The Executive Board begs to bring the following points to the careful attention of the Parish Branches:

- I. Every Branch is asked to make some contribution to the Diocesan Pledges.

\$600 for St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Virginia.
\$600 for St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, North Carolina.
\$185.95 Life Insurance for the Bishop of Western Colorado.
\$100 Scholarship at St. Mark's School, Nenana, Alaska.
\$100 for Indian work of the Rev. S. W. Creavey, Fort Hall Reservation, Idaho.
ALL these Pledges are SPECIALS and do NOT count on the Apportionment.
- II. The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Domestic and Foreign Work ask the parishes for opportunities to present the needs of the field at parish or drawing-room meetings, and the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Department is also anxious to present to the parishes the work of the Junior Auxiliary.
- III. The Educational Secretary urges the appointment of an Educational Leader for each Branch, who will co-operate with the Educational Secretary in the promotion of Mission Study Classes and other forms of Missionary Education. The Parish Branches are also urged to send delegates to the Summer Conferences.

Annual Report of the President.

May, 1915.

In this cataclysmic year of distress, suffering and war, your President cannot refrain from thanking each one of you personally for the noble way in which the New York Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has responded to the call for greater effort. In spite of "hard times" and the pressing demands of war relief your contributions to Missions have fallen off very little; in every department of our work there has been progress, and for a crowning joy our Branch this winter has offered not only money, but the gift of life, three volunteers having given themselves for service on the Field.

Our Monthly Meetings have been very well attended, and so was the Advent Meeting, but the Quiet Day still leaves much to be desired in point of members, as do the Meetings of the Prayer and Service Union. It seems easier for most of us to emulate Martha than Mary. At the Advent Meeting Bishop Greer preached, and was the Celebrant at the morning service, and in the afternoon we had the pleasure of listening to the Bishop of South Dakota, the Bishop of Western Colorado, Archdeacon Russell of Virginia, Archdeacon Mellen of Mexico and the Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions, Dr. Gray.

The Rev. Arthur M. Sherman, of Hankow, made the Quiet Day a source of very real help and inspiration to those privileged to hear him.

In response to the appeal sent out by the Emergency Committee of the Board of Missions, a meeting was called of the Presidents of all our parish branches and various suggestions were adopted and sent to every branch as to how we could do our part in helping to raise the Emergency Fund; a week of self denial from April 15th to 25th, was decided on, in addition to the gift of "One Day's Income."

Annual Report of the President.

I know that all the members of the Auxiliary will share the regret of the Executive Board that Mrs. Ames has declined re-nomination as Vice-President in charge of Foreign work. She has held this office since our Constitution was revised three years ago, and for two years before that was Chairman of the Foreign Committee, and her experience there helped us very much in making the reorganization a success. It is impossible to speak adequately of Mrs. Ames' devotion to the work, or her untiring zeal and activity, but to us who have worked with her, her beautiful humility will always be an example, and her most striking characteristic.

At our meeting in April when Miss Lindley made her illuminating address on the Woman's Auxiliary she spoke of the necessity of a definite aim for the Diocesan as well as the Parish Branch. May I submit the following for your approval? To make every woman in the diocese realize that membership in the Auxiliary is an honor and a privilege, not a duty, or a favor to the Branch.

We know this to be the truth. Shall we not try to open other women's eyes to the glory and beauty and joy of the work we have a share in, the greatest work in the world because it is helping to give His heart's desire to our Master and Lord.

A LETTER FROM THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY.

TO PARISH OFFICERS:

The steady growth of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of New York and the increased number of branches has so enlarged the work of the Diocesan Secretary that she will be greatly obliged if the Parish Officers, Presidents and Secretaries will note and comply with the following suggestions, in performing their duties of sending out notices and returning reports to her for the Green Book.

All notices of meetings are sent to the Parish Secretaries whose duty it is to keep a list of such officers and members as may wish notices and to forward them immediately. All changes in names or addresses of parish officers should be reported at once by the Parish Secretaries to the Assistant Secretary of the Diocese, MRS. S. H. EVINS, 112 STUYVESANT PLACE, NEW BRIGHTON, STATEN ISLAND, to whom all applications for notices should be made.

The president or treasurer of each parish should keep an accurate list of all missionary boxes sent out and their value, and the secretary should report these boxes on the blanks sent to her by the District Secretaries in May. No money gifts should be reported on this blank, nor boxes sent to Diocesan Missions, or charities, nor to Missions not supported by the Board of Missions, such as Canadian ones. Where cash is sent for shoes or some special article, it should be added to the value of the box. Also the freight or express charges. These blanks must be returned to the Secretary of each District before June 15th, otherwise the parish report will not appear in the Green Book.

These duties should be clearly understood by Parish Secretaries and no one should undertake the office who is not able or willing to fulfil them, as well as the regular duties of a secretary to her own Branch.

