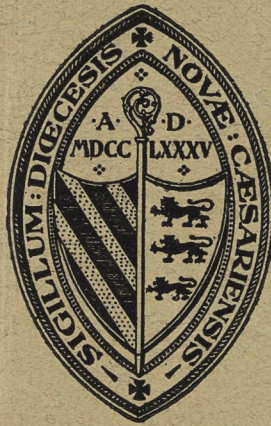

Suggestions to Parish Secretaries

Parochial Branches desiring Missionary letters should write to the Diocesan Vice-President of the branch of Missions for which they wish to work. In no case should parish secretaries write to the General Secretary for letters, as it complicates the annual reports and is unjust to the Diocesan officers who are supplied with letters.

Having selected a letter, return the others immediately, with full information as to the letter you have accepted, also the name of your parish and town. As a courtesy it is well to write at once to the writer of the accepted letter, stating your intention to work for him, thus giving him and his family the pleasure of knowing they are being remembered.

As soon as a box is sent, secretaries should report it, with its value, to the Vice-President in charge of that branch of work.

Names of parish secretaries should be sent to the Diocesan Secretary, as soon as they are elected.

All offerings for the United Offering, the Ten Cent Assessment Fund and the Systematic Missionary Fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer.

All gifts of money for Missionaries, Hospitals, Schools or Missions should be sent to the Vice-President representing the branch of work for which the offering is intended or, if sent direct to the Missions House, New York or elsewhere, report the amount and object of your gift immediately to that officer, thus making sure of its appearance in the annual report.

Secretary's Report

The twenty-seventh annual meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. Mary's Church, Burlington, Thursday, April 24th, at 10.30 a. m. In the celebration of the Holy Communion the Bishop was assisted by the Rev. Mr. Olmsted, rector of St. Mary's Church and the Rev. Mr. Rodrick, rector of St. Paul's Church, Camden. The Rev. Mr. Olmsted extended a most cordial welcome to the Auxiliary in behalf of his parish and especially of Miss Kelley, whose guests at luncheon the delegates were to be. The Bishop, after a few encouraging words about the work in general, introduced the Rev. Mr. Rodrick, who paid a glowing tribute to the late Mrs. Shubrick, followed by an address on the Church's Mission Work in Brazil, explaining the origin of the American Missionary

Society, and how the work in Brazil came to be started by that Body.

At twelve o'clock the business meeting was organized, Mrs. Clark presiding. Over one hundred and fifty delegates responded to the roll call. The minutes of the previous annual meeting, also those of the last two executive meetings were read and approved. Tellers were appointed by the President to collect and count the ballots, after which the meeting adjourned for luncheon. For the first time since its organization the New Jersey Branch was the guest, at luncheon, of an individual. Miss Kelley, a member of St. Mary's Church, and our librarian of the Lower Division, had invited the members of the Auxiliary to come to Burlington as her guests and those present enjoyed a most bountiful hospitality, dispensed by a gracious and cordial hostess. The vote of thanks proposed by the Bishop was warmly responded to.

At 1.30 the afternoon session of the business meeting was opened.

The report of the tellers appointed to count the ballots was presented and read by the President; the ticket offered by the nominating committee was unanimously elected.

The President reported the proceedings of an executive meeting held at noon, at which it was suggested to amend Article V. of the Constitution so as to provide for a vice-president of the Babies' Branch. A motion was offered by Miss Tweedy, seconded by Mrs. Abbey, that such a change be made. The President put the question before the meeting and the motion as adopted by the executive committee was unanimously carried.

A proposition to hold, on May 13th, at the Mission House, Trenton, a Conference of Diocesan Officers with the Secretaries and members of Parochial branches, was approved.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted, also those of the several Vice-Presidents as follows:

The Junior Auxiliary reported two new branches organized and gifts of money \$285.55; value of boxes sent \$452.00; adding to this \$66.43 given by the Babies' Branch, makes a total of \$803.98, all included in the above figures.

The Systematic Missionary Fund, \$29.00, was unanimously given to the Board of Missions.

Miss Carter made a short address on her work among the Indian women and exhibited the gold medal awarded to her lace exhibit at the Paris Exposition.

The meeting accepted, with much regret, the resignation of Mrs. Betticher as Vice-President of Indian Missions, and, by a rising vote, expressed its appreciation of Mrs. Betticher's three years of faithful and efficient service, and regret that she felt it necessary to give up the work.

