Annual Report of the President

MAY 2, 1939

The time has come for my first annual report as President of the New York Woman's Auxiliary. The year's experience has been full of inspiration and encouragement to me personally, due in no small measure to the generous cooperation I have received from all sides, but very especially from the Executive Board. It is a pleasure here to record my grateful appreciation.

To point out the difficulties by which all have been confronted during the past twelve months is futile. It were wiser to dwell on certain elements of progress, which will be manifest as this report takes up different features of the work. But I would here mention particularly the growing unity and increasing fellowship that have been evident in certain "interdenominational" enterprises. The all day conference in Christ Methodist Church in the autumn, to consider ways and means to meet the problems and the challenge presented by the complex life of this great city, made those sharing in it realize more acutely the crying need for all who call themselves Christians to unite in combating the forces of paganism. In the near future "Christian Solidarity" is again to be emphasized at a luncheon meeting under interdenominational auspices.

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An outstanding privilege came to the Auxiliary during the past year through the legacy made by one of its beloved former Presidents, Ethel Cheney Thorne. With characteristic wisdom and generosity, Mrs. Thorne left the disposition of this fund to the judgment of the Executive Board, that acting on the wisest counsel obtainable, they might allot this trust in such way as would give promise of greatest helpfulness. So serious a responsibility requires grave consideration. The following appropriations were recommended:

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During the past year Mrs. Jacoby has kept in touch with the various developments in the Youth organizations throughout the Church, especially those of our own diocese. Work among groups of young women and girls has progressed under the able direction of the district Vice-Presidents.

An interesting change has been decided on in connection with the presentation of the United Thank Offering at the Annual Meeting. It is felt that the privilege of personally presenting this offering belongs of right to parish custodians. For this reason the service will henceforth follow as nearly as may be practicable the plan of the great United Thank Offering service at the General Convention.

The Committee on Devotional Life has steadily carried forward its program. Mrs. Chapman reports the Quiet Day for Prayer on Armistice Day, and a Forum on the findings of the Oxford and Edinburgh Conferences of 1937, to which were invited members of other Communions and for which "Getting Together," a Forward Movement publication, was used as a study background. The offerings from these meetings were devoted to the Braille and the Japanese editions of Forward Day by Day. The Post-Madras Woman's Mass Meeting in St. Thomas's Church, in preparation for which the Committee took a leading part, emphasized the fact that "Christian fellowship is a world reality." Surely all hearts must have been touched by the pleas from men and women of such diverse civilizations for the unity of His Body. The World Day of Prayer helped tremendously in increasing understanding sympathy with other Communions all over the diocese.

Miss Hutton reports continuous and varied activities on the part of the Missions Committee: A sale by the China Committee of Chinese embroideries when a goodly sum was raised for China Relief; an annual sale of mission products in December to encourage the missions in their efforts for self-support; efforts toward further education in the work in the thirteen fields represented by the sub-committees, through speakers at the Committee meetings and lectures given by several of the sub-committees; collecting and selling old gold, silver and jewelry to raise money for the Missionary Shortage Fund.

The educational program offered a choice of two subjects: The Church in the City, or India. The first course promptly uncovered the need for the study of *familiar* subjects, and the desirability of using the modern method of survey and program, and afforded a new realization of the work of diocesan institutions. A number of largely attended trips were planned and carried out by the Districts of Manhattan and the Bronx and of Westchester. One of the most valuable results, in Mrs. Brodie's judgment, was the bringing home to the individual woman of the need for the study of problems in her own parish.

The courses on India increased understanding of conditions there, and of the Church's unique opportunity to minister to her people.

Mrs. Culver reports with satisfaction that the work sponsored by the Auxiliary at Ellis Island is bringing solace to an ever increasing number. People whose roots for generations have been sunk deep in the culture of central Europe, and who have been uprooted and driven from their homes at a moment's notice, flock here in tragic bewilderment. Only those in actual touch with the work can appreciate the service Miss Palmer is rendering these helpless, unhappy people in their effort to adjust themselves to new and strange conditions.

The increase of \$481.63 in the Supply Department is most gratifying and suggests our good fortune in finding so able a leader as Miss Turk. One interesting detail is that a group of young women at Hunter College has been enlisted in the supply work.

Reports from the several districts all indicate intelligent leadership and steady activity. Mrs. Baxter is encouraged by awakening responsibility in Auxiliary members to bring the missionary enterprise to the whole parish, and believes that "fellowship in work" may help mightily to bring about "fellowship in faith." She reports with satisfaction the establishment in the district of one new branch and two new groups since last May.

In Dutchess Mrs. Madeira sees numerous indications of progress. She has special pleasure in reporting an increase of one hundred women actively engaged in Auxiliary work. Study classes or Intensive Days have been held in every parish. Several branches report that younger women, and in some instances high school girls, are aiding in the program. A fact of real significance is that this year more women in the District are using the Blue Boxes.

In Orange the outstanding event of the year was a dinner of nearly 300 in Newburgh, at which the Presiding Bishop and Mrs. Pierce spoke. In so scattered a district, neighborhood meetings have been of special importance, and Officers' Conferences under Mrs. Hoffman's capable leadership were of great value.

