Annual Report of the President.

1913-1914.

You have learned the details of the year's work from the various reports that have been presented to you and I am sure that you rejoice as I do in the fact that all along the line there has been progress, more members, more branches, more Mission Study Classes, more money, and more concerted prayer.

This advance is due largely to the influence of the General Convention and the Triennial Meeting of the whole Women's Auxiliary held at the same time, with the many opportunities afforded by them for meeting and hearing the Missionaries, for studying the Missionary Enterprises and for getting ideas and suggestions from the Conferences held on Auxiliary methods and works. Two of the most successful classes held during the Triennial were conducted by members of your Executive Board, one on Studies in the Character of Christ and the other by the President of the Junior Auxiliary on the Emergency in China; while your President had the honor, owing to the accident of office, of presiding over the two business meetings of the whole Auxiliary.

The faithful and most efficient way in which Mrs. Vernon Davis and all the Committees under her, worked to make the arrangements for the Triennial a success deserves the gratitude of all of us, both as members of the Auxiliary and of the Diocese of New York. The Advent meeting was held at the Cathedral in December and the Bishop, much to our gratification, was with us all day. The Sermon was preached by Dr. Brown of Brazil and in the afternoon addresses were made by Bishop Guerry, Mr. John Wood, Archdeacon Stuck and Bishop Greer. The Lenten Quiet Day was conducted by Dean Robbins at the Church of the Epiphany, and both these annual events were so helpful that it is to be regretted every member of the Auxiliary did not make an effort to attend them.

Our first diocesan Institute was held at Poughkeepsie for three days in February with the most cordial co-operation and hospitality of the clergy and people of the place especially the rector of Christ Church. It was for both

the Woman's and Junior Auxiliary and the Conferences, Mission Study and Manual Training Classes were conducted by two senior and two junior officers with the additional help of Miss Grace Lindley. In spite of the blizzard which kept many people away it was felt that the time was not wasted; already several requests have come in for similar Institutes in other places, and we shall undoubtedly, with the co-operation of the Junior Department, hold several next year.

A new departure in our diocesan activities was the "Missionary Field Day," held on April 22nd, at Synod Hall. A member of the Domestic Committee having told her Vice-President that she had heard people say they had not enough opportunity to hear the Missionaries themselves, it was asked at our monthly meeting if this was the general opinion. A unanimous vote authorized the Foreign and Domestic Committees to get up a meeting and the Field Day was the result. Eight speakers presented the work of the Church in as many different fields and this birds-eye-view of the whole ground emphasized in quite an extraordinary way our privilege and our responsibility. Bishop Courtney conducted a devotional service in the Cathedral at noon and Bishop Greer finished the day with a speech that struck just the right note. All the arrangements for the programme, headquarters, etc., were unusually thorough and well carried out, and the volunteer choir of more than a hundred added immensely to the success of the day. Over six hundred women were present.

So much for the year that is past—what of the one that is to come? Shall it mean for every member of our diocesan Branch a kindled imagination, a more vivid perception of the task the Church is set to do, a greater joy that we are allowed to have part in it, and a keener, more intense longing to show to all who have not known Him the Christ who is our Life and our Light?

A LETTER FROM THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY.

TO PARISH OFFICERS :

The steady growth of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of New York and the increased number of branches has so enlarged the work of the Diocesan Secretary that she will be greatly obliged if the Parish Officers, Presidents and Secretaries will note and comply with the following suggestions, in performing their duties of sending out notices and returning reports to her for the Green Book.

All notices of meetings are sent to the Parish Secretaries whose duty it is to keep a list of such officers and members as may wish notices and to forward them immediately. All changes in names or addresses of parish officers should be reported at once by the Parish Secretaries to the Assistant Secretary of the Diocese, MRS. S. H. EVINS, 112 STUYVESANT PLACE, NEW BRIGHTON, STATEN ISLAND, to whom all applications for notices should be made.

The president or treasurer of each parish should keep an accurate list of all missionary boxes sent out and their value, and the secretary should report these boxes on the blanks sent to her by the Diocesan Secretary in May. No money gifts should be reported on this blank, nor boxes sent to Diocesan Missions, or charities, nor to Missions not supported by the Board of Missions, such as Canadian ones. Where cash is sent for shoes or some special article, it should be added to the value of the box. Also the freight or express charges. These blanks must be returned to the Diocesan Secretary, MRS. ERNEST R. ADEE, 129 EAST 35TH STREET, NEW YORK, before June 15th, otherwise the parish report will not appear in the Green Book.

