Annual Report of the President.

1912-1913.

The first year of work under the new Constitution has closed, and as we look back we feel that in spite of some inevitable confusion and misunderstanding the re-organization has justified itself.

Details of the work will be found in the reports of the other Officers; but I should like to speak here of the very gratifying attendance at the Monthly and Advent Meetings, and at the Quiet Day. The Monthly Meetings, through the great kindness of Dr. Lubeck, were held at the Parish House of Zion and St. Timothy, and we shall gladly avail ourselves of this hospitality next Winter. The Advent Meeting was held at the Cathedral on December 5th, the Bishop of Mexico being the Celebrant at the Morning Service and the Rev. Irvine Goddard of Poughkeepsie, the preacher. In the afternoon, at Synod Hall, Bishop Greer presided and introduced the speakers, Bishop Aves, Bishop Horner, Bishop Thomas, and Rev. Mr. Gould of St. Augustine's School, Raleigh. The Quiet Day was conducted by the President of the Board of Missions, at the Church of the Epiphany on Friday, February 28th.

At the request of Miss Emery I led a Study Class on the "Woman's Auxiliary," at the Institute for Diocesan Officers held at the Church Missions House in October, and I have had the pleasure of attending Auxiliary Meetings at the following parishes:

STATEN ISLAND.

The Executive Board, and indeed the whole Auxiliary, feel the deepest regret that Miss Tomes has been obliged to give up active participation in the work she has loved so well and done so admirably, and the following Resolution, passed by a rising vote at the Annual Meeting, expresses something of our appreciation of her long service.

The Meetings of the General Convention and the Woman's Auxiliary in October cannot fail to bring home to us more vividly than ever the high privilege that belongs to each one of us as sharers in the work that Christ will do for mankind. May He, by His Holy Spirit, so direct and guide our efforts that we may not only "attempt" but accomplish "great things for God."

A Resolution.

At the Annual Meeting, held on May 8th, the following resolution was unanimously passed by a rising vote:

WHEREAS, Owing to illness, Miss Margaret A. Tomes has felt obliged to tender her resignation as Secretary of the N. Y. Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, which resignation has been received and accepted by the Executive Committee with the deepest regret;

AND WHEREAS, Miss Tomes has for forty-one years devoted herself to the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in this diocese, and has during that time occupied many and various executive positions, and has discharged their duties with efficiency, faithfulness and distinction;

BE IT RESOLVED, That the following record of her long service and devotion to the cause of missions be spread upon our minutes:

Miss Tomes was one of the charter members of the Niobrara League when it was founded in 1872 and attended every meeting for ten years. She was Secretary of the Freedmen's Committee in 1874 and until it was merged with the newly-formed Domestic Committee whose Secretary she then became. She spent nine years, 1880-89, as assistant to Miss Emery in the Church Mission House, resigning on account of ill health, and was elected Secretary of this diocese in 1896, occupying this office until 1901 when she became Chairman of the Foreign Committee. In 1905 she was elected President of the New York Branch and in 1909 was again elected Secretary, continuing in this position until the present time. For many years she was a delegate to the Triennial Convention, attending seven out of nine of them in this capacity, and serving in all positions with great ability and fidelity.

BE IT THEREFORE FURTHER RESOLVED, That as an expression of appreciation of the unfailing devotion and efficient service to the cause of Missions which Miss Tomes has so signally shown to us, she be made an Honorary Vice-President of the New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

**Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions,
Church Missions House, New York.**

MY DEAR MISS DELAFIELD:

I want to take the earliest opportunity to express to the New York branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and all those women whom they associated with themselves in the preparations for the Triennial, the most hearty thanks and sincere appreciation on the part of their guests during the last two weeks.

