

President's Letter

Dear Friends:

I want, first of all to thank you for your patience and consideration during my months of illness.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese can report growth this year in members, work and good spirit. The monthly meetings at Trinity House, Newark, have been exceedingly well attended. The District Meetings were well attended and interesting. The delegates to the Convention who brought us back such stirring messages were listened to with much appreciation and invited to speak in many parishes afterwards. It is calculated that over one thousand women have heard the messages from the Triennial Meeting on "Family Life," "Interracial Relations," "International Relations," "Economic Conditions" and "Religious Thinking Today."

It is an inspiring challenge to the women of the Church to call them to the study of such themes. Every intelligent, fairminded woman ought to be anxious to discuss such questions as "How we can improve family life in our land?" "What is the Christian attitude towards Jews, Germans, Italians and Colored people?" "What should be America's attitude towards other nations?" "Can capital and labor ever get along together?" "Can fathers and sons think the same things about religion today?"

Two things I am especially anxious that we should plan for the coming three years. (1) To make a real attempt to plan for the younger women in our parishes. This involves thought and careful planning and a willingness to share on the part of the older members. (2) Can we not have more evening branches? There are a few flourishing ones made up of women who are in business, and we often forget how much they may feel they have little chance to help in the work of the Church.

How can we increase our membership? We must find ways to make the Church's work seem worthwhile to women and make them know what they are working for and whether it is needed. The Auxiliary offers work that is worthy of your best.

"And a certain lawyer stood up and tempted him saying, And who is my neighbor?" And the Master told the story of the Good Samaritan and ended—"Which one of these, think ye, was neighbor to him who fell among thieves?" "He that had mercy on him." Geography did not come into the question—only the man's need and the willing effort to meet it.

General Convention at Denver, 1931

Results of Discussions of Women's Groups

The delegates of the Woman's Auxiliary, in Triennial Meeting, have come together with the realization that the world is sadly perplexed by problems that it knows not how to solve.

We know that the "fields are white to the harvest"; our urgent concern is how we may best prepare ourselves to share in the gathering of that harvest.

Our desire to fulfill the "Great Commission" may well be as keen as that of any other generation of Churchwomen but the difficulties to be met seem greater than ever before and far beyond our apparent resources to meet them.

It is because of the unusual nature of these problems that a special effort has been made through instruction and discussion groups to provide every delegate with such information as may lead to a better understanding of the whole task of the Church in relation to modern life.

As a result of the work done it is possible now to set forth what may confidently be regarded as a cross section of the thinking of the delegates to this meeting. And it is our prayerful hope that the conclusions at which we have arrived may form the basis upon which the women of the whole Church may build their own program of study and work.

The subjects that have been under discussion in these groups are: Family Life; Property and Economic Conditions; Interracial Contacts; International Relations; and Religious Thinking Today.

Each of these themes has a direct bearing upon the individual Christian life, and as well seeks to provide the individual with such knowledge and understanding of the subject as will best fit her for the fulfillment of her Christian mission to her family, to society, and to the world.

The beginnings here made are rich in promise. It is not too much to believe that the effect of them will be cumulative.

If the problems are great, so also is our faith great. If the world is dismayed and weighed down by its burdens and perplexities, we have God as our Guide and Helper. The world's material adversity is the Church's spiritual opportunity.

And however difficult it may be to find just what course to pursue as we face the unique challenge of our time, we take comfort in the knowledge that there is no service we can perform that is equal to a simple, direct witnessing to our faith in our Lord Jesus Christ; the acceptance of whose Lordship provides the only solution for the vexing problems and heavy tasks of men and of nations.

Date all letters, give the name of your Parish Guild or Auxiliary, state which class in the Budget you have selected. Sign your name, adding married name and address, or, if unmarried, write (Miss) in parenthesis.

Simple but systematic accounts should be kept, and a financial statement rendered at each business meeting. Have bank books balanced once a month, all vouchers filed, and accounts audited once a year.

Keep your Rector informed of all payments that apply on your Parish Quota.

Annual Reports

Education

The work of the Educational Department has gone forward with gratifying results. Books have been distributed and Parish Lending Libraries have been enlarged or formed.

The Bible Class under the inspiring leadership of Mrs. William Hemans Smith met at Christ Church, East Orange. This year we studied the New Testament.