These duties should be clearly understood by Parish Secretaries and no one should undertake the office who is not able or willing to fulfil them, as well as the regular duties of a secretary to her own Branch.

District and Committee Secretaries should furnish to the Diocesan Secretary by June 15th a complete list of District or Committee Officers with addresses, and a statement of

the number of branches in her district, and District Secretaries should add the total number of boxes sent out in the year. If divided into Domestic, Foreign, Indian and Colored and totals given of each, it will greatly facilitate the work of the Diocesan Secretary, who will be correspondingly grateful for this assistance in the work of compiling the Green Book.

MEETINGS.

These are always held on the fourth Thursday of each month, from October to April inclusive, at 11 A. M., at Calvary Parish House, 104 East 22nd Street. During the past year they have been preceded by half-hour meetings of the Sub-committees, and have been closed by noonday prayers and a short missionary address. In March it was unanimously voted that the Committee, instead of closing its meetings in the Committee Room, should adjourn to the Noonday Service in the Church Missions House, where, through the courtesy of Bishop Lloyd, a short missionary address will be given. Thus all members of the Diocese who desire it will have, each month, another opportunity of hearing news direct from the Field.

"INFORMATION GIVEN THROUGH CORRESPONDENCE, VISITING, OR PROVIDING SPEAKERS."

A letter was sent in the Fall to the president of each parish branch stating that the Domestic Committee would be glad to give information concerning its work to any parishes desiring it—either by correspondence, or by sending one of its members to pay a personal visit. There has been much demand for "speakers" (the Indian Sub-Committee alone has visited eleven parishes, some of them very far distant, of course defraying its own expenses for tickets, etc.), and it is gratifying to find that not only our older members but some of our younger ones, have proved acceptable visitors and shown decided ability for helping in this part of our work. As the visits paid by the Chairman and members of the Committee to Parish and Neighborhood meetings and conferences are reported by the Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts no detailed account of these is given here.

DIOCESAN DRAWING ROOM MEETINGS.

Six of these have been arranged for by the Committee. The attendance at four of the six has been large and enthusiastic. All of the six have proved worth while and

ADDITIONAL WORK.

The members of the Domestic Committee worked hard, in conjunction with the special committee appointed for the purpose, to make the "Field Day" a success,—each sub-committee finding the speaker who represented its special part of the Field. Tea on that day was provided by the St. Augustine Sub-committee. Many of the members of the Domestic Committee attended the meetings of the Apprentice classes and the Chairmen of the Sub-Committees provided the Instructors for the classes dealing with the particular subject for which they were responsible.

DIFFICULTIES.

The main difficulty we have encountered came from the reluctance of the Parishes to hear of "Specials,"—and as the Domestic Committee in its Indian and Colored departments has inherited certain specials, and receives Appeals for Specials authorized by the Board we have felt it to be a very real difficulty. We would urge every Branch to consider at the beginning of its winter's work whether it could not plan to give a share of the \$600.00 formerly "pledged" to the St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, North Carolina (a

"*Special*" which though paid through the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary helps the Church Institute in its work for Negroes); and whether they could not undertake one (or a part of one) of the \$40.00 scholarships "*Special*" for the Shoshone Indians.

In reviewing the work of the past year we cannot but feel that the inspiration of the Triennial and the number of Missionaries remaining in this vicinity added much, towards enabling us to take up our winter's work with renewed zeal and purpose.

The committee has held its meetings on the fourth Thursday of each month from October to April inclusive, at eleven A. M., in the Church club rooms, preceeded by meetings of the four sub-committees.

The sub-committees on China and Japan found work laid at their respective doors in the two authorized Specials, St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, and St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo. The chairman of the Foreign Committee had the honor to serve on both National Committees handling these specials.

Two drawing room meetings were held in the interest of St. Mary's, Shanghai, one for St. Luke's, Tokyo, and one for Miss Bristowe of Japan.

Two Scholarships, and one in formation, have been founded by the Librarian Sub-Committee, boxes sent and numerous drawing room meetings held.

This Committee numbers eighteen and is alive to its present opportunity to give its hearty support to the work our Church is doing in this her oldest field of activity on foreign soil.

Through the instrumentality of the Latin-American Committee, drawing room and committee meetings have been held and lantern slides shown of work in Brazil, Mexico and Cuba.

