REPORT OF SECRETARY.

The Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was held in Trinity Church, Newark, on Wednesday, November 3d, 1886. The Bishop of the Diocese, with Bishops Paddock and Garrett, Rev. Drs. Schuyler and Boggs, Rev. Messrs. Reed, Granberry and Perry, were in the Chancel. The service began with the celebration of the Holy Communion. After the service, Bishop Starkey introduced Bishop Paddock, of Washington Territory, who gave a plain, straightforward account of his work and its needs, of the trials and obstacles which he had encountered and must expect for some time to come. The Bishop asked for help in his hospital and schools, estimating both as the most efficient means of obtaining a hold upon the rude population of the vicinity. He thought both peculiarly, the work of the Auxiliary, the training of girls in the Church's ways, that they, in turn, may influence fathers, brothers, husbands and children in the homes, and also minister to the needs of both souls and bodies of those far away from home and friends in the hospital.

Bishop Garrett, of Northern Texas, followed. His appeal being also for the girls' schools in his diocese, reiterating the assertion of Bishop Paddock, that the education of the young was the most important part of his work. He asked for money to establish schools and to build churches. The third speaker introduced was the Rev. Galbraith Perry, of Baltimore, whose devoted work among the colored people of that city has given him a wide reputation. Mr. Perry gave a rapid and spirited sketch of his field of labor, of the duties and obligations resting upon the Church toward this unfortunate and degraded people, of the great necessity of an early recognition of these duties. His special plea was for aid in building a place of worship. All three received aid in response to their appeal.

Bishop Starkey then invited all present to the lunch prepared by the ladies of Trinity Church in the school room of their Chapel, in Rector street, which the Auxiliary would gratefully acknowledge, it being the third time that such hospitality has been extended.

At two o'clock the business meeting was called to order by the Bishop, the President being absent from illness. There were 91 present. After a little preliminary business, Mrs. Twing, the Honorary Secretary of the Auxiliary, was presented, and in her own simple, ready, fluent manner, gave an account of Missions generally throughout our country, of some of her experiences in traveling from Maine to Colorado, of the ways and means of raising money, of the ingenuity brought in play where there was lack of both time and money, but the great love for the Church and its work overcame all obstacles. A vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Twing and also to the ladies of Trinity Parish. Thus ended the largest and most interesting Annual Meeting ever held by this Branch of the Auxiliary. The roll of the past season shows 108 members, representing 27 parishes. Two parishes have been added since our last report, Grace Church, Greenville, and St. Paul's, East Orange. Delegates from three societies of young ladies, coming from parishes already represented among us, have been added also, The Young Woman's Missionary Society of St. Luke's, Montclair; Daughters of the Church St. Matthews, Jersey City; The Helping Hand, from St. Paul's, East Orange. The Daughters of the Church, from Grace, Orange, have been represented for two years. We welcome them most cordially as those who will take our places when we shall have been called away from this scene of labor.

Four Scholarships are still supported by the Auxiliary, viz: The Bishop Odenheimer Scholarship in Jaffa, Syria, \$25.00; Scholarship in St. Paul's School, Yankton Agency, \$60.00; The Julia Starkey Scholarship, in Mrs. Hooker's Orphanage, City of Mexico, \$40.00. In Mr. Babbitt's School, Columbia, S. C., we have paid \$50.00 toward a Scholarship entitled, The Harrison Williams. \$200.00 is the cost of the whole. We hope to assume a greater portion of this the coming season.

The Directresses of the six branches of our work report as follows:

DIOCESAN.

For Diocesan Missions, the sum of \$357.00 has been reported from one parish. Owing to circumstances beyond the control of the Society, there has been less work done in this branch than in former years.

For Domestic Missions, Mrs. Holley reports one box sent to Decatur, Ill., value \$74.89; a box sent to Little Falls, Minn., value \$99.00; sent to Bishop Paddock for hospital, \$20.00; for Sister Eliza's salary, \$22.00; to Bishop Garrett, \$100.00. Total, \$315.92.

For Foreign Missions, Mrs. Niles reports \$25.00 for Bishop Odenheimer Scholarship in Jaffa, Syria; \$45.00 for St. Margaret's School in Tokio; \$7.00 towards teacher's salary. Total, \$77.00. Five Scholarships are reported through this branch supported by those in connection with the Auxiliary.

For Mexican Missions, Mrs. F. C. Henderson reports \$40.00 paid for Julia Starkey Scholarship in Mrs. Hooker's Orphanage, City of Mexico; \$3.75 for general work. There are three other Scholarships reported through this branch.

