In Memoriam.

CHARLES SUMNER BURCH
Bishop of the Diocese of New York
Died December 20, 1920.

The following minute was adopted at the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, Diocese of New York, held on January 4th, 1921.

In the sudden death of Bishop Charles Sumner Burch on December 20th, 1920, the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council of the Diocese of New York, loses a loyal supporter, a wise and sympathetic counsellor and an affectionate friend.

Amid the manifold and ever-pressing duties with which his life was over-crowded, he was never too busy to be of use to the Auxiliary, and in his responsive kindness of heart and unselfishness gave freely of his time and advice. His confidence and belief in the future of the Auxiliary was always an inspiration to those who sought his counsel.

Many of us look back with thankfulness to the last inspiring Advent Meeting—to the Service in the Cathedral at which he was the Celebrant and where we made our Communion, not foreseeing that before a month would have passed our Bishop would have joined that unseen Company whom we felt to be so near us at the Altar.

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General Report of the Year's Work.

1920.

Both at the Quiet Day, held on the Feast of the Annunciation, Thursday, March 25th, conducted by the Rt. Rev. Arthur S. Lloyd, D.D. at the Church of Zion and St. Timothy, and the Advent Meeting at the Cathedral, St. Andrew's Day, November 30th, other diocesan organizations of women were invited to share its privileges with the Woman's Auxiliary. The speakers on the latter occasion were Bishop Morris of the Panama Canal Zone, Bishop Overs of Liberia and Archdeacon Russell of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., with a sermon by Dean Robbins in the Cathedral. Both in the morning and afternoon the attendance was larger than ever before. It is with deepest appreciation we remember that Bishop Burch was able to be with us throughout the day, being Celebrant at the morning Service and presiding officer at the afternoon meeting.

The usual business meetings were held the first Tuesday of each month in the Parish House of Zion and St. Timothy, for the use of which we would here record our grateful appreciation and thanks to the Rector and members of the Parish.

Delegates from New York attended the Provincial Synod on November 9th, 1920.

DOMESTIC COMMITTEE.

All of the sub-committees did excellent work, each bending its energies towards some strategic point in its special field.

The Islands Committee worked with diligence and accomplished much through the organization of a weekly sewing-class during Lent, making garments for children in the Philippines; also raised sufficient money to keep open the little mission station at Bagnan, P. I.; to pay for an organ for St. Andrew's Chapel in Mayaguez, Porto Rico; gave a scholarship to the Iolani School, typewriters to the Virgin Islands and Santo Domingo, as well as \$500 towards an automobile for use in the latter place.

The Alaskan Committee has been able to contribute \$500 towards Archdeacon Stuck's Hospital (St. Stephen's) at Fort Yukon, this money being the result of a parlor meeting, and clothing was sent in answer to an appeal from Nenana.

Two parlor meetings in the interest of the Churchill Satterlee Memorial House, Columbia, S. C., and a Recital at Carnegie Hall were the means of raising \$2886.02 which was given through this special committee to the work started in his memory.

General Report of the Year's Work.

The Southern Highlanders' Committee is again working for the Helen Dunlop School, to which it sent \$900 in the spring, and for the completion of the endowment of a scholarship in Christ School, Arden, N. C.

There was a large overflow on the colored Pledge of \$1200 for the two schools, St. Paul's, Lawrenceville, Va., and St. Augustine's, Raleigh, N. C. and a generous response to the appeal for the Bishop Greer Memorial Scholarship in the Payne Divinity School.

The Indian Committee has not accomplished much as a committee, but has now been re-organized under a new Chairman.

FOREIGN COMMITTEE.

Although the Foreign Committee has been greatly handicapped during the past year by not having a permanent chairman, yet the sub-committees have continued their faithful labors and the work has been carried on.

For China \$1565 was raised for Bishop Roots' Union Normal School at Wuchang, and \$50 for the Rev. B. L. Ancell at Yang Chow.

The Japan Committee raised \$435 for the support of two Japanese students in Virginia; \$1580 for the Church at Hirosaki and \$1000 for the Rev. Mr. Goto's building fund. Also, through Mrs. Watson, \$100 for a Communion Service for the Rev. Mr. Andrews at Tokyo.

