President's Letter

*"Watchman tell us of the night
What its signs of promise are."*

AS I HEARD the old hymn sung in church recently, I thought it expressed the function of a president's annual report or letter to her diocese. She looks over the ground and tries to see what gains have been made, and what the trends are.

As I consider the diocese at the beginning of the year 1937, it seems to me that the report is very good in several directions.

There is, I think, a very good spirit of cooperation. There is a gain, not perhaps as large as we wish it might be, in the sense of diocesan solidarity and responsibility. But I am amazed, as I look over the reports from the parishes to realize the amount of the work we have been able to accomplish, by working together, and in particular what has been done by the smaller parishes. The gifts are small but the aggregate mounts up.

During the year past the meetings have been well attended, both in the districts and the diocesan meetings. The regular monthly meetings in Newark have averaged about 30 more than last year. I wish more of the women might come to these splendid and enthusiastic meetings and get the inspiration of being with the fine body of women of the diocese and hearing the interesting speakers. It would be a great help to them in their parish branch work.

The number of parishes of the diocese doing some Auxiliary work is about 145. In some cases this means only a small amount of supply work, or taking part in the United Thank Offering, but it all helps.

All the Departments are doing splendidly.

The Devotional life has been greatly helped, I am sure, by the use of the Forward Movement Leaflets. Their use has been very definitely encouraged by the Auxiliary and with good results. The Quiet Day, given by the Rev. Gardiner Day in December was well attended and much appreciated. The Day of Prayer for Peace on November 11 was widely used in the diocese.

The Education Department is starting the year with a fresh and vigorous life, building on the fine work already done, and showing growth in sections of the diocese where the work is somewhat new.

Almost all parishes show some Social Service activity. The Diocesan Supply Department shows growth. The General Supply has as usual accomplished a great deal. Please do read the reports in detail.

And would it not be wonderful if, when the United Thank Offering is presented at Cincinnati next October, every woman in the diocese should be represented?

In terms of figures, the gifts and work of the guilds and branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Newark have a report for the year of money and supplies for the Church's work totalling just about \$34,200.00.

As I looked over the reports from the parishes as they came in, I feel that the great need is an increased emphasis upon the Educational side of our work.

This is not the responsibility of the Educational Department only but of us all. We must learn enough of the church's work to have a right perspective on it. We must learn to think of the Gospel in world wide terms. We must have a more practical knowledge of the facts before we can really enter in and care about them, whether the facts are about the church in Newark, or in Alaska, whether they concern our relations with our Negro neighbors and their social and economic as well as religious problems, or the social, financial, and religious problems of the young native churches in China and India.

In practice, that means making place in our parish and branch life for more and better programs, speakers and study.

If this conception of our work could become more widespread, I believe we would have less difficulty in getting the women we want to take part in it. The Mission of the Church is not a chore to be done—it is a gift of God to be shared. "We have found The Master" said the Disciples, "Come and see!" And we—"If we be His disciples—?" Isn't that what we are trying to do also—share the wonder of the knowledge of the Father's love for man with others who have not had that blessing and all that it brings.

Let us in the year to come test our work by this measure!

So can we help a world that sorely needs it to look towards the Perfect Light.

 - b. Every woman in the Diocese observing the World Day of Prayer.
 - c. Prayer a vital force in the life of our branches.



The following quotation is from the pen of Arthur Seldon Lloyd, Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of New York and Formerly President of the Board of Missions of the Church.

“WHAT does it mean to be a member of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council? Taking a mite-box, going to a meeting now and then, sewing for a missionary box, attending an occasional missionary service? Often it does mean just that; sometimes it means much less; but it can mean infinitely more.

We need great Ideals. We need to realize the Christ working in us. We need to commit ourselves to infinite things, and then to put such a spirit into the Church as shall cause the things done to be done in the spirit of Christ. If we all would put the emphasis in the right place it would be a tremendous source of power. Are we, as members of the Auxiliary, vitally conscious that we are sharing in the work of bringing souls out of darkness into His marvelous light? All the religions earth ever had were trying to find out God. No one is wicked because he is a Buddhist or a Hindu. He is only waiting for his answer, and Christianity is his answer. This is our priceless possession, and the world is pleading that we give it to all men. The revelation of God must be given to all men because Christ is praying always that they may know the Father so that they may come back home again. Does it fire our imagination, and kindle our zeal, and deepen our compassion, to realize that our Father's heart is breaking because so many of His children do not know? To this high task we are called. He has planned no other way. He has given us the world to win for Him. Our hearts ought to sing all the time for joy that He has blessed us with the privilege of being workers together with Him.”

Officers' Reports

EDUCATION

In 1936 the Educational Department conducted 26 classes, 7 Intensive Days, and the 22 leaders for these classes were trained in two classes, one in Orange and one in Hackensack. Mrs. Reginald Williams conducted them both. A total number of 438 women were enrolled.

At the meeting of the Synod of the Second Province in Summit last January, Dr. Elmore McKee addressed the Auxiliary. His subject "The Church's Technique in the Waging of Peace" was so ably handled that it produced an instant demand for the publication of this address. The Educational Department of our diocese underwrote the initial expense of this publication and the pamphlet has been widely circulated.

