what to think. The meagre sums collected for missions abroad, either show our prayers for the heathen to be very few, or our faith very weak, and the knowledge we possess most imperfect. Perhaps more has been collected in the churches, and reported through the rectors.

Mexican and Foreign needs remind one of the words written by a devoted Bishop of our Church, in charge of the Commission to our colored heathen, while kindly commanding "Systematic Giving," he adds: "But we need and will need more and more right *proportion* in giving. It is ten times as hard to divide a dollar, so it will do most good, as it is to give the dollar. We must study more and more due proportion, for it is just here the greatest wisdom of the giver is needed, i. e., gift of brain, as well as gold. This means our co-operation with Jesus." Do we, my dear sisters, measure our giving by the standard set by our Blessed Master? Let us ask for faith, knowledge and wisdom in this all important soul-saving matter.

Our Diocesan Vice-President has received the usual assurance that our women do not forget their first duty after their parish church work. We are, however, hardly doing all we ought for the Diocese, perhaps because the objects nearer home are sometimes overlooked.

Our librarians report very favorably of their work, which compares most creditably with that of the Church Periodical Club in other dioceses, and which we find to be of greater benefit in our own.

We have been privileged to attend six most interesting Division meetings the past season. In going to distant and new working parishes, it has been very pleasant to meet the workers and become personally acquainted with the members. We have had rousing missionary addresses from those in the fields of work, and, doubtless, good seed has been sown in the hearts of our women.

The Executive Committee has met twice for earnest discussion of the different branches of our mission work. Out of these conferences has grown a new Junior Branch Auxili-

ary, of which our able, active and skillful organizer and present vice-president has, according to the Bishop's wish and advice, formed already a remarkably large number of branches in the few months of work. She has been aided by a very accomplished secretary and treasurer, who has shown great ability in work among the young.

Eight years ago it was deemed advisable, on account of the growth of our work in the Diocese, to divide into three sections, under corresponding secretaries, the parishes of the New Jersey Auxiliary.

We have found the plan to work effectively, but with some disadvantages in the manner of division. Now, with the expressed desire of our Corresponding Secretary of the Middle Division, and the concurrence of our Bishop, it has been decided by the Executive Committee to ask for a new division upon the lines of the *two* missionary convocations; so that instead of three, we may have but two sections.

We would also ask your approval of a new branch of work, which our rapidly-growing Auxiliary really seems to need. It has been considered expedient to form a "Missionary Literature Bureau" for the purpose of supplying the whole Diocese with books, pamphlets and maps for the instruction and pleasure of every parochial branch, which must be benefitted by this new departure from our usual methods of missionary efforts. The plans and rules will be further discussed when permission has been received from the Bishop, and voted upon by the delegates.

One word more, in conclusion, my dear friends, with God's grace, let our motto ever be in the Lord's name, and for the interest of His work, "Advance."

REPORT OF LOWER DIVISION.

The two regular meetings of the Lower Division were held in Trinity Church, Swedesboro, Oct. 31, 1894, and St. Mark's Church, Hammonton, Jan. 24, 1895. REPORT OF LOWER DIVISION LIBRARIAN.

There is some difficulty in giving a correct report of work done in this department on account of changes which have taken place. Sometimes a removal makes it uncertain whether publications continue to be sent. Then, again, the Librarian is not always notified when persons fail to send the promised periodical, but the following is believed to be a fair statement:

Nineteen parishes in the Lower Division are now sending reading matter to twenty-one dioceses and missionary jurisdictions, the following being a list of publications mailed regularly:

Fifteen copies *Churchman*, twelve copies *Church Standard*, eight copies *Living Church*, eleven copies *Spirit of Missions*, one copy *Church Review*, two copies *Church Eclectic*, four copies *American Church Sunday School Magazine*, eight copies *Parish Visitor*, eleven copies *Young Christian Soldier*, two copies *Young Churchman*, thirteen copies *Church Mission News*, one copy *Sunday School Times*, seven copies *Girls' Friendly Magazine*, one copy *Forum*, four copies *Century*, one copy *Arena*, two copies *Harper's Monthly*, ten copies *Ladies' Home Journal*, one copy *Woman's Progress*, one copy *Youth's Companion*, one copy *Housewife*, two copies *Delineator*. Total, 118.

It will be remembered that many appeals have been made for money to defray the expenses of sending large packages of magazines, papers, etc. In answer to these appeals eight parishes have contributed, as follows:

This sum has helped very much in paying freight, expressage and postage on boxes containing about seven hundred copies of prayer books and hymnals of the old edition, a large number of Sunday School library books, partly worn, to persons asking for them, a full year's numbers of *Scribner's* and *Harper's Monthly*, large packages *Young Christian Soldier* and other papers, leaflets, Sunday School, Christmas and Easter cards. A number of books, among

which were *Church Doctrine*, *Bible Truth*, *Holy Living*, *Commentary on Te Deum*, *Good Friday Addresses*, *Christ and His Church*, *Black Letter Saints*, nine copies *Scripture History for the Young*, and many good Sunday School instruction books.

The *Churchman* has been asked for by two or three. Will not some parish send a year's subscription for this paper, to be sent to a hard-working Archdeacon in the West?
