SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
NIOBRARA LEAGUE.

1878-'79.

THE Annual Meeting of the Niobrara League was held on the 7th of November, 1878, in the Sunday-school room of the Church of the Transfiguration, and the work of the season was begun by the election of officers for the ensuing year.

Thirty-eight parishes reported at that time delegates accredited to the League; and one parish joined during the season.

Fifteen of the Scholarships in the Indian Schools are now entirely supported by Sunday schools or individuals connected with the League.

The work undertaken during the season, to which all money not designated was applied, was the support of the ladies working among the Indians in Niobrara. The amount contributed provided for nine of these.

By the liberality of one parish, the Chapel at Flandreau was completed; and, by individual gifts, a new dormitory for St. Mary's School was built, money for a Church in the Wilderness and for a building at one of the stations provided, and five young men supported during their stay at the East. The Sunday-school of one parish gave to the Welsh Memorial Church at Yankton, and children from all parts have contributed to the Christmas boxes.

A full list of boxes sent is presented with this Report. These boxes differ from those sent by the Societies who work for Domestic Missionaries, in that they contain articles mainly for the Indians who compose the congregations and fill the schools of the Missionaries, and not for the Missionaries themselves. Boxes to these, might very reasonably be sent, both to the white Clergy and teachers and to the native Clergy and Catechists.

Some of the Scholarships in the Indian Schools are not yet provided for, although the schools are full. This means that a number of children are taught for whom no one is paying, the provision made for ten being stretched to include twelve or even more, so that none need be turned away.

Reports from Yankton tell of the continued usefulness of the printing-press sent out long ago by the League, and re-enforced lately by a gift of a hand-press and type from an honorary member.

The "Anpao," the monthly paper in Dakota and English, deserves a larger circulation at the East, as its reports of Indian affairs are extremely interesting to those who believe that the Indian has a future. The three Dakota pages may be only a literary curiosity, but a glance at the abstract of their contents will show that an effort is made to teach this ignorant people something about the world outside of their reservation, to instruct them in the past history of the Church and of their own country, and to tell them facts about themselves, their health and their diseases, their farms and their harvests, which will be of use to them in their daily life. To enable the paper to be as widely distributed among the Dakotas as it should be, 1,000 paying subscribers are needed. The subscription list in September was only 363.

The account of the Missionary Conference held in June at Yankton Agency, with its attendance of six white and two Indian Clergymen, its lay delegates from nineteen different stations, its crowds of lookers-on encamped upon the hillsides, cannot fail to astonish those who only think of the Indian as on the war-path, and know nothing of the hundreds who are walking in the paths of peace.

The young men sent to the East are rapidly learning English, and well repaying the outlay in capacity for increased usefulness among their brothers left at home. The boys and girls at school at Hampton, Virginia, have all done well, and Captain Pratt has found many more ready to leave their fathers and mothers and go with him among the white people, to learn the white man's ways.

A Chronology of Missions among the Indians has been prepared to accompany this Report, showing when work was first begun at each station now under Christian care, and what chapels and schools have been built.

On another page will be found a list of articles especially needed in the Missions.

The Constitution of the Niobrara League, as amended, is published with this Report.

The Christmas Boxes are also fully reported.

NEEDED FOR THE INDIAN SCHOOLS AND MISSIONS.

Shoes and stockings for women and girls.

Boots and shoes for men and boys.

Outer garments for men and boys (coats, vests, pantaloons, hats).

Sheets, blankets, comfortables, and coverlids (blue plaid domestic) for double beds.

Table cloths, towels, and rollers.

Soap, combs, and brushes.

Unbleached muslin, calico, and flannel, in the piece.

Basted work, needles, thread, thimbles, etc., for the sewing schools.

Groceries and hospital stores.

Children's Christmas Boxes, 1879.

The Committee on Christmas Boxes did not find quite as large a number of articles at the Bible House this year as last. This is, perhaps, partly owing to the fact that several boxes have been sent directly to the Indians by those who filled them.

