In Memoriam

DAVID HUMMEL GREER

Bishop of the Diocese of New York

Died May 19, 1919.

At this Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of New York we record our sorrow for the death of our late Bishop. In many other places his distinguished services to the Church have been enumerated; we commemorate especially his service to our Lord in the cause of Missions.

Believing that the only hope of the world is founded in the love of our Heavenly Father manifested in His Son, Jesus Christ our Lord and believing also that the Church's mission to make known the Way of Life cannot fail because it is the cause of God, Bishop Greer was deeply interested in all efforts to give to men the knowledge of that love and to show to them the Way of Life. Because the Woman's Auxiliary helps those who at home or abroad are trying to tell men of the love of God and to show to them the Way of Life, to increase the number of missionaries and to give them equipment for their work, the Bishop was always ready and glad to give to this Society his advice and his help. In the midst of his ceaseless labours in the Diocese and beyond it, he always kept for us the day of our Advent Meeting, when he celebrated the Holy Communion, sometimes preached, and presided at the business meeting. He was greatly interested in the Advent Call of 1918, and we remember with gratitude his sermon on Prayer on the opening day.

We miss his friendship, his sympathy and his help. We rejoice that the weariness and pain which so long beset him are ended. We trust that he, beholding the King in His Beauty, does not cease to pray for all who, however poorly and ignorantly, are trying to serve the King, and to point out to others the way to Him.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO
THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, DIOCESE OF NEW YORK,
AT ITS ANNUAL MEETING, JANUARY SIXTH, 1920.

With the passing of the Board of Missions, as an Auxiliary to which we were called into being, we wish to record our grateful appreciation of the leadership of its President.

As General Secretary and later as President, Bishop Lloyd never failed in his understanding of the problems and needs of the Auxiliary. His patient and sympathetic counsel was always available to us. His generosity in giving himself to speak, to preach, and to conduct Quiet Days for the Auxiliary was without stint.

But he not only led us, he shepherded us. He showed us that as we interpreted the Father, so could our service glorify His name. Bishop Lloyd was a Captain who not merely pointed out an objective, but who strove to make his soldiers fit for the combat. It was because he led us in spiritual vision that his leadership was vital; because we knew that a man of God was our leader, we realized that it was God's work we were doing and that it must done in His way.

We learned from Bishop Lloyd's great power as an Executive, and the remarkable success, even as the world rates success, which the work attained under his guidance, that nearness to the Father is the great qualification for doing God's work.

Whereas, we realize in large extent what all these qualities of Bishop Lloyd's have meant to the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and especially to the New York Branch, which has had the advantage of his presence in its Diocese, therefore be it

RESOLVED: That we here record our deep gratitude for what Bishop Lloyd has done for us and our sense of the blessing which his leadership has brought us.

Address of the President.

JANUARY, 1920.

It is a year and a half since our last Annual Meeting, and in that short space of time there have been more changes vitally affecting the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions than in its whole previous history.

The women of the Auxiliary became conscious to an increasing degree of the importance and responsibility of their work, and they longed for every woman in the Church to share their joy of service. To make this possible, at the Triennial Meeting in Detroit, they not only enlarged the scope of their own activities to include Religious Education and Social Service but they invited every Organization of Churchwomen to join with them in forming the Church Service League, with its National, Provincial, Diocesan and Parochial Councils.

The object of this federation or League is not simply to promote co-operation between societies and guilds and to prevent waste or overlapping, but its great purpose is to gain every woman in the Church for service in the fivefold field of the parish, community, diocese, nation and world. The National Council has already met; the Councils of this diocese and province will be organized this month with the hearty approval of the Bishop. I have written to the President of every Parish branch of the Auxiliary, asking her in consultation with her Rector to start the Church Service League in her parish, and many have already done so; I earnestly hope that by this Spring there will be no parish in the diocese without a unit of the League. It seems to me that the Church Service League will help us to gain an increased spirit of Christian fellowship, and also give us a marvellous opportunity to provide work for the women who have been reached through the Nation Wide Campaign.

This Campaign is the culminating act of Bishop Lloyd's administration of the Board of Missions, and like so many other things that he has accomplished he has preferred that the credit for it should go to others. It is hard to see how the Church can launch her new form of government without him, but we, in this diocese, are very fortunate for he is to help Bishop Burch during the next six months. I say nothing here of what our Auxiliary owes to Bishop Lloyd; some expression of our love and appreciation of him and of his leadership will be given elsewhere in this book.

We miss Bishop Greer and his wise counsel in all these new departures, and I know we will remember always that his last special message to us was the beautiful sermon on Prayer that he preached at the

Cathedral at the great Service inaugurating the Advent Call. His wonderful simplicity of goodness was a constant example of forgetfulness of self in love to Christ.

