

The speaker for the day was Deaconess Anna G. Newell, Principal of the Hooker School.

The speakers at the other regular meetings were: Bishop Lloyd, who told of the work of the Kuling School; Deaconess Harriet Bedell, who described her work in Alaska, and Bishop Lines, who greeted us at the October meeting with words of helpfulness and cheer.

During the summer Mrs. Stewart A. Trench, Recording Secretary, was obliged to resign; Mrs. H. W. Harmon, of Calvary Church, Summit, was elected to fill the unexpired term.

In December Mrs. Reginald H. Williams resigned as Chairman of the Department of the Devotional Life.

Six meetings of the Executive Board were held, at which all of the regular business was transacted.

Several changes in the Constitution and By-Laws have been made.

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## Report of the First Vice-President

(DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION)

In presenting the third annual report of the Vice-President in charge of Education, two points must be considered: First, what the Educational Department of the Woman's Auxiliary should accomplish, and second, how fully has this been realized. The goal which we would reach is a comprehensive one, namely, every Churchwoman in this Diocese efficiently at work for her Church because she knows its Program, and has had such deepening of her spiritual life as study, meditation, and prayer will produce.

This seems a very big thing to attain by such simple means as Missionary Calendars, THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS, Program Meetings and Speakers, Discussion Groups and Summer Conferences, and yet by just such means we have gone at least a little way toward our goal. Wherever the Calendars are used there are more women interested in, and praying for, the Church's mission; where THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS is read, increased interest and a better understanding for the campaign for the Church's Program; from Discussion Groups and Summer Schools, if not always trained leaders, certainly women willing and anxious to be trained, or at least to do their share of the Master's work.

Results can never be measured in such work as this, but in definite terms we can enumerate these: Five new Discussion Group Leaders; the Training Classes held during Epiphany in three Districts; in Lent, one Interdenominational Discussion Group (representing Newark Churches) led by a member

of this Department; 22 Discussion Groups in 21 churches in six Districts; one two-day Institute in each of the two remaining Districts; 13 attended the Princeton Summer School, representing all but one District; one of our Diocesan Leaders was a member of the faculty at Geneva and at Princeton.

Five hundred and one Calendars were sold throughout the Diocese (an increase of 200 over last year), and 300 Educational Department Programs are in use.

In October the annual training class for those who will lead District Training Classes was held under the able leadership of Mrs. Haff, of the Diocese of New York.

In addition to speakers from the Field, sent to some fifteen parishes by this Department, eight members of the Department have spoken in some twenty churches.

In December one of the smaller Newark churches placed a standing order for twenty copies of *THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS* each month.

It is perhaps interesting to note that the Discussion Groups were divided among the Districts as follows:

Five in Montclair (three Leaders provided by this Department).

Five in Morristown (two Leaders provided by this Department).

Three in Newark (two Leaders provided by this Department).

Five in Orange.

Three in Hackensack (two Leaders provided by this Department).

One in Newton.

The Calendars are divided among the Districts as follows:

My report cannot close without a word of thanks for the hearty co-operation, cordial appreciation, loyalty and devotion, which have made the work of these three years a pleasure and a privilege.

## Report of the Second Vice-President

(SUPPLY DEPARTMENT)

For the year 1923 we can truly report "progress"—a real forging ahead. To progress add enthusiasm and co-operation and you have the sum total of our year's work.

From January 1st to July 1st the parishes put all their efforts into the completion of the last allotment, and when the results were tabulated we could report a money value of \$10,500.00 for the first half of the year.

Summer, as usual, brought its emergencies, although the Spring had not been devoid of sudden calls. Ivanhoe, Virginia; Middlesboro, Kentucky; Bishop Kinsolving, of Brazil; had called and had been answered. Then came Canon Madara's plea for Alaskan babies, and the Rev'd Malcolm Taylor's plea for a schoolgirl, followed directly by the new allotment with two or three especially urgent requests to be cared for at once. The new work-year was in full stride before we knew it.

Thirteen institutions and sixty-two individuals are dependent upon our work in the new quota. The sixty-two individual boxes to be prepared will go to twenty-six missionary clergymen and their families; to thirty-two women

missionaries (in the shape of Christmas gifts, not to exceed five dollars in value), and to four catechists. The gift boxes have been named "Joy" boxes, and our share has been a great success.

