President's Address.

It is indeed a pleasure to come before you today. The thrilling reports of your Diocesan officers have given you a vivid picture of the splendid work that has gone on during the past year. My annual report is printed in the Bulletin you have received at this meeting, and while it could not possibly do justice to the achievements in all the fields of activities, it does give the general idea of what we have accomplished. I hope that, as you read it, you will bear in mind that it is your report. Without your cooperation and planning and devoted effort, there would be no report!

We have had a remarkably successful year, and our work has gone forward in the way it should. Every pledge was paid, every obligation met. There is a simple reason for that: we did not wander into byways, but kept before us the vision that the greatest contribution the Woman's Auxiliary can make to the life of the Church is in its devotion and steadfast loyalty to the missionary work of the Church.

We regret deeply that two of our officers are leaving the Executive Board: Mrs. McMaster who has been in charge of the District of Staten Island for seven years, and whose kindly spirit has been such a helpful influence, and Mrs. Porter, who for five years as Vice-President at large has taken such splendid care of the physical arrangements of our meetings, and who has been so successful in her work with the Juniors. We know that they will continue their interest in the Woman's Auxiliary, but they will be greatly missed at the Board meetings.

I am going to ask you to consider that I have read you all of my printed report, for it contains much that I should like to call to your special attention, but the time at this meeting is too limited for that, and I wish to speak of something else that is not in the report, before we separate for the summer. You see, I do not say "stop" for the summer: We do not "stop" in the Woman's Auxiliary!

The spirit of the Auxiliary can, and should, be carried into everything that we do. There is no better time than the next few months, for the most important work that we can do, for the Woman's Auxiliary and the Church,—to arouse the interest of the young girls and the young women in the program of the Church. Are they to be allowed to feel that there is no place for them in our work? Destructive forces are not backward about forming groups to spread their doctrines, and they realize the importance of reaching young people in those formative years, and of giving them something to do! Let us teach them how to build, not destroy, let us go out of our way in order to find definite tasks for them, and let us remember that they cannot know much about what we are doing unless we tell them.

Above all, let them see that there is real happiness in Church work. Not the restless, driving excitement that turns women with purposeless lives into souls possessed, but through the Church, as we know it to be, we want them to become wonderful instruments in the Hand of God, not tools of the antichrist.

Annual Report of the President.

The Woman's Auxiliary has again completed a successful year. In all departments the work has gone forward, and every difficulty has been overcome. The branches have responded as never before, and Diocesan officers are appreciatively aware of the personal interest shown by the members, without which such splendid results could not have been achieved.

The year of the Triennial Meeting is, of necessity, one of stimulated thought, free discussion and wisely-planned action, if the results of the energy expended are to have any real value in the work for which we are organized, namely, to aid the Mission of the Church. The delegates brought back from Atlantic City various impressions that were given thoughtful consideration by the Executive Board and used as a basis for suggestions to the parish branches, so that the theme "If We Be His Disciples" will become vitally significant to every member of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Confident that the first step in developing Christian discipleship is to strengthen the devotional life, both individually and in corporate worship, the Forward Movement leaflets and sermons on Discipleship have been distributed, the Quiet Day for Prayer was observed throughout the Diocese, an increasing number of parish branches have had regular Corporate Communions, and nine new Prayer Groups have been formed. From all the Districts come reports of additional Quiet Days, Quiet Hours, Retreats and Hours of Intercession. Miss White led a class in "Personality through Prayer" and Dr. Gavin had two classes on "The Church and Society."

To the 679 people present, the Third Triennial Missionary Luncheon in October was the great event. Through Mrs. Harding's experienced planning, twenty-five Bishops were among the visitors welcomed to the Diocese of New York by Bishop Manning in his address. The Lord Bishop of Aberdeen and Orkney linked us with the Church in Scotland, and the activities of our Church throughout the world were presented by Bishops from Brazil, China, Cuba, Honolulu, Japan, Mexico, South Dakota and Eastern Oregon. Father Hughson spoke for Liberia, two United Thank Offering missionaries brought the Blue Box to life before our eyes, and Church Army men sang words of cheer to the assembled missionaries who would soon be returning to their distant posts.

The Advent Meeting is the high point of the year to most of us, as numbers alone readily prove. Again our Bishop made us happy in giving us his entire day, and the inspiration of his presence raised our hopes and encouraged our efforts. At the Service, Bishop Booth preached with power and conviction, and in the afternoon, at the Missionary Meeting in the Synod Hall, we were addressed by two of the outstanding speakers of the Triennial Meeting, Dr. Francis Cho Min Wei, and the Reverend Wylie Roy Mason.

