President's Address.

We cannot but realize this morning how different the outlook for the work of the Auxiliary is, in the year before us, to any that are past.

There is a new feeling active in most of us; to quote from the Church Prayer League, the Foreign Missionary Jubilee has brought "A Vision to Women"; are we going to grasp that vision and make it our own? A year ago, our aim was to "interest the Churchwomen in our midst, who take no active part in this branch of Church work." We have with God's help during the past winter just touched the solving of that problem, both in the Junior and Senior Departments. The two "Normal" and four "Study" classes taken by one of our Vice-presidents, the Mission Bible-class of seventy-five members planned by the Junior Department, the Missionary Luncheon, where Bishop Brent's and Bishop Lloyd's stirring words brought to the work the enthusiasm and zeal that went so far in making the Jubilee a success; and now one hundred and twenty-eight women, some faithful workers in the Auxiliary for years, others newly interested through the Jubilee, have signed their names, volunteering "more work for missions." From this band of Volunteers, for new or greater service, are being organized Committees for Extension, Recruiting, Drawing-room Meetings, Study and Prayer Circles, which must bring a greatly added impetus for work and effectiveness to the Auxiliary.

We aim this year to reach every woman in the Diocese, in the interest of Missions, that at least, every woman may know, and understand intelligently; we may fall short of our aim, but we will aim high!

Of the General Meetings of the year I need hardly tell you; you know of the inspiration of Bishop Brent's sermon at the Advent Meeting; of the unbounded hospitality of St. Agnes's

Chapel at that time, of our United Meeting in February, and the help and instruction of Bishop Kinsman's "Quiet Day Service"—then in addition to our usual Auxiliary Meetings and work, has come this year the wonderful help and "Vision" of the Jubilee! Now we are facing new problems; the change in our Board almost necessitates change in our Auxiliary methods, but we must make for change slowly, breaking down nothing for the sake of change, but trying to build stronger, to do more effective work, with less expenditure of energy, that we may have more left to reach out further, spreading the work of the Auxiliary in every direction!

To the willing co-operation and faithful work of all our officers and members belong whatever has told for good in the work of the Auxiliary this past year. We would particularly note the ready response made by nearly all the parishes to the new effort of centralizing expenses in the Treasury of our Executive Committee. The Treasurer's Report will show you all the items and how each parish is, or should be, sharing in the support of the whole work of the Auxiliary. The result is most gratifying to those who planned this new departure.

Ten new branches have been formed, or reorganized, and splendid work has been done in one of the Archdeaconries, in the matter of United Meetings.

The Secretary will give a detailed report of the year's work of the Auxiliary; and let us all take courage and look forward to more work, with more earnest prayer, for the hastening of the time

Annual Report of the Secretary.

1910-1911.

The inspiration received from the triennial meetings last October in Cincinnati was a wonderful stimulus to increased effort during this past working season and a fitting preparation for the Woman's National Foreign Missionary Jubilee, which reached its climax the end of March in New York City. The officers and older members of the Auxiliary attending the former were glad to welcome into their ranks the many new workers who came forward at that time, that together they might do their share with the earnest and devoted women of other religious bodies in celebrating this great Jubilee year.

With such a beginning and with the memories of the inspiring Jubilee meetings at the close of our fiscal year, how should our hearts be stirred with impatience to take up our burden of the Forward Movement and thus help the Board of Missions to establish and maintain the policy recently put forth by its President.

The New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, in conjunction with the whole "Home Church," is surely awakening to a sense of its responsibility. Whether it be the influence of a newly organized and more efficient Board of Missions, the Laymen's Missionary Movement or the increased number of Mission Study Classes, or all three, strengthened by the greater number of prayer circles and individuals daily offering the noonday prayer for missions, we do not know, but are certain the interest in, and zeal for, carrying forward the Church's work is both aroused and awakened throughout the diocese. Parishes which for years have held aloof and hesitated to work with the Auxiliary are now writing for information as to proper organization incident to becoming branches. Witness five such in the Archdeaconry of Westchester alone, with one reorganized to render better service; two in New York, one in Richmond, and one in Dutchess which had been silent for some years.