Classes held, 25; Subjects, 2; India and the Bible; Training Class, 1; Intensive Days, 4; Leaders, 15; Missionary Calendars sold, 175; Money for Scholarships, \$50.00; Gifts of Study Classes given to Advance Work Program, \$149.35.

The Spring Rally was held at St. James' Church, Upper Montclair. Short reports of Educational plans were made by Mrs. Ernest Pulsford, Mrs. Robert Trenbath, Mrs. Lloyd Robinson and Mrs. Reginald Williams. These reports were followed by an address on "Why We Have Missions" by the Rev. Arthur Sherman, Secretary for Missionary Education to the National Council.

Miss Margaret Marston, head of the Educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary, conducted four sessions of the Leaders' Training Class. Two others were led by Mrs. Hutchison and Mrs. Williams.

The year of the Triennial is always one of great interest to Auxiliary members. Your Delegates to the Convention have spoken at many District and Parish meetings in an endeavor to bring to such groups the magnitude of the work the Church has before it. In these days of economic depression and physical distress the Church, through its program—as laid down in Denver—is blazing a new trail.

In thinking over the year's work we have much for which to be thankful. We have splendid women who are willing and glad to help carry out the Educational program, members of Parishes who are eager to learn more of the Church's work, speakers on special subjects who bring a message from the Mission fields, and others who tell us of our Social Service activities.

Steadily the work goes on, and every year sees an "increase in knowledge" among the members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

National Supply

During 1931 the National Supply Department has carried on splendidly all over the Diocese.

It has outfitted two hospitals—St. Andrew's, Wusih, China, and the Brent Hospital, Zamboanga, Philippine Islands; three Missions—St. Cyprian's Mission, New Berne, N. C., Quebrada Limon, Ponce, Porto Rico, and the Pine Ridge Mission, South Dakota; and four schools—the Hooker School, Mexico City, St. Elizabeth's School, Wakpala, S. D., The Okolona Industrial School, Okolona, Miss., and St. Mary's-on-the-Mountain, Sewanee, Tenn.

These, with other smaller allotments, make the total value of the boxes sent to

One hundred and one Parishes have participated in this work, two of whom are helping for the first time.

Thirty-eight branches of the Girls' Friendly Society also contributed to this total.

There have been a larger number of changes among the nine District Supply Secretaries than usual during the year, and we sorely miss those who have gone from the work, but the new officers have taken up their duties in a splendid spirit, and the work goes forward.

Social Service

During 1931 the number of Parishes reporting Social Service activities has increased. Fifty-one Parishes have reported. The District of Montclair leads with one hundred per cent reporting Social Service work of some kind and the District of Hackensack is a very close second. Every District has one or more Parishes doing and reporting some kind of Social Service work. The work accomplished has included the giving of Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets and dinners to those in need, the care of aged women, families in need, paying for a patient in St. Luke's Hospital, money to local institutions and agencies, money and surgical dressings to local hospitals, money to visiting nurse for her work. Several Parishes reported that their Social Service work was done through the giving of money to their local organizations whenever called upon to do so.

There were twenty-five summer picnics with 1,067 children and grown-ups taken care of for a day. Two of the nurseries in Newark were added to our list of organizations from whom we get our children for these outings. We also helped with buses for the recreation of the children from Christ Church in Newark.

Our new work this year was done by the women of St. Peter's in Essex Fells; St. James', Upper Montclair, and Christ Church, Short Hills. They gave a hundred dollars to the Social Service Bureau of Newark for the care at camps for four needy children. The Department has given \$125.00 to the Social Service Bureau this year for this work. Nine children have been helped thereby.

One hundred and twenty-seven Christmas stockings were filled for the Organized Aid in Jersey City. Two hundred and forty-six Christmas stockings were filled and given by the women of the District of Montclair for the Parental Home for boys and other needy ones in the District of Montclair.

In answer to the request from the Verona Sanitorium, eighteen women from the Montclair District volunteered and have given helpful service to the Verona Sanitorium.

Through the help of some members of our department about a hundred and fifty dollars have been given to The Church Mission or Help.

Diocesan Supply Department

Established in the Diocese of Newark are a number of institutions and agencies for the carrying forward of the Church's work—fulfilling its obligations to the people of our Diocese. It is the privilege of this department to act in the capacity of a Supply and Emergency Service for these Diocesan Responsibilities.