At the October meeting, the delegates to the Triennial Meeting made their reports, and Miss McKenzie gave us a vivid picture of her work in Liberia. The five other Diocesan meetings have had such interesting speakers as Dr. Franklin, Dr. Hobbs, Bishop Bartlett, Mrs. Pierce as Provincial Representative on the National Executive Board, Mrs. F. S. Boas of The Mothers' Union in England, and Dr. Van Keuren, Executive Secretary of the Diocesan Social Service Commission.

One of the unique privileges that we have enjoyed was the pleasure of arranging a reception in honor of Mrs. Cain, Miss Corey, Miss Hibbard and Miss Matthews, the first women to serve on the National Council. Miss Hibbard was prevented from attending, but addresses by the other women members of the National Council on the day before their first meeting made us feel that February 11th was historically important.

Under Mrs. Pierce's able and devoted leadership, the Missions Committee has had three large meetings, with the work in eight fields presented by stimulating speakers. District representatives have helped considerably in arousing interest in the Missions Committee, and in adding new members to the various sub-committees. The thirteen sub-committees are going forward in their respective fields, keeping in close touch with the missionaries and endeavoring to provide speakers from their own ranks for parish meetings. The different ways in which the sub-committees function are told in interesting detail in the Chairman's report. It is with deep regret that the death of Mrs. Charles deRham is reported. For fourteen years Mrs. deRahm served as Chairman of the Committee for Work among the Negroes, and the Memorial that the Committee is raising can never express the great affection with which she was regarded.

The subject for study was Christ and Japan. Mrs. Chapman reports that a greater number of parishes than ever took part in discussing Japan's vital problems in the light of Christian experience, and many branches planned programs on Japan in addition to their discussion groups. Increased attendance at the classes and at the closing Service at the Cathedral prove the educational work to be a real factor in arousing and holding the interest of the members.

Our Christian Social Service work at Ellis Island surpassed last year's record. Miss Palmer established contacts with 1,659 persons representing 21 different nationalities, and 6,413 services were rendered to the variety of people entering or leaving our country. Mrs. Nichols' enthusiasm is increasing interest in all the parish branches.

The Supply Department has also accomplished more than last year. Miss Hutton has had such wholehearted response to her presentation of the needs of missionaries that all requirements were met.

The United Thank Offering was presented at Atlantic City last October, and the splendid Offering from this Diocese, \$71,729.65 for the Triennium, was the result of the devoted service of our former Treasurer, Mrs. Van Bokkelen. Our new Treasurer, Mrs. Dickey, is showing so much zeal in putting forward the Offering as an ideal ex-

pression of personal gratitude, that her efforts are already producing encouraging results.

There are now 217 branches and groups in the Diocese, of which 3 branches and 5 groups are new. The District Vice-Presidents report steady progress, with a constantly increasing understanding of our work and aim.

Every pledge was paid, every obligation met. The gifts total \$10,611.31 more than last year, of which some \$10,100.00 went to the United Thank Offering.

It is with deep regret that we announce the retirement of two of our officers. Mrs. McMaster has been in charge of the District of Staten Island for seven years, and her graciousness, her kindly spirit and her helpful understanding have endeared her to all with whom she has served. For five years Mrs. Porter has served as Vice-President at Large, and the smoothness of the meetings has been due to her indefatigable attention to all the details. Mrs. Porter has also been very successful in her work with Junior Branches, as the large meeting she arranged last December demonstrated. Although we know that both Mrs. McMaster and Mrs. Porter will continue in Auxiliary activities, their loss will be keenly felt at the Board meetings.

The support and cooperation of our Bishops and other clergy have been of inestimable value, and we are very grateful for their many kindnesses.

It is a great pleasure to present this report, and to acknowledge the happy privilege of serving in the Diocese of New York, which, under Bishop Manning's inspired direction, has taken the lead in the invigorating work for which our Woman's Auxiliary exists,—the Missionary Work of the Church.

As Publicity Agent reports have been sent to the Diocesan Bulletin, The Living Church, The Churchman, and The Witness.

As Chairman of the Recruiting Committee for the Diocese I have spoken of the need for nurses and well educated young women in several fields and discussed the problem with the Rev. A. B. Parsons.

Devotional Life.

During the past year, when the world has been passing through acute problems, your Committee on Devotional life has felt deeply its responsibility. With a firm belief that our help is in God, we have been urged to strengthen our individual devotional life. We thank our Bishops and our Rectors for their co-operation and ministrations to us. For the year we took as our aim that every member of the Woman's Auxiliary in our diocese of New York, should strive to make herself a visible proof of Christian discipleship by her quiet and steadfast confidence in God, her joy, her hope, and her power. Every parish branch has been encouraged to have monthly Corporate Communions. Prayer Groups have been suggested; Prayer Partnerships between parish branches and workers in the mission fields were recommended. Our Prayer Partners for this year have been Miss Anne E. Cady, Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona; Miss Alice L. Hanson, Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska; Miss Viola V. Hanson, Zamboanga, P. I.; Miss Dorothy K. Wakeman, St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China; Miss Margaret Marshall, Trinity Mission, 721 Whaley Street, Columbia, S. C.; Miss Hazel A. Morrison, 1475 Jackson Street, Hillsboro, Oregon.

