ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

Annual Meeting, May 5, 1925

This closing year of our Triennial is always one of redoubled endeavor, even without the special efforts made of late for Japan Reconstruction. Moreover, this has been our year of Officers' Conferences. Just now, as we look forward to New Orleans, a particular problem confronts us. Are we in any way responsible for the Church's failure to meet the Program adopted at Portland? Has the Woman's Auxiliary no influence in the Church? In our own diocese is the actual amount that we contribute to Budget and Priorities all that we can do for the Program about which our diocese seems so apathetic? Everyone here has a prompt answer to that question,—the Auxiliary's educational work, the discussion groups, the speakers, the information spread, the earnest prayers offered,—all this must be of immeasurable help.

Do we not all agree that the help we have rendered in the past has proved so ineffective that we begin to realize it has been a case of treating symptoms rather than seeking out and curing the deep-seated cause? Fortunately our little company of women is not left to do this work itself, but upon us, as upon no others, rests a heavy burden, and before us opens a glowing vista of opportunity through the Message. The Auxiliary which exists to help in the "whole work of the whole Church," may, in deepest reverence, remember that it was the women who rose up early to seek the sepulchre and minister to the body of their Lord, who, because they came to minister, first perceived the world-compelling truth of His triumph over Death.

Perhaps the women who try so hard now to minister to His Body may be vouchsafed some clear conviction of what it is which must give that Body real triumph over failure. At least, we, who are a part of His Body, can look to ourselves. Realizing the inspiration and power to be gained at Summer Conferences, the Diocesan Executive Board aims to have a large number of women and girls of this diocese attend some one of them.

By deeper comprehension of the gospel story, we may approach nearer to knowing Him. By a more spontaneous effort to follow Him and to interpret Him to our fellows, we may grasp the great fundamentals, difficult to apprehend, amid the multiplicity of external machinery which seems to have so little connection with the realities of religion, with the "Blessed steps of His most Holy Life." At least

there is this to cling to,—that if we do not follow His footsteps, nor live and work as He did, yet we may aspire to work by His Spirit in the fellowship of love and abounding in joy.

As we think of presenting this autumn our United Thank Offering, we remember with great joy that the increasing knowledge of that Offering bears testimony to the devoted labors of the treasurer, Mrs. Miller. While we can but grieve that she refuses to consider renomination to the office which she has so ably filled, yet we rejoice for the privilege of the years of fellowship with her and the many lessons learned from her.

Other resignations recorded with regret, but in gratitude for the years of work together, are those of Mrs. Clifton Macon, who moved from the diocese in October; of Mrs. Wheaton, who resigned as Vice-President in Charge of Domestic Work; of Miss Violetta Jackson, whose work among young people has been close to the Auxiliary's heart (so far no successor has been appointed). We are glad to welcome to our Board Mrs. Charles H. Tuttle, who is in charge of the Junior Auxiliary and the Church School Service League.

It is with a sense of special personal loss that I announce Miss Murchison's refusal of renomination. The bond between the President and the Vice-President-at-Large is a personal as well as an official one, and Miss Murchison has done more than any spoken words or printed records can testify, to fill in the many gaps caused by the President's limitations. It is not only the great amount of hard and efficient work which she has done, but the way that she has done it. Her gracious spirit and unfailing cheer have been like "the precious ointment which filled all the house with the sweetness of its savor."

In addition to all her other work, Miss Murchison has represented the Executive Board in our newest effort for Japan, the part which the Auxiliary of this diocese took in the Provincial Plan for the Building Fund for St. Margaret's School, Tokyo. The Auxiliary's sincere thanks and deep appreciation are due to Miss Muriel W. Ashwell, who has had this Gold, Silver and Jewelry Offering in charge; to Mrs. Norman F. Lovett, her devoted assistant; to Canon Nelson for the use of Diocesan House; to the silver and jewelry experts who gave most important services and to all who have spent themselves unselfishly in this plan which has entailed great labor and effort. We would express special thanks to Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast, chairman of the Foreign Committee of the Pennsylvania Auxiliary, originator of the Gold, Silver and Jewelry Offering for St. Margaret's, for her advice and inspiration.

President's Annual Report.

From the many duties in her own diocese and other parts of the Church, she has given the time to make three trips to New York.

The sale was held on April 21st, 22nd and 23rd, through the courtesy of the Oceanic Investing Company, at 547 Fifth Avenue, Dr. Teusler and Dr. John W. Wood coming to open it. Dr. Teusler's account of Miss Heywood, the head mistress whose remarkable spirit he had seen during the world war when she ran a typhus camp in Siberia, made us prouder than ever to be co-workers with her. The proceeds of this sale finally amounted to \$11,808.19.

For our own particular effort for Japan, the Delafield Memorial, I am happy to report that the Committee has already in hand some \$17,000, and it is hoped that this amount will be added to rapidly, as there is need of haste in the constructing of Holy Trinity Church, Tokyo.

A crowning cause for rejoicing is that the Woman's Auxiliary Special, Bishop Tuttle Memorial, Church Houses for Women Workers, the particular undertaking of this Triennium, has made such encouraging strides as you have just heard reported by our devoted representative, Mrs. Hyde.

Whatever our discouragements may be, however, laborious and painful the probing into their fundamental cause, there is always this to remember,—that it is our perpetual duty to rejoice and give thanks and try to make our hearts a fit dwelling place for Him who came because God so loved the World.

