

Secretary's Report.

The twenty-sixth annual meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Trinity Church, Asbury Park, Wednesday, April 24th, at 11.00 a. m. In the celebration of the Holy Communion the Bishop was assisted by the Rev. Mr. Longley, rector of Trinity Church and the Rev. Dr. Lloyd, Gen. Sec. to the Board of Missions. The Rev. Mr. Longley, in behalf of himself and his congregation, extended to the delegates a most cordial welcome to Trinity Church. In a short address the Bishop impressed upon those present the great need of more help for the Board, to enable that Body to meet its obligations, to say nothing of pushing forward in the new fields lately opened to the church. The Bishop introduced, as special speaker of the day, the Rev. Dr. Lloyd, as one coming with full knowledge of the subject, to lay before the

women their duty and privilege to aid the Board in the spreading of the Master's Kingdom.

At one o'clock the business meeting was organized, the President presiding. Sixty-three delegates, representing twenty-six Parishes, responded to the roll call, a grand showing considering the inclemency of the weather. The minutes of the previous annual meeting, also those of the last executive meeting were read and accepted, after which the meeting adjourned for luncheon.

On reassembling at 2.30, owing to the lack of time, the President's address was omitted. The Treasurer's report was read and approved, followed by those of the several Vice-Presidents as follows:

The Junior Auxiliary reported several new branches organized and gifts in money \$207.00; value of boxes sent \$298.05; adding to this the offering of the Babies' Branch, \$100.59, makes a total of \$605.64, all included in the above figures. The Systematic Missionary Fund, \$18.00, was by vote of the meeting given to the Board of Missions.

The report of the tellers appointed to count the ballot was presented and showed that the ticket as offered by the nominating committee was unanimously elected and the Board remains the same as last year.

The Bishop in a few words expressed his regret for the great sorrow that had befallen our friend and co-worker, Mrs. Conover, Vice-President of the Missionary Lending Library, and proposed a resolution of sympathy from the meeting which was warmly responded to and the Secretary was requested to convey the same to Mrs. Conover.

The nominating committee appointed to serve for the ensuing year Miss Melville, Mrs. Hooten, Miss Carpenter and Mrs. Rutger.

President's Address.

The Ecumenical Conference of 1900 certainly left blessings upon every Missionary endeavor in our country.

There has been a decided impetus given to the work of our own New Jersey Branch, due doubtless to the earnest prayers and helpful examples of Godly missionaries.

Never before has there been such united desire for all good works and loving service for each demand upon our sympathies.

Early in our working year calls for help came; first the fearful flood and distressing losses at Galveston, Texas. Many churches responded and two of our parochial branches sent boxes full of clothing, bedding and groceries for those in need.

Next a letter from the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in Oregon told us of the terrible loss they had met with in the burning of the Good Samaritan Hospital, at Portland. They were able to rebuild but all their household stores had been destroyed and they needed new supplies of garments and appliances for their work. Immediately six or seven branches responded to this call and many fine boxes were sent. These were received with grateful thanks by the Superintendent of the Hospital and appreciation by the Woman's Auxiliary for the valuable help in their time of trouble and need.

At our meeting, at Rahway, in February, Archdeacon Spurr of Moundsville, Va., told us of his grand work in the midst of miners and poor whites. The hearts of our women were deeply touched by his tales of the needs of these wretched people and four or five parishes have sent substantial help to his Hospital and Hotel.

The work in Alaska, of which we heard from both Mr. and Mrs. Prevost, has stirred up a new interest in that northern, wintry climate, and they will receive our warmest sympathy and aid in the months to come.

Much work has been done for hospitals and schools and the dear friends who kindly prepare and give, as a loving memorial, stoles and cassocks, have done their full share of helpful service.

More Missionaries than usual have been supplied with boxes and more parishes have felt the rich pleasure and blessedness of providing them. It is sad that in so many cases they are needed on account of insufficient salaries given these faithful, hard working laborers in the vineyard of the Master. When will the Church awake to her responsibility in this important matter and provide the means for the Board to do justice to these noble men and women without the dread of a deficit in the Missionary treasury.

Our Division meetings have been most inspiring and largely attended. In October we went to Somerville and Mount Holly and in February to Rahway and Moorestown. At these meetings we came personally in touch with many workers whose devoted lives are such bright examples. Nothing so interests and arouses our women as their stories of the difficulties and trials of the Missionary's every day life.

