CENTRAL EXPENSE FUND.

Your attention is called to the following important changes in the financial department of the Auxiliary which were made at the Annual Meeting in Trenton, January 18th, 1922. As the budget adopted last year was not met, it was decided: 1st—That in addition to the usual dues and assessments a sum equal to five per cent. of its gifts to all missionary objects be given by every Parish Branch to the Central Fund. 2d—That *all* money must be sent to the Treasurer, Mrs. S. SKETCHES OF PLEDGES FOR 1922.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

SCHOLARSHIP, CHRIST SCHOOL, ARDEN, NORTH CAROLINA.

An industrial and academic school for boys and girls in the mountains of North Carolina. The training is intensive and practical. The Mission also ministers to the people for miles around. The support of the work is entirely dependent upon the gifts of friends and personal appeals.

ALL SAINTS' HOSPITAL, MCALESTER, OKLAHOMA.

The first hospital to be built in Oklahoma. Furnishes medical and surgical aid of the highest class and facilities are both ample and reasonable. Founded by Episcopalians but non-sectarian in its benefits.

ST. ANDREW'S SCHOOL, SEWANEE, TENN.

St. Andrew's School for Boys is conducted by the Holy Cross fathers in the mountains of Tennessee not far from Sewanee. The boys and their parents live in far apart mountain cabins where every man shifts for himself. It is a field of wonderful promise. There is not a work now being carried on there that could not accomplish tenfold more if adequately supported.

HOSPITAL OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD, FORT DEFIANCE, ARIZONA.

For medical and surgical treatment of Indians on the Navajo Reservation. The only hospital in Arizona. Land given and buildings erected by the Indians.

SCHOLARSHIP, TORTELLA HALL, NENANA, ALASKA.

A school for the education of the more promising boys and girls, both Indian and Eskimo. Founded by Miss Farthing.

SCHOLARSHIP, ST. AUGUSTINE'S SCHOOL, RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA.

For the education of negroes in the South. Founded in 1867. Has collegiate, normal, primary, night schools and industrial departments. Also special courses in teaching and nursing, which are the only professional vocations open to colored women in the South.

SCHOLARSHIP, ST. PAUL'S SCHOOL, LAWRENCEVILLE, VA.

A normal and industrial school for negroes, founded by Archdeacon Russell for young men and women of his own race. The largest missionary and educational work of the Church among the colored people with a potential influence for good to all the surrounding country.

BISHOP PAYNE DIVINITY SCHOOL, PETERSBURG, VA.

An institution for the theological education of colored candidates for Orders. Named in memory of the first Bishop to Liberia, the Rt. Rev. John Payne, a Virginian. The school is supported in part by the American Church Institute for Negroes.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

BIBLE WOMAN IN JAPAN.

Kimura San is the Senior Mission Woman of the American Church in Japan. Served for twenty-three years as head of the training school for Mission women until the school was moved from Tokyo to Sendai. She is now in charge of five out-stations in the District of Tokyo.

MISSIONS IN LIBERIA.

A movable pledge to be used as occasion requires. The 12,000 Liberians are mostly descendants of negroes from America. They live along the coast. It was to this colony of freed slaves that the American Church sent its first foreign missionary in 1835.

Back in the interior are one million natives. Thirty thousand of these are more or less civilized and under the influence of Christianity. The remainder are heathen. The work of the Church in Liberia is conducted almost entirely by negroes. They are devoted to their people and give what they can to missions but are too poor to support them without financial help. Their greatest need is for an Industrial School.

ST. MARY'S HALL, SHANGHAI.

A Church school for girls with 258 students—102 of these are Christians, 156 are non-Christians, including those who would be baptized if their parents gave consent. They come from Central China, Peking, and the north. Number of alumnae, 111. The latter are at present raising money for St. Mary's Building Fund. The graduating class of 1920 raised \$2,000 for the auditorium of the new building by an entertainment which they gave for this purpose. Money is greatly needed in order to finish the buildings which the war has thus far prevented from being done.

ST. LUKE'S HOSPITAL, TOKYO, JAPAN.

Founded by Rudolph B. Teusler, M.D., in 1900. The work grew so rapidly that in 1910 the hospital had eighty beds, thirty nurses, ten Japanese and three foreign doctors. In 1913 it was inadequate to the demands made upon it. A Japanese Council gave \$50,000 and the Emperor made a personal gift of \$25,000.

The war prevented the carrying out of plans for a new building, but in 1917 land was bought and three years later the National Council authorized the building of the first three units of the new plant at a cost of four hundred thousand dollars.