On September 30, 1936, a preliminary conference was held in Christ Church, Glen Ridge, to stimulate the interest of parish presidents and educational secretaries in the 3 Training Classes for leaders, to be started in Advent. 75 women responded to the invitation, and all the districts were represented. The President of the Auxiliary, the Educational Secretary, and Miss Mary Kirk, formerly a member of the faculty of the Bishop Tuttle School, Raleigh, N. C. spoke on various phases of the year's course.

The Department has established a Speakers' Bureau for the benefit of parish branches under Mrs. Fortiner of Maplewood.

The District Educational Secretaries have been "as a man's own hand" to your Secretary, never failing in their helpfulness and generous to the limit of time and interest. From our President the Department has received the guidance and support that she is so well qualified to give. Mrs. Reginald Williams, Mrs. J. G. Dolson and Mrs. E. W. Fortiner, members-at-large of the Educational Committee, have contributed of their time and experience in a manner to be expected by those who have been privileged to work with them. We face the new year with joy and faith.

Of the work for 1936-37 we have sent a check for \$350. to Dr. H. B. Taylor, St. James Hospital, Anking, Anhui, China, completely covering the needs of that Hospital, and have supplied the Shoshone School in Wind River, Wyo. with all their sheets, blankets, towels and shoes for the children. One box has already gone to St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., which is on this year's list. 14 boxes of used clothing in good condition have been sent to Lydia, Va. and St. Christopher's, Ga. and new clothing, household articles and surgical supplies as follows:

SOCIAL SERVICE

This department has, during the past year urged the Parish Auxiliaries to make Social Education a part of their programs, to be open minded in all social problems and to listen to both sides when ever possible.

We have made an effort to remind you of the Welfare Organizations both within and without the church through which each Parish may participate in the bettering of the Community.

Finally we have urged you through Social Action to help bring changes in conditions which hinder the coming of the Kingdom. By way of illustrations, efforts have been made to secure active support of such social legislation as the Kerr Bill (aliens); Costigan-Wagner Bill (housing); Minimum Wage Law and Prevention of Home Work and Sweat Shops in N. J.; Pettingill Bill (Movies). We have recommended the Consumers Protective Label and backed Peace Legislation and all organizations working toward Peace. Many Parishes have had speakers on social subjects.

During the summer months 54 children were sent to camps and 8 entire families were given vacations. Children were equipped with clothes for vacations; hospitalization was given for 6 children; shoes and glasses were purchased.

125 children were taken to the country for a day's picnic.

The milk fund, which furnished milk for twenty-four under nourished babies during the summer, has been made permanent and it is hoped that every parish will keep a milk bottle conveniently located where members may keep it filled with coins.

At Christmas 625 small stockings and 154 large stockings were filled and distributed. 618 bags were taken to hospitals, as well as bed jackets, toys and other gifts. The parishes cooperated generously making this by far the most notable year in our experience.

May this department grow in service to society so that the Christ-like spirit of each Parish will permeate its community, exemplifying the Master's Command that we "Bear one another's Burdens."

UNITED THANK OFFERING

During 1936, there has been an encouraging increase in the United Thank Offering, not only in the amount of money contributed, but in the number of women contributing, and most important of all, in the devotion and willingness to sacrifice which have been unmistakably evident in all parts of the diocese.

Ninety-seven parishes have reported increases, both in numbers and amount. Twenty-four have remained the same or decreased slightly, these latter in every case being in localities where conditions are unusually difficult. The districts of Newton and Montclair report one hundred per cent of their parishes contributing.

District and parish custodians have been a constant inspiration because of their interest, which is so deep, and their zeal, which never flags. They bring lovely stories of whole-hearted cooperation from many women, and their joy is reflected on their faces and in their letters.

We have lost two custodians by death, Mrs. W. J. A. McKim, of Christ Church, Short Hills; and Mrs. C. E. Kopp, of All Saints, Bergenfield. We shall miss them from their places among us, but the work that they have done toward the building of the Kingdom shall go on and on, and they, being gone into the Other Room of the Father's House, shall yet speak to us. We are grateful for the shining example of their lives.

DIOCESAN SUPPLY (Comfort Club)

During this past year, this department has continued its work for the Organizations and Institutions of the diocese. And it has also been called upon to help care for many individual cases. To fill these special needs, a Clearing House has been created through which many articles have changed hands. Furniture and clothing have gone to those who need, gladly passed on by those who could do without, or who had an over-supply.

To St. Barnabas and Christ Hospitals have been sent, linens, hospital supplies, garments, and in many instances, money. To St. Catherine's Home, linens, garments for mothers and babies, foods for the pantry shelf, and \$100. To the House of the Holy Comforter, linens, curtains, furniture, stair carpet and \$50. To Bonnie Brae Farm, boys' clothing and household linens. To the House of the Good Shepherd, furniture, through the Clearing House. To the Organizations:—the Church Mission of Help, new and used clothing—far more new than used—layettes, and woolies of every type, and, through the Clearing House again, carriages, playgrounds, cribs, and other furniture.

To the City Mission, large quantities of used clothing, shoes, new underwear, new woolen socks and caps, toys, and \$175. To the Western Counties Mission, used clothing and \$100, toward the mortgage. To Warren County Mission, used clothing and a wheel chair for a cripple. To Ringwood Manor, quantities of used clothing from the Bundle Days, and an ice-box for Miss Bogart.

The special efforts at Easter and Christmas have added materially to our finances for the money collected from parish groups and individual donors has increased our balance by over \$600.

The total value of work, gifts and money was \$5,870.00.
