President's Letter

My dear Friends,

The year 1934 is one we look back on with mingled feelings. It has been a difficult year, and yet we have found some blessings amid the difficulties. That, I think, is the experience of most of us. And it is the experience also of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. We regret to have to report that our gifts of money for the Church's general work have fallen off as compared with last year but we can rejoice and be thankful that the interest of the women of the diocese has been as keen as ever and that the branches have made great efforts to prevent the much needed work from falling short. Attendance at all meetings has been good. The average number at the monthly meetings in Newark was 141. One District Director gives, as the outstanding note for the year, that "the women have carried on in spite of adverse conditions and discouragements." May it not be that God is teaching us that there are other things His Church's work needs from us besides money?

This is a time, I think, to emphasize that some of the most important aspects of the Woman's Auxiliary are those that do not call for money at all. I am referring, of course, to the educational and informative activities. Is not this a period when we could put a great deal more time and attention on the Church's relation to the world problems that are facing us all and to giving time to talks and lectures, study and Bible classes to help us all to see better our relations to them as Christ's disciples and His Body? It is still true that a large proportion of the people in our churches are very ignorant about the efforts their church is making, as a body, to represent Christ in the world beyond the walls of their own parish churches. As an Auxiliary, it should be our aim to change this.

This part of our work is also one which can be made to appeal to the intelligent younger women, college graduates in many cases, who you find it so difficult to interest in sewing. Let us give it a larger place in our branch programs.

In the year 1934 we kept up our Supply work splendidly. The value of missionary boxes and supplies sent to schools, missions and hospitals outside the diocese was \$1,400 above last year. Within the diocese, one hundred and twenty-five branches helped and the value was about \$5,000.

The Social Service Department has a particularly interesting report, in which the practical and the intelligent sides I have been speaking of are nicely blended. Do read it!

The United Thank Offering, while smaller than three years ago, kept up as well or better than the average throughout the country. Start now, at the beginning of the Triennium to enlist more women in it, especially those not in our regular guilds, the younger women, business women, and those who do not come out to meetings. See that they are included and understand.

May I suggest a thought for the year? It is this. If we are doing work for God, we can remember that we are not alone, He is working with us. As Wendell Phillips said, "One, on God's side is a majority."

And we might take as a motto the words of Zechariah, "Not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts."

Objectives

- b. Furthering the response of parishes to the needs in their own communities.
- c. A better understanding of the great social problems of our day.

5. SPIRITUAL

- a. Every parish and mission represented at the Diocesan Quiet Day.
- b. Every woman in the Diocese observing the World Day of Prayer, March 8.
- c. Prayer a vital force in the life of our branches.

make your payments promptly to the Diocesan treasurer, Mrs. Kenneth A. Southworth, 10 Vernon Place, East Orange? Be sure they are plainly designated as to what they are for, and from what parish or mission they come.

notify the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Ralph F. Barry, 149 Clinton Place, Hackensack, at once of changes in your officers and their addresses? read the Spirit of Missions?

know that each year the Auxiliary of this Diocese has entire responsibility for outfitting certain hospitals, schools and missions of the church? Without the help of each parish this cannot be accomplished. Please let the work of these missions, for whose equipment we are responsible, be your first consideration in planning your work.

know that the field of work and interest of the Woman's Auxiliary extends from the parish and community to the diocese and world ?

THE District organization shall have the same officers as the Diocesan organization. They shall be elected (or appointed) for a term of three years. In cases of election, a nominating committee shall be appointed by the Director, which will automatically be discharged at the time of election. This committee shall confer with the Diocesan Board, or with the Diocesan heads of departments in reference to nominees.

It is essential that all District and Diocesan officers submit their reports in triplicate; one for the Diocesan president; one for the Corresponding Secretary, and one for filing.

All yearly reports from parish branches must be sent in to the District Director no later than January 1st. This is in order to conform to the fiscal year of the Protestant Episcopal Church which is from January 1 to December 31.

Parish officers should procure and read "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Life of the Church" for help in organizing and carrying on their branches.

The Diocesan and District officers of the Auxiliary stand ready to assist branches in any way regarding the planning and carrying on of their work.