While Mrs. Earle disclaims any "highlights" for Staten Island, her report is full of encouragement. The branches "do their work faithfully, steadily and loyally." Most significant has been "a healthy increase in the number of younger women actively interested in Auxiliary work. The new young president in one parish is calling on other young women in the parish to enlist their interest and is getting results . . . Four evening branches are composed almost entirely of young women." There has been great interest in study classes, increased attendance at the World Day of Prayer services, and in many parishes there was observance of November 11th as a Quiet Day.

Miss Boyer summarizes fine accomplishment in Westchester: "All district pledges paid with every branch contributing. Increase in summer pledge with every branch contributing. Increase in number of Junior groups working for missions and formation of a Junior Branch. Fine interest in the educational plan for the study of the Church in the City with every branch visited by a speaker on the subject. Excellent attendance at all neighborhood and district meetings, showing interest and cooperation with district plans throughout."

The Executive Board is losing, in Mrs. Donald F. Forrester, a devoted and invaluable member who has served in two capacities, both as Recording and Assistant Secretary, and as Editor of the Bulletin. We are losing Mrs. Hoffman as head of the District of Orange, but are happy that she will hold office on our Board.

I feel the deepest appreciation of the help given by the Bishop, the clergy and the numerous missionaries who have brought their stirring messages to our monthly meetings.

It is a source of real thanksgiving to us all that the pledges for 1938 were met in full. But I cannot forbear saying a word as to the great difficulty with which the result was accomplished. There can be little doubt that this was due in part at least to delayed action. At the time of the Advent meeting more than \$6,000.00 had still to be secured to provide for the obligations we had assumed, and when the first of the year came, in spite of personal appeals to many who, having already done more than they could, added to their offerings, \$2,213.87 was still lacking.

I would take this opportunity to beg, and to beg most earnestly, that all diocesan and parish officers make it their personal obligation to do what they may to see to it that pledges, PLEDGES, PLEDGES are kept always in the minds of Auxiliary members, and that this year a very definite and concentrated effort be made to see to it that when the Advent meeting comes again we may sing the Doxology because by putting first things first, we have done what we have solemnly promised to do.

President's Address.

You have heard the reports of our Diocesan Officers, who have given you but a small idea of the unfailing work which they have done during the past year. If you will all read carefully the Bulletin, and especially the Treasurer's report, you will know what effort has been made, and with what success the final raising of the Pledge was accomplished.

We have all been grieved beyond measure at the crisis faced by the National Council, and the threatened reductions should the sum of \$300,000 not be raised. The thought of abandoning some Indian Missions, curtailing our great work for the Negro, recalling missionaries, and closing fields of many years' endeavor would be nothing short of tragedy. We have risen to such crises before. We cannot fail now. One of the responsibilities of the Executive Board is to keep abreast of the National Council's work, and to realize that it is auxiliary to it.

My first year as your President has been a constant inspiration, and the Board has been faithful and ever ready to help and cooperate. We have had many problems, but have tried to work out their solution with patience and courage.

The interdenominational work this year has had a real impetus, with many meetings, small and large, the climax being the luncheon on May 4th at the Hotel Astor with nearly a thousand in attendance. We hope that this is only the beginning of great things to be accomplished in the future.

While my gratitude to the Diocesan Officers is very great, I feel this is my one opportunity to express to each one of you in every parish, in every district, in every tiny group and mission in this marvelous Diocese of New York, my deep appreciation of what you have done during the year 1938. Without you we can accomplish nothing. With you, each one of you, we can do all things in this next year to bring about more splendid and more noble things. Do not let the long summer find you idle in your Church's work. Remember the mission field is alive and carrying on. We cannot afford to forget during our happy vacation days that thousands of children in China are crying out to us for food and shelter, and that Japan needs our prayers as well. Let us make this summer one not only of rest and relaxation, but of real accomplishment for the near as well as for the far-flung places of the earth.

ANNUAL REPORTS OF VICE-PRESIDENTS

Young People.

During the past year great interest has been shown in the work done among the young people. Throughout the Church a youth movement has been in progress, where a common purpose is serving to bring together the various youth organizations in a spirit of coordinated effort. Regular worship and prayer, definite service and systematic giving have been made the basis of the program, and the importance of interesting other young people in the Church and her work has had strong emphasis. We too share in that common purpose, for do we not "pray fervently, labour diligently and give liberally" so that our Lord may be known throughout the world as God and Saviour!

Believing as we do that the missionary work of the Church as adopted in the General Church Program, is vitally important, we have endeavoured wherever possible to suggest ways in which the young people could learn about, and assist in, the development of that great work.

It is not the policy of the Woman's Auxiliary to organize groups for statistical purposes in a parish that may already be overorganized, nor do we draw lines of demarcation in age relationships. Our work among young people is often presented through other parish organizations, particularly those that deal primarily with youth groups, as well as in Church School classes, Junior Choirs and Junior Altar Guilds. Groups of young women and girls who are not members of any parish organization are banded together in some special work for missions, and we are always overjoyed when, out of such a nucleus, is finally developed a lively branch to take full part in our entire program. These splendid results are due to the able direction of the District Vice-Presidents, and the complete statements of their success will be found in their detailed reports.