In all, eight drawing room meetings, and one stereopticon lecture have been given under the auspices of the Foreign Committee during the winter.

Annual Report of the Foreign Committee.

Particularly valuable to the members of the Committee have been the classes held by the Apprentice Class on Japan, Liberia, Cuba, Mexico and Brazil, and through the inspiration of these classes the Chairmen and members of sub-committees on China, Japan and Latin-America have spoken at Parish meetings.

Commencing on Friday, November 21st, classes have been held every Friday at the Church Club, with the exception of Thanksgiving and Christmas weeks and Good Friday.

There has been a total enrollment of seventy-five besides ten visitors.

Miss Hicks had a study of the North American Indian for four weeks, followed by a six weeks' study of Colored work led by Miss Mosely; and then three sessions when Mission work in the Islands was discussed under the leadership of Mrs. Perry, Archdeacon Nichols and Mr. John Wood. The average attendance at these classes in the study of Domestic Missions was twelve.

Mrs. Bohn, formerly a resident of Mexico, led a class for four weeks in the study of that country's problems and needs, followed by three fascinating studies of Brazil conducted by Mrs. Zabriskie. Cuba then, for three sessions, was discussed under the able leadership of Miss Gavit, and Miss Wilson followed with a three weeks' study of Japan. Miss Florence de Cerkez arranged the closing course in the study of Liberia,—a remarkably fine course lasting three weeks; her full notes at the request of Doctor Burleson, have been given him for arrangement in some permanent form.

Mr. B. Carter Milliken led a large and interested group of leaders, during March, in methods, and it is certain that his suggestive outlines will prove effective. This class had an enrollment of thirty-four, with an average attendance of twenty-four.

Annual Report of the Apprentice Committee.

Two members of the Committee, Mrs. J. M. Hodson and Miss Gavit, have conducted lecture-method classes in other places, and several others have used material prepared for these classes in various groups.

The Committee feels especially appreciative of the excellent leadership and of the faithful work on the part of all who have attended the classes.

Those women in the Diocese are eligible for membership on the Apprentice Committee who are willing to help in the Diocesan Work of the Woman's Auxiliary,

1st, by studying in classes which will prepare them to assist the Chairmen of the Sub-Committees in their duty of sending "Speakers" to parish branches, and spreading information concerning the Field. (These classes will be arranged by the Educational Secretary in connection with the Chairmen of the Foreign and Domestic Sub-Committees, and will be held as formerly at the Church Club, every Friday morning from November to April inclusive, from ten-thirty to twelve o'clock);

2nd, by attending classes of instruction on such special subjects as will qualify them to serve on the many and various committees which members of the Executive Board find it necessary to form for the proper development of our greatly increasing work.

Plans are already under way for the organization of a special CHOIR COMMITTEE (it is hoped to make from our large Field Day Choir a permanent organization); for

a HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE; for a SPEAKERS COMMITTEE;

MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX. 62 BRANCHES.

The following new branches have been formed during the past season, two of which were complete reorganizations of former branches:

1. Parish of Grace Church. Evening Branch for those who cannot attend meetings during the day.
2. Chapel of the Holy Comforter.
3. St. Bartholomew's Parish House.
4. St. Stephens, Woodlawn Heights.
5. Church of the Transfiguration.
6. Intercession Chapel, Trinity Parish, Section B.
7. St. Luke's Chapel, Trinity Parish.
8. St. Bartholomew's German Branch.

Two Conferences have been held, one in December and one in January at the Church Club for the officers of all the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary; The first conference for the officers of the Branches of the Auxiliary of the Parishes south of 53d Street; the second for those of the Parishes north of that point. Both conferences were well attended, and the invitation to meet and discuss methods and problems, and to help and be helped, met with warm response.

Dean Robbins made an address at each conference, in which he placed the work, and the opportunities of the workers of the Woman's Auxiliary on so high a spiritual plane, that our conception of the possibilities of the work was enlarged and uplifted.

The growth in numbers of the parish branches has been marked, some of them reporting a doubled membership.

There has been a strong effort made throughout the district, to make the regular meetings more interesting, and to give the members a more thorough knowledge of work in the mission field, not only through providing speakers, but in several instances the Rectors of the Parishes have given talks on missions at the monthly meetings, while in

some branches the members themselves have done real studying, and have written, and read papers, on the subject.

Two branches have reported having held services of the Holy Communion with special intention for missions.

Two parish branches, St. James and St. Matthews have arranged Drawing Room meetings in the interest of Indian and Southern work.

