Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council Diocese of New York.

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General Report for the Year 1921.

A YEAR REPLETE WITH INTEREST.

In commemorating the date, October 16th, 1871, when the Church authorized her women to organize as a Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and that of the Centennial, November 6th, 1821, of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, New York is just about closing her own fifty years of service, for in November, 1872, she became a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary with the organization of the Niobrara League.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY.

A special Jubilee Service was held at the Cathedral on All Saints' Day, when the Bishop of the Diocese was Celebrant and Bishop Lloyd the preacher. Over six hundred women gathered for this Service and many former officers and charter members occupied seats reserved for them. New York's gift to the Fiftieth Anniversary or "Emery" Fund was offered on this occasion, a Fund the interest of which should be used for study, medical care and recreation of women missionaries home on furlough. One hundred and eighteen parishes contributed \$9,322.03, more than one-tenth of the total amount \$91,500., given by the whole Auxiliary. Another feature of this celebration and of interest is the Anniversary Book which was prepared, bound in white leather with the seal of the Diocese in gilt on the cover and containing beside a brief history of the New York Branch, an account of the "Emery Fund" with photographs of the three Misses Emery, the names of over four hundred former diocesan and parish officers and other, who are still carrying on the work and ten charter members. At the request of the Bishop this Book was delivered into his hands at the steps of the choir and was borne very reverently by him and laid upon the Altar, as a symbol of the service of the women of the Diocese.

ADVENT MEETING.

The following month, on December 6th, was held the Advent Meeting in the Cathedral and Synod Hall, the Bishop being the preacher in the morning and presiding officer in the afternoon. The two suffragans, Bishop Lloyd and Bishop Shipman, were also present and their words of encouragement and interest were a stimulus for our winter's work. The speakers from the field were Bishop Colmore of Porto Rico, the Rev. Dr. Reifsnyder of St. Paul's University, Tokyo, and Deaconess Scott, Principal of St. Hilda's School for girls, Wuchang, China. Never in the history of the New York Branch could we have recorded an Advent Meeting so large and inspiring.

General Report of the Year's Work.

ANNUAL MEETING.

On January 3rd, 1922, the year's work was closed with the Annual Meeting, when the new Board of Officers was elected. The new President we welcome with enthusiasm, knowing well her interested and energetic work in the past, though deeply regretting the resignation of our former presiding officer. An amendment to the Constitution made provision for two, instead of one, Vice-Presidents-at-Large. The personnel of the other vice-presidents was changed in three instances, those in charge of Domestic Work, and in the Districts of Staten Island and Westchester.

MONTHLY MEETINGS.

The regular monthly meetings were held as usual the first Tuesday of each month and at the Parish House of Zion and St. Timothy until the summer recess and for their hospitality we owe our grateful thanks to the Rector and Vestry of that parish, who have our deep sympathy in their later loss, of the church buildings by fire. By the Bishop's desire that all Church work in the Diocese should centre about the Cathedral, all meetings since October have been and will be held in Synod Hall.

DIOCESAN PLEDGES.

The Diocesan Pledges made in January, 1921, have been redeemed and over-subscribed; for Domestic Missions for Colored Work \$1,600. for St. Paul's School in Virginia and St. Augustine's in North Carolina, and \$1,250. for the maintenance of St. Stephen's Hospital at Fort Yukon, Alaska. For the Foreign field \$3,000. to be divided equally between St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, and St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, with an additional \$1,000. for Social Service for the National Council of Church Mission of Help and the Seamen's Church Institute of America.

The Domestic and Foreign Committees report great activity, the parishes in the five districts answering well to the appeals for the Diocesan Pledges, besides maintaining their parish pledges of long standing.

SUPPLY DEPARTMENT.

The gifts in Missionary Boxes through the Supply Department have during the past year increased in output in every District, nearly all parishes having accepted the new plan with enthusiasm. The Department has during the year filled 163 orders and cut 1124 garments, and the parish branches shipped five hundred and twenty-one personal and institutional boxes at a valuation of \$39,811.76.

DOMESTIC COMMITTEE.