It has been my pleasant duty to attend various conferences of leaders, and meetings of youth organizations, especially keeping in touch with the work of our diocesan Girls' Friendly Society.

Youth of today has many pressing problems. Their greatest need is leaders who will give them faith in God.

"Fellowship in Faith and Work," the theme of the Woman's Auxiliary program for this triennium, has been the watch-word of the Committee on Devotional Life and the Forward Movement. We have been conscious of an unparalled stimulus to spiritual fellowship, and also services were held which showed a definitely tangible fellowship.

On the 4th of October, 1938, 700 representatives from many of the churches in Manhattan met to study the city. The day began with a memorable service of the Holy Communion. There was a sense of common fellowship in Christ, shared by men and women of diverse backgrounds. After the service, Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia gave a comprehensive talk on the Church in the City.

The Forward Movement Commission has prepared a splendid study-course—"Getting Together." This was used as background for a three-session Forum on the findings of the Oxford and Edinburgh World Conferences of 1937. Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce, Dr. Henry Smith Leiper and Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins were leaders of the discussion. To these meetings were invited also women from churches other than our own. We were drawn into a sense of solidarity as we faced together the urgent problems presented by the state of the world and of the church. All over the Diocese can be felt a spiritual awakening. The persecution of our fellow-Christians in Central Europe has made us more deeply appreciative of our freedom here at home.

On Armistice Day our women gathered to observe the Quiet Day of Prayer. The leaflet prepared for use as a meditation was more helpful than ever before. It is interesting to note that part of it has been used frequently for the worship service at branch meetings. On this very special day we prayed for Peace, for the triumph of Righteousness and for the visible unity of the Universal Church. Prayer Partnerships and the use of the individual names of our prayer partners bring us very close together.

Another stirring event in which our Committee took a leading part was the Mass Meeting at St. Thomas' Church when we heard the reports from the Madras International Missionary Council. A little Madras was brought to us. The newer Christians themselves from India, China, Japan, Africa and Mexico came with a fervor, a gratitude, and a thankfulness which made us humble. We felt with them that "Christian Fellowship is a World Reality."

The World Day of Prayer gave us another opportunity to join as spiritual allies. The Chairmanship of the observance in Manhattan was held by your officer, and it was a distinct privilege to be a member of that Committee and to realize that we all can work together in one great cause. A children's service impressed me indelibly, twelve little children representing as many nations and possibly as many different Christian Confessions came to the platform in a parish hall. They got

down on their little knees, joined hands—Chinese, Japanese, Negro, Mexican, Filipino, Anglo-Saxon—and in different languages said together the Lord's Prayer. I shall remember that and those children will also.

So, as we look forward into The World of Tomorrow, there is the Eternal Hope, as expressed in the Gospel for the 2nd Sunday after Easter:

"And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold, them also, I must bring and they shall hear My voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd."

Of the total of \$7,449.73, \$1,937.72 counted on Auxiliary Budget, and \$5,512.01 was for specials.

The \$614.00 interest of the Eliza Seymour Perkins Memorial Fund was divided among the 7 sub-committees in the American mission fields.

Seven benefits were held by the sub-committees during the winter, and two of the committees wrote letters of appeal to friends instead of having benefits.

The Missions Committee also collected \$306.00 of old gold and silver and \$1,156.50 in cash for the Missionary Shortage Fund.

In furthering the mission education work, 3 general meetings were held, with 3 speakers from 3 mission fields, telling their story at each meeting. The speakers were Father Whittemore, Mrs. J. E. Flockhart, Mr. Wyatt Brown, Dean Kinsolving, Mrs. R. F. Wilnerl, Miss Hodelin, Dr. Mazundar, Mrs. W. C. Taylor, Mr. Kitigawa and Sister Ruth Mary. The meetings were held at St. George's, Incarnation, and Heavenly Rest, at the invitation of their Auxiliary Branches to whom we are most deeply grateful. The Annual Meeting was held at the Church Club, where, after the reports and business, Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce told of the work and latest plans of the National Council.

The educational work was carried on in 5 of the sub-committees as follows: The Indian Committee had 2 lectures by men working for the Government with Indians and also a discussion meeting. Honolulu and the Philippines Committee had a tea at Mrs. Nichols' where Bishop Littell and a young Igoet studying for orders spoke. Work among the Negroes Committee had a tea at Mrs. Elliotts' where Miss Esther Brown, National Field Secretary, told of her work among the southern negroes. 2 members of the Alaska Committee spoke on the work of their fields at parish meetings in New Jersey, Long Island and Newark as well as in New York.

In December the first annual sale of mission made articles was held at Percy Silver House. \$408.20 was realized for the missions. This sale was for the object of making a market in New York for the mission industries by means of which they help support their work, and all the money went back to the missions; the Mission Committee only received a very small percent which exactly covered the expenses of \$18.00.

The Speakers Bureau provided 18 parishes with speakers, and we hope to do more in this line next year, especially among the small country parishes, where the groups are small and no speakers' expenses can be paid. We are also getting a good list of speakers for larger groups and hope to be able to be of more use next winter.