In all, 158 boxes have been sent this year.

A vitalizing sense of solidarity and a strong desire for co-operation have characterized the work.

Annual Report of the District of Westchester.

May, 1913, to May, 1914.

The branches of Westchester District opened the year's work with a sense of expectancy concerning the Triennial, which proved so great an inspiration. It held for us a special privilege, when visiting missionaries gathered as our Committee's guests at luncheon and brought us into fresh touch with varied fields. Interest and activity have grown in many ways. A sense of responsibility for a definite share in the parish apportionment is increasingly seen, and many specially arranged meetings have been held. Chief among these was a series of neighborhood meetings, held in October, at Yonkers, New Rochelle, White Plains and Cold Spring, to hear Miss Thackara, who, in her hospital work for the Navajo Indians of Arizona, has been from the beginning, our special missionary. Thirty-one branches were represented at these meetings, and increased gifts for the work ought to follow increased interest. We have paid as usual one-half of Miss Thackara's salary, the other half coming from the United Offering, and have sent monthly sums for hospital expenses.

To the Branch at St. Barnabas', Irvington, we are greatly indebted for their delightful hospitality in entertaining us for our annual meeting on May 22, 1913. Over three hundred gathered for the Corporate Communion, when Bishop Lloyd was the preacher; and thirty-five branches were represented at the afternoon meeting, when we were further privileged to hear Mr. Daito, of Japan; Miss Ridgely of Liberia; and Miss Wood, of Boone Library, China. We especially appreciated the presence at the meeting of Mrs. Clarkson, who, as our Vice-President for the past year, had so greatly helped forward the work and brought us into close and happy relationship with our neighboring District of Dutchess.

In the autumn, the Managers met the officers of the branches under their charge, to confer about the year's plans, at New Rochelle and at Ossining, while at White Plains, the new Managers for the Harlem District were introduced at a conference between our Westchester Committee and the officers of nine branches. This was followed by a meeting for the members as well as the officers.

The following new branches have been organized:

- St. Mary's, Sherwood Park, by Miss Waring;
- St. Barnabas Mission, Ardsley;
- St. John's, Pleasantville;
- St. Andrew's Mission, Hartsdale.

Besides this, there have been important changes in the organization of the branches at St. Mark's, Tarrytown, and Christ Church, Bronxville.

The Representative Meeting held at St. John's, Yonkers, on February 27th, was followed by a Quiet Hour, conducted by the Rev. A. M. Sherman, of China, which brought refreshment and inspiration for the Lenten work.

Our Managers have worked devotedly in planning the Mission Study Campaign. The almost universal and excellent classes in the Hudson River Division bear a special testimony to hard work, faith and enthusiasm. We are deeply indebted to Miss Flanders and Miss Crosby for their help in leading mission study classes.

In many of the branches, an awakened effort has been made to plan for the interest of meetings and to adopt new methods. The appointment of a wide-awake Program Committee has proved very helpful. One branch has adopted the plan of having a play room for the children of mothers desiring to attend meetings. In a small branch, interest was gained by reading aloud the Lives of Bishop Ingle and Bishop Hare. Lenten sewing meetings have been opened with Bible study, as a result of Mrs. Muir's inter-parochial class on Missions and the Bible. Other successful plans have been, a loan library, of interesting missionary books, which have been enthusiastically read by the members of one new branch and will be handed on to another of the new branches; evening meetings and study classes for those who cannot attend by day; the St. John's, Yonkers, plan of all-day Lenten sewing meetings, which includes services and a mission study class, and which are increasingly held in other parishes. A parish missionary exhibit, with plays and demonstrations, culminates the year's study of China in Trinity Parish, New Rochelle.

Annual Report of the District of Westchester.

The uniting of several branches in a neighborhood meeting to hear reports and a missionary speaker, has been adopted by the seven branches of Mt. Vernon, Pelham and New Rochelle, which have three times brought together large audiences to hear splendid addresses, by the five Yonker parishes, in behalf of the New China Fund, and for Arch-deacon Stuck's stereoptican evening, when over 300 men and women were present; by Tarrytown and by Ossining, and has been continued by Portchester, Rye and Harrison, to whom Mamaroneck has joined, holding one of this series of large and excellent bi-monthly meetings. We are profoundly thankful for the inspiration and vision which the missionary speakers at all these neighborhood meetings, as well as at our parish meetings, have blessed us, and earnestly pray that we may prove faithful stewards of the treasures of knowledge with which they have endowed us.

