Suggestions to Parish Secretaries

Parochial Branches desiring Missionary letters should write to the Diocesan Vice-President of the branch of Missions for which they wish to work. In no case should parish secretaries write to the General Secretary for letters, as it complicates the annual reports and is unjust to the Diocesan officers who are supplied with letters.

Having selected a letter, return the others immediately, with full information as to the letter you have accepted, also the name of your parish and town. As a courtesy it is well to write at once to the writer of the accepted letter, stating your intention to work for him, thus giving him and his family the pleasure of knowing they are being remembered.

As soon as a box is sent, secretaries should report it, with its value, to the Vice-President in charge of that branch of work.

Names of parish secretaries should be sent to the Diocesan Secretary as soon as they are elected.

All offerings for the Ten Cent Assessment Fund and the Systematic Missionary Fund should be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer. All offerings for the United Offering should be sent to the special treasurer of that fund.

All gifts of money for Missionaries, Hospitals, Schools or Missions should be sent to the Vice-President representing the branch of the work for which the offering is intended, or, if sent direct to the Missions House, New York or elsewhere, report the amount and object of your gift, with receipt for the same, immediately to that officer, thus making sure of its appearance in the annual report.

Secretary's Report

The Thirty-third Annual Meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. John's Church, Elizabeth, Wednesday, April, 29th, 1908.

At 10.30 there was a celebration of the Holy Communion by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Kirwin, of Elizabeth, the Rev. Mr. Lighthipe of Orange, and the Rev. Brockholst Morgan, assistant at St. John's Church.

Great regret was expressed at the absence of the Rector, the Rev. Dr. Glazebrook, on account of sickness, and many kind wishes for his speedy recovery found their way to his sick room in the rectory from the delegates, to whom his representative, Mr. Morgan, extended a cordial welcome.

The Bishop, in his address, renewed his plea of last year in behalf of the "Widows and Orphans of Clergy Fund," also for the Christ Church Home, South Amboy.

At 12.30 the business meeting was organized with Mrs. Clark in the chair. The roll was called; over one hundred and fifty delegates, representing thirty-eight parishes, responded.

The minutes of the previous annual meeting, and those of the last two executive meetings, were read and approved, followed by the Treasurer's report, which was accepted.

The following appropriations from the Ten Cent Assessment Fund were then made:

The Systematic Missionary Fund, amounting to \$24.00, was as heretofore voted to the Board for General Missions.

The President appointed Mrs. Arthur S. Phelps and Miss Foote to receive and count the ballots.

The meeting then adjourned, for luncheon, to the Parish House, where the delegates were most hospitably entertained by the ladies of the several churches of Elizabeth.

On reassembling at two o'clock the Rev. Mr. Wood, of the Associate Mission, made an appeal for contributions, both money and supplies, for the support of the Mission House.

The report of the tellers was received and the Secretary announced the ticket as presented by the nominating committee elected.

Miss Mann, lately returned from Japan on furlough, gave a very interesting account of her work among women and girls in that country. A special collection was taken up and \$25.00 was given to Miss Mann toward the many needs of her mission.

The reports of the several Vice-Presidents were then read, as follows:

The report of the Babies' Branch, in the absence of Mrs. Jones, was read by the Secretary. It showed \$119.45 collected during the year, all included in the above figures.

This Branch shows a marked falling off, when compared with the figures of last year, which is owing to the illness of Mrs. Jones, who was not able to attend to the collections personally.

The meeting heard with regret of the continued ill health of Mrs. Jones and the consequent necessity for her resignation from the office of Vice-President of the Babies' Branch, a position which she has held since the organization of that branch of our work. The Secretary was requested to convey to Mrs. Jones the affectionate sympathy of the meeting and their hope that she might yet see her way clear to continue her identity with a work which she

and Dr. Jones had been instrumental in starting in this Diocese.

Miss Edwards reported for the committee appointed by the Executive Board to investigate the advantages of neighborhood meetings and to formulate a plan for districting the Diocese for the holding of such informal meetings, with the view of their taking the place of the regular midwinter Division meetings.

The plan suggested by the committee divides the Diocese into six districts, three in each Division. The Burlington Section to include the surrounding parishes and missions. Camden Section to include all the Branches within a ten mile radius of Camden. Vineland Section to include parishes and missions in the neighborhood. Long Branch Section to be bounded by Sewaren on the north and Lakewood on the south. Plainfield Section, bounded by Elizabeth on the north and by Bound Brook on the south, including Rahway and Linden. Trenton Section, bounded by Metuchen and Trenton.