To come from great things to small—it seems fitting that with the new Presiding Bishop and Council and the new Bishop of New York, there should also be a new President of the Auxiliary, and many changes on our Executive Board. The outgoing officers have all served so faithfully I should like to pay tribute to each one, but lack of time and space prevent. One, however, I must mention. For thirteen years Miss Clarkson has been, first United Offering Treasurer, then Treasurer, and her work has been really remarkable; such promptness, thoroughness and fidelity as hers are very rare in volunteer service. The Executive Board will never be the same without her.

It is very difficult for me after the seven and a half years that you and I have worked together to say good-bye to you as President. During all that time, in spite of my many failings and shortcomings, you have shown me nothing but goodwill and kindness, and my dear friends you don't know what it has meant to me, nor how I have valued it and thanked God for it. My term of office has been filled to overflowing with joy and happiness; I wish the same to the new President, I pledge her our loyal, enthusiastic support, and I pray that the Holy Spirit may so direct and guide her that she will lead our Branch to higher and greater things.

Having been asked this year to make the Reports as short as possible, and yet wishing that each Sub-Committee should be included in the summary of work, I wrote to the Chairman of each Committee requesting her to tell what she considered the most important piece of work accomplished by her Committee during the past "year". It is interesting to know what these "most important" achievements are; and since every Sub-Committee has worked (with good results) for many things, the things named by the Chairmen must truly be "important".

ALASKAN COMMITTEE

From Mrs. Edward V. Z. Lane, Chairman, news comes that the "most important work done" is the providing outfits for fifteen children in the Nenana School at a cost of about \$900, for adds Mrs. Lane, "though the money raised for the new Church at Cordova probably exceeded the cost of these outfits, yet, judging from letters received from Nenana" she believes that to the Mission School the clothing was most important.

INDIAN COMMITTEE

The regretted resignations of Mrs. Seth Low and Miss Anne Byrd,—both unavoidable, have caused much sorrow to the far Indians. We do not know what to do without them, but we trust that the Committee will shortly be re-organized. Miss Byrd writes that she believes that "the completion of the \$3000 promised to Bishop Thomas for the New York Unit, St. Michael's Mission, Wyoming, 'was' the event which the Diocese would probably consider the most important." Although much other work has been accomplished, we are inclined to agree with her.

ISLANDS' COMMITTEE

Mrs. H. Rawlins Baker, Chairman, is sure that, "the re-opening of the Mission Station, in Bagnan, P. I. (closed for eighteen months) is the most important work which her Committee has accomplished,—“yes, it is even more important” than the Scholarships for Besao, and the many other things for which the Committee has worked so hard.

COLORED COMMITTEE

Alas! you can never persuade this Committee that any of the wonderful and loving things which they do for the work's sake is "important". Having repudiated the suggestion they do not tell of any of their generous money gifts in detail, but Mrs. John Farr, Chairman, states that the comfort we are able to bring to those engaged in Colored work by being always ready to receive and hear them when they come to this City is the chief part of our work. She adds "the workers receive money from individual and Auxiliary Branches through our members, but we do not wish to speak of that."

MOUNTAINEER COMMITTEE

No report sent in! The members have again given one thousand dollars to the Helen Dunlop School, Winslow, Arkansas,—shall we risk calling this their "most important" piece of work? We hope that Mrs. Arthur Gray, Chairman, will think our choice correct.

CHURCHILL SATTERLEE MEMORIAL HOUSE COMMITTEE

Mrs. Charles de Rham reports that "The Committee has raised since March, 1919, till September, 1919, twelve hundred and fifteen dollars; and since November 21st from two meetings held in private houses fourteen hundred and fifty-six dollars and sixty-seven cents, making a total of two thousand six hundred and seventy-one dollars, sixty-seven cents." This Committee is working with unusual earnestness and determination, in the hope that this "Memorial" to one who willingly gave his life for the betterment of the Mill and Mountain people, may be a means of carrying on the wonderful work which he began.

COMMITTEE IN CHARGE OF WORK IN THE WEST

Which is the "most important" piece of work done? Is it not the raising of the Six Thousand dollars and over for the building of the operating room for St. Luke's Hospital, Boise, Idaho? Mrs. C. Chauncey Stillman, Chairman, is not certain as to whether this large gift or the smaller gifts which have brought gladness to some of the Bishops of Western Dioceses should be selected as most important.

Annual Report of the Foreign Committee.

1918-1919.

Since our last report the Foreign Committee has met monthly from October to May with an average attendance of 32 members. We have had addresses by Dean Robbins, Dr. Arthur R. Gray, Miss Littell, Dr. Cassell and Miss Seaman of Liberia, Miss Gardiner and Miss Wells of Japan, Miss Ruth Kent, Mrs. Edmund J. Lee and Mrs. John Ely of China. The Vice-President has spoken at twelve parish meetings.