I hardly know where to begin or how to end, but I trust that everyone will understand—yourself how much your services as presiding officer were appreciated; Mrs. Davis as chairman of the general committee of arrangements, the other members of the committee and the heads of all sub-committees and their fellow workers, how greatly the visiting members of the Women's Auxiliary enjoyed all that they prepared for their comfort, pleasure and help. The indefatigable efforts of those at headquarters made that meeting-place a real home to many strangers. The complete and beautiful hospitality of our official luncheon, the plan by which so spacious a room was offered for exchange of hospitalities at luncheon time throughout the Triennial, the delightful hospitalities of the drawing room meetings, the charm of the afternoon teas, where the women of the Auxiliary and the men coming from General Convention might meet so pleasantly, the many courtesies shown to our English guests and visiting missionaries, the accommodations given for Junior exhibits and for study classes, the pains taken to accommodate our business meetings and conference classes and to add to the attractiveness of their surroundings, the careful arrangements for music, for the reception of guests and for the seating of the audience, which helped bring about the enthusiasm of our Carnegie Hall meeting, the earnest care given to preparations for the service in the Cathedral, the music there and the call to devotion of which Miss Bull spoke so feelingly at our final session yesterday, the influence which gave us the privilege of the daily celebration at St. Michael's and opened its doors for the Quiet Hours,—you can easily see when I begin to review all that we have had from New York this last week, how difficult it is to stop!—And to the committees which made it easy for our travelers to come from a distance, and find shelter when they arrived, and which offered cheer in time of pain and sickness, the Auxiliary is again indebted.

I feel that during these two weeks some of the New York women have been content to serve most cheerfully and acceptably as hewers of wood and drawers of water. Please thank them one and all for this willing service, and tell them how much we hope that three years from now some of them may have the pleasure of being in St. Louis and in another Triennial have the joy of sharing in its pleasures, which their labors today made free to others.

Lest anyone should have been omitted in this enumeration, which is more hasty than I would like to make, please give a closing message of thanks from the Woman's Auxiliary to every committee and individual, who, during these last two weeks, has helped to make our Triennial of 1913 what it has been,

Prayer and Service Union.

The Prayer and Service Union, which was instituted on the Feast of the Epiphany of this year, has adopted six By-Laws, which are herewith given for the benefit of any who may desire to form Branches.

BY-LAWS OF THE PRAYER AND SERVICE UNION.

I.

NAME AND OBJECT.

The name of this organization shall be the PRAYER AND SERVICE UNION OF THE DIOCESE OF NEW YORK.

Its object shall be to promote daily prayer for Missions among the Women of the Auxiliary of this Diocese, and to deepen the spiritual life of the members.

II.

OFFICERS.

The officers of the Union shall be a President and a General Secretary with such others as they may find it advisable to appoint.

The President of the Union shall be the President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese.

The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting, and such other Meetings as she may see fit to call.

The General Secretary shall have charge of the Member's cards, and of the Roll Book.

She shall send to each Member, or to the Branch Secretary, notice of the Quiet Day, the Advent and the Annual Meetings.

III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Any one wishing to become a Member should apply to the General Secretary or to a Branch Secretary for a card of Membership.

Prayer and Service Union.

IV.

BRANCHES.

Any Member desiring to form a Branch of this Union may do so by enrolling at least ten Members, whose names and addresses she as "Branch Secretary" must keep and to whom she must send those notices which she herself receives from the General Secretary.

Branch Meetings shall be held weekly, monthly or occasionally according to the discretion of the Secretary of the Branch.

V.

ANNUAL SERVICE.

There shall be an Annual Service held during the Season of the Epiphany.

VI.

ANNUAL MEETING.

There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Members of the Prayer and Service Union, at which the General Secretary shall be elected. This meeting shall immediately precede or follow the Annual Service.

Report of Domestic Committee

1912-1913.

The "Vice-President in charge of the Domestic Work" would have found the task allotted to her absolutely impossible but for the hearty co-operation of those who had been in charge of the St. Augustine and Niobrara Leagues, and of the former Domestic Committee. With a self-effacement born of real devotion to the cause these workers united to form the present Domestic Committee, consenting that their three separate departments should for the future be known as Sub-Committees of the Domestic. By consenting to do this the inevitable loss resultant from the abolishment of the former "Standing Committees" was reduced to a minimum, and the way paved for a large gain in general knowledge, interest, and enthusiasm.

The next important step on the part of the Committee was the invitation to former "delegates" to meet at the Church Missions House on the morning of the Feast of the Epiphany, — when Bishop Lloyd celebrated the Holy Communion and addressed us and our fellow workers and delegates of the Foreign Committee, on the subject of "PRAYER AND SERVICE," and the "UNION" which now bears that name was inaugurated.