A total of 104 new members is reported from the district for the year. Thirty boxes have been sent, valued at \$2,700.76, and seven others, value not given. Our committee has met monthly, and to its untiring zeal and devotion most of the work I have reported is due. It is with great regret that we record the resignation of Mrs. Gibson, for so long Manager of the Hudson River Division, and deeply interested in our work; and of Miss Giles who has served with us for the past year.

Annual Report of the District of Dutchess.

The work of the Woman's Auxiliary in Dutchess County has continued as usual. Some of the Branches have done much better work, others not as well.

At a meeting of the Poughkeepsie Branch on March 18, it was voted to disband the Tri-parochial organization to take effect May 1st. Branches have since been organized in St. Paul's Church and Christ Church, and the Holy Comforter will organize in the Fall.

Owing to the severe weather during the time of the Poughkeepsie Institute for Missions, many Branches who had appointed delegates were not represented. Those who were able to attend were greatly interested and it is the hope of the Parishes that the Institute may be held again this year and that the time will be in the Autumn when the Branches are starting their winter work. The Annual Meeting of Dutchess County was held May 9th, 1913, in Zion Church, Wappingers Falls and was well attended. Bishop Lloyd and the Rev. Mr. Daito of Japan made addresses. Miss Delafield was with us and spoke at the business meeting.

I was renominated Vice-President of Dutchess District by proxy vote in April.

The Archdeacon Ziegenfuss' Scholarship in Bishop Wells' School, Spokane, Washington, which is the only County pledge, has been collected and sent.

There are seventeen Branches in Dutchess County, with a membership of about 500. There are 26 new members, St. Margaret's Statsburgh, have gained the largest number. The value of boxes sent from the Parishes to Missions is about \$1,230.00.

I feel that the Mission Study Classes have been the greatest help and hope that more Parishes will be able to have them next year.

Annual Report of the District of Orange.

In giving the reports of the Orange District I wish to tell you

- 1st, Of its Organization.
- 2nd, Of its Meetings.
- 3rd, Of its work and growth.

The Orange District comprises the parishes in the four Counties of Orange, Ulster, Sullivan, and Rockland, 34 parishes. As I need not remind you these parishes are scattered and very widely separated, for which reason it was thought best to divide them into five groups, each to be presided over by an Officer called the President of a Division. This has been done more successfully and systematically than last year, as it took a little while to find out that places near to each other on the map may be separated by well nigh insuperable obstacles, and cannot always be considered as in one neighborhood. The District has been more thoroughly canvassed in this way and we have endeavored to learn what each Branch was accomplishing.

The Annual Meeting of the District took place on May 15th, 1913, in St. George's Church, Newburg. Ninety delegates were present, a larger number than have ever attended before. At this meeting annual reports were read from each of the parishes.

The semi-annual meeting of the District was held in Suffern, October 2nd, 1913. At this meeting it was voted to continue our Scholarship in the Keeling Industrial School for the next three years.

During the year there has been one neighborhood meeting in each of the Divisions of the District.

Division No. 1 met in Ellenville on December 6th, 1913. Miss Warren and Miss Delafield from the Executive Board were present, and spoke to the delegates from the eight parishes comprising the Division. The Missionary speaker was the Rev. Dr. Tyson of Sewanee University, Tenn.

Division No. 3 met in Port Jervis on January 14th, 1914. Mrs. Adee represented the Executive Board, and Dr. Tyson was again the Missionary speaker.

The 5th Division met in Tuxedo on February 19th. Mrs. Watson, our honorary President, addressed the meeting, and Dr. Mary Glenton told of her work in China.

The 4th Division met in Goshen where Mrs. Alexander made a plea for the United Offering, and the Rev. Samuel Bishop spoke of our duty to uplift the colored people. This meeting was also the Representative Meeting for the nomination of Vice-President in charge of the District.

The 3rd Division met in Milton, where Miss Delafield explained fully the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At these meetings the delegates from the Branches have been urged to subscribe for the Spirit of Missions, have had the organization of the Woman's Auxiliary carefully explained, and the purpose of the United Offering made clear. I feel that a great deal has been accomplished in giving a better comprehension of the work, and in making possible a more intimate acquaintance between the Parish leaders and the members of the Executive Board.