The committee reported a number of very successful neighborhood meetings held during the past winter, but as there was a very decided feeling against these meetings taking the place of the midwinter Division meetings, the Bishop suggested that the idea be abandoned.

The following resolutions, passed by the Executive Board and submitted for the consideration of the parishes before being put to vote at the annual meeting, were read by the Secretary:

Resolved, That there shall be two Vice-Presidents, one in the Upper and one in the Lower Division, to assist the President in arranging for and conducting meetings and such other duties as pertain to the office.

Resolved, That the several departments of the work shall hereafter be cared for by committees, each of which shall consist of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman, who shall be officers of the Board, and who shall have power to associate others with them as the interests of the work may demand.

Both resolutions received the approval of the meeting and were passed unanimously.

The question of the most convenient place for holding the annual meeting was brought up for discussion, and it was the unanimous opinion that Trenton was the most convenient point, also that some arrangement should be made by which the meeting could be always held there. There was much discussion of the subject, which resulted in the acceptance of a motion made by Mrs. Abby that each parish Branch be asked to contribute the sum of one dollar toward a Central Expense Fund, to be used to defray the expenses of the next annual meeting.

The matter of the pledge for Archdeacon Hughson's nurse was considered. Some parishes had discontinued their specials for this purpose and it was the unanimous decision that the amount should be greatly reduced.

Many suggestions were made and it was resolved that all designated offerings for the pledge should be paid over to Archdeacon Hughson, but to notify him that the New Jersey Branch could not assume the responsibility of making good any deficit, and that the further consideration of the question be left to the next annual meeting.

The meeting, by a standing vote, returned thanks to the members of St. John's parish, and the women of the other Elizabeth churches, for their hospitable entertainment, after which the Bishop closed the meeting with prayer and the benediction.

President's Address

The year just ended has been one of promise and fulfillment in the Woman's Auxiliary all over the world, and more than ever have we realized the many ways in which God shows us His strength, relieves our anxieties and prepares the way for work in the Mission fields.

Beginning with the meetings of the Auxiliary in Richmond, the Missionaries, Diocesan Officers and other delegates were encouraged and stimulated by reports of the United Offering, and the men's Thank Offering, the amount of both being far more than most of us dared to expect, although some of little faith said it should have been larger.

We must wait for the seed sown to ripen, and may those who are spared to see it in 1910 exclaim, "what has God wrought!"

The great work of the Bishop of London must be our pattern, and those who are going to the Pan-Anglican Council will have an opportunity to see something of this work for themselves.

The reports from the foreign field have been full of interest and encouragement for further effort.

How near to each of us come the countries which Dr. Lloyd visited. As he so graphically describes them, it is no longer a foreign field, but our very own Mission, and

the work of our parishes has been quickened and increased because of the glowing words of our Missionaries. In our own country, Alaska and her needs and present conditions have been brought very near to us by the illustrated talks given by Archdeacon Stuck.

In reading the many reports from the parishes, as we have learned to know the thoughts and needs of the workers, many of whom we have never seen, every desire for the good of others has brought a blessing to ourselves, and may not this blessing remain with us from year to year, as we read about the Missionaries and meet them both in and out of the field.

It seemed a hard trial for Bishop Knight to leave New Jersey, but as reports of his work come to us, may we not rejoice in our own Diocese for the good he has been able to do for Western Colorado, and we realize that his going has been a great help in our home work. Year by year our hearts are opened to these wonders.

At the Associate Mission the work is still progressing. The Bishop may always rely upon the workers there, and the fine showing of our Diocese in the gifts of the women will always remain and prove a benefit to New Jersey.

We have enjoyed many good meetings during the past year.

The Day of Devotion which was led by the Canon of the Cathedral in Albany, was of great interest. Then, at our first meeting in Plainfield, and the second at Mt. Holly, many who had been to the General Convention took part. These were followed by midwinter meetings at Burlington and New Brunswick, neither of which was attended by the Bishop.

It is hoped that some plans to be decided upon later by the Executive Committee, may enlarge the scope of our work, and stimulate interest both at home and abroad.