It is a joy to report the work that you yourselves have done this year.

The District of Dutchess, Miss Louise Whitcome, Devotional Secretary, reports that many parish branches have had monthly Cor-

porate Communions. There was an awakening interest in Prayer Partnerships and with the co-operation of the Rectors the great need of a more devotional life was brought before the women.

The District of Manhattan and the Bronx, Mrs. William P. Baird, Devotional Secretary, reports that a ten minute period of prayer and meditation has been held before the District Meeting each month. In All Angels Parish a half hour service of prayer and meditation was held one afternoon of each week during Lent. The Devotional Committee was actively represented in the World Day of Prayer on March 8th. At St. Mary the Virgin's, on March 29th, a most inspiring Quiet Day was conducted by Father Hoffman of Boston for the Woman's Auxiliary.

The District of Orange, Miss Leila R. Ramsdell, Devotional Secretary, reports 102 Corporate Communions, 10 Quiet Hours, 11 parish branches used the Prayer for the Bishop's call, 19 parish branches observed the Quiet Day for Prayer on November 12th, and 2 Episcopal Churches were used for the World Day of Prayer on March 8th. In the district all of the Prayer Partner missionaries were chosen by parish branches.

The District of Staten Island, Mrs. Thomas C. Brown, Devotional Secretary, reports a deepening of the devotional life of the women. Members attend the Holy Communion Service the Sunday after Auxiliary meetings. The World Day of Prayer, March 8th, was largely observed.

The District of Westchester, Miss Laura F. Boyer, Devotional Secretary, reports that she presented "Our Aim" for this year to 49 parish branches. Corporate Communions have been made by the parish branches. A Prayer Group was formed. Prayer Partners were given to shut-ins, and practically every branch in the district prays for Miss Cady, at the Mission of the Good Shepherd. In the little Chapel at Ardsley members of the Woman's Auxiliary, each week during Lent, held an hour of discussion on Prayer.

Dr. Gavin conducted two classes during the year: one in November on "The Church and Society", and the second during Lent on "Contemporary Society in the Church".

In October, Miss Mary May White led a class on "Personality through Prayer".

With the joy of these reports comes a hope that we all will strive harder to attain those characteristics that shall mark us more definitely as strong Christian women.

It is to be the privilege of this Committee to carry on the work of the Forward Movement among the members of our Woman's Auxiliary. Our aim will be to bring the Forward Movement to every woman of our Diocesan Auxiliary.

The time between Easter and Whitsunday is one when many inter-

cessors are praying for the re-invigoration of the life of the Church, so that ways and means may be found to enrich the spiritual life of the individual communicant in his relationship to God and to the society of his fellow men, in order that it may ultimately strengthen the efforts of the Church more completely to fulfill its missionary responsibility in parish, diocese and the general church.

During the summer you will be asked to carry on this great Forward Movement. These are changing times. If we cannot give of our time, our money or our strength as in years past, we definitely can give abundantly of those greater gifts of love for God and love for our neighbors.

With gratitude for His blessings of our efforts during the past year, we pray God to defend us and that His presence and His love may sustain and direct us in the days to come.

The year has been an eventful one for the Missions Committee.

The autumn meeting was omitted in order that we might cooperate fully with Mrs. Earl Harding's plans for the Missionary Luncheon, which was held on October 27th. There were 679 people present, including 25 Bishops. This great occasion was ably managed by Mrs. Harding and was the inspiration for our winter's work.

Three meetings of the Missions Committee were held, at one of which the Rt. Rev. Frank W. Creighton, D.D. made an important address about Mexico; and at another the Rt. Rev. Benjamin M. Washburn, D.D. spoke on the Relation of the Forward Movement to the support of Missions.

The Committee is fully organized, with a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, a representative of each district, and a chairman for each sub-committee. The Vice-Chairman, Miss Palmer, has been in charge of a Speakers' Committee and has filled many engagements for parish branch meetings.

The sub-committees have been reorganized. The Panama Committee has been consolidated with the Islands. Alaska and Southern Mountaineers are each independent committees, and the Committee for Western Missionary Districts has been organized.