The Bishop spoke of the great loss the New Jersey Branch had sustained in the death of Mrs. Shubrick and proposed a resolution of sympathy from the meeting to her husband. It was unanimously carried and the Secretary was requested to convey the same to Mr. Shubrick.

The nominating committee appointed by the President to serve for the ensuing year, Miss Melville, Mrs. Hooten, Miss Carpenter and Mrs. Rutgers.

President's Address

Our Fall Division meetings were held in November on account of the General Convention at San Francisco. The Upper Division met in Grace Church, Plainfield, where we were beautifully entertained by the ladies of that city.

The return of our delegates from the convention made the meeting full of interest.

The Lower Division met in St. John's, Camden. There also those who had enjoyed the Woman's Auxiliary meetings, the church services, particularly the United Offering and the inspiration which it afforded, told us of their enjoyment of the General Convention and all the benefits received from their trip.

The sadness caused by the death of Mrs. Twing; the funeral so truly in the midst of the whole Auxiliary, Bishops and delegates, as told by Mrs. Neilson, was most affecting.

For the first time we were obliged to have these meetings without our Bishop.

In February the parochial branch of St. John the Evangelist, New Brunswick, entertained the Upper Division and the Lower Division meeting was held at Riverton.

Both of these meetings showed the enthusiasm derived from the Western trip, and much work had been undertaken on account of that influence. The sad loss to our Branch of our dear friend Mrs. Shubrick, whose death occurred at Riverton, will ever be remembered and her last words, as in answer to the subject of more spirituality in our gifts to the cause of Missions were: "God will show us a way."

The work of Missions in our New Jersey Branch, if not financially greater than last year, has shown more decided zeal in all that has been reported. Two years ago there was held in New York City the most remarkable conference upon Missions ever heard in our Western world. The gathering together of the delegates was a wonderful sight. This gathering was to welcome Missionaries of all christian denominations from many lands,

who had gone to distant countries to tell of the news of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, and now come to tell of some results of their work. It was truly historic, and we listened with bated breath to the words of those veterans as they spoke of what God had wrought.

During the past year our whole country has been stirred by the later volunteer movement of the students, who represented fifty denominations from all parts of our continent and showing the rapid growth of Missionary spirit in many hearts.

At the close of their conference, when one hundred and fifty young men and women rose to signify their determination to dedicate their lives to the Foreign Fields, God's Spirit hovered over the vast assembly.

Bishop Thoburn, of India, told these consecrated ones that they must show forth in their lives Christ, as that was their special commission for the work.

May we not take for our motto his words, and show daily "More of Christ," and "less of self." Surely the blessings of such conferences have brought to us a new baptism of the Spirit of Missions, and from our midst may some go forth who will devote their lives to the service of their Master.

A few words now about our future work. We know that all the Rectors have received their appointment of dues expected by the Board of Missions. Our Bishop has written that their answers were very encouraging to him. We also, in the Woman's Auxiliary, have had every Mission in our Diocese and each parish enumerated. Every gift of the last year has been shown to us and our work mentioned as satisfactory. The gift to the school in Shanghai has been appreciated and the memorial of \$15,000 has been accomplished. Indeed it only took two months to make up this amount in all the Dioceses of our Church. So all must thank God and take courage for future efforts.

Through the kindness and courtesy of our Bishop a new place for general conferences of our workers has been made possible. While our Division meetings are of great benefit as showing us the work we ought to do,

while the various speakers stimulate our efforts, the officers of our Branch feel that we need the constant co-operation of all the parochial secretaries and their constituents. We need to come together, to see each other face to face, and to understand the minutia of our work. There is little time for discussion at the larger meetings, and it has been proposed that we meet in a more central place, with less outlay and expense.

On the second Tuesday in the month, which is Board of Missions day for our Bishop, he has made us welcome to his room in the Associate Missions House. There for an afternoon conference, from two to four o'clock, we may be able to discuss our work and seek direction and help about it. We shall come nearer to each other, and nearer to the Diocesan center; we may be able to find new channels of work and interest for the future.