Annual Report, Junior Auxiliary

This year the Junior Department acted upon the plan of holding Sectional Annual Meetings; four were arranged and held at Trinity Church, Red Bank; Trinity Church, Princeton; St. Paul's, Camden; and St. Stephen's, Netherwood. With one exception all four meetings were as well attended as the one had been formerly, so the officers felt the plan had tripled the effectiveness of the Annual Meeting.

The success was due to the Rectors and entertaining parish Branches, the order being first a Service, when particular intercessions were made and a Missionary speaker heard; viz: Bishop Van Buren, Rev. Mr. Clapp, Rev. Mr. Van Meter, Rev. Mr. Claiborne and Deaconess Drant. The Juniors and their officers afterwards adjourned to the Parish House, where brief, helpful papers on methods were read and discussed, business transacted and light refreshments served, giving an opportunity for social intercourse. The result has been more earnest and united work.

The latter has been particularly advantageous for the sinking of individual desire in the community of interest, has indicated the true Missionary intent, and furthered more substantial benefit. The officers have appreciated the confidence implied and desire to record this tribute to the parish officers, whose loyal support and devoted service have counted for so much in the general progress.

In anticipation of the change of the Woman's Auxiliary Constitution, let us speak of the help it will be to the Junior Department to have a Vice-Chairman who will constitute a distributing centre of interest and help to the lower end of the Diocese. The proverbial two heads better than one will prove itself in a Diocese of numerous centres. Hereafter, Branches south of Trenton will be under the personal direction of Miss Florence M. Roberts, 188 Pennington Avenue, Trenton, whose experience and special study of Junior Auxiliary work fit her for efficient service. The one Secretary and Treasurer for the Diocese, Miss Mary R. Wood, will remain the same and will continue her devoted performance of duty. Also Miss Grace A. Smith, as Secretary of Missionary Study, will continue her prompt attention to calls for Missionary literature.

In this department of work an innovation has been made. The lack of simple, available, compact Missionary information has been felt, and a Central Committee, composed of Junior parish officers, has been appointed. Each of the six have prepared or are now preparing a packet containing a Map, an Outline of Conditions and Missionary Work, Mounted Illustrated Cards, a Story of Japan, China, the Colored Race in Africa and the U. S., the Indians, Mexico, the Islands of the Sea; these packets to be renewed every two years. The first four are ready now to be lent to Branches by the Secretary

of Missionary Study. Appreciation of the usefulness of this Missionary Lending Library has been expressed many times by the borrowers; it is hoped that more Branches will avail themselves of its help. The united Christmas box sent to the Santee Indians, South Dakota, was a splendid manifestation of Missionary enthusiasm, containing eight hundred gifts from fourteen Branches. The other Branches assumed the responsibility of providing the entire Christmas gifts for separate Mission stations, sending directly. Sixteen Colored Missions in southern Virginia were the beneficiaries of nine hundred gifts. There has been such a steady improvement in the Christmas boxes that it has been decided next Christmas to send directly to the Mission stations, instead of to a central point for repacking. However, to provide opportunity for smaller Branches which cannot supply complete boxes, these Juniors have been asked to send whatever they can to Archdeacon Claiborne, Sewanee, Tennessee, where he sorts appropriate gifts for his numerous small mountain stations. Then the deficiency or superfluity of one box will be offset by another.

The interest and contributions for the United Offering have been sustained and increased, so that it is hoped the Juniors next year may assume a scholarship for St. Augustine's School, Raleigh. The Sherman Chinese Day School Fund has enabled Mr. Sherman to open new day schools, thereby winning new ground for the Church, the day school serving as a net for boys and girls who are thus prepared for the higher and more extensive training of Boone and St. Hilda's Schools.

The Wetmore Memorial Scholarship has given another mountain boy a chance to live the life for which he was intended.

The Oneida Hospital pledge has given a small assurance to those who have the burden of the support of the only agency of ministration to the sick Indian on the Reservation.

That the Juniors should not confine their ministrations to the picturesque in Missions, they have helped Deaconess Patterson to pay her Sunday School room rent in Coalgate, Oklahoma, a station of great discouragement, for the indifference and sordidness of the people.

A number of neighborhood meetings have been held with the endeavor to widen the circle of interest. The diocesan officers have enjoyed these opportunities of making new friends and strengthening the ties of fellowship in work.

The circle of Devotional Reading during Lent has been joined by more parish officers, and this development of the hidden life cannot help but to strengthen the work.