The chief work of the LIBERIA Committee has been to help in raising the SPECIAL FOREIGN PLEDGE for the Lloyd Industrial School at Cape Mount; instead of the \$2700 promised the amount collected was \$3004.25. This Committee gave \$80 towards the support of a Liberian studying in this country, \$16 for a boy under the care of Mrs. Ferguson (widow of the late Bishop), \$50 for a scholarship in the Brierly school, Cape Palmas, and \$143 for Miss Conway's discretionary use in St. Timothy's Hospital. They have also sent to her drugs costing \$200. Last spring a few days before Miss Seaman left for Liberia at the end of her furlough, a small reception was given for her, to which each person brought a present, either for her use on the long journey or something to take back to the Mission. Three members of this Committee have spoken at parish meetings.

The CHINA Committee has paid the premiums on Bishop Root's life insurance for 1919 and 1920 and collected money, supplies and clothing for the Church General Hospital at Wuchang. For this institution since May 1918, including one very large gift of \$8000 from two members, the Auxiliary of this diocese has given \$12,714. This fall Mrs. Wheeler, the chairman, has held two special drawing-room meetings for the Committee, one to meet Bishop Roots and the other to meet Deaconess Reebe, and \$125 has been given to furnish the room for the Woman's Station Class at Ichang.

Annual Report of the Foreign Committee.

Under the zealous and untiring leadership of Mrs. Watson, who on account of absence from New York has resigned the chairmanship, the JAPAN Committee besides paying the premiums on Bishop Tucker's life insurance, raised \$2518.50 for a Mission building at Kumagaya, \$100 for a bell for the church in that town, \$1000 for pews for All Saint's Chapel of St. Paul's College, Tokyo, and has contributed \$415 towards the support of two Christian Japanese girls preparing in this country to teach in Japan. Through the Committee there has been given for the Church building fund for Kawagoe \$3036. They have also pledged \$50 a year for a creche managed and mainly supported by Japanese pupils of Deaconess Knapp in Tokyo, and for this year that amount has already been paid. The new chairman, Mrs. R. T. Stevens has had one special meeting for her Committee.

The three Committees working for Latin America were consulted by the Secretary of the Board in charge of work for those countries, about a new folder describing our work there, and each Committee contributed \$100 towards its publication. In addition to this the MEXICO Committee paid Bishop Aves life insurance premiums for two years, gave \$200 for the House of Hope at Nopala, \$450 for the Hooker School and \$25 for St. Andrew's Seminary at Guadalajara.

The CUBA AND HAITI Committee have also paid their Bishop's life insurance premiums, raised \$510 for the Mission at Port-au-Prince, Haiti and \$10 for All Saint's School, Guantanamo, Cuba. Through this Committee \$2000 more were given for this school. The chairman has spoken at three parishes.

Mrs. Blanchard's energetic BRAZIL Committee gave last March an entertainment to raise money, and held two receptions for Bishop and Mrs. Kinsolving, one in April and one in October. They gave to the Bishop to commemorate the twenty years of his episcopate \$3015, to be used where he thinks it most needed in his diocese. This money was collected from his friends in twenty dioceses and the gifts were accompanied by many expressions of affection. The Committee sent a box of fancy work and materials to the Woman's Auxiliary of Rio de Janeiro valued at \$25, and paid the insurance premiums for Rev. W. M. M. Thomas.

(These figures do not include all the money given by our Auxiliary for Foreign Missions but only the money given directly through the Foreign Committee).

In presenting my last report as Vice-President of this Committee, I wish to express my appreciation of the cooperation of the faithful

Chairmen, for they have done all the work. A new leader will give them new inspiration and new ideas and they will thus be able to do greater work for the far-away children of our Heavenly Father.

Owing to a death in my family I was unable to be present at the District Annual Meeting on May 6th, 1918, held at St. Luke's Church, Matteawan, and which would have been my first appearance as Vice-President. Mrs. Clarkson very kindly consented to take my place, and the meeting was a large and satisfactory one, in every way.

On May 8th, 1919, the Annual Meeting was held in Zion Church, Wappingers Falls, my own Parish, and was also large and representative. We had an interesting and inspiring address from the Rev. Herbert Shipman, and also from Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Haff, who came to tell us of the Every Name Campaign.

One branch apparently lapsed just before I became Vice-President, and I have been unable as yet to start any new ones. I have, however, adopted the plan that has proved to be so successful in Westchester and Orange, of sub-dividing the district with a leader in charge of each division. Three Leaders have been chosen, and I hope for one, if not two more before the winter is over. There are so many new aims before the auxiliary and so many new plans, that I have waited until they are a little more crystallized before broaching them to my Branches, but that is for the immediate future.