During the Winter, Drawing-room Meetings were held by each Sub-Committee, the large attendance and enthusiasm shown at these meetings being most encouraging. "NEIGHBORHOOD MEETINGS" and "CONFERENCES" have also been conducted; these entailed "PREPARATION CLASSES" and much personal work which brought us in close touch with many of the Parish officers.

The increasing demands brought home to us the need of more and younger women on the Committee, who could

respond to invitations to visit Parish Branches, and who could give information about the work. We therefore formed last Lent an "APPRENTICE CLASS" to which we invited not only the members of the Committee, but those young women who were willing to help us. This Class met on Friday mornings at the Church Club under the superintendence of Miss Grace A. Crosby, who found "Leaders" specially qualified for the subject of each Session, and herself conducted the closing one on "The Presentation of the Need." From this Apprentice Class (which it is planned next Winter to make into a FRIDAY MORNING APPRENTICE SCHOOL) we have already gained new workers as well as an entirely new SUB-COMMITTEE, whose special work will be to care for the interests of "the Islands and Panama."

At the closing meeting of the Domestic Committee it was resolved that more meetings rather than less, were needed for the proper development of the work; that it should be clearly explained that these meetings were not intended for the same people; that each Parish which desired it should receive a visit from some one member of the Committee; and that the Monthly Meetings of the Committee which are through the courtesy of the Rev. Theodore Sedgwick, held in Calvary Parish House on the fourth Thursday morning of each month, at 12 o'clock, should be thrown open to Missionaries from the Field in order that we might have better opportunity of learning their needs and the best way of responding to them.

We are hopeful that the experience of this first difficult year's work under a new "Constitution" may bear much fruit during the coming season.

Report of Foreign Committee

1912-1913.

The division of the former executive of the Foreign Committee into four Sub-Committees, namely, China, Japan, Liberia and Latin America, has resulted advantageously, and we have been better able to keep in touch with the work in all Foreign fields rather than to allow the necessities of one or two to overshadow the importance of those less prominent.

Monthly reports from Chairmen of Sub-Committees give record of interest and enthusiasm, which we hope may grow from year to year. Meetings have been held in the Church Club Rooms regularly on the 4th Thursday of each month from November to April inclusive. Preceding these meetings, the four Sub-Committees have held their sessions.

At the December meeting the important question arose as to methods of retaining the interest of the many former Delegates of the Foreign Committee. It was voted that they be asked to meet on a certain day to have the new organization explained and that an appeal be made for their prayers and interest in the work for the future. The meeting was held as planned on January 2nd, and the women came in goodly numbers. In November the Foreign Committee co-operated with the Domestic Committee in forming the Prayer and Service Union.

At the Annual Meeting held April 24th, Miss Josephine Entz was appointed Secretary by the Chair for the ensuing year, to succeed Mrs. Samuel Evins, resigned. At this meeting By-Laws were adopted.

Probably the greatest achievement in the way of meetings was one for Dr. Rudolph Teusler, Director of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan, held in the beautiful Chapel of St. Luke's Hospital, Amsterdam Avenue and 113th Street, on April 21st.

A Missionary Hymn, and Collects said by the Rev. Mr. Clover, Chaplain of the Hospital, opened the meeting.

Mr. John W. Wood, Secretary of the Board of Missions, introduced the Speaker, Dr. Teusler. Bishop Lloyd, President of the Board, made a stirring appeal for our prayers and interest for this plan of Dr. Teusler's for making St. Luke's Hospital an International Hospital. Over 125 women were present and the following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this meeting of the women of the Diocese of New York that the offer of Prince Katsura and Baron Goto looking to the development of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, as an international hospital should be accepted and

FURTHER RESOLVED, That it is the sense of this meeting that a committee be formed to co-operate in such ways as may be possible with the American Council for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, in making known the facts about St. Luke's Hospital and securing gifts for the Hospital Building Fund.

Immediately a Committee was formed to co-operate with the American Council which has already undertaken to help Dr. Teusler raise the \$250,000 necessary to carry out his plan.

Report of Archdeaconry of Orange

1912-1913.

While much still remains to be done in the way of organization, we feel that interest in, and knowledge of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary has increased during the past year in this part of the Diocese. Many earnest and enthusiastic workers have been doing their best, and we believe that they are more united and more in sympathy with the Diocesan Branch than ever before.