The following changes have been made in the Advance Work Program: The China Committee has completed its Advance Work project, a Staff residence at Church General Hospital, Wuchang, and is working for a Heating and Water Supply Plant at St. James Hospital, Anking; the committee for Western Missionary Districts is working for a Conference Center for Young People at Payette Lakes, Idaho; the committee is in correspondence with several missionaries in the west; the Advance Work project for Liberia has been changed and instead of \$10,000 for work in the interior, we hope to give \$1500 during the next three years for financing and reopening Julia C. Emery Hall at Bromley; the Committee for Work among the Negroes has given a Memorial for Mrs. deRham, for fourteen years chairman of the committee. This has been used to complete the Advance Work project, Dining-room and Kitchen Equipment, to furnish a room in the Infirmary, and to provide an endowment for the care of sick children at Fort Valley Normal and Industrial School, Georgia, and to make a special gift to Archdeacon Baskerville.

The Committee for Southern Mountaineers has written a short paper about Patterson School, for which they are working, hoping that the paper may be read in parish branches. The Brazil Committee has circulated copies of Bishop Thomas' radio address. The Japan Committee, under the leadership of Mrs. Sawada, had an entertainment before Christmas, the proceeds of which were divided between the support of our work in Utsunomyia and needy Japanese in New York.

The Committees have been asked to study the situation and to keep in correspondence with the missionaries in their respective fields, especially with those who have gone out from this diocese; to develop speakers for parish branch meetings; to support the diocesan pledge for budget by designated gifts, and to help the missions of the Church go forward by gifts to advance work projects.

We hope to cooperate with the Commission on the Forward Movement; emphasize the national development of our Church as the agency for carrying on our World Wide Mission; carry out the recommendations contained in the report of the Committee on Missions in This Age; test our lives by the words: If We Be His Disciples.

The stimulus which Missionary Education has received and will receive from the Forward Movement has been felt especially in our Department. Much that has been said and written in Auxiliary annals has emphasized the importance of a wider knowledge of the missionary enterprise of our Church. With Japan as the subject for study the work has gone forward courageously and aggressively. The vital problems of the Sunrise Kingdom have been presented from a constructive rather than a critical point of view, especial emphasis being placed upon their Christian solution.

The District of Dutchess under the leadership of Mrs. Robert W. Andrews reports 20 parishes participating in the educational program. In Manhattan and the Bronx fifty-five branches were reached. Mrs. C. M. Baxter, Jr., organized study in twenty-six branches in New York City. Miss Margaret Sparrow and Miss Hilda Groome promoted work in sixteen evening branches. In the Bronx, Mrs. R. T. Kelly, reported that thirteen branches were reached. It is significant that at an Intensive Day on Japan led by your Vice-President, the Bronx branches were all represented. In the District of Orange, under the leadership of Mrs. Alfred J. Fritz, there were twenty-four parishes participating in the work. In Staten Island, Mrs. R. C. Hanaway reported that eleven branches and groups studied Japan. In Westchester, fifty-four branches took an active part in the program, approaching a perfect record,—the only one not reporting was a summer parish which holds no winter meetings.

The committee suffered a distinct loss when Miss Edna M. Brigham resigned. Miss Laura F. Boyer consented to serve the department as secretary in addition to her membership at large. Her ceaseless and devoted service has contributed much to the achievements of the year.

The total number of branches and groups studying Christ and Japan either in discussion classes, intensive programs or reading groups was 164, an increase of eleven over last year's report. Many presidents reported a program on Japan or an intensive day in addition to a study group. Mention should be made of the numbers from the Federated Churches and from other communions who joined our classes. Our leaders also conducted groups for the Girls' Friendly Society. The impressive conclusion drawn from these statements is that it represents the voluntary contributions of time, service and self on the part of the educational secretaries and leaders who have made this report possible.

In the fall, a trip was made to the Japanese section of the Columbia University Library, to a Buddhist temple, to a Japanese garden and to other Japanese centers in New York City. In March some of our leaders visited the exhibition of Japanese No robes and Buddhist vestments at the Metropolitan Museum. It is gratifying to know of the many corporate communions that were held in conjunction with the educational programs. The annual service in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine was a fitting culmination of the season's work.

Your Vice-President conducted nine sessions of normal classes for the training of leaders, thus making a personal contact with representatives of seventy-four branches. In addition to promoting the work in this Diocese, your officer has conducted classes for leaders in the diocese of Virginia and in Connecticut and plans to lead again at the summer conference for the Junior Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of Washington.

It is an honor to record the results of our work in 1934-1935. Our classes have fostered good-will and friendly neighborliness between our country and Japan. Such impact has been made upon public opinion that it has offset ignorance and unfounded prejudice. An unusual feature has been the interest evidenced by the Japanese themselves. Mme. Renzo Sawada, wife of the Consul General, and chairman of the Japan Committee, and Mme. H. K. Iijima have cö-operated to the utmost and frequently have spoken of their own Christian experience.