But most of all, the expressions of growing interest in the work of Missions which have come from many parochial branches, cheer our hearts. Several Secretaries write of pleasant meetings, with prayers and study, as arousing the interest of the members. One parish during Lent held special meetings before the regular ones, for prayer and the reading of missionary items, to stimulate interest and deepen the spiritual life of the Society. There need be no surprise in learning that the report shows it to be the banner parochial branch for the past season.

The Elizabeth Branch celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary, at St. John's Chapel, on the eleventh of February, 1901. The Rev. Dr. Correll of China, and the Rev. Mr. Prevost of Alaska, were present and told of the work in their respective fields, giving much interesting information and calling forth the sympathies of their hearers. As the Elizabeth Branch began its life with work for China, through Mrs. Schereschewsky, wife of the then Bishop of China, it seemed most fitting that at this, its twenty-fifth anniversary, China should be represented. "The meeting was an enthusiastic one and an inspiration

to greater effort in the work of Missions," so writes the Secretary of the Branch. In accordance with the frequently expressed views of our Bishop, the meeting was brought to a close by a social tea.

From a good western Rector, whose work in Nebraska has been mentioned in the "Churchman," a letter has been received by the parish which had furnished him with a box. I will quote a few lines from it. "I wish you could see the little ones, as each new revelation was drawn from the treasures of that box. Their mother seemed just as full of the spirit of the occasion as they were and I gladly admit I also had a large share in the joy and gratitude that filled our little home.

"If some painter would faithfully portray the varied expressions upon the faces of a western Missionary's family on the occasion when the love and devotion of hearts in sympathy with the common cause are so unmistakably manifested, how varied and pleasing would be the sight of a scene, beyond the power of language to describe. If you can imagine that scene, caused by the generosity and thoughtfulness of the good ladies' of——Church, who have left no shade of gladdening color omitted, you can form some estimate of the emotions of joy, and the evidence of gratitude. May God the Giver of every good gift reward you all with a measure of His goodness and make you feel the full sweetness and reward of well doing." Many Missionaries have been relieved of grave anxieties through the women of our Auxiliary; time would fail to tell all.

There has been much interest expressed for Dorothy, a pretty little spot in the Lower Division.

The Rev. Mr. Shepherd, in his very practical and instructive address at Moorestown, described how the place could be helped and at once the women took up the work most earnestly; they have already secured the funds to carry forward their plans.

Miss Carter has expressed herself as truly grateful to the women of New Jersey for their help and sympathy in her work. If part of the burden resting upon her could be lifted by the Board of Managers, her valued life

might be longer spared to be a blessing to the Indian women and the whole Church.

Our Juniors have developed great happiness and success in the past year, their large gifts to Indian schools have delighted the doners and relieved the Missionaries. Several new branches have been formed and one parish has a successful Junior Boys' Branch. This is a most important part of our Auxiliary work.

Our Babies' Branch is a joy to its officers, I am sure if it were more thoroughly understood many more children would be interested in it. Their early days given to the work of Missions and prayers for it, are a faint type of the blessings which their maturer years will bring to the cause.

In looking back upon the sad events of the past year in foreign lands we are grateful to our Father in Heaven for His preserving care over our Missionaries. With sad hearts we must remember the truth in that oft quoted maxim, that "The blood of the Martyrs is the seed of the Church," and doubtless much of our stimulated zeal has arisen from the bitter sorrows of other Missionary bodies.

One parochial Branch mourns the loss of a faithful Secretary. Mrs. J. B. Dumont of Grace Church, Plainfield, who for eighteen years has blessed the Woman's Auxiliary with loving service, has now been removed to a higher sphere of love, in her Heavenly Home. A most conscientious christian woman, she will be sadly missed both as friend and worker in her Church. It is hard to part with such good women and few can take their places in the work.

That God's richest blessing may rest upon our feeble endeavors and that we may "Trust in the Lord forever, for the Lord Jehovah is everlasting strength," is the earnest wish of,

Junior Report.

Increased interest has developed in the Junior Department during the past year. Several new, strong branches have been organized and many old branches have added to their membership.

The annual reports were most encouraging in the evidence of true missionary spirit. Many branches devote at least monthly meetings to study.

In several, regular weekly services were held during Lent.

A large number unite with adults in offering the noonday prayer.

To secure a general observance of the Children's Missionary Service, on the second Sunday after Epiphany, personal letters were written to every Rector in the Diocese, asking that a special service should be held on that day and the children taught the Missionary Catechism, published for the Junior Department of this Diocese. Some of the clergy responded and sent for copies to the number of fifteen hundred, which is an increase of five hundred over the previous year. We pray that another year our effort may reach every child in the Diocese.