The Advent Meeting was held Tuesday, December the second, Bishop Manning was the Celebrant at the Communion Service and Acting Dean Prichard preached the sermon.

There were seven hundred and fifty women in the congregation, nearly all of whom went to the luncheon in Synod Hall, in the Undercroft.

The Missionary Meeting after the luncheon was extraordinarily well attended. All the districts sent large delegations and there were many visitors from other dioceses. The speakers were Miss Grace Lindley, Dr. Rudolph Tuesler of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio; and Bishop Thomas of Wyoming. The members of the Auxiliary were deeply impressed by the messages from the various fields of service.

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The Quiet Morning was held in the Church of the Incarnation, Thursday, March 12th. The service began with the Celebration of the Holy Communion and the Meditations were conducted by Dr. H. Percy Silver. It was an especially helpful Quiet Morning. Many members of the Auxiliary were present and all felt very grateful to Dr. Silver for his inspiring addresses.

DOMESTIC COMMITTEE

The Domestic Committee decided last Autumn to hold its meeting once in two months, and it has met four times, in November, January, March and April, with a speaker at each meeting. In November Bishop Colmore told us of the development of the work in Porto Rico and the Virgin Islands, a work, however, seriously hampered by lack of funds and sufficient priests.

In January, the Rev. Edward A. Sibley, from Bontoc, Philippine Islands, told us of his life among the Igorots, of his school and of the need of scholarships for boys. In March the Committee again this year were generously invited to meet at the home of Mrs. Robert W. B. Elliott, on the afternoon following the Quiet Morning. There was a good attendance. Mrs. Thorne was so good as to be the speaker, "On Present Methods in the Various Departments of the Auxiliary."

Archdeacon Claiborne in April told us of the need in the Church, of a ministry interested and trained for rural parishes, and of the aim of the DuBose Training School at Monteagle, Tenn., to fill this great want.

In November, 1924, the Panama Sub-Committee sent to Bishop Morris \$300 for the Children's Home in Ancon, and in March \$200 additional was given by Mrs. Richard Colt and a friend, through the Committee, as the result of a visit to Ancon and in recognition of the work of the Children's Home.

The Sub-Committee on Indian Work has held a meeting monthly since October, 1924. A pledge of \$1,000 towards Priority No. 107

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was completed in December and \$843 is in hand for the 1925 pledge, Priority 612, the erection of a small Church at Moapa, Nevada.

Two hundred dollars was sent in December on an emergency call from the Diocese of Sacramento for the Indian work at Orleans, to pay the traveling expenses and two months salary of the new U. O. Worker there.

A memorial for a former Secretary of the Indian Committee, Miss Byrd, was sent in February to Christ Church, Crow Creek Mission, South Dakota, consisting of a Chalice, Patern, 2 small glass flagons, a Missal and Prayer Book for the Altar.

An entertainment and sale was held in March at the Church League Club at which Mr. Alanson Skinner of the Heye Foundation spoke on "Symbols in Indian Art."

The Sub-Committee for Colored Work has given half of the \$250 (special) for the Normal and Industrial School of St. Philips, San Antonio, Texas; the other half being given by a member of the Executive Board.

The Islands' Sub-Committee gave Bishop Colemore \$40 for a portable organ to be sent to a little mission near Ponce, Porto Rico, also \$100 has been sent to the Church in Bontoc, Philippine Islands, and \$50 for a scholarship for an Igorot boy for which Father Sibley asked and to the Iolani School, Honolulu, \$75.

In addition the Domestic Committee as a whole voted to send one-half of the interest of the Eliza Seymour Perkins fund amounting to \$383.03 to the building of the Church of Holy Trinity, Ponce, Porto Rico, the other half going to the Indian Church fund at Moapa. The Continental U. S. Sub-Committee held a sale of cake and candy at the home of the Chairman, Mrs. Edward Buckhout for the benefit of Priority 332.

\$130 was made toward the Parish House, at Torrington, Wyoming.

It is a matter of keen regret that the Alaska Sub-Committee has had no chairman this season and has not felt able to carry out any plan of work.

FOREIGN COMMITTEE

Seven meetings have been held at the Parish House of St. Thomas' Church from October to May.

Speakers from all branches of the field have made addresses at each of the regular meetings: Miss Nellie McKim, on the Kindergar-

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tens of Japan; Mrs. Charles H. Boynton, on her trip to the Hooker School in Mexico; Mr. John Ely, Dean of St. John's College, China; Miss Lucy Kent, on Industrial China and the Anking Cross Stitch; Dr. John W. Wood, on general conditions in the Foreign Field; and Deaconess Elizabeth Fueller who showed some very attractive and interesting lantern slides of Mission work in China and told of the remarkable progress of the last ten years.

Besides these regular meetings, several special ones have been held. One at the residence of Mrs. Thomas Ewing, on Monday, February the second, was in the interest of the House of Bethany, Liberia, with addresses by Father Huntington and Father Hawkins of the Order of the Holy Cross. Mrs. J. N. Blanchard of the Brazil Sub-Committee gave a tea on December 5th for Mr. Albert Robert from the Diocese of Pittsburgh, who was to start at once for Brazil.