The Girls' Friendly Society and the Altar Guild have lived up to their splendid reputations. The G. F. S. took care of an Arkansan Mission in the last allotment and is caring for a Virginian Mission in the new quota. The Altar Guild helped Bishop Kinsolving in his need, and answered an urgent request in behalf of Japan. No Diocese is more truly a unit in its endeavor to fulfill its obligations to the Church.

Since September 1st we have sent twenty-three personal family boxes, four catechists' boxes, and one hundred bundles of clothing or linens to the institutions allotted to us. The money value of all this is approximately \$7,800.00. Hence our total for the year is well over \$18,000.00—a good two thousand dollars ahead of our report for the calendar year 1922.

The Department has become so very active that our Diocesan Supply Secretary will, from now on, be obliged to place all institutional lists in the hands of the District Supply Secretaries. All requests for sewing or inquiries as to the needs of the institutions must go to them. This does not mean that the Diocesan officer will not answer any question put to her. It does mean that a source of information is near at hand in each District; also, that henceforth each District will be responsible for the institution allotted to it, and should feel a pride in that responsibility as well as a satisfaction in accomplishing its job.

We have found the road—let us keep it.

### Report of the Third Vice-President

(DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICE)

My first year's report must needs be indefinite, but I have endeavored to feel my way and hope soon we shall see results.

All but one District has a Social Service Secretary, and many of the parishes have appointed Social Service Secretaries.

Recreation work has been done during the summer; fruit and flowers have been distributed every week from June to September; a number of "cases" have been cared for; and in one District a decided interest has been aroused between the Juvenile Court and the Church.

Financial aid has been given to the Church Mission of Help in the Paterson District, and the expenses of Miss Day, of the Church Mission of Help, to the Washington Conference were paid. I have visited the eight Districts, and have attended the Washington Conference and the Princeton Summer School.

My plea for the coming year is for workers to study the needs and conditions of the institutions, Church and State, and to make a "point of contact" between institutions and parish, and for volunteer workers to do follow-up work and to help in the recreation work so greatly needed during the summer months.

My thanks are due to the District Directors and the Social Service Secretaries, and to the parish workers, for their co-operation and interest in this still indefinite, but appealing, "field of service."

## Department of the Devotional Life

### REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

During the past year the Chairman of the Department of the Devotional Life has had the privilege of stressing the devotional side of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary at many parish meetings, and at most of the District meetings, in Spring and Fall. The willingness to turn aside from box work, and committee meetings, to think about the needs of this side of the work, the increasing number of women pledging themselves to pray for other people's work, and the help given by many in searching out such people, has shown the importance placed on this Department.

Thirty Intercessors and six Prayer Groups, besides many not listed, are regularly using the intercessions sent out, and during the year nine calls for definite prayer have been passed on to them. Old people and shut-ins, and a woman in an attic room, rejoicing that there was still something they could do to help along God's work in the Church, rectors' prayer groups, women in the House of the Holy Comforter, and members of the House of the Good Shepherd, Sisters of the Holy Nativity, Daughters of the King, an Intercessor of the Society of the Nazarenes, high and low Churchmen, negro and white women, all have joined in one common desire, praying for the spread of the Kingdom.

Another fine piece of co-operation has been the Prayer Partnership, which as worked out in this Diocese, during the past year, linked very closely the U. T. O. and the devotional work.

At the meeting of the Auxiliary in Portland, the following resolution was adopted:

*Resolved*, That the plan for Prayer Partnership used by the Woman's Auxiliary in Canada be commended heartily for use in our own Woman's Auxiliary, and that such steps be taken by the Executive Board as will make possible its use.

This plan, which as recommended in Miss Lindley's report, we have been carrying out in our eight Districts, where each one has selected a special worker about whom it has studied, for whom it has prayed, to whom it has written and for whose prayers it has asked.

In order to co-ordinate our work still more the women chosen as Partners, as far as possible, are stationed in places where our Supply Quota is going, or for whom we are working in some other way.

District of Orange—Miss Bertha Richards.