During the past year the Department of Education has ventured to carry two subjects for mission study, "The Church in the City," and "India." The City Church was studied intensively by all but one of the Districts; but in all sections of the Diocese there were addresses on India by missionaries or members of this department, motion pictures, and always there was the tremendous background of the Madras Conference.

In the District of Dutchess, the Educational Secretary, Miss Marian Wilkinson, is new in her position, so that it is particularly gratifying that she led her own normal class and was able to conduct successfully the affairs of her department with very little help required from headquarters.

The District of Orange has an area so wide and parishes so scattered that it is remarkable how unified the Educational work there is. This District's Educational Secretary, Mrs. William Maxfield, has arranged a series of neighborhood centers to which a group of trained speakers carries the study material.

Both Westchester, under Mrs. J. Raymond Lawler, and Staten Island, with Mrs. Joseph W. Latham, had Normal Classes for leaders who later led Parish Classes. An outstanding accomplishment of the District of Westchester was the trip to Diocesan Institutions, during which 151 Auxiliary women of 40 branches from 27 towns learned at first hand what the Episcopal Church is doing in New York City. Individual Parish branches of the District of Staten Island also visited these institutions.

In the Bronx the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Edmund Ellis, organized an evening class for *men* and women—sponsored by the Vestry. (Oh rare and beautiful phenomenon—a Missionary-Minded Vestry!).

In Manhattan, under Mrs. Howard M. Jefferson, activities were so varied that they ranged from an address by the Presiding Bishop to the making of charts and maps by Parish Branch members. In this District also a tour of Diocesan Institutions was made. Perhaps the most unique feature of the year's work in Manhattan was in the field of foreign missions. The Rector of a certain Parish organized a group of young women who definitely did *not* believe in foreign missions. They were to *study* and *evaluate* foreign missions and report to him. The story of the "conversion" of these women makes a thrilling tale and is a perfect example of the value of missionary education.

There has been an unusual interest in the study subjects in the Junior Auxiliaries and the Evening Branches. These younger women who will live in the world of tomorrow are vitally important to Missionary work and, perhaps because their school days are comparatively recent, they have a grasp of educational methods much to be desired.

To the literal minded who demand practical results, we may tell of a wider knowledge of the general relation of Church and Community, a deliberate re-thinking of individual parish problems, plans for social and civic contacts, the aroused interest in the sewing for and the contributions to the City Mission Society. We feel that the women of the Auxiliary have learned that the Church of today may apply to the solution of its problems modern methods of survey and program—all of which leads to the new motto of the Department of Education, words which state completely its reason for being: BEFORE A CONSCIENCE CAN BE QUICKENED OR A WILL INSPIRED, THE MIND MUST KNOW.

The year of Christian Social Service work that is being completed at Ellis Island is a most significant one. In every department there has been an increase of services rendered and persons contacted. This is largely due to the unsettled conditions in Europe and our own World's Fair, both factors in bringing added hundreds of people of all nations to this country.

Of these the Refugee has presented the greatest problem. Those of the Jewish faith are well looked after by their own welfare agencies but many of the Christian Refugees fall under our Church's care. We owe much to our Chaplains at Ellis Island who minister to them spiritually. Conducting services and other offices when needed.

The regular work of meeting ships at the docks, explaining the Immigration Law and assisting those desiring citizenship has gone forward as usual, beside caring for those leaving the country either voluntarily or as deportees.

The following figures are some of the statistics of the year.

This is a fine record but it does not interpret adequately the real work done, and tells nothing of the conscientious service and devoted Christian loyalty with which Miss Palmer has carried on. She has handled the increased activity magnificently and given of herself untiringly.

This year for the first time Miss Palmer reported personally to the members of the National Executive Board and to the Diocesan Executive Board. She has also spoken at two distant meetings, one in Philadelphia and one in Manlius, New York. Thus the Ellis Island work is being brought to a wider field of Auxiliary Women.

The pledge of \$2,400 although increased over 1937 by \$200 was met in full. Out of 162 parishes 147 sent contributions toward this pledge and with the increase it has been possible for Miss Palmer to have the services of a young girl from the Chapel of the Incarnation. Her knowledge of Greek has been of great assistance in the contacts with the Greek Orthodox group who are referred to us from abroad. The same pledge of \$2,400 has been adopted for 1939 and our aim this year is 100% participation by the parishes of the diocese.

This report would not be complete without mentioning the splendid cooperation of the District Vice-Presidents and the District Representatives who keep the Ellis Island work before their parishes. As a result interest has been promoted through meetings and special programs and many donations of second hand clothing, books and games have been received.

The past year has seen momentous events occur throughout the world. Their impact on our own country is inevitable. Forces are at work trying to destroy our faith and Church. Where else is missionary effort more important than at the very gateway of our land. Here we as auxiliary women uphold our Christian Social Service work. We are proud to support it, thereby upholding our faith and striving for a better understanding and Christian fellowship between God's children of all nations.

The work we do is very much improved and we have new patterns, new materials, some new colored wools and we can save you both time and money.

Six Steamship lines and the Alaska Railway have consented to deliver our wholesale orders free of transportation charges to Puerto Rico, the Philippine Islands, Kusatsu, Honolulu, and Alaska and we are grateful for this courteous help.