Mrs. S. A. Arnold who so long served the Foreign Committee as Secretary was obliged to resign on account of other pressing work. The gratitude of the whole Committee for her efficient service was keenly felt and so expressed at the first meeting in the fall. Mrs. J. Breckenridge Gibson was appointed to take her place.

Mrs. Francis Landon, long a member of the Japan Sub-Committee, was called to her last home this winter, and her loss is a great one in the field of mission work in which she was so much interested.

The Japan Sub-Committee has sent two boxes for Mr. Goto's Kindergarten for his Christmas celebration, containing candy, knitted articles and dolls, numbering altogether 659 articles. For a special student at St. Paul's, Tokio, \$250.00 was raised. The Committee will send \$200.00 for the Delafield Memorial Church in Tokio.

The China Sub-Committee has been working for St. Saviour's Church and land at Wuchang, and Priority Number 391 is completed. The first church settlement house in China, called the House of the Merciful Saviour, is being started and the value of this social service work cannot be overestimated. The committee is now raising money for Miss Stedman's work there.

The Mexican Sub-Committee has been handicapped by the continued illness of the Chairman. Several new members have been added during the year and general progress continues for the Hooker School. Great need is felt in Mexico for leaders.

Liberia has met with a distinct loss in the return to this country of the Reverend Mr. Haines who went out with such promise. His wife, formerly Miss Gordon, was ill and future residence in that climate was found to be impossible. Bishop Overs indorses the raising of

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\$10,000 for the girls' school connected with the House of Bethany at Cape Mount as a thank offering to Miss Ridgeley who has given more than thirty years of heroic work in Liberia. This is under Priority Number 400.

Money is still coming in for Number 295, the Ramsaur Memorial.

The committee has sent two boxes of drugs to the hospital at Cape Mount. A very interesting farewell service was held on January 30th at the Church Missions House for Miss Mackenzie. Fifty dollars was sent out for the care of an orphan.

The Cuba Sub-Committee has sent much needed altar linen to Mr. McCarthy, and over three hundred dollars was sent to Bishop Hulse to help with all the illness caused by the severe winter.

The young girls of the Haiti Sub-Committee are trying to raise \$25,000 for Bishop Carson's work.

The Brazil Sub-Committee under its new chairman, Mrs. William McLaren, is working for the hospital at Porto Alegre, which it is hoped in two years will be self-supporting. Thirty nurses were graduated last June and six sent north for post-graduate courses.

Gifts of \$600 have been received for this work and \$5,000 is now on hand.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

In October, 1924, the Education Department sustained the loss of its head, Mrs. Macon, because of her removal from New York. She had planned and started the work which has been carried on by the Secretary of the Department.

The work began in September and continued till June, the discussion group or study class method being generally adopted. "China's Real Revolution," by Paul Hutchinson, has been the widely used textbook and has insured in every group interest and live discussion.

In all, 2,428 persons were reached by the 120 study units, 92 of these being study classes. Several met in the evening and were composed of men and women. Twenty-two leaders received appointments from the committee, 2 Rectors led their own classes, and in several places sessions were led by branch members.

Mr. Gardiner M. Day, a student in Union Theological Seminary, Mr. Lincoln of St. John's University, Shanghai, and Mr. Hu, a Chinese

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studying for the ministry of our Church also led for us. A Normal class for all leaders in the Diocese was held in New York. *Total—1 unit; 3 Sessions; 19 Enrolled.*

The District Educational Secretaries report as follows:

DUTCHESS

Miss Helen Webb reports 5 Intensive Days, 3 one session groups, 6 study classes, 2 reading groups, 1 Lecture Course. A new venture, very successful, was a "Circuit" of five Intensive Days in different towns, led by Miss Prophet. *Total—17 units.*

NEW YORK CITY

One Intensive Day, 23 Study Classes, 1 Monthly Missionary Evening, 6 Reading Groups, 5 Lectures, 1 Playlet on China (ten of these were in the Evening Branches). *Total—37 units.*

ORANGE

Mrs. Louis G. Hoffman reports 2 District Classes, 5 other Intensive Days, 1 Method Class, 8 Study Classes, 2 Monthly Programs,, 4 Lectures, 1 Three-Day Week End Conference with an enrollment of 65 and a leader developed who has ably led a class in Lent. *Total—25 units.*

STATEN ISLAND

Mrs. Mason Smith reports 1 District Class, 4 Study Classes, 2 Lectures, 1 Reading Group, 1 Playlet on China. *Total—9 units.*

WESTCHESTER

Miss Helen Elting reports 2 District Classes, 9 Intensive Days, 20 Study Classes. There were 8 leaders, two new; and two new parish classes; 8 classes had over 30 enrolled; 2 were Evening Branches. *Total—31 units.*

The Speakers' Committee, Miss Florence M. Sill, Chairman, with a membership of 32, has continued effectively to supply speakers, and

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serves as a stimulus to further study. Miss Sill reports: "From November to May, 23 appointment have been filled by 17 members of the Committee. The subjects requested by the parish branches applying for a speaker were: Duty to the Whole Work of the Whole Church 1; China 6; Japan 3; Mexico, Hooker School 1; Brazil 1; Southern Mountaineers 1; Indian Work 1; Bishop Tuttle Memorial 2; Supplies 3; Social Service 1; United Thank Offering 1; The Church at Work Around the World 1; How to build up membership in a parish branch 1.

