Suggestions to Parish Secretaries.

Parochial Branches desiring Missionary letters should write to the Diocesan Vice-President of the branch of Missions for which they wish to work. In no case should parish secretaries write to the General Secretary for letters, as it complicates the annual reports and is unjust to the Diocesan officers who are supplied with letters.

Having selected a letter, return the others immediately, with full information as to the letter you have accepted, also the name of your parish and town. As a courtesy it is well to write at once to the writer of the accepted letter, stating your intention to work for him, thus giving him and his family the pleasure of knowing they are being remembered.

As soon as a box is sent, secretaries should report it, with its value, to the Vice-President in charge of that branch of work.

Names of parish secretaries should be sent to the Diocesan Secretary as soon as they are elected.

All offerings for the Ten Cent Assessment Fund and the Systematic Missionary Fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer. All offerings for the United Offering should be sent to the special treasurer of that Fund.

All gifts of money for Missionaries, Hospitals, Schools or Missions should be sent to the Vice-President representing the branch of the work for which the offering is intended or, if sent direct to the Missions House, New York or elsewhere, report the amount and object of your gift, with receipt for the same, immediately to that officer, thus making sure of its appearance in the annual report.

Secretary's Report.

The thirty-first annual meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions was held in Trinity Church, Trenton, Wednesday, April 25th, 1906.

In the celebration of the Holy Communion, the Bishop was assisted by the Rev. Mr. Schuyler, rector of Trinity Church, who extended to the Auxiliary a most cordial greeting on behalf of himself and his parish.

The Bishop, in his address, commended the women for their energy and devotion, and for the work they had accomplished, all the more praiseworthy in that it was a voluntary service. The Bishop referred most feelingly to the sorrow and loss that had fallen on the people and Church of San Francisco.

At twelve o'clock the business meeting was organized, Mrs. Clark presiding.

The roll call showed forty-one parishes, represented by one hundred and sixty-three delegates.

The minutes of the previous annual meeting, also those of the last executive meeting, were read and approved.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted, after which the President appointed the Tellers to collect and count the ballots.

The meeting then adjourned for luncheon. Before leaving the dining room the Bishop proposed a vote of thanks for the bountiful hospitality of the women of Trinity Church. It was warmly responded to.

At 1.45 o'clock the meeting reassembled for business.

The report of the Tellers was made, showing the ticket as presented by the nominating committee was unanimously elected.

Mrs. Abbey made a strong appeal for more scholarships in the Mexican schools, as the most acceptable way in which we can help to further the work of the Church in that country.

Miss Edwards gave an outline of her work in Mission Study, what had been already accomplished, and her plans for next winter.

Mr. Clark, of South Dakota, gave some very interesting facts about his work in that Diocese.

The Systematic Missionary Fund, amounting to \$13.00, was voted to General Missions.

Mrs. Grice made a short address on the spiritual side of Missions; elevating the power of prayer to a higher plane than the giving of money.

A motion made by Miss Townsend that a "Day of Devotion," like the one held in St. Michael's Church, Trenton, last January, might become an annual feature of our work, that it be held the first week in Advent, and that the President appoint a committee to have the matter in charge, was seconded and approved.

On a motion of Miss Townsend, it was resolved that the "Day of Devotion" be noted in the Annual Report among the regular meetings.

On a motion of Mrs. Abbey, it was resolved, that hereafter the work heretofore known as "Freedmen Missions" shall be designated as "Work Among Colored People."

A pleasant feature of the meeting was the presentation of a purse of over \$300 to the Bishop as a small token of affectionate regard from the women of the Auxiliary, on his seventy-fifth birthday.

The meeting was closed with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Schuyler.

President's Address

In the year 1875, on December 8th, a meeting was called at Elizabeth, N. J., to consider the formation of a Diocesan Missionary Society. On the 5th of January, 1876, a second meeting was held in New Brunswick, Bishop Scarborough presiding, when the present Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was formed. At that date, only in a few other Dioceses, had any such missionary efforts been effected, and not any of those Bishops are now living. God's blessing has surely rested upon the work in His service.

The appreciation of the people in Mexico for dear Mrs. Clark, of Yonkers, whose life has been one long service, and will be, for Bishop Aves, has been most touching, and we expect that the work there may grow and flourish.