Besides being present at the District and Division meetings I have visited Highland Mills, Piermont, Chester, Suffern, and Callicoon, and every where I have found that the Branches were anxious to know all about the organization of the Auxiliary, and just what duties they were expected to perform. The hospitality and cordiality with which I have been received are an inspiration for future effort.

At every meeting the necessity and power of prayer has been earnestly brought before the members.

The scholarships which the District supports have been paid, viz.: one in St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, and two scholarships in the Keeling Industrial school for colored girls in Tennessee. Eight outfits for Indian pupils in St. Elizabeth's School, S. D., have been sent by the District and 30 Missionary boxes have been reported. Of these a large number have been sent to the Waynesville Associate Missions, and some to

St. Mary's Mission House for Colored People in Columbia, S. C., also a number of other boxes have been sent by the Branches to points where they had special interest.

It is a pleasure to report the organization of one new Branch. This is at Highland Mills, a small mission, but its members are very earnest and enthusiastic.

The interest in Auxiliary work has been maintained throughout the winter despite the obstacle of bad weather. Most of the Branches have met regularly, and many members have made real sacrifices to attend the meetings, and to contribute their share in money and work.

I wish to thank the officers of the Executive Board who have, at great inconvenience to themselves, assisted me with the meetings in this District, and I also would like to say a word of sincere appreciation to those Missionary speakers who have taken long journeys simply to interest us, and to inspire in us a deeper love of the master's work.

Annual Report of the District of Staten Island.

Almost all the parish branches in the District of Staten Island report a very successful season. The membership is increasing, the meetings are well attended, and the work of missions is being carried forward with real enthusiasm.

Beginning in November, United Meetings for the District have been held every month except March, when a Quiet Day was conducted by the Rev. Frank Heartfield. Addresses have been made at each meeting and the first of the season was preceded by a Corporate Communion Service.

The Annual Meeting was held at St. Mary's Church, Castleton Avenue, on Friday, May the first. All branches, and several parishes in which there are none, were represented.

The annual reports which several of the Junior Branches were kind enough to bring, added greatly to the interest of the meeting.

With the exception of the Quiet Day when the weather was particularly stormy the attendance at the United Meetings has been good.

There are seven parish branches in the District, a new branch having been formed this season at the Church of the Holy Comforter, Eltingville. Nine boxes and nine barrels have been sent, with a total valuation of \$894. The total value is probably greater as in some cases it was not reported.

Annual Report of the Educational Secretary.

1913-1914

During the past winter through the co-operation of the Mission Study Committee there have been organized eight normal classes which were held in the following places: Two in Poughkeepsie, one being in connection with the Institute, one in Newburgh, one in Middletown, one in Mount Vernon, one in Yonkers and two in New York; with the exception of the class at Yonkers, which was led by Miss Crosby, these classes were conducted by the Educational Secretary. Besides these normal classes there were two large classes, also led by the Educational Secretary, an interparochial class for Staten Island with some normal training and an interdenominational class at Bronxville.

There have been 73 regular mission study classes in the diocese with an average attendance of 690, 8 Bible study classes and many parishes where there have been programmes or reading meetings.

I wish to speak of the wonderful educational work which has been done in Westchester, especially under the manager of the Hudson River Division where fifteen out of nineteen Branches have held one or more mission study classes, making for Westchester a total of 29 classes (four of which were Bible study classes).

Most of the classes have studied China this year, which was the subject recommended by the Board.

It gives me great pleasure to report as the result of one mission study class which was held in the district of Dutchess, that the members have formed themselves into a China committee and pledged one hundred dollars a year to be given for the work among women in China. Another class gave \$60 to St. James' Hospital, Auking, and yet another an offering to St. Mary's School, Shanghai.

I have found great encouragement in the fact that several branches, which last year had only program or reading meetings, have found the courage to attempt a regular mission study class this year; also that on many of the report cards was written "no class this year but we hope to have one next."

There is in each parish an immense amount of untrained missionary zeal which needs direction and crystallizing into action; it isn't that people don't want to do but that they don't

know how to do, and it is for the educational department to point out the way in which this energy may be directed. I hope that the time is approaching when every branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will consider it a necessary as well as a practical part of its work to set aside some time each year to study the work done in the Mission Field, therefore I urge all of you who can to take advantage of the Cathedral Conference which is to be held here in June, or to go to the Conference at Silver Bay with the idea of leading classes next winter. My greatest difficulty this year has been the lack of trained leaders. If each parish would send one delegate to one of the summer conferences or to one of the normal classes this lack would be met and in the future when a parish writes to me for a leader I would not have to say as I have so many times in the past, that I have no one to send.