Christians of Japan and Christians in this country working and praying together for the extension of the Kingdom of God—There could be no greater contribution toward World Peace.

"During the past year, our Mission at Ellis Island—which is our part of the Christian Social Service—made contacts with 1,659 persons, comprising 21 different nationalities. A total of 6,413 different types of services were rendered, consisting of material aid to the destitute, services rendered to those in need of advice and direction, and ministrations to the spiritual needs of those who pass through the gates of our country, coming in and going out.

Religious Services were maintained and conducted by Chaplains furnished by our City Mission Society, and it is with a deep feeling of joy and satisfaction that we note the attendance at these services has shown a steady increase during the year. It is quite a common occurrence to have requests for a Prayer Book before leaving the Island. During the past year, a greater number of Books of Common Prayer was distributed than ever before. Our Mission is quietly, and we hope effectively, working toward a spiritual fellowship with these people who come to Ellis Island. There are being made spiritual ties which, we hope, will bind together "All Nations of the earth" into the one, enduring brotherhood of man.

The work is divided: those who are coming into our country for the first time—mainly relatives of former immigrants, who are permitted to come only when they can present affidavits of support from those who are bringing them in—, no one who will compete in our industrial life, is allowed to enter. The major part of the work has been with those who are going out of our country, either as voluntary removals, or who are being deported as illegal entrants, or as undesirable aliens.

We are also busy with the problem of the separated family, working with those who are to accompany the husband when he is deported, or establishing some adjustment during the husband's detention on the Island. Problems involving all phases of human welfare and adjustment come to our attention. No other social agency has the variety of problems that beset us at Ellis Island. Our Mission is actually unique—unique, in the fact that it partakes of all the characteristics of a foreign field in a domestic setting, yet it is not limited to one race of people,

but consists of many races, constantly shifting, according to the amount of time they are required to remain in detention.

The work is a process of re-creation, re-adjustment and encouragement at points of great crises in the lives of these people. In making our investigations, prior to any individual adjustment, we strive to find all the creative forces for good within the individual, all his physical, mental and spiritual assets, and with a knowledge of these forces at hand, we try to put the individual in touch with conditions and with people where these assets will be used; it is practically a work of salvaging human material.

Contacts with Chaplains at foreign ports have been established, in order that those arriving may be assured of some one to meet them. Many are leaving our country who have been away from their native shores so long that they return as comparative strangers and need some sort of assistance at the ports of arrival. For over thirty years the church has maintained this contact, but never has the need been so vital as at the present time; never has it assumed so much importance and never been so relied upon, as now. It is one of our most useful contacts with the foreign-born of our church, advising and directing them in the appropriation of the ideals of our American life and its institutions, besides strengthening and rebuilding their church relationships that may have been neglected.

At this critical time in world-wide movements affecting the future well-being of every nation, let us seize this opportunity—through our Mission at Ellis Island—to maintain our share in the forces for good which may influence the lives of those aliens who return to their native shores, and who, we trust, will carry a good-will message from America, wherever they go."

The above is the report of the work done on Ellis Island by the missionary, Miss Alice G. Palmer, whom we as a Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, send there. I ask you to help keep her there to do this work; by your prayers, your interest, and your support of the pledge made for 1935 of \$2,000.00. Please bear in mind we are the only Protestant Church represented on the Island, if we fail, and where we leave off, the Roman Catholic Church will step into the place we have made, the place of confidence and trust with the Government. It would take years for us to regain what we would lose if we gave up our work at Ellis Island even for a short time.

The report includes \$519.00 for altar supplies sent to missionaries, among them three private communion sets.

This is the first year since 1927 that the New York Supply Department itself is on the Honor Role. The value of our help to the mission of the Church is \$1,364.42 more than last year.

There are 124 branches on the Honor Role against 87 last year, and we should be grateful that we are realizing the distress and needs

of our church people on the difficult frontiers, as well as those at our doors.

Our wholesale buyer, Miss Helen V. Lewis, has purchased 24,952 articles, exclusive of dispensary supplies. It would be much to the financial help of parishes if more of them would order their bought garments through the wholesale department. Only 62 branches have ordered this year, and we could really be a great saving to the parishes if more would let us help them.

Mrs. J. C. Cattus has cut 218,250 surgical dressings, which is nearly twice as many as last year.

Mrs. R. D. Murray in the Cutting Room reports 11,066 garments cut, not quite as many as last year.

We have felt the need this year of more clear understanding in the parish supply officers of the details of this part of the work, and hope that in the autumn they will all be sure to attend the Supply Officers conferences in all the districts. There is a great deal of detail to this part of the Auxiliary work but it has all been arranged to help the missionaries most efficiently and economically, so that everything we ask to have done has a very good and helpful meaning, and we hope for mutually instructive supply officers meetings next year.