District of Paterson—Miss Margaret Bartberger, Anvik, Alaska.  
During the year the Chairman has secured thirty subscriptions to the Church Service League Prayer Leaflet, besides many others sent directly to C. M. H. The devotions for the opening of the Newark Auxiliary Meetings have been arranged, and a Quiet Day was planned for officers and leaders of Discussion Groups in February, lead by the Rev'd Thomas A. Conover.

At the beginning of Lent a list of devotional books was sent to each Auxiliary President, with Miss Lindley's Meditations, given at Portland, and the Program for the Day of Prayer for Missions, held by women of all Denominations on the first Friday of Lent.

That more and more, during the coming year, prayer may bind our several workers, and our different departments of work together, and that the devotional life may have a greater emphasis, day by day, are some of our hopes.

"Intercession is little understood, and yet there is no sphere in which the soul that knows God can more effectively help and bless others. . . . St. Paul knew the power of Intercession when he said: 'Brethren, pray for us.' He did not think that God needed persuading by some one else to be good to him, but he did know that loving, sympathizing, healing thought, projected like wireless telegraphy vibrations from united God-inhabited hearts, were the life of God in man reaching forth to quicken and stimulate and support a brother man. . . . Many have experienced it, have been upheld in physical and mental weakness by a stream of kindly sympathy from God-inhabited hearts, radiating divine, creative energy."

"Beneath the shelter which your prayers have reared,  
Quiet and blest,  
The storm which struck me down no longer feared,  
Secure I rest."

May we not all use the prayer of the Intercessors.

O Lord, I pray thee, make me a living member of Thy Kingdom, finding ways to serve Thee by intercession, that I may strengthen thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

"There shall be created an Emery Fund for Missionaries Home on Furlough, to be given over to the Board of Missions or their successors, to be for all time a Trust Fund, the interest of which shall be used for women missionaries on furlough in such way as the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary or its successors shall approve." [From the Minutes of the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held in Detroit, Michigan, October, 1919.]

In connection with this Fund the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Newark established a Book of Remembrance.

In it may be recorded the names of former diocesan officers, and those women no longer living, who in parish branches have served the Auxiliary and Church in their day and generation. The sum of five dollars, which accompanies the name, is sent to the Emery Fund at the Church Missions House.

The Book of Remembrance was presented with the Emery Fund on October 5, 1921.

One name has been placed in the Book of Remembrance during the year of 1923, and five dollars was sent to the Emery Fund from Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge.

### United Thank Offering of 1925

*Resolution adopted in Portland, Oregon.*

*Resolved*, That the United Thank offering of 1925 be given to the Presiding Bishop and Council for the work of women in the mission field whose appointment has been approved by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, including the training, sending and support of women workers, and the care of such workers when sick or disabled; *provided*, that one-tenth of the Offering be set aside and added to the permanent trust fund to be invested and administered by the Presiding Bishop and Council, the income to be applied to the support of retired United Thank Offering workers; also, *provided*, that the sum of not less than \$25,000.00 be devoted to the erection, completion, or

renewal of a building or buildings approved by the Presiding Bishop and Council on the recommendation of the Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions and the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary.

*Resolved*, That to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves or of their substance to the work of the Master in the Mission field.

The Kuling School was founded by the Episcopal and Presbyterian Mission Boards, some five years ago, for the education of the children of the one thousand missionaries of central China. While designed primarily for them, it also serves the children of western business men, consuls and customs officials. The completion of the Hankow-Canton Railway will soon make it available to the missionaries of the semi-tropical southern provinces, to whom it should be an even greater boon.

The greatest need of the School, however, is for a supporting constituency to provide annually the money needed for maintenance. This year the trustees must raise \$12,000 for this purpose, in addition to the appropriations of the two boards.

A delegate was sent to the Summer School, at Princeton, and she reported at the Fall Meeting in a most interesting manner.

The Social Service Department works steadily all year, and under Mrs. Livingston Lewis, of Trinity Church, Hoboken, and Miss Louise Elliott, of St. Stephen's, Jersey City, much has been accomplished. Each month candy is sent to the dear old men and women at our County Home and personal visits of cheer made. The dry summer interfered with a definite policy which is postponed until next year.

The U. T. O. Custodian, Mrs. Kuncken, of St. John's, West Hoboken, reports steady progress, with more women showing interest in the "Little Blue Box."