The Advent Meeting, held this year in St. Agnes' Chapel,

West 92d Street, was very largely attended, the sermon at the service in the morning being preached by Bishop Brent, of the Philippine Islands, and the addresses in the afternoon carrying us in mind and sympathy from Alaska to Mexico, with a momentary glance along the way at the Negro.

A united meeting of the four Standing Committees, with the Junior Department, was this year held at St. Bartholomew's Parish House, and was made interesting by the reading of reports from the Committees and addresses by the Rev. Dr. Harding, Secretary of the Second Missionary Department, Bishop Lloyd, President of the Board of Missions, and Miss Grace Lindley, who spoke on the United Offering. The monthly meetings of the Standing Committees and the annual and semi-annual meetings of the Archdeaconries have steadily maintained their attendance and interest.

Recent elections have shown some important changes, which we feel possibly is a step in the right direction, as every new officer should mean the interesting of new people, who, with the old, will increase our membership and strengthen our work. It is with deep regret, however, we record the loss by death of the two Honorary Vice-Chairmen of the St. Augustine League, Mrs. Daniel T. Hoag and Mrs. Benjamin Woodhull Strong, and of another from active service, one of our pioneers, a faithful and devoted helper, who by her ever-ready sympathy, loving appreciation and gentle courtesy has left us an example we would do well to follow. In resigning, Miss Fanny Schuyler leaves the Chairmanship of the Westchester Archdeaconry Committee with the regrets and blessings of all those who have been privileged to work under her leadership. It yet gives us pleasure to record her election as Honorary Chairman of the Westchester Archdeaconry and her re-election as a Vice-Chairman of the Foreign Committee.

United Offering. Since the last annual meeting of this Body we have gathered in the total of New York's share of the United Offering of 1910 and have presented it upon the Altar at the Triennial Service

in Cincinnati. Already the work for the Triennial Offering of 1913 is encouraging. Two parishes have recently become interested, so that now 135 are making regular annual or semi-annual payments. Every branch of the Auxiliary in the diocese has a treasurer receiving gifts for the United Offering and a number where no branch has as yet been organized are beginning with this as their first effort for missions. "Altogether," writes the Diocesan Treasurer, "I think the diocese is doing better work than in 1908, and I look for great results with the Presentation Service at the annual meeting to arouse still greater interest."

Study Classes. The best method so far tried for awakening an intelligent sympathy for missions is the teaching of Study Classes. The First Vice-President having this department under her special care held two normal and three parish classes herself, out of which grew seven more conducted by members of her normal classes. The Chairman of the Junior Department also led a normal and a parish class and all of her pupils taught others. Several for older and for younger women or girls were conducted by diocesan officers in New York and Staten Island, and from this diocese we were able to furnish leaders for three classes in the Diocese of Newark, one in New Jersey, two in Pennsylvania and for an interparochial class in Philadelphia.

Work of Standing Committees. The special work of each of the Standing Committees has gone on uninterruptedly, both the Domestic and Foreign Committees increasing their pledges this year, the former by \$350 and the latter by \$500, and both given undesignated to the Board. These have not only been met, but in both cases have exceeded the amounts pledged. The number of missionary boxes reported to the Domestic Committee was 114, with a total valuation of \$10,463.94, but this by no means represents the good work of this kind done by the whole diocese, nor does it in the case of the St. Augustine and Niobrara Leagues, to the former of which only six boxes were

reported, valued at \$426.70. Many parishes, more especially the far-distant ones, send reports annually to the Diocesan Secretary, including gifts both in money and boxes, which are given in the table of Parish Reports but which never reach the Standing Committees. Could such be sent occasionally to the monthly meetings in writing to the several secretaries, or through the delegates, it might prove an encouragement and stimulus to others.

The Reserve Fund of the Domestic Committee. made up of small gifts of 25 cents each from members of the Auxiliary, amounted this year to \$589.57, \$500 of which was distributed as usual among those whom the Committee was privileged to hear speak of their work during the winter. The interest on the Eliza Martin Seymour Perkins Memorial Fund was given to the poor whites of Southern Virginia and toward the travelling expenses of the Bishops of Wyoming and Utah. The payment on the Life and Accident Insurance Policy of the Bishop of Western Colorado was also continued.