The hospital is, and has been a demonstration of Christianity. Every nurse graduated from the training school has gone out a Christian.

St. Luke's is the only foreign-equipped hospital between Honolulu and Manila prepared to render service to Missionaries and all other foreigners, rich or poor.

DIOCESAN MISSIONS AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

Work in the Pine Belt of New Jersey.

Under the charge of the Rev. C. W. Twing. A parish of 1,000 square miles where less than one per cent. of the people have been baptized. They know nothing about religion. The mission of the Church is to lift them from their poverty, degradation and ignorance and help them to help themselves.

CHRIST CHURCH HOME, SOUTH AMBOY.

Opened in 1857. It provides a home and practical education under Church influences for friendless little girls or those whose parents can only partially support them. The endowment fund is no longer sufficient for the expenses of the Home. The committee must have a larger income or turn some children away. The alternative depends upon liberal giving on the part of Church people in the Diocese.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS OF THE CLERGY FUND.

The interest from this Fund, together with offerings from Parishes and Missions, is used at the discretion of the Bishop and Standing Committee to meet as far as possible the needs of the widows and orphans of deceased Diocesan Clergy.

ST. BERNARD'S SCHOOL.

A Church school for boys of moderate means where they may be under religious influence and obtain a grammar and high school education and also learn such trades as gardening, printing and carpentry.

As the charge for tuition is much below the actual cost of the school, the balance must be made up by gifts and contributions from other sources.

MISSIONS OF LATIN AMERICA.

The Hooker Memorial School and Orphanage, Mexico City, Mexico. Three Scholarships: Scarborough, Clarkson, Bowne. For the education of native girls. Established by Mrs. Hooker. The pupils vary in age from six to sixteen, and come from all classes, from the wealthy Mexican who pays the tuition of his daughter, to the orphan of the Peon family. Bishop Aves says, "These Mission Schools are the lever by which a submerged people may be raised to a higher plane of opportunity and Christian living."

BRAZIL.

The Brazilian Mission was organized in 1893, was taken over by the Board of Missions in 1905, as an independent church under its own independent Bishop. In 1907 the church in the U. S. was asked to accept the work as one of its missions. Bishop Kinsolving resigned as a "Bishop of the Church in Brazil" and became the first Missionary Bishop of Southern Brazil. The whole republic is now the field of the American Church. The people are largely descendants of the original Spanish and Portuguese settlers, re-inforced by immigration from Europe.

The work of the Church at present is concentrated at Rio Grande do Sul, the most southern state in the republic with a population of 800,000 people. There are forty churches and mission stations, all of which are in charge of native clergy.

The greatest need is for the development of the educational phase of the work. There is a Diocesan school for boys at Porto Alegre with an attendance of 80 boys—40 of them are boarding pupils. The "Southern Cross School" marks a great advance in the Brazilian Mission. Schools for girls are equally needed. With the necessary equipment, teachers could easily be found and a great work undertaken.

WORK IN PORTO RICO.

The Missionary District of Porto Rico is included in the Second Province and should therefore be the special charge of the dioceses in New York and New Jersey. It is greatly in need of support of missions and schools.

LEPER COLONY.

The Leper Colony is situated on Cabras Island at the entrance to San Juan Bay, a barren reef where conditions are unsanitary and uncomfortable. The Rev. Harvey P. Walter has charge of the work of the Episcopal Church and has done what he can for the lepers. He has made a personal appeal to the legislature for their removal from the island to the mainland where they can have a hospital, a physician, better housing and better clothing. These things will be possible when more money is available.

MINUTES OF THE FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The Forty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in All Saints' Church, Trenton, January 18th, 1922. The meeting was opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion and a short address by the Bishop of the Diocese. The rector of the parish, the Rev. Ralph Urban, extended a cordial welcome to those present.

The meeting was called to order, the President, Mrs. Fitch, in the chair. One hundred and forty-five answered the roll call, representing fifty parishes. The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were approved as read.

The report of the Corresponding Secretary was read and accepted. The Treasurer's report was accepted and placed on file. Mrs. Monroe for the Emery Fund reported \$1,704 from New Jersey. Following these, the President made her Annual Address. The Educational Secretary gave an outline of the proposed plans for the coming year. It was moved and carried that she be authorized to complete these plans by cooperating with the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

On motion of Mrs. Phelps, it was voted that a message of sympathy be sent to the Misses Emery upon the death of their sister, Miss Julia C. Emery; seconded and carried, and Mrs. Phelps was requested to write the letter.