The Secretary of the Education Committee has attended to the general correspondence, kept the literature table for the sale of books at the Diocesan meetings, attended several district meetings and committee meetings, and in addition has led 33 study classes, having 130 sessions, (these include the 3-day Week-End Conference and the 5-day Circuit).

What is the real meaning of the 120 units and 23 addresses, and hundreds of letters and many telephone and other appointments made and kept? Let us test them by the three questions the Chinese Students are asking.

"What is this?" May each leader be able to answer, "Our Mission Study Class has proved beyond a doubt to be a dynamo of genuine devotion."

"Why is this?" "To build up an intelligent Christian group to pray and work, give and go and sacrifice to carry out the Church's program."

"What value has it for today?" "For the individual whose duty is at home it opens a way to obey our Lord's command, 'Go ye into all the world.' For the parish it develops a group who understands and wants to meet the Budget."

Due to the cooperation and devoted service of the District Educational Secretaries and other leaders in each District, and especially to the Intercessors, those true workers, unnamed, uncounted, and unknown save to those whose hands they have so faithfully held up, this report is possible, and is presented for them and in their names, by

SOCIAL SERVICE

In presenting this our fifth annual report of work in our Social Service Department, it is encouraging to be able to record a definite

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linking up of our endeavor with a much needed social project otherwise unprovided for in this Diocese. We can also report a very marked increase in the support given to this project.

Our chief concern has been our social service pledge; in 1924 \$2,000 for work at Ellis Island. This was not only paid in full but growing interest warranted our decision to increase the amount in 1925.

From time to time we have learned that our support made possible both care for emigrants arriving at Ellis Island and follow up work which connected them with both Church and social organizations at their final destinations in America. The work is done through the City Mission Society and increasing contact with the workers and a more definite understanding of the work accounts for our greater success in gaining the necessary support. That we have the privilege of associating ourselves with such a vital piece of work, international in its scope is a cause for great thankfulness.

We are particularly indebted to Rev. L. E. Sunderland, Supt. of City Mission Society, and to various members of his staff for addresses given at Auxiliary meetings. Your Vice-President was only able to accept a few of the invitations which came to her to attend branch and district meetings, the necessity of declining so many of these opportunities was a cause of real regret. Work as your representative in this department connects the Auxiliary of the Diocese with various committees and boards, the most important of which is the Social Service Commission whose members are appointed by the Diocesan Convention. In June, 1924, the New York Auxiliary was one of eight Diocesan Auxiliaries taking part in the National Conference of Social Work under the Department of Christian Social Service.

Although the supply work for our Diocesan Institutions is fully reported in the Supply Department, no account of the year's work for social service can be made by me, without reference to the increasing interest of our branches in providing garments and furnishings for various agencies of the Church in and near New York. Much of this is chosen by members as summer work and it is a very real contribution to the needs of those of our own community.

Thinking of this brief review of our work in 1924, in comparison with our groping for a plan five years ago, we see a real cause for thankfulness for the direction our work has taken and we trust all our members will find stimulation to go forward.

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SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

In reviewing the winter's work we can all feel that the responsibility toward our allotment has been very keen, and furthermore, that the interest in filling extra demands shows a lively understanding of our opportunities in the work. The Personal Boxes were filled with zest, and with a few exceptions, shipped before Christmas. They were 60 in number, 6 Indian, 12 Colored, and 42 White. In addition there were twelve catechists suits and underwear, and 63 Christmas Gift Boxes. The Institutional Allotment was large, and in many ways difficult to handle, but we reach the spring with the knowledge that it is nearly completed. The five schools provided for were: Julia Emery Hall, Monrovia, Liberia; Good Shepherd Mission School, Fort Hall, Idaho; St. Christopher's Normal School, Columbus, Georgia; Blue Ridge Industrial School, Dyke, Virginia; Iolani Boys' School, Honolulu, T. H.

The fourteen missions were as widely scattered as the schools:

St. Andrew's Mission, Keokee, Va.

Mission of Our Saviour, Bendu, Liberia.

Christ Church, Anvik, Alaska.

St. Mary's Home, Honolulu, T. H.

Cluett House, Honolulu, T. H.

Calvary and Associate Missions, Charleston, S. C.

St. Mary's Mission, Hot Springs, Ark.

Chapel of the Good Shepherd, Abington, Va.

Middle River Mission, Fletcher, Va.

Trinity House, Richlands, Va.

St. Raphael's Mission, Monterey, Tenn.

House of the Holy Child, Manila, P. I.

Holy Trinity Mission, Glendale Springs, N. C.

St. Mary's on the Mt. (very small part), Sewanee, Tenn.

The most important part of the work, however, was the providing of supplies for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo. The responsibility was very real, as our diocese was given the entire allotment. All the five districts took part, and showed great interest in this special opportunity of doing something for Japan in the long interval between the earthquake and our rebuilding. To fill this allotment in the best way, the buying was centralized to an extent not hitherto done, and the results were excellent. The Supply Department buyer, Mrs. Clark Mellon, put a great deal of effort into finding out where to buy to the greatest advantage, and the large cases sent the Church Missions House saved effort usually required to list and pack small donations. The interest in this work was so generous, and the buying so well done,

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that we increased our allotment by 710 sheets, 306 hand towels, and other things, in our desire to aid Dr. Teusler replace the supplies destroyed in the fire of the winter.