The Annual Meeting of the Branches in the Archdeaconry was held in St. Paul's Church, Newburgh, on May 23rd, 1913. At this meeting it was resolved to continue the maintenance of the scholarships in St. Mary the Virgin's School in Nashville, Tenn., and in St. Agnes' School in Kioto, Japan.

The Semi-Annual Meeting was held in St. Paul's Church, Chester, on October 23rd. Although the meeting was a large one, only a few parishes were represented on account of the very stormy day. In order that each parish, even the most remote, should have an opportunity to send delegates to some Missionary Meeting during the year, the four counties were divided into five districts, each under its own President, and meetings in three of these districts have been held. Delegates from every parish in the respective districts were sent to these meetings (with the exception of two) and at each of these Neighborhood Meetings, our President, Miss Delafield, was present. At these meetings we have had one of the members of the Executive Board, as well as a Missionary speaker. In this way the parishes have been enabled to come into closer relationship with the Officers of the Auxiliary, and their interest in its organization has been stimulated.

These Neighborhood Meetings were held in Newburgh, Middletown and Kingston.

The influence of the Mission Study Classes organized by our Educational Secretary, Miss Strong, has been very marked throughout the Archdeaconry.

Report of Archdeaconry of Orange.

The scholarships have been paid, and three new branches have been established, viz.: one in St. Paul's Parish, Spring Valley, one in St. Andrew's Parish, Walden, one in Ascension Parish, West Park, and the Branch in St. Thomas' Parish, New Windsor, has been revived.

Most of the parishes in the Archdeaconry have sent boxes to either Archdeacon Dulaney of the St. Augustine School, Raleigh, N. C., or to the Gastonia Group of missions under the care of the Rev. M. J. Peters. Other boxes have been sent which are reported elsewhere.

Besides being present at the Neighborhood Meetings in Newburgh, Middletown, and Kingston, your Vice-President has visited the Branches in West Park, Monroe, Suffern, Ellenville, Warwick, and St. George's, Newburgh. Everywhere I have been received with the greatest kindness and hospitality—an indication of a very lively interest in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. (As an example of increased interest and zeal I would mention the case of St. George's Parish Branch in Newburgh, which, in addition to the gifts of its members during the Winter, amounting to \$102, collected from the women of the Parish the sum of \$304 to be paid on the Parish Apportionment. This is far more than this Branch has ever been able to do before.) Thus we have much to encourage us, and we are happy in what has been accomplished, but we hope that another year will find us a still more united and stronger band of workers, and that by our prayers and our gifts we may become a very real auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

February 14th, The Christ Church Group, for the Parishes of the Upper West Side. Number present 55. Parishes represented, 6.

March 11th, The Epiphany Group, for the Parishes in that neighborhood. Number present 30. Parishes represented, 5.

March 31st, Trinity Chapel Group, for the Parishes of the lower West Side. Number present 10. Parishes represented, 4.

The Neighborhood Meetings were opened with prayer. Then followed the Speaker of the day. After this the meeting was resolved into an informal conference when the women present discussed with the leaders and among themselves subjects connected with the work of the Auxiliary, and problems, difficulties and weaknesses met with in the work.

Report of Archdeaconry of New York.

The plans and preparation for these meetings were made at preliminary meetings where delegates from the parishes taking part met in conference the Vice-Presidents of the Domestic and Foreign work.

On January 30th a meeting of the Staten Island parishes similar in character to the Neighborhood Meetings was held in the Church of the Ascension, West New Brighton.

On March 12th the parishes of Staten Island had a Quiet Day which was held in St. Mary's Church, Castleton, and conducted by the Rev. J. Wilson Sutton, of Trinity Church. Luncheon was served in the Parish House.

The regular routine of the Parish Branches in the Archdeaconry of New York has evinced a steady, faithful and growing interest in Missions and has been characterized by the adoption of new and vital methods, by great activity and interest, and by a spirit of prayerfulness and alert receptivity.

Report of Educational Secretary.

May 17th, 1912 to May 8th, 1913.

If any one thing has been more clearly shown than another by the work of the Educational Secretary this year, it has been the wisdom of having created the office a year ago, for nothing could have been more conclusive than the proof that there is real need and great opportunity in this diocese for a well-organized educational department of the Woman's Auxiliary. From the moment the work was begun, there has been eager response from the parishes to the opportunities offered, and the only difficulty all the year through has been to find enough people to do all that might be done.