The Leaflet has been sent out regularly from October to May, every month with its news, letters, and urgent requests from the Missionaries. We were pleased to have a group at Hunter College ask for sewing during Lent.

We wish to express our thanks to Dr. Gass and the Church of the Incarnation for their generous kindness in allowing us the use of their choir room for our Cutting Room, and also to the Secretary of the Committee, Mrs. T. Wyman Porter, who has so generously contributed the new patterns and necessary repairs on the cutting machines.

My annual report must pay tribute to the District Committee of sixteen who spread their time, their abilities, their enthusiasm and their loyalty over the sixty-nine active parish branches and nine affiliated groups in Manhattan and the Bronx. An Evening Branch at the Church of the Holy Nativity, a Foreign Missions Group at the Church of the Ascension, and a Group at Hunter College in the Bronx are new and composed of younger women.

Because of the subject assigned for study in 1938-1939, we, city folk, I hope, are more alive to our privileges, our dangers and our peculiarly urban problems—particularly in their relation to the Church. We have met and worshipped with the women of other Churches in two great interdenominational services. Neighborhood meetings have been sponsored by a group of branches of the Auxiliary in Lower Manhattan and by five Evening Branches in Harlem.

The Bronx District under Mrs. Gifford's wise direction continues to use the Neighborhood meeting with reports from District officers and with missionary speakers as the best method of supplementing the monthly Diocesan meetings.

The Evening Branches have held four meetings addressed by Mrs. Claude Pickens, Miss Alice G. Palmer, Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce and Dr. Grace Lindley. The Reverend Granville Mercer Williams, Superior S. S. J. E. showed his pictures and spoke on Japan. Nine Diocesan officers have been present in the course of the year.

That all women occupied during the day might have a share in the World Day of Prayer on February 24, a special service was held in the evening at the Church of the Incarnation with Mrs. Robert W. B. Elliott as leader.

A report of the activities of the past year would be incomplete without mention of the "fair shares" of the Budget Pledge for 1939 as assigned and voluntarily assumed by the parish branches of the District. Not until the fiscal year is over can we decide upon the permanent value of such a method for meeting our primary obligation.

The Annual Meeting of Orange District on May 25th was a happy event as we were privileged to share in the one hundred thirty-fifth anniversary of St. James parish, Goshen. The Rector, the Rev. Edwin R. Smythe, was the celebrant at the corporate communion and Bishop Gilbert preached the sermon. The missionary speaker at the afternoon session was the Rt. Rev. Leopold Kroll of Liberia—a former resident of Orange District.

Two neighborhood meetings in June completed our summer work. At St. John's in the Wilderness, Ramapo Mts. Captain John Pryor, church army, spoke on his work in the Southern Mts. and at Christ church, Marlborough the meeting was addressed by Diocesan officers.

Our annual officers' conference was held at Ring Lawn on September 21st. We are indeed proud that eighty officers bravely came from all over our scattered district on the long to be remembered day of wind and rain, and we are thankful that all got home safely after many adventures.

At our fall meeting on November 9th in St. Georges', Newburgh we joined the arch-deaconries of the Hudson and Ramapo. At our corporate communion the Rev. Karl Tiedemann of the Order of the Holy Cross gave us a stimulating meditation on God's plan for his children. Bishop Gilbert was the celebrant. For the afternoon, District and Diocesan officers outlined the year's work for us. The Rev. Frank Dean Gifford spoke on diocesan missions.

At 7 P. M. we met again—275 of us—auxiliary and arch-deaconries for dinner. Bishop Gilbert presided. Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce of the National Council spoke for the women of the auxiliary and the Most Rev. Henry St. George Tucker, Presiding Bishop, spoke on the world-wide mission of the church and its contribution to civilization. All of our departments have flourished this year.

Five panels on the Urban Church were held at convenient centers. Three Neighborhood Meetings with addresses on India completed our educational work. The auxiliary of Tuxedo Park again gave us the opportunity of hearing a number of our missionaries on furlough. It is impossible to estimate the benefits the hospitality of the parishes so entertaining us does for the whole work of the district. The new pledges for Christian Social Service are materially greater than last year. More of our women are members of mission sub-committees.

The United Thank Offerings are being presented on the altars of our churches before being sent to the Cathedral. We have sent all supplies allotted to us and have given our quota to the dispensary fund.

The increasing number of corporate communions, and Quiet Hours indicate our spiritual growth. The World Day of Prayer is yearly becoming more important in the lives of our women, surely showing the growing tendency towards church unity.

The Rev. Lansing G. Putman conducted a Quiet Hour for the district at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Newburgh as our Lenten preparation and at St. Georges', Newburgh in mid-Lent Canon H. Adye Pritchard lead a Quiet Hour for a large inter-denominational gathering.

In closing my final report to you as chairman of Orange District may I say what a joy it has been to me to work with my very fine district committee and to thank most cordially Bishop Gilbert, the Diocesan Board and the many friends in Orange District who have encouraged and helped me for five happy years.