Through the Liberia Committee Miss Conway's Hospital received \$334 in money and \$316.47 for the purchase of drugs. Several scholarships were given and a box was sent to the Brierley School.

The Diocesan Pledge of \$2000 given this year to Brazil for the salary of the Rev. Mr. Morris, Dean of the Theological Seminary, was exceeded by \$140.90, while Bishop Kinsolving's appeal for baptismal bowls was answered most generously.

A Rummage Sale netting \$2500 was held for Bishop Hulse's School for boys at Mariano, Cuba. The Committee also gave \$35 to Haiti.

The Mexican Committee to appeals for the Hospital at Nopala had a response of \$482 and blankets valued at \$380.

The new committee on Panama was not behind the older ones in its gifts. Hearing of the difficulties in transportation in that country the members raised \$750 for a Ford car for the Bishop.

Four of the committees insure the lives of the bishops and others and all gave larger or smaller amounts too numerous to mention in this report, and also were active in holding parlor meetings. In several instances books were sent to the missionaries, which were deeply appreciated and receptions were given at the International Club of the Y.W.C.A. for Chinese and Japanese students.

General Report of the Year's Work.

EDUCATION.

In January, 1920, the educational work was organized under two officers, a Vice-President in charge of Religious Education and an Educational Secretary, and the new officers built upon the excellent foundation which the former Educational Secretary had laid.

The Nation-Wide Campaign gave great impetus to the work. New leaders were found and classes were unusually well attended, using "Neighbors", the text book of the year. Five Normal Classes were held in New York. Forty-eight branches reported taking part in forty study classes.

A literature table at the Diocesan meetings provided the latest leaflets, as well as special devotional and reference books.

Seven organizations of the Church in joint committee held a mass meeting at Synod Hall in the interests of Summer Conferences. The diocese of New York was more largely than ever before represented at the conferences at Princeton, Geneva and Wellesley. The Executive Board offered this year a scholarship at Princeton, and the recipient thereof is now giving her time to courses at St. Faith's School for Deaconesses and work in her own parish. The new year brings us the "General Survey" as our topic for study.

SOCIAL SERVICE.

The Social Service department being a new one in the Woman's Auxiliary, its first annual report must of necessity be of experimental undertakings.

The Vice-President in charge of this work is very much privileged in having been elected a member of the Social Service Commission of the Diocese.

The first effort was to collect from all diocesan organizations and institutions doing social work a list of their needs. Fifteen replied giving definite lists of supplies required and also requests for various kinds of volunteer help. Through our Supply Department the needs may now be placed on allotments. The call for volunteer helpers did not meet with the success for which we had hoped.

A series of "Open Days" at a few of the institutions were arranged for, and invitations given to members of the Auxiliary invited to visit them at these times.

It has been found there are three ways in which we may best help in this work:

- 1st. *Social Service in the Supply Department*: whereby supplies for these dependent ones who are close to us may be included in the allotments to parish branches along with those in the Mission field.
- 2nd. *Social Service in our Educational Department*: where information regarding community problems may be given through Study Classes and illustrated lectures.
- 3rd. *Social Service in our Finance Department*: in realizing the responsibility that our financial support is called for in the whole work of the Church not the missionary work alone.

SUPPLY DEPARTMENT.

This new Department has but little of real work to report as yet, its organization being but just completed. January 1st, 1921, the Department takes possession of its new headquarters at the Diocesan House, 416 Lafayette Street, where an office will be open every day in the week but Saturday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Buying on order for various parishes has already begun, and orders for purchasing materials and cutting garments may now be given through the District Supply Secretaries.

The total number of missionary boxes sent from the Diocese and now reported through this Department is 320 at a valuation of \$35,453.30. Details of these and money received for the supply work is given elsewhere in the Green Book.

Each of the five Districts through their Vice-Presidents in charge, show progress and much enthusiasm.

DISTRICT OF DUTCHESS.

The work of this our most northern district is most encouraging in that all branches were at work and that the money gifts exceeded those of 1919 by \$449 and the boxes were valued at \$900 more. The United Thank-Offering alone showed a small decrease.