Though these boxes did not go through the hands of the Committee connected with the Niobrara League, they serve to supply the Indian children with Christmas gifts, and save the extra and thereby unnecessary expense on freight.

With the gifts received at the Bible House the plan adopted last year was followed, that of sorting and selecting such articles as would be most suitable for each Mission, packing them in different boxes and sending them direct to the Missionary in charge.

In this way one box was filled for Yankton Agency, one for the Rev. Luke C. Walker, two for Cheyenne River Agency, and one from Calvary Free Chapel for Oneida, Wisconsin.

Most of the children, who have worked for the Indians this year, live at a distance from New York, some even in the Southern States. They seem to work mostly by forming themselves into societies or bands, and as we read the letters sent from these little ones, we cannot but feel that their hearts as well as their hands have been in the work. That all the boys and girls of the Church, those who have as yet done nothing, as well as those who have contributed in former years, may unite in helping and cheering the heart of the Missionary, would it not be well for us to remember that the interest of children in Missions, as well as that of older persons, needs to be constantly aroused and kept alive; that they must be taught that Missionary work must not be spasmodic; that because they have sent a large contribution to the Christmas box one year, they have done all the Church requires of them, but as they increase in years, so must their labors for and interest in Missions increase, until they, in their turn, become members of the Niobrara League, its officers and earnest workers. May God grant that long before this time shall come and these children shall have ripened into manhood and womanhood, all Christian people may unite in the cry, not "exterminate" but "God save the Indian."

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called THE NIOBRARA LEAGUE.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work, in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, in aid of the Indian tribes in our land, especially those under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Niobrara. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are: the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the Mission; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid; and the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the Indian.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the Treasury thereof, annually, the sum of at least one dollar. Any one may be constituted a Life Member by the payment at one time of the sum of one hundred dollars.

ARTICLE IV.

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, two Vice Presidents, a Secretary, and a Treasurer; who, with two ladies from each Parish represented in the Association, shall constitute a Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to regulate the affairs of the Association, and, under the supervision of their Rectors, to further its work in the Parishes to which they respectively belong.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all Meetings of the Association and of the Board of Managers; to call Special Meetings of the same when occasion shall arise; and to present to the members of the Association such objects for their interest and contributions as shall have been approved by the Committee in charge of Indian Missions.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice Presidents to preside in the absence of the President ; to make special efforts to interest such Parishes of the Diocese as are not already represented in the League, in the work of the Association ; to obtain from the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary fresh information from our Indian Missions, and to read the same at the Stated Meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the Minutes and conduct the correspondence of the Association and of the Board of Managers ; to send out all notices of the Stated and Special Meetings of the same ; and to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all money contributed for the work of the Association ; to pay over, after each Meeting, to the Treasurer of the Committee in charge of Indian Missions all funds, excepting such undesignated amounts as shall be needed for printing, postage and other incidentals, with a written explanation of the distinct purposes for which such offerings are destined ; to present a Report at each Stated Meeting ; and to prepare an Annual Report to be printed with the Annual Report of the Secretary.

ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution shall not be altered except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a Stated Meeting of the Board of Managers.

 BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Association on the first Thursday of November in each year, at such hour and place as the President and Secretary shall agree upon.

II.

The Officers of this Association shall be elected by ballot, at the Annual Meeting, and shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been elected.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a Stated Meeting of the Board of Managers ; and any one so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting of the Association.

IV.

Every Parish in the Diocese is entitled to send two Delegates to the Board of Managers. The Delegates shall be responsible for the representation of their Parish at every Stated Meeting.

V.

The Stated Meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the first Thursday of each month from November to May inclusive.

VI.

The order of business shall be as follows :

Prayers.

Reading of Minutes.

Treasurer's Report.

Roll call, with Reports from Delegates.

Miscellaneous business.

Address, or Reading of Letters.

Prayers.

VII.

At a Meeting of the Board of Managers any number present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and at the Annual Meeting of the Association, a number of members equal to one-half the number of Parishes represented in the League shall constitute a quorum for the election of Officers.