Noon-day prayers were offered by Archdeacon Shepherd after which the Vice-President of the Upper Division reported the organization of the Elizabeth District and one new Woman's Auxiliary branch; the Vice-President of the Lower Division, who is also President of

the Woodbury District, reported the Atlantic City District and five new Parish branches organized. A motion was made and carried that the Presidents of the Districts be notified of Diocesan Meetings.

Mrs. Matthews for the Devotional Committee, advised the appointment of a Devotional Chairman in each District to assist the Diocesan Chairman, five of the Districts having already followed this plan.

The Nominating Committee presented the following ticket:

Chairman of the Domestic Committee, Mrs. Harold Morse, Merchantville; Chairman of the Diocesan and Social Service Committee, Mrs. Paul Matthews, Princeton; Chairman of the Devotional Committee, Miss Caroline Simpson, Elizabeth. There being no other nominations, on motion, which was seconded and carried, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot and the officers named were declared elected, each to serve for three years.

The President read a letter from Miss Lindley, in which she asked for signatures to a Resolution reflecting the mind of the Christian homes of America, by sending their affectionate greetings to their sisters in Japan, pledging themselves to do all in their power to develop the good will and understanding between their respective countries.

The report of the Finance Committee showed that only about \$600 of the \$1,000 asked for the Central Expense Fund had been received. Mrs. Matthews moved that five per cent be asked from pledges given by the parishes to meet overhead expenses, lost. A spirited debate followed as to the method of increasing this fund, lasting until the lunch hour, after which it was again discussed. A motion was made that in addition to the usual dues and assessments, a sum equal to five per cent of its gifts to all missionary objects be given by every Parish branch to the Central Fund. Carried.

A motion was made that all money be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary instead of the Department Chairman as the custom has been in the past. Carried.

The delegates elected to the Triennial which will be held in Portland, Oregon, in September, 1922, were: Mrs. Fitch, Mrs. Matthews, Mrs. Phelps, Mrs. Shepherd and Miss Tappan. The alternates were: Mrs. Tidd, Mrs. Trowbridge, Mrs. Monroe, Mrs. Stretch and Mrs. Stroud.

Mrs. Morse, Chairman of the Domestic Committee, reported all pledges paid, and moved a renewal of last year's pledges, with an additional one of \$100 for St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tenn. Carried.

The Chairman for the Foreign Committee, Mrs. Stroud, reported all pledges paid and moved the continuance of the present pledges and a new one of \$100 for the Building Fund of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Japan. Carried.

The Chairman of Committee for Latin-America, Miss Tappan, reported a deficit in some of the pledges but recommended the same pledges as last year, with some changes in the amounts, on motion, seconded and carried.

The Chairman of the Diocesan Committee, Miss Foote, moved a renewal of her pledges with additional one of \$100 for St. Bernard's School. Carried.

The reports of the United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Shepherd, the Librarian of the Church Periodical Club, Mrs. Tidd, and the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Stretch, were read and accepted.

Progress was reported by all of the District Presidents. A vote of thanks was extended to the Rector and ladies of All Saints' parish for their gracious hospitality, after which the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

In summing up the work of the past year, several important events have taken place: the Centennial of the "Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society;" the Fiftieth Anniversary of the founding of the Woman's Auxiliary to that Board; and the completion of the "Emery Fund" to which New Jersey had the privilege of contributing over \$1700; this is the first time a specified sum has been asked for, subscribed and over, within the time limit set.

Our Diocese has made a steady advance; two Districts, Elizabeth and Atlantic City, have been organized, thus completing organization in all of the Districts. Woman's Auxiliary branches have been formed in Holy Comforter, Rahway; St. Thomas', Glassboro; St. Mark's, Hammonton; Holy Trinity, Delair; Trinity Church, Vincentown and St. Barnabas, Mantua.

The usual Spring Division meetings were held, in the Lower at St. Mary's, Burlington, on April 20th, when Miss Riddell, head of the Hospital of the Resurrection of Hope, Kumamoto, Japan, was the speaker; the Upper Division meeting in St. Paul's, Westfield, on April 27th, when the Rev. Camille Estornelle spoke about conditions in Porto Rico.

The Fall Division meetings were held on October 26th, in Christ Church, Riverton, with the Rev. A. E. Frost from the Philippines as the speaker, and in St. James' Church, Long Branch, when Dr. Mansfield from the Seaman's Church Institute, gave a graphic description of that work.

