SKETCHES OF PLEDGES FOR 1924.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Appalachian Industrial School, Penland, N. C.

Among these people the scheme of life is that of two hundred years ago. The problem is one of isolation.

The Penland School is a distinctive mountain work and serves a large community. The course of study has been planned to help the children to be better mountaineers.

Christ School, Arden, N. C.

An Industrial and Academic School for boys and girls in the mountains of North Carolina. The training is intensive and practical. The mission also ministers to the people for miles around. The enrollment is now two hundred and the school needs enlarged equipment.

All Saints' Hospital, McAlester, Oklahoma.

The first hospital to be built in Oklahoma. Furnishes medical and surgical aid of the highest class and facilities are both ample and reasonable. Founded by Episcopalians but non-sectarian in its benefits.

St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tenn.

St. Andrew's School for Boys is conducted by the Holy Cross fathers in the mountains of Tennessee not far from Sewanee. The boys and their parents live in far apart mountain cabins where every man shifts for himself. It is a field of wonderful promise. There is not a work now being carried on there that could not accomplish tenfold more if adequately supported.

Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon.

A hospital where excellent medical and nursing care may be obtained. A room is reserved for white patients but nine-tenths of the work is done for the Indians. Dr. and Mrs. Burke are in charge and are doing most effective work for the natives and all others who come to this hospital in the far North, which is named in honor of a missionary who was universally loved and respected throughout Alaska.

Scholarship, Nenana, Alaska, St. Mark's Mission.

A school for the education of the more promising boys and girls, both Indian and Eskimo. It is supported largely by special gifts. It has suffered in common with other institutions by the great increase in the cost of all supplies—new buildings are also needed.

Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona.

For medical and surgical treatment of Indians on the Navajo Reservation. The only hospital for Indians within a radius of five hundred miles. Land given and buildings erected by the Indians.

St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, North Carolina.

For the education of negroes in the South. Founded in 1867. Has collegiate, normal, primary, night schools and industrial departments. Also special courses in teaching and nursing, which are the only professional vocations open to colored women in the South.

St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va.

A normal and industrial school for negroes, founded by Archdeacon

Russell for young men and women of his own race. The largest missionary and educational work of the Church among the colored people with a potential influence for good to all the surrounding country.

Bishop Payne Divinity School, Petersburg, Va.

An institution for the theological education of colored candidates for Orders. Named in memory of the first Bishop to Liberia, the Rt. Rev. John Payne, a Virginian. The school is supported in part by the American Church Institute for Negroes.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Missions in Liberia.

The 12,000 Liberians living along the coast are mostly descendants of negroes from America. It was to this colony of freed slaves that the American Church sent its first foreign missionary in 1835. Back in the interior are one million natives, nearly all of whom are heathen. The work of the Church in Liberia is conducted almost entirely by negroes. They give what they can to missions but are too poor to support them without financial help. Their greatest need at present is for hospitals.

Japan.

Many buildings which stood the shock of the earthquake in Tokio, succumbed to the fire. All the Churches, Hospital Missions and houses were destroyed and must be rebuilt.

Bishop Tucker says: "It is the moment for showing the Japanese that Japan cannot be safely reconstructed without the co-operation of Christianity. It is the greatest opportunity that the Christian world has ever had in Japan."

China.

The Mission of our Church in China is to educate the young people in the true meaning of Christian democracy. No portion of China is now closed to Christianity. If we are to save Asia we must help the Native Church in its growth and permanency. The pledge is for general work.

DIOCESAN WORK.

Work in the Pine Belt of New Jersey.

Under the charge of the Rev. C. W. Twing. A parish of 1,000 square miles where less than one per cent. of the people have been baptized. They know nothing about religion. The mission of the Church is to lift them from their poverty, degradation and ignorance and help them to help themselves.

Christ Church Home, South Amboy.

Opened in 1857. It provides a home and practical education under Church influences for friendless little girls or those whose parents can only partially support them. The endowment fund is no longer sufficient for the expenses of the Home. The committee must have a larger income or turn some children away. The alternative depends upon liberal giving on the part of Church people in the Diocese.

Widows and Orphans Fund.