Our Parish Branch has a very successful Section B. formed of young girls who have outgrown the juniors, and I spent a most delightful afternoon with them last September. All of the branches are active, and I note a growing tendency to send the Missionaries cheques instead of boxes of clothing. Many of them send Christmas boxes to nearby

Diocesan Institutions, such as Hope Farm, and when these can be reported a fairer estimate will be obtained of the work the district has done and is doing. A great many branches also read and study about Missions at their regular sessions, without calling for guidance from the Educational Secretary. I hope that in time, their interest will grow so that regular classes may be formed. Of course the Advent Call and Every Name Campaign have occupied a large place in our time and thoughts. We prepared for the former by a large Meeting at Christ Church, Poughkeepsie, in June, 1918, which Miss Warren conducted.

Later, the influenza interfered so seriously with our plans that it was only possible to have our meeting at Pleasant Valley in October, when Mrs. Elliott made a stirring appeal. For the Every Name Campaign we were able to do more. Mrs. Haff addressed a fairly representative meeting at St. Paul's Church, Poughkeepsie, on Sept. 10th and as a result we had speakers enough to send wherever they were asked for. As a rule, the Dutchess County clergy preferred to run the Campaign independently, but we sent speakers to a dozen or more places.

The work in the district since my last report covers a period which commences with preparations for the Advent Call. A May meeting in 1918 at the Bronx Church House, when Mr. Betticher spoke, was attended by most of the Bronx parish officers and in the following Autumn other meetings were held at various centres in Manhattan and the Bronx in preparation for the Advent Call.

On the last day of January a conference of parish presidents was held at my home, when more than 40 branches were represented and there was general discussion of questions arising from after War conditions, in regard to parish work.

Annual Report of the District of New York.

The Annual evening meeting held in Mid-winter for the Evening branches was on February 13th, when Miss Berry the chairman in charge planned a most interesting programme. The subject was Liberia and Bishop Lloyd was the speaker. Every evening branch was represented and there was a large attendance. The offering for the Foreign pledge, amounted to \$40.00.

All plans for district meetings this Autumn were merged in plans for the Nation Wide Campaign. Your chairman was in constant correspondence with the parish presidents from July until Advent.

There are 65 parish branches to report, in this district, with 10 temporarily suspended, lacking leaders. Of these 65, there are 46 which have sent boxes to the number of 160 with a total valuation of \$15,388.65.

There is one new branch while 12 branches report new members, one with as many as 14. The Diocesan pledges received support from 27 and there are doubtless others who contributed and have not reported it to me. Included in the list of boxes are 3 which were sent by Sub-committees of the Foreign Committee when returning Missionaries could take them with them, to China, Liberia and Brazil.

The greatest happiness which has come to me has been in connection with my visits to the parish meetings, where I have seen the working out of many plans of service and to these parish officers and members I am indebted for much of the inspiration, which has made my work all Joy.

Three meetings of the District have been held; two so-called Annual meetings, with reports, May 1918 and May 1919, and one deferred "autumn meeting" in December, 1919. The autumn meeting of 1918 was omitted because of epidemic conditions.

Annual Report of the District of Orange.

Two campaigns have been conducted; the Advent Call, for prayer and Bible study, and the Speakers campaign, as part of the Every-name Canvass, with fifteen speakers, almost entirely a force of novices who were surprised at their own temerity and gratified with the reception accorded them. Twenty-two meetings for women were held; with three extra parishes represented at Union meetings.

Thirty-seven boxes have been sent, valued at \$1939.16.

Thirty dollars has been sent through the Box-Directress toward a clerical coat for a missionary. Several parishes contributed.

All the District pledges were paid during the old season of 1918-19. The reports for the ensuing months will have to be given in next season's report.

About half the desired amount has been raised, up to this date, for the proposed Scholarship Endowment in Mrs. Wetmore's School, in memory of our dear Mrs. Rushmore.

A neighborhood meeting was held at Port Jervis in September, 1918. Classes for speakers, and Union-meetings of women addressed by them, have largely taken the place of Neighborhood or Division meetings during 1918 and 1919. Too many gatherings are a drain upon the resources of District hospitality, etc., at the possible center.

We have one new branch to report, and one remote one disbanded because of shifting population. One branch has reorganized.

A fifth District has been formed of the three western branches.

Our 1918 Annual Meeting was held in May, at St. John's Church, Clifton. Mrs. Van Bokkelen spoke on behalf of the Advent Call, followed by Bishop Tyler, about his work among boys in North Dakota.

Annual Report of the District of Staten Island.

On October 31st, 1918, our fall meeting was held, at Christ Church, New Brighton, where we heard three interesting speeches from Miss Dickinson, directress of Religious Education, Mrs. Zabriskie, and Miss Ruth Kent, from China.