The summer parishes have done a fine work, and aroused much interest along the sea coast. Speakers from the mountain whites of North Carolina, and workers in Japan and China have been heard with great effect. The officers, not contented with the winter's work in New York City, show forth the glad tidings in New Jersey. At our two winter meetings in February, held respectively in Grace Church, Elizabeth, and St. Stephen's, Beverly, there were more parishes represented with a larger number of delegates than ever before at that season. The Day of Devotion, which was held at St. Michael's Church, Trenton, was a godsend to New Jersey. The kind hospitality of the rector and members of that parish was much appreciated by all who were able to be present. In speaking of this service to a clergyman in the upper part of the State, he remarked that he hoped it might be observed each three years. Some of the members of the Auxiliary felt that its influence might be much more to all if held during the Advent season. Our Indian vice-president's trip last fall has proved a wonderful revelation of that work, and she has been invited not only in our own Diocese, but

also in New York and Pennsylvania, to tell of her experiences. Mrs. Carpender has shown by her efforts and devotion how the interest in the United Offering may be increased by the wise appointment of a United Offering treasurer for the Diocese. Our vice-president who has charge of mission study and the missionary lending library, has been most useful in advice, and her work has received commendation from many other Dioceses not so highly favored as our own. The visits which our vice-president pays to the southern homes of the Freedmen are most effective, and we may hope to see the work among them more fully solved ere long. The Junior work has shown the untiring zeal of its vice-president. The fine boxes sent out from their stores have cheered the recipients in north, south and west, and the Juniors themselves love and appreciate their leaders. What shall we say of our large increase in the Babies' Branches! "Out of the mouths of babes and sucklings" come the promises we see fulfilled.

Will our dear Bishop excuse a few personal remarks? As his life and usefulness have been precious, so the Lord Jesus Christ has blessed his devotion to the Diocese and its interests. The women of the Auxiliary wish they could more adequately express their thanks for all his love and care in the great work of missions all over the world.

The unprecedented large attendance at the Annual Conference on December 2d, held in Christ Church, Elizabeth, made real the fact that the Junior Auxiliary in New Jersey is a corporate body, and in proportion to the life of each Branch, so shall be the vitality of the whole. After the celebration of the Holy Communion a very helpful Hour of Devotion was conducted by the Rev. Arthur Sherman, of Hankow, China. The meditation demonstrated the truth of the naturalness of missionary zeal, the consequent outward expression of the inward obedience of the redeemed. The testimony of the joy of the missionary's life was inspiring, and the quiet hour, in contemplation of the reason of it all, sent the workers back to their vocations with renewed purpose and clearer vision.

In the afternoon the Conference devoted itself to discussion of methods. It was decided, that in view of the enormous proportions to which the United Christmas Box had grown, that hereafter boxes containing over fifty gifts should be sent directly by the donors to their destinations.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Sherman explained what was done with New Jersey's gift, The Sherman School Fund. It is not used to support one special school, but whenever there is a favorable opening to place a day school in or about Hankow, the fund is used to help furnish it; and so it is continually winning new ground for the Mission, in giving a chance to more Chinese boys and girls.

The Juniors have also enjoyed giving the opportunity to a mountain boy to attend Christ School, Arden, North Carolina, one Branch after another gladly undertaking the cost of his tuition, until the whole eight months' scholarship was provided.

Offerings already received indicate as enthusiastic co-operation with the other Juniors of the Church in making a joint gift of two classrooms for the boys at St. Paul's School, Tokyo.

The United Christmas Box to the Santee Indians, South Dakota, and to the Colored Missions in Georgia, elicited warm thanks from the recipients. Thirty-two Branches contributed in overflowing generosity and thoughtful selection of gifts. Credit was due to the Junior member, but back of it all was the earnest effort of the leaders of the Branches, who gave their enthusiasm and conscientious direction.

A gratifying interest in missionary work has been manifested by the Branches of the Girls' Friendly Society, who affiliate so

generally now with the Junior Department. Almost every G. F. S. Branch in the Diocese works at some time during the year for missions, and it is always a pleasure to visit their meetings and furnish them with missionary information.

Considerable amount of Mission Study has been pursued in some form or another, in the Junior Auxiliaries. Regular study classes on Japan, China, Alaska, Indians and mountaineers have been held, or more elementary methods followed, such as talks, picture illustrations and exhibits, all contributing to a realization of the world's need. Simple and adaptable illustrated study courses, on detached mountings, have been prepared on the following subjects: The White Earth Indians, Minnesota; The South Dakota Indians; Colored Missions of Georgia; and the Southern Mountaineers. These may be borrowed from the Vice-President. Effort is being made to build up a bureau of information, and it has been gratifying to have the supply so generally used by the Branches and Sunday Schools.

Two Neighborhood Meetings, held in the extremes of the Diocese, have kindled enthusiasm and helped to make the Junior member realize the scope of the Auxiliary.

Three new Branches have been organized, and many others visited by the officers.