My first year as head of the District has been one of great inspiration and encouragement. The District Board has given wonderful cooperation and ever-ready help.

The 52nd Annual Meeting was held in Christ Church, Poughkeepsie, on May 16th, 1934. A corporate communion was celebrated with Canon Prichard as the preacher. At the afternoon meeting, the Reverend Henry A. McNulty, from Soochow Academy, Shanghai, China, was the speaker. There was a record attendance and great enthusiasm.

During the summer, Presidents' Day was observed at my home in Sharon, Connecticut. All Parish Presidents were invited for a conference, followed by luncheon. This is to be an annual event. The District board attended and future work was discussed.

Several Board meetings were held in Sharon and Poughkeepsie during the summer, fall and winter.

Almost every parish branch has had Mission Study Classes and Discussion Groups with competent leaders. Most of the intensive days were held during Lent.

out the District. Miss Kinkead has been always ready to help locally. Mrs. Madeira, with her routine work of Secretary, and added work as Treasurer, for the United Thank Offering, has never ceased in her efforts for the well-being of the District. Mrs. W. deGarmo Smith has pushed forward the supply work and has seen that all allotments were filled. Mrs. Greer has done all in her power to interest the branches in the work at Ellis Island, special meetings with speakers having been arranged. Miss Clarkson has tried to interest all branches in special missionary enterprises. Miss Louise Webb, of Red Hook, has been especially working for the Southern Mountaineer Committee. Mrs. Theodore Klein, of Beacon, has been appointed to serve on the Diocesan Nominating Committee.

In November, the Quiet Day for Prayer, was observed in most of our churches and also in those of other denominations.

We are trying in the District to help the Forward Movement of the Church, hoping in this way to be truly His Disciples in our life in the Parish, and in our contacts with the world in which we live.

Amid the greatest aggregation of human effort and achievement that the world has ever known—not to mention the appalling manifestations of a changing civilization which reach their high water mark in our great city—the District Committee of Manhattan and the Bronx has sought, during the past twelve months, to carry forward, with vigilance and devotion, its share of the program set up by the Church, for the supreme task of the ages—the building of the Kingdom of God.

All along the line, under the able leadership of each faithful District Officer, the work has progressed. It is impossible to relate in this brief report what has been accomplished in the several departments, in each Parish Branch. Suffice it to say, that in the seventy-seven Branches, which compose the District, with their total membership of some 4,000 women, there has been no appreciable falling off in any part of the work—and in nearly every case the record has gone forward. It is most regrettable that three Branches—St. Luke's Chapel (Trinity Parish), St. Thomas' Evening Branch, and St. Cyprian's (also an Evening Branch) through changed conditions, have found it necessary to disband. But the happy word is added in the same breath—that two new Branches have been formed—the Juniors of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, and the Day Branch of St. Edmund's Church in the Bronx.

An *Officers' Conference* was held on January 11th, in the Parish House of St. Thomas' Church, at which some 113 Parish Officers were present, a very fair representation of the District.

A *Quiet Day* for church women was conducted by the Rev. Father Hoffman, of Boston, in the Church of St. Mary the Virgin, on March 29th. This was attended by more than one hundred women, mostly officers of the Auxiliary—and was in very truth a *quiet day*—an experience long to be remembered by many who shared it.

THE BRONX. Under the wise and able direction of Mrs. Joseph R. Kinney, chairman for the Bronx, a number of excellent meetings have been held. Chiefly, the series of Devotional Meetings conducted by Miss Mary May White—the intensive day on “Japan” under Mrs. Alfred Chapman—and the three Neighborhood Meetings, held in different parishes, and each addressed by a leader in the mission field, have all been extremely well attended.

EVENING BRANCHES. The District Meetings for Evening Branches, held on the second Tuesdays, in November at St. Bartholomew's; in January at All Angels; in March at the Chapel of the Intercession; were each addressed by active missionary leaders—as well as the various district officers. On May 21st, in St. James' Church, the final meeting of this series, will be a “Meditation Service,” conducted by the Rev. H. W. B. Donegan, rector of St. James.

Remembering with perpetual thanksgiving the lives of those who came before us, confident always of those who will follow us, we of the District of Manhattan and the Bronx press onward to new reaches of effort in our own day—and with the precious Gospel story of the Good

Shepherd still ringing in our ears we *know* our goal will finally be achieved, and that "there shall be one flock, and one Shepherd."