There is a splendid spirit of co-operation and interest in the Jersey City District and with the motto "Carry On" in our hearts, and the close sympathy and willing help of all the Diocesan officers, we believe that each year will prove more inspirational and effective.

### THE DISTRICT OF MONTCLAIR

The Montclair District consists of three large churches, four small churches and four missions.

The Spring Meeting, held at St. James', Upper Montclair, was addressed by all the Diocesan officers. Mr. Sherman, of China, spoke on the Kuling School.

The Fall Meeting was held at St. Luke's, Montclair. Bishop Stearly was the speaker, and group meetings were held under the Diocesan officers after the business meeting.

Every month an Executive Committee meeting is held. This consists of the six District officers, the President of the Woman's Auxiliary, and one other delegate from each of the churches. At this time the Director passes on information received at the Diocesan Executive Committee meetings, gives notices, etc. The District officers and the Auxiliary Presidents give a report of their work. Some Branch of the work, such as the W. U. T. O., Comfort Club, Educational Supply or Social Service Department, is made a "special" at each meeting and the head of that work in each church is asked to be present and report. In this way we are kept in touch with one another, and get new ideas. At the close of the business hour, tea is served, and we meet socially and become better acquainted.

In the Spring the Educational Department had study classes in six of the churches, obtained eighteen speakers for meetings, and has sold many books and calendars. Shortly before Easter a play, entitled "The Little Blue Box," was given in the parish house of Christ Church, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge. It was designed to display the spirit of the W. U. T. O. and was most beautifully rendered. In the Fall, Dr. Tyson gave a course of lectures in St. Luke's, Montclair, which were attended by most of the members of all the churches.

The Supply Department sent clothing, valued at \$603.89, to the Industrial School for Boys in Covington, Virginia; St. Mary's, at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and the Virgin Isles. Linen Showers brought \$153.56. In June, a large box of surgical dressings was sent to St. Andrew's Hospital, Wusih, Kiangsu, China, by the Surgical Dressings Branch of St. Luke's Auxiliary. The same group is now busy on an assignment for the American Church Mission Hospital, in China, and report over four thousand dressings finished at this date. Nine boxes of used clothing have been shipped, and three personal Christmas boxes were valued at \$1,169.40. I wish it were possible to give the report of the Social Service Secretary word for word, but the nature of the work makes that impossible. Many friendly visits have been made, hospital care given and comfortable clothing provided for those in need.

In July, St. Agnes' Church, Little Falls, gave a wonderful picnic to thirty-eight children from Jersey City.

The W. U. T. O. is growing, and plans are being made to bring the "Little Blue Box" to all women.

Besides our regular Missionary work, we strive constantly to help one another. In June, every Auxiliary joined in sending a box of useful and fancy articles to one of our missions, which was holding a bazaar for their building fund, and one or more of the District officers have attended the sales through the District.

The work under the new United Thank Offering Custodian is progressing nicely, and she reports that nine churches contribute.

Two District meetings have been held—the Annual Meeting, in April, at St. John's Church, Boonton, at which Deaconess Harriet Bedell, of Alaska, was the speaker, and one in October in Calvary Church, Summit, at which the speaker was the Rev'd Charles T. Bridgeman, of the Foreign-Born Division, Board of Missions.

Since our last report a new parish has been organized in Mountain Lakes, an outgrowth of St. John's parish, Boonton, and the District most heartily welcomes this addition to its number, feeling assured of many earnest workers.

#### THE DISTRICT OF NEWARK

The women of the twenty-one parishes, now in the District of Newark, have worked through the various departments of the Auxiliary with the following results:

**EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT**—The District elected Miss Mary Biller, of St. John's Church, Newark, as Secretary of the Educational Department of the District. Due to illness, Miss Biller has been forced to resign. Any requests for speakers or leaders for discussion groups in the various parishes should now be sent to Mrs. William F. Hobbie, jr., 148 Milford Avenue, Newark, or to the District Directress, and these requests will gladly be taken care of for the parishes.

The Normal Class for leaders was well attended and gave us two new leaders. Three of our parishes had Discussion Groups following this.

There were requests for speakers from ten of our parishes.

It is of interest to note here that one of our leaders was requested by an interdenominational group to conduct a class on Dr. George Hayne's book, "The Trend of the Races." This was attended very well and our Church was well represented.