The interest from this Fund, together with offerings from Parishes and Missions, is used at the discretion of the Bishop and Standing Committee to meet as far as possible the needs of the widows and orphans of deceased Diocesan Clergy.

St. Bernard's School.

A Church school for boys of moderate means where they may be under religious influence and obtain a grammar and high school education and also learn such trades as gardening, printing and carpentry.

As the charge for tuition is much below the actual cost of the school, the balance must be made up by gifts and contributions from other sources.

CHURCH EXTENSION FUND

The Extension Fund is a Fund out of which the Archdeacon is able to assist the Missions in their various worthwhile projects. It has been of immense help and enabled us to carry out many enterprises. Be sure and remember this Fund in the distribution of your gifts.

MISSIONS OF LATIN AMERICA.

Haiti.

Work was begun in 1861 by a young negro—James Theodore Holly—who later became the first Bishop of the Church in Haiti. The present Bishop is trying to help the natives to improve their standard of living and develop their resources. Haiti is an unevangelized country and nowhere can there be found a people more in need of light and truth. The greatest need is for schools and teachers.

The Hooker Memorial School, Mexico City, Mexico.

For the education of native girls. The pupils vary in age from six to sixteen and come from all classes. Bishop Aves considers these Mission Schools to be the lever by which a submerged people may be raised to a higher plane of opportunity for Christian living.

Brazil.

The Brazilian Mission was organized in 1893 and in 1905 became an independent church under its own independent Bishop. In 1907 it was made a Mission of the American Church and Bishop Kinsolving became the first Missionary Bishop of Southern Brazil. The whole republic is now the field of the American Church. The work at present is concentrated at Rio Grande do Sul. There is a school for boys at Porto Allegre with one hundred pupils. The "Southern Cross School" makes a great advance in the Brazilian Mission. Schools for girls are equally needed.

Work in Porto Rico.

The Missionary District of Porto Rico is included in the Second Province and is therefore the special charge of the dioceses in New York and New Jersey. Industrial and agricultural schools are needed where the young may be taught modern methods.

The many friends of our devoted United Thank Offering Treasurer, miss this year having her with us, she has always been an example of what the best type of Auxiliary officer should be, giving first herself, then of her means to HIM whom she served.

I wish I could express my heartfelt gratitude for all the patience and loyalty you have shown me during my term as your Executive, and I am deeply concerned as to how best I can serve you, how make the work more interesting and effective, and I should be glad to welcome any constructive criticism.

"There was no room for HIM in the inn." How many still so busy with the affairs of the world, deny HIM room in their hearts and lives. May we not pray for a deeper realization of our Lord's indwelling presence, that we may be ready, as far as may be, for a share in the blessings that are sure to come, by giving ourselves fully and freely for the Master's service.

MINUTES OF THE FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING
OF THE NEW JERSEY BRANCH OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The Forty-ninth Annual Meeting of the New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Church, Trenton, on January 9, 1924.

The meeting was opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion with Bishop Knight as celebrant. The sermon was preached by Bishop Matthews. The business meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Fitch. Owing to Mrs. Shepherd's serious illness, her report as U. T. O. Treasurer was read by Archdeacon Shepherd before the regular business—he reported a balance of \$6,441.26, \$1,500 more than at the same period three years ago. He also spoke of Diocesan Missions and asked for interest in the Church Extension Fund. The roll call followed to which 170 delegates responded, representing 54 parishes.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were approved as read. The Treasurer, Mrs. Monroe, read her report. It was moved, seconded and carried that it should be accepted as read and placed on file. It was followed by the report of the Corresponding Secretary, Miss Kelly. The President announced that the Executive Board had elected Mrs. Morse to be Assistant Treasurer to the U. T. O. Treasurer on account of Mrs. Shepherd's illness and that Mrs. Morse had accepted.

Mrs. Matthews, Chairman of By-Laws Committee, reported that a change in the by-laws was necessary.