In February a particularly large audience, heard Miss Delafield tell about the work being done for devastated France, and was thrilled with what was being done to help its homeless, destitute women and children. She was followed by Dr. E. A. Dodd, who spoke of the Y. M. C. A. work among the hospitals, with which he had been associated. It was wonderfully interesting and inspiring. Following these speakers, the home needs were emphasized, and a committee appointed, with Mrs. Mason Smith as Chairman, to continue after war work for our hospitals. Those present pledged themselves by a rising vote, to help, and to keep together the women who had been so splendid in the Red Cross activities. As a result of this meeting a "White Elephant" Sale was held in May realizing \$197.73, which was divided between our Staten Island Hospital and Grace Hospital, Morganton, S. C.

In May, our spring meeting was held at old St. Andrews, Richmond, (This used to be our Annual Meeting but in the future, this will be January 1st, conforming with the rest of the Auxiliary year). This meeting marked the starting of their Auxiliary Work in combination with New Dorp Church, which has now become part of St. Andrews. Dr. Gray spoke of the Haitian needs.

Another District Meeting held in May was to hear Miss Warren on behalf of the Advent Call, twenty-five were present and were thereby enabled to instruct where to carry out the Call, in the spirit of those who started it. Needless to say it was very successful and every Church family was visited.

The end of October, (of this year) 1919, a meeting was held at the Church of the Ascension, to instruct the leaders who were to speak at our own district meetings, on the subject of the Every Name Campaign. Mrs. W. B. Haff led this meeting. Ten were present and great inspiration was derived from Mrs. Haff, without which the women felt they could not have undertaken what they did so successfully.

On November 6th our fall meeting was held at the Church of the Ascension, West New Brighton.

Annual Report of the District of Staten Island.

Our speakers were Mr. Petersen, who spoke appealingly for Dr. Tai, and Miss Emily Tillotson whose account of the Convention at Detroit was so intensely interesting. We were very grateful for the spiritual touch, a hope which permeated what she said, and for the picture she painted. This meeting was followed as usual by supper, 220 were served. A large meeting followed a reception to Bishop Burch, with speakers for the Every Name Campaign.

At this time a few results must be noted of this wonderful Campaign in our District. The preparatory paving of the way, and the preliminary calls were all made by women, chosen by the rectors, and the final canvass was done in two parishes by women, (St. Mary's and St. Andrew's) in two parishes (Ascension and St. John's) by men and women and in Christ Church parish by men, only 150 volunteering for this.

In St. Mary's parish six new members joined the Auxiliary. There was a doubling of subscriptions to support the Church, also a good increase for missions. In St. Andrew's Parish twenty new members and subscriptions about doubled. In Ascension Parish twenty new members were added, 260 as against 180 dollars last year for Church envelopes and nearly doubled for missions. In St. John's parish thirty new members, the amount subscribed thru the envelopes \$1204.60 as against \$411.81 last year, and a good missionary increase. In Christ Church Parish thirty-six new members have joined the Auxiliary, increase in Church Support 2700 instead of 150 subscribers, and for Missions increase from \$1200.00 last year to \$6200.00 this year (\$5000 more).

I want to speak of the co-operation, the interest and the zeal with which our members have worked during the past year and a half. More meetings were held than ever before. Two scholarships for Mrs. Wetmore's school are reported, one from St. Mary's parish and one from Christ Church.

The past twenty months have been for Westchester, a distinctly growing time; she has set herself aims towards larger giving and wider work, and has not failed to measure to them.

The months have brought to completion the Schuyler Memorial Fund. Also Westchester has added to her accustomed support of the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Arizona, an increase of twenty-five per cent. for needed maintenance. Again at the last All-Day Meeting, held at White Plains in April, a pledge of one thousand dollars was made by the District to the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, as our summer work. Not only did Westchester respond warmly to this cause, but also it was a matter of her family pride that she should take part in the fund, the raising of which is so largely due to Miss Helen Littell and Miss Janet Waring, members of our District. All this is in addition to the regular pledges and payments of branches. I wish that I might picture for you what this added giving represents;—the work of hands and talents, the personal service, the gladness and the patience which have gone into these funds. In a spirit of devotion the giving has been made.

Of all the meetings held in the past year and a half, the ones of chief importance are the two All-Day District Meetings. These are significant always in the real growth of the Branches. They mark the completion of efforts, they launch new plans, and color largely the work of the Auxiliaries throughout the year.

At the Port Chester meeting Miss Warren talked on the Advent Call, and it rightly became the centre of interest in the months which followed. The summer was given to making known its plans and purpose, by letters, literature sent, and personal visits, and three large Division Conferences were held; also classes for instruction and training. In the District of Westchester 282 messengers made 3348 visits, 2423 cards were signed, 138 special services were held, and the number of intercessors were 475.