District and Committee Secretaries should furnish to the Diocesan Secretary by June 15th a complete list of District or Committee Officers with addresses, and a statement of the number of branches in her district, and District Secretaries should add the total number of boxes sent out in the year from her District, divided into Domestic, Foreign, Indian and Colored and totals given of each. This will greatly facilitate the work of the Diocesan Secretary, who will be correspondingly grateful for this assistance in the work of compiling the Green Book.

1914-1915.

MEETINGS.

These have been held on or near the fourth Thursday of the month from October to April inclusive, at 11 A.M., in Calvary Parish House, 104 East 22nd Street, and have generally been preceded by meetings of the Sub-Committees.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

Last November a LETTER was addressed to the Presidents of the Parish Branches, stating the desire of the members of the Domestic Committee to co-operate with them in the effort to arouse interest, and to give information concerning needs in the Domestic Field. With the letter was enclosed a LEAFLET, in which the difference between gifts "DESIGNATED" (counting under the Apportionment), and "SPECIALS" was explained with as much clearness as possible. The Committee found that this LEAFLET filled a very definite want.

We would call attention to the fact that the Domestic Committee co-operated with the Educational Department in organizing TRAINING CLASSES. These classes have done excellent work in giving accurate information to those members of the Speakers' Committee whose duty it has been to tell about Domestic work in Parish Branches.

The Chairman of the Domestic Committee has addressed "District," and various meetings, and is grateful for every opportunity given her to present the Domestic work.

It is with regret that we must report the resignation of two of our Chairmen who have served for many years in the Auxiliary, and whose earnest and faithful work is well known throughout the Diocese, — Mrs. J. C. O'Connor, Chairman of the Colored Committee, and Mrs. E. Van Zandt Lane, Chairman of the Sub-Domestic Committee. It would be hard indeed were we to lose from the Domestic Committee two such workers, and we therefore take pleasure in announcing, that they will continue to give their help and counsel as Vice-Presidents of the Domestic Committee.

COMMITTEE IN CHARGE OF THE COLORED WORK

A very interesting MEETING at which the Bishop of New York presided was held in March at the Church Club, when representatives from thirty-two parishes had the opportunity of hearing Dr. Bryan (Bishop Payne Divinity School), the Rev. A. B. Hunter (St. Augustine's, Raleigh, and Archdeacon Russell (St. Paul's, Lawrenceville), tell about their work.

It is encouraging to be able to report that the DIOCESAN PLEDGE for St. Augustine's and St. Paul's has been more than met, and that the interest in colored work seems decidedly on the increase.

INDIAN COMMITTEE.

A large DRAWING-ROOM MEETING was held at the residence of Mrs. Seth Low, at which the Hon. Seth Low presided. Addresses were made by Mrs. John Markoe, the Bishop of South Dakota, and the Rev. H. Burleson.

The membership of the Committee has been enlarged from 10 to 15 and includes representatives from the various "Districts" and from the Lenten Indian League. The Indian Committee has worked very actively in conjunction with the "Speakers' Committee" to arouse interest in Indian work, and we are glad to report a marked increase of life and enthusiasm.

ISLANDS COMMITTEE.

In December a DRAWING-ROOM MEETING was held at Mrs. Amos Morrill's when a large number of people had the pleasure of hearing Deaconess Young tell of her work among the Moros.

It is with much regret that we report the resignation of Miss Elsie Morrill (now Mrs. J. W. Tuckerman, Jr.), but we feel sure that the interest and energy which so greatly helped us is transferred to her new home in Massachusetts. We announce with pleasure that under the direction of Miss Juliet L. Nourse, the new Chairman, the Committee has

already made decided progress, and has done much to develop the work started by Mrs. Tuckerman.

It is with great joy that the Committee is able to report a volunteer from this Diocese, with exceptionally good references, for work in the Philippines under Bishop Brent.

A well attended Drawing-room Meeting was held at the residence of Mrs. Edward Van Zandt where the Rev. C. E. Betticher, Jr., gave an illustrated lecture in the interest of Alaskan work. Annual Report of the Foreign Committee.

1914-1915.

The year's work began with a Corporate Communion of the Domestic and Foreign Committees on the fourth Thursday in October, at the Church Mission House, Bishop Lloyd being both Celebrant and Preacher; such a meeting argued for the best results of the winter's work.

The regular meetings have been held on the fourth Thursday of every month from October to April, inclusive.

Early in October a letter was sent out by the Committee to each Parish President in the Diocese, asking the co-operation of her Branch and offering any desired information concerning the work touching the activities in the foreign fields; many of these letters were answered and speakers supplied.

Five members of the Committee attended the Summer Conference on Mission Study at Silver Bay last July.

The work of the Church both in Mexico and Hayti has, on account of the revolutions in these two countries, been much hindered and retarded.