One of the most important classes of the winter has been Miss Warren's Monday Morning Bible Study Class with a total enrollment of almost 50 and an attendance varying from 20 to 35. In addition to this Monday Morning Class, Miss Warren has consented to lead a normal class in the autumn, the subject being, "Our Lord's Life and Character." Will any of you who would like to join this class please send your names to Miss Warren or to me.

I cannot close this report without expressing my gratitude to Miss Crosby for the wonderful and untiring enthusiasm with which she gave herself to the educational work, having taught nine classes for the Woman's Auxiliary since Christmas.

I am sure that all of you who attended the annual service for Mission Study Classes last Thursday and heard Bishop Lloyd's wonderful address, will have felt with me what a big privilege has been ours to have had a part in this work of missionary education and have been filled with new courage and firmness to go forward in the future.

The beautiful Greek meaning of the word enthusiasm is God within, with such enthusiasm then let us seek to extend His Kingdom.

Annual Report of the Prayer and Service Union.

1913-1914.

The increased attendance at the monthly Diocesan meetings of the Prayer and Service Union shows that the members feel that a needed force and power are entering their lives and that through their general and special intercessions for missions they are reaching out and touching the lives of their brethren in both the Domestic and Foreign Fields.

Mrs. Ames led the November meeting, and in December Mrs. Stephen Baker gave a most spiritual and helpful talk on prayer.

The Annual Meeting, held on the 21st of January, was preceded by a service held in the Chapel of the Church Mission House, conducted by Bishop Lloyd. At this meeting it was voted that at the monthly meetings a short sketch of some special branch of the missionary work should be given, followed by prayers for the work, and that members should be asked to especially remember it by daily intercessions during the following month.

In February the Rev. Theodore Sedgwick told of the work among the Indians, especially referring to Archdeacon Stuck's labors along the Yukon River, and to the Sioux Indians in South Dakota. In March illness prevented Miss Moseley from being present, and in her place Miss Delafield spoke about the Negro work in the schools and hospitals of the South, and of the Church Institute for Negroes.

In April the members were most fortunate in being able to listen to the Rev. Arthur Sherman from China, who asked not only for special intercessory prayers, but also for prayers of thanksgiving for the Native Church and the wonderful results already achieved.

There are now seven Branches of the Union, but as there are members from twenty-one different Parishes may it not be hoped that before the end of another year there may be at least as many Branches, one for each Parish?

Annual Report of the President of the Junior Auxiliary.

For the Junior Auxiliary this has been a year of reorganization and experiments, and reorganization is always trying and makes work difficult at first. Owing to the Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary, our own Diocesan work was delayed, and the Cathedral meeting which usually opens the year's work was held on December 13th, instead of in November.

The Communion service for leaders and officers of the parish branches was celebrated by Dean Grosvenor, and the sermon was preached by the Rev. Arthur Sherman. Conferences were conducted in the morning and afternoon. At the January meeting it was voted to reorganize the New York Junior branch into Sections, according to the plan made at the Triennial, and in order to do this it was necessary to amend the Constitution, which was done at the April meeting.

The Constitution now calls for Three Sections, and another important change has been made by adding the office of Educational Secretary. . .

The General Meeting was held on Saturday, February 7th, in the parish house of the Church of the Ascension. Mrs. Cooper spoke on the work among the Indians.

Two Sectional meetings were held, one at Garrisons, when our ninety Juniors from Garrison's, Cold Spring and Hyde Park were present. Miss Thurston and the Junior President were the speakers, and the other meeting was at Christ Church, Staten Island.

During the winter Mrs. Ramsey Hunt resigned as Vice-President in charge of the Third Section, and it is due to the untiring efforts of Miss Gorham who ably assisted the President, that the work among the older girls has advanced this year.

Every branch of the Third Section is entitled to appoint one member on the Mission Committee, of this Committee Miss Gorham is chairman and Miss Coate Secretary. The Mission Committee is endeavoring to raise \$5000 this year

towards the support of St. James' Hospital, Anking. Up to date this sum has not been realized, but the efforts for its attainment will continue until August 1st, when the Junior Treasurer will close her books.

The Columbia Varsity players gave a benefit for St. James' Hospital on the night of April 22nd.

Study has been carried along this winter as well as possible without an Educational Secretary. The President was assisted in the normal class work by Miss Drake; to her and to Miss Grace Crosby who led four classes for the members of Section Three we owe our sincere thanks.