These, of course, were largely, if not altogether for the Domestic field, but in addition to this and the redemption of Pledges the sub-committees of this branch of the work increased these gifts by raising nearly \$1,000. each for the Islands and the Southern Mountaineers. Alaska also received between \$500. and \$600. in scholarships and the Colored Committee through several drawing room meetings helped the work in South Carolina and Texas, while Panama was the recipient of money sufficient for a Ford automobile. The Indian Committee is still unfortunately unorganized for lack of a chairman but we rejoice in knowing that the mill-owners of Columbia, S. C. are doing so well by their employees that the Churchill Satterlee Memorial House Committee is practically, for the present at least, put out of business.

FOREIGN COMMITTEE.

The foreign sub-committees were active in holding receptions for the missionaries home on furlough, the Rev. Dr. Pott of St. John's University, Shanghai, and others, where interest was created in some cases resulting in large gifts to St. Luke's Hospital and a microscope for the Leper Colony in Japan. A warm response was made to an appeal for Mexico; the proceeds of a lecture paid for a scholarship in Brazil and an illustrated lecture given by Miss Ridgeley secured gifts for her work at Cape Mount, while the Liberian Committee also sent hospital supplies for St. Timothy's Hospital in the same place. The Cuba Committee showed much courage and faith in undertaking to raise one-half the amount needed for establishing a school for boys under Bishop Hulse and are to be congratulated on the prospect of their success. The Bishop considered this school the most important work to be undertaken in his district and outlined his plans at a meeting held at the home of the chairman of the Cuba Committee, in which he told of the great need of such a school in the life of the youth of Cuba.

SOCIAL SERVICE.

The Social Service Department being no longer an experiment but an established fact as shown in the report of forty-nine parishes contributing \$721.75 to the Seamen's Church Institute of America and fifty-two contributing \$639.00 to the National Council Church Mission of Help, indicated that the \$1,000 pledge was overpaid. Forty-one boxes for all social service purposes, valued at \$2,768.36 and a goodly number of responses to an appeal for personal service under the City Mission

Society are also encouraging. The accomplishment during the past year of the co-operation of this department with that on Education in arranging for a class of leaders in the new text-book "The Social Opportunity of the Churchman" is indeed a step forward and to which we are looking for great results.

EDUCATION.

This latter Department, the Educational, has perhaps made greater strides than any other this year, especially is this true of the educational work in the District of Dutchess and Orange, where the plans of the Committee have been adapted to the needs of the outlying parishes, proving the possibility of education even in the smallest and weakest branches. The other three Districts have carried on their work as usual. There were six Normal Classes and twelve Institutes for Training Parish Officers, forty-eight Discussion Classes reaching ninety-five parishes, while one hundred and eleven parishes reported educational work of some kind. Two diocesan scholarships for the Princeton Summer Conference were given by the Executive Board and both delegates who enjoyed the opportunity are now rendering valuable service in the Diocese. The Vice-President in Charge attended the Conferences at Wellesley and Silver Bay and led a Study Class at the former on "The General Survey." She was a member of a Provincial Committee which prepared a co-ordinated educational programme. This was adopted by the Second Province and later by the Presiding Bishop and Council for the entire Church. The Normal Class for the Social Service leaders for the coming year, mentioned above, is an outcome of this plan. The culminating point of last year's work was a class led by Miss Boyer, Assistant Educational Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, on Dr. Jefferys' book "How can We Know the Way?"

BULLETIN.

The publication of the Bulletin, just closing its seventh year, is continued with an ever increasing circulation, which has now reached an average of eighteen hundred copies monthly, during the working season. The far-reaching influence of this little pamphlet throughout the Diocese can scarcely be estimated and only judged by the great demand.

DISTRICT COMMITTEES.

The five Districts report encouragingly, Dutchess of increased contributions to the Diocesan Pledges and its own District Pledge over-subscribed; Orange of an attendance at a District Meeting more than double that of previous years and the establishment of a Lending

Library which is already largely patronized: Staten Island has had a busy and successful year's work, notwithstanding the changes in leadership, sending large and valuable missionary boxes and preparing for Study Classes for this coming Lenten Season. The special effort of the New York District has been to further the interests and co-operation of the Evening Branches, three general meetings having been held with a large attendance with a special Study Class formed at their request. Institutes for Training of Parish Officers were held for both Morning and Evening Branches, as reported by the Educational Vice-President. Westchester has overpaid its Pledges, organized its first school branch at Castle School, Tarrytown, its first Evening branch at St. Andrew's, Yonkers and worked 100% on Christmas boxes. The one hundred and seventy-nine officers, representing thirty-eight parishes, which attended Officers' Institutes should be commended.