For Home Missions, to colored people, Mrs. G. H. Stirling reports one box sent to Memphis, Tenn., value \$97.55; one box sent to Langley, South Carolina, value \$46.50; one box to Columbia, S. C., value \$94.85; Bible, Prayer Book and Hymnal to colored student at Annandale, \$5.00; Scholarship in Mr. Babbitt's School, \$50.00; sent Mr. Babbitt \$25.00 for the re-building of School-house; for Colored Missions in Florida, \$5.00; for Miss Hoke's School, Lincolnton, Va., \$3.00; for education of colored girl, \$10.00. Total, \$336.90.

For Indian Missions, Mrs. C. H. Christian reports one box sent to Miss Ives, Greenwood, Dakota, value \$28.00; one box sent to Prairie City, Indian Territory, value \$45.00; Scholarship in St. Paul's School, Yankton Agency, \$60.00; sent to Bishop Hare, for "All Saints," at Sioux Falls, \$78.00; for Miss Ives' salary \$23.00. Total, \$234.00.

In addition to this, Mrs. Christian reports a number of useful articles sent without valuation.

In making a summary of our last season's work, we are glad to record an increase in our numbers and contributions, showing growth, which, if not great enough to be very remarkable, still proving that we do not stagnate nor does the interest flag. It was suggested at one of our last meetings by a member of the Auxiliary, one of the few left of the little band that came together now twelve years ago, that in watching the growth of the work and drawing lessons from experience, that nothing so conduced

to the welfare of the Society as well organized Missionary Societies in the Parish. This, of course, subject to the Rector's approval. If each parish had its own little missionary band, from which delegates could be sent to the Auxiliary meetings with a certain sum, large or small, according to the resources of the parish, this to be used at the discretion of the delegates, or those whom they represent, much more could be accomplished. Out of the six branches into which our work is divided, each delegation may choose that which commends itself to them, or in which the greater number can be interested. Time and money are needed in each. Money for Schools and Scholarships, for Hospitals and Churches. Time for the getting up of boxes, filled with useful articles, to be sent to the family of the missionary, which makes such a welcome supplement to a meagre stipend for hard and self denying labor. Boxes, the contents of which could not be bought for treble the cost here. The grateful letters received in acknowledgment bear witness to the appreciation. May we not hope then that the Reverend Clergy will attend our Annual Meetings, read our report, examine our work, (far from perfect we know,) bring those with them likely to be interested, for many are idle from lack of knowledge. Sure we are that we might in this way increase our numbers, treble our contributions, enlarge our sphere of usefulness, lighten many a burden, cheer many a despondent heart. To prove ourselves true daughters of the Holy Mother, whom it is our great privilege, as well as duty, to serve with the best gifts vouchsafed us, not forgetting that each time we kneel at her altars, "We offer ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy and willing sacrifice." May God grant that our lives may show forth what the lips utter.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be called the NEWARK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

ARTICLE II. Its object shall be to work in connection with the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE III. This Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof annually at least the sum of one dollar, or who shall render, in materials or serving, substantial aid to missions. Any one may be constituted a life-member by the payment, at one time, of the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25).

ARTICLE IV. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. There shall be, moreover, a Board of Managers, consisting of the above-named officers and of two or more ladies from each parish represented in the Association, whose duty it shall be to regulate its affairs, and, under the supervision of their rectors, to further the work of the League in the parishes to which they respectively belong. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be furthered are the raising of money for the support of missionaries and teachers; for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the mission; the making, collecting and transfer of clothing, and other material aid; and the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the different missions.

ARTICLE V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the meetings of the Association and of the Board of Managers; to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall require, and to countersign all drafts on the Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially that with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and from her to obtain fresh information of the different missions, to be read at stated meetings of the Board.

ARTICLE VII. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and Board of Managers; to send out all notices of stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an annual report.

ARTICLE VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep account of all moneys and materials contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts on the funds when countersigned by the President.

ARTICLE IX. This Constitution shall not be altered except at an annual meeting of the Association, notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS.

1. There shall be a Public Anniversary of this Association in the Autumn of each year, with missionary addresses or sermon, at which time a collection shall be made for such mission or missions as shall be designated at the time.
2. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the League in the Spring of each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with advice of the President, shall designate.
3. The election of Officers and Board of Managers shall take place at such meetings, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors are appointed.
4. In case of vacancy of any office by the death or removal of its occupant, the same may be filled at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers, and any one so elected shall continue in office until the next meeting of the Association.
5. The stated meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the second Wednesday of each month, in Trinity Chapel, Rector Street, Newark, or any other place designated.
6. At the meetings of the Board of Managers any number present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and at the Annual Meetings a number of members equal to one-half the number of parishes represented therein shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
7. Each parish shall be considered as represented at the stated meetings of the Association in the absence of their delegates if a report is sent to the Corresponding Secretary.