There has been a slight increase in the sale of the Missionary Calendars over last year. Here I should like to say that St. Philip's Church, Newark, has ordered twelve copies of *THE SPIRIT OF MISSIONS* a month. This is the largest increase in the circulation of this paper in any parish in the Newark District.

**SUPPLY DEPARTMENT**—Up to the present, eight of our parishes have reported their Fall work completed. Requests for more work have come in, and other parishes which are still to be heard from have taken work. After the New Year there will be a new assignment of work. It is to be hoped that the parishes will respond readily.

**SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT**—In the Fall, our Secretary for this branch of the work co-operated with the Bureau of Social Service of this city, and planned an outing for sixty children. Although these plans could not be carried through, the Social Service Bureau was eager to work in co-operation with our Church, and it is to be hoped that when the Diocesan Social Service work is completely organized, there will be plenty of co-operation between these two agencies. It is the desire of the District officers that every parish, that possibly can, will go on record as a willing helper when either of these agencies may call.

**UNITED THANK OFFERING**—There has been no increase in the number of parishes having Blue Boxes. Fifteen out of our twenty-one parishes are contributors, with five hundred and ten women contributing.

We are glad to report an increase in our returns. Last year the amount was \$881.54 and this year the amount was \$931.51, up to date. Some parishes give twice a year, and this will raise the figure in January.

Our two District meetings were held in April and October respectively. The Spring Meeting was held at Grace Church, Nutley, with a large attendance. Miss Seaman, from Liberia, was the speaker. The Fall Meeting at St. Thomas's Church, Newark, was not so well attended, due to very bad weather, but those who attended, representing ten parishes, were very fortunate in hearing Mr. Baker from California.

If it were not for the various officers in the District of Newark, the Distress would not be able to render this report. The work has gone on through the efforts of these women, and it is with grateful appreciation of their work that this report is submitted.

#### THE DISTRICT OF NEWTON

Two District meetings have been held during the year. The Spring Meeting was held at St. Luke's, Phillipsburg, on June 7th. Five parishes were represented and reported on their work. Mrs. Charles H. Boynton, President of the Diocesan Auxiliary, spoke on Administration; Mrs. Porter, on Social Service; and Mr. Leidt, on Missions, told of the schools and hospitals in Japan. The Fall Meeting was held at Eagles Nest Farm, Delaware, on October 11th, with a good attendance from many of the parishes. Miss Mary Morford had charge of the devotional services, after which Mrs. Boynton spoke on Supply, Social Service, and the Japanese disaster. Mrs. Brown, Treasurer, spoke on the budget, after which the Rev'd George H. Young, of St. Peter's, Washington, told us of what had been done at Eagles Nest Farm during the past summer.

There was an earnest effort made to send a delegate to the Summer School at Princeton this year; none was found that was free to go. It is hoped some one will be able to attend during the summer of 1924.

My thanks are due to all those members of the auxiliaries and guilds who have helped to make my work a pleasure and so worth while—without their co-operation little could have been accomplished.

#### THE DISTRICT OF PATERSON

There has been a steady gain in the interest and work of the women of this District, and the fact that we report smaller numbers in the work of the Supply Department is due to a change in the character of the work, and not to a lessening in the effort and willingness of the women who are doing it.

Last Spring 513 garments were completed and one personal box sent at a total value of \$814.35; guilds of sixteen churches having taken part in the sewing. This Fall eight guilds have been sewing and seven more have taken sewing to do after Christmas, while two or three others hope to sew for us during Lent.

Last year three churches paid for their own materials.

This Winter six have paid for all their materials and one church has paid for half.

Six churches have paid their contributions to the Budget.

The Educational Secretary arranged a District Conference in St. Mark's Church, Paterson, in the Spring, and is planning for another to be held soon. We are happy to report that four women went from this District to the Princeton Summer School.

In fifteen parishes the women are working for the U. T. O.

The Comfort Club has increased its membership greatly in several of the parishes. Christ Church, Ridgewood, has 105 members; St. Paul's, Paterson, has about 90, Miss Evans' Sunday School class (33 members) having joined in a body, also, St. Margaret's Guild (15 members). Some other parishes are showing renewed enthusiasm for the Comfort Club.

Some parishes, which have not before been able to help in any of the Auxiliary work, are doing splendidly this year. Among these, Christ Church, Wortendyke, is taking hold especially well.