The annual All-Day Meeting, held April 30, 1919, at Grace Church, White Plains, was the largest in our history. Bishop Lloyd, who could not come to us the year before, brought the needs of Liberia very close to our hearts. The attendance was 327 members from 40 parishes and

8 Rectors. This meeting marked the beginning of our sharing in the Nation-Wide Campaign. A representative of the Diocesan Every Name Campaign gave its outline, and definitely asked the women's help in making known the Campaign in their parishes. Later a well ordered plan of publicity was formed, in charge of Mrs. H. A. Witcombe; three Division Conferences were held by the managers in the late spring to consider workable plans, and in the summer and autumn 47 parishes had meetings, the speakers at which were six trained women of the District. A notable instance of the part played in the interest of publicity by the women of one parish, was the placing of 59 new subscriptions to Church papers.

It is Westchester's habit to assemble at her All-Day Meetings Hospital supplies for the District box sent each summer to Miss Conway. Generous gifts were brought to the Port Chester meeting, and the valuation of the box sent to Liberia in the summer of 1918 was \$246 in addition to a special Memorial Fund of \$90 for the purchase of specified drugs. The supplies brought to White Plains last spring exceeded all previous record. In addition to articles in kind, over \$100 was given, and two memorial gifts were made, one for equipment for the Dispensary of the Schuyler Memorial, and the other a bed in the little St. Timothy's Hospital.

Boxes from the Branches have gone with much the usual regularity, and to the Arizona Hospital has been sent a rich supply of Navajo petticoats, ample in figure, and exact in design, which have rejoiced the Indian women's hearts, as petticoats ever do rejoice the feminine mind.

The boxes so far reported since May 1, 1919 are 30 with a valuation of \$1,818.20 besides the Conway District box, valued at about \$250.

The educational work of the District has gone forward largely, in the capable hands of Mrs. Haff; many Bible classes in direct result of the Advent Call have been held, the largest of these was a course by Dr. Tyson on the Life of St. Paul, in which three parishes united. Thus in the months that have followed one another, the old claims and new ventures have been fulfilled, and in resolute spirit.

With the close of our year, there closes also a chapter in Westchester's history which touches deeply both our hearts and memories. After twenty-five years of service at the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Miss Thackara has withdrawn,—the tax upon her strength being greater than she could longer endure. It is not possible to express the devotion and quality of her service; not only has she restored to the Navajo Indian his threatened sight, but she has endeared herself personally to him, as

his trusted friend. She has made of the Hospital of the Good Shepherd a veritable Lighthouse in the Desert; she leaves behind her a memory beloved by all, and unforgettable. The growing work will continue in charge of Miss Cady, who for the past five years has shared its supervision with Miss Thackara. She will prove, we are confident, a not unworthy follower of the true *great woman* whom she succeeds.

Annual Report of the Educational Secretary.

1918-1919.

The past eighteen months, marking the transition from war to peace, have been critical in the history of our country and no less so in the history of our church. That all kinds of work should suffer was an inevitable consequence of the resultant conditions of dissatisfaction and unrest. The educational department of the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese of New York has felt this reaction, but *because* of the difficulty, perhaps, rather than in spite of it, the Educational Committee feel that the work has made a decided advance. It has suffered in having its workers absorbed and turned aside by other interests, but it has gained in the increased earnestness and devotion of those who already appreciated its significance, and in the wider realization of the value of education as an underlying force in our activities.

The educational work in the diocese during the past year has undergone some changes to meet the changing conditions. In place of the former six session study class we have held discussion classes of four and even three sessions, where it was impossible for the people to give more time for study, and I feel I can say these classes met a very real need; they also made it possible for the leaders to cover more ground.

The formation of an Educational Committee has been of inestimable help to me in planning the work and the courses for study.

Four Normal Classes were held at the Church Club last year, one on "Our Church and Our Country" and three on "The Call of a World Task".

There have been forty parish classes studying "Our Church and Our Country", "The Call of a World Task", "Missions According to the Bible", and "Alaska". Besides these regular classes there have been program meetings, reading circles, and Bible classes. I wish to make special mention of the work done in Westchester, where all forms of educational work were carried out this year: parochial study classes, Bible classes, and community study classes, nineteen in all. Besides these, many branches had special educational meetings where material from "Our Church and Our Country" was used. The results of the year's work were particularly gratifying in that several class members went to the summer conferences and new leaders for the work have been found.

The October meeting of the Educational Committee was held at the Church Club and the work outlined for the year. The subject for study for the coming year will be the general one of Americanization, using "Neighbors" as a text book. The Advent Normal Class for experienced leaders was held on November nineteenth and twentieth at the Church Club, in two all day sessions which we found to be far better than the old plan of one lesson a week for six weeks. We made an observation trip to the Czecho Slovak Settlement, and had a speaker on the Russian situation who has lived in Petrograd for the last seventeen years, from whom we were able to gain much valuable information through questioning and discussion.