The Annual Conference, held at Trenton, on November 3d, was not largely attended owing to storm, but proved most helpful to those present by the interchange of ideas on conducting Parish Branches and the discussion of the subject, "Development of the Missionary Spirit."

The United Christmas gift, which has become an annual feature of our work, showed this year a remarkable unity of effort. Twenty-four parishes contributed, the aggregate value of which was one hundred and eighty dollars.

We know that the child heart is best known to the mother, therefore we urge mothers to become interested in the Junior Department of our Woman's Auxiliary.

The Division Librarians report one hundred and fifty-eight periodicals now being sent regularly to Missionaries, besides many packages of reading matter, partly worn Sunday School books, Christmas and Easter cards and booklets have gone to give pleasure and encouragement to those in the Hospitals and Schools. The Librarian of the Lower Division feels that more may have been accomplished than is reported. The Librarian of the Upper Division has subscribed to the "Churchman" for a foreign Missionary, with a portion of the five dollars received from the Ten Cent Assessment Fund.

Diocesan Constitution.

I.—NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general missionary work of the church, to communicate missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the gospel of Christ.

III.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall be a president, vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer, division corresponding secretaries and librarians, to be elected at the annual meeting and serve for one year. The election of officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made by a nominating committee appointed at the previous annual meeting and sent to each parish secretary two months before an annual meeting.

IV.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The executive board shall be composed of the president, vice-presidents, secretary and treasurer, and corresponding secretaries. The board shall meet twice or more each year, these meetings to be arranged by the president.

The Right Rev. Bishop of the Diocese shall be a member *ex officio* of the executive board.

V.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The president shall preside at all meetings and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The president and vice-presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedmen, one for Foreign, one for Mexican, one for Diocesan Missions and one for the Junior Auxiliary Work. There shall be one vice-president whose duty it shall be to take charge of a Missionary Lending Library, to consist of books, maps, reports and all other literature that may be helpful to the women missionary workers in the diocese; said library to be for the use of all members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of New Jersey.

The secretary shall call the roll at the annual meeting, and prepare and read the minutes, performing all duties belonging to the office; and the treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society.

The corresponding secretaries shall send to the rectors, vice-presidents and parochial secretaries, notices of each Division meeting, keep the minutes of said meetings, make an annual report of the same, and diffuse among the parishes intelligence concerning the missionary work of the church.

The collections at Division meetings shall be used for the contingent fund of the Auxiliary and sent to the diocesan treasurer.

Librarians shall communicate with all the parochial secretaries about such literature as may be contributed for missionary work, and keep an account of all given and where sent, reporting the same at the annual meeting.

VI.—REPRESENTATION.

Any parish may become a member of this Society by appointing a secretary and notifying the president. The secretary of the parochial branch is expected to correspond with the diocesan officers, and they *alone* correspond with the secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

A membership fee of ten cents shall be paid annually by all members towards a general missionary fund. Each parish shall send to the annual meeting two or more delegates.

VII.—MEETINGS.

The annual meeting shall be held the last Wednesday of April. On the second and fourth weeks in October and February, there shall be meetings respectively in the Upper and Lower Divisions to enable the vice-presidents to present their several branches of work. Any other meetings which may be deemed advisable can be held at times proposed by the parish or corresponding secretaries and concurred in by the president.

VII.

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting. Any proposed alteration in the Constitution must be submitted to the executive board in writing before bringing it before the Auxiliary.

Suggestions to Parish Secretaries.

Parochial Branches desiring Missionary letters should write to the Diocesan Vice-President of the branch of Missions for which they wish to work. In no case should parish secretaries write to the General Secretary for letters, as it complicates the annual reports and is unjust to the Diocesan officers who are supplied with letters.

Having selected a letter, return the others immediately, with full information as to the letter you have accepted, also the name of your parish and town. As a courtesy it is well to write at once to the writer of the accepted letter, stating your intention to work for him, thus giving him and his family the pleasure of knowing they are being remembered.

As soon as a box is sent, secretaries should report it, with its value, to the Vice-President in charge of that branch of work.

Names of parish secretaries should be sent to the Diocesan Secretary, as soon as they are elected.

All offerings for the United Offering, the Ten Cent Assessment Fund and the Systematic Missionary Fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer.

All gifts of money for Missionaries, Hospitals, Schools or Missions should be sent to the Vice-President representing the branch of work for which the offering is intended or, if sent direct to the Missions House, New York or elsewhere, report the amount and object of your gift immediately to that officer, thus making sure of its appearance in the annual report.