QUIET DAY.

It remains for us now but to mention the two branches of our work which bring us into a higher realm, the Quiet Day and the United Thank Offering.

The National Committee of the Church Service League had planned to set apart a day early in Advent, 1920, for a Quiet Day, but it seemed wiser in view of our Woman's Auxiliary Advent Meeting to postpone it until the Lenten Season, when it would fill the place of the usual Auxiliary Quiet Day. It was therefore held on Wednesday, March 9th, at Grace Church, New York, for all Churchwomen in the Diocese. It was conducted by the Rev. Ralph B. Pomeroy of the General Theological Seminary and was preceded by an evening Service of Prayer and Penitence on Tuesday, March 8th, to give an opportunity to many unable to attend during the day and as a preparation for the following day for those who could avail themselves of both Services. It was truly a day of rest and inspiration, when we felt we were indeed accepting our Saviour's call to His disciples, "Come ye yourselves apart and rest awhile."

UNITED THANK OFFERING.

The United Thank Offering, which is over and above any other we may be called upon to make for Missions, is the opportunity the Auxiliary has given us to pour out our hearts in material form in gratitude for all our blessings and especially for the privilege of being permitted to work with the Christ for the extension of His Kingdom. The amount received to date to be offered next October at the Triennial Service of the Woman's Auxiliary in Portland,

Oregon, is \$24,230.84, as against \$19,172.11, the amount on hand at the same period in the last Triennial. There are but nine months before the closing of this Offering of 1922. Shall we double our gift of \$46,222.75 of 1919?

Before closing this report we would mention with gratitude for their services those who have during this year resigned from the Executive Board. Mrs. R. W. B. Elliott, who has been a true leader, carrying us through all discouragements by keeping before us the high ideal of service, which has helped us in every department. Miss Grace Scoville for years successively Vice-President for District of New York, Secretary and Vice-President-at-Large, felt her term of service sufficiently long to call for her retirement. Mrs. George Zabriskie, one time Vice-President in Charge of Foreign Work and then Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, whose family duties were of paramount importance; the Vice-President in Charge of Domestic Work, Mrs. Arthur R. Gray, Miss Juliet P. Nourse, Assistant Secretary and the Staten Island District Vice-President, Mrs. Henry F. Clark, all these leave us much to emulate in their example of faithfulness and zeal.

United Thank Offering of 1922.

Resolution Adopted in Detroit, October 20, 1919.

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1922 be given to the Board of Missions or any organization which has succeeded, or may hereafter succeed to its functions, for women's work in the mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers and the care of such workers when sick or disabled—provided that one-tenth of the offering be set aside as a permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Board of Missions, or any organization which has succeeded or may hereafter succeed to its functions, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers,—also provided that the sum of not less than \$10,000 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the President of the Board of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ALSO RESOLVED: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the mission field.

Junior Auxiliary and Church School Service League.

REPORT FOR 1921.

Although we have not been able to put into effect completely, the new plan of work called the Church School Service League, yet the Junior Auxiliary branches are active and the outlook is brighter than it was at this time last year.

We have raised \$3,103. thus more than completing our pledge, which is \$3,000 for St. Mary's School, Shanghai. This big increase (\$1,698) over the amount raised last year is largely due to the devotion and efficiency of our treasurer Miss Cozzens, but is also an indication of increased interest among the branches. Several new branches of the Junior Auxiliary and some of the C.S.S.L. have been formed. On the other hand some once active ones have lapsed from lack of leadership. There is a splendid branch at Tuxedo, and Mrs. Leigh, Vice-President of that district has done much to bring the work to the notice of the clergy in it.

Five members of the Junior Board attended Summer Conferences, Miss McJilton as an instructor. The President and Vice-President represented the Diocese of New York at an informal conference at the Provincial Synod at Garden City.

In an effort to reach the country districts, we held a neighborhood meeting at the Church of the Messiah, Rhinebeck. This was well attended. Five Clergy were present. The children of the C.S.S.L. at Rhinebeck showed by a little play how the C.S.S.L. was working there, and then there was a general discussion of the plan with Deaconess West.