I wish to express our gratitude to Dean Robbins for the very beautiful service which he held for us in St. Saviour's Chapel last May, so full of inspiration and hope for the future; I am only sorry that the lateness of the date made it impossible for many who would otherwise have been present, to have a part in this most important and fitting close to our year's work.

Oh, women of the Auxiliary, put the best of yourselves into the new and difficult task of reconstruction, remembering that it will take *all* of your powers; and above all do not lose sight of the fact that back of, around and underneath it all is education. The leaders cannot do it for you, it requires the individual effort of each member of the Auxiliary to make the educational department of 1920 the force it should become.

I wish I could express all I feel in my heart to you individually for your affectionate and loyal support during my years of office, you have made many hard places easy by your confidence expressed, and by your sympathy. I thank you most sincerely for the privilege you have given to me so many years, of serving as one of your officers.

Annual Report of the Prayer and Service Union.

1918-1919.

The meetings of the Prayer and Service Union have been held regularly on the third Wednesday of the month from November to April and November and December of 1919, except in March when the meeting was held in connection with the Quiet Day.

The Annual Service was held at the Cathedral in the Chapel of Saint Ansgarius, The Rev. E. Briggs Nash was the Celebrant and the Rev. Franklin J. Clark delivered the address. The offering at this service was for general missions.

The annual business meeting followed in Synod Hall directly after the service. On account of the small attendance at this meeting it was decided to carry questions for discussion over to the February meeting.

Because of the war work and influenza, the attendance at the monthly meetings has been small and the question was brought up at the February meeting whether it would be advisable to discontinue these meetings. After considering the matter from all sides the question was put to vote. It was unanimously decided to continue the monthly meetings of the Prayer and Service Union, holding them on the third Wednesday of the month.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS, DIOCESE OF NEW YORK

THE RESOLUTION FOR THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1922

Adopted at the Conference of Diocesan Officers, 1919

Resolved, That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions, for women's work in the Mission Field, including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled;

Provided that one-tenth of the Offering be set aside as a permanent Trust Fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers;

Also provided, that the sum of not less than ten thousand dollars be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions, and the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also Resolved, That to our united gifts be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

Annual Report of the Junior Auxiliary.

1918-1919.

The Triennial Convention of 1919 at Detroit has meant so much to the children of the Church in developing plans for wider interest and larger usefulness, that it seems a little out-of-date to write a report of the work of the Junior Auxiliary for the year before October, 1919. However, during that time, as in the two preceding years, the Diocesan officers were doing their best to arouse interest in the New Junior Plan, and to form as many new branches as possible for work in the five fields of Service—Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and the World.

Mrs. Alfred Moore of Poughkeepsie was appointed Vice-President of the Northern District and was very successful in organizing new branches in that part of the Diocese and especially in gaining the support and interest of the Clergy.

It was thought wise to concentrate the Missionary activity last year on China and Alaska, and so the money raised for the apportionment was designated for the support of St. James Hospital, Anking, China, and Archdeacon Souck's traveling expenses—his dogs, and the launch, the "Pelican". The Vice-Presidents spoke especially of the work in these parts when visiting the branches and tried to make the members feel nearer to the people to whom they sent their money. Rev. Edward P. Newton of Hyde Park was very kind in telling of his life when in Alaska at several neighborhood meetings arranged by Mrs. Moore.

At the first meeting of the year, held at the Cathedral, Bishop Lloyd celebrated Holy Communion and made an address. The Juniors appreciated having the President of the Board of Missions with them at their opening service.

During the week of the Advent Call, printed prayers were sent to the branches, so that, although the members, in almost every case were too young to take any active part in the visiting, they were able to co-operate with the older members of the Auxiliary, and later in the year, during Lent, the Juniors also used "Call to Service" leaflets, specially prepared for them.

At the February meeting, the Reverend Mr. Madara showed lantern slides that he had made from pictures he had taken in Alaska and told of the work of the Missionaries there.

The Annual meeting was held in May at the Church of the Epiphany. The Rev. Arthur Ketcham conducted the service and made a short and very helpful address of welcome. After the meeting, the

Chapel of the Incarnation Branch presented a mystery play called "In As Much", which was very charming, and interested the audience and offered a good suggestion to other branches.

With the new plans now taking concrete form, we look forward confidently to a day in the not far distant future when all church children through the Church Schools will take an active interest in pushing forward Christ's work. It is a splendid vision,—we pray soon to be realized—but in looking admiringly at that, let us not forget those loyal little branches of the Junior Auxiliary, organized several years before the "New Junior Plan" was even discussed, when Church Schools were still called Sunday Schools, which have been meeting week by week, year by year under the faithful guidance of one or two devoted "leaders" who have done so much in spreading a love for Missions among so many of our children.