Liberia has suffered too, owing to the cessation of commerce along her shores as a result of the war in Europe. We are glad to note that the Board of Missions has reappointed to her former work in Liberia Miss Sara Conway.

The Committee has asked the Educational Department for a complete revision of lantern slides and subject matter of lecture accompanying same for all foreign work and has had the promise of their request being considered. The Chairman urged at the April meeting the serious consideration of the "Emergency Fund," both in the "One Day's Income" and our own especial Diocesan "Week of Self Denial." Following last year's plan, it was decided at our annual Committee meeting to remember, as the fourth Thursday in each month came during the summer months, our two Specials of the past two years — St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, and St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo — and pray that the necessary amounts may be forthcoming to make possible a speedy completion of these funds.

CHOIR COMMITTEE.

The Choir Committee has had charge of the music for the Advent Meeting Quiet Day, and helped with the music at the monthly diocesan meetings. Mrs. William Neidlinger gave her services for both of the large meetings. On the Quiet Day she was at the organ for six hours.

HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE.

The Hospitality Committee took entire charge of the luncheons for the Advent Meeting and the Quiet Day. Three hundred and eighty-six persons were served at the Advent Meeting, and one hundred and eighteen the Quiet Day. As the committee was asked to provide luncheon for two hundred and seventy persons for the Quiet Day and there were only one hundred and eighteen who remained for luncheon; there was a deficit of \$5.60. This with the water kettle, dish pans, paper plates, napkins, etc., were contributed by Miss Day. Miss Georgie Day, sister of the Chairman, contributed the flowers for the altar as a memorial. The Committee also served tea to seventy persons after the meeting in the interest of the colored work, held at the Church Club on March 26. The efficient way in which this branch of the work has been managed by Miss Day and the cordial cooperation of her Committee have made the Hospitality one of the most successful of the activities of the Apprentice Committee.

SPEAKERS' COMMITTEE.

During the season of 1914-1915 members of the Speakers' Committee have spoken at fifty-seven parish meetings—Twenty-five for the Foreign, and thirty-two for the Domestic Committee. Much appreciation of the helpful effect of the visits of these speakers has been expressed. In January a series of three classes on "The Best Way of Approaching and Holding an Audience" was held at the Church Club for the benefit of the Speakers' Committee. Mrs. J. E. L. Davidson, Miss A. E. Warren, and Miss Grace Lindley conducted these classes. On the first Sunday in March several members of the Speakers' Committee assisted the Board in taking the message about the Mite-Box to the Sunday Schools. The number of speakers sent out by this Committee bears witness

to the untiring energy and perseverance of the Chairman and members.

SPECIAL LENTEN COMMITTEE.

It is well known that when missionaries come to New York they want opportunities to address the parishes and tell of their work. The rectors sometimes think their congregations do not want to hear missionaries, and therefore hesitate to invite them to preach on Sundays. The Auxiliaries often think it hardly worth while to invite a clergyman to talk to a few ladies. So the missionary goes back to his field feeling that the people of New York do not want to see or hear him, and that they have no interest in his part of the Church's work. The officers of the Woman's Auxiliary know that the members of their societies do want to hear about the missionary work of the Church, and the purpose of this committee is to obtain for these missionaries opportunities to tell their stories. The committee was permitted to arrange for missionary addresses at Sunday services at six of the New York churches, and weekly addresses in eight others. The Committee regrets that it has not been able to get an opening for the missionaries in some of the other prominent churches, nor at the services attended by the largest congregations, but it feels that a beginning has been made toward, to quote Dr. Houghton, "making missions one of the key notes of the observance of Lent."

The Chairman feels that the Apprentice Committee has made at least a start in carrying out the plan for its organization, and wishes to thank the many faithful members who have given themselves wholeheartedly and for the work's sake to the development of this new department of the work of the Foreign and Domestic Committee.

RULES TO GOVERN THE APPRENTICE COMMITTEE.

NAME—This Committee shall be called the Apprentice Subcommittee of the Foreign and Domestic Committees of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of New York.

It shall include the following Special Committees: Choir, Hospitality, Records, Speakers and any other committee which the growth of the Apprentice work may necessitate.

OBJECT—To draw new members into the Auxiliary.

To get members of parish branches to take an active part in Diocesan work, and thus form a nucleus from which future officers may be drawn.

OFFICERS—The Chairman of the Apprentice Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Foreign and Domestic Committees, and she shall have the privilege of appointing a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, and the Chairmen of the Apprentice Special Committees. The Chairman of the Apprentice Committee shall be responsible to the Chairmen of the Foreign and Domestic Committees for all branches of Apprentice work.

CHOIR—The Choir Committees shall have charge of the music for the Advent Meeting, Quiet Day, and such other large meetings as might be held. This Committee shall endeavor to provide ten to fifteen voices to sing at the monthly Diocesan Meetings.