We may not have many at a time but the officers will try to be present at these meetings and glad to tell of the needs of each Branch of work. Also there will be no entertainment to take up our time and distract our thoughts from work. We hope to inaugurate the new plan upon the second Tuesday in May, and as the Convention will meet in Trenton on that day, more may be with us to arrange for the work of the summer and decide how best to raise our share of this apportionment to relieve the Board of their deficit.

Junior Report

The Annual Conference of Junior Branch Officers and representatives of affiliated, G. F. S. Branches strikes the keynote of special aim for the following Winter.

The Conference met on the 26th of October in the Associate Mission House, Trenton. A lofty and spiritual ideal was set forth in an address by Mrs. E. C. Grice and the discussion for practical application was heartily entered into by the many members present. For the spiritualizing of missionary effort within the Junior Branches, the first week in Advent was decided upon as an appropriate period for devotional services for special intercession, to be held by each branch, conducted by its rector. This was generally observed, as far as can be ascertained.

A harmony in deed as well as in intention was urged, particularly loyalty to the Board. Zealous support of the Missionary Day for Sunday schools, the lenten offering and the joint offering within the branches for General Missions.

Endorsement was given to the united Christmas box for the Poncas, Santees and Yanktons of South Dakota, and that this was supported was testified by the sending of 1500 splendid gifts. Bountiful generosity and thoughtful care in preparation indicated the spirit of true giving.

Several reports from branches have appended to statement of money given, "*earned by members.*" This we welcome as a sign of personal interest and insight on the part of the Junior members to the extent of giving of one's self, not what one can spare, but what one can sacrifice.

Two new branches have been added, making a total of 28. The frequent applications for Missionary literature, maps, etc., have been gladly responded to. In proportion to breadth of intelligence in church extension, so must the inner life of the Junior member be quickened to its sense of responsibility and privilege in intercession. Would that the Junior Department might extend this influence in every parish in the diocese.

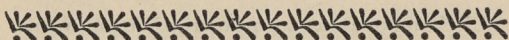

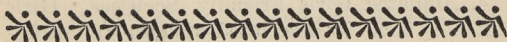
THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

IN THE

DIOCESE OF NEW JERSEY.



THE Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Diocese of New Jersey, as authorized by the General Convention of 1889, was organized February 15, 1894.

The object of this Junior Department is to make all children and young people realize their responsibility as members by baptism of the Missionary Society, which is the Church.

1. To endeavor to bring all Societies of young people or children working for the Missions of the Church into unity or touch with one another.

2. To be a medium for disseminating missionary information, and for the training of the young to be interested in and to work for Missions.

The Junior Department recognizing the varied conditions in parishes offers the following methods :

1. The Junior Auxiliary, a Society organized to interest and to train children and young people to prayer, study, and work for Missions.

2. The Babies' Branch, organized to emphasize the fact that every child at baptism becomes a member of the Missionary Society, the Church ; providing systematic prayer and means of giving for children too young for the Junior Auxiliary.

3. Associated Sunday Schools, Sunday Schools organized to systematically study the Missions of the Church.

4. Affiliated Girls Friendly Societies. Girls Friendly Societies associated with the Junior Department for the purpose of taking part in the authorized work of Missions at some time during the year.

(a.) The Junior Auxiliary may be composed of either boys or girls, or both, with proper officers appointed. It must hold regular meetings for work, study, and devotion for Missions. It is requested to join in the annual box of Christmas gifts and in the Junior offering for General Missions for which is provided a mite box. The annual dues to the Junior Department are five (5) cents per member, payable April 1st.

(b.) A Babies' Branch has a Parish Secretary who gives to and collects from the mothers of the members, the regular mite-box, requesting that the child be trained to offer a penny every Sunday with the prayer for the Missionaries and their work. If the child be too young, the mother is asked to repeat it for him.

(c.) Associated Sunday Schools. The benefits secured to a Sunday School from Association with the authorized Missionary organization for young people are : the bringing together the children of the Church into a unity of spirit and work.

The extended idea of the Church as a whole.

The employment of the methods, literature and information placed at their disposal by the Junior Department.

The obligations consequent upon this Association are :

That the Sunday Schools join in the Lenten Offering as provided for by the Board of Missions.

The observance of the Missionary Day appointed by the Board of Missions.

The adoption of a systematic study of Missions, and the appointment of regular times for such purpose.

The appointment of an officer to correspond with the Junior Department.