In November there were nearly three hundred children present at our Annual Cathedral Meeting. The Bishop was the speaker and the Dean, the celebrant. We invited the Candidates of the G.F.S. to this Service. One branch responded and we hope more will do so next year.

Our efforts to form a diocesan organization of the C.S.S.L. under the Diocesan Board of Religious Education have not so far been successful. The president of the Junior Auxiliary presented the plan of the C.S.S.L. to the Board at their request and a member of the Board, the Rev. Wm. H. Owen, was appointed to inquire into the plan further and confer with the heads of other diocesan organizations working with young people. This has been done but no definite action toward the formation of the League has been taken. This prevents very much forward action. It is possible however, for each branch of the Junior Auxiliary to work in the five fields of service at some time each year and so conform as far as possible to the plan of the Church School Service League.

The keen and practical interest which the Bishop has taken in our work has been the greatest possible help, and we are most grateful to him.

Constitution.

NEW YORK BRANCH WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL.

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912,
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETINGS,
MAY 8TH, 1913, JANUARY 6TH, 1920, JANU-
ARY 4TH, 1921 AND JANUARY 3RD, 1922.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are considered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who, in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the Missions of the Church may become by enrolment, actual members of the New York Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President and thirteen Vice-Presidents, five in charge respectively of the districts of Dutchess, New York, Orange, Staten Island and Westchester, one in charge of the Junior Auxiliary, and five in charge, respectively, of the work of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Education, Social Service and the Supply Department, and two Vice-Presidents at Large, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, a Treasurer and a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering; all of whom shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Association may appoint Honorary Officers at pleasure.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting, two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the proposed amendments, having been given at a previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I.—DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents.* A Vice-President at Large shall preside in the absence of the President, and the Vice-Presidents shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Executive Board, presenting a report of their work at the Annual Meeting.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting a written report of the work in their respective Districts for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Education, Social Service and the Supply Department shall inform the Parish Branches through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers, of the needs and work in their respective departments. They shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 3. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall—

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 5. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of work and shall attend the meetings of the Association, reporting receipts and disbursements to the same.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer—United Thank Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Thank Offering, and under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 7. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 8. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association; shall fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of officers; and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 9. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE II.—PARISH DUES.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually to the Treasurer, for the current expenses of the Association, a specified sum of money to be known as Parish Dues. The amount of these dues shall be determined by the Association at the November meeting.

ARTICLE III.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

SECTION 1. The meetings of this Association shall be held monthly from November to May, inclusive, the January meeting being the Annual Meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four duly elected or appointed delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association, except the Annual Meeting, fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. At the Annual Meeting one hundred delegates from the Parish Branches shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 6. A meeting of the Executive Board shall precede each monthly meeting of the Association.

SEC. 7. The Vice-Presidents in consultation with other officers of the Association may arrange for special meetings in the Districts to arouse keener zeal and effort.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE V.—NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually by the President a Nominating Committee of seven members comprising at least one member from each District, which shall nominate at the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office of the Association, the District Vice-Presidents excepted.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts of Dutchess, New York, Orange, Staten Island, and Westchester shall be nominated at a representative meeting of their respective Districts. At such meeting, which shall take place not less than one month before the Diocesan Annual Meeting, each branch shall have one vote, a branch being a group of women working to help the Presiding Bishop and Council and contributing to the expense fund of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. Unless one-third of the branches are represented by delegates or proxies, there shall be no quorum. Should a District waive the right, the Vice-President shall be selected by the Nominating Committee.

SEC. 2. All the officers except the Treasurer for the United Offering and the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Auxiliary shall be elected by ballot of majority vote at the annual meeting and shall hold their office for one year or until the election of their successor.

SEC. 3. The President of the Junior Auxiliary as elected by that body is *ex-officio* the Vice-President of this Association in charge of that work.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer for the United Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting in the same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

- (12) Adjournment.

ARTICLE VIII.—AMENDMENT.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular or annual meeting by a two-thirds' majority vote, notice of proposed changes having been given at a previous meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

Roberts' Revised Rules of Order shall govern all meetings.