HOSPITALITY—The Hospitality Committee shall arrange the luncheon for the Advent Meeting, Quiet Day, and any other large meeting during the year. When necessary it shall provide tea for drawing-room meetings, and shall be expected to act as hostesses on these occasions. The Hospitality Committee shall send invitations to the Bishops, the clergy and any others suggested by the Executive Board. This Committee will have charge of the flowers for the altar given as memorials.

RECORDS COMMITTEE—The Records Committee will have a sufficiently large number of members to enable them to keep closely in touch with missionaries in all parts of the field. Each member to keep a scrap book, to which may be added from time to time news of the development of the work in each district. This book shall be at the service of the Executive Board and Speakers' Committee.

SPEAKERS' COMMITTEE—The Speakers' Committee shall consist of members of the Auxiliary willing to attend the Training Classes and to inform themselves concerning the work of special districts in either the Foreign or Domestic field, so that they may be prepared to address parish Auxiliaries.

The Chairman of this committee shall keep a list of Speakers, with addresses and telephone numbers, and file a duplicate of this list with the Bureau of Information, that it may be consulted in an emergency.

SPECIAL LENTEN COMMITTEE—The duty of the Special Lenten Committee shall be, to obtain, for visiting Missionaries and Missionary Bishops opportunities during Lent, to speak of their work in the churches of this diocese, and to arrange such other Lenten work as may be suggested and approved by members of the Executive Board.

MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX. 66 BRANCHES.

New branches have been formed during the winter as follows:

1. Mission of the Good Shepherd.
2. Grace Church, West Farms.
3. Church of the Holy Spirit.
4. St. Cyprian's Mission.
5. St. George's Church, Williamsbridge.
6. St. Luke's Church, Evening Branch.

A Neighborhood Meeting including all the Branches of the Auxiliary in the Bronx as well as delegates from Parishes and Missions in which Branches had not yet been formed, was held in January at the Bronx Church House. Addresses were made by Bishop Burch, Archdeacon Pott, and Mrs. Baird Sumner Cooper, who spoke about the Indians of Wyoming. Nearly one hundred attended this meeting.

In the course of the season 165 boxes have been sent to various mission stations. Of this number 143 were valued at \$11,125.62, the value of the remaining sixteen not having been reported.

It has been a pleasure to visit the following Branches: Good Shepherd, Holy Faith, Holy Spirit, St. Cyprian's, Calvary, Heavenly Rest and St. George's, the last three in the interest of St. Michael's Arapahoe Mission in Wyoming.

Among the various activities of the Branches, two seem worth mentioning in this report. One Branch has established a library in connection with the Auxiliary where books on Missions may be procured and the members of another cut out garments to be made by those in need of help and later purchased for the missionary box thereby serving a double purpose.

Notwithstanding present conditions due to the dreadful war now raging we are able to record at the close of the year, a wider interest in the work of the Auxiliary as shown in new branches formed, more work accomplished, enlarged

membership, one Branch, that of the Chapel of the Intercession having added twenty-six new members, and by loyal help towards the raising of the Emergency Fund, for all of which we may well give thanks.

Annual Report of the District of Westchester.

May 1, 1915.

In submitting this annual report, I am deeply sensible of the gratitude we should feel that, in a year of great difficulty for all enterprises, the work in Westchester has not only held its own, but has improved in many respects.

The Annual Meeting of the District of Westchester for 1914 was held at St. Andrew's Church, Brewster, which being at the extreme of the district, permitted the attendance of those often cut off by distance.

It was notable for the presence of the Rev. and Mrs. Nathan Matthews, whose work at Cape Mount, Africa, has for many years been our Westchester foreign special, as well as for the sense of intimate fellowship experienced by all. At the Corporate Communion Archdeacon Pott was Celebrant and the Rev. Arthur M. Sherman Preacher. Twenty-seven branches were represented by one hundred and one delegates and six Diocesan Officers were present with us. Mrs. Ames, Mrs. Watson and Miss Delafield bringing us most inspiring messages. To the ladies of Brewster who so bounteously entertained us, our heartiest thanks are due.

In the autumn, a definite plan for the year's work was adopted by the Westchester Committee. Then the Managers of each division invited the officers of the parish branches of the division to meet them to consider plans for carrying out this policy. 108 parish officers attended the three conferences.

Of the work of the managers and of the officers of the Committee it is impossible to say enough. They have carried through the year's work during the enforced absence of the Vice-President not only with devotion and consecration, but with vision and initiative. Among the results of their labors are the following:

The mission study work has been enthusiastically maintained.

More systematic gifts to our district specials have been made.

An increasing sense of duty and a new spirit of willingness on the part of the women to share in the parish apportionments, is felt.

The United Offering has been inaugurated at Crotonville.