This was one of the extra gifts which shows our appreciation of special opportunities, also a number of times made clear in the interest taken to meet the special needs announced at the Synod Hall meetings. Much individual work was put into the sending of suitable overcoats, suits and other articles to those asking for good used clothing.

On the other hand, the good we can do with second-hand clothing is still very inadequately met. The development of this branch of the work, and the increase of the Social Service summer work, are two parts where advances can be made.

A number of Altar Guilds have helped us this winter. Some have reported work on new supplies, through others used stoles, vestments and altar supplies, have been sent to several missions.

The Girls Friendly Society has been working on layettes, asking for them almost more rapidly than the workroom could provide them.

In the workroom there has been continuous and earnest work. The expenses have been much less than usual, which means that among the volunteers there are trained workers who came steadily and mastered the endless detail required in that work.

When we begin to speak of workers, we think first of all of the never flagging energy of the Chairman of Allotment, Mrs. Orr; then of the continuous detailed work of the District Supply Secretaries, and of the planning and sewing and shipping of the hundreds who finish the work. Moreover, outside our own department we have received not only encouragement, but very active help from our Diocesan President, and the District Vice-Presidents.

Among our leaders there has been one very sad loss. The death of Miss Helen M. Moore, for years District Supply Secretary of Dutchess, has deprived us of her steady understanding work in her district, and her vigorous help in the Department.

In closing the report, I want to add that I feel sure the interests of all of us have been broadened by our being able to do this personal work for the great missions of our Church.

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DUTCHESS

The Annual Meeting and Corporate Communion of the District of Dutchess was held last year at St. James Church, Hyde Park. With a large and interested attendance Bishop Lloyd gave us a message full of inspiration, striking a note that was followed in the addresses of the afternoon speakers. The offertory, the largest we have ever had, went to the Delafield Memorial.

Dutchess began the working year with an educational circuit, conducted by Miss Prophet, lasting five days, and reaching parishes where heretofore no educational work had been done and in some cases where there is not yet a branch of the Auxiliary. There was no Officers' Institute but two Officers' Conferences were held instead, which proved interesting and useful.

The reports of the Supply and Educational Vice-Presidents show the excellent record of the District, and Mrs. Ewing's books bear testimony to the fact that all pledges have been met.

Last January Dutchess had the great sorrow of losing her Supply Secretary, Miss Helen Moore. In token of affection for both her and Mrs. Garrison, who died a year ago, the District is raising a Memorial, which will probably take the form of a stone in the Cathedral and a Cross and Vases for the little Chapel in the new Training School for Church Workers to be built in Raleigh, N. C.

I am glad to be able to announce that Miss Florence Titus of Hyde Park will take Miss Moore's place as Supply Secretary.

Six parishes took part in the gold, silver and jewel offering.

NEW YORK

Four Officers' Institutes held in the early fall in the different parts of the District began our year. These were conducted by our President and were a great inspiration and help and have had an influence on all the work of the year.

There have been two general meetings of the Evening Branches in addition to the Institute and two neighborhood meetings. One new Branch has been formed at St. Luke's Chapel. Mrs. Sperry was presented as Vice-President-in-Charge of Evening Branches at the February meeting and warmly welcomed by them.

All of the Branches have shown a splendid spirit of co-operation. There is every reason to feel encouraged about the progress of the work.

ORANGE

The Annual Meeting was held at St. George's Church, in Newburgh, each of the Newburgh parishes having now the record of about 200 in attendance, when entertaining the Annual District Meeting. The reports of parish and District Officers showed Orange, on the whole, to be "marching on." Miss Wood of Wuchang, held close attention by her account of Library Work among the Chinese.

Two Officers' Institutes were held in the Autumn; one at Chester, and one at the Church of the Good Shepherd, in Newburgh. About ninety women attended, representing fifteen parishes. The institutes were very interesting.

The Autumn meeting at Grace Church, Middletown, had an unusually good attendance; the more gratifying because following quickly upon the Institutes. It was a responsive gathering. A Quiet Hour was led by Father Hughson of the Order of the Holy Cross; Mrs. Maslin, of Hankow, China, was the Missionary speaker; and Bishop Shipman spoke a few stirring words.

Two Intensive Days of Mission Study, led by Mrs. Haff at St. Paul's, in Newburgh and St. John's, in Kingston, brought representatives of various parishes together again.

The Educational Work has increased in scope and weight this season; the District Educational Secretary has taken hold of it with an effective grasp. The sale of books has gone far beyond the usual numbers. An experiment in the educational work was made at St.

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George's, Newburgh, preceding a three-sessioned Lenten course on China, with local leadership. An Intensive Day on method was held under Mrs. Hoffman's leading. This technical teaching proved helpful. We hope it may be repeated elsewhere.

The Lenten Supply Work has gone forward with such increased output and enthusiasm that the District Supply Secretary modestly attributes it to the influence of the Officers' Institutes and the Educational Work. From a distance she has conducted the work by correspondence and the branches have found the usual help and incentive from her.

About a dozen branches have taken part in the Gold and Silver Offering. Most of our branches have felt that they could not undertake it, after the various drives already engaged in. The most informal collections were permitted. Grace Church at Suffern made a systematic campaign. Other branches made very good contributions.