All regular needs are allotted to the districts, and emergency calls are cared for from the funds in the hands of the Treasurer. All of which shows that without such splendid and generous cooperation nothing at all could be accomplished, and our various Church responsibilities would of necessity be sadly neglected.

This year the usual linens, clothing and miscellaneous articles have reached their designated destinations; and the dues and donations have gone from parishes to the Treasurer as directed. The districts have in most instances filled their quotas, two far exceeding theirs, which made up for the deficit in others. The total value of the articles and labor in making amounts to \$3,000; and over \$1,500 was sent through to our Treasurer. This report represents 96 parishes. Unquestionably much is sent which is not reported through this department—both of miscellaneous articles and money. Each of the districts aided 6 or 7 of the institutions and agencies designated.

Reports of District Directors

District of Englewood

This District of Englewood is made up of eighteen parishes and missions, fourteen of whose guilds and missions have some share in the work of the Church outside of their own parishes, through the Budget, the National Supply Department, which assists the general missions, and the Diocesan Supply Department that aids the institutions within our Diocese of Newark. The United Thank Offering is a popular form of giving in most of the parishes.

In two parishes Quiet Days have been held, while two other guilds have had the intellectual and spiritual stimulus of mission study discussion groups. Others are planning to follow their example. Two others have Bible classes and one a personal religion class. The two district meetings give a chance for the clergy and guild members to have a first hand contact with some of the missionaries one reads about in the *Spirit of Missions*. More people are taking advantage of the inspiration of hearing them speak at the monthly diocesan meeting held in Trinity Parish House, Newark, the first Wednesday of each month at ten o'clock. The district officers gave the skit, *Tools*, three times in the interest of the Advance Work Program.

Our Social Service work includes three picnics given for the children from the Organized Aid in Jersey City, and Christmas stockings filled for the same society.

Five parishes have *Spirit of Missions* secretaries and we hope that this work will grow. In one church, all the Sunday School teachers receive this magazine regularly, and many people are passing on their copies to other people.

District of Hackensack

The District of Hackensack is comprised of nineteen parishes and missions. The number of Guilds participating in the Auxiliary work is increasing each year.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT—Increased interest in this department is shown by a larger number of subscribers to the *Spirit of Missions* and the sale of more calendars. In many instances study groups have been formed and carried to a successful conclusion. One Guild holding weekly meetings, devotes one meeting each month to a program, at which a speaker informs the members on mission and Auxiliary work. Each year a delegate is sent to the Summer school.

SUPPLY DEPARTMENT—Eighteen Guilds have taken an active part in the work of this department, and have responded generously to requests for used clothing, and for personal boxes.

SOCIAL SERVICE—In 1931, eight picnics were given for the children from Jersey City, and all but two parishes took the Christmas stockings to fill. In 1930, the district had a 100% record for these stockings. Many Guilds do sewing for local institutions. Generous support is given to the Church Mission of Help, as well as to the poor and needy.

DIOCESAN SUPPLY—Requests from this Department are met promptly by most of the Guilds.

U. T. O.—The number of women taking an active part in this Offering is increasing each year, and the little Blue Boxes are distributed in every parish. The sums presented the past two years have been very substantial.

Hackensack District has an active secretary for each of the departments of the Auxiliary work. The spring and fall meetings are well attended. The clergy of more than half the parishes attended the meeting in the fall of 1931.

District of Jersey City

The Jersey City District comprises eighteen parishes and three Missions. Seventeen Auxiliaries and twenty-three other organizations of women have done our work.

Two District meetings were held in 1931, one at Grace Church, Union City, and one at Trinity Church, Hoboken. The executive board of the District has had two meetings.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT—Ten parishes bought calendars, eighteen had speakers, and fifteen bought study books on India. There was one District and one parish study class. Two parishes presented Missionary sketches.

SPRIT OF MISSIONS—There were 330 copies of this magazine sold, and ninety-five subscriptions taken.

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT—The entire District cooperated in helping the needy of our parishes, filled Christmas stockings, and assisted local welfare agencies.

NATIONAL SUPPLY DEPARTMENT—All parishes responded generously in filling our quota.

DIOCESAN SUPPLY DEPARTMENT (Comfort Club)—Nineteen parishes contributed supplies and money for Diocesan institutions. Three parishes made 176,892 surgical dressings.

UNITED THANK OFFERING—Twenty parishes have custodians, many booklets have been distributed, and the number of contributors is increasing.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB—We have an active Secretary and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

One Quiet Day and one Day of Prayer were held in the District.