The Committee has met monthly and in February, a representative meeting was held at Mt. Vernon for which proxies had been sent to all branches and were returned by thirty-five. Neighborhood meetings have continued a help because speakers who could not have taken time to visit several parishes, brought inspiration to many who must otherwise have been deprived of hearing their message. At St. John's, Yonkers, over 200 heard Mr. and Mrs. Pancoast's stereopticon lecture on Japan and the importance of St. Luke's International Hospital. Also at Yonkers, as well as at New Rochelle, several parishes were brought together to hear Archdeacon Russell, and new helpers were won for our diocesan special for Colored work. Over one hundred were present at St. Peter's, Port Chester, in November; and other neighborhood meetings have been held at Dobbs Ferry, Mamaroneck, Harrison, Mt. Vernon, Pelham and Ossining.

Among legitimate ways of raising funds the progressive missionary tea has been found helpful as it brings intimate interest to those present. A large and successful one was held at Trinity, New Rochelle.

A Quiet Day for the Yonkers neighborhood held at St. John's, in which five parishes united, was a most helpful feature of the Lenten work. It was conducted by Bishop Kinsman of Delaware. Lenten activity in preparing boxes has been greater than ever before, one parish having surpassed the goal aimed for — 500 garments. Summer boxes this year were especially good, for instance at St. John's, Yonkers, nine groups of ladies provided each an Indian child's complete school outfit. The district reports a total of 74 boxes valued at \$4,187.34, no value given on 11. There have been 85 new members added to the branches, and the usual district specials for Miss Thackera's work among the Navajo Indians at Fort Defiance, Arizona, and for school work at Cape Mount, Liberia, have been sent. Most of all, it is hoped that in this time of world calamity, there has been fostered a deepened sense of Christian responsibility for supplication and the testimony of lives guided by broad sympathy.

It is with deepest regret that we must record the retirement from the active work of the Westchester Committee of our first Vice-Chairman, and of our Treasurer, Mrs. Humason,

who has served with splendid faithfulness for sixteen years. Her devotion and her interest which has never flagged nor lapsed, have sustained our work year after year. Her resignation is an unspeakable loss. Of Mrs. Van Kleeck we feel that throughout Westchester love for her, has helped to make the work loved. Her gentle and beautiful influence has indeed been as a precious ointment poured out and the fragrance has filled the lives of those who worked with her.

Annual Report of the District of Dutchess.

May 4th, 1915.

The Annual Meeting of the District of Dutchess was held on May 7th, 1914, at St. James' Church, Hyde Park. A celebration of the Holy Communion at which the Celebrants were Archdeacon Pott and Dr. Newton, was followed by luncheon in the Town Hall. Over 200 delegates attended and it was the largest meeting ever held in Dutchess County. Mrs. Ames, Vice-President of the Foreign Committee, was with us and made a short address. The speakers were Archdeacon Nicholls of Porto Rico and Rev. Wm. Sibley from Bontoc. There are now 17 Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in Dutchess County, the 3 Poughkeepsie Churches having reorganized into three separate branches. In July I was sent as the Dutchess County delegate to Silver Bay and attended Dr. Sailers' Mission Study Class.

In November a neighborhood meeting was held at Christ Church, Red Hook. Four Branches were represented. Miss Delafield addressed the meeting. The Branch at St. Peter's Lithgow has met with a serious loss in the death of their President, Mrs. Jacob Bockée. The Branch at St. Paul's voted to give quarterly suppers for a year and at their first supper cleared \$32.00 for their treasury.

The Ziegenfuss Scholarship in the Bishop's School at Spokane, which is the only pledge, has been paid.

The Mission Study Class at Zion Church, Wappinger's Falls, have again completed their pledge of \$100 for China, which is to go to St. Mary's, Shanghai.

The Branch at Trinity Church Madalin has developed this year more than any previous year, the total offerings for Missions being nearly four times that of any previous year.

The Branches report 155 new members, the largest gain being St. Paul's, Poughkeepsie.

Annual Report of the District of Orange.

May 4th, 1915.

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the District of Orange was held in Grace Church, Middletown, on May 28th, 1914, twelve parishes being represented. A celebration of the Holy Communion took place in the morning. Chaplain Silver of West Point preached the sermon. The Annual reports of the Parishes were read in the afternoon meeting and they showed that most excellent work has been done. Mrs. Wetmore of Christ School, Arden, N. C., was the Missionary Speaker. Her appeal for money to provide desks for her pupils met with a liberal response. Motions were passed at this meeting that the Fall Meeting of the District should be held on the second Thursday in October, and that the Annual meeting should be held on the second Thursday in May. It was also voted that the District should support a scholarship in St. Elizabeth's School, S. D.