Annual Reports

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

Following the precedent of last year, two leader's Training Classes were again held, one in Christ Church, East Orange, and one in Christ Church, Hackensack, under the leadership of Mrs. Reginald Williams. These classes had an average attendance of over forty women, not all of whom however, were prepared, at their conclusion, to lead classes but who reported back to their Parishes on the text book and gave brief resumes of each session, thereby spreading the idea of the adult Educational Program of the Church.

Twenty-six discussion group classes, with an approximate attendance of 273 women; five Intensive Days; one reading group and several "Bible" and "Personal Religion" groups led by Rectors of Parishes, make up the year's report for this Department.

The study theme "Christ and the Modern World" with the text book "The Never Failing Light" proved most timely and interesting.

At the Spring Rally, which was held at St. Paul's Church, Englewood, Dr. Arthur Sherman, Secretary for Missionary Education to the National Council, spoke to us on the general subject of "Missions". The collection at this meeting amounted to \$45.00 and was sent to "The House of Light" at Matsugasaki, Japan.

Two scholarships to the Blairstown Conference were given by this Department.

NATIONAL SUPPLY

The National Supply Department has accomplished a great deal during the Year 1934. Although we did not quite fill our assignment, the value of the work totals about \$1400.00 more than last year's.

It is very encouraging to have 132 Guilds and Auxiliaries taking an active part in our work—more than ever before. The Girls' Friendly also assisted as usual.

We completely outfitted three Missions, viz., St. Mark's, Dante, Va., Church of The Holy Apostles, Oneida, Wis., and the Church of The Redeemer, Greensboro, N. C., Three Schools—Galilee Mission School, Creswell, N. C., St. Mary's School, Springfield, S. D., and Hoffman-St. Mary's Industrial Institute, Mason, Tenn.; One Hospital—St. Elizabeth's, Shanghai, China. We also helped St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, China.—The Voorhees School, Denmark, N. C., Penland School for Weavers and Potters, Penland, N. C., Calvary and St. Andrews Mission, Charleston, N. C., and the Mission of St. John the Baptist, Charlottesville, Va.; St. Elizabeth's School, Wakpala, N. D.

Twenty-one completely filled personal boxes were sent and we helped with eight more; one catechist was outfitted and fifteen Christmas Gift Boxes have been reported to date. The total value of the boxes is as follows:

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

Early in the year a most successful luncheon was held at the Hotel Suburban, East Orange, with Margaret Sanger speaking on "What Church Women Should Know About the Birth Control Movement." A second luncheon was held on the subject of "Child Labor In New Jersey."

Twenty children were sent to camp and given vacations during the summer. There were ten picnics, which meant that four hundred children had a one day outing. Milk and ice were furnished for eighteen babies of the tenements. Assistance of various kinds was given which brought wide variety of relief during the past year. For example; money for a blood transfusion, and a trained nurse for a dying boy which made his last hours more bearable. Renting of a wheel chair for an elderly lady was made possible, and transportation for vacations of four boys and girls. A request was made for spectacle frames and the response has been splendid. We have furnished seventeen pairs of frames and also lenses for three children.

At Christmas one hundred and fifteen large red stockings were filled and two hundred and fifty small stockings. The District of Montclair provided its usual gifts to Verona Sanitarium. The District of Hackensack did splendid work in having practically every parish contribute some stockings. The District of Orange not only contributed stockings but took charge of giving gifts to the one hundred patients of Ivy Hill Convalescent Hospital.

Information has been sent out in form letters about industrial conditions, peace, and general social conditions.

At the Triennial Meeting in Atlantic City, the subject of Christian citizenship was discussed by all the delegates after a stirring paper by Miss Vida Scudder. A report was made with the following resolution: "That this report, together with the address of Miss Scudder, be used as a basis for study and action in the various dioceses and parishes during the coming Triennium." Copies will be sent to every parish as soon as they are available.

Department funds are very low. We hope to carry on our program of informing you as to our opportunities to put into practice Jesus' teaching of the supreme worth of every self. Won't you help us to relieve some of His children from their weariness? Help us to give them the handclasp of an unknown friend who believes in His love for others.