I have held three Executive Board meetings, three special Committee meetings, have conducted one Officer's Conference, and attended six others at the Church Missions House; I have also addressed 9 District and 12 Parish meetings.

My correspondence includes 237 letters and 43 postals; I acted as Hostess for the Provincial Summer School, Princeton, and had the honor of being sent as a delegate to the Provincial Synod, in Garden City.

Our Annual meeting again brings changes in the personnel of the Executive Committee; Miss A. B. Foote, who for many years has been Chairman of the Diocesan Committee, retires this year; we cannot sufficiently express our appreciation of Miss Foote's loyalty and she will be greatly missed.

On January 9th, there passed into Paradise the soul of our beloved friend, Miss Julia C. Emery, who for forty years was the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary; a faithful servant of the Master,

she won through her gentle kindly nature the confidence and love of all who knew her. No one can estimate how much her example and leadership has meant to the Auxiliary, but "her works do follow her."

Shall not we, too, share in that vision which she had, ever looking upward and onward, striving towards that goal which she worked so valiantly to attain, so that the Woman's Auxiliary may be a better, bigger, and stronger part of the Diocese of New Jersey.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING.

The United Thank Offering Treasurer would report that she has received since October, 1919, when the last triennial offering was made, \$10,575.16. \$5,641.12 of this amount has been received since the last annual meeting. Ninety-three Parishes and Missions have sent offerings which are included in the above. The amount to the

credit of the United Thank Offering is \$5,486.53 more than it was January, 1919.

I am glad to note that the new Auxiliary at Delair has become interested in the United Thank Offering.

I have visited those Parishes and attended those District meetings to which I have been invited and made addresses upon the United Thank Offering. I have written two letters to all the Parishes and Missions setting forth the spiritual value and the blessedness of this United Thank Offering.

I note with much gratitude that more and more of the Parishes are presenting their semi-annual United Thank Offerings at a corporate Celebration of the Holy Communion when special prayers for the workers are offered.

I would stress particularly the fact that there are only two more semi-annual offerings in this triennium. The Spring offering will be collected March 1st; the Fall offering must be collected by the parochial treasurers very much earlier owing to the fact that the Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Portland is to be held the first week in September. It will be necessary that these offerings should be returned to me by August 25th, at the latest. Please make this fact known as widely as possible. I know that it is a difficult time in the year to collect an offering, and still I am sure that by a little extra personal effort it can be done. Three years ago the largest semi-annual offering was sent to me in September. May we not hope for the same interest and gifts this year?

We thank all those who have helped to make the United Thank Offering to date larger than it has ever been at this time in the triennium. We wish to urge upon every woman of the Church the present opportunity of contributing to this object this year. If this could be done we would not only reach the fifteen thousand dollar goal that we have set ourselves, but go very much beyond it, and it is important that the offerings should be much larger, for if the triennial offering is only as large as it was three years ago it will mean that *no more* United Thank Offering workers can be sent out for three years as this amount will be required to support those who are already engaged in the work. The very success of the workers calls us to greater efforts and larger gifts in order that the needs of the growing work of the Church may be fully met by sending out more women as teachers, nurses and doctors.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF
THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF
NEW JERSEY, 1921.**

Since you made me your Educational Secretary just a year ago I have been chiefly occupied trying experiments on you. Though they have not all been very successful, they have taught me a good deal about you. My first experiment was in the line of Conferences. With the help of the District Educational Secretaries, of whom I now have a complete set, and other leaders, we put through a series of five Conferences on the Church's Work, in ten different centres. Fifty of these conferences were held in Camden, Trenton, Burlington, Woodbury, Red Bank, New Brunswick, Elizabeth (Trinity and St. John's) and Plainfield (Grace and Holy Cross). They were led by Archdeacon Shepherd, Mrs. Shepherd, Mrs. Jennings, Mrs. Bent, Mrs. Simmons, Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Molineux, Mrs. Howard Richards, Mrs. Stroud, Mrs. Weaver, Mrs. Morton Lewis, Mrs. Matthews, Miss La Monte, Mrs. Welles, Mrs. Perot and Mrs. Phelps. The total attendance was 1,600 from 80 Parishes.

In June I sent our letters to the leaders suggesting summer reading of the Survey, Dr. Sturgis book; The Church's Life, and How Can We Know the Way, by Dr. Jeffrys.

In September I called a meeting at Elizabeth of the leaders in the Upper Division, and at Merchantville of those in the Southern Division to confer with Canon Lewis about plans for our work this winter. There was a fine attendance and a good discussion.