Miss Louisa Elliot, who was serving her second term as Director, was obliged to resign January 1, 1931, because of ill health. Her resignation was accepted with the deep regret of the District. Anything that has been accomplished during the past three years has been due to her untiring and unselfish devotion, and we will long miss the inspiration of her leadership.

District of Paterson

The District of Paterson can report no special gains or achievements for the year except that there is a growing sense of relationship with the Diocese within the more active parishes. It seems almost peculiarly true of this district that each parish is so definitely a social, economic or geographic unit (sometimes all three) that there is lacking the stimulus of friendly rivalry.

While there are six parishes in the city of Paterson, for instance, one is a Mission, three have been greatly affected by the removal of parishioners to the suburbs and by other elements of changing population and only one really strong parish is able to make a conscious effort to maintain Auxiliary standards.

Rearranged according to Auxiliary standards the twenty-three parishes of Paterson District resolve into thirteen active parishes, five doing some Auxiliary work, two almost necessarily self centered, three Missions and four parishes where for one reason or another the Auxiliary program has not as yet been supported.

So that the year's report of district meetings—fine in spirit and attendance; the Diocesan U. T. O. presentation service at St. Paul's, Paterson, last May; \$549.93 in garments; \$102.97 in money for the Comfort Club; about \$450 in value in work for Supply Department; generous social service programs; support of Auxiliary budget and five Bible study classes must be fairly credited to thirteen parishes and not scattered over 23. And lack of Auxiliary Program is no discredit to the other ten. The District Secretaries have been faithful and their cooperation earnestly offered. The increasing consciousness of the Auxiliary in the thirteen active parishes is a tribute to the earnest endeavors of the District Secretaries.

Constitution

NEWARK BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL

ARTICLE I.—NAME

This Society shall be called the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT

The object of this Society shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Newark the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP

The membership of this Society shall be composed of all women, and parish organizations of women actively engaged in carrying out its object.

ARTICLE IV.—EXECUTIVE BOARD

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering, who, together with the District Directors and Chairmen of Committees, shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at any regular meeting, *provided, however,* that notice of such amendment has been given, in writing, to the organization in each parish, at least one month previously.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I.—MEETINGS

Section 1. There shall be a regular meeting of the Auxiliary during the year, on the first Wednesday of each month from October to May, inclusive, except December.

Sec. 2. The meeting in January shall be the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 3. The President shall call at least four regular meetings of the Executive Board each year, which shall be held on the first Wednesday of the month.

Sec. 4. Eight shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Executive Board.

ARTICLE II.—DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Board; to call special meetings; and to have a general supervision of the work.

Sec. 2. The first Vice-President shall represent the Department of Education.

Sec. 3. The second Vice-President shall represent the Supply Department.

Sec. 4. The third Vice-President shall represent the Department of Social Service.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct all correspondence of the Auxiliary and to send out all notices. She shall also be the Custodian of the Emery Fund, and the Book of Remembrance.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep the Minutes of all meetings of the Auxiliary, and of the Executive Board, and present a report at the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep all moneys contributed, and to disburse the same; exclusive of the United Thank Offering.

ARTICLE III.—COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be the following committees: Publicity, Finance, Auditing.

Sec. 2. The President, with the approval of the Executive Board, shall appoint the Chairmen of Committees.

ARTICLE IV.—ELECTIONS

Section 1. Elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 2. At the Annual Meeting in January, 1922, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a President, and a Corresponding Secretary, to serve for three years or until their successors shall have been chosen. There shall also be elected a first, second and third Vice-President, to serve for two years; a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian, to serve for one year.

At the Annual Meeting in January, 1923, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian, to serve for three years.

At the Annual Meeting in January, 1924, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a first, second and third Vice-President, to serve for three years.

“No officer shall serve for more than two consecutive terms.” (A term is understood to be the major portion of three years.)

All officers shall take office the May following their election, except the Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian, who shall take office immediately upon election.

ARTICLE V.—DELEGATES

There shall be five delegates to the Triennial Convention, nominated by the Executive Board, and elected by the Auxiliary, with the approval of the Bishop. Delegates to all other meetings shall be elected by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENTS

Amendments to these By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting, provided previous notice has been given in writing to members.

Suggestions for Districts

Districts shall elect their own officers.

District Directors shall be elected for three years, and are members of the Executive Board.