May the same loyal spirit enrich the Church School Service League.

Report of the Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of New York.

MAY 1, 1918-JANUARY 1, 1920.

The past year has proved the wisdom of adopting the diocesan organization mentioned in the last Report. The parishes have gladly met their increased apportionment which helped to relieve the financial embarrassment of the N. Y. Branch of the C. P. C.

The Librarians have been thoroughly aroused to their responsibility and have worked with increased enthusiasm, but it is to be regretted that some parishes are still inactive, as no Librarian has been appointed. We hope this may not long be the case, as the need is great and every one must have some reading matter they are willing to pass on to less fortunate neighbors.

The Church Periodical Club may well be proud of the confidence placed in their organization by the Officers of the War Commission who, realizing the work they were already doing for the Chaplains in the Army, placed in their hands funds for increasing this work.

A Chaplains Welfare Committee was immediately formed, and did such splendid work during the war, that their efforts were greatly commended and appreciated, so much so, that the work is to be continued and the Chaplains may still feel they can depend upon the C. P. C. to keep in touch with them and their needs. But with this added interest the Industrial Schools, Hospitals, Libraries and the Missionaries in all parts of the world are not forgotten. The C. P. C. has added another feature to this work, in undertaking to supply the Institutions of New York City with books and magazines, the plan being that different churches will select an institution, find out their needs in that line and make themselves responsible for seeing they are supplied. This seems to be a much needed work and promises to be an interesting one to those who undertake it.

At the meeting of the Provincial Synod held in Newark recently, this Diocese joined with other Dioceses in the province, in an effort to place a Church paper with all public libraries in the Diocese.

Constitution.

NEW YORK BRANCH WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL.

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912,
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETINGS,
MAY 8TH, 1913, AND JANUARY 6TH, 1920.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are considered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who, in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the Missions of the Church may become by enrolment, actual members of the New York Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President and eleven Vice-Presidents, five in charge respectively of the districts of New York, Orange, Westchester, Staten Island and Dutchess, one in charge of the Junior Auxiliary, and four in charge, respectively, of the work of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Religious Education and Social Service, and one Vice-President at Large. A Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer and a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering; all of whom shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Associations may appoint Honorary Officers at pleasure.

Constitution.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting, two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the proposed amendment having been given at a previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I.—DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents.* The Vice-President at Large shall preside in the absence of the President and perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Executive Board, presenting a report of her work at the Annual Meeting.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the districts shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting, a written report of the work in their respective districts for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Religious Education and Social Service shall inform the Parish Branches through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers, of the needs and work in their respective fields. They shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of the work in their respective fields for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 3. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall—

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 5. *Educational Secretary.* The Educational Secretary shall arrange for the formation of Normal and other Mission Study Classes throughout the Diocese.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of work and shall attend the meetings of the Association, reporting receipts and disbursements to the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 7. *Treasurer—United Thank Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Thank Offering, and under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

SEC. 8. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 9. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association; shall fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of officers; and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 10. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE II.—PARISH DUES.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually to the Treasurer, for the current expenses of the Association, a specified sum of money to be known as Parish Dues. The amount of these dues shall be determined by the Association at the November meeting.

ARTICLE III.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The meetings of this Association shall be held monthly from November to May, inclusive, the May meeting being the Annual Meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four duly elected or appointed delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association, except the Annual Meeting, fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. At the Annual Meeting one hundred delegates from the Parish Branches shall constitute a quorum.

By-Laws.

SEC. 6. A meeting of the Executive Board shall precede each monthly meeting of the Association.

SEC. 7. The Vice-Presidents in consultation with other officers of the Association may arrange for special meetings in the Districts to arouse keener zeal and effort.

ARTICLE V.—NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually by the President a Nominating Committee of seven members comprising at least one member from each district, which shall nominate at the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office of the Association, the District Vice-Presidents excepted.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the districts of New York, Orange, Westchester, Staten Island and Dutchess shall be nominated at a representative meeting of their respective districts. At such meeting which shall take place not less than one month before the Diocesan Annual Meeting each branch shall have one vote, a branch being a group of women working to help the Board of Missions and contributing to the expense fund of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. Unless one-third of the branches are represented by delegates or proxies, there shall be no quorum. Should a district waive the right, the Vice-President shall be selected by the Nominating Committee.

SEC. 2. All the officers except the Treasurer for the United Offering and the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Auxiliary shall be elected by ballot of majority vote at the annual meeting and shall hold their office for one year or until the election of their successor.

SEC. 3. The President of the Junior Auxiliary as elected by that body is *ex-officio* the Vice-President of this Association in charge of that Department.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer for the United Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting in the same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

ARTICLE VI.—ORDER OF BUSINESS.

SECTION 1. *Monthly Meetings.*