A most satisfactory class on the "Survey" was held and all branches had accepted the new allotment plan.

DISTRICT OF NEW YORK.

As a direct result of the Nation-Wide Campaign the work in this District has been going forward and growing steadily, twenty-nine of the sixty-eight branches reporting increase in membership.

The annual meetings of the parishes in the Bronx and of the Evening Branches were well attended and enthusiastic, the latter adopting a

resolution that a special gift of money be raised to be divided between the Bishop Greer Memorial Fund for the Payne Divinity School and the work in China.

DISTRICT OF ORANGE.

The usual two All-Day Meetings were held at St. Paul's Church, Newburgh, May 19th, and at the Church of the Holy Cross, Kingston, October 30th, which were well attended. Two normal Study Classes on Americanization led by Mrs. Haff spread considerable interest, and neighborhood meetings were held in three of the Divisions where educational work was stressed, also the Nation-Wide Campaign and a fresh interest aroused in the Supply work.

The Scholarship of \$1000 in Christ School, Arden, N. C., in memory of Mrs. E. C. Rushmore is completed.

DISTRICT OF STATEN ISLAND.

Our smallest district in number of parishes makes a most excellent report of progressive and extensive work. As a practical result of a Study Class on "Neighbors" one parish branch raised \$200 and conducted a Vacation Bible School for five weeks in the Italian district, for which two hundred and twenty-five pupils were enrolled with a daily average attendance of one hundred. This branch also doubled its United Thank-Offering, the result of a personal house to house canvass of its treasurer.

Another parish is supporting at a cost of \$1200 a missionary in the Philippines and is also doing social service work.

DISTRICT OF WESTCHESTER.

The Westchester District aimed first to train the District to an intelligent understanding of and a readjustment to the new methods of Auxiliary work; secondly to bring the branches into a clearer knowledge of its special work for Liberia and the Navajo Indians.

Toward this end Neighborhood Meetings and Officers' Conferences were held throughout the District, and Social Service, Religious Education and Publicity for the Nation-Wide Campaign were added to the usual and long established work. It was to the Neighborhood Workroom at Rye that the first allotment from the Supply Department was given in any diocese.

At the Annual District Meeting held at St. Andrew's, Yonkers, May 20th, Bishop Lloyd announced that a temporary building was being erected at Balmah, the farthest inland station of the Cape Mount section in Africa, with money from the Schuyler Memorial Fund. Later, should this station prove satisfactory, the permanent Schuyler Memorial building will be placed there.

General Report of the Year's Work.

At this same meeting the parish branches represented pledged themselves to re-equip the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona.

Westchester, as well as all the other Districts, has appointed a District Secretary in charge of the Supply Department. The gifts of money for various objects from all Districts and sub-committees are recorded in the Treasurer's report and the tabulated statements.

At the closing of the year 1920, we are again called upon to mourn the death of our Bishop. A Minute showing our love and appreciation for Bishop Burch is printed elsewhere but we would speak here of the deep interest he always took in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, and his readiness at all times to give counsel and encouragement.

Earlier in the year, in the one month of March, three of our earliest and most devoted workers were called to the Higher Life and we would here record with appreciation and respect the names of Mrs. George Cabot Ward, for many years President of the Niobrara League, Miss Henrietta M. Schwab, Financial Secretary of the Foreign Committee, and Mrs. Vernon Mansfield Davis, Vice-Chairman of the Domestic Committee.

The United Thank Offering of 1922.

Resolution Adopted in Detroit, October 20, 1919.

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions, for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that one-tenth of the offering be set aside as a permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers,—also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ALSO RESOLVED: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.

The Junior Auxiliary and The Church School Service League

The past year has been a difficult one in the work of the Junior Auxiliary. Our big problem was to decide what action we, as a Diocese, should take on the adoption of the Church School Service League. This is the plan for work with young people suggested by the General Board of Religious Education. After much discussion and consultation with a committee appointed by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, we voted to urge the formation of a Church School Service League in the Diocese. We feel, however, that the Church School Service League does not at present take care of the boy and girl between the ages of seventeen and twenty-five. We recommend, therefore, that some provision be made for them such as is made by the Episcopal Young People's Association of the Diocese of Michigan or the Young People's Fellowship of the Diocese of California. This plan was discussed with Bishop Burch and met with his approval.