The usual monthly payments to the two Industrial Schools, St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, and St. Augustine's, Raleigh, for Colored people, have been met by the St. Augustine League, two branches in Dutchess contributing to the former the sum of \$50 as a memorial to their late rector and archdeacon, the Rev. Dr. Burgess. A number of scholarships were also given by the League to the Payne Divinity and other schools. Two days have this year been endowed in St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, at \$250 each, one by the Church of the Ascension, New York, and another by a few members in loving memory of Mrs. Benjamin Woodhull Strong, a late Vice-Chairman and for many years the devoted friend of the League.

The opportunities opening out before this Committee appear to our human eyes to grow even faster than we can hope to keep pace with them, but neither the League nor the Church must expect to do so alone, for, as the Rev. Mr. Robbins, of Englewood, has said, "the race problem is not a problem of a section, but of a nation. It is a problem of faith and hope and

love. . . . It is a question of vital, throbbing human relationships. The relationship is one of guardianship and protection and fostering care on our side, of striving, learning, acquiring upon theirs. Education, of a sort best fitted to their natural capacities, in the main industrial education, is the only right and loving way."

The problem of the Indian is no less absorbing and in many ways similar. They are to be educated and should have the industrial as well as the mental, combined with religious, instruction if they are to take their places as good citizens. The Niobrara League is helping in this. Westchester Archdeaconry for many years has faithfully contributed to, and almost supported, Miss Thackara and the Hospital of the Good Shepherd in Arizona among the Navajoes. There are other Indians in the various states and territories in the West whose Bishops are looking to New York for help and sympathy, and the League is awakening to the fact and in a small way has already begun to assume its responsibilities, realizing the broader one's sympathies the larger one's work. With the exception possibly of the Foreign, the Niobrara League has given more toward the apportionment than the other Committees, for the many scholarships supported in the Indian and foreign schools all come under appropriation of the Board.

Realizing that with new claims new methods must be employed, the Foreign Committee proposes introducing a series of conferences at its regular monthly meetings next winter, whereby delegates and others may be instructed in the best methods for missionary work. Hearing the experiences of each parish society and of other Boards of Foreign Missions, not our own, and having opportunity for questions, may help delegates to understand more intelligently just what should be their aim and how to reach it.

The Junior Department, in going outside of the City of New York for four of its seven monthly meetings, has led a way it might be well for the Auxiliary to follow. It might bring it into closer touch with the outside parishes and the Archdeaconry

Committees. It is scarcely sufficient for two or three of the general officers to attend each year their annual meetings. We want not only to learn what they are doing, but to bring the work of the Standing Committees to them.

Work of Archdeaconry Committees.

All the Archdeaconries have continued their work with wonderful faithfulness, sending boxes and money according to their ability, and in many instances working against many discouragements. Four of the officers of Orange Archdeaconry have during the winter visited twelve different parishes under their jurisdiction, stimulating and encouraging them to attend the semi-annual meetings.

The reports received from Dutchess show an increase, in many instances, both in gifts of money and in boxes. Some of the parish branches have introduced missionary reading at their meetings or regular programme meetings, and the rector of one parish has planned a Study Class for another season. Dutchess is also happy in having given one missionary to the foreign field, Miss Emily de W. Seaman, who is now at Cape Mount, Africa.

One of the Divisions in Westchester arranged for neighborhood meetings, *i.e.*, meetings where two or three neighboring parishes unite, with happy results, and in Richmond plans for similar or united meetings were for this second year successfully carried out.

Central Expenses. It is particularly pleasing to note with what favor and success the new plan for meeting the central expenses of the New York Branch has been received. Each parish branch throughout the diocese was asked to give to a central fund 6 per cent. (approximately) on its money gifts of the previous year in lieu of annual dues to the various Committees. With scarcely an exception each has responded promptly and cheerfully. From the fund so gathered all expenses for printing, postage, etc., of the Executive Board, the four Standing and four Archdeaconry Committees are paid. This plan we believe to be a decided im-

provement upon the old method of \$2 dues to four or five different committees, amounting, in many cases, to more than the parish did or could give to the missionary work itself; and it also allows ample to cover all current expenses for the whole diocesan branch. This fund does not touch the Junior Department in any way, for its work is on a somewhat different basis.