Staten Island began its year confronted with an emergency caused by the resignation of its vice-presidents, Mrs. Roy Clark Hanaway. Her years of experience in various branches of Auxiliary work, and her untiring devotion to the cause, had made her a valuable officer whom we lost with regret. A farewell luncheon was given in her honor in June.

Our fall meeting was held in October at St. Mary's, West New Brighton, when Dr. Charles W. Sheerin, vice-president of the National Council, addressed us on the Forward Movement. April 25th was the date of our annual meeting, held at St. Anne's, Great Kills. Holy Communion at 11 o'clock was followed by a box luncheon eaten out of doors in the warm sunshine. After the business meeting and its reports Mrs. Hollis S. Smith, of Changshu, Diocese of Shanghai, gave a graphic account of life in rural China, the coming of the war and what it has done to Christian work, and the challenge to the Church when peace comes. 115 women were present, the offering going for dispensary supplies.

There were many changes in our department representatives this year, six out of the eight being new to their tasks, but each has carried on her work in a praiseworthy manner. Our Missions representative, Mrs. Mason Smith, has visited more than half of our branches, in her vital way telling us news from the National Council and the mission fields. Mrs. Bancroft is increasing our knowledge of the history, accomplishments and spiritual aspects of the United Thank Offering. One branch reports having doubled the number of its givers, another uses a committee of 20 to collect the offering. Supply work has increased, especially for diocesan institutions. 15 branches shared in putting Staten Island in third place on the honor roll. The Church Periodical Club reports the astounding total of nearly 26,000 items distributed in the United States and some foreign countries. In Christian Social Service there has been an increase in interest and giving. Our aim for 1939 is to have each branch and guild contribute, if only a small sum.

Our Secretary for Devotional Life read her paper on "Psychology in the Service of the Soul" before several branches and has reminded us constantly of the Forward Movement literature. Many of us observed the Quiet Day and attended World Day of Prayer services.

Our Educational Secretary, Mrs. Latham, arranged two meetings on India for the District. Each branch and group has had one or more classes on the Church in the City, with the result that pilgrimages to diocesan institutions were made by individuals, by one senior branch and by our two junior Auxiliaries. A movement is also under way to discuss the possibilities of establishing a social center for Staten Island's under-privileged children.

Our two junior Auxiliaries, composed of girls of high school age, have been very active. Under Mrs. Bridgman's direction a joint meeting is scheduled for May 7, with Sister Augusta, of Hankow, China, as speaker. We are very proud of our peppy evening branches. Throughout the District there has been a gratifying increase in the number of young women who are active.

May I thank each officer and member for her loyal support and ask your prayers that our work may continue to go forward.

The year in Westchester has been one of steady growth. The number of workers and the volume of work have increased along many lines.

The three Annual Meetings with which we began our year last May were attended by 684 women from 52 branches. Our speakers were the Rev. Claude L. Pickens, who spoke on our Church's work among the Moslems in West China, and the Rt. Rev. Robert E. Campbell, O.H.C. who spoke on the work among the Southern Mountaineers. The summer pledge amounted to \$2,904.75, an increase of about \$150 over the pledge of the year before. There has been an increase in gifts for Budget items, the United Thank Offering has increased in parishes giving every year, and there has been a large increase in the work for supplies.

Every Branch fulfilled its obligations to the District pledges, The House of Bethany and the Mission of the Good Shepherd; every Branch gave also to the summer pledge, to the work at Ellis Island, and to Budget. Our plan is to move forward together in all the work, and in this year the Branches have accomplished our aim.

192 new members are reported in 38 Branches, and 242 new contributors to the United Thank Offering in 30 Branches. So we are constantly enlarging our group of interested women.

We have one new Branch this year, a Junior Branch at St. Andrew's, Yonkers. This new Branch, our first Junior Branch, is composed of Junior High School girls who have worked as a group for two years and have now assumed responsibility for the Diocesan and District pledges, supply work, and the United Thank Offering in addition to special gifts for missions. This marks St. Andrew's, Yonkers as a most interested parish with a Day Branch, an Evening Branch, and a Junior Branch.

The number of groups of younger women and girls working for missions has also increased from 10 groups in 10 parishes to 17 groups and 1 Branch in 16 parishes. The growth of these groups has proved beyond question of doubt that where there is even one woman who is willing to give the time there is no difficulty at all in interesting younger women and girls in missionary work.

Officers' Conferences and Neighborhood Meetings were planned to reach every Branch. A special conference for supply officers was held to introduce the new Diocesan Vice-President for Supply. At the conference for general officers the Diocesan Vice-President of the United Thank Offering led special conferences. The Diocesan Vice-Presidents for Missions, Educations, and Christian Social Service have spoken at Neighborhood Meetings. The Hudson River Neighborhood Meetings were well attended and full of interest. They were addressed by Miss Sarah Reid on the work of the Church in China: by Miss Gillespie on the Patterson School, Legerwood, North Carolina: by the Rt. Rev. Robert E. Campbell, O.H.C., on St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tennessee: and by Deaconess Ramsey, on the work of the Church in Nevada. Miss Mabel Mansfield addressed two Neighborhood Meetings:

one at St. John's, Larchmont and the other at St. John's, Yonkers on the work of the Handicraft Guild in Virginia. Samples of handicraft were displayed and sold.