The dues, one dollar (\$1.00) to be paid yearly, April 1st.

The Sunday School is invited to join in the annual box of Christmas gifts.

Affiliated Girls Friendly Societies. Girls Friendly Societies thus associated with Junior Department are enabled to extend their effort of doing for others through the authorized channel of Missionary work for young people. A Missionary department may be formed within the existing organization, an officer appointed to correspond with the Junior Department. It is expected to learn about Missions of the Church at the time it is doing its Missionary work. It is invited to join in the annual box of Christmas gifts.

No dues are expected.

Missionary Information. The Junior Department is prepared and desires to furnish on request literature, maps, methods of study and data upon all Missions of the Church to all its associated organizations.

Conference. Conference of Junior Workers is held annually in the fourth week of October to which are expected to come delegates from all associated organizations. This meeting is for the purpose of exchange of thought and method, for mutual encouragement and renewal of spirit, all furthering the unity of purpose.

Report of Librarians

The Librarian of the Upper Division reports seventy-five periodicals sent regularly from fifteen parishes, besides packages of Christmas and Easter cards. About one hundred and twenty-five books were sent to a Sunday School Library, ninety of these were given by Christ Church, New Brunswick, all were in good condition, some new. A copy of the "Churchman" is sent to a Foreign Missionary and the Librarian would be glad of donations toward paying this subscription. Many encouraging letters are received from the recipients of reading matter; of special interest is a grateful letter from a missionary whose invalid son eagerly watches for the "Review of Reviews" which has been regularly mailed to him for several years.

The Librarian of the Lower Division reports about seventy-eight church publications and twenty-two secular magazines, making a total of one hundred sent regularly. There have also been sent books, church calendars, Christmas and Easter cards and about one thousand sheets of sermon paper to a clergyman in the south, who expressed a wish for it.

Diocesan Constitution

I.—NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general missionary work, of the church, to communicate missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the gospel of Christ.

III.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall be a president, vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer, division corresponding secretaries and librarians, to be elected at the annual meeting and serve for one year. The election of officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made by a nominating committee appointed at the previous annual meeting and sent to each parish secretary two months before an annual meeting.

IV.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The executive board shall be composed of the president, vice-presidents, secretary and treasurer, and corresponding secretaries. The board shall meet twice or more each year, these meetings to be arranged by the president.

The Right Rev. Bishop of the Diocese shall be a member *ex officio* of the executive board.

V.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The president shall preside at all meetings and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The president and vice-presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively—one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Freedmen, one for Foreign, one for Mexican, one for Diocesan Missions, one for the Junior Auxiliary Work and one for the Babies' Branch. There shall be one vice-president whose duty it shall be to take charge of a Missionary Lending Library, to consist of books, maps, reports and all other literature that may be helpful to the women missionary workers in the diocese; said library to be for the use of all members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of New Jersey.

The secretary shall call the roll at the annual meeting, and prepare and read the minutes, performing all duties belonging to the office; and the treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society.

The corresponding secretaries shall send to the rectors, vice-presidents and parochial secretaries, notices of each Division meeting, keep the minutes of said meetings, make an annual report of the same, and diffuse among the parishes intelligence concerning the missionary work of the church.

The collections at Division meetings shall be used for the contingent fund of the Auxiliary and sent to the diocesan treasurer.

Librarians shall communicate with all the parochial secretaries about such literature as may be contributed for missionary work, and keep an account of all given and where sent, reporting the same at the annual meeting.

VI.—REPRESENTATION.

Any parish may become a member of this Society by appointing a secretary and notifying the president. The secretary of the parochial branch is expected to correspond with the diocesan officers, and they *alone* correspond with the secretaries in New York, and transmit to them all moneys.

A membership fee of ten cents shall be paid annually by all members towards a general missionary fund. Each parish shall send to the annual meeting two or more delegates.

VII.—MEETINGS.

The annual meeting shall be held the last Wednesday of April. On the second and fourth weeks in October and February, there shall be meetings respectively in the Upper and Lower Divisions to enable the vice-presidents to present their several branches of work. Any other meetings which may be deemed advisable can be held at times proposed by the parish or corresponding secretaries and concurred in by the president.

VIII.

The constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting. Any proposed alteration in the Constitution must be submitted to the executive board in writing before bringing it before the Auxiliary.
