SECRETARY'S REPORT, FOR 1892 AND 1893,

OF THE

Niobrara League, Diocese of New York.

The twenty-first annual meeting of the Niobrara League was held on Thursday, November 3d, 1892, in the Guild-room of Grace House, 802 Broadway, New York City.

The work of the season opened with prayers by the Rev. Dr. Huntington, followed by the reports of Secretary and Treasurer, and the election of officers for the ensuing year.

Thirty-four churches, 4 societies and the Junior Auxiliary were represented during the session of 7 months; 6 new scholarships have been added to our list—the Henry Lubeck, the Wm. Lewis Morris, Jr. (in mem.), the William Reed Huntington, the St. Agnes, the David J. Ely, the James R. Swords (in mem.)—making 44 scholarships supported by the League.

Bishop Hare has felt obliged to hand over Hope School, Springfield, to the Government, as, at the General Convention of our Church, it was thought inexpedient for the Government to aid any denominational school, and therefore, the scholarships that have been used for that school, have been distributed among the other four.

The Bishop earnestly desires additional scholarships, that more Indian children may have a Christian education. He also reminds us that scholarships only support the scholar, while teachers as well have to be provided for.

The monthly meetings of the League have been well attended. We are much indebted to Rev. Dr. Huntington for the use of his Guild-Room, and also for his kindness in giving us clerical services at the opening of our meetings.

Bishop Hare addressed us at the Annual Meeting of November, 1892—speaking of the wonderful progress of the Indians. Their Convocation of this year was held in Cheyenne River Reservation; 1500 people camped out in tents; early in the morning and at sunset open air services were held. At one service, two Indians, who had faithfully served as deacons, were ordained priests—Rev. Amos Ross, and Rev. Philip Deloria.

At another service, 140 men and women were confirmed.

Twenty years ago there was among these Indians but one church, that of All Saints', Crow Creek Agency ; now there are 55 churches and stations, with four boarding schools.

The new chapel of "The Inestimable Gift," at Corn Creek, is in charge of Rev. Amos Ross, an Indian, lately raised to the priesthood ; it is very well furnished and has a rectory and guild-room.

The new Prayer Books, sent out during this year, have furnished all the churches, except the Church of the Holy Cross, at Pine Ridge. They were very thankfully received.

The League has paid this year \$1000 toward the building of a chapel at Broken Rib Bear's Camp, \$700 toward enlarging St. Elizabeth's Church, standing Rock Reserve, and \$700 for the building of Bow Pith chapel.

The Bishop writes of St. Thomas', Bow Pith : "The bearer of good news is always a welcome messenger, and it was with good heart we made our way to this settlement, eighteen miles, to which we were to bring the glad tidings that there was nothing now to hinder the building of their long-expected church. The people have for so many years been 'laying by in store' such amounts as they could collect towards a church building, that I had begun to meet them with a 'hang-dog look.' On this occasion, however, I was able to meet them with head erect, as a letter from the Niobrara League had informed me that they had raised money sufficient for the Bow Pith Chapel. They were overjoyed when I announced that kind friends had given me money enough to build them a church, and we all rose up and said together, 'Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost.'"

Bishop Hare, in his January letter, writes : "That though the work in the Indian Field has increased five-fold during the last 10 years, the appropriation from the Board of Missions has decreased : the boarding schools have been spared in a great degree, but the time has now come when I must, in justice to the distinctly evangelical work, cut down their appropriations, and increase the stipends of the Catechists, which are now so small as to seem mean, and to deter the best men from devoting themselves to the work : this reduction can be made without serious inconvenience to the schools, if our kind friends of the Woman's Auxiliary would consult together before filling boxes, that the garments, etc., may not be duplicated."

At our February meeting Bishop Talbot addressed the League on the subject of his Indians, the Arapahoes and the Shoshones.

On Sunday evening, March 5th, by the favor of Dr. Huntington, the 20th anniversary of the League was held in Grace Church,

New York City. We were addressed by Bishop Hare and Mr. Herbert Welsh, a staunch friend of the Indian for many years.

The Church of the Holy Cross, at Pine Ridge, for many years in charge of the late Rev. C. S. Cook, is now under the care of Rev. C. E. Snively, a white clergyman, who promises to be very successful in his new parish. In a letter to his Bishop he describes his introduction to his new Indian friends, by Rev. A. B. Clark, as very enjoyable; he also reports very good attendance at church services. On the first Sunday, about 70 children came to morning service; after evening prayer on the same Sunday, the music for Easter was practised. Mr. Snively tells of a very pleasant meeting at his rectory with his Catechists and Helpers—of his organizing them into a central chapter of the St. Andrew's Brotherhood—all, after the meeting, repairing to the church, and receiving the Lord's Supper. This meeting will be held each month.