The District Meeting at Christ Church, Bronxville was particularly happy since, after Sister Jolly's address, the gift from the legacy of Mrs. Samuel Thorne to complete the new dining-room at the House of Bethany was announced.

This year, in each Branch, the Woman's Auxiliary was asked to make a definite plan to help the Rector carry out his Lenten program, thus strengthening the Church throughout the District. Two special devotional meetings were held to give stimulus to this plan. At St. Paul's, Ossining, the Rev. George F. Bratt, conducted a quiet hour on the Spiritual Value of Lent and at St. Bartholomew's, White Plains, the Rev. Harold Hand Donegan spoke on The Keeping of Lent.

The study of the Church in the City has aroused great interest. One group and 56 out of our 58 Branches have been visited by specially trained speakers. Books on the subject have been widely read. Programs, book reviews and classes have been held. As a supplement to our study, on April 19th, 151 women and 40 Westchester Branches went on an observation trip to some of the Church's institutions in New York City. We were able to give \$50 to the Seaman's Church Institute through the supply department and we expect a greatly increased interest will find its expression in summer work for diocesan institutions.

The Westchester Committee has had a real loss this year in the resignation of Mrs. William J. Eschbach as the District Supply Secretary. She has worked indefatigably; in the summer preparing the allotments and in the winter directing the work on them. No one could number the hours of work she has spent during the nine years she has served in this office, but we all know the high quality of her work, her faithfulness, her dependability, and her devotion. She regarded her work as above all service for her Master and gave to it her time, her ability, and herself.

The Westchester Committee and the Branches of the District have worked hard. This work together for a common purpose has strengthened the sense of unity in a common task, and we are looking forward to next year's activities with expectation.

As always we have had the privilege of attending District Annual and Neighborhood Meetings, and the monthly Diocesan Meeting; in this way keeping alive before large groups of women, not only the spiritual power of our Offering, but the beauty of the service it gives through trained, consecrated workers in all parts of the mission field. Many parishes have had special Thank Offering meetings, and the addresses and intimate contacts have brought us nearer to the goal of "every woman."

This year we celebrate our fiftieth anniversary. It is indeed a jubilee year; for looking back with humble gratitude upon what this fellowship of thankfulness has, through the leading of the Holy Spirit, already accomplished we dedicate ourselves to future years of greater service through the prayer of praise made a living testimony to our Blessed Lord by sacrificial gifts.

Constitution.

NEW YORK BRANCH WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

AS APPROVED BY THE BISHOP AND ADOPTED BY
ITS REPRESENTATIVE BODY, MAY 17TH, 1912
AND AMENDED AT THE ANNUAL MEETINGS.
MAY 8TH, 1913, JANUARY 6TH, 1920, JANU-
ARY 4TH, 1921, JANUARY 3RD, 1922, MAY 6TH,
1924, MAY 5TH, 1925, MAY 1ST, 1928, MAY
6TH, 1929, MAY 6TH, 1930, MAY 3RD, 1931,
MAY 3RD, 1932.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The Name of this Association shall be THE NEW YORK BRANCH
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the
Diocese of New York the purposes and work of the WOMAN'S AUXIL-
IARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All Churchwomen and children by virtue of their baptism are con-
sidered possible members of the Woman's Auxiliary. All those who,
in this Diocese, by their prayers, work or offerings, aid the Mission
of the Church through the National Council may become by enrollment,
actual members of the New York Branch.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this association shall be a President, twelve Vice-
Presidents, of whom three shall be Vice-Presidents at Large, five in
charge respectively of the Districts of Dutchess, Manhattan and the
Bronx, Orange, Staten Island and Westchester, and four in charge,
respectively, of the work of Missions, Education, Christian Social Serv-
ice and the Supply Department; a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary,
a Treasurer, and a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering, all of
whom shall constitute an Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—HONORARY OFFICERS.

The Executive Board may appoint Honorary Officers, subject to
confirmation by the Association.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENT.

This Constitution, having been approved by the Bishop, may be
amended with his approval by the Association at its Annual Meeting,
two-thirds of the Representatives present concurring, notice of the pro-
posed amendments, having been given at the previous meeting.

By-Laws.

ARTICLE I.—DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

SEC. 1. *President.* The President shall preside at all meetings of this Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 2. *Vice-Presidents at Large.* A Vice-President at Large shall preside in the absence of the President. The Vice-Presidents at Large shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to them by the Executive Board, and shall present written reports of their work at the annual meeting.

SEC. 3. *Vice-Presidents.* The Vice-Presidents in charge of the Districts shall be Chairmen of their respective Districts and shall endeavor to promote the formation of Parish Branches and to help and strengthen those already existing; shall consult with the Executive Board, and shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

The Vice-Presidents in charge of Missions, Education, Christian Social Service and the Supply Department shall be Chairmen of their respective Departments and shall inform the Parish Branches through correspondence, visiting or providing speakers, of the needs and work in their respective departments. They shall present at the Annual Meeting written reports of their work for the year.