The work was begun by sending a circular letter to the parishes, with a post card for reply, asking for the statistics of mission study classes in the past, and requesting each branch to appoint an educational leader for the parish. In response to this, 35 replies were received, a good many of them accompanied by requests for information about normal classes and text books. Early in November, another letter was sent to the branches in New York City, giving the dates and places of the two normal classes to be held in town, and asking each parish to send a delegate to one of them, and at the same time, arrangements were made with the archdeaconry vice-presidents for normal classes in Mt. Vernon, Staten Island and Newburgh. All five of these took place during November and December, the second of those in town being made possible by the kind assistance of Miss Flanders. Deaconess Hyde has also given valuable help by her work as leader of the Bible study classes, and Miss Warren's Bible Class has been one of the most important and inspiring classes held.

Soon after Christmas, requests for leaders for parish classes began to come in, and realizing that there would be more, as Lent approached, and that we had not very many

leaders in reserve, at the January meeting of the Auxiliary I asked for volunteers to join a normal class, preparatory to being sent to parishes which had no leaders among their own number. In response to this appeal a very good class of nine was formed, and its members did splendid work afterwards as leaders of parish classes.

During Lent there was not so much opportunity for normal work as most parishes were having parish classes, but a long-cherished plan of a normal class in Poughkeepsie was finally carried out and proved the most successful and worth while. I also had the privilege of leading the regular Lenten study class of St. John's Church, Yonkers, a splendid class of about thirty women, whose interest and enthusiasm were most inspiring.

A very interesting and unusual class of men and women was held by Miss Edith Walker at Trinity Church, New Dorp, Staten Island. It met weekly, in the evenings, and was especially designed to interest the men. It succeeded wonderfully in doing this, many of the men who came feeling, after the eager and informal discussions, that they had "discovered missions."

Another new and interesting way of arousing missionary interest in a parish was tried in Harrison, Westchester, where they held a Japanese Exhibit. The men, women, and children all worked for it all through the Winter, studying and reading, as well as preparing the Exhibit, and it was finally held, with very great success, early in April.

Early in the Winter, the Rev. Arthur R. Gray, the Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions, asked if we would co-operate with the Educational Department of the Board in planning and preparing for a Missionary Exposition to be held during the General Convention. It was agreed that we should provide leaders for the training classes for stewards, and as far as possible arrange the classes. This

has taken an increasing amount of time ever since the beginning of Lent, and has been most interesting work. There are over three hundred stewards now enrolled, from about 25 parishes in this diocese, and from several in Newark, N. J., and Long Island, there have already been ten training classes, and there are several more still to be held, so the prospects for the success of the Exposition are most encouraging.

Immediately after Lent reply post cards, asking for the statistics of classes held this year, were sent to all the branches of the Auxiliary. A little over half have been returned and report 71 study classes held in 51 parishes during this past season. This is a long way from the ideal of a study class in every parish, but it shows a considerable increase over the reports of last year, and I think we may rightly look at it in that light. There have been 7 normal classes in the diocese this year, with a total membership of 76, and while that is very far from being enough to cover the diocese, we may still feel pleased and encouraged. Figures are not everything, and a much truer indication of the success of the year's work than any statistics, is the spirit with which the educational work has been met everywhere throughout the diocese. I could not possibly tell you how universal has been the interest, how eager the response, how enthusiastic the support, wherever I have been this year. The one thing, above all others, that has been impressed on my mind is that the women of the Auxiliary want mission study. There is not the least doubt about it, and I am certain that one of the greatest opportunities before the Auxiliary in this diocese to-day is the development of the educational work. When women will take an entire day once a week for six weeks to come to a normal class, it means that they feel it is valuable, and if it is as valuable as that to them, we want to be very sure they have it. The report for this year is one long story of interest and enthusiasm, of growth and development, and of ever-increasing

opportunity. We have made a glorious beginning, and we may well feel that in organizing this new department of our work, we have found a way to give very real help to the Master in the building up of His Kingdom. Let us give time and thought, and above all, most earnest prayer to continuing and developing what, by His grace, we have been enabled so well to begin.

Bishop Greer asked the Juniors for \$5,000 as their Apportionment. At this time it is too early to say how much has been given as the Annual Meeting of the Juniors has not been held.