Bishop Hare writes, in April, of a delightful service held at Flandreau: "The weather was stormy, but 40 Indians came in from their farms to attend church, the native organist and Catechist leading the people through both the Canticles, and even the 'Rose of Sharon' Te Deum. These Indians have an interesting history. In 1871 they broke away from their old life of Reservation Indians, gave up their tribal rights, removed to a distance of 120 miles from their old home, and took up claims near Flandreau, in Dakota, determined to live as white men; many of them were members of our Church. For years they pleaded piteously for the services of the Church. After a long time, we raised among our own people about \$150, and the ladies of St. Thomas' Church, New York City, gave them \$650, and St. Mary's church, Flandreau, was built."

In August, 1893, Bishop Hare suffered a severe loss in the sudden death of Rev. Charles R. Stroh, Missionary to the Santees—a very scholarly man, and devoted to his charge, active in improving the methods of their work, and bettering the condition of his flock.

Bishop Hare writes "That the results of school work have been, in the most marked way, beneficial.

"Before schools were introduced, there were but two or three persons in a tribe who understood English as well as Dakota, and the poor people were entirely at the mercy of one or two interpreters, who might easily be bought up, by interested parties, to misrepresent grossly the Indians or the government, or both. From this proceeded misunderstanding and incalculable evils, even bloody wars. Now, thanks to the work of the schools, there are dozens of persons in every tribe, ready and competent to expose any misrepresentation.

"In the mission of which I have charge, there have been redeemed from heathenism, 13 men now clergymen, 7 men now candidates for holy orders, and nearly 50 who are Catechists and Helpers—the whole number of communicants being over 2200. The offerings of our native Christians have increased year by year, since we began to make systematic efforts in this behalf, from \$585 in 1881, to \$4109 in 1893. There are 48 societies of Indian women, branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, and they reported last year contributions to the amount of \$2210." A bright example for us in self-denial and perseverance.

CONSTITUTION.



ARTICLE I.

THIS Association shall be called THE NIOBRARA LEAGUE.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be to work, in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, in aid of the Indian tribes in our land, especially those under the Jurisdiction of the Bishop of South Dakota. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are : the raising of money for the support of Missionaries and teachers, for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the Mission ; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing and other material aid ; and the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the Indian.

ARTICLE III.

The Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the Treasury thereof, annually, the sum of at least one dollar. Any one may be constituted a Life Member by the payment at one time of the sum of one hundred dollars.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer ; who, with two ladies from each Parish represented in the Association, shall constitute a Board of Managers, whose duty it shall be to regulate the affairs of the Association, and, under the supervision of their Rectors, to further its work in the Parishes to which they respectively belong.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all Meetings of the Association and of the board of Managers ; to call special Meetings of the same when occasion shall arise ; and to present to the members of the Association such objects for their interest and contributions as shall have been approved by the Committee in charge of the Indian Missions.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside in the absence of the President ; to make special efforts to interest such Parishes of the Diocese as are not already represented in the League, in the work of the Association ; to obtain from the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary fresh information from our Indian Missions, and to read the same at the Stated Meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the Minutes and conduct the correspondence of the Association and of the Board of Managers ; to send out all notices of the Stated and Special Meetings of the same ; and to prepare an Annual Report.

ARTICLE VIII.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all money contributed for the work of the Association ; to pay over after each meeting to the Treasurer of the Committee in charge of Indian Missions, all funds, excepting such undesignated amounts as shall be needed for printing, postage and other incidentals, with a written explanation of the distinct purpose for which such offerings are destined ; to present a Report at each Stated Meeting ; and to prepare an Annual Report to be printed with the Annual Report of the Secretary.

ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution shall not be altered except at an Annual Meeting of the Association—notice of the proposed change having been given at a Stated Meeting of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS.

I.

There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Association on the first Thursday of November of each year, at such hour and place as the President and Secretary shall agree upon.

II.

The Officers of this Association shall be elected by ballot, at the Annual Meeting, and shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall have been elected.

III.

In case of the vacancy of any office, by the death or removal of its occupants, the same may be filled at a Stated Meeting of the Board of Managers ; and any one so elected shall continue in office until the next Annual Meeting of the Association.

IV.

Every Parish in the Diocese is entitled to send two Delegates to the Board of Managers. The Delegates shall be responsible for the representation of their Parish at every Stated Meeting,

V.

The Stated Meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the first Thursday of each month, from November to May, inclusive.

VI.

The Order of Business shall be as follows :

Prayers.

Reading of Minutes.

Treasurer's Report.

Reading List of Boxes.

Roll Call, with Reports from Delegates.

Miscellaneous Business.

Address, or Reading of Letters.

Prayers.

VII.

At a Meeting of the Board of Managers any number present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business ; and at the Annual Meeting of the Association a number of members equal to one-half the number of Parishes represented in the League shall constitute a quorum for the election of Officers.