The Affiliated Group at Pearl River has become a branch. A branch has been formed at Willow Grove and is waiting to be formally organized. Four branches have increased their Social Service pledges. Three new pledges have been received.

We number in all 35 branches, and 6 groups.

STATEN ISLAND

During the past year this district has accomplished the allotted work of the Auxiliary, and in many ways has done more than this quota.

Owing to other demands of the Church the Auxiliary branches have found it necessary to make a great effort in order to accomplish the necessary work.

We have held three district meetings, two in connection with the Archdeaconry Supper and Meeting.

Miss Sullivan gave her illustrated talk on the cruise of the Aloha to China and Japan at the Fall meeting, Miss Lindley told us of her world travels in February and Bishop Lloyd and Mrs. Thorne are to be with us at our annual meeting in Bishop Burch Memorial Hall.

Most parishes have held regular semi-monthly meetings with speakers from the field. Four Lenten Study Classes were held and

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an intensive day on China, at which all parishes were well represented was led by Mrs. Haff.

We have increased our budget and Social Service pledge, all parishes are contributing to the United Thank Offering and a new Branch has been formed at St. Ann's Church, Great Kills. Nearly all parishes have contributed to the Gold, Silver and Jewel Drive, the Women's Auxiliary Special, the Delafield Memorial, and to Saint Saviour's Church, Wuchang, China. St. John's Evening Branch maintains a scholarship in St. Agnes' School, Anking, China, and in another school in China.

The district has been filling many boxes for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio; and for the House of the Holy Child, Manila. Many other Mission and personal boxes have been sent out from each parish. Several wards at Seaview Hospital are taken care of Christmastime. Summer work goes to Ellis Island, Alaska, Church Mission of Help, and the Seaman's Church Institute.

We are looking forward to another year of hearty co-operation and consecrated endeavor in the work of the Auxiliary.

WESTCHESTER

The Annual All-Day Meeting of Westchester was held this year on May 22nd, at St. Andrew's, Brewster, the northernmost parish of our District. Undaunted by distance, 356 members, 22 rectors and 32 guests gathered together from 44 parishes. Our large numbers in no way overwhelmed the glad welcome of our hostess parish, and it was a day we will long remember.

Canon Prichard was our Preacher, and at the afternoon session we had with us the two Bishops representing the mission fields with which Westchester from the beginning of its organization, has been connected in closest tie.

Bishop Atwood brought us news of his recent visit to the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Arizona, and Bishop Overs presented the vivid need of equipment for the Sarah Ramsaur Memorial Hospital, Liberia. His stirring words brought a quick response and 38 Branches answered the appeal, and pledged \$2,300, increasing this amount later to \$2,580, the total to count on the Liberia Priority No. 637.

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Our third speaker was Miss Mary Elizabeth Wood, United Thank Offering Missionary and Librarian of Boone Library, Wuchang; she delighted her hearers and made *new* friends for China, the subject of our year's study.

Our Officers' Conferences this year took the form of three Training Institutes, and were held at Ossining, Larchmont, and White Plains, with a total attendance of 165 from 44 Branches. Two District Educational Days were planned by our Educational Secretary at St. Barnabas, Irvington and Trinity, New Rochelle, and in the early winter our Supply Officers met together at the home of our District Supply Secretary to discuss the year's allotment. The five foregoing conferences have stood as *Training Schools* for our officers and leaders.

Our Branches have gathered together in frequent Neighborhood Meetings. Six of these were held by the Parishes of the upper Hudson River Division, from Hastings to Peekskill, with an average attendance of 77, including rectors.

One Neighborhood Meeting held at Rye—followed closely our Annual Meeting, with Miss Wood again as speaker. Six Branches in our District have made special gifts for the Boone Library.

Among other speakers at the eleven Neighborhood Meetings were Bishop Thomas, Miss Lindley, Mrs. Morrison of Ellis Island, and Dr. Wood who spoke at two large meetings on the United Thank Offering. Our Supply Secretary has given at many parish meetings an inspiring talk supplemented by regional maps, on the mission stations to which we have sent supplies.

A meeting having special significance for our District was held at Christ Church, Pelham Manor, on Feb. 9th to commemorate the "Golden Jubilee" of its Woman's Auxiliary. Miss Fanny Schuyler, our first Westchester chairman, was a member of this parish and it was a day of interest and memories and inspiration. The Rev. E. L. Haines was the preacher at the Anniversary service. Over 100 women were present from 15 Parishes.

To reach out to the younger women, and to gain new groups of workers has been our aim in every undertaking. We have one new Evening Branch of young women at Grace Church, White Plains. Miss Florence Sullivan's Talk on her "*Trip Around the World*" launched them into active work, in which they have *continued* faithfully.

St. Margaret's Guild of St. Paul's, Yonkers, recently organized, have helped in the Branch's allotment, and is sending a *member* to a Summer Conference. The Woman's Auxiliary gave a supper to these young women, at which the work of the Auxiliary was presented to them.

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We have added two *new* Groups, St. Agnes Guild of Young People at St. Stephen's, Armonk, and the Swedish Mission, St. Johannes, Yonkers.

In one parish the "Mother's Meeting," with a membership of 90 women has shared the allotment, their part being valued at over \$100.