It was moved and seconded that section 9 be omitted. Carried. It was moved and seconded that By-Law III be cut. Carried. Mrs. Matthews, for the Finance Committee, reported that the budget for 1924 will be \$900 for the Central Expense Fund, and \$5,420 for pledges. The abolishment of the 25c. membership dues and the adoption of proportionate giving to the Central Expense Fund was announced. A discussion over different plans for paying pledges followed. A motion was made that the apportionment plan for paying pledges be adopted for one year. Seconded and carried. The meeting adjourned for luncheon and reconvened at 2 o'clock. Bishop Matthews presided and called for the report of the Nominating Committee. Miss Armstrong, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, announced the following ticket:—President, Mrs. C. P. Fitch, 1924-27; Vice Presidents, Miss Jones and Mrs. Perot, 1924-27; Chairman Latin America, Miss Tappan, 1924-27; Educational Secretary, Mrs. A. S. Phelps, 1924-27; Supply Secretary, Mrs. A. T. Stretch, 1924-27.

It was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed and the Secretary instructed to cast the ballot. Carried. The Secretary cast the ballot and the President, Mrs. Fitch, resumed the chair. The President appointed Mrs. Monroe, Treasurer; Miss Kelly, Corresponding Secretary, and Miss Hartshorne, Recording Secretary. The President's report followed. Rev. T. A. Conover spoke of the summer conference at Princeton and the Annual Meeting of the Church Mission of Help was announced. Mrs. Phelps, the provincial representative on the National Council, made a report and was followed by Mrs. Morse, Chairman of Domestic Missions. Mrs. Morse recommended that a new pledge of \$200 for the Appalachian Industrial School be adopted and a continuance of the old pledges for domestic work, with an increase of \$100 for All Saints Hospital. It was moved and seconded that this pledge be adopted, as presented. Carried. Mrs. Morse recommended that a new pledge of \$100 be adopted for the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Alaska. Moved and seconded that this pledge be adopted. Carried. Also a continuance of the two of last year with the same amounts. Mrs. Morse recommended that the pledge for St. Augustine's and St. Paul's School each be increased to \$200 and the others remain the same as last year. It was moved and seconded that these pledges be adopted. Carried. Mrs. Stroud, Chairman of Foreign Missions, recommended pledges of \$500 each for Liberia and China and \$1,000 for reconstruction work in Japan be adopted. Carried.

Miss Tappan, Chairman, reported for Latin America, recommended that a new pledge of \$100 should be made for Haiti, the others remaining the same as last year. It was moved and seconded that this pledge should be adopted. Carried.

Miss Jones, Chairman of the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund Special reported having asked the nine District Presidents to appoint representatives in each parish for this project and mentioned \$1,500 or \$2,000 as a possible goal for the diocese. Mrs. Matthews, Chairman for Diocesan Missions, recommended that the pledges remain the same as last year. It was moved and seconded that the pledges for Diocesan work remain the same as last year. Carried. A discussion on the time of sending money to the Chairmen followed. It was moved and seconded that all money be sent in before November 1st. Carried. Miss Simpson, Chairman of Devotional Committee, made her report, which was followed by the report of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Phelps. Mrs. Stretch, Supply Secretary, reported 135 boxes sent from 86 parishes valued at \$6,710.87. Mrs. Tidd, Diocesan Correspondent for C. P. C., made her report and asked for books for Japan. The

President stated that all money for pledges should be sent to the Chairmen instead of to the Treasurer. The amount of the offering at the opening service, \$65.70, was announced. It was moved that the offering be applied to the deficit on Latin America. Seconded and carried. A motion was made that the offering be applied to the Hooker School pledge. Seconded and carried.

Mrs. Matthews offered the following resolution:

The members of the Woman's Auxiliary desire to express their loving appreciation of the faithful work of our U. T. O. Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. R. Bowden Shepherd. Her influence has not only led us to give freely to this great offering but it has also made us realize its spiritual value in our own lives. Her last message which Mr. Shepherd brought us to-day will surely be an inspiration to us for the rest of our lives and will lead us in this Diocese to look upon the U. T. O. as a constant opportunity to show our love and thankfulness for the example of her life.

Resolved that this appreciation of our affection be sent to Mrs. Shepherd and spread upon our minutes. This resolution was seconded and carried by a rising vote. The President announced that the Spring meeting of the Lower Division will be held at Swedesboro on April 23rd and of the Upper Division at Grace Church, Plainfield April 30th. A motion was made and seconded that a message of love and sympathy be sent to Dr. Baker in his illness. Carried. A note of thanks was extended to the Rector and women of Trinity Parish for their kind hospitality.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING.