The Fall Meeting of the District was held in St. Mary's Church, Tuxedo Park, on October 13th, 1914. The Rev. Mr. Pringle was the preacher at the morning service. Ninety-three delegates were present, representing twelve parishes. The Rev. Mr. Stroup from the District of Asheville was the Missionary Speaker, and gave a most interesting account of his work among his own people. As a consequence money was pledged by the parishes for a scholarship for a girl in his school, and for a horse and wagon to enable him to do his work.

Miss Warren then addressed the meeting concerning Domestic Missions.

Each of the five Divisions into which the District has been divided has had a meeting during the past year at which, with one exception, there has been a celebration of the Holy Communion in the morning and a Missionary Meeting in the afternoon. At every one of these meetings there have been present members of the Executive Board, missionaries from the field or members of the Board of Missions.

The Meeting of Division No. 1, Mrs. C. V. Hasbrouck, President, was held in All Saints' Church, Rosendale, on December 11th, 1914. Delegates from each Parish in the

Division were present. Miss Delafield attended this meeting and held a conference with the Leaders of the Branches and Bishop Lloyd made the Missionary Address.

The meeting of Division No. 2, Miss Anna Betts, President, was held at Highland Falls, in Holy Innocents' Church, on March 4th, 1915. Bishop Wells, formerly of Spokane, was the Missionary Speaker. The Rev. H. Percy Silver, Chaplain, at West Point, also addressed the meeting. Miss Warren held a conference with the delegates. The meeting of Division No. 3, Mrs. F. S. Smithers, President, was held in St. John's Church, Monticello, on April 22nd, 1915. Miss Delafield held a conference with the Leaders and Dr. Gray, Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions, addressed the meeting. The meeting of Division No. 4, Miss E. R. Chamberlain, President, was held in St. Paul's Church, Chester, on January 22nd, 1915. Every Branch in the Division was represented. Miss Delafield held a conference with the delegates and Mrs. Walter Alexander spoke about the United Offering. Miss Laura Bassett of Jump Off Mission, Tennessee, was the Missionary Speaker.

The meeting of Division No. 5, Mrs. F. P. Lockett, President, was held in Christ Church, Piermont, on April 26th, 1915. The Executive Board was represented by Mrs. John Ames and Mrs. Walter Alexander, both of whom addressed the meeting in the afternoon. Miss Virginia Young was the Missionary Speaker and gave a most interesting account of Bishop Brent's work in the Philippines.

As a result of these meetings we find that 23 out of the 28 Branches in the District have sent delegates where they have met Officers of the Diocesan Board and of the Board of Missions, and have heard Missionaries from the Field. From the letters of thanks and appreciation received from the Branches I know that greater zeal and enthusiasm have been aroused in this way. The Scholarships pledged by the District have been paid; one in St. Elizabeth's School, S. D., one in the Keeling Industrial School, Tenn., and one in St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan.

The Box Work of the District has been in charge of Mrs. Hoffman Miller, 26 boxes have been reported of which the greater number have been sent either to the Rutherfordton

Missions in the Asheville District or to the Lawrenceville Mission in Virginia.

I have to report the lapse of two Branches, that of St. Thomas, New Windsor, caused by the removal or death of many active workers in the Church, and of St. Paul's, Spring Valley, and the gain of two new Branches; one recently organized in the Church of the Good Shepherd in Newburgh, and a Branch of Section B in St. George's Church, Newburgh. Besides attending the District and Division Meetings your Vice-President in charge has visited Highland Falls, Kingston, Milton and Newburgh for informal conferences with the Leaders of the Branches.

It is with deep gratitude that I have noted that in spite of the exigencies of the past year our Branches have not failed to do their part, and that their knowledge of the organization and loyalty to the ideals of the Woman's Auxiliary have visibly increased. This is largely due to the loving co-operation of the Officers of the Diocesan Board to whom, and to those members of the Board of Missions who have visited our Branches, I wish for myself, and in behalf of the whole District to extend most sincere and heartfelt thanks.

Annual Report of the District of Staten Island.

May 1st, 1915.

The District of Staten Island covers sixty square miles and includes eleven parishes and two missions. Of these churches seven have organized branches of the Women's Auxiliary, one is working for missions through its parish guild, and another always sends delegates to our United Meetings.

Most of the Branches report a fair increase in membership. The greatest gain is reported from St. John's, Clifton, which has added 52 names to its Auxiliary this year. This Branch has started a fine Section B — the first in this District, which has had a most successful winter.