Other Parishes report *new* Helpers among their young people, in both *supply* and work for St. Margaret's School, Tokio.

In addition to these our Branches have reported 246 new members. Two small Branches, St. John the Divine, Mt. Vernon, and St. Paul's, Eastchester, we have relisted as "Groups," their part being limited to sewing. Speaking of new members, it gives us delight to report a two-session study class at Bedford, which had an attendance of 31, only 3 of whom had ever before attended a study class. The Mission Chapels, St. James, North Salem, and St. Luke's Somers, were included in this membership. We can picture the *personal* work involved which *alone* could have gathered together such a group!

Six hundred and eighty-two members have been enrolled in our Westchester classes, including both men and women.

Thirty-six Branches united in the "Gold and Silver Offering" for St. Margaret's, Tokio.

Two meetings were called by Managers of Division to outline to the Parish presidents, the details of the plan and the response has been given in *splendid* spirit.

This report would be incomplete without speaking of the work done by the Vice-President-at-Large of our District, in connection with the "Bishop Tuttle Memorial." She has given greatest service in furthering that Special in our District, speaking for it, and reading the Playlet at many Parish meetings.

During Lent a Quiet Day was conducted by Father Hughson, O. H. C., at St. Peter's, Peekskill, and at St. John's, Yonkers, a "Quiet Hour" with meditations relating to the "Message," was given by the Rector.

Within the past week a special gift of one thousand dollars has come to our Treasurer, from a member of our District, for the completion of the buildings of the "Fanny Schuyler Memorial," the inland station at Barloamah, Liberia, built in memory of our *first* Westchester chairman.

As we are cabling this happy news to Miss Seaman, it fills our own hearts with thanksgiving, and makes indeed for us a glad *ending* to our year.

District Reports.

To the members of the Westchester Committee and to our *Branches* whose efforts have made possible this report, and to whom all credit is due, I want to express my appreciation of their always loyal help. It has been a year of work—hard work—persistently done but *ever* in gladness.

And in closing we want earnestly to thank our Diocesan Officers, and Miss Prophet, who on so many occasions in the past months, have so immeasurably helped us, inspiring us and giving us generously of their time.

REPORT ON BISHOP TUTTLE MEMORIAL CHURCH HOUSES FOR
WOMEN WORKERS—WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE
NATIONAL COUNCIL—SPECIAL 1923-1925

Madam President and members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of New York: Owing to the help and loyal co-operation of our President, the Vice-Presidents and other members of the Executive Board, as well as of many women throughout the Diocese during the past year, it is possible to make the following report of the endeavor to interest the women of New York in the Woman's Auxiliary Special for 1923-1925 in memory of Bishop Tuttle; which is the Training School for Colored Women Church Workers at Raleigh, North Carolina, and the New York House for young women training for the Master's service in our Church.

Thirty-nine talks, or addresses, have been made to Parish Branches, Neighborhood and District meetings and at Synod Hall, including the Annual meetings of the Districts of Dutchess, Orange, Staten Island and Westchester in May, 1924.

In October, 35 letters enclosing leaflets were sent to the Chairmen, Secretaries and Division Managers of the Districts of Dutchess, New York, Orange, Staten Island and Westchester, and to the Presidents of 67 Parish Branches in the District of New York. Of these 102 letters, 40 remain unanswered.

Three hundred and sixty-five copies of the Playlet were sold 1,500 leaflets distributed, and 350 other letters written.

A short report has been published in each issue of the Woman's Auxiliary Bulletin. A letter was sent to the April Diocesan Bulletin, and an article published in the Churchman for April 25th.

Each Parish in our Diocese was asked to have a Celebration of the Holy Communion in memory of Bishop Tuttle on St. Philip's and St. James' Day, May 1, 1925, the 58th anniversary of his consecration, and to give the offering at that service to the Memorial Houses.

Resolution Adopted in Portland, Oregon.

RESOLVED: That the United Thank Offering of 1925 be given to the Presiding Bishop and Council for the work of women in the mission field whose appointment has been approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled; Provided, that one-tenth of the Offering be set aside and added to the permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Presiding Bishop and Council, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers; Also Provided, that the sum of not less than \$25,000.00 be devoted to the erection, completion or renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Presiding Bishop and Council on the recommendation of the Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

RESOLVED: That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the Mission Field.

ANNUAL REPORT

The Church School Service League has adopted a Constitution, approved by Mishop Manning. In addition to the usual officers, there will be a Vice-President for each Field of Service and one for each District, for Box Work, Little Helpers and Junior Council.

Four regular meetings of the Board will be held each year.

The annual all-day Conference of parish leaders and children was held in Advent, with 186 children present. After the Service in the Cathedral the Junior Council was formed, consisting of two representatives from each Church School in the Diocese, with a board of officers corresponding to the adult board. This Junior Council has been active and gave an exhibit in Old Synod House at the time of the Diocesan Convention.

The Church School Service League has co-operated with Dr. Sunderland in the work of City Missions, with Canon Prichard in the Cathedral offering and has tried to extend the educational program of the Church Schools in connection with their Lenten offering to the Nation and World Fields.

A meeting for Leaders of Little Helpers was held in May at the home of the President to consider a larger program in the coming year.