At the last annual meeting you re-elected me as Diocesan Treasurer of the United Thank Offering for three more years. Almost immediately after that meeting I became ill, though for a few months I was able to visit some of the Parishes in the interest of the work and to attend the April Division meeting in Haddonfield.

I have received during the year the spring and fall collections and have been much gratified at the response to my letters, which had to take the place of personal visits.

Only a very few of the Parochial Treasurers fail to make a semi-annual return. It is earnestly desired that all such treasurers should send their collections of offerings to the Diocesan Treasurer in September and March.

I am able to report having received \$6,441.26 which is for the first year of the new triennium, and it is over \$1,500.00 more than was received during the same period three years ago. In addition, the Treasurer of the National Council has received \$950 from a legacy from Lucy H. Hart, of New Brunswick, which with interest added will be sent to the Diocesan United Thank Offering Treasurer just before she goes to New Orleans in 1925.

The outlook, therefore, is more encouraging for raising the full twenty-five thousand dollars during these three years, which I expressed the hope that the women of the Diocese would raise by October, 1925.

I am thankful that in addition to the increased gifts the spiritual value of the offering is being more and more accentuated by its presentation locally at a Celebration of the Holy Communion.

I desire to thank the Parish Treasurers for their splendid co-operation and to ask of them renewed zeal which will not rest satisfied until all the women in every Parish and Mission are enlisted as contributors to the United Thank Offering.

May you have courage and patience and faith to carry on.

REPORT OF THE DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE.

A general call was sent out to all Auxiliary branches to observe a Day of Intercessions for Missions, March 14th.

Seven Quiet Days were held during the Lenten season by eight of the nine districts in the Diocese: Burlington, Camden and Woodbury united, Elizabeth, Monmouth, New Brunswick, Plainfield and Trenton. Atlantic City did not hold a Quiet Day, but reported a special observance of the Day of Intercessions. In addition to the District Quiet Days, a special Quiet Day was held in Princeton, Monday in Holy Week. This makes eight Quiet Days in the year, which, I believe to be the largest number the Auxiliary has ever held.

The Annual Corporate Communion of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese was observed Sunday, October 7th. Nine Districts reported its observance in thirty-nine parishes.

There are sixty-four subscribers to the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet, representing one hundred and sixty-two copies.

The Prayer Partnership Plan has been launched in the New Jersey Auxiliary. Three Districts have formed groups, and a fourth is in process. The order in which the groups were formed were Burlington, Monmouth and Plainfield, while the formation of the Woodbury group is almost completed. Names of missionaries to be prayed for have been assigned to these groups, and the partners are in correspondence with them, and the members of the groups are praying for them.

1923.

The Diocesan officers and leaders report 89 addresses made and 15 classes held. This does not, of course, cover the informal remarks which they have made at other meetings, nor the Church School classes they teach. For instance I find I have only spoken—made addresses—at 25 meetings, but I have attended 99 meetings and you may be sure I was not silent at many of them!

As the educational work done in the parishes can be found in the Parish Reports I will merely mention the other forms of adult educational work which have been attempted during the past year. Quite a number of parishes failed to fill in and return their report blanks.

Last January, Training classes were held two consecutive weeks at Elizabeth and Camden, on Missions, Social Service and Personal Religion, with an afternoon general class on Methods conducted by Miss Boyer. The registration at Elizabeth for all classes was 39 and at Camden 19. In November similar classes were held at Elizabeth, Camden and also Trenton, with the afternoon open class led by Canon Lewis the first week and Bishop Matthews the second. The registration for all classes was in Elizabeth 26, Camden 29 and Trenton 18. In each case a few more came for the afternoon classes but as they did not register I cannot report the number. My only comment is that all these classes were very expensive in car fare, time and effort of the leaders. I think I may add that those who made the venture of attending them found them well worth while.

The plan for the Home Study of Christian Literature has been working fairly well. 37 readers have either rented our books or followed our courses at their own expense. The books of the Holy Scripture Course, 1, have been used by 10 readers. Course 2, Church History, by 6, and Course 3, The Church's Belief, by 8. The other readers have either bought their own books or borrowed separate Missionary books from

our library. We are offering two new courses this year: Course 4, The Acts of the Apostles, and Course 5, Japan.