A weak point in the Junior Auxiliary throughout the Church has been the loss of the girl of high school age. To her mind, the Junior Auxiliary has been meant only for children, and so has been beneath her notice. May I ask parish officers to give special attention to the

winning and holding of this most potential member of the Auxiliary? Let us do all we can to disabuse their minds that the Junior Auxiliary is for children only. It would be better, if necessary, to sacrifice the children to the older girls. Give them something definite to do and, if necessary, dismiss the younger ones earlier that the older girls may receive more fitting instruction in Missions.

There is no work which is worth while which does not become at some time a drudgery, or assume a discouraging aspect. When we have failed to win this girl, or hold that one, when we feel and see the work diminishing, when we feel unable to answer all the calls for help, it is hard not to get discouraged. But just hold on, dear fellow worker, and persist in it. There are certain calls to which we can always respond. I mean the silent calls to prayer that come to us in busy moments and may be ruthlessly pushed aside; but if not repelled, if always responded to, will result in a fellowship with the Source of all power who will do the winning for us, will do all that we ask of Him in His own way, not ours.

Report of Mission Study

The work of Mission Study for the year in New Jersey can be summed up in much the same words as in several years past. There is as yet no normal training class for teachers in the Diocese, and so all the study meetings reported represent the original thought and execution of individual Branches. It is impossible to specify the number of classes properly so-called; I cannot always gather how

far the preparation is done by one person, or by all the members, but it is quite sufficient to say that twenty-five per cent. of our Branches have made a definite study of one field; that forty per cent. report the regular reading aloud of the Spirit of Missions or other Missionary literature; and fifty per cent. report Missionary addresses.

Until the proposed scheme of sectional division goes into effect, your present representative is biding her time. But when that consummation is attained, I hope to see in each section a good, thorough Mission Study Class, as a rallying point and centre of action for the Branches included in that district.

Meanwhile there are several encouraging features. First, an increasing number of Branches volunteer the statement that they are greatly stimulated by the interest in Missions displayed by the parish clergy. Only a few years ago we used to hear the constant cry: "Our Rector cares nothing for the Auxiliary." I believe that day has long gone by, and that at any rate in this Diocese we have the hearty support and blessing of those who are set over us.

Second, the spirit of neighborly interest and co-operation has been very evident. The Camden interparochial class was given up, owing to Mrs. Grice's pressing duties elsewhere, but it was replaced by three neighborhood meetings at Burlington, Camden and Merchantville. I would instance the latter as a shining example of the possibilities of a Sectional Conference. There were three most excellent addresses on "The Churchwoman's Threecold Relation to the Home, the Church and the Community," followed by a spirited and delightful discussion in which all took part. In Trenton an interparochial Mission study class was conducted by the Rev. Charles Townsend, to whom the Mission Study Department would extend very hearty thanks for so signal a service to the work of the Auxiliary in Trenton; and from several other Branches come interesting reports of combination meetings held at their own wish.

Thirdly, the well rounded character of the usual report. So many of our Branches cover every known way of arousing interest. I would quote as an example Trinity parish, Asbury Park. It reports a Missionary address and definite study of the Philippines, as well as a new and admirably selected Missionary library, a legacy to the Branch. It provides meetings for sewing, entirely separate from study meetings, held in private houses, with tea, and, not forgetting the better part, it adds the mention of a monthly Celebration with Missionary intention.

I am not surprised that the Branch reports an excellent attendance. There is nothing left undone to secure that healthy, hopeful growth which we all desire for the Auxiliary.

And lastly, I wish to express my own deep satisfaction and pleasure in the work Mrs. Arthur Phelps has been doing, not only in her own parish, but in the Missions under that parish, and in Plainfield as well.

I have now a syllabus of Mrs. Phelps' course on "The Beginnings of Christianity" which I should like to see in use in every parish in the Diocese.

All the excesses and shortcomings of modern Mission study work are due to the fact that people nowadays are prone to think of Missions as the flower of modern religious enthusiasm, and not as the root from which all our modern thought and action has sprung. The basis of Missions is still the foundation of the Apostles and prophets and other foundation can no man lay.

The saints of the primitive Church are still the type and pattern for the Missionary of to-day, and they who learn from the history of the early Church what is the theology of Missions, the motive of Missions, the method of Missions, and the end of all Mission work, will find within themselves that firm foundation of doctrine and practice which will ensure their understanding and support of the Missionary work of to-day.