During October I attended, at the Bishop's request, all but one of his conferences in the different districts of the Diocese and at each one I conducted an educational conference for the women who were sent from their Parishes to the meetings, and I also addressed the clergy and others on our educational plans and work.

Your educational department felt that the first and most important thing for us to do was to train more leaders for Parish classes, and for that purpose there were held during November and December seven training classes in different centres. Canon Welles led a class on Social Service at Camden, which though not very largely attended will, we hope, furnish four new leaders for Social Service discussion classes in Parishes. Rev. E. W. Hall's class on the same subject at Elizabeth, in the evening, had an attendance of the highest quality, but smallest quantity, and I think has resulted in no new leaders. Miss Boyer's class on Missions also at Elizabeth had an average attendance of 14, representing five Parishes, and tho' I am sure some

of our present leaders gained much help and inspiration from the class, I have as yet heard of no *new* leaders who have come out of it. Canon Lewis' four classes on the Church's Ways, held in Atlantic City, Camden, Trenton and Plainfield, were well attended everywhere but in Trenton, and were most instructive. The subject matter will surely be used by all the members of the classes in their work in the Church, School and elsewhere, but similar classes could not well be conducted by lay people. This second experiment has been rather disappointing. Our people have not responded with much enthusiasm to our attempts to bring Church training within their reach, and some other way of approach will have to be found. The leaders of these classes were fine in every case and we feel deeply indebted to them for their help.

Early in this month I sent out a brief questionnaire to all Auxiliary branches found in our last report. Eighty-three were sent and I have had replies from 49, containing the following information:

Many small branches have failed to answer, very likely having nothing to report, but I cannot understand why I have not heard from ANY Parish in Trenton except from St. James—which made a very good report—or from Rumson, Bernardsville, Moorestown, Pitman or Woodbury which all surely have had some addresses or conferences during the year.

The last question on my report blank concerns my next experiment since only 33 people are reported as attending summer conferences, and only 14 Discussion classes are said to have been held, and only 9 Parishes think they want classes this year, it would seem that our New Jersey women are not willing or able to leave their own homes to learn more about the Kingdom of God. I am not willing to believe that they don't WANT to know more! Consequently I asked, as my last question: How many of your people would like information

about Home Reading Courses and on what subjects? The answers report 44 people who would like to know more of this. Three want Social Service, 14 the Bible, 2 the Prayer Book, 17 Church History, 2 missions and 5 specified no special subject. This seems to me a fair response to our next experiment.

This innocent little plan of mine has had an unexpected reception by the Diocesan authorities. I first told Canon Lewis about it and he approved, he told the D. B. R. E. about it and they approved so much that they want a share in it; then he told the Bishop and he approves so much that he wants the plan enlarged so that it may meet the needs of everybody in the Diocese. I had meant to have a nice little program ready to distribute today for you to take home to your Parishes, but since my child has been adopted by the Diocese I shall have to wait till its career has been planned out by its new friends, and then send you a program telling you all about it. This will give us more time to talk it up everywhere and interest all the people who can't (or won't) go to classes! I am of course very thankful to have all this help in developing our plans.

The following features will doubtless be included in the plan:

1. A Reading Course with suggested books for reading under the direction of, or with the help of, some special person chosen as leader for that subject, the course requiring a short period of reading each day or week, with no reports or examinations.

2. A Reading Course, leading to a diocesan certificate or diploma which would call for regular reading and reports and at the end some sort of test or examination.

3. An advanced course for those competent and willing to do the required work, under the S. H. S. H. S. through the Diocesan officers.

4. A special course for Church Sunday School Teachers.

The subjects asked for on the Questionnaires are sure to be included in these courses, and we have already secured a number of highly qualified men and women to act as directors or correspondents. We could, of course, have kept this plan entirely in the Auxiliary but I am sure you will all agree with me that it is much better to share it with the whole Diocese, and thus help to build up an intelligent and well informed body of lay people. I should like to have you take a vote on this matter, and, if you are willing, give me permission to work our new plans under the direction of the D. B. R. E. They will finance the work, besides giving us their help in other ways. I want every member of the Auxiliary to take one of these courses, either the simpler or the more advanced ones. The former need only take 20 minutes of your time each day and they will all give you

a satisfaction and pleasure which will repay you a thousand times for your efforts. I am sure you want to be as well informed about the affairs of the Kingdom of God as you are about these of this world, and remember how often you have heard that the first and great commandment is: Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul and with all thy *mind*. Our hearts are often moved, and our souls are stirred, now let us offer God the service of our minds as well.