DEPARTMENT OF DIOCESAN SUPPLIES (Comfort Club)

This department is called upon to give "comfort" in such a wide variety of ways—clothing for children, to permit them to go to school, clothing for men, to help them in applying for work, coats for the women and foods for the pantry shelf. All these things spell comfort in its physical sense, and sometimes the very doing of it has opened the way for God's comfort to restore peace to worried and tortured minds and hearts.

Besides personal cases, there are our regular allotments for institutions and agencies of the diocese. All kinds of articles to the value of \$3500 have been sent them. Many small parishes have had to be helped in the purchase of materials for their sewing, and linens and underwear bought.

One hundred and twenty-five parishes have taken part in this work. Fifty three have sent money amounting to \$1100 to our treasurer, and the total value of the work is about \$5000.

The response to the call has been splendid and as we are not on the Budget, I know you realize how deeply we appreciate your help.

A Christmas Fund, to which some parishes and individuals contributed, helped out. Those who answered the call, enabled our bishops to make brighter the Blessed Day for many.

Knowledge is a call to action, and it is a great deal easier to do that which is given us to do than to face the responsibility for not doing it. We have given all we felt we could spare. Now we must give even that which we feel we cannot spare.

Constitution

ARTICLE I.—NAME

This Society shall be called the Newark Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT

The object of this Society shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Newark the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP

The membership of this Society shall be composed of all women, and parish organizations of women actively engaged in carrying out its object.

ARTICLE IV.—EXECUTIVE BOARD

The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Custodian of the United Thank Offering, who, together with the District Directors and Chairmen of Committees shall constitute the Executive Board.

ARTICLE V.—AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at any regular meeting, provided, however, that notice of such amendment has been given, in writing, to the organization in each parish, at least one month previously.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I.—MEETINGS

Section 1. There shall be a regular meeting of the Auxiliary during the year, on the first Wednesday of each month from October to May, inclusive, except December.

Sec. 2. The meeting in January shall be the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 3. The President shall call at least four regulars meetings of the Executive Board each year, which shall be held on the first Wednesday of the month.

Sec. 4. Eight shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Eexecutive Board.

ARTICLE II.—DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Auxiliary and of the Executive Board; to call special meetings; and to have a general supervision of the work.

Sec. 2. The first Vice-President shall represent the Department of Education.

Sec. 3. The second Vice-President shall represent the Supply Department.

Sec. 4. The third Vice-President shall represent the Department of Social Service.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct all correspondence of the Auxiliary and to send out all notices. She shall also be the Custodian of the Emery Fund, and the Book of Remembrance.

Sec. 6. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep the Minutes of all meetings of the Auxiliary, and of the Executive Board, and present a report at the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep all moneys contributed, and to disburse the same; exclusive of the United Thank Offering.

ARTICLE III.—COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be the following committees: Publicity, Finance, Auditing.

Sec. 2. The President, with the approval of the Executive Board, shall appoint the Chairmen of Committees.

ARTICLE IV.—ELECTIONS

Section 1. Elections shall be by ballot.

Sec. 2. At the Annual Meeting in January, 1922, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a President, and a Corresponding Secretary to serve for three years or until their successors shall have been chosen. There shall also be elected a first, second and third Vice-President, to serve for two years; a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian, to serve for one year.

At the Annual Meeting in January, 1923, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a Recording Secretary, a Treasurer, and a United Thank Offering Custodian, to serve for three years.

At the Annual Meeting in January, 1924, and each third year thereafter, there shall be elected a first, second and third Vice-President, to serve for three years.

"No officer shall serve for more than two consecutive terms." (A term is understood to be the major portion of three years.)

All officers shall take office the May following their election, except the Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian, who shall take office immediately upon election.

ARTICLE V.—DELEGATES

There shall be five delegates to the Triennial Convention, nominated by the Executive Board, and elected by the Auxiliary, with the approval of the Bishop. Delegates to all other meetings shall be elected by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI.—AMENDMENTS

Amendments to these By-Laws may be made at any regular meeting, provided previous notice has been given in writing to members.