Leaving the material, let us for a moment now reflect upon the spiritual side of the work—that which only makes the other possible. The members of the Executive Board, being called by the President to their first business meeting on November 2d, began their season's work with a service of celebration of the Holy Communion in the Missions House Chapel. Midway in the year, March 24th, arrangements were made by the Second Vice-President for a Quiet Day for members of the Auxiliary in Trinity Chapel, conducted by Bishop Kinsman, of Delaware. The Foreign Committee has put forth a litany, with special petitions for St. Paul's College, Tokyo, to be read at its monthly meetings, and recommends it to all parish societies praying for foreign missions. A Book of Remembrance of the prayers and God's direct answers to them has been opened also by the Foreign Committee. Meetings for special prayer for missions are being held weekly in one of our city parishes, led by the president of that parish branch. All these are signs showing the deepening of the religious, and, therefore, the missionary, life of the Auxiliary. It gives us a higher ideal of our opportunities and responsibilities, looking more and more toward the larger things, until, as one of the Jubilee speakers so aptly put it, we can accustom ourselves to such words as these: "every," "whole," "all." *Every* Churchwoman in the diocese doing *all* she can for the *whole* world, until *each* child of God shall come to see the vision of the ascended Christ in the fulness of His glory.

THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913.

Resolved: That the United Thank-offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions, for Woman's Work in the Mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of women workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly as the Lord hath prospered them.

PRAYER FOR MORE WORKERS.

ALMIGHTY GOD, Lord of the harvest, we humbly beseech Thee to send forth more labourers into Thy harvest, and especially to put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to Thy work in the Mission field; that so the bounds of Thy blessed kingdom may be enlarged; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

Annual Report of the Junior Department.

The first meeting of the Junior Auxiliary was held on November 18th at the Church Missions House. The meeting was opened with a Corporate Communion Service. The Rev. Howard C. Robbins officiated and preached the sermon.

After luncheon at the Bishop's House, to which Miss Greer cordially invited all delegates, a conference was held in the Board Room of the Missions House. Miss Hutchins, Chairman of the Massachusetts Juniors, spoke on the responsibility of leaders.

This year the experiment of out-of-town meetings has been tried and proved successful, the monthly meetings being held in the following places: Newburgh, Yonkers, Rye and New Brighton, Staten Island.

The general meeting for all members of the Junior Auxiliary was held in February at St. George's Church, New York, when the Rev. Mr. Betticher, of Alaska, spoke and showed stereopticon views of his work.

The annual meeting of the Juniors was held on May 6th in the Church of the Epiphany. The Rev. Y. Y. Tsu, of China, and two members of the Auxiliary were the speakers.

Fifteen new branches have been organized, eight of which are for older girls.

The Wednesday morning Bible-class for young women has a membership of seventy-five. The study was conducted by the Rev. H. C. Robbins, and as a result of his careful guidance a Committee for Foreign Missions has been formed.

The Juniors have decided to send one, and if possible two, delegates to the Conference at Silver Bay.

Normal Mission Study Classes have been held, and the number of Parish classes throughout the diocese has greatly increased.

We cannot close our report without mentioning the resignation of Miss Katharine Atterbury, to whose untiring efforts and consecrated interest the New York Juniors owe so much. However, our congratulations go to Massachusetts, for our loss is their gain.

We also regret to say that we are losing Mrs. Carter, who expects to be in India next winter, but we feel it a great privilege that one of the New York officers should be in the field.

The Executive Board has met once a month for prayer and conference about the work.

Both Juniors and Babies' Branch have more than met their apportionment, and we feel that, while mistakes have been made, on the whole the Junior work has progressed.