District of Westchester

The Forward Movement in the Archdeaconry of Westchester was started three years ago and the Woman's Auxiliary of the District has cooperated each year in the plans of the Archdeaconry Council. The Rev. Frank Dean Gifford, Chairman of the Council, spoke on the aims and accomplishments of the Forward Movement at the three annual Division Meetings last May. On September 21st, St. Matthew's Day, a Corporate Communion with special prayers and intercessions was held in 44 parishes. This was followed in November by the Bishop's Meeting at the County Center in White Plains where an exhibit for the United Thank Offering arranged by the District Committee roused much interest. Two Quiet Hours were planned in Lent, one for Evening Groups and Branches on the subject of Prayer, the Ideal and the Practice, conducted by the Rev. Howard D. White, Rector of St. Mark's, Tarrytown; and another for the Day Branches, A Study of the Cross, led by the Rev. Richard T. Henshaw, Rector of Christ Church, Rye.

625 members of the Westchester Auxiliary from 52 parishes with their Rectors attended the three all-day Division Meetings at St. Mark's, Tarrytown, Christ's Church, Pelham Manor, and St. Bartholomew's, White Plains last May, and heard interesting and instructive sermons from three Westchester Rectors, the Rev. Richard T. Henshaw, The Rev. J. Reginald Mallett, and the Rev. Harold F. Hohly. At the afternoon missionary meetings, Miss Rachel Walker, Miss Etta McGrath, and Miss Janet Walton gave inspiring addresses on St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, the Nippon Sei Ko Kwai, and St. Luke's Mountain Mission, Tanner's Ridge, Virginia. The summer pledge was \$2,400 and was divided between China, Japan, and the Supply Department. Later \$100 was sent by the officers of Westchester for the building of a well at Tanner's Ridge.

The year has been full of fruitful activity. There have been interparochial meetings and interparochial study classes; six interdenominational study classes; seven Neighborhood Meetings where Canon Bridgeman, The Rev. Mr. Atkins, Miss Lillie Harper, Miss Bremer, Mrs. Pedersen, Mme. Iijima and Mme. Sawada spoke on their respective interests: the work of our Church in Jerusalem; the Emerald Hodgson Hospital, Sewanee, Tennessee; the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska; St. Faith's School, Yangchow, China; and Japan

our special subject of study this year. Three Officers' Conferences attended by 273 officers were held in November with the General Convention and the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary as the background for a fresh presentation of our work, and now in May three special teas are being held for discussion of the United Thank Offering.

All of these activities to the minds of the Westchester Committee have borne fruit. The parish reports show 196 new Branch members; 249 new Blue Boxes distributed; five new Groups helping with the Supply Work (making thirteen Groups in all); all Branches contributing to the district pledge for the Mission of the Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, Arizona, all but one to the House of Bethany, Cape Mount, Liberia, and all to the Summer Pledge for 1934; two Groups signifying interest in becoming Branches next Fall; a better and clearer understanding of our work and aims as evidenced by Corporate Communions, attendance at Quiet Hours, interesting programs, and a willingness to increase the Budget giving in 1935 to meet the increased expectancies of the parishes.

The two Vice Chairmen, the Members at Large, and the Managers, with the Secretary and Treasurer all have worked hard to keep the wheels of this large District organization running smoothly and more important still, running toward the goal.

All of this activity would be worth nothing unless with it went an inward, spiritual grace, growth and enthusiasm. The Westchester Committee feels and many Branch Presidents have said that this has been a year of happy giving together and of happy fellowship together. So do we prove that we are the disciples of Him of Whom a poet has recently sung;

"God may have other words for other worlds,
But for this world of ours, His Word is Christ."

Since that time I have received \$2,498.32, and today we have presented our first semi-annual Offering. An offering which I, who have happily come to know the devotion with which the parish Custodians labor, do firmly believe will be a strong foundation for the Triennium.

But of far deeper significance than the money has been the earnest endeavor of the District Representatives to present in their various districts the spiritual meaning of this Offering. Beside addresses given at Officers' Conferences and Neighborhood Meetings, during the past months thirty-four parishes have been visited, and through the contacts so made we have advanced not a little toward our ideal that every woman in the Church shall share in this great corporate act of Thanksgiving, and realize through so sharing what a power her prayers and gifts may bring to the Mission of the Church.

I am also thankful to tell you that a greater number of Branches than ever before have first presented their Offering at a Corporate Communion in their parish church, so intensifying the true spiritual meaning of their gifts.

Is it not possible that in our United Thank Offering we women can very specially answer the Church's great call to a Forward Movement? By determining to offer more constantly, more eagerly, our overwhelming gratitude for our Blessed Lord's redeeming love,—so shall not our Offering increase to His honor and glory?

Constitution.