Sectional Meetings have been conducted in Rye and New Rochelle, and the members of the Junior Board have visited many of the branches.

On Saturday, May 10th, the Annual Meeting will be at St. Bartholomew's Parish House, and a play entitled "Uganda's White Man of Work," will be given by the Boy's Branch of Trinity Church, Mt. Vernon.

Constitution

OF THE NEW YORK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS,

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912,
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING,
MAY 8TH, 1913.

ARTICLE I. — NAME.

The name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF
MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II. — OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within
the Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the
Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III. — MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism
are considered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary.
All those who, in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or
offerings, aid the missions of the Church may become by
enrolment, actual members of the New York Branch and of
its Junior Department.

ARTICLE IV. — JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

There shall be a Junior Department of this Association
for the Younger Women and Children of the Diocese, working
under its own Constitution and electing its own Board of
Officers, of which the President of this Association shall be
a member.

Constitution.

ARTICLE V. — OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President and eight Vice-Presidents, five in charge respectively of the districts of New York, Orange, Westchester, Staten Island and Dutchess, one in charge of the Junior Department, and two in charge respectively of the Foreign and of the Domestic Missionary Work. A Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer and a Treasurer for the United Offering; all of whom shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI. — HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Association may create Honorary Officers at pleasure.

ARTICLE VII. — AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting, two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the proposed amendment having been given at a previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I. — DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents.* One of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the absence of the President.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the districts shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches, and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board and send annually before May 1st to the Secretary of the Association a written report of progress in their respective districts for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Foreign and Domestic Work shall inform the Parish Branches of the needs and work of the Foreign field and the Domestic field, including work among the Indians and the Negroes, through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers to address their meetings, and shall send annually before May 1st to the Secretary of the Association a written report for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 3. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall —

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

By-Laws.

SEC. 5. *Educational Secretary.* The Educational Secretary shall arrange for the formation of Normal and other Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of work; shall attend the meetings of the Association, reporting receipts and disbursements to the same.

SEC. 7. *Treasurer — United Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Offering, and, under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

SEC. 8. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 9. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association; shall fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of officers; and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for.

SEC. 10. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 11. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE II. — REPORTS.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually before June 1st to the Secretary of the Association a written report of its work for the preceding year.

ARTICLE III. — PARISH DUES.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually to the Treasurer, for the current expenses of the Association, a specified sum of money to be known as Parish Dues. The amount of these

dues shall be determined by the Association at the November meeting.

ARTICLE IV. — FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from May 1st to May 1st.

ARTICLE V. — MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The meetings of this Association shall be held monthly from November to May, inclusive, the May meeting being the Annual Meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except one accredited and duly elected or appointed representative from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association twenty accredited representatives shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. At the Annual Meeting one-fifth of the accredited representatives of the Parish Branches shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 6. A meeting of the Executive Board shall precede each monthly meeting of the Association.

SEC. 7. The Vice-Presidents in charge of Foreign and Domestic Work in consultation with the other officers of the Association shall arrange for meetings in the districts at stated intervals to arouse keener missionary zeal and effort.

ARTICLE VI. — NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually by the President a Nominating Committee of seven members com-

prising at least one member from each district, which shall nominate at the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office of the Association, the District Vice-Presidents excepted.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the districts of New York, Orange, Westchester, Staten Island and Dutchess shall be nominated at a representative meeting of their respective districts. Should a district waive the right, the Vice-President shall be selected by the Nominating Committee.

SEC. 2. All the officers except the Treasurer for the United Offering and the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Department shall be elected by ballot of majority vote at the annual meeting and shall hold their office for one year or until the election of their successor.

SEC. 3. The officers hereinabove mentioned for the year succeeding the Annual Meeting in May, 1912, shall be elected by the Representative Body as existing at the time of the adoption of this Constitution and By-Laws. The officers for all succeeding years shall be elected by the Representative from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, in the Diocese as above mentioned and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 4. The head of the Junior Department as elected by that body is *ex-officio* the Vice-President of this Association in charge of that Department.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer for the United Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting, in the same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

SEC. 6. Honorary officers may be elected by the Association at any regular meeting.

ARTICLE VIII. — AMENDMENT.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular or annual meeting by a two-thirds' majority vote, notice of proposed changes having been given at a previous meeting.