Constitution

OF THE NEW YORK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS,

AS APPROVED BY THE STANDING COMMITTEES MAY 11th, AND
ADOPTED ON THE APPROVAL OF THE BISHOP, JUNE 1st, 1900.
AMENDED APRIL 28th, 1902, NOVEMBER 15th, 1905, AND
OCTOBER 29th, 1909.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The name of this Association shall be the New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary as approved by the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their Baptism are considered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those, who, in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the missions of the Church, are recognized as actual members of the New York Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

1. The officers of this Association shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot by the Representative Body at their May meeting, and shall hold their offices for one year and until the election of their successors.

2. A Treasurer for the United Offering shall be elected once every three years, at the May meeting, in the same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her election to take effect November 1 of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

3. The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association, of the Representative Body, and of the Executive Board.

4. One of the Vice-Presidents, or in their absence the chairman of one of the Standing Committees, shall preside in the absence of the President.

5. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the Association, of the Representative Body, and of the Executive Board; shall have the custody of their records; conduct their correspondence; issue notices of their meetings; prepare and edit the annual report; and shall perform such other duties as shall be assigned to her by the Representative Body or by the Executive Board.

6. The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

7. The Treasurer shall receive, disburse and keep account of all moneys contributed for central expenses, and all funds not specified as for the Standing Committees. Her accounts, and those of the Treasurer for the United Offering, shall be audited annually by an auditing committee, to be appointed in conformity with the By-Laws, who shall report to the Executive Board.

8. The Treasurer for the United Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Offering of the Woman's Auxiliary; and, under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

9. The Association may create Honorary Officers at pleasure.

ARTICLE V.—REPRESENTATIVE BODY.

1. The officers of the Standing and Archdeaconry Committees and the general officers shall constitute the Representative Body of this Association, which shall meet annually on such day in the second half of May as the Executive Board may appoint, and shall then elect the general officers and transact the business of the Association; and may meet at other times on the call of the Executive Board.

2. Fifteen members of the Representative Body, repre-

senting a majority of the number of Committees, shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting.

3. Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern the proceedings at all meetings.

ARTICLE VI.—EXECUTIVE BOARD.

1. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the general officers of the Association, the chairmen of the five Standing Committees, and a representative elected by each of the Archdeaconry Committees.

The chairmen of the Standing Committees and the representatives of the Archdeaconry Committees may appoint a substitute to attend any meeting of the Board in their absence with power to vote.

2. The Executive Board shall have power to adopt By-Laws; to fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of general officers; and, subject to the control of the Representative Body, shall exercise all the powers of the Association not otherwise herein expressly provided for.

ARTICLE VII.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of this Association shall be from May 1st to May 1st.

ARTICLE VIII.—STANDING COMMITTEES.

1. There shall be five Standing Committees of this Association for the furtherance of its work in relation respectively to Foreign Missions, Domestic Missions, Indian Missions, Missions to Colored People, and the Junior Department.

2. Each Committee shall be composed of one or more delegates from each parish or organized chapel in the Diocese. Each parish or chapel shall be entitled to one vote.

3. Each Standing Committee shall annually elect a chairman and such other officers as it may determine, and shall have power to adopt By-Laws not inconsistent with the Constitution or By-Laws of this Association.

4. Each Standing Committee shall annually, on or before May 15th, send to the Executive Board a written report of its proceedings for the preceding fiscal year, including a copy of the report of its treasurer.

ARTICLE IX.—ARCHDEACONY COMMITTEES.

1. In each Archdeaconry an Archdeaconry Committee may be constituted for the furtherance of the objects of this Association within the Archdeaconry in co-operation with the Standing Committees.
2. Such Committees shall be composed of delegates from the parishes and organized chapels within the Archdeaconry and shall elect a chairman and such other officers as they may determine, and shall have power to adopt By-Laws not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association.
3. Each Archdeaconry Committee shall annually, on or before May 15th, send to the Executive Board a written report of its proceedings for the preceding fiscal year.

ARTICLE X.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be amended with his approval by the Representative Body at its annual meeting, two-thirds of the members present concurring, notice of the proposed amendment having been given at a previous meeting.