NEW YORK BRANCH WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETINGS.
MAY 8TH, 1913, JANUARY 6TH, 1920, JANU-
ARY 4TH, 1921, JANUARY 3RD, 1922, MAY 6TH,
1924, MAY 5TH, 1925, MAY 1ST, 1928, MAY
6TH, 1929, MAY 6TH, 1930, MAY 3RD, 1931.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the
Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the WOMAN'S AUXIL-
IARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are con-
sidered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who,
in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the Mission
of the Church through the National Council may become by enrollment,
actual members of the New York Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this association shall be a President, twelve Vice-
Presidents, of whom three shall be Vice-Presidents at Large, five in
charge respectively of the Districts of Dutchess, Manhattan and the
Bronx, Orange, Staten Island and Westchester, and four in charge,
respectively, of the work of Missions, Education, Christian Social Serv-
ice and the Supply Department; a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary,
a Treasurer, and a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering, all of
whom shall constitute an Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Executive Board may appoint Honorary Officers, subject to
confirmation by the Association.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be
amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting,
two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the pro-
posed amendments, having been given at the previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I.—DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SEC. 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents at Large.* A Vice-President at Large shall preside in the absence of the President. The Vice-Presidents at Large shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Executive Board, and shall present written reports of their work at the annual meeting.

SEC. 3. *Vice-Presidents.* The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts shall be Chairmen of their respective Districts and shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Missions, Education, Christian Social Service and the Supply Department shall be Chairmen of their respective Departments and shall inform the Parish Branches through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers, of the needs and work in their respective departments. They shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 4. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall—

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 5. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the Association and shall keep accounts thereof, and shall report to each meeting of the Executive Board and of the Association.

SEC. 7. *Treasurer—United Thank Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Thank Offering, and under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 8. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 9. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE II.—PARISH BRANCHES.

SEC. 1. A “Parish Branch” is a group of actual members of the New York Branch organized within a Parish.

SEC. 2. Each “Parish Branch” shall be entitled to send representatives to the District Meetings of the District in which it is situated, and shall be entitled at such meetings to one vote. The attendance of one or more representatives, or their proxies, from at least one third of the Parish Branches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SEC. 3. Each “Parish Branch” shall pay annually to the Treasurer for the Expenses of the Association a sum of money to be known as Auxiliary Dues. The amount payable by each Branch shall be determined by the Executive Board—subject to approval by the Association at the November Meeting.

ARTICLE III.—FISCAL YEAR.

The Fiscal Year of this Association shall be the calendar year.

ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

SEC. 1. Meetings of the Association shall be held on the first Tuesdays of every month from November to May inclusive provided that whenever the appointed day shall fall upon a public holiday or a greater festival of the Church, the meeting may be transferred to some other day. The May meeting shall be the annual meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman’s Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman’s Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

By-Laws.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. The Executive Board shall meet before each monthly meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE V.—ELECTIONS AND NOMINATIONS.

SEC. 1. The term of office of all officers shall terminate at the Annual Meeting of 1932, and at that meeting new officers shall be elected to serve as follows:

The President shall be elected for a term of three years and thereafter for terms of three years each, her election to take place at the Annual Meeting following the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Three Vice-Presidents at Large shall be elected to serve respectively for one, two, and three years, their successors to be elected on the expiration of their respective terms, for terms of three years each, so that annually after 1932 one Vice-President will be elected to serve for a term of three years.

The Vice-President in charge of Missions, the Vice-President in charge of Christian Social Service, the Vice-President in charge of the Supply Department, the Vice-President for the District of Dutchess, the Vice-President for the District of Manhattan and the Bronx, the Secretary and the Treasurer shall be elected for terms of two years each, their successors to be elected at the Annual Meeting in each alternate year thereafter for terms of two years each.

The Vice-President in charge of Education, the Vice-President for the District of Orange, the Vice-President for the District of Staten Island, the Vice-President for the District of Westchester, and the Assistant Secretary shall be elected for terms of one year each, their successors to be elected at the annual meeting of 1933 to hold office for two years and thereafter for terms of two years each.

SEC. 2. The President shall appoint each year a Nominating Committee of at least seven members, including at least one member from each District, to nominate and report to the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office to be filled that year; provided, that the Districts, at meetings of their respective representatives, shall be entitled to nominate their respective Vice-Presidents, and at least one month before the Annual Meeting to report their nominations to the Nominating

Committee, and the Nominating Committee shall report to the annual meeting the nominations so received by them.

SEC. 3. All officers shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting, and except those elected for one year in 1932 and those elected at any time to fill unexpired terms, and except the President, Vice-Presidents at Large, and the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, shall hold their offices for two years and until the election of their successors.

SEC. 4. In case an office should become vacant before the expiration of the term, it may be filled for the balance of the year in which the vacancy occurs by appointment by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Board, and the remainder, if any, of the unexpired term shall be filled by election at the next Annual Meeting.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be elected by ballot once every three years, at the May meeting in the same year as the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, her election to take effect November 1st of that year. She shall hold office until her successor is elected and installed.