We have had several United Meetings this year. Our Annual Fall Meeting was held in Christ Church, New Brighton, Miss Warren, Vice-President in charge of Domestic Work, being present and giving us a most inspiring talk on "the Black Folk" and their needs — and our duty towards them. In January an evening meeting was held in the Church of the Ascension, West New Brighton, Mr. Betticher giving his stereopticon lecture on Alaska. Instead of our usual Quiet Day, we tried a Quiet Hour this year, which was conducted by the Rev. F. J. Clark, Recording Secretary of the Board of Missions, at St. John's Church, Clifton. At all of these meetings the attendance was unusually good, owing in part, no doubt, to our good fortune in having favorable weather. On April 20th a most successful drawing-room meeting was held for Mr. Sherman, Mrs. H. E. Alexander, of New Brighton, kindly offering us her house. This resulted in a committee of men being formed to raise \$500 for a parochial school at St. Michael's Church, Wuchang. I had the pleasure of welcoming the various parish officers of the district at an informal meeting at my house in February. We found the opportunity for an interchange of ideas and plans most helpful, and hope this may be an annual affair.

The box report from the district is a good one. In all 15 boxes have been sent, valued at \$935.35.

I feel that no report of the year's work on Staten Island would be complete without mentioning the help that mission study has been to us. Six of our seven branches sent

delegates to Miss Flanders' normal class at Christ Church in the Fall. Those of us who were privileged to attend this class found much inspiration in it, and several of the members led classes in various parishes during Lent. Mrs. A. D. Pentz, who has taken charge of this part of the work, has been a most efficient assistant. Besides taking the responsibility of forming study classes, she got up two interesting and very well attended meetings at which one of the Normal Study Class members gave a talk with the stereopticon lecture "Then and Now." 150 people were present at the first one, and 200 children at the second.

I have made visits to several Auxiliaries during the year and have been warmly welcomed by some of the churches which have no branch at present.

Plans for helping the Emergency Fund, as suggested for the New York Auxiliary, have been taken up with enthusiasm and each branch is working it out in its own way.

I cannot close the report without referring to the whole-hearted support I have received from the officers and members in this district, and with their help I hope next year we may reach higher ideals than ever before.

Annual Report of the Educational Secretary.

1914-1915.

The title or watchword of this year's united program was "Christ for Every Life and All of Life." As we have reached the end of our year's work it is fitting that we take a backward glance and see what part we have taken in this program of the Missionary Education Movement. The real significance of the year's work will be difficult to determine but as I look back it is with a feeling of great thankfulness that I see an increased interest and earnestness shown by the leaders and members of the Mission Study Classes. I want to say first of all that the Mission Study Work has been reaping the benefit of the training received by the fifteen delegates to the Silver Bay Conference last July.

Six Normal Classes have been held, one on the Missionary Message of our Lord, led by Miss Warren, the remaining five on the "Social Aspects of Christian Missions" which was the subject chosen for this year's study. One of these classes was held in Poughkeepsie and led by Mrs. Clarkson, who was one of last year's delegates to Silver Bay. The other four were led by the Educational Secretary. Besides these Normal Classes there have been 66 parish and 2 diocesan Classes, one of the latter led by Miss Earle was held at St. James' Parish House and marks our first mission study work among the coloured people. The other was Miss Warren's Monday Morning Bible Class, the importance of which is shown in the ever increasing interest and attendance of its members. This makes a total of 74 classes with an average attendance of 715 as against 81 classes last year with an average attendance of 690. You will see that while the number of classes is smaller this year the average attendance is larger. In addition to these discussion classes there have been many parishes which have used the lecture form of Mission Study, have had programme or reading meetings.

The same splendid work has been done this year as heretofore in the Hudson River Division of the district of Westchester, where fifteen out of nineteen branches have been represented in mission study, making a total for Westchester of twenty-five classes.

Staten Island has had a wonderful awakening to the fact of the importance of mission study as a practical part of the work of the Auxiliary.

To the untiring zeal of Mrs. Pentz, the educational secretary of the district, is chiefly due the success of the educational work. She worked faithfully all summer preparing for the winter's campaign, beginning with a normal class during Advent, which I had the pleasure of leading, and never ceasing in her efforts until every branch was represented in some form of mission study during the year.

An important part of the year's work has been the Training Classes held at the Church Club on Friday mornings from the first of November until the first of April. There were classes upon the following subjects under the following leaders:

The attendance at these classes was 172. In addition there have been classes on Mexico and China on other days and at other places. Mrs. Elliott reports that these classes have all been most interesting and that the chairmen of the various sub-committees deserve great appreciation of their earnest efforts to secure such splendid leaders.

The true value of mission study is not to be found in figures but rather in the increasing of the spiritual force and understanding of the members of the Auxiliary. But I should like to call your attention to some of the direct results of the work this last year. From many classes gifts of money for special objects or for the Emergency Fund; committees formed for canvassing a district for the Emergency Fund;

Mite boxes and United Offering boxes distributed; new subscribers to the Spirit of Missions; Missionary libraries started in two parishes; Missionary literature circulated and 100 copies of Miss Emery's Hand-Book of the Woman's Auxiliary purchased by members of the Staten Island District. These classes are also a means of removing prejudice against missions and of breaking down that line which should never have been created between what is called foreign and domestic missions.