A letter was sent, before Lent, to each Branch, setting forth various objects which the officers specially recommended for work and gifts, and commanding especial and definite intercessions. The more we can teach that "intercession converts as mightily as sermons," the more we will be making real the fact of the oneness of the human family and their kindred needs. But it often seems that this is the one part of our work that is not real; it is the one recommendation or request which does not always draw out enthusiasm and response. Why is it? It is because we ourselves do not realize our spiritual needs, our spiritual blindness, as we do realize our need for hospitals, schools and Christmas festivities.

Then it is for us so to fill ourselves with the conception of the perfection of the Christ that we realize our pitiful shortcoming of our Divine Pattern. Then our own need will be real, and as the study of heathen customs has prepared us to know something of mankind in greater darkness, we will not be able to restrain ourselves from falling on our knees in supplication for them as well as for ourselves. Let us add, then, to our mission study, the definite study of our Divine Pattern; then we will be able to say with the poet: "I said, I will water my garden and will water abundantly my garden bed, and lo, my stream became a river, and my river became a sea."

REPORT OF MISSION STUDY

and

Missionary Lending Library.

The first annual report of the Mission Study Department represents only work that has originated in the various branches. The Department being only recently created, it seemed wise, for this year, not to take any initiative, but simply to comply with demands made voluntarily by the Branches themselves. The report includes every variety of educational work done in the Diocese, since all such study has its place in the development of the intelligent church woman.

Out of seventy-one Branches, twenty-seven made no reply, and out of the remaining forty-four, six made no report. Of the thirty-eight Branches left, the following is the sum of work accomplished:

Ten parishes report parochial Bible classes.

Eleven report systematic instruction in Church History or Doctrine.

Eleven report definite study of Missions, though four of these failed to complete their program.

Eighteen parishes report readings at Auxiliary Meetings.

Twenty-two parishes report Missionary Addresses from outsiders, and fifteen also report instructions on missions from their own clergy.

I have given assistance in various ways to nine small parishes and missions in which no branch exists; and beyond our own bounds to persons in Philadelphia, Pittsburg, Vermont, Michigan and Oregon.

Valuable advice from Buffalo, Chicago and California has been most useful in laying foundations.

Special mention should be made of the illustrated lectures on Missions, in Grace Church, Elizabeth; of the excellent work done by secretaries in Bound Brook and Riverside for the missions under their parish control, and the general interest and diligence manifested in this work by the small branches in the Diocese.

The Library has received many excellent books, some purchased and some loaned. A full catalogue will be issued in the fall, classified for the use of students. Thirty-two copies of the "Spirit of Missions" are being circulated among the smaller parishes, and the spirit of interest seems rapidly growing.

Report of Division Librarians.

In the Upper Division the work grows, though slowly. About eighty papers and periodicals are mailed regularly, a few of them being sent direct from the publishers. Packages of books, Christmas and Easter cards have been sent, and the "Reading Room" at Fairbanks, Alaska, has been remembered by many.

At the request of Miss Edwards, several copies of the "Spirit of Missions" are sent to persons in the diocese.

There may be more done than is reported to the Librarians; it is somewhat difficult to obtain an accurate list.

Many continue to send the same publications year after year, as they have done for ten or fifteen years, showing that they are not weary in well doing.

The Librarian of the Lower Division reports the work about the same as last year, and regrets that continued ill-health makes it impossible for her to push the work as she would like to.

To the Members of the Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese of New Jersey:

DEAR FRIENDS:

Two years have now nearly passed by since my first letter to you, and since the United Offering was made in Boston in 1904. In one year more, in 1907, the General Convention will meet in Richmond, Virginia, and then, at the Triennial Service of the Woman's Auxiliary, we women are to make our seventh United Offering. The first offering amounted to \$2,188, the last to \$150,000, what will the next be? We are all hoping and praying, too, that it will greatly exceed the last, and with that end in view, I now write to try to bring the United Offering right home to your hearts and minds.

Some Parishes are already working hard to make their offering large and really representative. Others, I grieve to say, have as yet done little or nothing; but to all alike I now appeal, in the remembrance that this is the last year before the offering of 1907, and ask them really to bestir themselves, so that our Diocesan Offering may be largely increased.

In 1907 we shall have double cause for a Thanksgiving Offering. Not only the daily and yearly blessings, and the constantly increasing spread of the Gospel are to be remembered, but also the fact that it will be the Three Hundredth Anniversary of the establishment of our dear Church in America—should we not add an extra sum to our Thanksgiving offering in commemoration of that event? When we look about at our beautiful Churches, it is hard to realize that in 1607 at Jamestown, Virginia, the Rev. Robert Hunt held the first service and administered the Holy Communion to a little band of settlers, under a sail spread among the branches of the trees, with the green grass for a carpet.