Each Vice-President shall appoint such persons as she may deem necessary to assist her in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 4. *Secretary.* The Secretary shall—

- (1) Issue notice of meetings;
- (2) Keep the Minutes of the Association and of the Executive Board;
- (3) Prepare and edit the annual report, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the Association or the Executive Board.

SEC. 5. *Assistant Secretary.* The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in the performance of her duties.

SEC. 6. *Treasurer.* The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the Association and shall keep accounts thereof, and shall report to each meeting of the Executive Board and of the Association.

SEC. 7. *Treasurer—United Thank Offering.* The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall receive all contributions for the United Thank Offering, and under the direction of the Executive Board, endeavor to arouse and increase an interest in the same.

By-Laws.

SEC. 8. *Auditing Committee.* The accounts of the Treasurer of the Association and those of the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be audited annually by an Auditing Committee to be appointed by the President.

SEC. 9. *Executive Board.* The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of the Association and shall exercise all powers of the Association not herein expressly provided for. Six members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE II.—PARISH BRANCHES.

SEC. 1. A "Parish Branch" is a group of actual members of the New York Branch organized within a Parish.

SEC. 2. Each "Parish Branch" shall be entitled to send representatives to the District Meetings of the District in which it is situated, and shall be entitled at such meetings to one vote. The attendance of one or more representatives, or their proxies, from at least one third of the Parish Branches shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

SEC. 3. Each "Parish Branch" shall pay annually to the Treasurer for the Expenses of the Association a sum of money to be known as Auxiliary Dues. The amount payable by each Branch shall be determined by the Executive Board—subject to approval by the Association at the November Meeting.

ARTICLE III.—FISCAL YEAR.

The Fiscal Year of this Association shall be the calendar year.

ARTICLE IV.—MEETINGS.

SEC. 1. Meetings of the Association shall be held on the first Tuesdays of every month from November to May inclusive provided that whenever the appointed day shall fall upon a public holiday or a greater festival of the Church, the meeting may be transferred to some other day. The May meeting shall be the annual meeting.

SEC. 2. These meetings shall be open to all members of the Woman's Auxiliary, but no persons shall be entitled to vote except four delegates from each organized Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and the officers of the Association.

SEC. 3. The Secretary shall call special meetings on request of the President or five members of the Executive Board.

By-Laws.

SEC. 4. At all meetings of this Association fifty delegates shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 5. The Executive Board shall meet before each monthly meeting of the Association.

ARTICLE V.—ELECTIONS AND NOMINATIONS.

SEC. 1. The term of office of all officers shall terminate at the Annual Meeting of 1932, and at that meeting new officers shall be elected to serve as follows:

The President shall be elected for a term of three years and thereafter for terms of three years each, her election to take place at the Annual Meeting following the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Three Vice-Presidents at Large shall be elected to serve respectively for one, two, and three years, their successors to be elected on the expiration of their respective terms, for terms of three years each, so that annually after 1932 one Vice-President will be elected to serve for a term of three years.

The Vice-President in charge of Missions, the Vice-President in charge of Christian Social Service, the Vice-President in charge of the Supply Department, the Vice-President for the District of Dutchess, the Vice-President for the District of Manhattan and the Bronx, the Secretary and the Treasurer shall be elected for terms of two years each, their successors to be elected at the Annual Meeting in each alternate year thereafter for terms of two years each.

The Vice-President in charge of Education, the Vice-President for the District of Orange, the Vice-President for the District of Staten Island, the Vice-President for the District of Westchester, and the Assistant Secretary shall be elected for terms of one year each, their successors to be elected at the annual meeting of 1933 to hold office for two years and thereafter for terms of two years each.

SEC. 2. The President shall appoint each year a Nominating Committee of at least seven members, including at least one member from each District, to nominate and report to the Annual Meeting one candidate for each office to be filled that year; provided, that the Districts, at meetings of their respective representatives, shall be entitled to nominate their respective Vice-Presidents, and at least one month before the Annual Meeting to report their nominations to the Nominating Committee, and the Nominating Committee shall report to the annual meeting the nominations so received by them.

By-Laws.

SEC. 3. All officers shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting; provided that balloting may be dispensed with by a unanimous vote of the delegates. Except the President, Vice-Presidents at Large, the Treasurer for the United Thank Offering, and those elected at any time to fill unexpired terms, all officers shall hold their offices for two years and until the election of their successors. Except for the Treasurer no Diocesan officer shall be elected to the same office if her total tenure of such office shall thereby become more than six years, provided, however that service for less than a year under a vacancy appointment, as hereinafter provided for, shall not be included in computing length of tenure of office for this purpose.

SEC. 4. In case an office should become vacant before the expiration of the term, it may be filled for the balance of the year in which the vacancy occurs by appointment by the President with the advice and consent of the Executive Board, and the remainder, if any, of the unexpired term shall be filled by election at the next Annual Meeting.

SEC. 5. The Treasurer for the United Thank Offering shall be elected by ballot in accordance with the provision in *Article V.—Section 3*, at the May meeting, once every three years, in the same year as the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary. The incoming Treasurer shall assume office on November 1st of that year, but she shall be admitted to the Executive Board immediately upon election, with full voting power. The retiring Treasurer shall hold office until her successor is installed, but without vote.