The Junior Auxiliary joined with other units of the Church Service League in a rally in the interests of the Church Summer Schools. The Juniors of New York were represented at the Summer Conferences at Princeton, at Geneva, and at Wellesley.

Our Junior Day at the Cathedral, with a Celebration of the Holy Communion, in November was well attended. Mr. John Wood spoke to us on Alaska, and Miss Withers to the Junior leaders and to members of the Church Normal School, on the subject of the Church School Service League. In the meanwhile the children were entertained downstairs by Miss Alice Gregg, one of our missionaries from China.

The Little Helpers report twenty-four units with two new ones just coming in. Letters were sent to all branches explaining the work, and offerings have been received from all but three.

The new plan of work has been presented to the Diocesan Board of Religious Education and they have passed a resolution giving it their approval and recommending it to the authorities of the Church Schools. Many dioceses have adopted the Church School Service League and it is our hope that we may here have every child in the Church working in the five-fold field of service as part of his religious education.

Constitution.

NEW YORK BRANCH WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL.

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912,
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETINGS,
MAY 8TH, 1913, JANUARY 6TH, 1920, AND
JANUARY 4TH, 1921.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are considered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who, in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the Missions of the Church may become by enrolment, actual members of the New York Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President and twelve Vice-Presidents, five in charge respectively of the districts of Dutchess, New York, Orange, Staten Island and Westchester, one in charge of the Junior Auxiliary, and five in charge, respectively, of the work of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Education, Social Service and the Supply Department, and one Vice-President at Large, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer and a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering; all of whom shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Association may appoint Honorary Officers at pleasure.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting, two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the proposed amendments, having been given at a previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I.—DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents.* The Vice-President at Large shall preside in the absence of the President and perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Executive Board, presenting a report of her work at the Annual Meeting.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting, a written report of the work in their respective Districts for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Education, Social Service and the Supply Department shall inform the Parish Branches through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers, of the needs and work in their respective departments. They shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 3. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall—

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 5. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of work and shall attend the meetings of the Association, reporting receipts and disbursements to the same.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer—United Thank Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Thank Offering, and under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 7. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 8. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association; shall fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of officers; and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 9. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE II.—PARISH DUES.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually to the Treasurer, for the current expenses of the Association, a specified sum of money to be known as Parish Dues. The amount of these dues shall be determined by the Association at the November meeting.

ARTICLE III.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The meetings of this Association shall be held monthly from November to May, inclusive, the January meeting being the Annual Meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four duly elected or appointed delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association, except the Annual Meeting, fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. At the Annual Meeting one hundred delegates from the Parish Branches shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 6. A meeting of the Executive Board shall precede each monthly meeting of the Association.

SEC. 7. The Vice-Presidents in consultation with other officers of the Association may arrange for special meetings in the Districts to arouse keener zeal and effort.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE V.—NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually by the President a Nominating Committee of seven members comprising at least one member from each District, which shall nominate at the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office of the Association, the District Vice-Presidents excepted.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts of Dutchess, New York, Orange, Staten Island, and Westchester shall be nominated at a representative meeting of their respective Districts. At such meeting, which shall take place not less than one month before the Diocesan Annual Meeting, each branch shall have one vote, a branch being a group of women working to help the Presiding Bishop and Council and contributing to the expense fund of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. Unless one-third of the branches are represented by delegates or proxies, there shall be no quorum. Should a District waive the right, the Vice-President shall be selected by the Nominating Committee.

SEC. 2. All the officers except the Treasurer for the United Offering and the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Auxiliary shall be elected by ballot of majority vote at the annual meeting and shall hold their office for one year or until the election of their successor.

SEC. 3. The President of the Junior Auxiliary as elected by that body is *ex-officio* the Vice-President of this Association in charge of that Department.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer for the United Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting in the same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. Her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

ARTICLE VIII.—AMENDMENT.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular or annual meeting by a two-thirds' majority vote, notice of proposed changes having been given at a previous meeting.

Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern all meetings.