Now what can be done to make the parish branches realize what an effective part of their machinery they are neglecting? I am sure it is because they do not realize this that so many branches have been without any form of mission study this year. Will not each one of you who has had the privilege of leading or being a member of a class this year make an effort to get one uninterested person to come to a class either diocesan or parochial that our classes next year may be filled with new material? And let us not cease our efforts until every member of every branch shall have had some form of missionary instruction! What is it that makes those of us who know feel how great a privilege is ours that we are given a share in this work of mission study? It is not these material results just enumerated, valuable as they are, but a far deeper reason, the highest aim of mission study is the winning of lives for the extension of the Kingdom of God, and this year we have been most wonderfully blessed in that two lives, both from the same parish, have been offered for service in the mission field. They are members of the New York Auxiliary, they are your responsibility and mine and for them I ask your prayers.

Those of you who attended the beautiful service held in Grace Church on the 23d of April heard Dr. Slattery say, "we are to love God with all our minds as well as with our hearts and strength." How much more effective then would be our work and our prayers if we could know *how* dark is the darkness which we are trying to dispel through the spread of the knowledge that "Christ is for Every Life and All of Life."

Annual Report of the Prayer and Service Union.

1914-1915.

The Prayer and Service Union has held its regular monthly service of prayer, on the third Wednesday in the month, from November to April inclusive, with a varying attendance. With the exception of the Annual Meeting in January, which was held at the Cathedral, the Union has met at the Church Club, 53 East 56th Street.

We have had the privilege of hearing, at four of these meetings, Miss Emery, Miss Warren, Miss Crosby and Mrs. Betticher, who spoke to us, in different ways and most helpfully, of prayer, and at the December meeting Miss Bessie Mead told very interestingly of her work in Yamagata, Japan.

The Annual Meeting was held in Synod Hall in January. It was preceded by the Communion Service in the Chapel of St. Saviour in the Cathedral. Bishop Lloyd was the celebrant, and his words to us afterwards, on union and communion with Christ,— He “the Vine” and we “the Branches,” must have remained with us, all through the year’s work, as an inspiration and a joy. At the business meeting immediately afterwards, in Synod Hall, it was voted to alter the By-Laws to allow of Branches of the Prayer and Service Union being formed with less than ten members. As Mrs. Edgar B. Van Winkle felt it to be impossible for her to continue as General Secretary, owing to other important church work which is making increasing demands upon her time and strength, the Union was regretfully forced to accept her resignation, and Miss Augusta A. Smith was elected to take her place.

At the closing meeting, in April, it was agreed that the Prayer League Leaflets should be used daily, during the Summer, by the members, so that while we shall have no meetings until next November, we shall still be uniting our petitions for the work we all love.

Mrs. R. B. Sperry, one of our earliest members, entered into rest, on the 24th of last January.

Two of the older Branches,—those of the Chapel of the Intercession and of St. Michael’s Church, — have shown strong growth during the winter and are a source of deepening spiritual power.

We pray that more and more we may all come to realize the wonderful meaning of "Paul may plant, and Apollo water, but it is God that giveth the increase," and that we may be "workers together with Him," through more earnest prayer, and through looking steadfastly to the guiding of His Spirit in all that we undertake.

Annual Report of the President of the Junior Auxiliary.

May 1, 1915.

This has been a most difficult year for the Junior Auxiliary, due to the conditions created by the war, and the interest in the Red Cross work; but we are glad to report that many branches have risen nobly to the emergency and have worked harder than ever before.

The following new branches have been organized. Under Section I St. Barnabas, Irvington, Dongan Hills Branch, and Christ Church, Staten Island. Under Section II Grace Neighborhood House, St. Thomas's, Incarnation Chapel Boys' Branch, St. John's Kingston; Calvary; Christ Church Poughkeepsie; St. John's Monticello, and Under Section III St. James' Goshen, Heavenly Rest, Incarnation Chapel, St. Barnabas' Irvington, St. Paul's New Rochelle.

The Wednesday Morning Bible Class met during January and February. In January Bishop Lloyd and Dr. Jeffery each conducted two meetings, and Dr. Johnson Ross had the class during February. The class raised about \$4,300.00 for the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China, making a total for the last three years of nearly \$12,000.00.

Four normal Study Classes were led by Miss Dorothy Giles and the Junior President.

The Executive Board considered it wise to divide the Diocese into districts in order to increase the efficiency of the work. These districts are under the supervision of vice-presidents, and each branch has the privilege of choosing the districts to which it wishes to belong, this is done in order to facilitate the attendance at meetings.

At our November meeting we had the Communion Service, followed by Sectional Conferences. In December the conference for the officers of Section II was held, and on Sunday, December 13th, Section III had a mass meeting at which Bishop Lloyd and Dr. Jefferys spoke.

District meetings have been held in Mt. Vernon, Poughkeepsie and Middletown.