Most of the readers have been enlisted as the result of a visit of the Educational Secretary to the District or Parish. Please invite me. Remember that these courses are not merely for members of the W. A. Every one is welcome to use our books. I now have three young men reading with great interest, one the Holy Scripture Course, and two the Course on the Church's Belief. We all need to be better informed so as to be able to stand by our Church and our Creed with intelligent loyalty. I beg each one of you to help to make this department the power it should be in the Diocese of New Jersey.

CONSTITUTION OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF NEW JERSEY.

Article I.—Name.

The name of this Society shall be "The New Jersey Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Church."

Article II.—Object.

The object of this Society is to interest all women in the Missionary, Social and Educational work of the Church, to deepen the spiritual life of its members, and to encourage increased offerings for the spread of the Gospel of Christ.

Article III.—Officers.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, one for the Upper and one for the Lower Division of the Diocese, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a United Thank Offering Treasurer, an Educational Secretary, and a Chairman for each department of the work. The President, the two Vice-Presidents, the United Thank Offering Treasurer, the Educational Secretary and the Chairman shall be elected triennially to serve for a term of three years and shall not be eligible for more than two full consecutive terms.

At the election of 1918, the President, Vice-Presidents and the Educational Secretary shall be elected for three years, four officers for two years, four for one year. At each succeeding election the four officers whose terms expire shall be elected for three years.

The Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer shall be appointed by the President for the duration of her term. The Diocesan Correspondent for the C. P. C. shall be appointed by the Bishop.

Article IV.—Executive Board.

Seven members shall constitute a quorum. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled by appointment by the President for the unexpired term. No officer shall at any time hold more than one office.

Article V.—Representation.

Any parish organizing a branch of this Society shall notify both Recording and Corresponding Secretaries of the names and addresses of their officers, and shall make a report of their work to the Recording Secretary each year before the Annual Meeting.

Article VI.—Amendments.

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting, when such amendments have previously been submitted in writing and approved by the Executive Board, and read at both an Upper and Lower Division Meeting.

The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any Annual Meeting or at both an Upper and Lower Division Meeting.

BY-LAWS.

I. Duties of Officers.

1. The President shall preside at all meetings, have a general oversight of all branches of the work, and perform such other duties as usually appertain to that office.
2. The Vice-Presidents shall assist the President in arranging for and conducting meetings and in the absence of the President shall preside at meetings in their respective Divisions. They shall be responsible for the organization of the Districts in their Divisions.
3. A Chairman shall have charge of each of the Branches of Mission Work, respectively, and shall receive and forward all moneys contributed for the same, and make a full report to the Recording Secretary before the Annual Meeting.
4. The Recording Secretary shall call the roll at all meetings, prepare and read the Minutes, prepare the Annual Report, and perform all duties belonging to the office.
5. The Corresponding Secretary shall send to the Rectors, Diocesan Officers and Parochial Secretaries notices of each Division Meeting and to the Officers notices of Executive Board Meetings. She shall make an Annual Report of the same.
6. The Diocesan Treasurer shall take charge of all moneys appropriated to the expenses of the Society, the Central Expense Fund and collections at Diocesan Meetings.
7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall take charge of all moneys contributed for that object.
8. The Educational Secretary shall have charge of Mission Study and of the Missionary Lending Library, which is for the use of all members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese.
9. The Chairman of the Devotional Committee shall make arrangements for Corporate Communions and the Days of Devotion for the Auxiliary throughout the Diocese.
10. The Supply Secretary shall take charge of all Missionary Boxes.

II.—Meetings and Collections.

The Annual Meeting of this Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in January. There shall be meetings in the Upper and Lower Divisions in the autumn and spring to enable the officers to present their several branches of the work.

The offerings of the Division Meetings shall be used for missionary purposes, at the discretion of the President and two other officers.

III.—Finances.

The finances of this Society shall be administered by a committee, consisting of five members of the Board, to be elected by the Executive Board, the President and Treasurer being members *ex officio*. This committee shall each year prepare a budget of the expenses of the Society covering all expenses and submit the same at the Annual Meeting for its approval.