Social Service work is being started in some of our parishes, in several of which Mrs. G. W. Wilson, Paterson's Social Service Worker, has spoken. St. Clement's Church, Hawthorne, has been particularly active in this work for years.

The Spring District Meeting was held in St. Clement's Church, Hawthorne, with women from eleven parishes present. Our Diocesan officers gave short addresses. Miss Emily Seaman spoke on Liberia; Mrs. John Hawes gave a blackboard talk on "The Parish Guild and the Auxiliary," and the playlet, "Two Days at Princeton," furnished by the Educational Department, concluded our meeting, and was perhaps the reason for our being able to report that four women went to Princeton in July.

The Fall Meeting was held in St. Luke's Church, Lake View, Paterson, with ten parishes represented. Following the Diocesan officers, Mrs. Wilson spoke on "The Church Mission of Help." Mrs. John Moore spoke on "The American Hospital in China," and the Rev'd Mr. Andrews, of Japan, on the "Earthquake and its Consequences."

All Saints' Church, Glen Rock, has kindly offered us its church for a meeting which we are planning for January, as we have decided to have three District Meetings this year. St. Elizabeth's, a chapel of St. Bartholomew's, Hohokus, is our youngest and newest worker, and we are looking forward to much help from that rapidly growing parish and its guilds when it gets a little more firmly established, and from the rest of our parishes, which space does not permit me to mention.

# Constitution

## NEWARK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

### ARTICLE I.—NAME

This Society shall be called the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

### ARTICLE II.—OBJECT

The object of this Society shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Newark the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

### ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP

The membership of this Society shall be composed of all women, and parish organizations of women, actively engaged in carrying out its object.

### ARTICLE IV.—EXECUTIVE BOARD

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering, who, together with the District Directors and Chairmen of Committees, shall constitute the Executive Board.

### ARTICLE V.—AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at any regular meeting, *provided, however,* that notice of such amendment has been given, in writing, to the organization in each parish, at least one month previously.

# By-Laws

### ARTICLE I.—MEETINGS

Section 1. There shall be four regular meetings of the Auxiliary during the year, to be held on the first Wednesday of the months January, March, May and October.

Sec. 2. The meeting in January shall be the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 3. The President shall call at least four regular meetings of the Executive Board each year, which shall be held on the first Wednesday of the month.

Sec. 4. Eight shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Executive Board.

### ARTICLE II.—DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Board; to call special meetings; and to have a general supervision of the work.

Sec. 2. The first Vice-President shall represent the Department of Education.

Sec. 3. The second Vice-President shall represent the Supply Department.

Sec. 4. The third Vice-President shall represent the Department of Social Service.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct all correspondence of the Auxiliary and to send out all notices. She shall also be the Custodian of the Emery Fund, and the Book of Remembrance.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep the Minutes of all meetings of the Auxiliary, and of the Executive Board, and present a report at the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep all moneys contributed, and to disburse the same; exclusive of the Emery Fund and the United Thank Offering.

#### ARTICLE III.—COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be the following committees: Publicity, Finance.

Sec. 2. The President, with the approval of the Executive Board, shall appoint the Chairmen of Committees.

#### ARTICLE IV.—ELECTIONS

Section 1. Elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 2. At the Annual Meeting in January, 1922, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a President, and a Corresponding Secretary, to serve for three years or until their successors shall have been chosen. There shall also be elected a first, second and third Vice-President, to serve for two years; a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian, to serve for one year.

At the Annual Meeting in January, 1923, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian, to serve for three years or until their successors shall have been chosen.

At the Annual Meeting in January, 1924, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a first, second and third Vice-President, to serve for three years or until their successors shall have been chosen.

All officers shall take office the May following their election, except the Treasurer, who shall take office immediately upon election.

#### ARTICLE V.—DELEGATES TO THE TRIENNIAL CONVENTION

There shall be five delegates to the Triennial Convention, nominated by the Executive Board, and elected by the Auxiliary, with the approval of the Bishop.

#### ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENTS

Amendments to these By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting, provided previous notice has been given in writing to members.

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#### SUGGESTIONS FOR DISTRICTS

Districts shall elect their own officers.

District Directors shall be elected for three years, and are members of the Executive Board.