In Box Work the results were most gratifying. Seventeen hundred and seventy-five joyful and useful gifts were sent to twenty missions

from twenty-five parishes and fifty comfort bags were made for the Seaman's Church Institute.

For our corporate gift in the Diocesan, Nation and World Field \$963.71 was received by our Treasurer, of which amount \$317.07 was sent to Schermerhorn House, Connecticut; \$321.00 to the Mountain Mission, Lexington, Kentucky; \$323.16 to the Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China. The "Little Helpers," the Home Department of the Service League, through their mite boxes, gave \$737.62 to Kindergartens in Japan, and the Birthday Thank-Offering was \$107.63. These gifts, together with \$100.90 in Specials and \$68.91 in Expense Fund, make a total of \$1,978.77.

I wish to acknowledge the generous support of the many capable leaders who have cheerfully taken upon themselves the work of pathfinders in a year of readjustment, and endeavored to engage all the schools in a program of Service in the Five Fields, which shall give to our children a broader understanding of "The Program of the Church."

We are especially grateful to those rectors and superintendents, who, regardless of whether their schools were or were not formally organized as The Church School Service League, graciously responded to the children-officers in their requests for two representatives from each parish to the Junior Council, and to the splendid officers of the Junior Council who worked to give the Church School exhibit at the Old Synod House at the time of the Diocesan Convention.

Constitution.

NEW YORK BRANCH WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912,
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETINGS,
MAY 8TH, 1913, JANUARY 6TH, 1920, JANU-
ARY 4TH, 1921, JANUARY 3RD, 1922, MAY 6TH,
1924, MAY 5TH, 1925.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the
Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the WOMAN'S AUXIL-
IARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are con-
sidered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who, in
this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the Missions of
the Church may become by enrolment, actual members of the New York
Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Association shall be a President and fifteen
Vice-Presidents, six in charge respectively of the Districts of Dutchess,
New York, Orange, Staten Island, and Westchester and of the Evening
Branches, one in charge of the Junior Auxiliary and Church School
Service League, one to represent the Young People's Service League,
and five in charge, respectively, of the work of Domestic Missions,
Foreign Missions, Education, Social Service and the Supply Depart-
ment, and two Vice-Presidents at Large, a Secretary, an Assistant Sec-
retary, a Treasurer and a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering;
all of whom shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Association may appoint Honorary Officers at pleasure.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be
amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting,
two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the pro-
posed amendments, having been given at a previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I.—DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SEC. 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents.* A Vice-President at Large shall preside in the absence of the President, and the Vice-Presidents shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Executive Board, presenting a written report of their work at the Annual Meeting.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts and of the Evening Branches shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting a written report of their work for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Domestic Missions, Foreign Missions, Education, Social Service and the Supply Department shall inform the Parish Branches through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers, of the needs and work in their respective departments. They shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 3. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall—

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 5. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse and keep account of all moneys received in each department of work and shall attend the meetings of the Association, reporting receipts and disbursements to the same.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer—United Thank Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Thank Offering, and under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 7. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 8. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association; shall fill vacancies occurring on the resignation or death of officers; and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 9. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE II.—PARISH DUES.

Each Parish Branch shall send annually to the Treasurer, for the current expenses of the Association, a specified sum of money to be known as Parish Dues. The amount of these dues shall be determined by the Association at the November meeting.

ARTICLE III.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st to December 31st.

ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

SEC. 1. The meetings of this Association shall be held monthly from November to May, inclusive, the May meeting being the annual Meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four duly elected or appointed delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association, except the Annual Meeting, fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. At the Annual Meeting one hundred delegates from the Parish Branches shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 6. A meeting of the Executive Board shall precede each monthly meeting of the Association.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE V.—NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS.

SEC. 1. There shall be appointed annually by the President a Nominating Committee of at least seven members, comprising at least one member from each district and one from the Evening Branches, which shall nominate at the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office of the Association, the District Vice-Presidents and the Evening Branch Vice-President excepted.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts of Dutchess, New York, Orange, Staten Island, and Westchester and of the Evening Branches, shall be nominated at a representative meeting of their respective districts. At such a meeting, which shall take place not less than a month before the Diocesan Annual Meeting, each branch shall have one vote, a branch being a group of women working to help the National Council, and contributing to the Expense Fund of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary. Unless one-third of the branches are represented by delegates or proxies, there shall be no quorum. Should a district waive the right, the Vice-President shall be selected by the Nominating Committee.

SEC. 2. All the officers except the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering, the Vice-President in charge of the Junior Auxiliary and Church School Service League, and the Vice-President who represents the Young People's Service League shall be elected by a ballot of majority vote at the annual meeting and shall hold their office for one year and until the election of their successors.

SEC. 3. The President of the Junior Auxiliary and Church School Service League as elected by that body, and the representative of the Young People's Service League as appointed or elected by that body, are by virtue of such appointment or election Vice-Presidents of this Association in charge of their special work.

SEC. 4. The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting in the same year as the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.

ARTICLE VI.—ORDER OF BUSINESS.

- (11) Adjournment.

ARTICLE VII.—AMENDMENT.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended or repealed at any regular or annual meeting by a two-thirds' majority vote of delegates present, notice of proposed changes having been given at a previous meeting.

ARTICLE VIII.

Roberts' Revised Rules of Order shall govern all meetings.