CONSTITUTION OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF NEW JERSEY.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The name of this Society shall be "The New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Church."

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the Missionary, Social and Educational work of the Church, to deepen the spiritual life of its members, and to encourage increased offerings for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

ARTICLE III.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, one for the Upper and one for the Lower Division of the Diocese, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a United Offering Treasurer, an Educational Secretary, and a Chairman for each department of the work. The President, the two Vice-Presidents, the United Offering Treasurer, the Educational Secretary and the Chairman shall be elected triennially to serve for a term of three years and shall not be eligible for more than two full consecutive terms.

At the election of 1918, the President, Vice-Presidents and the Educational Secretary shall be elected for three years, four officers for two years, four for one year. At each succeeding election the four officers whose terms expire shall be elected for three years.

The Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer shall be appointed by the President for the duration of her term. The Diocesan Correspondent for the C. P. C. shall be appointed by the Bishop.

ARTICLE IV.—EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Seven members shall constitute a quorum. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled by appointment by the President for the unexpired term. No officer shall at any time hold more than one office.

ARTICLE V.—REPRESENTATION.

Any parish organizing a branch of this Society shall notify both Recording and Corresponding Secretaries of the names and addresses of their officers, and shall make a report of their work to the Recording Secretary each year before the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENTS.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting, when such amendments have previously been submitted in writing and approved by the Executive Board, and read at both an Upper and Lower Division Meeting.

The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting or at both an Upper and Lower Division Meeting.

BY-LAWS.

I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

1. The President shall preside at all meetings, have a general oversight of all branches of the work, and perform such other duties as usually appertain to that office.

2. The Vice-Presidents shall assist the President in arranging for and conducting meetings and in the absence of the President shall preside at meetings in their respective Divisions. They shall be responsible for the organization of the Districts in their Divisions.

3. A Chairman shall have charge of each of the Branches of Mission Work, respectively, and shall receive and forward all moneys contributed for the same, and make a full report to the Recording Secretary before the Annual Meeting.

4. The Recording Secretary shall call the roll at all meetings, prepare and read the Minutes, prepare the Annual Report, and perform all duties belonging to the office.

5. The Corresponding Secretary shall send to the Rectors, Diocesan Officers and Parochial Secretaries notices of each Division Meeting and to the Officers notices of Executive Board Meetings. She shall make an Annual Report of the same.

6. The Diocesan Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the expenses of the Society, the Central Expense Fund and collections at Diocesan Meetings.

7. The Treasurer of the United Offering shall take charge of all moneys contributed for that object.

8. The Educational Secretary shall have charge of Mission Study and of the Missionary Landing Library, which is for the use of all members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese.

9. The Chairman of Social Service shall make a survey of social and industrial conditions in the Diocese, and point out opportunities of service to the members of the Auxiliary.

10. The Chairman of the Devotional Committee shall make arrangements for Corporate Communion and the Days of Devotion for the Auxiliary throughout the Diocese.

11. The Supply Secretary shall take charge of all Missionary Boxes.

II.—MEETINGS AND COLLECTIONS.

The Annual Meeting of this Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in January. There shall be meetings in the Upper and Lower Divisions in the autumn and spring to enable the officers to present their several branches of the work.

The offerings of the Division Meetings shall be used for missionary purposes, at the discretion of the President and two other officers.

III.—FINANCES.

The finances of this Society shall be administered by a committee, consisting of five members of the Board, to be elected by the Executive Board, the President and Treasurer being members *ex officio*. This committee shall each year prepare a budget of the expenses of the Society covering all expenses and submit the same at the Annual Meeting for the approval of the delegates. The adoption of the budget shall be by ballot.

Every member of each Parish Branch shall pay annually twenty-five cents to the Branch Treasurer, who shall forward these dues to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Report of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Forty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in All Saints Church, Trenton, January 18, 1922. The meeting was preceded by a Celebration of the Holy Communion, the Bishop being the Celebrant. The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Fitch; 145 delegates answered the roll call, representing 50 Parishes. The president reported that the regular Spring and Fall Division Meetings were held, those for the Lower Division in St. Mary's, Burlington, and Christ Church, Riverton, and for the Upper Division, in St. Paul's, Westfield, and St. James', Long Branch. The President held three Executive Board meetings, three Special Committee meetings, conducted one Officers' Conference, and attended six in New York. She also addressed nine district and twelve Parish meetings, acted as hostess for the Provincial Summer School, Princeton, and was a delegate to the Provincial Synod at Garden City.