Much has been accomplished since that time, and how vastly more we should accomplish, if we all really tried, each one of us, to do her best.

We have a great deal to encourage us in our work—constant requests are being sent by the Missionary Bishops for more and more trained women workers, and with the United Offering to draw upon,

our Board is able to grant requests that otherwise would have to be refused. At present there are in the Mission Field one hundred and nine women who receive their stipends wholly or in part from the United Offering; of these, sixty-nine are in the Domestic Field, and forty in the Foreign. There are also seven who are receiving training for the missionary work through the United Offering. You will observe that I say, some of the women receive only part of their salaries, this is because a number have part paid by branches of the Auxiliary. While we are trying to raise the money to pay their stipends, do not, I beg, forget to pray for them. One of our United Offering workers said to me, "It is an inspiration and an incentive to do my very best, when I think that every cent of my salary is consecrated by prayer."

The terrible disaster that has befallen California must unavoidably make a difference in the amount of the offering from that Diocese. But if all the other Dioceses will endeavor each to give a little extra on that account, the entire sum will not be materially affected. At least let us do our share.

During the past two years, Parishes and individuals in the Diocese of New Jersey have sent \$1,280 to me. This money is in the Savings Bank, drawing interest, so at the expiration of three years we will have quite a nice little additional sum.

To those who have not yet commenced to put by for the next United Offering, let me say—wake up, and make the best possible use of the remaining year; to those who are working, do not grow tired and discouraged, but *Persevere*. And, Parish Treasurers, in making the work known, and in collecting, remember that we not only want large sums from a *few*, but small sums from *many*. Our object should be to induce each woman in our Parish to give something as a Thankoffering, no matter how small the sum may be, so that she may feel that she has her share and interest in this great Triennial gift.

If I can be of assistance, let me know, and I will gladly help.

Diocesan Constitution.

I.—NAME.

The name of this Society shall be, "THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS."

II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the general missionary work of the church, to communicate missionary intelligence, and to secure increased contributions and prayers for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

III.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall be a president, vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer, treasurer of the United Offering, division corresponding secretaries and librarians, to be elected at the annual meeting and serve for one year. The election of officers shall be by ballot; nominations to be made by a nominating committee appointed at the previous annual meeting and sent to each parish secretary two months before an annual meeting.

IV.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The executive board shall be composed of the president, vice-presidents, secretary and treasurers, and corresponding secretaries. The board shall meet twice or more each year, these meetings to be arranged by the president.

The Right Rev. Bishop of the Diocese shall be a member *ex officio* of the executive board.

V.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The president shall preside at all meetings and perform such duties as usually appertain to that office. The president and vice-presidents shall have charge and oversight of the several branches of mission work respectively — one for Domestic, one for Indian, one for Work Among Colored People, one for Foreign, one for Mexican, one for Diocesan Missions, one for the Junior Auxiliary Work, one for the Babies' Branch, and one for Mission Study, who shall have charge of the Missionary Lending Library, consisting of books, maps, reports, and all other literature that may be helpful to the women missionary workers in the diocese; said library to be for the use of all members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of New Jersey.

The secretary shall call the roll at the annual meeting and prepare and read the minutes, performing all duties belonging to the office. The treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the incidental expenses of the Society, and the treasurer of the United Offering shall take charge of all moneys contributed for that object.

The corresponding secretaries shall send to the rectors, vice-presidents and parochial secretaries, notices of each Division meeting, keep the minutes of said meetings, make an annual report of the same, and diffuse among the parishes intelligence concerning the missionary work of the church.

The collections at Division meetings shall be used for the contingent fund of the Auxiliary and sent to the diocesan treasurer.

Librarians shall communicate with all the parochial secretaries about such literature as may be contributed for missionary work, and keep an account of all given and where sent, reporting the same at the annual meeting.

VI.—REPRESENTATION.

Any parish may become a member of this Society by appointing a secretary and notifying the president. The secretary of the parochial branch is expected to correspond with the diocesan officers, and they *alone* correspond with the secretaries in New York, and submit to them all moneys.

A membership fee of ten cents shall be paid annually by all members towards a general missionary fund. Each parish shall send to the annual meeting two or more delegates.

VII.—MEETINGS.

The annual meeting shall be held the last Wednesday of April. On the second and fourth weeks in October and February, there shall be meetings respectively in the Upper and Lower Divisions to enable the vice-presidents to present their several branches of work. Any other meetings which may be deemed advisable can be held at times proposed by the parish or corresponding secretaries and concurred in by the president.

VIII.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting. Any proposed alteration in the constitution must be submitted to the executive board in writing before bringing it before the Auxiliary.