The Junior Leaders from the Hudson River branches were interested in the Institute held in Poughkeepsie and were faithful in their attendance even during the severe snow storm which came just at that time.

Many of the leaders have followed the Diocesan plan of dividing into Sections and have graded their branches, and in a year or so we hope to have every parish branch divided into Sections. The Wednesday Morning Bible Class was held as usual at the residence of Mrs. John Pratt. The Rev. Henry Sloan Coffin conducted it until Lent when the Rev. Arthur Sherman took charge of it. Constitution
OF THE NEW YORK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS,

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912,
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING,
MAY 8TH, 1913.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are considered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who, in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the missions of the Church may become by enrolment, actual members of the New York Branch and of its Junior Department.

ARTICLE IV.—JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

There shall be a Junior Department of this Association for the Younger Women and Children of the Diocese, working under its own Constitution and electing its own Board of Officers, of which the President of this Association shall be a member.

ARTICLE V.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President and eight Vice-Presidents, five in charge respectively of the districts of New York, Orange, Westchester, Staten Island and Dutchess, one in charge of the Junior Department,

Constitution.

and two in charge respectively of the Foreign and of the Domestic Mission Work. A Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer and a Treasurer for the United Offering; all of whom shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI. — HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Association may create Honorary Officers at pleasure.

ARTICLE VII. — AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting, two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the proposed amendment having been given at a previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I. — DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SECTION V. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC 2. *Vice-Presidents.* One of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the absence of the President.

X The Vice-Presidents in charge of the districts shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting, a written report of progress in their respective districts for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Foreign and Domestic Work shall inform the Parish Branches of the needs and work of the Foreign field and the Domestic field, including work among the Indians and the Negroes, through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers to address their meetings, and shall present at the Annual Meeting, a written report of progress in their respective fields of work for the year.

SEC. 3. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall —

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

X SEC. 5. *Educational Secretary.* The Educational Secretary shall arrange for the formation of Normal and other Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of work and shall attend the meetings of the Association, reporting receipts and disbursements to the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 7. *Treasurer—United Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Offering, and, under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

SEC. 8. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 9. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association; shall fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of officers; and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for.

SEC. 10. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 11. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE II.—REPORTS.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually before June 1st to the Secretary of the Association a written report of its work for the preceding year.

ARTICLE III.—PARISH DUES.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually to the Treasurer, for the current expenses of the Association, a specified sum of money to be known as Parish Dues. The amount of these dues shall be determined by the Association at the November meeting.

ARTICLE IV.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from May 1st to May 1st.

ARTICLE V.—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The meetings of this Association shall be held monthly from November to May, inclusive, the May meeting being the Annual Meeting.

By-Laws.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four duly elected or appointed delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association, except the Annual Meeting, fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. At the Annual Meeting one hundred delegates from the Parish Branches shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 6. A meeting of the Executive Board shall precede each monthly meeting of the Association.

SEC. 7. The Vice-Presidents in charge of Foreign and Domestic Work in consultation with the other officers of the Association shall arrange for meetings in the districts at stated intervals to arouse keener missionary zeal and effort.

ARTICLE VI.—NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually by the President a Nominating Committee of seven members comprising at least one member from each district, which shall nominate at the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office of the Association, the District Vice-Presidents excepted.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the districts of New York, Orange, Westchester, Staten Island and Dutchess shall be nominated at a representative meeting of their respective districts. Should a district waive the right, the Vice-President shall be selected by the Nominating Committee.

SEC. 2. All the officers except the Treasurer for the United Offering and the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Department shall be elected by ballot of majority vote at the annual meeting and shall hold their office for one year or until the election of their successor.

SEC. 3. The head of the Junior Department as elected by that body is *ex-officio* the Vice-President of this Association in charge of that Department.

By-Laws.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer for the United Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting in the, same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

SEC. 5. Honorary officers may be elected by the Association at any regular meeting.

ARTICLE VII. — ORDER OF BUSINESS.

SECTION 1. *Monthly Meetings.*

- (4) Annual Report of the Treasurer for United Offering.
- (5) Annual Reports of the Vice-Presidents.

By-Laws.

- (10) Election of Officers.
- (11) New Business.
- (12) Adjournment.

ARTICLE VIII. — AMENDMENT.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular or annual meeting by a two-thirds' majority vote, notice of proposed changes having been given at a previous meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern all meetings.
