MINUTES OF MEETING
OF
Woman's Auxiliary
MAY 14, 1889.

The Auxiliary met in the Guild Room of Holy Innocents Church, Henderson, at 5:30 p.m.

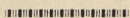
Rev. T. M. N. George opened the meeting with a hymn and prayer. He then delivered a short and practical address, urging the duty of all, as members of the Church, and as members of the Woman's Auxiliary, to pray for Missions, to learn about Missions, and to work for Missions. He reminded his hearers that every time they use our Lord's prayer, and repeat "Thy kingdom come," they are praying for the extension of His Church, and urged them to learn about and work for Missions that they may use this petition with understanding and heartiness. The service closed with prayer.

The roll of parishes was called by Mrs. E. G. Davis, vice president of the Woman's Guild, of Henderson. Eight parishes were represented—Trinity, Asheville; Holy Innocents, Henderson; St. James, Kittrell's; St.

Stephens, Oxford; Christ, Raleigh; Good Shepherd, Raleigh; St. Marys, Raleigh; Trinity, Scotland Neck.

The secretary then read the annual report; also an interesting letter from Rev. N. B. Fuller of the Montgomery Institute, Seguin, Texas, asking for \$125 a year to educate and maintain a little girl whose twin sister is to be maintained there by Bishop Johnson.

As a number of the ladies present had to leave on a certain railroad train, the meeting dispersed without having accomplished the organization of an auxillary branch in Henderson.



SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

**North Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to
the Board of Missions.**

APRIL 1st, 1888 to APRIL 1st 1889.

For the first time since our N. C. Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized, our annual report shows a falling off, instead of an increase. Various causes may be assigned for this. St. John's, Fayetteville, has left us to join the Auxiliary Branch of East Carolina, organized last May. Several of our parishes are preparing to build new churches, and the women feel constrained to devote their time and strength to this object. Only seven branches show an increase in contributions. Every column of our report shows a falling off, except Foreign and Domestic Missions, which are increased.

The mite chests for General Missions, which have helped so well and so unobtrusively, have not been so carefully remembered and collected this year; only ten parishes making report of them.

Dear friends, this ought not so to be, when we have so much to be thankful for. May the coming year show by its contributions a greater degree of earnest self devotion, and remembrance of our duty to Missions as members of the church.

The objects proposed for united diocesan effort, have not been fully provided for, but we have made a very fair beginning. Fourteen parishes have responded to this proposition to unite our labors, and have raised \$70.20. Of this sum \$30 was sent to the Mission rooms to be applied to the support of a baby in St. Mary's Orphanage, Shanghai, China; and \$40.20 was sent there to be forwarded to Montgomery Institute, Seguin, Texas, for support of one scholar. It was desired to raise \$60 for this object, to support one scholar one year. Perhaps this year we may succeed in securing the whole amount.

Earnest appeals have been made for aid for two Missionary objects in our own diocese, which are heartily commended to the thoughtful and prayerful consideration of the North Carolina Auxiliary. Cannot we unite in helping these also, and so have one Foreign, one Domestic, and one Diocesan mission work to unite our hands and hearts and prayers in helping. It will be more useful for each branch to send its mite towards certain objects, than for our strength and means to be scattered in so many directions.

The diocesan objects referred to are the Cashier's Valley Mission, and one lately established about seven miles from Asheville. At Cashier's Valley the people have built a neat little church, but they ask for help to

pay a clergyman's expenses. If the North Carolina Auxiliary could promise them \$50 a year it would be a great assistance. The other Missionary work asking for help is the purchase and repair of a building for a church seven miles from Asheville. This object is warmly commended by Rev. Dr. Buxton. They need about \$50 for this purpose.

Think about these works which so greatly need assistance, and let each Auxiliary help as God enables them to do so. If each of our Auxiliary members would conscientiously put one penny each week through the year in a mite box, and send to Diocesan Secretary, we could easily give thirty dollars to the Chinese Orphanage; \$60 to Montgomery Institute; \$50 to Cashier's Valley; and \$50 to the Mission near Asheville. Will you not each one try this systematic penny a week offering?

We report this year 21 Parish Branches, with 368 members. Our offerings from April 1st, 1888, to April 1st, 1889, are:

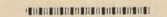

Leaving to pay for printing and mailing this

This is considerably less than half this expense.

None of the Parish branches have interested themselves in the selection of assistant secretaries. It would be a great assistance to the work, if the Auxiliaries in each convocation would recommend to the Diocesan Secretary such women as would be suitable to undertake this charge, so that proper authority may be given to them, and the Auxiliary thus be strengthened and aided. One in each convocation would be sufficient. Raleigh convocation is now the only one which has an assistant secretary. Asheville, Charlotte, and Tarboro, convocations need such helpers, and the Diocesan secretary feels greatly the need of assistance in a work which requires more time, strength and labor, than can be properly borne by one person.

May God's blessing still be upon the Auxiliary and its members.

RULES

For the Organization of the North Carolina Branch of the
Woman's Auxiliary.

1.—This organization shall be called the NORTH CAROLINA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

2.—Its objects are, by means of union and systematic effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence; to increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese; to unite previously existing societies; and to encourage the formation of societies where there are none.

3.—All parish societies, and all individuals desiring it, will be considered members of this Association.

4.—The officers of this Association shall be a Diocesan Secretary, to be appointed by the Bishop, and an Assistant Secretary in each Convocation, to be appointed by the Dean.

5.—The Diocesan Secretary shall call meetings and preside over them; shall correspond with the General Secretary and the Missionaries and find out where help is needed, and of what kind; shall inform the parish Secretaries, and arrange about their work, so that a general oversight of the work may be kept by one person. She shall prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese; shall receive and forward all money offerings and shall keep account of all money and articles contributed for missionary purposes by the parish branches or by individuals, and shall embody a full account of this work in the annual report.

6.—The Assistant Secretaries shall try to increase missionary spirit in their respective Convocations, by arousing the women to greater efforts in working for missionaries, and raising money for the cause; and by diffusing intelligence concerning the missionary work of the Church. They are to search out the scattered families and individuals belonging to the Church, and try to interest them in missionary work. And to correspond with the parish Secretaries and Diocesan Secretary in regard to missionary work. The Assistant Secretaries are authorized to hold meetings in their own Convocation, whenever they consider it desirable.

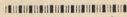
7.—The Secretaries of the parish branches shall correspond with the Diocesan Secretary, transmit the information received from her to their respective parish branches, and shall report to her by April 1st, in each year, an account of work done by their parish.

8.—Each parish shall send one or more delegates to the annual meeting, if possible.

9.—There shall be a meeting of this Association each year, during the session of the Diocesan Convention.

10.—Five persons shall constitute a quorum at all meetings.

11.—To provide for the expenses of the Diocesan officers in postage, stationery and printing, or other matters, a contribution of 10 cents a year shall be asked from each member of the Woman's Auxiliary in North Carolina, to be collected by each parish Secretary and forwarded to the Diocesan Secretary by the 1st of April.
